## CENSUS OF MERCHANDISING AND SERVICE ESTABLISHMENTS, 1931. HOTEL OPERATIONS IN NEW BRUNSWICK, 1930

A preliminary report for the Census of Merchandising and Service Establishments, covering the operations of hotels in New Brunswick during the year 1930, shows that 135 hotels which operated the entire year had receipts of $\$ 1,637,756$ and 18 hotels which operated only part of the year (most of them in the summer months) had receipts of ${ }^{3} 215,790$.

The hotels operating the entire year are classified on the basis of plan of operation, as European, American and mixed (European and American) plan hotels. For European plan hotels, receipts are shown separately for rooms and meals, while for American and mixed plan hotels, the receipts from these sources are combined. Of the total receipts of $\$ 1,637,-$ 756 reported for all hotels in operation during the entire year, \$139,392 were secured from the sale of meals in European plan hotels, and it is estimated that $\$ 648,895$ were secured from the same source in American and mixed plan hotels. Thus, receipts from the sale of meals provided almost half the entire revenue of hotels in New Brunswick in 1930. Receipts from other sources - such as tobacco counters, news-stands, etc. - totalled \$81,791.

The total number of employees was given by each hotel as at the time the report was made, and the number of employees for the months of January, April, July, october and December, in 1930. The average number of employees for these five months in hotels operated the entire year was 775, of which 270 are taken as male employees and 505 as female employees. The total anount of saluries and wages paid to these employees was ${ }^{(368,-}$ 824. The value of board and room furnished hotel employees is not included in this figure.

Proprietors and firm members receiving a stated salary were requested to report the amounts so received during the year. Figures based on these replies are shown in the tables, but it is realized that such data contain some errors and omissions and are based upon various interpretations of the question.

The number of guest rooms in hotels operating the entire year was 3,313 and the seating capacity of dining rooms was 4,030.

Separate particulars are given for hotels operating the entire year in the city of St. John.

## Hotels Operating Part of the Year

Combined figures are shown for hotels operating only part of the year as it is impossible to give figures by plan of operation for these hotels without revealing the operations of individual establishments. As the majority of seasonal hotels operate on the American plan, separate figures are not shown for room receipts. However, on the basis of particulars submitted by some hotels, it is estimated that receipts from meals amounted to $\$ 93,328$. The total recejpts from all sources for hotels operating only part of the year were \$2i5,790.

The average number of employees for hotels operating only part of the rear has not been computed as the most of the employees, as is shown in the table, are employed for the summer months only. The salaries and wages reported cover only the period of employment and do not include any estimate of the value of bcard anc lodgings furnished to employees.
