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FOREIGN TRADE OF BELGIUM 1929-1933.

The external commerce of Belgium has suffered declines in common with world trade in general. The franc value of Belgian exports in 1933 amounted to 14,328 million as contrasted with 15,124 million in 1932 and 31,880 million in 1929. Imports in 1933 were valued at 15,217 million francs in 1933, 16,343 million francs in 1932 and 35,624 in 1929. These value figures, however, tend to accentuate the decline in Belgian trade as contrasted with most other countries, since the gold value of the franc established in 1926, has been maintained, and its commodity value has appreciated more than these currencies of which the former gold parity has been abandoned. The following tables set forth (a) the general movement of wholesale prices in Belgium, Canada, United Kingdom and United States since 1929, and (b) a comparison of the value and volume of Belgian trade, 1929-33.

It will be noted that the decline in wholesale prices from 1929 to 1933 in Belgium was much greater than in any of the other three countries. The Belgian index number for 1933 was only 58.9 per cent of the 1929 index, compared with 70.2 per cent for the Canadian index, 73.1 per cent for United Kingdom and 69.2 per cent for United States.

These variations in price levels are largely a corollary of fluctuating exchange rates between the currencies of the different countries, and it follows that the drastic declines in the franc value of Belgian trade may be discounted somewhat by the strong exchange position of the franc.

It will also be noted that the decline in the volume of imports and exports has been much less severe than the decline in value, and that the volume of exports showed a slight improvement in 1933 over 1932. Nevertheless the relatively less drastic contraction in volume does not offset the severity of the persistent decline in values. The seriousness of this cannot be minimised in a small highly centralized country like Belgium which is unable to absorb more than a small percentage of its own production. A competent authority has stated that no branch of Belgian industrial activity has been able to withstand the persistent shrinkage in foreign trade.

#### TRADE OF BELGIUM WITH CANADA

The value of imports into Belgium from Canada in 1933 amounted to 150,549,000 francs compared with 184,778,000 francs in 1932 and 596,738,000 francs in 1929. This sharp decline in values is principally accounted for by the fall in agricultural prices, notably wheat, the predominant item in Belgian imports from Canada. Imports of wheat from Canada in 1929 were 2,701,416 metric quintals, valued at 424,868,000 francs, while in 1933 2,183,738 metric quintals imported amounted to only 108,930,000 francs. The table below shows the imports of wheat into Belgium giving the average unit price for each of the five past years.

Belgian exports to Canada have also declined sharply in recent years, amounting to 101,737,000 francs in 1933 as compared with 144,350,000 francs in 1932 and 393,367,000 in 1929.

The downward trend of trade with Canada was checked in the first six months of 1934. Imports from Canada during the six months ended July 31, 1934, amounted to 111,388,000 francs compared with 76,013,000 francs in the corresponding period of 1933. Exports to Canada amounted to 51,198,000 francs and 49,218,000 francs respectively for the two periods.

#### BELGIAN MARKET FOR CANADIAN PRODUCTS

Some of the principal items imported into Belgium from Canada are commented upon individually below.

##### APPLES

Total imports of fresh apples into Belgium in 1933 were greater in volume than for any of the four preceding years although values were down somewhat from the 1930 and 1931 figures. Total imports in 1933 were 213,385 metric quintals valued at 27,859 thousand francs; in 1932, 134,586 quintals at 20,112 thousand francs; in 1931, 209 quintals at 36,991 thousand francs; in 1930, 153,323 quintals at 34,180 thousand francs and in 1929, 87,957 quintals at 18,537 thousand francs. Imports from Canada in 1933 amounted to 30,373 quintals which was also greater than any of the four preceding years except 1931 when imports amounted to 50,537 quintals. Principal competitors in the Belgian apple market are the United States which supplied 141,183 quintals in 1933, and the Netherlands which supplied 36,741 quintals.

##### ASBESTOS RAW OR IN FIBRE

In 1933 as in previous years Canada ranked first as a Belgian source of asbestos crude, supplying 36,914 metric quintals out of a total import of 140,285 quintals. Imports from Canada and total imports increased

from 13,390 quintals and 54,684 quintals in 1932 respectively. Other principal sources of supply are Germany, Portuguese West Africa, Russia, South Africa, Netherlands and United Kingdom.

#### BARLEY, OATS, WHEAT

Belgium is a small country with a relatively large population. The population is estimated at 8,313,449 or a total of 699 persons per square mile. Thus Belgium is a market for agricultural products requiring extensive cultivation, and annually imports large quantities of wheat, oats and barley. With a large population per acre of arable land Belgium has not been able to contemplate self-sufficiency policies which are now so prevalent throughout Europe. Production of wheat in Belgium from 1929 to 1933 averaged 14.4 million bushels as compared with average production of 15.3 million bushels from 1924 to 1928. During the four years from 1929-30 to 1932-33 Belgian imports of wheat averaged 44.4 million bushels compared with average imports of 40.6 million bushels from 1925-26 to 1928-29. Belgium constitutes a larger market for wheat at the present time than prior to 1929 and import restrictions are less severe than in other importing countries in Europe.

Belgium does not produce her own requirements of oats and barley. From 1928 to 1932 oats production averaged 46 million bushels and imports averaged 18 million bushels. Barley production averaged 4.0 million bushels from 1928 to 1932 and average imports amounted to 7.1 million bushels during the same years.

Belgium is a deficit area as far as cereals are concerned and as such is a substantial importer of commodities which normally exist in surplus quantities in Canada.

#### FISH, SHELLFISH, ETC. PRESERVED

Imports under this heading into Belgium from Canada in 1933 amounted to 4,497 quintals valued at 2,939,000 francs. It probably consists mainly of canned salmon which is not separately stated in Belgian trade statistics.

#### COPPER, RAW, IN BLOCKS, INGOTS, ETC.

Supplies of this item are obtained principally from Belgian Congo and the United States. Imports from Canada amounted to 23,609 quintals in 1933 out of a total import of 467,586 quintals, and 2,361 quintals in 1932 out of a total of 385,494. No imports from Canada are shown in 1929, 1930 or 1931.

#### FILMS, PHOTOGRAPHIC, IN ROLLS

Canada has gained a position in this market in recent years. Imports from Canada in 1933 amounted to 130 quintals as compared with a total of 490 quintals. Competition comes principally from Germany and the protected domestic industry.

#### WOOD PULP

Principal supplies are obtained from Scandinavian countries. Total imports in 1933 amounted to 1,298,619 quintals of which Canada supplied 21,765 quintals.

#### ZINC, ORE AND CRUDE

Belgium is the world's second largest producer of refined zinc. The total Belgian output in 1932 was 98,978 tons out of a world production of 786,411 tons. The industry is cartelized and production controlled. Imports of zinc ore in 1933 amounted to 335,197 metric tons of which Canada supplied 30,996, and imports of zinc raw and scrap was 111,020 quintals of which 3,016 quintals came from Canada.

#### BELGIAN EXCHANGE, 1932 and 1933

The position of the belga was strong during 1932 and 1933, both in terms of gold and non-gold standard countries. This was particularly marked in 1933 when rumours were afoot that several of the remaining gold standard countries were faced with financial difficulties. During this period Belgian gold reserves continued to increase while bank notes in circulation decreased, resulting in a considerably higher ratio of gold reserves to outstanding

notes. Although the Belgian government found it necessary to meet some of its current commitments in 1932 by borrowing outside the country, in 1933 the ordinary budget was balanced with a surplus and no difficulty was apparent in marketing bonds for capital expenditure. This indicated improvement in the internal financial situation.

BELGIAN TARIFFS ON PRINCIPAL IMPORTS FROM CANADA

Note: - The data on Belgian tariff were prepared by the Foreign Tariffs Division, Department of Trade and Commerce. Enquiries relating to the tariffs of foreign countries should be addressed to that division.

Powdered buttermilk and animal bristles are admitted free of duty into Belgium but are subject to a turnover tax of 2.5% ad valorem on importation.

Wheat, rye and barley are admitted duty free under the Belgian tariff, but are subject to turnover taxes of 2.5% ad valorem in the case of wheat and rye and 5% ad valorem in the case of barley. Imports of these grains can be made only under licenses but the licenses are granted without restriction on payment of a fee of 10 francs per 100 kilogs (about 12½ cents per 100 lbs.). This fee became effective for wheat on August 17, 1933, for barley on October 21, 1933, and for rye on June 18, 1934.

Fresh apples in 1929 were dutiable at 150 francs per 100 kilogs (\$1.89 per 100 lbs.) net, imported in boxes, baskets, barrels, or other containers weighing 20 kilogs (44 lbs.) or less, including the container and contents. This rate applied also to apples when the receptacles were divided up inside in compartments or when the fruit was wrapped in paper or other material to protect it. Fresh apples imported otherwise (except in bulk) were dutiable at 5 francs per 100 kilogs (6 cents per 100 lbs.) net, and those in bulk at 3 francs per 100 kilogs (4 cents per 100 lbs.) net.

On March 27, 1932, the foregoing rates were increased by 15% becoming respectively 172.50 francs per 100 kilogs (\$2.17 per 100 lbs.), 5.75 per 100 kilogs (7 cents per 100 lbs.), and 3.45 francs per 100 kilogs (4 cents per 100 lbs.).

Effective March 1, 1934, the tariff on fresh apples was changed as follows: -

Imported in boxes, baskets, barrels, or other containers, weighing, including the container:

15 kilogs or less - 172.50 francs per 100 kilogs net (\$2.17 per 100 lbs.)

15 to 20 kilogs:  
April 1 to August 31 - 25 francs per 100 kilogs gross (31 cents per 100 lbs.)

Sept. 1 to March 31 - 172.50 francs per 100 kilogs net (\$2.17 per 100 lbs.)

Over 20 kilogs:  
April 1 to August 31 - 25 francs per 100 kilogs gross (31 cents per 100 lbs.)

Sept. 1 to March 31 - 28.75 francs per 100 kilogs gross (36 cents per 100 lbs.)

Imported in bulk - 10.35 francs per 100 kilogs gross (13 cents per 100 lbs.)

Fresh apples are exempt from the turnover tax, but a license has been required for their importation since March 24, 1934.

Lead and zinc ores enter duty free except for a turnover tax of 1% ad valorem. Asbestos (raw or fibre), copper (rough cast, in blocks, ingots, etc., including scrap), and raw zinc (including scrap) are also admitted free of duty except for the turnover tax, which amounts to 2.5% ad valorem.

Canned sardines and tunny were dutiable at 30 francs per 100 kilogs in 1929, and other canned fish, including salmon, at 40 francs per 100 kilogs. These rates were increased to 34.50 francs (43 cents per 100 lbs.), and 46.00 francs (58 cents per 100 lbs.) respectively on March 27, 1932. The turnover tax on canned fish amounts to 10% ad valorem on Canadian products.

Leather gloves are dutiable at 15% ad valorem which rate has remained unchanged for a number of years. In addition to the duty there is a turnover tax of 7.5% ad valorem on Canadian gloves.

Wood pulp is exempt from ordinary duty but subject to a turnover tax of 5% ad valorem when of Canadian origin.

Automobile parts, unworked, have for a number of years been dutiable at 12% ad valorem. The turnover tax on these products, if of Canadian origin, amounts to 7.5% ad valorem. A license for the importation of automobile parts has been required since August 12, 1932.

Photographic films in rolls are dutiable at 24.15 francs per kilog (30 cents per lb.), having been increased from 21 francs on March 27, 1932. Canadian photographic films are subject to a luxury tax of 14% ad valorem.

A Belgian franc at par equals 2.78 cents Canadian. The above conversions have been made at par. Present exchange value is 4.6 cents Canadian. 1 kilog equals 2.204 lbs.

#### DISCREPANCIES BETWEEN CANADIAN AND BELGIAN STATISTICS

Comparison of Canadian statistics of exports to Belgium with Belgian figures of imports from Canada, and of Canadian statistics of imports from Belgium with the corresponding Belgian exports discloses that the two sets of figures are never identical and often differ greatly.

Many factors contribute to such discrepancies and unfortunately, for the most part they are not subject to exact numerical determination. Non-comparability between the two sets of trade figures may be caused by -

- (1) Canadian export values are on an F.O.B. basis, representing the actual cost or value at the time of exportation at the points in Canada whence originally shipped. Belgian import values are on a C.I.F. basis, representing the original cost plus the expenses of packing, freight, insurance, commissions and other expenses incidental to importation up to the point of discharge.
- (2) When foreign exchanges are fluctuating violently, it is customary to calculate an average rate to convert a year's figures. Error may be introduced when the fluctuations are wide, and the trade variable in different parts of the year. It should also be mentioned in this connection that both Belgian and Canadian customs' authorities use official rates of exchange which approximate, but do not necessarily duplicate current market rates.
- (3) The "time element". Goods leaving one country at the end of a year may not arrive at their destination until the beginning of the next year, and thus are entered in the statistics of the importing country a year later than the record of export.
- (4) The foregoing factors all contribute to the divergence in trade statistics but their importance is overshadowed by the difficulty in determining "origins" and "destinations".

Few countries attempt (and those with but qualified success) to credit all imports to their country of origin, i.e., the country in which the goods were actually produced or manufactured. Neither is it possible, in respect to large proportions of international trade, to ascertain or show, at the time of the exportation of goods from the country of production, to what country they will be finally conveyed for consumption. Could these particulars regarding imports and exports be accurately recorded in every case, discrepancies in trade statistics would largely disappear. But most countries including Belgium and Canada record their imports as from the country of consignment, that is, the country with which the actual commercial exchange takes place. While this system fails in many cases to disclose the country of actual origin of the goods, it does more clearly demonstrate the

"balance of trade" upon which international financial adjustments are based.

It is evident that systems such as are now followed, in conjunction with the great volume of indirect trade, must result in considerable divergencies in statistics. This is the dominant factor in producing differences between the trade records of Canada and those of European and other overseas countries. For a very large part of Canadian produce finds its way to the country of consumption via a third country.

Canada, like many other countries, attempts to ascertain the country of final destination when goods are exported, but in many cases this is not positively known, even to the owner of the goods. Fluctuations of demand and price may cause diversions of goods from one destination to another while in transit, e.g., Canadian wheat exported "to the United Kingdom" may be re-directed to continental European ports while on the Atlantic, or may be consigned to one of the European free ports and consigned from there to the country of consumption.

Another factor in this origins and destinations problem is that a proportion of exports from Canada to overseas countries are shipped via the United States, and similarly some exports of United States origin find their way to overseas markets in transit through Canada. European countries are inclined to credit the former in their import statistics to United States and the latter to Canada. Canada's exports to Belgium and the amount and proportion, shipped via the United States for the fiscal years ended March 31st are presented in the table below.

Statistics are not available showing the value of United States exports to Belgium in transit through Canada, but the following figures showing the exports of United States wheat to overseas countries via Canada give a valuable sidelight on this trade.

In the case of Canadian exports to Belgium, it is known that a large part is directed to the free port of Antwerp to be transhipped to a further destination unknown at the time of exportation. Canadian exports to Belgium are thus normally greater than Belgian imports for home consumption from Canada. The table below sets forth a comparison of Belgian imports from Canada and Canadian exports to Belgium, 1926-1933. Belgian in-transit imports are combined with retained or special imports. The excess of total Belgian imports over Canadian exports is principally due to the fact that grain of United States origin shipped via Canadian ports is credited in the Belgian statistics to Canada. It should be noted that in the years 1927 and 1928 when the excess of Belgian imports was greatest, the export of United States wheat via Canadian ports to overseas countries was exceptionally heavy. In 1932 and 1933 when Canadian exports were greater than Belgian imports the amount of United States wheat exports via Canada was greatly reduced.

The following table presents a comparison of exports from Belgium to Canada and imports into Canada from Belgium. The excess of Canadian imports from 1926-1930 was probably due to the fact that Belgium transhipped and consigned goods from the interior of Europe to Canada which were not recorded in the Belgian statistics but were credited by Canada to Belgium. On the other hand some goods of Belgian origin arrive in Canada after transhipment through a third country. There is reason to believe that some of the window glass recorded in Canada as imported from the United Kingdom is really of Belgian origin. Similarly Belgian exports of precious and semi-precious stones is in excess of the Canadian imports of this item. It is probable that some or most of the diamonds and precious stones shown in Canadian imports statistics as coming from United Kingdom and United States, are of Belgian origin. Neither United Kingdom nor United States show an export of diamonds to Canada. However, diamonds are only included in the United Kingdom statistics so far as they are declared on entries which represent only a small part of the trade. In any case, detail comparisons of the trade statistics of various countries by items is practically impossible since the various statistical classifications are not identical.


