The present report is compiled from both German and Canadian statistics. Its object is to present a brief outline of the foreign trade of Germany and a more detailed analysis of the trade between Germany and Canada.

TRADE OF GERMANY, 1929-1934.

The external trade of Germany which had shrunk to an extraordinary low level in 1933 declined still more in 1934.

The decrease in export trade appeared to come to a stop during 1933, but at the beginning of 1934, there was a new decline which continued as far as the summer, after a seasonal interruption in March. From August to October there was a seasonal increase, while in November there was a seasonal decrease which, however, was less pronounced than the average of preceding years. Exports over the full year 1934 decreased by 14.5 per cent as compared with 1933.

The German statistical office explains the continued retrogression of German exports, contrary to the world trend, as due partly to reduced export pressure resulting from increased domestic demand. Other factors mentioned are the devaluation of the dollar and the effects of the boycott.

The influence of German industrial recovery on the development of import trade is clearly shown by the increased imports of raw materials and semi-manufactured products which marked the period April, 1933 to April, 1934. Since then stringent measures of exchange control and import restriction have operated to check imports. Notwithstanding these measures, imports in 1934 increased by 5.9 per cent over 1933.

The downward movement of the value of German trade is due in part to declines in prices. The index number of value of imports fell from 100 in 1928 to 31.7 in 1934, while volume only declined to 69.8 per cent of the 1928 level. Exports in value declined from 100 in 1928 to 34.6 in 1934 compared with a decline to 40.7 in volume. The volume and value of German trade 1928-1934 is shown in the following tables.

The very considerable increase in production and consumption produced an increased demand for foreign raw materials and semi-manufactured products. For this reason the downward movement of imports which had already come to a stop during 1932, started to rise considerably at the end of 1933 and the beginning of 1934. As exports fell simultaneously, the balance of trade which had been favourable since 1929 was changed to an unfavourable balance at the beginning of last year. Owing to the precarious exchange conditions in Germany, measures were taken in the Spring of 1934 to reduce imports. Notwithstanding these measures, however, the year closed with an unfavourable balance of 286 million Reichmarks.

TRADE OF GERMANY WITH CANADA

Germany's trade with Canada has suffered continual declines since 1929. Imports from Canada in 1934 amounted to 63 million Reichmarks compared with 303 million Reichmarks in 1929 and 79 million Reichmarks in 1933. The declines in 1934 from 1933 were common to most of the various items. Nickel, asbestos, copper and wood pulp were exceptions. Exports to Canada amounted to 22 million Reichmarks as compared with 85 million Reichmarks in 1929 and 28 million Reichmarks in 1933.

The details of trade between Germany and Canada according to German statistics are set forth in tables III and IV of this report. The reasons for the discrepancy between these figures and the Canadian statistics in tables V, VI and VII are discussed in the following section.

DISCREPANCIES BETWEEN GERMAN AND CANADIAN STATISTICS

Comparison of Canada's statistics of import or export trade with any country, with the statistics of that country covering the same trade, discloses that the two sets of figures are never identical and often differ greatly. A comparison of the statistics of Germany and Canada of the trade between those two countries from 1929 to 1934, is given in the table below.

It will be noted that there is a wide discrepancy between the two sets of figures respecting the movement of trade from Canada to Germany, the German values being consistently greater than those recorded in the Canadian export statistics. The two sets of statistics in regard to the eastward movement of trade from Germany to Canada are in closer agreement although in this case the Canadian figures are larger.

Many factors contribute to such discrepancies and unfortunately, for the most part they are not subject to exact numerical determination. Non-comparability between the two sets of trade figures may be caused by -

- (1) Canadian export values are on an F.O.B. basis, representing the actual cost or value at the time of exportation at the points in Canada whence originally shipped. German import values are on a C.I.F. basis, representing the original cost plus the expenses of packing, freight, insurance, commissions and other expenses incidental to importation up to the point of discharge.

- (2) When foreign exchanges are fluctuating violently, it is customary to calculate an average rate to convert a year's figures. Error may be introduced when the fluctuations are wide, and the trade variable in different parts of the year.
- (3) The "time element". Goods leaving one country at the end of a year may not arrive at their destination until the beginning of the next year, and thus are entered in the statistics of the importing country a year later than the record of export.
- (4) The foregoing factors all contribute to the divergence in trade statistics but their importance is overshadowed by the difficulty in determining "origins" and "destinations".

Few countries attempt (and those with but qualified success) to credit all imports to their country of origin, i.e., the country in which the goods were actually produced or manufactured. Neither is it possible, in respect to large proportions of international trade, to ascertain or show, at the time of the exportation of goods from the country of production, to what country they will be finally conveyed for consumption. Could these particulars regarding imports and exports be accurately recorded in every case, discrepancies in trade statistics would largely disappear. But most countries, including Canada, record their imports as from the country of consignment, that is, the country with which the actual commercial exchange takes place. While this system fails in many cases to disclose the country of actual origin of the goods, it does more clearly demonstrate the "balance of trade" upon which international financial adjustments are based.

It is evident that systems such as are now followed, in conjunction with the great volume of indirect trade, must result in considerable divergencies in statistics. This is the dominant factor in producing differences between the trade records of Canada and those of European and other overseas countries, for a very large part of Canadian produce finds its way to the country of consumption via a third country.

Canada, like many other countries, attempts to ascertain the country of final destination when goods are exported, but in many cases this is not positively known, even to the owner of the goods. A large part of Canada's exports to continental Europe is consigned to one of the European free ports and from there directed to the country of consumption. This fact is largely responsible for the wide discrepancy between the German and Canadian statistics of the eastern movement of trade between the two countries as so much of that trade is conducted "via" one of the European entrepot centers. German import statistics are recorded, so far as possible, according to the country of production.

Canadian exports to Belgium and to Netherlands are normally greater than the imports into those countries for home consumption from Canada according to their statistics. Exports of goods from Canada to Belgium consigned to Antwerp, or to Netherlands, consigned to Rotterdam, are only included in the import statistics of Belgium or Netherlands if the goods are released there for home consumption. Otherwise they are recorded in the statistics as intransit trade. There is little doubt that a large proportion of these intransit goods eventually reach Germany.

Another factor in this "origins" and "destinations" problem is that a proportion of exports from Canada to overseas countries, are shipped via the United States, and similarly some exports of United States origin find their way to overseas markets in transit through Canada. European countries are inclined to credit the former in their import statistics to United States and the latter to Canada.

A detailed comparison, item by item, of Canadian export and Germany import statistics is practically impossible since the two classifications are not identical. The table below is an attempt at such a contrast. The headings correspond with the Canadian classification and the principal differences with the German readings are set forth in the footnotes.

CALENDAR YEARS 1923-34


