PREFACE

A series of occasional reports under the general title of *Health Manpower in Hospitals* have been produced by the Institutions Section, Health and Welfare Division, DBS. These reports form part of the over-all Institutions Section series of surveys and reports on Health and Welfare Manpower including the Annual Salary Surveys series relating to Hospital Nursing Personnel and Public Health Nurses.

These reports which are based upon published and unpublished tabulations of the Institutions Section and upon other DBS data are designed to provide an in-depth study on many of the various professional and technical categories of personnel in Canadian hospitals. The data are drawn from the detailed information collected on the Annual Returns of Hospitals (HS-1 and HS-2) from 1961 onwards and reflect such items as changes in employment patterns, workloads, turnover rates, etc., for each province and Canada.

Contained in these reports are brief textual highlights and tables of historical comparisons, as well as definitions of terms (where required). The volume of data presented varies according to the availability of detail on each professional or technical group. The reports will be up-dated periodically.

In addition to a general publication, i.e., *Health Manpower in Hospitals – General, 1961-68* (Catalogue No. 83-507), which gives the reader a general background of trends in hospital manpower, there are a number of publications dealing with a particular group of hospital personnel (see back cover of this report).

EXPLANATORY NOTES AND GLOSSARY

Hospital

An institution which is operated for the medical, surgical and/or obstetrical care of in-patients, and which is licenced or approved as a hospital by the federal and/or a provincial government, or by a municipality duly authorized under the laws of the province. Specifically excluded are institutions primarily for tuberculosis, mental disease, and mental defect.

Public Hospital

Recognized by the province as a "private hospital" which generally restricts its admissions to patients paying for the care provided at rates determined by the management.

Federal Hospital

A hospital owned and operated by the Government of Canada; operation will either be by the Department of National Health and Welfare, the Department of National Defence, or the Department of Veterans Affairs.

General Hospital

A hospital which provides for the treatment and care of all types of diseases or at least a wide range of conditions.

Allied Special Hospital

Includes chronic, convalescent, rehabilitation and "other" hospitals.

Rated Bed Capacity

The number of beds that the hospital is designed to accommodate as at December 31 of the reporting year, on the basis of established standards of floor area per bed.

Size of Hospital

The size of a hospital in this report is determined by the rated bed capacity on December 31 of the reporting year.

Full-time Staff

Persons employed on a full-time basis at December 31, i.e., regularly employed throughout the full hospital workweek.

Part-time Staff

Persons employed on a part-time basis at December 31, i.e., regularly employed on selected days or partial days in the hospital workweek.

Staff Separation

The departure of an employee from employment within the hospital.

Paid Hours

Accumulated during the year, paid hours include full-time and part-time regular employees of the hospital who have had salaries and wages payable to them by the hospital.

Revenue Fund

The Revenue Fund is set up to record monetary activities associated with the day-to-day operations of the hospital in providing services to patients. It is sometimes called the Operating Fund.

Revenue Fund Expense.—Revenue Fund Expense is the cost, on an accrual basis, of operating and maintaining the hospital during the year, regardless of the amounts of disbursements made during the year.

Salaries and Wages.—Included are the gross salaries and wages earned during the year by all hospital personnel whether or not actually paid during the year. Gross salaries and wages comprise the following:

- (1) Salaries, wages and other remuneration earned by paid personnel, including special allowances paid and perquisites supplied to such personnel; includes also any earned fees or other remuneration perquisites, and special allowances to physicians or therapists for services rendered to the hospital.
- (2) The value of contributed services of regular staff members working without pay, and of perquisites supplied to such personnel, calculated on the basis of salary scales of similar services in the community and supported by regular payroll records.

In-patients

Patients who are duly admitted to the hospital and to whom a bed or bassinets has been allocated. (This category excludes stillbirths as well as patients attending a day or night centre attached to the hospital).

Adults and children.—All in-patients except newborn.

Admission.—The formal acceptance and reception of a person as an in-patient (including newborn).

Patient-day.—The period of service to an in-patient between the census-taking hours on two successive days; the day of admission is counted as a patient-day but the day of separation is not.

Population

June 1 population figures as enumerated in Census years or estimated for inter-censal years.

Dietitians

Personnel who have successfully completed an approved dietetic internship following a degree in Household Science or Home Economics from a recognized university, with a major credit in Foods and Nutrition, or who have qualifications approved by the Canadian Dietetic Association.

INTRODUCTION

This report, which is one of the series of statistical reports on Health Manpower in Canada, relates to qualified dietitians employed in reporting general and allied special hospitals¹ in Canada for the years 1961-68 inclusive. In addition to this report, and others which deal with specific professional and technical groups, a general publication, *Health Manpower in Hospitals - General*, (Catalogue No. 83-507), which enables the reader to observe trends in total manpower in Canadian hospitals is available.

Data included in this publication pertain to general and allied special hospitals and are arranged into the following areas: absolute counts of personnel, separations and paid hours, turnover rates and various ratios relating dietary productivity, personnel and costs to over-all hospital activity. The data have been arranged historically to bring out trends.

HIGHLIGHTS

Qualified Dietitians

The total number of qualified dietitians² in reporting general and allied special hospitals in Canada has increased 43.1 per cent from 662 in 1961 to 947 in 1968. The number of dietitians per 100,000 population has climbed slightly from 3.6 in 1961 to 4.6 in 1968 (Table 3). Most frequently during this period, Nova Scotia maintained the highest rate per 100,000 population.

Generally between 85.0 and 90.0 per cent of the total number of dietitians reported in general and allied special hospitals during the years 1961-68 were employed on a full-time basis. Public general hospitals with 500-999 beds reported more full-time dietitians than any other size-group of hospitals. Provincially, Quebec and Ontario combined accounted for slightly less than two-thirds of reported full-time dietitians over the period 1961-68.

From 1961-68 the rate of full-time dietitians to full-time hospital staff in Canadian general and allied special hospitals has remained relatively stable, fluctuating between 0.30 per cent and 0.32 per cent (Table 2). Provincially, the lowest rate of full-time dietitians to full-time hospital personnel has been maintained by Newfoundland, ranging from 0.03 per cent in 1961 to 0.15 per cent in 1967, while at the other extreme British Columbia, for the most part had the highest rate, varying from 0.43 per cent in 1962 to 0.54 in 1963.

Turnover rates of full-time dietitians in Canadian general and allied special hospitals ranged from 32.0 per cent in 1962 to 31.5 per cent in 1968 (Table 4). Since the counts of separations for the year 1962 include some unqualified dietitians, the turnover rates for 1962 are inflated; separations, and consequently turnover rates, for the remaining years relate to qualified dietitians only. Thus, for the years 1963-68 the values of the turnover rates have resulted in being highest in 1968 (31.5 per cent) and lowest in 1964 (24.3 per cent). Comparison at

The number of hospitals reporting data for qualified dietitians has not increased significantly. In 1962, the number of reporting hospitals was 318 (25.4 per cent of all operating general and allied special hospitals), and in 1968 the absolute number reporting was 377 (29.7 per cent) (Table 1). From 1962 to 1968, most of the operating public general hospitals with 200 beds or more reported information relating to qualified dietitians. In the case of public general hospitals under 200 beds in size, the number reporting decreased in direct relationship with the size of the hospital. At the provincial level, Quebec and Ontario together have accounted for the majority of hospitals reporting data on qualified dietitians, averaging about sixty per cent during the period 1962-68. The proportion of reporting to operating hospitals in Quebec and Ontario combined has climbed from the low of 31.9 per cent in 1963 to 38.9 per cent in 1968.

the provincial level showed that New Brunswick (for the years 1964, 1965 and 1967) most frequently had the lowest rates of turnover, while Quebec (1964, 1966-68) more often than not had the highest rates.

Paid hours reported for dietitians employed in general and allied special hospitals in Canada have increased by 28.2 per cent from 1,279,041 in 1963 to 1,639,418 in 1968. In the dietary department as a whole, paid hours per 100 patient-days climbed from 129.0 in 1962 to 134.4 in 1968, an increase of 4.2 per cent (Table 9). For total hospital personnel the ratio of paid hours per patient-day has advanced 15.3 per cent from 11.8 in 1962 to 13.6 in 1968 (Table 9). The ratio of paid hours in the dietary department per meal-day from 1964-68 in general and allied special hospitals has remained unchanged at 0.8 (Table 10).

Workload, generally, over the period 1961-68 in the dietary departments of reporting general and allied special hospitals has been decreasing. The number of meals-days per 100 paid hours in the dietary department has decreased 1.9 per cent from 123.1 in 1965 to 120.7 in 1968 (Table 11).

In reporting public general and allied special hospitals salary cost per patient-day in the dietary department increased 70.4 per cent from \$1.42 in 1962 to \$2.42 in 1968, while the total hospital salary cost per patient-day increased 85.9 per cent from \$16.22 in 1962 to \$30.16 in 1968 (Table 13). When the former was taken as a percentage of the latter, the resultant proportion was found to have decreased from 8.8 per cent in 1962 to 8.0 per cent in 1968. Of total Revenue Fund Expenditure per patient-day, the ratio of dietary salaries per patient-day represented a steadily decreasing proportion, going from 5.7 per cent in 1962 to 5.4 per cent in 1968. Dietary department salary cost per patient-day was highest in the largest public general hospitals.

Dietary department salary cost per meal-day advanced 46.5 per cent from \$0.99 in 1964 to \$1.45 in 1968 (Table 14). When this ratio was looked at as a percentage of dietary department direct cost per meal-day over the period 1964-68, it was found to have increased from 49.5 per cent to 54.9 per cent.
