

This bulletin is a preliminary report of Mental and Neurological Institutions in Canada and is the result of a special Census undertaken in connection with the decennial population census of 1931. This was the first special census of mental institutions undertaken by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics and covers all patients resident in Mental Institutions June 1, 1931, as also movement of population, administration, receipts and expenditures for 1930.

SCOPE AND PURPOSE OF CENSUS

The scope of the Census was laid before the various Provincial and Federal authorities as well as the Canadian National Committee for Mental Hygiene and the various schedules to be used in the Census were subjected to the strictest examination before final adoption. This survey of our Mental Institutions was in response to repeated requests of various public bodies interested in obtaining fuller and more adequate statistics regarding this important branch of social welfare.

SPECIAL FEATURES OF CENSUS

The 1931 Census includes not only patients present on June 1, 1931, but also First Admissions, Re-admissions, Separations and Deaths during 1930.

The special features of this Census were: a separate classification of First Admissions from Re-admissions so as to obtain the best available index of the incidence of mental disease in the general population; the classification of First Admissions, Re-admissions, Discharges and Deaths with reference to principal psychoses; collection of data in connection with ex-service men, so as to find out the influence of war service in the causation of mental disease; data in respect of paroles; data in respect of urban and rural residence; data relative to the administrative personnel of Mental Hospitals; data regarding values of property and of hospital plants, receipts from governments and municipalities towards maintenance of mental institutions, receipts from paying patients, expenditures for maintenance, new buildings and additions to plants.

Apart from hospitals in Mental Institutions proper there are special wards set apart in a few general hospitals for the care of the insane, feeble-minded and epileptic. Then there are Homes for Incurables, Home for the Aged, and other institutions which care for harmless insane, feeble-minded and epileptic patients.

HISTORICAL STATEMENT

Census studies regarding insane and feeble-minded people in Canada were first made in connection with the general population decennial census of 1871. With the census of the population for that year general data were collected concerning people affected with mental diseases and published under the caption "Unsound mind people", the numbers being classified by province, sex, age and racial origin. The Census of 1911 gave the number of insane and idiotic people in Canada to be 13,355, and the yearly report for that year gave 9,671 patients in Mental Institutions. The decennial censuses up to 1921 gave a general survey of feeble-minded in Canada, in

and outside institutions. In 1921 figures covering the number of patients in Mental Institutions were collected and gave the number of insane as 21,516.

In 1888 general information was collected from various sources and statistics compiled and published giving the approximate number of institutions for mental diseases in each province and the number of inmates in these institutions. This information was not complete as it included only the patients of Provincial Mental Hospitals and did not include a large number of insane and feeble-minded in other institutions.

PRESENTATION OF DATA

The information submitted in this preliminary report is designed to furnish general information concerning number and operation of our various Mental Institutions, general tables on movement of population during 1930, as also valuable information concerning the inmates present in our Mental Institutions on June 1, 1931.

MOVEMENT OF PATIENT POPULATION

Tables 1 to 4 deal with the movement of population in Mental Institutions during 1930.

On January 1, 1930 there were 29,927 patients in the books of the institutions for Mental Diseases, 28,754 resident patients and 1,173 on parole or otherwise absent.

During 1930 the patients received comprised 7,532 First Admissions, 1,789 Re-admissions and 738 Transfers, or a total of 10,059 patients admitted.

The increase in the number of patients received during 1930 was 1,618, an increase of 5.6 per cent during the year. Prince Edward Island is the only province that showed a decrease in the number of resident patients at end of 1930. The Province of Saskatchewan showed the largest ratio of increase during the year. There were 2,069 at the beginning of the year, and 2,275 at the end of the year, an increase of 206, or 9.9 per cent.

Table 2 shows the ratio and percentage of increase in patient population as well as the rate of increase and decrease for male and female patients during 1930. Comparatively the ratio of increase for male patients is nearly always higher than for females. For the Dominion of Canada male patients increased 5.8 per cent during year 1930. In comparing figures for individual provinces it should be noted that the number of patients under hospital care in any given province is affected by not only the number of mental cases in the province, but also by such factors as capacity of the hospitals, the effectiveness of machinery in bringing mental cases under the care of the hospitals and the distribution of cases between Public and Private mental institutions and other institutions such as hospices, homes and refuges.

Table 3 gives the ratio of total discharges and of discharges according to condition on discharge per 100 admissions during the year 1930.

Table 4 gives Deaths in mental hospitals during 1930 and ratio to total Admissions and to total Separations. Of a total of 2,216 patients that died in mental hospitals during 1930, 1,255 were males and 961 females. The number of deaths was equivalent to 26 per cent of the total separations during the year.

Table 5 shows Receipts and Total Expenditures for Mental Institutions during the year 1930.

PATIENTS RESIDENT IN MENTAL INSTITUTIONS, JUNE 1, 1931.

Tables 6 to 22 refer only to patients who were resident in Mental Institutions on June 1, 1931 and are self-explanatory, and tables 23 to 25 refer to Administrative Staff.

Table 26 shows the movement of patient population in Mental Hospitals during the year 1931.

RECENSEMENT DES INSTITUTIONS

Chef: J. C. Brady

Ce bulletin est un rapport préliminaire sur les institutions pour maladies mentales et nerveuses au Canada, montrant la compilation d'un recensement spécial fait en connexion avec le recensement décennal de la population de 1931. C'est le premier recensement spécial des institutions pour maladies mentales entrepris par le Bureau Fédéral de la Statistique et il couvre tous les patients hospitalisés dans les institutions mentales ~~du Canada~~ le 1er juin 1931, de même que le mouvement de leur population, leur administration, leurs recettes et dépenses pour 1930.

CADRE ET BUT DU RECENSEMENT

Le cadre de ce recensement a été d'abord soumis aux différentes autorités provinciales et fédérales de même qu'au Comité National Canadien pour l'Hygiène Mentale, et les différents questionnaires employés dans ce recensement ont été soumis au plus strict examen avant d'être finalement adoptés. Ce relevé de nos institutions pour maladies mentales a pour but de répondre à des demandes réitérées de différents corps publics intéressés dans des statistiques plus complètes et plus adéquates sur cette branche importante de bien-être social.

TRAITS PARTICULIERS DU RECENSEMENT

Le recensement de 1931 relève non seulement les patients dans ces institutions le 1er juin 1931, mais aussi leur première admission, les réadmissions, les libérations et les décès en 1930.

Les traits particuliers de ce recensement sont une classification séparée des premières admissions et des réadmissions afin d'obtenir le meilleur indice possible de l'incidence des maladies mentales parmi la population en général, la classification des premières admissions, réadmissions, libérations et décès en juxtaposition avec la principale psychose; le relevé des données en connexion avec les ex-soldats afin d'établir l'influence de leur service militaire dans le développement de troubles mentaux; données sur la libération conditionnelle, sur le domicile rural ou urbain; données relative au personnel administratif des hôpitaux pour maladies mentales; données sur la valeur de la propriété et de l'outillage, sur les contributions du gouvernement et des municipalités au maintien de ces institutions, sur les recettes versées par les patients payants, sur les dépenses, l'entretien, les nouvelles constructions et additions à l'outillage.

Outre les institutions pour maladies mentales proprement dites, il y a aussi des salles spéciales dans plusieurs hôpitaux généraux pour le soin des déments, des faibles d'esprit et des épileptiques. Il y a ensuite les asiles pour incurables, les refuges pour vieillards, et autres institutions qui prennent soin des faibles d'esprit inoffensifs, des épileptiques, etc.

HISTORIQUE

Le recensement du Canada s'est occupé des déments et des faibles d'esprit au Canada pour la première fois en 1871. En connexion avec le recensement de la population de l'année, des données générales ont été compilées sur les personnes affligées de maladies mentales et ont été publiées plus tard sous le titre de: "Aliénés", avec classification par provinces, âges et races. Le recensement de 1911 donne le nombre de déments et idiots au Canada comme étant de 13,355, et le rapport annuel de la même année donne 9,671 patients dans les institutions pour maladies mentales. Les recensements décennaux jusqu'à 1921 donnent un relevé général des faibles d'esprit au Canada dans les institutions et ailleurs. Les chiffres du recensement de 1921 montrent qu'il y avait alors 21,516 personnes internées dans les institutions pour maladies mentales.

En 1888 un relevé général a été colligé des différentes sources d'informations alors compilées donnant le nombre approximatif d'institutions pour maladies mentales de chaque province et le nombre de patients dans ces institutions. Cette information n'était pas complète parce qu'elle ne couvrait que les patients dans les asiles provinciaux pour maladies mentales et ne comprenait pas un grand nombre de déments et de faibles d'esprit dans d'autres institutions.

PRESENTATION DES DONNEES

L'information fournie dans ce rapport préliminaire a pour but de donner des renseignements généraux sur le nombre et le fonctionnement de nos différentes institutions pour maladies mentales, des tableaux d'ensemble sur le mouvement de la population en 1930 de même que d'autres informations précieuses sur les patients internés dans les institutions pour maladies mentales le 1er juin 1931.

MOUVEMENT DE LA POPULATION INTERNEE

Les tableaux 1 à 4 montrent le mouvement de la population dans les institutions pour maladies mentales en 1930.

Le premier janvier 1930 il y avait 29,927 patients sur les registres des institutions pour maladies mentales, 28,754 internés et 1,173 libérés sur parole ou absents de toute autre manière.

En 1930 les admissions de patients comprenaient 7,532 premières admissions, 1,789 réadmissions et 738 transferts, soit un total de 10,059 patients reçus.

L'augmentation du nombre de patients admis en 1930 est de 1,618 soit une augmentation de 5.6 p.c. au cours de l'année. L'Île du Prince-Edouard est la seule province montrant une diminution dans le nombre de patients internés à la fin de 1930. La province de Saskatchewan montre la plus forte proportion d'augmentation au cours de l'année. Elle avait 2,069 patients internés au commencement de l'année et 2,275 à la fin de l'année, soit une augmentation de 206 ou 9.9 p.c.

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Le tableau 2 montre la proportion et le pourcentage d'augmentation en internés, de même que le taux d'augmentation et de diminution pour hommes et femmes en 1930. Le taux d'augmentation pour hommes est presque toujours plus élevé que celui pour femmes. Pour l'ensemble du Canada les hommes déments ont augmenté de 5.8 p.c. au cours de 1930. En comparant les chiffres de différentes provinces il faut noter que le nombre de patients sous les soins d'un hôpital dans une province est affecté non seulement par le nombre de cas dans cette province mais aussi par d'autres facteurs tels que la capacité des hôpitaux, les facilités à amener les patients aux hôpitaux et la distribution des cas entre les institutions publiques et privées et autres institutions telles que hospices, refuges et asiles.

Le tableau 3 donne le taux de toutes les libérations et l'état du patient lors de sa libération, par cent admissions au cours de 1930.


Le tableau 4 donne les décès dans les hôpitaux pour maladies mentales en 1930 et leurs taux au total des admissions et des libérations totales. Sur un total de 2,216 patients morts dans les hôpitaux pour maladies mentales en 1930, 1,255 étaient des hommes et 961 des femmes. Le nombre des décès est équivalent à 26 p.c. de toutes les admissions au cours de l'année.

Le tableau 5 montre les recettes et les dépenses totales des institutions pour maladies mentales en 1930.
