MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY :-

AFTER a final and careful revision of the Census Returns of Prince Edward Island, taken in the summer of the present year, I have the honor now to transmit, for the information of your Excellency in Council, the results, as compiled in the accompanying Abstract in tabular form. Some interesting statistics never before collected in this Island, are given in these tables.

The total population (including 350 Indians of the Micmac Tribe) is 80,857, being an increase of 9361 since the last Census in the year 1855, or 13 per cent, in six years. The males are in excess of females by 903.

The population of the City and Royalty of Charlottetown is 6706, shewing an increase in six years of 193 only, or scarcely 3 per cent.

The First Electoral District of Prince County gives the highest rate of increase, while in Townships Nineteen, Thirty-four and Forty-nine the population has apparently slightly diminished. The Indians number four less than in 1855. The number married on the Island during the past year was 586. The births have been 2320, and the deaths 938 in the same period. The number of children within the educational age—5 to 16—is 22,876. The number capable of bearing arms—16 to 60—is 19,800. Deaf and Dumb, 68. Blind, 43. Insane, 148. Not vaccinated, 37,386. Churches, 156; increase in these, 29. School-houses, 302; increase, 50.

The foregoing embraces but a few of the principal items of information. Under the heads of land tenures, products, manufactures, &c., will be found returns of more or less value. At the end is a summary of "general remarks," by certain of the numerators; these, in most instances, possess only a local interest, treating, for the most part, of the state of roads and bridges, water communication, and the facilities for reaching markets. The remarks made, descriptive of Lot 54—a portion of the public lands, as yet but partially settled,—are an exception to the general style and tenor of these "remarks," and will be found interesting to the immigrant or intending settler. For all other details, I beg to refer you to the annexed columns, completing the summary of Statistics which it was the object of the Legislature and the Government to obtain.

Nor is the interest in the information herein furnished confined alone to ourselves as Colonists. Such information becomes national property, as a contribution—to the general fund—of a British Province, comparatively limited in extent, yet possessing elements of undeveloped wealth, material and moral, calculated—if duly fostered—to produce great results. In these figures, our Island adds its quota to swell the vast and accumulating mass of Statistics now in-gathering, under Imperial auspices, from the remotest regions—Statistics which will be viewed as a monumental record—valuable, because authentic—of the might and resources of that extended Empire, in whose unity and prosperity we all feel a deep and an abiding interest.

APPENDED BY THE ENUMERATORS TO THE FOREGOING RETURNS:

LOT OR TOWNSHIP No. 1.

THE Cunard Estate on this Lot is a light soil, but when well cultivated, very productive in moist seasons. Palmers' part of this Township is a heavy clay bottom, good for grass, and very productive; and a fishing sea board not surpassed in the Gulf. The great drawbacks on the trade of this Lot are-The Alewives have regularly decreased sterling for the residue of the term of 999 years; Act was put in force. The markets most these lots are designated in the margin by †. since the Act was put in force. resorted to by the inhabitants are Tignish, Nail Pond and Seacow Pond. The roads are generally good; the bridges decidedly bad. The trade of this Township will not now appear, as the exports cleared only from the former Custom-House.

LOT 2.

The land on Lot Two is poor, being mostly second and third quality. The roads on the East side of the Lot are good, but on the West side, bad. The markets mostly resorted to by the inhabitants of this Township are Cascumpec and Tignish, -Cascumpec being about ten miles distant; but the people are so poor that they have scarcely any surplus produce to take to market. The want of a harbor is very much felt by the inhabitants on this Township.

LOT 3.

The land on Lot Three is in general good; at the clearing out thereof, to permit small vessels to ascend, would be a great benefit to the inhabitants.

LOT 4.

The whole of this Township may be classed as: second quality land, there being only a few small spots of first quality; there are about 1000 acres of barrens, and a small portion of swamp.

It has also been impossible to give the exact dates at which full rent commences on several of the farms, in many cases owing to the farms changing occupiers,-the leases being held by other parties as security; there are also many persons who have not yet taken their leases.

The potato crop last year was a failure, compared with that of the previous year. Clover seed has also been a failure; on account of the scarcity of hay, very little was saved,-last summer being very dry. With regard to the quantity of butter made, not one farmer knew the quantity consumed by his family, and could only give account of the sales; the same remark will apply to the quantity of cheese made.

LOT 7.

The land on this Township is, in general, of the best quality; there are about 500 acres, perhaps, of what is called "barrens" on the whole Fownship; but it is useful for pasture. The main road through this Township is good, but some bridges are falling fast into decay, although several sums of money have been laid out on them; but the most important parts have not been replaced. Our markets are inconvenient, as we have no harbor, but an iron bound shore, which makes the shipping of produce always a risk, and very much lessens the value of our produce; while oats were selling at harbors for 2s. 3d. to 2s. 6d. per bushel, through the winter, the highest price we could get was 2s. per bushel Richibucto is our nearest market, but it is always attended with risk and expense, as the inhabitants generally go in small boats, and not unfrequently lose much time, notwithstanding I think it is the market most resorted to. Richibucto is about twenty-four miles distant from Cape Wolfe.

LOT 8.

Land Assessment is paid at present for about ten thousand acres of land on Lot Eight. Of this quantity, which is of the best or first quality; in general, there are but 2253 acres of arable land, -a small amount, when we consider that the inhabitants have been residents for ten to thirty years on it; the reason of this is, that we have no harbor or safe place of landing, the nearest harbor being Cascumpec or Summerside, a distance of thirty to forty-five miles. The roads also are very inferior; so much so, that the profits accruing from surplus produce taken to market is lost in the time spent and expense incurred in transportation. The markets to which the people of this lot resort are Cascumpec and Summerside; and in the neighboring Province, Shediac, Richibucto and Miramichi. A resort to these markets takes away, of course, the business that might be done among ourselves, stops the circulation of money, and of necessity makes us a poor people; such, for example, is our state and condition, that when a merchant brings goods to sell, the common prices are as follows: when tea is selling at any of the above markets at 2s. 3d. to 2s. 9d., it is here 5s. per lb.; when molasses is at 1s. 6d. to 2s., it is sold here at 4s. to 5s. per gallon; cottons, prin's, and other household things, all in the same proportion; and on the other hand, when the above markets are giving high prices for grain, this advantage is here seldom to be obtained, for want of road and water communication.

The people of this and the adjoining Lots petitioned the Legislature for a grant to build a wharf at the West Point; should it be built there, it would be a direct benefit not only to Lot 8, but to other Lots, such as Lots 4, 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10.

A steamer calling at Cascumpec is no direct benefit to the people of these Lots; but were a wharf built here, it would be a direct benefit not only to quality, but when well cultivated, yields good crops. the above Lots, but to Cascumpec. There are but Freeholders are mostly independent; but the incon-

LOT 9.

The quality of land in general on this Township is very bad. I would safely say that there are not, according to my knowledge, more than about 4000 acres of good land -that is, of first quality-on Lot 9 altogether, and a large quantity of it is nothing but barrens.

Secondly, with regard to advantages: the only advantage here is, that it is a good place for herring fishing in the spring; but there are many disadvantages on account of roads. There is no market within seventeen miles—at Cascumpec Cross Roads, -and then, I believe, but once a year, in October, when a man can scarcely travel these bad roads.

Thirdly, there is no Post Office nearer than Mr. James Kinlay's, Lot 7,-a distance of about eighteen miles from Lot 9, where letters may sometimes remain for four or five months, and perhaps be returned. I witnessed a case of this kind not many days since. JOHN MACDONALD.

Lot 10,-No remarks.

LOT 11.

The quality of land on this Township is, in some parts, very good, and in other parts very bad. A considerable quantity of it is not fit for cultivotion; I think nearly half of the Township is bad land. With regard to its road communications, they are very good; when a bridge-which is now commenced-will be built over Lot 10 River, they will be much better.

The water communications are only middling. The water for the most part is shallow, and will not admit a vessel of any burthen up any of the rivers, except Foxley River, ap which some vessels ascend, and take in produce at the Canadian River Bridge, on Lot 11. Port Hill and Cascumpec are the nearest markets, except when a vessel comes to the Canadian River Bridge on purpose to take in produce for a merchant doing business on the Lot. The land on this Lot is all Government land excepting 100 acres of rented land.

LOT 14.

Although no pains have been spared to render the returns intelligible, and duly fill up the columns containing the landed property, I regret to have to state that there are some heads of families who can give no information respecting their leaseholds, save that they pay rent to the Hon. James Yeo, but know nothing about their leases; others call themselves leaseholders; but pay no rent. It will be seen that only the number of acres in farms of this description has been returned; being unable to ascertain the conditions upon which they are held.

The land on this Township, generally, is of second three Schools on this Township,-two of them but venience of obtaining a market for their surplus. produce, tends to retard their prosperity. Tenants complain loudly of the rental system; some few among them are independent; but too many are needy, particularly the French settlers located on the Western section of the Lot.

The wilderness land is of very inferior quality. Roads and bridges are generally kept in pretty fair order; but it is to regretted that we have no wharfs for shipping purposes, as the Eastern section especially commands excellent water privileges. The markets most resorted to are St. Eleanor's and Summerside,—distant from twelve to eighteen miles.

LOT 15.

Land about second quality. Great disadvantages from the want of roads. Water extends the length of the Township. Summerside is the nearest market,—distant from 15 to 20 miles.

HUGH GAMBLE.

LOT 16.

The Eastern part of this Lot is about eight miles from Summerside, whither the inhabitants generally take their grain to market; the main road leads through the Lot to that place, and is generally in a good state for that purpose. The Western part of the Lot is twelve to fourteen miles from Summerside, and produce has to be carted by the main Western road. This Township is also bounded Easterly and North by Richmond Bay, where grain is occasionally shipped off. This bay extends some distance up, affording an opportunity of water communication occasionally. The land in general is low, swampy and barren; the people generally poor.

LOT 17.

The land in general is of good quality. This Township is pretty well supplied with roads, and the Southern boundary fronts on water the whole length; the Northern part also for several miles fronts on, and has communication with, Richmond Bay. St. Eleanor's and Summerside are the principal markets; extreme distance to the former place, eight and a half miles; to the latter, eleven miles.

LOT 18.

The quality of land on this Township is generally good. The advantages in regard to roads and bridges and water communication are good. The markets resorted to are Summerside and Princetown.

Stephen Maclellan.

LOT 19.

Land on this Township may be considered a light loam of medium quality, which, if properly manured, would yield good returns to the farmer in the root crops, barley and oats; but it is not good for wheat or hay. Farmers having shore fronts have the privilege of obtaining the necessary ingredients for manuring, with but little expense; but those in the rear, in the absence of peat or bog mud,—of which this Lot has not much—have to pay dearly enough

for it, if they get it at all. Neither is there much wood on the Lot; scarcely enough for common fuel, building and fences, to say nothing of burning ashes to enrich the land.

The Township is pleasantly situated, well intersected by roads, which if in good repair, would compete fairly with any on the Island. As to markets,—with the small exception of the produce exported from Margate,—all goes from Summerside, possessing as it does the best harbor for shipping on this end of the Island, and is within reach of all residing on the Lot; the greatest distance being from two to ten miles.

ARCHIBALD TOWNSEND.

LOT 20.

The land on this Township would, on an average, come up to second quality; the interior being very stony and hard to cultivate, and requiring more manure than the occupants can procure, in order to raise anything like an average crop, particularly of hay; and the portion fronting on the shore is of a light sandy nature, requiring heavy manuring to keep it in good heart.

The Township is pretty well intersected by roads; and although the Southwest River runs across the Lot at near its centre, water communication is seldom resorted to. The markets generally resorted to by the inhabitants of this Township for the sale of surplus produce are, Summerside, New London Harbor and Graham's Wharf. Summerside is distant from twelve to fifteen miles; New London Harbor from four to eight miles from those living on the North side of the Southwest River; Graham's Wharf being the easiest of access, and the chief mart for the settlers on the south side of the Southwest River, is mostly resorted to, and a large amount of produce is annually shipped thereat. Long River Wharf, at the head of the South-west River, is also of great convenience to the inhabitants in that vicinity, and of Irishtown,—one or two schooners generally loading there with grain in spring and fall.

ARCHIBALD MACKINNON.

LOT 21.

The quality of the land on this Township, in most settlements, will compare favorably with the soil of the Island in general; while in some parts it is inferior, in some settlements, particularly in and around Millvale road. Many of the settlers are in very destitute circumstances, living on rented farms, and being poor when they came here, having scarcely any clearance, and many of them no other way of subsistence than by planting a little with the hoe, they scarcely gain a livelihood, although the people seem industrious in general; the land is also very hilly, &c.

This Lot is pretty well intersected with roads, and which are in a fair state of repair. The greatest inconvenience to the travelling public is the want of a bridge over the South-west River, New London, at or near Coles' Ferry. The water communication is good; the harbor well buoyed, with about ten feet of water on the bar at half tide. Markets most generally resorted to for the sale of produce are, Miramichi, St. John, N. B., Newfoundland, New York, Boston, &c.

LOT 22.

The quality of the land on this Township, except about 1000 acres on the North end, which was originally a pine forest, and repeatedly burnt; some few hundred acres of stony land, and a few hundred acres in the hollows by the brooks, is of a good quality, and will compare favorably with any land in Queen's County: the surface is uneven, and towards the South, hilly.

The Township abounds with springs and brooks of excellent water; many of the streams are of sufficient magnitude to propel mills. Fyfe's Bridge, New London, is the principal shipping place for the North end of the Township, to which there is access by pretty good roads, and where considerable quantities of oats and potatoes are annually shipped. The only market resorted to from the South end of the Township is Charlottetown, distant at the nearest point thirteen miles, by Anderson's Road, the Township roads leading to which are very hilly. The settlers on this part of the Township are mostly from the Island of Raasa, and do not appear to have agricultural skill; although they have been on the Lot twenty years, there are many who have not seed to plant their yet small farms, nor food for the coming summer. Very considerable numbers of cattle and sheep have likewise perished for want of sufficient food to sustain them through our long winter. Reference to the foregoing pages will shew the very small amount of hay grown, and without it, in the absence of turnips-which are not grownno man can keep stock through our long winter, without risk of losing them.

LOT 23.

The North end of Lot 23, Cavendish and vicinity, ship their produce at Hope River, distant $2\frac{1}{2}$ to 4 miles; some is also shipped at Rustico and New Glasgow Wharf. New Glasgow and vicinity ship from Rustico harbor, sometimes, but there is a sand bar at the entrance, which does not admit vessels of heavy draught of water, there being seldom more than eight feet of water at flood tide. Charlottetown is the principal market for New Glasgow, and the only market for the South end and centre of the Lot, say-Johnston's and the Malpeque Road, distant from eleven to seventeen miles, and a hilly road. Sea manure is obtained by only a few: no muscle mud or river mud on the Lot except in New Glasgow or Hunter River. Roads hilly, but generally pretty good. Fencing is chiefly done with fir and spruce poles, which are becoming very scarce. No cedar. Firewood scarce; worth about forty shillings per acre. By firewood, understand hardwood, such as beech, birch or maple.

LOT 24, AND PETER'S ISLAND.

The soil on Lot 24 will compare favorably with most of the land of the Island, with the exception of about 3000 acres fronting on Rustico Bay and the Gulf shore. The roads are numerous, and generally good. Charlottetown is the principal market for produce,-distant from ten to twenty-five miles. bridge across the Hunter River would shorten the distance six miles to about one fourth of the popula-THOMAS MCNEILL. tion.

LOT 25.

Summerside is the nearest market at which most of the produce of this Township is sold and shipped; but as it is very inconvenient for many on the Lot to carry their produce so far, they require a wharf built on the North side of Bedeque harbor.

Lot 26.—No remarks. Lot 27 -No remarks. Lot 28.—No remarks. Lot 29.-No remarks.

LOT 30.

Argyle Shore .- The inhabitants of this district are all freeholders; the land, if not first rate, is fertile, level and well watered, and from its proximity to the sea-shore-where abundance of manure can be easily procured—it can be brought to yield luxuriant crops, wheat, barley, oats and potatoes; the inhabitants are, consequently, among the most thriving in the Colony. Surplus produce is shipped at Mc-Ewen's Wharf and Crapaud.

Bonshaw, Smelt Creek, and Argyle Rear.-With the exception of three or four families, the inhabitants of this District are all leaseholders, very poor, and utterly unable to pay back rent. The land is light and hilly. McEwen's Wharf and Crapaud are the places of shipment.

Green Road .- The land in this settlement is level and fertile, and the inhabitants industrious; they are Irish Ieaseholders, very anxious to purchase the freehold interest of their farms. Crapaud is their

usual shipping place.

Appin Road.—This settlement is quite new; the land beautifully sloping to the South. The settlers are all leaseholders, contending with numerous privations. A cart road from Hugh Currie's to

Green Road is indispensable.

Settlements South side of Rhymery River, between Crosby's and Dollar's Mills. - The miserable inhabitants of this District, composed of Irish and Highlanders, are destitute of roads and bridges. The land is very hilly and steep, except near the border of the stream. The inhabitants are all under some obligation to pay rent; there is no road, bridge or school in the whole District.

Road between Townships Nos. 30 and 65.—The land is generally second rate. The inhabitants are leaseholders and squatters, apparently very industrious; and although poor, extremely anxious to purchase the fee simple interest of their farms. Char-

lottetown is the nearest market.

Scotch Settlement back of Lot 30 .- The land is so high, and the hills so steep in this District, as to preclude the possibitity of its ever becoming a flourishing settlement. The farmers are all Scotch Highlanders, frugal, persevering and industrious, else they would never have been able to maintain themselves under so many privations. They are all leaseholders, extremely anxious to become freeholders. The trifling sum of eight pounds is the only item ever appropriated towards roads and bridges in this District. Charlottetown, about 20 miles distant, is the nearest market.

Old Tryon Settlement Road .- The inhabitants are all squatters, natives of Ireland, and equally industrious and persevering with their Highland neigh-

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bors, and as anxious to become freeholders. land is similar in every respect to that in the Scotch Settlement; the wretched state of the road is deeply felt by both. There are probably between six and seven hundred persons in the above three settlements, without a Magistrate or a Post Office; their quarrels are settled at Charlottetown or Crapaud, entailing exorbitant expenses.

Lot 31.-No remarks.

LOT 32.

The lands on the South end of this Lot are light and fertile, and not subject to mildew or early frost; the farmers have access to muscle mud and other sea manure, are all freeholders, and in easy circumstances. Those on the middle part of the Township are poor, the lands being flat and swampy, and subject to early frosts. The North end of the Lot is light and poor, and the farmers are chiefly tenants, and poor, having no access to sea manure, and their farms are very small. The crops this year were partially a failure. I met with many who had no seed nor anything to support their families during the ensuing summer. This Lot is well provided with roads and bridges, and near to places for shipping produce. Upon the whole, I am of opinion that Lot 32 is very poor, and may be classed second or third quality. LOT 34.

With respect to the general quality of land in this Township, the Southern portion of it is superior to the other parts. Commencing at the Hillsborough, for three miles North, the land appears to be first and second quality; for two miles further North, it is very inferior; but on towards the Gulf shore the quulity is much improved, with the exception of the the eastern portion of the Township, which cannot be considered better than third quality.

In regard to roads, there is a sufficiency for the convenience and accommodation of the inhabitants of the Township. As to water communication, there being no harbor on the North side of the Lot sufficient to admit trading vessels, the market resorted to for the disposal of surplus produce is chiefly Charlottetown; a few of the inhabitants of the Southern part of the Township ship off produce at Appletree

Farm Wharf.

The extreme North part of this Township is distant about 14 miles from Charlottetown; the South-

ern part not more than 6 miles.

With respect to one name on the return—Robert S. Fellowes-that individual at first refused to answer all my questions, saying that he would give an account of his farm and stock, but that it was positively inquisitorial to pry into a man's domestic concerns; and then he added that he would give a return such as he could swear to. The number of bushels of produce returned by him from a farm of 130 acres of arable land, is, I believe, far under the mark; and his return therefore, so far, in my opinion, is not reliable and correct.

DAVID LAWSON.

Under the head of "produce raised by each family during the past year," the following is the return above referred to: "5 bushels wheat; 5 bushels of barley; 5 bushels of oats; 5 bushels of buckwheat; 5 bushels of potatoes; 5 bushels of turnips; 5 tons of hay." Also, stock--"3 horses; 2 neat cattle; 1 hog.

Lot 35.-No remarks.

LOT 36.

The North of the Township, along the Sand Hills, is very destitute, they say, from high rents and poor land, and disadvantages in respect of markets; the nearest shipping place is McConnel's Wharf. If the Afton road were made through, and a wharf at Hayden's, it would reduce the distance to between three and four miles to a shipping place, where it is now from nine to ten miles.

The South side of the Township is-part of itbetter land, and the rents are lower; near the South boundary, the land is very poor; the only place of shipping is Hickey's Wharf, distant about six miles.

ALEXANDER STEWART.

LOT 37.

Farms on the sea shore of this Lot are partly ruined by drifting sand. Farmers, in general, not well off; rent too high for the quality of land. Scarcity of grain and potatoes for seed. Great loss of cattle and sheep on account of scarcity of fodder.

Light soil, in general, on the North side of the Hillsborough River, and very difficult to clear on account of so much wild tea and ferns; also, farming not carried on as it should be. Mount Stewart a good shipping place, but very poor road and bridge; road from St. Peter's Road to Mount Stewart Bridge is impassable, and the bridge unsafe.

LOT 38.

The land-from what I have seen of it-is good, and the greater part of it of first quality. The Southern part of the Township, being the best land, is being fast settled; although the settlement is new, they are fast reclaiming their forest. The Township is pretty well supplied with roads, there are about twelve different public roads, all in a very good state; the main post road being the worst I travelled on in the Township, excepting a new one lately cut out. If the bushes and trees allowed to grow close to the track on many of the roads, especially the main post road, were cut down the full width of the road-say sixty feet-the sun and wind would in the spring dry up the roads much earlier, it those obstructions were removed; and many heavy snow drifts in winter would also thus be prevented. The bridges arc in a good state; I observed but two small ones, of about four logs each, bad, in the whole Township. The principal shipping place is Mount Stewart Bridge, at the head of the Hillsborough, distant about one mile from the nearest part of the Township, and about seven or eight from the farthest point.

LOT 39.

The land on this Township appears to be, about

one-third first quality, and nearly two-thirds second safe place of shipment, by Grand River harbor. This The Township possesses the advantage of good roads, with the exception of the new settlements. The markets mostly resorted to by the inhabitants are Charlottetown city, Mount Stewart Bridge, and country traders who export to Newfoundland, Nova Scotia and St. Pierre. The Township is upwards of twenty miles distant from Charlottetown, and six to twelve miles from Mount Stewart Bridge. JOHN JARDINE.

LOT 40.

The settled land here is of good quality generally, but the unsettled wilderness land is mostly swamp,

and of a bad quality.

The roads are generally in a very good state, except two or three back roads, viz.: the road at Morell, called Milltown road, and the road leading to Macdonald's Saw Mill; the bridges are in a fair condition, except Morell Bridge-which requires to be built anew—as well as one or two other small bridges. The water communication would be good but for the bar at the mouth of St. Peter's harbor; this bar makes it unsafe for vessels to come in or go out, consequently vessels will not come here in the fall; so the market is but a very small one on the bay. This compels farmers to take their surplus produce, some to Grand River and others to Mount Stewart Bridge—a distance of ten to sixteen miles. The people hope for a nearer market when the breakwater at the harbor of St. Peter's is com-WILLIAM HAYDEN. pleted.

LOT 41.

The principal part of this Township consists of good land, pretty productive when under good tillage; notwithstanding, I would not class it among the first quality of land on the Island; and although it produces a tolerably fair return of cereal and green crops, it is too sandy and light, and being principally sloping land from ranging heights, much of its productive substratum is, in consequence, carried off-particularly in the spring seasons-to the bays and rivers, rendering it consequently but very indifferent for the production of hay or pasturage, as may be seen by the accompanying return; a considerable portion of it-probably one-sixth-is irreclaimable, being what is commonly called red spruce swamps.

The roads through the Township will compare favorably with the roads generally throughout the Island. In respect to water communication, the harbor of St. Peter's was never a good one, and is now become worse than ever; so much so, that the inhabitants have almost abandoned the shipment of their surplus produce, particularly in the fall of the year, by water, and have, therefore, no alternative for its disposal but to resort to a market in Charlottetown-a distance of over thirty miles-or to Georgetown, a distance of over twenty miles, and sometimes to Grand River harbor, about the same distance by the present route as to Georgetown But a road in a straight line from the head of St. Peter's Bay to Grand River Bridge would bring the shippers of produce from this locality to within a dis tunce of six miles, and often to-as it has proved of from the North side, in summer, to save the hauling

object once accomplished would prove of vast benefit not only to the settlers of St. Peter's Bay, and those in its immediate vicinity, but the surrounding country on the North side of the Island, to a considerable extent, would be benefitted thereby.

LOT 42.

On this Township there is but one main post road, leading from the head of St. Peter's Bay to East Point. This being the only market road, it should be always in good condition, but which is a difficult matter, in consequence of the proximity of the road to the North shore, there being several bridges which are in danger of being (and often are) carried away by the action of the sea; therefore it is the desire of the inhabitants generally to have the main post road nearer the rear of their farms, by which it will more easily be made a good road.

As regards markets,—the head of St. Peter's Bay is the nearest, being ten miles to the Eastern boundary of Lot 42, on the North side or shore; and Souris

is the next, being from 16 to 18 miles.

RODERICK McINTYRE.

LOT 43.

The quality of land on this Township is in general good. The roads are mostly laid off to good advantage, with the exception of a back settlement in the interior, from Roderick McIntyre's, Cow River, towards Naufrage Marsh, where there are several settlers without any road. The only harbors on this Township are Fortune and Rollo Bays, which are not much frequented on account of the difficulty of getting to them, there being at Rollo Bay no way of approaching the loading ground but by a sand flat of a mile in length, which is covered with water at half tide. The chief market is Souris, about 12 or 13 miles distant from some parts of the Township; and a few traders in the vicinity. JAMES DAVIDSON.

LOT 44.

A good deal of the interior of this Township is low, swampy land. The principal market for surplus produce is at Souris, whence it is shipped by the merchants to the neighboring ports of Halifax and St. John, and occasionally to Boston. Seldom a cash market is met with at Souris; and to obtain cash for their produce, the inhabitants have to convey it to Grand River, a distance of 15 to 20 miles, or to Georgetown, a distance of 30 miles, when it generally commands a fair cash price. Shipping of produce from the North side has almost ceased; the inhabitants prefer taking it to market, by land, rather than running the risk of the delay and danger attendant on shipping it at the sea board. JOHN MACGOWAN.

LOT 45.

The quality of land is generally good; this Township is well supplied with roads. Souris is the principal place of business, and where most of the produce is sold. Sometimes fish and grain are shipped late years—a ready money market, and always to a to Colville Bay or Souris harbor for shipment. The distance from the North to the South side (Souris harbor) is about nine miles.

ROBERT BOSWALL.

LOT 46.

Although the East end of the Island is almost surrounded by water, yet very much inconvenience is felt from the want of harbors; and the distance from any market causes a great deal of trouble to the inhabitants hauling their produce to market.

The Baltic Road settlement is principally very inferior land, with but an indifferent road, only lately opened. Greenvale, in the interior of the Lot, is very inconveniently situated, on account of bad roads; the nearest market is Souris. Glencorodale, which is a new settlement, with but middling land and very indifferent roads, is very much inconvenienced in regard to markets; the inhabitants have to bring their produce through to the North side, and from thence to Souris.

LOT 47.

The soil of Lot 47 is generally good; scarcely any portion of it being unfit for cultivation, excepting about 1000 acres of barren sandhills, which being included in the area of the Lot, is levied on annually for arrears of land tax. Although this Township is nearly surrounded with water, yet being entirely destitute of harbors, and in an exposed position, Shipowners rarely venture to take freights off the coast, after the middle of October; and the road to Souris—the nearest place of shipment and about 15 miles distant—being one of the most hilly on the Island, the inhabitants are in a great measure cut off from the advantage of an autumnal exportation of their surplus produce.

Owing to the foregoing geographical disadvantages, agricultural produce never commands such a high price at the East Point as it does in most other parts of Prince Edward Island.

LOT 48.

A great part of the land in this Township is of good quality, and capable of producing fair crops; but there are other portions, especially those remote from the shores, which will never yield more than a scanty remuneration to the agriculturist, as the soil is generally composed of white sand, and swampy. These latter remarks refer chiefly to the lands at the upper end of the Lot, occupied principally by Irish inhabitants from Monaghan. The roads through the settlement above referred to are bad, and likely to continue so for some time, owing to the swampy nature of the land; those through the other parts of the settlement are fair. The principal markets for produce are Charlottetown, and the Ferry opposite that city.

ROBERT MUTCH.

LOT 49.

There are seven school-houses and two churches on this Township. Governor's Island has no inhabitants. It is owned and cultivated by Robert Gay; the statistics of his produce, &c., are included in the returns of this Township.

JOSEPH SHEDOW.

LOT 50.

The general quality of land on this Township is good. The roads are passable. With respect to markets, there is no part of the Lot distant more than five or six miles from Vernon River Bridge—one of the best shipping places in the Township; China Point Wharf is also a good shipping place, as vessels drawing twenty-two or twenty-three feet of water can load in the harbor.

THOMAS BEERS.

LOT 51.

- 1. Quality of land.—The land in general on this Township appears to be of an average quality; about one-half of it is of the first, one-third is of the second, and the residue is of the third quality.
- 2. Roads and water communications -- The Township is pretty well intersected by roads, with the exception of that portion of it South of Montague River, the only road there being nothing better than a winter timber road. The main post road leading from Charlottetown to Georgetown interects the middle of the Lot East and West. Baldwin's Road runs Northward from the main post road, and connects it with the Pisquid road leading from the head of Cardigan, and crossing Lot 51 to Mount Stewart Bridge, affording communication between the Cardigan and Hillsborough Rivers. The Union road runs South from the main post road, and connects with Sparrow's road to the South, which crosses the Lot East and West, and leads to Montague Bridge.
- 3. Markets.-To the inhabitants of the South end of the Township, Montague Bridge offers the nearest and most advantageous market; from them it is distant about two and a half miles; from those in the central parts, about six miles; and from the Northern settlements, about nine miles; it is the chief market, and that most resorted to by the inhabitants of the Lot, and where the greater portion of the produce is shipped; much of the produce, however, finds its way to Georgetown, Cardigan, Brudenell and Hillsborough Rivers. Georgetown is distant, on an average, about ten miles, and Brudenell Wharf and the Hillsborough respectively, about eight miles from the Northern settlements on the Township. The new bridge now in course of erection on Cardigan River, will afford-from its proximity to the Northern portions of the Lot-the most convenient place of exportation. JAMES MACDONALD.

LOT 52.

The quality of land on this Township (as shewn by the returns) is, with few exceptions, "second." The enumerator is of opinion that it would bear a higher rating. The Southern half is a light soil, but easily cultivated. About the middle of the Township, and towards the North end, is a portion of swamp; but where the land is dry, it appears to be of excellent quality. The Township, generally, is level, possessing a good quantity of firewood, rails, and timber for building purposes. The Southern half is well situated as regards both roads and water communication; the furthest settlers, with the exception of a few at the North end, about Morell, being within eleven miles of Georgetown; nine of Montague Bridge; eight of Brudenell Wharf; and

about eight of Cardigan Bridge. Should the road be opened, as contemplated, to the latter place, the distance will be shortened about one and a half mile; but the majority of the inhabitants of the Township are two to five miles from shipping places. Of these, Georgetown and Montague Bridge are the most resorted to. Ten families in the back settlement about Morell, are very disadvantageously circumstanced, having neither roads nor water communications. If the Morell, crossing Peake's road, was bridged, it would be a great advantage to them, and it would soon become a large settlement; a great part of the land being taken up, but for want of roads people are tardy in settling there.

WILLIAM ALLEY.

LOT 531

The soil of Lot 53 is light and sandy, with very little swamp south of Cardigan; on the north of Cardigan there is a large extent of swamp. I consider the Township second quality; nearly every settler has put his land down at that rating.

The Lot is well intersected with roads, in a very

fair state for this time of year.

The advantages of the Lot as to water communication are equal to any in King's County, having a frontage on Montague River, with Brudenell and Cardigan Rivers crossing it, with a depth of water sufficient for vessels of a moderate size to load in. Most of the settlers on the Lot go to Georgetown, Brudenell Wharfs and Montague Bridge, which are easy of access, with their surplus produce; those on the North of Cardigan have a long distance to go to Georgetown, - some twelve miles; when the new bridge on Cardigan River is finished, it will shorten the distance to Georgetown, and will be a first rate place at which to load vessels of a large draught of water. LOT 54.

This Township, with the exception of the portions thereof bounded by the Cardigan, has been, but recently settled; therefore, the quantity of agricultural produce stated in the annexed return cannot be fairly reckoned as testing the capabilities of the soil for agricultural purposes. The township is of an undulating and uneven surface; in many places swampy, but interspersed with tracts of superior land, yielding all the variety of timber peculiar to King's County, excepting hemlock. The quality of the soil is a fair average of the Colony, although the unevenness of the surface causes a material difference in the soil, in the different localities.

Lot 54 is favorably situated for the purposes of commerce, having a good wharf on Cardigan Bay, and shipping accommodation at Grand River Bridge. It is bounded on the east, longitudinally, by a road leading from Cardigan Wharf to its rear, and intersected by two roads, transversely, respectively named Launching road and Grand River road, all of which are in good repair, except the road leading from Grand River road to the rear, or North

boundary of the Lot. The market to which the inhabitants of this Lot

resort is Georgetown, which by the winter route is three miles from the southern extremity of the Town-

Georgetown is eleven miles distant from the nearest part of Lot 54, although that distance may be much shortened by crossing the Cardigan Ferry.

HECTOR JOHNSON.

LOT 55.

The principal market, and that nearest to Grand River, is Georgetown, and Launching Wharf, and Grand River Wharf; there are besides, three small wharfs, all private property, on Grand River, - one at the head of the river, on the west side, and two on the east side, one of the latter two to three miles from the Grand River Bridge. The bridge at the head of Grand River is in a very bad state of repair, and much decayed; a new bridge is much needed here.

The road from Enman's to Mathewson's across Hayden's Milldam, is not passable, either in sprin or fall; residents of the District estimate the cost of making it a sufficient road at one hundred pounds; sixty pounds have already been expended on it. Inhabitants speak of endeavoring, by the interference of Government, to get the road shifted on Alexander Hayden's and Mathewson's land, as they think that the one now in use over the dam, can never be made a good road without great expense to the country to keep it in repair.

The roads on the East side of Grand River travelled by me this spring are in better order, in general, than they have been for some years past; if the Commissioner had money enough to expend, the roads would soon be fair. On the west side of Grand River I travelled a good deal along shore and across farms; but such parts of the road as were travelled on are in a very fair condition for this

season of the year.

As regards the quality of the land on Lot 55, some is very poor, -I should say over one-third of it,and a considerable part of it swampy; some of the land is second, and the remainder first quality, that is, as far as I have travelled it.

LOT 56.

The land in general is second quality. The advantages in regard to roads are good, if they were kept in repair. The markets most resorted to are Lower Grand River and Fortune harbor. The harbors are very inconvenient to a number of settlers on this Township. WILLIAM CONOHAN.

LOT 57.

The land of Point Prim is very fine; that of the Portage is lighter, and not so good. The Orwell soil is excellent; that of Newtown is light and not so good. The Murray Harbor road settlement, and the different adjoining Districts, possess very good soil, with the exception of Brown's Creek, which is light and stony.

At Pinette Wharf,-distant seven or eight miles from some of them,-the people of Point Prim ship their produce; the roads in general are very soft, spring and fall. The inhabitants are very anxious that a wharf be built at Angus Macaulay's; the harbor, from the entrance, runs pretty straight, so far, and vessels of greater draft could load there, and get in and out much sooner and more easily, ship; but by the summer route, along the main road, while the distance would be considerably shortened.

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I believe the people would subscribe handsomely towards that object. The inhabitants of the Portage and Lower Newtown load, in general, at Pinette Wharf; those of Orwell and Upper Newtown generally, at Orwell Point or Veraon River Bridge,—a distance of three to four miles. The people of Murray Harbor road, and of the different adjoining settlements, load either at Vernon River Bridge or at Montague River Bridge,—distance in general about five miles; the greater quantity of the produce is carried to the latter place, on account of the number of Americans loading there, and the generally better prices obtained.

LOT 58.

St. John's Church, in connection with the established Church of Scotland, and St. Michael's Chapel, of the Roman Catholic Church, and the Lighthouse on Point Prim, are erected on this Township. In the centre of this Lot is Pinette River-the nearest and usual market for surplus agricultural produce. Widow Lyance, widow Jessie Macdonald, and Murdoch Martin-one of the late immigrants-who have settled in the Surrey settlement, have got helpless families, and are not in a situation to pay for any part of their land. I beg most respectfully to recommend them to the favorable consideration of his Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in Council. The settlers on Lot 58 who have complied with the Government terms, and paid the first instalment of the price of their lands, are returned as "freehold ALEXANDER McLEAN.

LOT 59.

The land on this Township is inferior, not to be rated above second quality, the best of it being a poor sandy soil. The Lot is well supplied with roads, and these roads are in good repair for this time of year. The markets and chief places of shipment of surplus produce are Montague Bridge and St. Andrew's Point. At the former, there is always a ready market for produce, at the shipping season; it is about eight miles distant from the farthest part of the Lot. At the latter place a large quantity of produce is bought by the resident trader, and shipped to the different markets. A public wharf is in course of erection at Aitken's shore, which, when finished, will be a very convenient shipping place for surplus produce for a portion of the inhabitants of this Lot.

LOT 60.

The land generally is third quality. The inhabitants in general resort to Pinette market. The inhabitants of Culloden settlement, fronting on the Selkirk Estate, labor under much difficulty for want of water; there is none within two miles of some of them, in summer. They complain of being assessed to support Free Education, and cannot get a Schoolhouse erected, for want of means, although there are children enough in the settlement to make up the average required by the Act. The inhabitants of Rona, fronting on the Three Rivers road, declare they are, in general, in poorer circumstances, than when the last census was taken.

LOT 61, AND PANMURE ISLAND.

The land on Lot 61 is generally bad; that which is not swampy, is sand and flint; when looking at the new fields on the new settler's farms, I could see flint stones almost as thick as grass over the surface. I did not see more than four or five good farms on the whole Township.

There are about forty immigrant families on the west end of the Lot, without even a road to their miserable abodes; of this they complain very much, as they have to carry every thing they can get (not what they want) ten or fifteen miles on their backs.

Two lines of roads are intended to be opened through to the Wood Island road, which crosses the west end of the Lot, but from some cause this object has been neglected for the past three years, and the above people are suffered to undergo all the hardships which can be better imagined than described. I had to wade nearly knee-deep in swamp, and was in danger of losing my horse.

The west end of Lot 61 is well wooded, but the land bad, worth nothing, except for lumber; far from market, and the settlers are without a road or a school. It is the last place I would choose to make a living in. A road is very much required to enable the poor people to get a horse to their abodes.

DUNCAN FRASER.

LOT 62.

The soil of this Township, in general, is light, sandy. The roads require to be greatly improved. There is no stated water communication with other parts; the inhabitants suffer great inconvenience for want of a harbor. The nearest stated market is Charlottetown, about 35 miles distant. In the fall of the year surplus produce is generally shipped at Pinette and Murray Harbor,—distant respectively ten or twelve miles.

DUNCAN MUNN.

LOT 63.

So far as my acquaintance with the soil of the and Island extends, I am of opinion that Lot 63 is among the poorest, for farming purposes; and all of it fit for cultivation is nearly occupied; there is a great extent of what is called barrens or swamp, and the crops on the farms near the swamps are often destroyed by the early frosts.

The inhabitants of this Township have, in a great measure, to deal with the merchants in Murray Harbor proper, and at St. Andrew's Point, and Georgetown. Sometimes American vessels call into St. Mary's Bay in the autumn, and pay for produce in cash. The roads are very good, except in the rear of the Township, and there they will never be good, on account of deep ravines, although mostly dry, rendering it very difficult for the poor settlers there to take their produce to market; some of them will hrve to cart it about thirteen miles to the shipping places on Lots sixty-three and sixty-four; but in my opinion it will be long before the poor settlers on the rear of Lot 63 will be able to ship much produce.

As regards leases, neither the time when they were executed, nor the time expired, could be correctly ascertained, because some not being able to pay for it, have not got a lease yet, and some have a number of leases, once held by others, and

many or most of these have been executed at different times, and with different rents payable, &c. JOHN DALZIEL.

Lot 64.-No remarks.

LOT 65.

stony, but the inhabitants, by industry, and the collection of sea manure, raise considerable crops of wheat, oats and potatoes, but very little hay. Charlottetown is their chief market, to which most of the surplus produce is hauled on the ice, on account of the want of a convenient shipping wharf.

Nine Mile Creek.—The land is more loamy and flat,-better adapted for hay and pasturage; but rent is a great hindrance, especially to those in arrears; their shipping place is the wharf at Dead-

man's Point.

Big Point.—The land is generally very gravelly and dry; but for the advantage of sea manure, some farmers could hardly subsist, -to say nothing of paying rent. Their shipping place is McEwen's Wharf.

Canoe Cove and Rear Settlement. - The rear settlement is very gravelly and dry land. The soil may be rated as third quality. The inhabitants are generally very poor; some of them hardly able to obtain seed.

Road between Lots 65 and 31, and also between 65 and 30, is very hilly land, and much subject to blast and mildew, about the creeks, by reason of which the wheat crop generally fails; some have abandoned sowing it altogether. The general market is Charlottetown, distant about twelve miles.

LOT 66.

The north end of this Lot is rather far from any market or shipping place,-Montague Bridge being the nearest. There is but one School-house on the JOHN MACLEAN. Lot.

LOT 67.

contains a good deal of hilly land, with a great 14s.

quantity of stones, rendering it hard to cultivate; hence, the land ranks as second quality; but the Township contains neither swamps nor barren land. The land marked first quality is easy of cultivation, producing good crops of hay and grain of all kinds, as also root crops. The agricultural produce of the Township, generally, and hay particularly, was be-South Shore .- The land is generally high and low an average, considering the breadth under crop, owing to the drouth of the season.

Charlottetown is the principal market for the eastern part of the Lot,-distant 14 to 20 miles. The nearest market, where a considerable quantity of produce is shipped, is New London, on the North side,—five to nine miles distant. Summerside, on the west,-thirteen to eighteen miles distant,-commands a good deal of grain, on account of the facility of getting goods or necessaries in return. Crapaud, on the south, -distant seven or ten miles, -would be a good outlet for produce, in the shipping season, were the County line road sufficiently improved.

PRINCETOWN AND ROYALTY.

The quality of land in general is pretty good. The place is well supplied with roads. The markets mostly resorted to are Boston, Halifax, Miramichi, Dalhousie and Richibucto.

GEORGETOWN AND ROYALTY.

The quality of land in the Royalty is poor. town is advantageously situated for shipping. communication in the Royalty, indifferent.

CHARLOTTETOWN AND ROYALTY.

There are thirty-nine inhabitants in the Barracks. In the County Jail are seven male prisoners-two of them criminals under sentence of death; and also

two female prisoners, both of them criminals.
Steam Tannery of W. B. Dawson manufactured Lot 67 is situated in the centre of the Island, and last year 54,088 lbs. of leather, valued at £7352 JAMES E. S. BAGNALL.
