SPI by the numbers:

- The Strategic Partnerships Initiative (SPI) is a unique federal program administered by Indigenous Services Canada/Indigenous and Northern Affairs Canada, but shared by a growing network of 16 federal partners.
- SPI supports economic reconciliation by working with Indigenous proponents to increase their participation in complex, multi-year economic opportunities that span a range of sectors.
- Internal to the federal government, SPI is an innovative approach. Designed to make possible what one program or one department cannot do alone, SPI provides a way for multiple federal partners to coordinate their efforts, reduce administrative burden, and find new ways to broaden the use of SPI's flexible, shared authorities.

- Since its launch in 2010, SPI has been a catalyst for partnership and investment in Indigenous economic development opportunities across Canada.
- SPI provides a way to get key players to the table, including:
 - o Indigenous institutional partners who play a key pathfinding role by connecting SPI members to emerging opportunities at the regional level; and
 - o Provinces/Territories and academic institutions who can take on critical activities under SPI initiatives such as service delivery and training.
- Partnership is at the heart of every SPI initiative. No initiative can go ahead without the involvement of at least two federal departments or agencies.
- We are continuously working to grow SPI's membership by actively engaging other key departments.
