Representation

The Indian Association of Alberta (IAA) is a provincial wide political organization representing individual First Nation's people. It has had and continues to have, an unclear mandate to represent the Chiefs in Alberta who have established their own political organizations in the three Treaty areas.

The IAA has had a tenuous relationship with the Assembly of First Nations (AFN). In 1984, the IAA severed ties with the (AFN) after disagreeing on Bill C-31. However, at the 1988 annual assembly of Indian chiefs, the IAA and AFN put aside their differences to form a united front to pursue common issues. During 1992, the IAA president declared her opposition to the AFN's stand and participation in constitutional discussions as she felt it was contrary to a treaty perspective and has been active in establishing a "break away" Treaty First Nation Alliance.

Attempts have been made in 1992 and will likely continue in 1993 to resolve the issue of mandates and roles. This has been forced by the establishment of the Treaty 6 and 8 organizations and also their receiving funds which had formerly gone to the IAA.

Organization Mandate

The Indian Association of Alberta was founded in 1946 and is incorporated under the Societies Act of Alberta. Its mandate is as follows:

- to protect and strengthen the rights of the Treaty Indians of Alberta;
- to give legal and political assistance to Treaty Indians for their social and economic well-being;
- to actively support the varied programs designed for cultural and creative expression;
- to assist in promoting leadership development for self determination of Indian governments;
- to work with any Indian government in their relations with all governments and corporations for the benefit of Indians;
- to support land claims and protection of Indian lands;
- to monitor legislation; federal, provincial and municipal.

Priority Issues of concern

At each Annual General Assembly, motions are tabled and resolutions adopted which provide the IAA direction and mandate upon which to focus activities for the upcoming year. Issues of concern are:

- Claims, policy and process - perception that Canada and Alberta are not actively resolving claims in a manner satisfactory to Indian bands in Alberta.
- Treaty Rights - pursuing a process to clarify and define treaty rights and how they relate to concerns in the areas of post-secondary education, health, etc.
- Indian Justice - supports the establishment of an Indian justice system (policing, courts, etc.) on reserve as a further step to self-government.
- Environment - concerned about the impact of major resource development projects (pulp mills, tar sands plants) on Indian lands, particularly the environmental effects on fish in the Athabasca River.
- A review of the Indian political structure in Alberta.

The 1979 "Master Agreement" was a historic agreement as it effectively devolved the program administration and advisory functions to the LSLIRC. Federal civil servants vacated DIAND offices and the council hired its own staff. However, despite its statement of intent, it had not been a practical instrument for moving LSLIRC beyond contributions.

An agreement was reached using the AFA authority, along with the LSLIRC draft agreement, recognizing the historic significance of the "1979" agreement along with preamble and set of principles.

A five-year transfer payment agreement was signed on August 10, 1990 by the Lesser Slave Lake Indian Regional Council and the Regional Director General for \$112,190,143.

Due to the significance of the agreement a commemorative signing with the LSLIRC and the Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development took place on October 19, 1990 at Driftpile, Alberta.

ALTERNATIVE FUNDING ARRANGEMENTS

A five-year transfer payment agreement for advisory and program services, has been signed and will expire in March, 1995. This is the largest agreement in Canada to date.

An addendum to the agreement, that would allow the LSLIRC to manage additional capital projects with its member bands, is presently being discussed.

SELF-GOVERNMENT

The Regional Council submitted a comprehensive brief to the Alberta Cawsey Commission and was well received.

The Regional Council is also developing a strategy for policing services for the member bands in conjunction with the Alberta Justice and Federal Ministry of the Solicitor General.

Developmental funding has been provided to LSLIRC relating to the Administration of Justice.

The Tribal Chief's Ventures Inc. (formally known as the Tribal Chiefs Association of Alberta) was originally formed in the late 1970's as a political organization for the seven bands of the St. Paul District.

The seven bands originally in the organization were the Beaver Lake Band, Frog Lake Band, Cold Lake First Nations Band, Heart Lake Band, Kehewin Band (now known as the Long Lake Cree Nation), Saddle Lake Band and Whitefish Lake Band.

On April 14, 1988 the Tribal Chief's Ventures Inc. was incorporated. The Frog Lake Band, Beaver Lake Band, Cold Lake First Nations, Heart Lake Band, Long Lake Cree Nation and the Whitefish Lake group at Goodfish Lake are members of the organization.

The Saddle Lake Band, was the last band in St. Paul District to officially join the Tribal Chief's Ventures Inc. in March, 1993.

YELLOWHEAD TRIBAL COUNCIL (YTC) BACKGROUND/HISTORY

The YTC was formed in 1979-1980 as a political unit representing the Enoch, Alexis and Alexander bands. Later, the Sunchild and O'Chiese bands from the Southern Alberta District joined the organization.

The tribal council is unincorporated and administers several programs and services with funding from various federal and provincial government agencies. It retains advisory personnel in education, economic development and engineering to assist bands to develop strategies and skills for the eventual take-over of those programs.

The YTC provides the following post-secondary programs and services: student financial support, university/college entrance preparation, guidance and counselling, instructional services and management support.

The YTC has also negotiated the retention of a CEIC counsellor within its own structure as well as a National Health and Welfare contact person. The council has successfully negotiated a dual bilateral child welfare agreement with the Province of Alberta and the department to form the Yellowhead Tribal Services Agency.

The YTC has just completed a move of its offices to the Enoch First Nation Reserve. Plans are in the works to move the post secondary education offices into Edmonton.
