## HISTORY

The French presence in PEI dates back to 1720 , when a French colony settled on the sland known as Île Saint-Jean. Nearly all of the Acadians were deported from the island 1758. In 1884, Maritime Acadians adopted their national symbols, including the flag, the Acadian National Convention in Miscouche.
1990, the PEI government created the French-language school board, which is
