This Labour Market Bulletin provides an analysis of Labour Force Survey results for the province of Quebec and its regions.

OVERVIEW

According to the latest estimates of Statistics Canada's Labour Force Survey (LFS), the number of employed people rose by 8,500 between October and November 2016 in Quebec, amounting to an increase of 0.2%. In comparison, the employment growth rate in Quebec this month sat in between that for Canada overall (0.1%) and Ontario (0.3%). Full-time employment fell by 0.2% in Quebec and by 0.1% in Canada over the past month, whereas it rose by 0.2% in Ontario. In Quebec, the gain of 16,400 part-time jobs offset the decline of full-time employment.

The picture is more positive for the past 12 months. Year over year, employment added 80,600 jobs in Quebec. The bulk of this gain was due to the number of part-time jobs, which rose from 776,900 in November 2015 to 828,900 in November 2016. Over the same period, full-time employment added 28,600 jobs (0.9%). The number of workers in the public sector increased by 1.2%, while the proportion of self-employed workers was 1.6% higher than in November 2015.

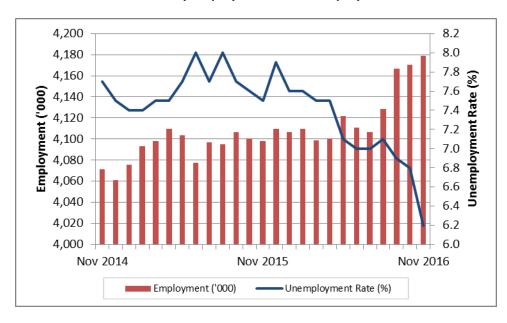

Quebec Monthly Employment and Unemployment Rate

The unemployment rate fell by 0.6 percentage point between October and November 2016, and reached 6.2%. The number of unemployed people saw a significant decline over the last month, which was all it took for the labour force to shed 20,300 people between October and November 2016. The unemployment rate saw a significant decline over the past year, from 7.5% to 6.2% (its lowest rate over the last 40 years). The number of unemployed people dropped again, but the labour force grew, thanks to a good performance of employment.

It is worth noting that the unemployment rate of youth between the ages of 15 and 24 fell by 1.5 percentage point between October and November 2016. This decline benefited both young men and young women. Over the past year, the unemployment rate of youth rose by 0.6 percentage point. This situation affected young women a little bit more. The employment rate of youth between the ages of 15 and 24 fell during the past month (0.2 percentage point) and over the past year (-0.3 percentage point). In both cases, the proportion of employed young women saw a significant decline, whereas the rate of employed young men increased. However, it is the 25+ age group that benefited from the increase in employment over the past month and the past year.

EMPLOYMENT BY INDUSTRY

Over 80% of job gains over the past year in Quebec were attributable to the service sector. All service sector industries saw employment increases, except trade and professional and technical services, where the number of jobs fell. Employment in the goods-producing sector rose during the same period, boosted by a good performance of the construction industry. However, employment in the manufacturing industry decreased by 0.7% year over year.

REGIONAL ANALYSIS

Over the past year, three economic regions stood out in terms of above 9% employment growth: Abitibi-Témiscamingue (9.5%), Laval (10.3%) and Centre-du-Québec (10.8%). The Montréal region posted the strongest job creation for the year with the addition of 64,900 jobs. Despite significant gains in Laval and Montréal, the rest of the Greater Montréal region posted job losses, the most significant ones occurring in Montérégie (-22,600).

The unemployment rate saw a significant decline in three Quebec regions. Thus in Mauricie and Montréal, the unemployment rate fell by 2.3% and stood at 5.6% and 7.5%, respectively. In Saguenay-Lac-Saint-Jean, the rate



shed 1.4 percentage point and fell below the 6% mark. This decline of the unemployment rate was complemented by an increase of the employment and participation rates in Saguenay-Lac-Saint-Jean. The Centre-du-Québec and Capitale-Nationale economic regions posted a 3.9% unemployment rate (In Capitale-Nationale, the unemployment rate stood at 3.7% in November 2015).
