October 2015



This Labour Market Bulletin provides an analysis of Labour Force Survey results for the province of Saskatchewan, including Regina-Moose Mountain, Swift Current-Moose Jaw, Saskatoon-Biggar, Yorkton-Melville and Prince Albert & Northern economic regions.

OVERVIEW

Employment in Saskatchewan grew 1,400 between September and October. Labour force growth was even more rapid, with 5,000 people joining the Saskatchewan labour force last month. This increase accounts for almost half of the province's total labour force growth over the last year (+12,700) and indicates that more people in Saskatchewan are looking for work.

Saskatchewan's recent employment increase comes on the heels of a period of limited growth, and gains in October only partly offset losses over the past year. Last month, employment was down 300 compared to same month last year. Nonetheless, last month's increases come as welcome news given the ongoing impacts of low commodity prices.

Saskatchewan is expected to have minimal employment growth for the rest of this year, but conditions should increase somewhat next year. Conference Board of Canada expects only 3,000 new positions (+0.5%) to be created this year, but it forecasts that the provincial economy will rebound somewhat in 2016.



Despite the increase in employment over the last month, the large influx into the labour force caused the unemployment rate to increase by half a percentage point. The unemployment rate remains high compared to last year; the rate last month (5.6%) was 2 percentage points higher than in October 2014. Saskatchewan no longer has the lowest provincial unemployment rate in the country; Manitoba now has a slightly lower rate at 5.3%. However, Saskatchewan's unemployment rate is still well below the national rate of 7.0%.

Saskatchewan youth saw the largest monthly increase in the unemployment rate in October. Among 15 to 24 year olds, the unemployment rate jumped 2.3% between September to October, compared to a slight 0.3% increase among those aged 25 and older over the same period. Interestingly, the small increase in the 25+ unemployment rate was driven entirely by a large increase in the labour force (+4,300), as employment for this age group rose significantly (+3,000) month over month. Both men and women have seen similar increases in the unemployment rate (+0.5 and +0.6% percentage points, respectively).



EMPLOYMENT BY INDUSTRY

Employment in Saskatchewan's goods-producing sector has been trending in the opposite direction of employment as the services-producing sector. Goods-producing industries grew 4,200 from September to October, but employment in this sector has fallen considerably since October 2014 (-8,400). Meanwhile, Saskatchewan's services-producing sectors fell 2,800 over the last month, but on a year-over- year basis, employment in the sector was up 8,200.

Within the goods-producing sector, Saskatchewan's construction and agriculture industries had the largest employment increases last month, with each gaining 1,300 between September and October. The seasonal rise in agriculture is based largely on the harvest, which turned out better for some producers than previously feared.

Like agriculture, construction in Saskatchewan now employs fewer people now than it did a year ago. Construction's year-over-year loss stems in part from a decline in housing starts throughout Saskatchewan, a trend that is expected to continue for some time. According to the Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation housing starts in Saskatchewan are expected to continue to decline in 2016, but should stabilize in 2017. A number of recently-announced commercial projects, including a \$24M addition to the Prince Albert Correctional Centre and \$525M upgrades to SaskPower gas turbines at the Queen Elizabeth Power Station near Saskatoon, will offset decreased employment demand in the residential construction industry.



Saskatchewan's manufacturing industry is another industry where employment increased last month despite a longer-term downward trend. According to industry representatives, manufacturing sales are down due primarily to the decline in commodities prices, which lowers demand for manufactured goods. V

REGIONAL ANALYSIS

Over the last year, unemployment rates have risen throughout the province and employment levels have declined or stagnated in most regions.

Both Swift Current—Moose Jaw and Yorkton-Melville have seen their employment levels (-1,100 and -2,800) decline and their unemployment rates increase (+1.7 percentage points each). Slow activity in the oil and gas industry and the resulting decline in goods-producing services are likely still taking their toll in these regions. Husky Energy, which is based in Alberta but has some operations in Saskatchewan, has announced that it has cut 1,400 jobs. This is in addition to the numerous oil companies with operations in Saskatchewan who announced-large lay-offs in September.

Prince Albert & Northern is also seeing falling employment (-1,400) and a rising unemployment rate (+2.2 percentage points). A new freshwater fish processing plant being constructed in Île-à-la-Crosse will have the capacity to double the number of fisherman and helpers in the community to 500, from the 250 employed last winter. VIII As well, a new expansion to the Prince Albert Correctional Facility will create 100 new jobs.

Saskatchewan's larger urban centres are doing comparatively better. Saskatoon-Biggar has seen strong employment growth (+2,000). Despite this recent growth, the region's unemployment rate has also increased (+1.5 percentage points) due to an even larger growth in the labour force (+7,500). A negative turn for the region occurred this month, when Mosaic announced lay-offs at its potash mine near Colonsay. Regina-Moose Mountain has seen minimal, but positive, employment growth (+200), but the region has also seen only minor growth in the unemployment rate (+0.4%).
