ROCKFISH CONSERVATION AREAS

You Can Protect British Columbia's Tiger

AND OTHER INSHORE ROCKFISH

Inshore rockfish species live on rocky and glass sponge reefs, do not swim far from their home reefs, and many can live over 100 years! They are very susceptible to overfishing.

Rockfish Conservation Areas (RCAs) help protect declining populations of British Columbia's inshore rockfish species from fishing mortality.

Most fishing activities, including recreational halibut and salmon fishing, are prohibited in all 164 RCAs.

The only permitted fishing activities are:

Recreational **Commercial** • Crab, shrimp and prawn by trap • Crab, shrimp and prawn by trap • Invertebrates by hand picking or dive Euphausiid (krill) by mid-water trawl Smelt by gillnet Groundfish by mid-water trawl Herring by gillnet, seine, and spawn-on-kelp Indigenous Peoples' Food, Invertebrates by hand picking or dive Social, and Ceremonial (FSC) Salmon by seine or gillnet Sardine by gillnet, seine, and trap Harvest and conservation decisions Scallop by trawl made by Indigenous governing bodies Smelt by gillnet within FSC allocations
