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In this Report the details of expenditure and revenue for each department are given in a separate part, the parts being arranged alphabetically by the names of the departments. At the commencement of each part there is a summary of the expenditure, indicating the pages where the details will be found. A similar summary of the revenue is given at the commencement of the revenue details. Thus, if an item of Immigration expenditure is wanted-it being known that this service is under the control of the Interior Department-on turning up that department in its place alphabetically, the summary at the beginning gives the page for Immigration, and there the details of expenditure will be found arranged under agencies. Similarly an item of expenditure under the control of the Public Works or any other department may be found in the same way.

For full index, see end of each volume.

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I have the honour to transmit the report of the Auditor General on Expenditure Accounts, appropriation and statutory, and on Revenue Accounts. .

It will be easily understood that during my short absence in Europe last summer I could obtain but a very small portion of the information that would be useful in my official position.

## Visit to Great Britain.

In Britain I thought mainly of four points-(1) The Public Accounts Committee; (2) the Treasury in its connection with the Audit Office ; (3) the methods of control and audit and (4) the Civil Service competitive examination system.

## (1) The Public Accounts Committee.

The Public Accounts Committee procedure seems absolutely perfect. The committee is composed of a few members of experience who confine their committee work to the one subject, who deal with principles, to a great extent differences between the Executive and the Audit Office, and who settle the practice for similar points when they may arise.

## (2) Treasury and Audit Office.

The connection between their Treasury and Audit Office is in a sense more satisfactory than ours. There seems to be no pretense there that the rulings given out by the Treasury are governed by any law. Here, up to the present time, while the overruling of the Auditor General's decision is legally governed by sections of the Audit Act, the overruling is based in fact upon the opinion of the Department of Justice, a department which knows no more about the rules which should govern the auditing of accounts than the first man you may chance to meet. For instance, the department, by the opinion of which I am overruled, contends that the Auditor General is not justified in requiring vouchers when the government has passed an Order in Council that the gross amount is to be paid on a claim in which there are evidently details which can be given, but are withheld.

These particulars are not adduced to cause an unfavourable opinion of the Department of Justice to prevail. The proper controlling of expenditure is a branch of its own and may be absent from persons who have clearer minds and more general information than others who understand our work.

I complain again as I have complained before that the Opposition of the day seems to think that no risk is run in allowing the government to do as it is greatly tempted to do by the demands of its friends and by the ill-informed opinions of the I)epartment of Justice, there being nothing more in its way than the slight obstacle of an unsupported Auditor.

Talk of the opposition being. weak in numbers and without experience! One member, even if he had never been in the House before, but had once grasped the
view that the money with which we all deal is no more the property of the government than it is that of the humblest tax payer in the land, would have no difficulty in making it clear to Parliament and to the people that not a dollar should be allowed to a claimant of public funds until after it had been earned in the same way that money is earned from a private individual. One can, however, easily see that it is quite absurd to do even as is done in England, make a Comptroller and Auditor General nominally independent of the government, and the Treasury Board (the government in another name) ; the Chancellor of the Exchequer, who is the British Finance Minister, being the ruler of the board which makes decisions that the Comptroller and Auditor General accepts without a murmur. Hopes of an awakening of the British Audit Office may be cherished from the recollection that in Sir Wm. Dunbar's time it was not thus. He was willing to stand up for his own opinion when he had the law of the land supporting him.

## (3) Methods of Control.

While this is not a place in which a Canadian should dwell largely on our, superiority over the practices of other countries, it is well that the attention necessary to prevent us forgetting the advantages which we already enjoy, should be given to it. By thoroughly grasping our strong points we are not so likely to lose them.

When there is an appropriation or other authority to expend money here, the control of the country's money is never lost until it actually reaches the public creditor, so that, while the money has its full effectiveness for general purposes, it never becomes available for the individual needs of the public employee, who is engaged in distributing it as the requirements of the state may make necessary.

The examiners in the Audit Office, therefore, make use of the cheque to the order of the public creditor and endorsed by him as a principal voucher in the examination of accounts. I do not know any other country where this simple and thorough system is in such general use.

This regulation had not reached Britain so far as I could learn when at home.
As I have explained in another place my chief objection as an official to the borrowing of money from the banks is that it is impossible to put the check above described into operation with reference to the borrowed money.

## (4) Civil Service Competitive Examination System.

Another point which greatly interested me as an official having to get work done by assistants was the Civil Service examination system. The competitive system of selection has many important advantages besides that of selecting from the individuals who are willing to accept public employment those who have the fullest clerical knowledge :

1. It selects for you the industrious, the sober and the men of ability.
2. It excludes the persons who appeal to the sympathies of those who are willing to let any man have public employment who is unfit to manage the private business of these same generous persons.
3. Then it prevents a competitor from being handicapped by not belonging to a particular political party.
4. After the official under the competitive system becomes attached to the office he has nothing to look to for promotion but his head and his hands. Nobody wants to hasten or retard his advancement except as his merits may justify it.

An outsider can scarcely conceive the misery to a man who is responsible for the proper conduct of an office, who requires assistance, knows the man who is capable and who is willing to perform the work at a reasonable rate, and is prevented from getting him. The difficulty is not so much in the political aspect of the matter. If a present applicant's father happens to be a Conservative one scarcely knows that he ever had a father, his Liberal uncle is so constantly with him. The great difficulty seems to be the part of Canada where the applicant happened to be born. One might be supposed to give a little consideration to the fitness for a public place of the person who is to fill the place.

Then, in Britain, if an official does his work well, there is no suspicion of his being moved in secret to be treacherous to his superior, he having obtained employment without political support, and there can be no ground for the latter desiring his removal to obtain a favoured successor, as under their system, no man outside of the Board can tell who his successor will be after he is removed.

I am quite sure that, if the change to the competitive system were made here, it would not be a month in existence until the ministers would be pleased in every way with the change.

## Visit to France.

In France an able and prominent resident whom I had the good fortune to meet, made it rather evident that, notwithstanding the ability of the people, there was little chance of obtaining, in the short time at my disposal, much information which would be of service to us in our condition.

The great difficulty is the length of time which elapses between the expenditure of money and the publication of the details of expenditure. Then the frequent changes of the government itself tend to weaken control, as they must, if that government is out of power when the first intimation of how the expenditure has been made reaches the public.

Early and strict accounting are wanted. If the persons who expended improperly were to the fore when the tardy accounting for the expenditure were being made, the free criticism of an enlightened press and people would be salutary, but a community becomes disheartened when those who have wasted their hard earned substance go unpunished.

It is no wonder that in France earnest industrious people, under the circumstances described, seem to have given up any thought of watching their political rights, pay without, question such taxes as are demanded from them and confine their personal expenditure to the portion of the fruits of their intelligence and toil that
may remain to them after the uncontrolled demands of the government have been satisfied. How simply, apparently, political privileges may be lost by even a brave, sensitive and courageous people.

Is not this sufficient warning to us to watch steps which are being taken and which at the outset are apparently free from danger ?

## Bounties on Iron and Steel.

It is unnecessary to make further remarks here on the differences between the De partment of Trade and Commerce and this office regarding the methods which seem necessary to me, to thoroughly safeguard the interests of Canada in connection with the millions which are to be paid to the smelting and steel companies. I trust that this important subject will receive careful consideration. It seems clear that legislation is required in connection with the bounty to meet the change in their works made by the Dominion Iron and Steel Company so as to produce steel at once without the expenditure of fuel in the reheating of its pig iron.

## Trávelling Allowances.

You will observe by the correspondence that consideration of the old subject of travelling allowances ought to be renewed.

## Extended leave to Temporary Employees.

I presume, as there is not likely to be any attempt to consider by the Public Accounts Committce the differences between the Treasury Board and this office regarding certain claims of extra clerks for protracted sick leave, I may as well consider myself absolved by parliament from the necessity of declining to pass any claim of this kind which may receive the sanction of an Order in Council, no matter how long the leave may be.

## Justice Department and Audit Office.

While writing this short memorandum a report is current of a change in the Ministry of Justice. If the differences of this office with that department do not now become speedily settled, no one will think of attributing the result to want of energy or ability on the part of the gentleman who is expected to succeed to the position.

## Printing of Audit Report.

I am glad to be in a position to state that the work of the King's Printer's Department, in connection with the printing of this report, has been done to the entire satisfaction of this office, both with reference to speed and manner of finishing.

Sir,-In reply to your letter of the 25 th , I beg to say that there is no technical difficulty in carrying out your request to supply 1,200 advance copies of your forthcoming report. A serious difficulty of another kind, however, presents itself. Your report, when sent to me, becomes the property of parliament, and is printed by its order and subject to its rules. It would be a breach of duty on my part, and would bring upon me a deserved reprimand, if I were to issue any book or paper of parliament before it is distributed to those upon the authorized list sent for my guidance. The parliamentary distribution must be first served, and if that be done, the parts will be lost, and I shall have no complete volume to give the members when they arrive. If parliament were in session, the parts might be sent to members to assist in considering the estimates. That has, to a certain extent, been done before; but to distribute partially, out of session, has never been done. It would be contrary to usage and to the principles upon which the printing of parliament is carried on.

## Audit Office, Ottawa, December 2, 1901.

Sir,-I have your letter of the 30th ultimo about the difficulty of distributing the Audit Report in parts.

I am obliged to leave Ottawa to-morrow, and, therefore, have no time to look up the precise action taken by parliament on Mr. Charlton's motion some years ago.

There is no difficulty now about distributing the whole book whenever it is ready, it being distributed first to those on the parliamentary list. I had no notion of making a general distribution of the parts until they were distributed to those on the parliamentary list. In fact, the use I proposed making of the 1,200 copies in parts was to send them to the senators, members of parliament, and the newspapers on this list. I cannot see what possible transgression of parliamentary rules can be made by treating the parts exactly as the whole volume would be treated.

I trust that, in the meantime, you will be good enough to go on doing all that is needed to have the parts ready, so that when I return in about ten days, no time shall be lost should it turn out, after the best consideration that we can give the subject, that there is no constitutional objection to letting the members and others obtain the information which they otherwise will not get at all. If the report becomes public property only after the opening of the House, it will generally be put aside for the many other documents which from day to day attract the attention of members of parliament.

The purport of the move made by myself to have reports distributed in anticipation of the meeting of parliament, was simply to enable members to be posting themselves upon public questions before reaching Ottawa, and the reception of even portions of the Auditor General's Report would place information in the hands of the members in accordance of the original design of the resolution, I strongly endorse your position in this matter.

Sir,-I have received no reply from you to my letter of the 2 nd ultimo, about the objection which you raised to the distribution of the Audit Report in parts. However, I think I did not deal with the portion of your letter of November 30 where you say : 'The parliamentary distribution must first be served, and if that be done the parts will be lost, and I shall have no complete volumes to give the members when they arrive.'

You are mistaken in supposing that ynu would not have the complete volumes. My view was that the complete volumes should be distributed when the members arrive, just as before. The only change would be that the members would get the same information in two volumes, one being distributed in parts and the other bound up.

Please let me know now whether you find it necessary to decline complying with my request or if you see your way to preparing the finished parts for distribution at once.

Sir,-I have given the subject of your letter of the 13 th careful consideration, and I do not yet see my way to make so radical a change in the method of distribution as you propose. There are several obstacles which stand in the way, and they are mainly as follows :-

1st. The distribution of parliamentary documents is entrusted solely to the King's Printer, and there is no one else but him who can send them out. He acts in accordance with rules and instructions laid down by the Printing Committee of parliament, and these rules have existed for very many years. The distribution lists, which are instructions, are varied from session to session. The departmental officers have no control over these rules, nor power to modify them.

2nd. You request me to hand you over 1,200 copies of the 2,000 which you are toreceive under the Order in Council, after the distribution is complete; and these 1,200 copies you propose to distribute yourself. That cannot be done, for the reason that parliament has provided a distribution list, and there is no authority to make a partial distribution, or, in other words, to send to some and not to all the persons on that list. No partial distribution has ever been permitted. If any go out at all, all must go out ; and that is a rule which has never been deviated from. If I deviate from a rule so fundamental as that I am taking upon me a serious risk, and I shall most certainly be blamed, and I shall have no one to stand behind me to bear the responsibility.

3 rd . If, then, I issue the whole number of copies and make the distribution on the parliamentary list a large number of the separate parts will get lost, and I shall have no copies to make them good. The whole distribution will fall into confusion and uncertainty. The 1,200 copies which you propose under your plan to send out will be practically wasted. No one will be satisfied, and I shall be justly reprimanded for breaking out on a new path without authority.

4th. With regard to these 2,000 copies which are to be given to you, they or any portion of them, can only be given to you after the parliamentary distribution is completely finished. I shall be glad to do these up in single parts, as you propose, but only after the parliamentary distribution is complete.

These are the reasons I gave in my letter of November 30, and I cannot see any escape from them. A public officer whose duty is so clearly laid down as mine is has no justification in deviating from his instructions. An innovation so important can only properly be made by authority of parliament ; and the proper course would seem to be for you to bring the matter up before the Printing Committee. The subject of your report has often been before the Printing Committee, but it has never expressed any desire to vary the mode of distribution.

I regret, therefore, that for these reasons I find it impossible to carry out your wishes. Your report is advancing very rapidly, and there is no reason that I see why it should not be on the Table of the House when the House meets. It is true the copy is not all in, but there cannot be a great deal more.

I am forwarding a copy of this letter and that of November 30 to the Chairman of the Printing Committee. If he should think fit to send me different instructions in the matter I shall then have some one to assume responsibility for this new departure.

Memorandum on the subject of the foregoing correspondence regarding the distribution of the Audit Report in parts.

There is no object in arguing this question. The correspondence brings the matter before Parliament. The King's Printer only requires the direction of Parlia-
ment to change the mode of distribution. If Parliament desires that this Report should be distributed as the parts are ready, it is only needed to say so. All that seems necessary is the same simple direction with reference to the parts of this report that was given with reference to all of the departmental reports at the instance of Mr. Charlton in 1887. The Premier of the day, Sir John Macdonald, at once acceded to the proposition, as far as I can recollect.

There appears to be no need for an allusion to my opinion as to the view taken by the King's Printer.

## Funds Borrowed from a Bank to carry on Services for which Money is not appropriated.

Audit Office, Ottawa, December 30, 1901.

Sir,-I know that some departments are now carrying on services by money borrowed from the bank, although I have no direct official kuowledge of the fact : for instance there is no entry in the Audit Office books since August last on Census Account. Where did the money come from which must have been required?

It seems advisable to say that I cannot hold myself responsible, at any stage of such expenditure, for the accuracy or regularity of it. The difficulty of keeping a continuous check on outlay of that kind has been made clear by the investigations in the Public Accounts Committee on the Charleson accounts. Even with the credit system it has often been objected by members of Parliament that the Audit Office sees vouchers for expenditure only after it is too late, that is when the expenditure has been already made ; but then I get the statement of the cheques which are drawn each month, the cheques themselves and other vouchers in the same way, at the end of the month, while the chances are that the first time the accounts or vouchers of any kind in connection with the bank-borrowed money will reach me, will be near the end of the financial year when the money voted by Parliament to repay the bank its advances will be made available. I should say that then, if my memory serves me rightly, there is usually no notice to Parliament that the money has been already used.

You probably reply : This cannot be different. If money is absolately required and it has not been appropriated it must be obtained on a Governor's Warrant or be borrowed. It could not be legally obtained under Governor's Warrant when it was borrowed from the bank, and therefore it was borrowed. I answer : Surely on the face of the case it seems unreasonable that the government should have the right to borrow money while it cannot touch the money of the country which is in the bank in abundance.

If an appropriation runs short, while additional outlay is immediately required and while the House is not in session, a Governor's Warrant should, in my view, always issue, so that the expenditure may go on in the usual channel subject to the regular prescribed conditions, be entered in the books of the Finance Department and Audit Office ; and not in ways known only to the department immediately concerned. Always assuming the absolute and immediate necessity of the expenditure the Governor General's Warrant should issue instead of the using of any other means of providing funds. Whether any one should be censured, or who should be censured for indirect connection with the necessity of the warrant is quite independent, at that stage, of the constitutional propricty of causing the issue of the Governor's Warrant.

It is true that the government will be held responsible if the necessity for the additional appropriation was or should have been foreseen when the last estimates

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were being brought down to Parliament, cr if there was no immediate necessity for the funds provided by the warrant, but will not otherwise.

Parliament has carefully scrutinized the circumstances under which warrants of the Governor General have issued during the tenure of office of this government, as well as that of the Conservative party, to determine whether there was just cause for blame of the government in connection with the necessity for the issue of the warrant. In any case there is no need of such examination when money is borrowed from a bank while Parliament has money of its own. This is always wrong.

Memorandum by Minister of Finance on Auditor General's Letter.-The Auditor General's letter appears to be based upon the assumption that the Governor General's warrant is always available to meet an expenditure that has not been provided for by parliament. This may not be so. There may be cases in which an expenditure is called for which is not provided for by parliament and for which a Governor General's warrant cannot properly issue. The ministers must be the judges as to when such cases arise, and they must be free to make such arrangements for meeting the cases as they deem best, relying upon parliament to indemnify them by making the necessary appropriations. This is a matter wholly outside the functions of the Auditor General, whose only responsibility is for the auditing of the accounts when they come before him in due course.

Memorandum by Auditor General.-I do not see this matter in the same light as the Finance Minister either (1) with reference to the freedom which the ministers should enjoy in making arrangements for meeting cases where money not appropriated by parliament is required, or (2) as to the whole responsibility of the Auditor General to parliament being the auditing of the accounts when they come before him.

1. There is only one class of cases referred to in my letter, so far as the side of the question with which I dealt is concerned.

Money was not provided by appropriation, a Governor General's warrant was not issued, but the government thought that the necessity for spending the money was so great that, although it appeared to the government that a Governor General's warrant could not properly issue, it was advisable that the money should be expended, and the money was borrowed from the Bank of Montreal.

The best evidence that there may be an occasion, in the view of the government, for obtaining money when it has not been appropriated, and when, according to the
interpretation of the Audit Act by the government, a Governor General's warrant cannot properly issue, is that it has already occurred.

To authorize, in the first instance, the expenditure of public money, is recognized as the exclusive privilege of parliament. Parliament should, therefore, in any case which is likely to arise in which money may be required, and which is neither the subject of an appropriation nor comes under the cases where, in the view of the government, a Governor General's warrant. may issue, be advised by the government as to the restrictions which should be placed around the proceedings and the formalities which should be enforced. The expenditure would, by the imposition of such restrictions, be brought under the control of the Auditor General from the beginning.
2. I quite agree with the Minister of Finance that this is no business of mine, unless I have more responsibility in connection with secing to the regular carrying out of the directions of parliament and the government in the expenditure of public money than he supposed when he wrote the memorandum.

The most of the expenditure is made under letter of credit. The credits are always in favour of two persons who always act jointly and who are not permitted to draw cheques except to the order of the public creditor. It is manifest then that defalcations in the course of the expenditure of public money can only take place by the collusion of three persons, the two officials and the creditor. Then, if there is any delay in sending vouchers to show how the claims are made up, a renewal of the credit does not take place until the explanations are made. It is far more pleasant to devote time to prevent wrong doing than to detecting it after it has been done.

It takes 50 cents in this office to do the work connected with $\$ 1,000$ of the public revenue and expenditure. It would take more than $\$ 5$ to do the same work if everybody was permitted to do what he liked between the time when he obtains control of public money and when it reaches the public creditor, and there would not then be the same security that there had not been irregularity.

What occurred in the Accountant's office of the House of Commons a few years ago could not happen now, and happened then only because I was prevented from enforcing there the system of paying always by cheque and to the order of the member or other person entitled to receive money. These restrictions that I think so ncessary and which have proved so effectual, cannot be applied if the money is spent, without the knowledge of the Audit Office, as it is when the money being spent is borrowed from a bank.

## Dept. of Trade and Commerce : Proposed Extension of Letter of Credit to cover payment of Steamship Subsidies and Iron Bounties; also Evidence required in support of claims for Bounty.

Sir,-Mr. Nutting has returned to me as coming from you my letter to the Auditor General of the 27 th instant asking for a letter of credit to meet expenditure during the current year on account of several services under control of this department ; and he informs me that you wish to have the amount reduced and two items bounty on iron and steel and mail subsidies struck out.

I do not feel disposed to do so as I find nothing in the Audit Act that would warrant any curtailment of the ordinary auditing of accounts by the Deputy of the department, or in other words of the auditing by the Auditor Gencral's Department before the issuing of cheques. The Order in Council authorizing the issue of letters of credit and signing of cheques I must consider as sufficient warrant for the request

I have made. If you see fit to reduce the amount or to strike out the items referred to I think you must do it on your own responsibility. Cheques must issue on some of the accounts prior to the first day of next month.

Sir,-I have your letter of 29 th instant with regard to the issuing of a letter of credit of $\$ 50,000$ for your department, the application for which I personally returned to Mr. Nutting (in your absence at the moment). At the same time I gave my reasons for asking that payments for mail subsidies and bounties on iron and steel should not be made by cheques on a letter of credit, and asked that the amount applied for should be reduced to a sum sufficient to pay the other services mentioned in your application, viz., Culling Timber and Inspection of Staples.

It may be well for me to repeat my reason for asking that payments for mail subsidies and bounties should be made through this office, on your application of course.

The payments for the former service are now so made, and during the absence of the Auditor General it is not advisable that any change should be made. As regards the bounties, it is true that in the past these payments have been made through the Customs Department letter of credit, but the Auditor General has for some time been asking for a change to payment by Receiver General's cheques. Under these circumstances I would ask you to continue the existing practice in the matter ${ }^{-}$ of paying mail subsidies, viz., by the issue of a Receiver General's cheque, and also that bounties should be paid in the same way.

I shall not discuss the provisions of the Audit Act regarding the payments of public moneys. Both systems of payment, viz., by departmental letter of credit and Auditor General's certificate are in force and I think the sections of the Act under 'Proceedings as to votes of money' clearly provide for them. The Auditor General claims the right to say how far each system. shall apply. As regards the reducing of the amount of the letter of credit which you say must be done on my own responsibility, this office of course is not in a position to know what the requirements for your other services will be. If you will inform me I shall be glad to authorize the necessary letter of credit.

Sir,-I am in receipt of yours of even date in reply to mine of yesterday in re the letter of credit applied for some days since. I note the reasons you give for not issuing (which is tantamount to a refusal to issue), the letter of credit, and in reply would state that as regards the practice you quote, the payment of mail subsidies by Auditor's cheques instead of by letter of credit was not because this department accepted the right of the Auditor General to insist upon it, it was a mere matter of convenience at the time. The department did not ask for a letter of credit preferring to pay by Receiver-General's cheques. Now, that the business of the department is so greatly increased the ordinary course seems more advisable, and it is the intention of this department to pay such claims from the 1st instant by letter of credit cheques. Appropriations have been made for these several accounts and this department is charged with the administration thereof and intends to deal with them in the manner to best promote the interests of the service and to do quick justice to claimants. I can sce that there is a considerable difference between the auditing of accounts and the obstructions that are, and have been for some time past, put in the way by the Audit Office. I do not find that the Auditor has any power to assume to be a dictator or a controller. If so, the various departments in the service had better be abolished, and the whole government administered by him. I must decline to name any sum smaller than that asked for. If you choose to cut it down you assume the responsibility. I might add, possibly for your information, that it is not at all probable that there will be any claims for bounty ready for payment for some few weeks to come, and in the meantime you can make up your mind as to what course you see fit to take. If you neglect (which I hold to be tantamount to a refusal), to issue a letter of credit, an appeal will of course be at once taken. The payments of salaries, \&c., cannot be delayed in this manner. Cheques must be issued at once.

I trust on second thoughts you will issue the credit asked for without attaching thereto any restrictions.

Sir,-I am inclosing herewith a requisition for leter of credit in favour of this department for the sum of $\$ 50,000$.

I note in a letter from your department of the 30th July that you objected to the issuing of credit in favour of this department for paying mail subsidies and bounties on iron and steel, and that the Deputy Minister in his reply did not recognize your objections as being good. In connection with the payment for these two services I would point out to you that they are two services in which there is less necessity for an audit before payment than probably in the payment for any other service under government control. The payments for bounty on pig iron are made to well established and responsible firms, and will continue to be made to these firms for the next five years. The same papers will be furnished to your department in the shape of vouchers after the cheques are issued as would be furnished to your department when asking for cheques for payment made by Receiver General's cheque, and in case any error should be discovered there would be no difficulty in adjusting the matter. The same may be said in regard to payment for mail subsidies. A great number of the contracts are for from three to ten years, and in most cases the annual payments are divided into from two to four payments; any over-payment could be re-adjusted in settling subsequent claims. There is no risk and no possible chance of any loss to the government by having these cheques issued from this department instead of from the Auditor General's. In regard to the payment for bounties on pig iron, all previous payments have been made by letter of credit cheques from the Department of Customs, and the Order in Council by which the payment is transferred to this department, specially states that the payment of these bounties which had hitherto been paid by the Department of Customs, should after the 1st of July, be made out of the Consolidated Fund of Canada under the direction and control of the Minister of Trade and Commerce instead of being made from Customs Revenue under the direction of the Minister of Customs.

There are several claims now in, both for mail subsidies and for bounties on iron and steel, and unless a letter of credit is immediately issued $I$ shall have to bring the matter before Council.

Sir,-I have received your applications, dated the 12 th instant, for the payment of claims for bounty on Iron and Steel, amounting to $\$ 116,667.70$.

As the amounts which will be disbursed on this account during the six years of the existence of the bounty will be so very large, it is highly desirable that all possible effort should be made from the outset to close any loophole for over-payments.

In the claim-papers as furnished, the whole dependence appears to be on the affidavits of the manager and accountant in each case, while both of these officials are more or less interested in the claimants and are in no way responsible to the government. I have no doubt but that you have in view, making a scrutiny from time to time of the books. It seems to me, however, that there is a general, easily provided statement which should accompany each claim from the beginning and which would be an important safe-guard. I would be inclined to call upon each company to show : 1st, the weight of steel ingots, puddled bar and pig iron at the commencement of the bounty earning period ; 2nd, to prove from its books, railway vouchers, \&c., the amount shipped during the period, and 3rd, to show by inventory the amount on hand at the end of the period. These three statements would of course give the amount manufactured during the period, unless to the extent that the result might be affected by manufacturing from cne material into another. Government officials could take various means of testing the accuracy of these reports.

I trust that there is some means of verifying the returns of bounty earning material by the ore used in the manufacture. We should have proved statements of all the material provided.

Have you found the opportunity of becoming informed on the methods practised in other countries to prevent wrong payments in a similar part of their public service?

I shall be much pleased to talk over these points or any others that may occur to you.

Sir,-I am in receipt of yours of the 3rd instant, with stated reference which purports to be a reply to my letter to you of the 25 th ultimo, asking for the section of the Audit Act under which you claim to be acting in connection with the question at issue, and I note that you do not in any way answer my inquiry but simply refer to certain correspondence between you and the Department of Railways and Canals in 1897 and 1898, which, so far as I can see, is not pertinent to the question, except possibly the last line of your letter of January 21,1898 , in which you state 'I cannot do what you desire without being relieved from responsibility by competent authority.' I claim that in this case you have been relieved by competent authority, as an Act of Parliament has been passed which provides for the payment of bounty upon pig iron, steel ingots, \&c., which Act further provides that certain regulations may be made by order of the Governor in Council-such regulations have bem made and become as it were part of the Aet itself-such regulations definitely provide that the payments. shall be made by the Minister of Trade and Commerce upon such evidence as is therein required.

In the claims that have been submitted to you the full requirements of the Act and of the regulations have been complied with, therefore, under the terms of the Act and co-relative regulations the minister is empowered without any refarence to you to make payment of claims. This department has asked you for letter of credit under which to comply with the terms of the law. Although you have not refused in direct terms to issue such letter, you have for now nearly two months neglected to do so, and it is time the matter was settled, and parties who have earned subsidy and have complied with the terms of the law, receive payment. I must submit that the Act and the regulations predicated thereon have as full force and in fact greater force than any obscure section of the Audit Act, inasmuch as such law and regulations are specific, covering the point at issue, and are subsequent in date to the Audit Act.

I do not wish you to understand that I object to any audit, in fact I am quite anxious that all claims should be eventually audited, but I claim that the auditing should be subsequent and not prior to the passing thereon, and payment thereof by this department.

As it has become absolutely necessary that some definite action be taken, I have again to request a distinct reply as to whether you intend either to issue as requested letter of credit in favour of this department, or authorize the issue of cheques in payment of claims now before you, or not, in order that if you still adhere to your determi-

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nation and refuse payment, the matter may be submitted at once to Treasury Board for final decision.

I quite agree that it is time that those who have earned subsidies should be paid and I have offered to pay any round sums less than the monthly claims, as there are always fresh earnings which have not been presented for payment sufficient to cover any deficiencies.

The regulations of the Act which you menticn are necessary, but they do not repeal the Audit Act. Both apply and are not inconsistent.

With reference to your last paragraph I must repeat that I do not intend to cause the issue of the letter of credit.

You are mistaken in supposing that this is a point on which the law provides that there is an appeal from my decision to the Treasury Board. Of course you may appeal to the Treasury Board on my refusal to issue the cheques on your applications for payment of the accounts now in my hands and test the point in issue between us.

I think cheques might also issue in full, under the same conditions, for all the claims you now have in your hands for pig iron, leaving those for steel and puddled bars over for future consideration, or possibly cheques might be issued for a reasonable portion of the amount claimed for steel, \&c., subject to future adjustment.

These amounts do not include the claims made in your application for puddled bars or steel ingots, but merely those for pig iron, and are made in accordance with the condition laid down in your letter of the 12th inst., namely, that they are to be considered merely as payments on account.

I hope you will be in a position when the next claims are presented to give the information suggested by me with reference to all the claims from the 1st of July.

Sir,-Referring to your letter of the 8th instant in re the issuing of letter of credit to this department for payment of claims for bounty on iron and steel and for mail subsidies.

I note you claim that the law does not provide for an appeal from your decision in this matter to the Treasury Board ; and in this connection I would submit that the issuing of credits is apparently covered by sections 29 and 30 of the Audit Act, and I cannot find in these sections that you are given discretionary powers in this direction. The modus operandi as apparently interded was that, when Council had authorized the payment of services under any department by letter of credit, an application should be made for this credit to the Auditor General, who would examine the same with a view to ascertaining if there be a parliamentary or statutory appropriation for the same. If there is an appropriation covering the service the Auditor General will apply for a letter of credit to the Minister of Finance and Receiver General.

If you will refer to the discussion of this Act in committee in 1878 when the Bill was introduced you will find that in explaining this section it was stated as follows :-
' It was better to give this power to the government to exercise at their discretion than to oblige them, \&c.'

You will see, therefore, that parliament in passing this Act never intended to give you the discretionary power you claim but reserved it to the government.

I am quite sure that you do not wish to assume powers and responsibilities which parliament never intended to confer upon you ; and would, therefore, suggest that you issue the credits asked for by this department, and that in future the question as to whether services shall be paid by letter of credit or by Receiver-General's cheque be left to Council, as was intended by the Act.

If there is any doubt about the interpretation of this Act, it would be well to have the matter brought to the attention of Treasury Board with a view to having the Act amended, if thought necessary, and the responsibility more definitely defined.

Further with reference to the applications that have already been made to you for cheques in payment of bounties earned and to your suggestion that you would issue cheques for part of each claim on account, I cannot see any valid reason for acceding to this proposition, that is in so far as regards bounties payable on pig iron. I think you should pay all claims in full or refuse in toto ; and if you have any reason or any evidence to show that the amount claimed has not been earned then of course you should take the latter course ; but as regards the clains for payment on steel ingots, I am inclined to think your suggestion the better course, and that payment of a reasonably large proportion of each claim simply on acc sunt should be made, for the reason that in my investigations in re the manufacture of steel some questions arose in my mind which will probably necessitate some modification in the regulations ncw existing, and which may perhaps make a difference in the amount of bounty actually

payable. For this reason I am not strenuous with reference to the full payment of the steel ingots claims until the matter can be brought before Council, and some decision arrived at on the points I have brought to the notice of the Honourable the Minister.

I am directed by the minister to state that the correspondence between us will be submitted for consideration of the Honourable the Treasury Board.

Sir,-I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your favour of the 10th instant, with reference to the issuing of letter of credit to pay the bounties on steel, puddled bar and pig iron.

Regarding your quotation from Hansard of the discussion in 1878 on the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act as it went through the Commons, you do not contend surely, that even where the words of the Act are of doubtful interpretation a point in its meaning can be properly settled by an isolated sentence of the discussion of the subject in parliament, without even naming the speaker.

The whole tenor of the debate indicated that letters of credit were expected to be used to a far less extent than they have been used, instead of a greater.

The remarks of Sir Richard Cartwright, of which you quote a small part, show that he, as Minister of Finance, was very far from the opinion that credits should be the universal method of making payments-the view which ycu seem to hold.

At the bottom of the column in which the remarks quoted by you appear, Mr. Blake, who gave the matter much attention, is mertioned as having said : 'There was considerable force in the remarks of the Hon, the member for Charlevoix (Sir Hector Langevin). A general system of credit should not be established, because for a large portion of the expenditure such was unnecessary ; credits should be given only in special cases.'

It is quite plain that the general system of making expenditure, which was anticipated when the Audit Act was before Parliament was one of direct payments by Receiver General's cheques as contra-distinguished from payments under credits.

We have worked for over twenty years under this Act and, so far as I can recollect, have had no serious difference before on a point of this nature between any department and this office.

There can be no possible kind of expenditure where there is less ground for claiming that the stable door should be kept open until the horse may have been stolen.

In making payments of public money there are two great points to be kept in view, expedition and accuracy. Expedition is important but accuracy is usually much more so.

Where the payments are numerous, comparatively small, recur month after month or week after week, or are made at a distance, the chances of error being consequently small and the delay consequent upon waiting for a cheque often being a source of inconvenience, credits are frequently issued to supply the means of making payments. Credits too are always substituted for the carrying of cash when it is necessarily a choice between cash and a credit.

In this case-the paying of the steel and iron bounties under the present lawthere is not one of these reasons in favour of a credit and there is every reason against it.

The payments are few and large, not more than seven or eight in a month, and amounting in all even now to more than $\$ 100,000$ in that period.

The work of scrutiny in this connection is in its infancy and our knowledge of the best methods of safeguarding the interests of the country necessarily in its infancy. Neither you nor I can say that he is certain that he has found the best method of dealing with the question. You cannot surely maintain that there is such inconvenience to your department as to justify, for the purpose of avoiding it, the chances of error in these large sums in the very beginning of the operations.

In your recent letter you admit that the applications to me for payment may have been wrong so far as the steel bounties went, and if so, your payments, if you had a credit, might have been wrong. Isn't there the proof that you should not have had a credit? If the applications had come to this office the error might have been found out. Certainly I should not have asked that any of your tests for accuracy should be abandoned, and I should have supplied others which, if they were not additional safeguards as they are now admitted by all to be, could not have done harm. I am not referring to your having overlooked an important safeguard as at all blameworthy. We all miss points. I mention this only as an illustration of the advantages which arise from getting the assistance of others. I think I see other important ways of verifying the correctness of the charges made against the government in these cases.

Since I returned from Europe in the beginning of last month there was an application to this office for over $\$ 40,000$ which the country had no right to pay and which would have brought down severe censure on all concerned if it had been paid. An Order in Council had passed for the amount. This amount would no doubt have been paid if the department had a letter of credit for that purpose. The government at once acquiesced in my objection, when it was pointed out. Recollect that except in the case of election accounts I never pass any application for payment without the requisition of a department for the amount.

This is an office where the critical side of the question is naturally taken up. If our training is good for anything it is for the bringing of weaknesses into view.

During this month I have declined temporarily to issue the usual departmental letter of credit to two departments on account of delays in making returns to such an extent as to greatly interfere with the progress of business in this office. Both the late and the present Minister of Finance consider such reasons as justifying my course.

It makes no difference who establishes general regulations regarding bounties, it must always be open to those whose duty it is to pass upon the claims, to apply new tests as they get new light upon the business. Of course it is always our duty to apply what appears necessary tests with as little friction as possible, but they must be varied as appears advisable from time to time.

Then, it is proper in your interest and mine that if we are able to show to the people of Canada by our statements exactly where all the material on which bounty was paid actually went, we should do so.

Why should we not ask for the actual weight of every cast with the certificate of every person who did the weighing, and why should this not be among the vouchers to lay before the Public Accounts Committee?

We now both agree upon the advisability of having constant and close supervision on the part of representatives of your department, particularly in the larger establishments.

Discrimination on many points is needed and I strongly believe should be applied without delay.

Direct payments, instead of credits, have existed from the inauguration of this office with regard to all the large payments in the Public Works and Railway Departments and I do not recollect that there ever was a demand for a change. I remember well that Mr. Trudeau during his tenure of office expressed a strong objection to an alteration of the system.

In the sentence 'It was better to give this power to the government, \&c. ", govcrnment is there used, as it so often is, for the executive, no matter who it is who has the duty of carrying out the general directions of the legislature.

Sir,-I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your's of yesterday's date in reply to mine of the 10th instant, having reference to the issuing of letters of credit or to the payment by direct Receiver-General's cheques of bounty claims.

I do not see much use in continuing the arguments. The correspondence has all been submitted, under direction of the minister, for the consideration of the Honourable the Treasury Board. Whatever decision is arrived at, I shall on my part most cheerfully abide by. The one point to be arrived at is a decision of some kind.

I fear you place a wrong interpretation upon my remarks with reference to the payment of the steel bounties. I do not admit that the arplications were wrong. The applications as made were in strict compliance with the Act and the regulations founded thereon, and no one could be held blameworthy were the claims paid as sent over. The idea that I intended to convey to you was that perhaps some further regulations were required with reference to the bounties on steel, which migint perhaps change the actual amount payable.

I showed you my memorandum on the subject, so that you are quite aware of the grounds on which I based my ideas, and I think you quite agree with me on the subject. That is a matter for the consideration of the government; but it in no way affects claims that have been sent over to you-only that I would suggest that payments on steel be made 'on account' instead of in full until the matter can be more particularly looked into.

Without entering into any arguments to show the uselessness of these statements even if procurable, I have been informed by one company that they could not comply for reasons satisfactory to me, but not necessary to repeat herein.

I have submitted the matter for the consideration of the honourable the Minister and am by him desired to state that the various claims have all been made in strict compliance with the terms of the Act and of the regulations founded thereon and adopted as per Order in Council, and that it is not the intention to add to the regulations or to require further evidence in support of claims unless so directed by the honourable the Treasury Board.

I have, therefore, to request the issue of cheques for amounts of all claims, both on iron and steel, in your possession-some of which are now six months old.

Sir,-I duly received your letter of the 14 th instant, with reference to bounty.
I cannot see how any company could say that what I have asked, a statement showing that the pig iron made and therefore subject to bounty is the sum of what has been shipped and what is now on hand, cannot be furnished. Pig iron does not evaporate. I had no difficulty in proving to Mr. Drummond that there was no hindrance to providing the statement.

It is quite true that in steel works this mode of checking does not apply. That is no reason that the method should not be used where it does apply. It is the very simplest and most effectual method of determining whether the claim is correct or not where it does apply, at Midland, Deseronto, \&c.

If an auditor is of any service in exposing or throwing out claims that should not be allowed, he must have the greatest latitude in applying tests. In this case the application of the test will cost the company nothing.

I am sure that you misapprehend in some respects, the nature of the case. If you read the Audit Act carefully you will see that, while the Treasury Board may overrule me when I have given my decision that a claim or part of a claim is not to be paid, there is no provision for overruling my application for vouchers, my efforts to obtain more light on the subject. You will also notice that there is no ground in reason for refusing vouchers at any stage of the examination. If the claim is sound no vouchers can prove it unsound. Every honest claimant should jump at an opportunity to prove that his claim is sound.

The companies are getting millions with nothing but an insignificant outlay to prove the claims. Nobody ever gave them any ground, I am sure, to expect that they will get their claims allowed without a thorough examination from those whose duty it is to look into their claims. They have a right to expect treatment exactly similar to what it would be if the bounty came from private individuals.

I think it would be a serious mistake to oppose my request, but if you are determined that I should have in reality nothing to do with the examination and audit, of the bounty claims, be good enough to get express authority from Parliament to that effect.

## Living Allowance of $\$ 10$ a day for Travel in England.

## Audit Office, Ottawa, November 12, 1901.

Sir,-Let me call your attention to the payments from Civil Government Con-tingencies-Sundries, Finance Department, $\varepsilon$ mounting to $\$ 774.16$, to Mr. J. M. Courtney, Deputy Minister of Finance, on account of expenses of his trip to England from December 17, 1900 to January 30, 1901.

It will be seen from the accounts that Mr. Courtney, to cover only his cost of living, received $\$ 10$ a day during the whele period of his absence, not only while he had hotel bills to pay, apparently about twenty-eight days, but during the time of his passages to England and back-about sixteen days, his board and lodging in the latter case having been altogether covered by the passage money.

In connection with this I learned when in England during the summer, from the Assistant Comptroller and Auditor General, that the Imperial living allowance when on land for superior officials, to cover all but moving expenses, is a guinea a day, and that when ordinary board is paid by the nominal passage money an allowance of 4 s . a day for wine is made. In this way Mr. Courtney, if serving the Imperial Government in a position similar to that which he holds in Canada, would have received for living expenses on the trip with which we are now concerned :

while he received for the purpose from Canada $\$ 440$. I need not weary you with proofs that, if the British Comptroller and Auditor General or the Permanent Secretary of the Treasury can cover his outlay for living with $\$ 158.65$, no man in the Canadian service requires more than that amount, not to speak of nearly three times that sum far the same service. The amounts based on actual outlay which have already been received by the Accountant of Contingencies for my own recent trip to Europe, confirm the deduction drawn from the Imperial accounts.

I send herewith British reports on the question of travelling expenses which contain with other matters the information which I give above and which, as I there say, was received verbally from the Assistant Comptroller and Auditor General.

With reference to the accounts of Mr. E. L. Newcombe, Deputy Minister of Justice, the amount received by him for living expenses was $\$ 540$, while the amount
which would have been allowed by the Imperial Government is $\$ 218.03$-a difference of $\$ 321.97$. In the ease of Mr. M. J. Griffin, Parliamentary Librarian, the amount received for living expenses was $\$ 650$, while the amount which would have been allowed by the British government is $\$ 274.24$, a difference of $\$ 375.76$.

It is surely time that, if it is determined to continue a system of allowance for living expenses to those who occupy the positions of deputy ministers, when they travel to other countries, the allowance should have some nearness to actual outlay. Please return the accompanying papers when you have examined them.

Sir,-I have the honour to acknowleảge the receipt of your letter of 12 th instant in reference to my travelling expenses to England, from December 17, 1900 to January 30, 1901.

I have also received the British repcrts referred to in your letter, and I beg to point out that they only apply to rates authorized to be paid to officers in the United Kingdom, travelling in the United Kingdom. The true comparison, to my mind, would be, what would be paid to an English official travelling beyond the seas, and what would be paid to a Canadian official travelling to England.

I am perfectly acquainted with the British reports, which I return.
I may say that while I was in England I made further inquiries on this subject and found that while you are undoubtedly correct in stating that the Imperial living allowance on land in England is but a guinea a day, the allowance beyond the seas, and which was paid, for example, to the Foreign Office officials who went to Washington and the Hague, and to the Post Office officials who went to Berne, was two guineas a day, and in some higher cases three guineas. The allowance paid to British officials in Paris in connection with the Behring Sea Arbitration varied from one and a half guineas to three guineas per diem.

Your statement as to what the Comptroller and Auditor General would be paid if he made a trip similar to the one I made last winter is erroneous, as, if such a case were to arise he would in all probability be paid £2 12 s . 6 d . per diem.

My trip being chiefly in connection with the Mint I made inquiries as to the allowance granted the official of the British Mint who was sent to Perth to install a branch mint at that place, and I found that his allowance was two guineas per diem. He was not the chief official, although of the first rank, drawing a salary abnut the same as paid to us.

I do not think it necessary to enter into a lengthy and coraparative discussion as to your expenditure and mine for, with your manner of living, I have no concern nor have I any curiosity about your accounts, nor do I think it desirable to take notice of your remark about actual outlay. At all events I can only say that in over thirty-two years of public service I never left Canada of my own wish but always at the request of the Minister of the day-that I am glad to say that my travel has, as a rule, been advantageous to the public interests-in many cases I have made outlay which I could not well charge-that I have never profited by travel, and I do not recollect any oceasion when on my return I have not had to make a refund from my own resources.

SIR,-I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 13th November, about the travelling allowances of yourself and others in England.

I do not agree with you in the comparison of your expenses with those of British officials who travel beyond the seas. The standard should be the similarity of duties.

Under usual circumstances when a Canadian official goes to England, i.e., unless to meet a large body of men engaged on the same business, he has no greater expense than an ordinary traveller. Although foreign office officials were beyond the seas when they went to Washington or the Hague, and post office officials who went to Berne, the additional expense did not arise from the fact that they were beyond the seas, but from the fact that their countries were in evidence and not they. The same thing was true of the Behring Sea Commission.

I must maintain in the absence of information, which if it exists should be given, that your trip to London was entirely devoid of the element of expense which existed in the other cases which you cited. I do not now refer to the officer of the mint whose expenses you mention, because I do not know what the ordinary expenses in Australia are.

I did not mention my own expenses for the purpose of comparison; but you may notice that when we travel in Canada and our accounts are itemized they are on about the same scale. If our expenses are practically the same here they are likely to be so in other places and therefore in England. I get repaid my actual expenses and therefore, if you were treated in the same way, you would get less than half what you do get.

There is really no object in referring to your making refunds from your own resources. You do not pretend that you have not been paid more than your individual actual expenses on government account amounted to. I spent, although my circumstances would not permit me to be anything but economical, $\$ 150$ more than I thought I was justified in charging to the government. You charged the moncy which you received in addition to your actual expenses for no better reason than you would charge your coal bill or your house rent here.

I did not raise any question about your having or not having the requisite authority of your minister or the government.

If your travel was markedly advantageous to the government, as you suppose it was, there is a reason, not that you should charge more for your expanses than they were, but that you should claim a higher salary.

I wish this difficulty, which occurs every year between some deputy head and myself, were settled in some way. It makes matters very unpleasant for me. Then it interferes with the discharge of public business.

It is plainly wrong that for any period you should get an allowance largely in excess of your actual expenditure. When on land you get $\$ 10$ a day and do not ordinarily spend more than $\$ 5$. Then for the time on the vessel going and returning, about 15 days, the whole $\$ 150$ is practically a gift. I did not then spend a cent. You, I am sure, did not spend more than $\$ 10$ all told. It will be recollected that the usual tips are repaid independently. I cannot, in my position, shut my eyes to such unjustifiable charges. I am willing to admit that the people who permit uncomplainingly their press to allow such aecounts to pass unchallenged, deserves to be treated as they have been.

The very serious thing in all this is that in paying you every year or two, five hundred dollars to which you are not, by any kind of reasoning, entitled, it cannot be calculated how much more the country is losing indirectly, than if you were paid instead three or four times as much annually in salary to which, in my view, you are entille ${ }^{1}$. You by ight should exercise a great influence, as secretary of the Treas ur. Board, in controlling public expenditure and making Canadian methods respected.

In matters of disbursements you have deprived yourself of the power of applying the only test-show where the money went-by having for your own advantage maintained that it did not apply.

Sir,-I am in receipt of your letter of the 10 th instant respecting travelling allowances in England.

I have no further remarks to make on the subject. May I be permitted to suggest, however, that in your correspondence due regard be had to consistency on one hand and the avoiding of exaggeration on the other. I am induced to offer this suggestion in view of the opening sentence of the last paragraph of your letter, which reads : 'The very serious thing in all this is that in paying you every year or two, five hundred dollars to which you are not, by any kind of reasoning, entitled.'

Now, as a matter of fact, I did not visit England from the summer of 1892 to the winter of 1900-1901, a period of over eight years, and according to the academic calculation of the excess of allowance made in yours of November 12, the alleged over-payment was $\$ 281.35$, not $\$ 500$.

So far as I am concerned this correspondence is closed.

## Local Revenue : Yukon Election Expenses.

Sir,-Your letter of October 15, 1901, to J. T. Lithgrow, Dawson, re Election Expenses, owing to Mr. Lithgow's absence, has been forwarded to me. Replying to same I beg to state that the time for the delivery of ballot boxes was so limited that I could not call each deputy returning officer to Dawson for his box ; besides had I done so the expense would have been fully three times what it cost to send a reliable man from Dawson via steamer, for which selvice I paid him a lump sum, the very smallest I could get any reliable man to do the work for.

Navigation had closed wheri election was over, and I wired Major Primrose of the North-west Mounted Police, at White Horse, to engage a thoroughly reliable man to bring in the boxes and that I would pay him 25 cents per mile on each box. No man could be secured for less, and the amcunt paid for this service, to my mind, was not excessive, as the man had two dog teams and an assistant, was compelled to engage a steam tug boat to cross Lake Labarge, was laid up en route for days at different points of the river, and complained when he reached Dawson that he would lose money on the transaction, and begged for an additional sum which I could not recommend, as the ordinance fixed the tariff. The expense, although to you may look high, I can assure you is not, and considerable money was saved to the Territory by my handling the business as above.

# EXECUTIVE REGULATIONS G0VERNING PUBLIC EXPENDITURE 

## Powers of Attorney.

Rules prescribel by the Treasury Board, under sanction of the Goveruor General in Council, in reference to the mode of acquittal of Warrants for the payment of money by the Government of Canada.

1. No Officer of the Civil Service shall, under any circumstances, be permitted to act as attorney for the receipt of public moneys.
2. No power of attorney will be recognized, received or acted upon by the Receiver General, which is not printed, and of the form to be obtained from the office of the Receiver General, under which only payments can be made, and such power will operate as to any fum of money due only by the Government at the date of the power of attorney.
3. No powers of attorney will be received by the Government for tho payment of moneys on warrants which partake of the character of an assignment of the moneys to another party, or purport to be irrevocable, or are in "any respects qualified."
4. General power of attorney, authorizing the receipt of money due, or which may become due after its date, by which any chartered bank or agent of a chartered bank, or any private individual, is constituted the attorney, will be received and acted upon, if printed and of the special form to be obtained from the office of the Receiver General; and in the event of the power being to the agent of a chartered bank, the bank must declare itself, by a proper instrument in writing, responsible for the acts of such agent, in respect to the receipts of moneys thereunder.

It is, however, optional with the party executing any power of attorney to a bank or agent of a bauk, or any private individual, prior to the execntion, to erase the words "or may hereafter become due."
5. All powers of attorney must be signed in the presence of a witness.
6. In case of the death of the person in whose behalf payment is claimed, the probate of will or other proof that the applicant is entitled to receive the money must be furnished on application for such payments.

Blank forms of powers of attorney may be obtained from the office of the Receiver General and at all the branches of the Bank of Montreal,

## Registration of Letters containing Cheques.

Order in Council, December 6, 1882.-Ordered that the various departments be required to register all letters containing cheques.

## Duplicate Cheques.

Treasury Minute, June 18, 1888. -The Board had under consideration a communication from the Auditor General suggesting that uniform regulations be prescribed by the Board with reference to the requirements which are to warrant the duplication of lost cheques.

1. The Board, on the advice of the Department of Justice, direct that if a Government cheque, whether on letter-of-credit or Receiver General's account, does not reach the person in whose favour it is drawn, or is lost or destroyed by such person, the bank on which it is drawn be notified first by such person.
2. That a duplicate cheque be issued, on a bond of indemnity of the form annexed being furnished, sceuring the Government against loss ; such bond to be examined by the Department of Justice after exccution.
3. That a declaration showing whether the original cheque was endorsed or not and how it was lost or destroyed, should accompany the bond, in case it is claimed that the cheque was lost or destroyed.
4. That each duplicate cheque should have the word "duplicate" written in red ink across the face of $i t$.

## Overdrafts of Appropriations.

Memorandum for the Minister of Finance. - You have frequently had occasion to allude in conversation to the overdrafts of appropriations made by departments under their letters-of-credit, and to inquire whether a renceat could not be found for the evil.

The irregularity occurs :
(1.) Sonetimes by overdr awing the credit to the bank,-but
(2.) More often while thare is a part of the credit unused, the over-expenditure of one appropriation being possible owing to an equal or greater aggregate under-expenditure of other appropriations.

It may be supposed that the remedy for (1) would be to give instructions to the bank not to eash cheques against an exhausted credit.

When, however, I have been applied to by a bank for instructions with reference to cheques presented for payment against an overdrawn credit, although I could not, as is plain, request the bank to continue cashing the cheques, I have hesitated to ask that the cheque should be dishonoured, as it might be hurtful to the credit of a departinent to have it generally understood that it was doubtful whether its cheques would be accepted.

Besides, with (1) as with (2), the responsibility should be laid upon the department. If the accountant of a department attends to his duties, he charges each cheque as it is issued against its appropriation and against the letter-of-credit of the department, and may be expected to be fully informed from time to time as to the balance of the credit and of each of the appropriations.

I therefore beg to recommend that an Order in Council based upon a report of the Treasury Board be passed, making it the duty of the accountant of each department to inform the Deputy Minister of the department whenever a cheque which is about to be issued will overdraw an appropriation or letter-of-credit, so that such cheque may not issue until parliamentary or other authority, as provided by the Audit Act, is obtained in the one case, or an additional credit in the other case.

Order in Council, July ~, 1892.-On a report dated July 4, 1892, from the Minister of Finance, submitting the annexer memorandum from the Auditor General with regard to the overdrafts of appropriations made by departments under their letters-of-credit.

The Minister, in accordance therewith, recommends that it be the duty of the accountant of each department to inform the Deputy Minister of the department whenever a cheque, which is about to be issued, will overdraw an appropriation or letter-of-credit, so that such cheque may not issue until parliamentary or other authority as provided by the Audit Act, is obtained in the one case, or an additional credit in the other case.

The committee recommend that a copy of this Minute be sent to the several departments for their guidance in future

## Appropriation Balances.

Order in Council, June 27, 1888.-The Treasury Board had under consideration a communication from the Auditor General respecting the interpretation of section 37 of the Audit Act, which provides for the extension of time for closing the Appropriation Accounts.

The Auditor General states that he understands the section to mean : "That an Appropriation account can be kept open for any time fixed by the Council, up to three months, for the purpose of charging against a vote all services or supplies for which the vote was taken, that is, those rendered before June 30 ."

As the present practice of bringing down the balances of appropriations for thrce months, and thereby lengthening the financial year to fifteen months, has been productive of delay in the preparation of accounts for Parliament, and with the view of definitely deciding what course should be followed, the matter was referred to the Department of Justice for opinion.

The Deputy Minister of Justice reports: "The question is, whether, upon an Order in Council having been passed as specified in the section, a department may make additional expenditure and incur increased liabilities upon the strength of the original estinate ; or whether the extension referred to in the section is only for the purpose of enabling a department to pay, after June 30, lialilities that have been incurred previously to that date. It would appear that the latter interpretation is the correct one. The section, without the proviso, categorically provides that any balance unexpendell on June 30, shall lapse, and he written off. The proviso does not either expressly or by implication, give a department power to make a new expenditure, and if that rower is not cortained in the proviso, it is nowhere; it does not exist. The only meaning to be d-syn from the proviso is that the extension is made for the purpose of paying, after June 30, out cf the original appropriations, such accounts as had at that date been incur red."

The Board, after careful consideration of the matter, recommend to Council that for the current fiscal year the present practice be retained, so that no inconvenience may be experienced by the departments, the Auditor General having intimated that he is willing that for the present year such course be adopted; but as the law is clearly in accordance with the contention of the Auditor General, the Board are of opinion that under existing circumstances the practice now followed cannot be continued.

## Letter-of-Credit Cheques.

Order in Council, June 24, 1889. - The Treasury Board had under consideration a communication from the Auditor General with regard to the signing of letter-of-credit cheques, and subunitting a list of the names of persons who sign such cheques for the different ilepartments; and they recom. mend to Council :
(1). That for each department, substitutes be anthorized by Order in Council to sign for those in whose favour the letter-of-credit is drawn, and that a copy of the Order in Council be sent to the Bank of Montreal, or other bank on which the credit may be drawn.
(2.) That the departments be instructed not to permit any person to sign except those anthorized by Order in Council.
(3). That no cheques be signed in blank, either in the inside or outside service.
(4). That all cheques be drawn in the form : "Pay to the order of ——"; ; and not in either of the forms : "Pay to-_or bearer," or "Pay to-_ or order."
(5.) That authority be given for the signing of letter-of-credit cheques in the different departments by the following substitutes :-(List not printed.)

## Contracts.

Order in Council, May 23, 1880.-On a joint memorandum, dated March 20, 1880, from the Honourable the Minister of Public Works and the Minister of Railways and Canals, recommending that hereafter all public works involving an expenditure of over $\$ 5,000$ shall be let by public tender and contract, unless owing to urgency or other cause it be deemed advisable to take different action, and that in all such cases authority be obtained by an Order in Council. That, with all tenders submitted, a money guarantee, or approved accepted cheque, shall be given, to be open to forfeiture in the event of the tenderer failing to make the necessary five per cent cleposit hereinafter referred to, within eight days after receiving notice of the acceptance of the tender, or of his declining to enter into contract when requested, the amount of such guarantee to be fixed at a sum not less ihan $\$ 1,000$ nor more than $\$ 5,000$. That upon acceptance of a tender, and notification by the department concerued, the intending contractor shall, within eight days, deposit with the Government a sum of money equal to five per cent of the amount of his contract. That in all cases where tenders have been called for, the lowest received shall be accepted, unless good and sufficient reasons appear for passing over such tender. The Committee submit the above recommendations for Your Excellency's approval.

## (Circular.)

Finance Dept., Ottawa, July 4, 1888.
SIR, - I have the honour to enclose herewith a copy of an Order in Council, passed on June 16, 1888, respecting the mode of treatment of securities deposited by public contractors, from which you will observe that hereafter the proceeds of all cheques and all deposits on account of contractors' securities are to be deposited in the Government Savings Bank.

I have the honour, therefore, to request that you will be good enough, immediately a contract is entered into, to send me all the securities for the performance thereof, in order that I may deposit the proceeds of the said securities in the manner prescribed by the Order in Council above referred to.

Order in Council, May 2, 1893.-On a memorandum dated May 1, 1893, from the Minister of Finance, submitting a report from his deputy respecting contractors' securities.

The Minister recommends, in accordance with the snggestion therein contained, that notice be immediately given to the Department of Finance by the department having control of the work, in case of the failure of contractors having a contract for the performance of work for the Government, and having security deposited with the Department of Finance.

The Committee submit the same for Your Excellency's approval, and advise that a copy of this Minute be forwarded to the Minister of each department for his information.

Memorandum respecting Contractors' Securities.-The undersigner has to report that by Order in Council of June 16, 1888, all cheques and all deposits on account of contractors' securitics are turned by this department into cash, and deposited in the Government Savings Bank, and in son:e instances where the security given is large, the interest accruing on the deposits is paid to the contractors yearly at their request.

The attention of the undersigned has lately been directed to the fact that a firm of contractors having a deposit now in the hands of the Government has recently failer, and it is just possible that cases may arise in which moneys may be paid over by this department unwittingly, for interest, to contractors who have suspended payment. To obriate such a contingency, the undersigned would suggest that the matter be brought before the Treasury Board, with a view of having a Minute adopted to the effect that whenever a firm of contractors having a contract for the performance of work for the Government and having security deposited with this department, fails, notice thereof be immediately given to this department.

## Certificates on Vouchers.

Revised Statutes of Canada, Cap. 29, Sec. 33.-No payment shall pe authorized by the Anditor General in respect of work performed, or material supplied by any person in connection with any part of the public service of Canada, unless, in addition to any other roucher or certificate which is required in that behalf, the officer, under whose special charge such part of the public service is, certifies that such work has been performed, or such material supplied, as the case may be, and that the price charged is according to contract, or if not covered by a contract, is fair and just.

Note. - The proper officers to make these certificates are those who have personal knowleclge of the facts in each case.-J. L. McD.

## Small Balances due to Estates.

Audit Office, Ottawa, June 12, 1888.
Sir,--It frequentiy happens that there is a small sum due to the estate of a deceased person who has left no will, generally for superammation or salary, when the whole assets of the estate are so small that the cost of obtaining letters of administration would be ia large part of them.

I suppose that in strictness the amonnts due by the Government cannot be paid Icgally to any one but the administrator of the estate. However, the amounts are frequently paid, either on receiving a renunciation fromall the other known heirs in farour of one, or on a bond approved by the Department of Justice iudemnifying against loss, should a person who has obtained the legal right to claim the payment make a demand for it.

I would suggest that payment, nuder the circumstances above set forth, should be made to a person who is not legally empowered to demand it, only when the assets of the estate are under one hundred dollars, and after the execntion of a bond as above rleseribed, approved by the Department of Justice, with any additional safeguards which, in the opinion of the Department of Justice, the special circumstances of the case call for.

Order in Council, July 24, 1894.-That a number of deaths occur annually among the fishermen who are entitled to fishing bounty, and in the majority of cases the men are poor, die intestate and leave no property worth the cost of administration. The bounty in such cases, by right belongs to the nearest of kin to the deceased, but that, under an Order of the Treasury Board, dated 19th June, 1858 , all cases where small sums are due the estates of persons who die intestate and leave little or no property of any consequence, must be referred to the Treasury Board for decision as to the action to be taken, which course necessitates a separate Order in Council in each case.

That as those to whom the money rightfully belongs are, in most cases, in needy circumstances, a general Order be granted, authorizing, in case of death among the fishermen of the class referred to, to pay the amount earned to the widow, father, mother, or children as the case may be, of the deceased, without reference to the Treasury Board.

## Stationery Office

Order in Council, June 26, 1889 (as amended by O. C., July 11, 1889).-His Excellency, in pursuance of the powers vested in him by Revised Statutes, chap. 27, sec. 7 , and by and with theadvice of the Queen's Priry Council for Canada, is pleased to direct and order :-

1. In every department the Deputy Head shall sign all requisitions in accordance with sec. 7, chap. 27, of the Revised Statutes, and a clerk, to be named by the head of the department shall, under the direction of the Deputy, have charge of all stationery and printing, and shall receive from the Government Stationery and Printing Offices all printed work and articles of stationery ordered and supplied, and grant receipts for the same, superintending, also, their distribution to the clerks or employees for whose use they have been ordered.
2. The Secretary of State is authorized to prepare a list of all articles to be kept in stock and furnished to the depart:nents upon ordinary requisitions, such list to be subject to the final revision and approval of the Governor in Council.
(Note.-This list was approved by O. C, Nov. 29, 1889.)
3. As soon as such list has been so settled and approved, and printed and distributed to the several departments, all ordinary requisitions upon the Stationery Office shall be issued for those articles only that are therem enumerated.
4. No articles sball be adrled to such list thereafter except upon the report of the Secretary of State, approved by the Governor in Council.
5. No plain paper or envelopes, such as are used for ordinary correspondence, shall be asked for by any ordinary requisition or issued upon the same for private use of the emyloyees in any department, except in the case of Deputy Heads.
6. No paper or envelopes for correspondence, bearing relief stamp, cameo or embossed work or devices, either lithographed or engraved, shall be kept in stock or supplied, except for the use of Ministers or Deputy Ministers, the Governor General's Secretary, the Speakers and Mermbers of the two Houses of Parliament, and the Judges of the Supreme and Exchequer Courts, the Clerk and Law Clerk of the Senate, the Clerk and Law Clerk of the House of Commons, and the Librarians of Parliament.
7. No pocket-knives or pocket-books shall be kept in stock or supplied to any department except upon special requisitions, stating the names and employment of the persons for whose use they are to be procared.
8. No despatch-boxes or brief bags, shall be issued for the use of members of any Government Comnission.
9. All requisitions issued under Rules 6 and 7, or for articles not on the general list (and therefore not procurable upon ordinary requisitions) shall be signed by the Depnty Minister and approved and initialed by the Minister of the Department, or the Clerk and Speaker of each Honse of Parliament.
10. A return of all artieles furnished to each department upon requisition, with the total cost of the supply to such department, shall be made up by the Superintendent of Stationery each six months, as soon as possible after the 30th of June and the 31 st of December in each year, in order that it may be submitted to the Governor in Council by the Secretary of State.
11. All former Orders in Council in reference hereto are cancelled.

## Pamphlets and Books.

Order in. Council, December 22, 1888. -The Secretary of State desires to draw the attention of Council to the practice in the past of the granting of authority by Council for the purchase of hooks for Library exchanges and for distribution among the departments, and he recommends that in the future no such authority be granted, but that all books for Library exchanges be procured under the authority of the Joint Library Committee of Parliament, and paid for out of the sums placed at its disposal ; and that all purchases of books for the use of any department of the government be made on the authority of the Minister charged with its administration, as already provided by Order in Council, through a regular Stationery Office requisition, as required by the Act respecting Public Printing and Stationery. The Committee recommend that this Minute, if approved, be communicated to the ${ }^{\text {ribrary Committee and to each department of the public service. }}$

## Newspapers and Books.

Order in Council, June 18, 1894.-Cancellation of all forme. Orders in Council in reference to supply of newspapers, books and magazines to departments.

Order in Council, June 18, 1894.-Regulations respecting the purchase of newspapers, books and magazines, to the several departments :-
(1.) That a maximum limit of $\$ 500$ be set apart for each ministerial department, within which is to be defrayed the cost of newspapers, books and magazines for the use of such department.
(2.) That books and magazines, other than those which are of a technical character and necessary for the proper working of the department, shall be purchased only on authority of the head of the departinent.
(3.) That no newspapers be supplied to outside offices of any department except on the authority of the Minister of that department.

## Accounts for Advertising.

Order in Council, May 8, 1894.-On a menorandum dated March 28, 1894, from the Secretary of State, recommending that the following regulations be established to regulate and govern advertising for the several departments of the Government.

## regulations.

All orders for advertising which are issued at the seat of Government shall be given through the Queen's Printer, and the Queen's Printer shall certify to the accounts before payment.

The copy shall be sent to the Queen's Printer, accompanied by ministerial directions, naming the papers in which the advertisement is to be published, specifying whether in the daily or weekly issue, and the number of insertions in each paper, respectively.

On receipt of these instructions, the Queen's Printer shall print a sufficient number of copies to enable him to furnish duplicates to the papers indicated. These shall be forwarded by him to the publishers: accompanied by an intimation of the number of lines to which the advertisement is to be limited, himself establishing the space on a proper estimate of the solid matter of the notice, with a moderate allowance for the purposes of display, and accompanied also by an instruction to the pablishers to render the accounts to hini in duplicate, with a copy of the order attached, and with marked copies of the papers in which the advertisements are printed.

The Queen's Printer shall ascertain the established tariffs for advertising of the papers on the Patronage List, and on receipt of these accounts shall certify to the same in accordance with these rates, and transmit the accounts for payment to the departments from which the orders issued, having first satisfied himself that the publication has been as directed, but no newspaper shall be paid a. higher rate than that charged to the general public for a similar service.

Accounts for advertising required by the Outside Service shall also be rendered, with the orders and marked copies of the publications, to the Queen's Printer, and the advertisements shall by him be measured, certified to, and transmitted for payment in accordance with the rules which obtain for advertisements issued at the seat of Government.

The Queen's Printer shall keep with each paper, accounts of the advertisements directed to be published in it under the different departmental headings, so as at all times to show the state of each account.

Advertisements shall not be inserted in any books or pamphlets, or in any periodieals other than newspapers published weekly or more frequently, and all advertisements shall be limited to a maximum of six insertions in daily and three in weekly papers.

These regulations shall apply to all the departments excepting the Immigration Branch of the Department of the Interior, and the Intercolonial Railway.

The Committee submit the above regulations and recommeudations for Your Excellency's approval.

## Advertising in Canada Gazette.

Order in Council, March 22, 1885. - On a report dated March 21, 1888, from the Secretary of State, submitting that the Act respecting the Department of Public Printing and Stationery prescribes that all charges for advertising in the Canada Gazette shall be paid in advance, and that the Queen's Printer reports that in some cases, after such payment, the parties ardvertising discontinue their notices before all the insertions asked for have been given, and apply for a refund of moneys paid for insertions ordered but not given.

The Minister recommends that the Queen's Printer be instructed that no such return of moneys can be made, as the Government is ready at all times to fulfil the contract entered into with the advertisers in the Gazette, and is in no wise responsible for their discontinnance. The Committee submit the above for Your Excellency's approval.

## Legal Services.

Order in Council, April 12,18i9.-On a report dated April 2, 1879, from the Honourable Minister of Justice, stating that it has been represented by the Auditor General that it would facilitate the business of his office were an Order in Council passed making it necessary that the accounts rendered by any legal agent employed professionally by any of the departments of the Government should be submitted to the Department of Justice for examination and approval before payment.

That at present the practice of the departments appears to be to submit such accounts to the Department of Justice before paying the same, but no formal Order in Council exists on the subject.

That an Order in Council does exist providing that all accounts for printing and advertising are to be certified by the Qneen's Printer before payment.

That he, the Minister, thinks that it would be proper that a formal Order should be passed with respect to legal agents. He recommends, therefore, that it be ordered that the accounts rendered by legal gentlemen employed professionally by any of the departments of the Government be submitted to the Department of Justice for examination and approval before payment, and that a copy of the order be transmitted to each of the departments of the Government.

## Removal Expenses.

Order in Council, Sept. 8, 1871. -The Committee of Council have had under consideration an ex tract from the Minutes of a meeting of the Treasury Board held Sept. 7, recommending that the following rules be adopted for the payment of removal allowances to Government employees, and they respectfully advise that the recommendations therein submitted be approved and adopted;-
"Removal Allowances. - No removal allowances can be granted except on report of the Treasury Board. No romoval allowance is to be granted if the salary is increaserl, except in special cases, and on a report of the head of the department. A removal allowance is not to exceed the actual cost on account rendered."

# Travelling Expenses-No allowance while on Steamers. 

(Order in Council, November 10, 1886.)

Treasury Board,-The Board having had their attention called by the Auditor General to the subject of the payment of expenses incurred by the officers in the employ of the Governnient while travelling on Government business, and also advances made to such officerson account of such expenses, after full consideration of the subject, recommend to Conncil as follows:-

1. The per diein allowance for inaintenance shill not hereafter be paid io such officers for days spent on board steamers or steamships, or other modes of conveyance, if the passage money includes meals and all other accommodation.
2. All advances made to such officers for travelling expenses shall be accounted for within one month from the conclusion of the trip, and the officer shall render to the Auditor General a detailed statement of such travelling expenses.

## Travelling Expenses-General Regulations.

"The whole of the expenditure was incurred on Government business."

## Triplicate Deposit Receipts for Balances of Travelling Expenses Advances to go to Accountant of Contingencies.

That the triplicate receipts for all refunds of balances of amounts advanced from Civil Government Contingencies for travelling expenses and for petty cash, and for all other refunds made on azcount of Civil Goverument Contingencies, be forwarded by the department or officer making such refunds to the Accountant of Contingeucies for the purpose of closing the personal accounts and replacing to the credit of the different clepartments the amounts so refunded, to enable him to keep a proper check upon the various appropriations.

## Special'Qualifications.

## Treasury Board, Ottawa, Nov. 13, 1883.

Sir,-I have been directed by the Honourable the Treasury Board to call your attention to the 5 th subsection of section 7 of 46 Victoria, chapter 7 (C. S. Act), wherein it is stated that " in the case of attorneys, harristers, engincers, architects, actuaries and land surveyors, the examination may be dispensed with on a report from the deputy head, concurred in by the head of the department, that it is not necessary" ; and in connection therewith to call your attention to the Hansard of last session, page 1035, when in reply to an observation from Mr. Ross, of Middlesex, Sir Hector Langevin stated that these gentlemen are employed in the service in the practice of their profession, and therefore an examination would not be required, as they had already passed technical examinations before their admission into the ranks of their profession.

I have now to ask whether, in case any of these professional gentlemen are employed in a department where their professional attainments are not reguired as, for instance, a barrister in the Finance Department, the spirit of the Act would allow of the examination being waved?

I am of opinion that the spirit of the Act does not allow of the examination being dispensed with in the case mentioned, but that the examination can be dispensed with only in cases where the duties to be performed by the officer seeking promotion are those connected with his profession as an attorney, barrister, engineer, architect, actuary or land surveyor.

## Appointments subject to changes in Superannuation Laws.

Order in Council, 18th November, 1896. -That all appointments made after 23rd June, 1896, or to be hereafter made, shall be subject to the understanding and conditions that the persons so appointed accept office subject to any changes which may be made in the Superannuation Laws of Canada; and that such appointees be notified of such understanding, and that a copy of this Minute, if approved, be forwarded to the deputy head of each department, and that each deputy head be requested to forward a copy thereof to each person to whom it may apply,

## Civil Service Promotions.

Order in Council, April 12, 1893.-His Excellency, in virtue of the provisions of section 39 of "The Civil Service Act," as amended, and by and wilh the advice of the Queen's Privy Council for Canada, is pleased to make the following regulation :-

Hereafter no clerk on the staff of any department of the Public Service, who was in the service or employment of the Government on the 1st day of July, 1882, and has since been continuously engaged therein, shall, as a condition of promotion, be required to pass an examination in any other subject than the duties of the office to which he seeks promotion, unless in any special case the Deputy Minister by a report concurred in by the head of the lepartment submits to the Board of Examiners other subjects of examination as a test of fitness for such office.

## Salaries : Date of Payment.

Order in Council, January 13, 1887.-The Committee of the Privy Council have had a memorial from the members of the Civil Service laid before them by the Right Honourable the Prime Minister, praying for relief of their financial embarrassment in reclaiming the advance of salary.

The Committee recommend, with a view to relieving the financial embarrassment, that the paylist for each month be authorized on the 15th day of the month, provided that when the day for passing any pay-list under the provisions hereof shall be a Sunday, or a bank or departmental holiday, the pay-list be issued on the previous day. The salaries of the Ministers to be paid at the end of each month.

Order in Council, March 5, 188s.-The Treasury Board have had their attention called to the fact that the terms of the Order in Council of January 13, 1887, governing the issue of the Civil Service monthly pay-cheques have not been stristly adhered to, and that cheques are sometimes issued in advance of the days authorized by the said Order for the issue of the pay-lists. The Board recommend to Council that the several departments be notified that in future the monthly paycheques must not be issued in advance of the days authorizell by the said Order for the issue of the pay-lists, and that the provisions of the said Order must be strictly adhered to.

The Board recommend that the attention of the several departments be called to the irregularity of such action, and the Board are of opinion and recommend that steps should be immediately taken to stop the practice for the future.

## Extra Salary.

Civil Service Act, 1888, 51 Vict., cap. 12, sec. 12.-Subsections 1 and 2 of section 51 of the Civil Service Act (R.S.C., cap. 17) are hereby repealed, and the following substituted therefor :-" 51. No extra salary or additional remuneration of any kind whatsoever shall be paid to any deputy head, officer or employee in the Civil Service of Canada, or to any other person permanently employed in the public service."

# Public Service: Hours of Attendance, Extra Salary. 

Audit Office, Ottawa, August 11, 1899.

Sir,-The Department of Justice has recently made application to me for payments to members of its staff for extra services rendered in the preparation of returns ordered by Parliament, on the ground that such payments were permissible, because in accordance with the judgment of the Supreme Court of Canada in the case of The Queen $v s$. Bradley. The account rendered was certified by the Deputy Minister that the work was performed outside of regular office hours and was not in the line of the Clerk's ordinary duties. Two of these accounts I have passed; but, as the practice is sure to grow fast and as it therefore appears to me it would be in the interest of the Public Service that a uniform system in this regard should be established by the Governor in Council, I have refused to pass in the meantine an application of this character sent to me within the past few days.

It is manifest that, if in certain Departments all the work which requires to be done after office hours is paid for, in addition to the regular salary of the clerk who performs the work, while in the other Departments the service which is done after the usual office hours brings no additional remuneration, the pernanent heads of the latter Departments will le much more unpopular with their assistants than the deputies in the other Departments with theirs.

You will ohserve that there is in force an Order in Council of July 27, 1882, which provides that any member of a Departmental staff may be required by the Head of the Department to attend liis office at any time his services may be deemed necessary. In view of this provision, it seems to me clear that the Governor in Council intended it to be understood that the officials of the Department were to keep up the work of the Department after the usual office hours when it could not be done during those hours, no matter whether the work could be strictly called the usual work of the Department or not.

In the cases that have arisen so far, the work done, as I have said, has been in connection with the preparation of returns ordered by Parliament; and it seems to me the question should be decided by the Treasury Board or by Council whether or not the preparation of those returns or other similar work falls within ordinary duties in a Department, when done by those who are receiving regular pay as either permanent or extra clerks.

I shall be oblige: if you will bring the matter to the notice of the Treasury Board with the view of having some definite and uniform basis established in regard to a practice which I fear, if not regulated, may grow to undesirable proportions, and may cause much dissatisfaction.

Order in Council, 19th August, 1899. -That the provisions of the 9th section of the Order in Council of 27th July, 1882, which provides amongst other things: "That at any time, if the public "service requires it, the Heads of Departments or Deputy Heads to have the right to call for the " attendanze of all or any of the officers or clerks at an earlier or later hour than those named," be confirmed.

That no extra salary or additional remuneration of any kind whatsoever, be paid to any Deputy Head, officer or employee permanently employed in the Civil Service of Canada, unless an amount to provide for the payment has first been specially voted by Parliament.

## Salaries: Date of Changes and Increases.

Order in Council, July 29, 1871.-On a report dated July 29, 1871, from the Minister of Finance, stating that considerable inconvenience has arisen from Orders in Council making promotions and other changes in the Civil Service, and granting superannuation allowances, not naming the time from which they shall count, and that it is desirable that, excepting for special reasons, such changes shall always count from the first day of some month and recommending that it be established as a general rule that unless some other date is specially named in the Order in Council, all such changes shall be held to count from the first day of the month next succeeding the date of the said Order. The Committee sulbmit the above recommendation for Your Excellency's approval.

Srr,-In connection with the papers and other memoranda relating to appointments, promotions, increases of salary and other matters affecting the Establishment, referred for the considera. tion of the Treasury Board, I am directed to say that the Board are desirous in all cases of having before them the fullest information bearing on the action recommended, and to ask that particular attention be given to make the papers as complete as possible, especially in regard to the following requirements :-

In consequence of the Civil Service Superannuation Amendment Act, 1893, and Civil Service Insurance Act, 1893, being now in force, it is absolutely necessary that in the case of appointinents, in addition to the full reasons for the action recommended, the age of the appointee be given and a medical certificate submitted as to his state of health. In the case of memoranda recommending the employment of temporary clerks, the certificates required by the Civil Service Act must in all cases accompany the papers, and, in addition, the state of the appropriation from which payment for the extra assistance is to be made must be set forth.
lt is also directed that the certificates, reports and requisitions required under the Civil Service Act (vide sections $15,17,19,21,26,35,37,39$ and 47 ) be furnished with the respective cases to whicl they relate.

I have further, by direction of the Treasury Board, to state that in: all cases where employees of 60 years of age and over are recommended for retirement under the Civil Service Superannuation Act, it will be necessary to give full and explicit reasons, in addition to that of age, for the action recommended, as members of the Board cannot undertake to recommend the superannuation of civil servants for the reason of age only.

In directing your attention to these requirements of the Board, I have to ask that in all cases the papers for their consideration be submitted in as complete a state as possible, and to inform you that in no case will is memorandum be taken into consideration if the papers are not complete.

## Employment of Temporary Clerks.

Section substituted by 58-59 Victoria, Chapter 15, for section 47 of the Civil Service Act (R.S.C., Chap. 17):-When from a temporary pressure of work or from any other cause, extra assistance is required in any branch of either the first or second division, the Governor in Conncil may, on the report of the deputy head of the department, concurred in by the head of the department, that such extra assistance is required, authorize the employment of such number of temporary clerks, writers, messengers, porters, packers or sorters, as are required to carly on the work of the department.

## Temporary Employees : Certificate of Attendance.

Treasury Board Minute, Dec. 27, 1898. -The Board direct that the following certificate be substituted for the certificate required by their Minute of the 2nd October, 1891, to be given in all requisitions to the Accountant of Contingencies for the payment for the services of extra clerks and messengers in the several departments, and that the Minute of the 2nd October, 1891, be amended to this extent :
"I eertify that during the current month the extra employees mentioned have satisfactorily performed the services for which they were appointed under Order in Council of ..................... .......................and that they have been in attendance at this office every day except Sundays, statutory holidays and leave of absence under Order in Council of 20th October, 1892, as specified, during the period for which payment is asked."

It being understood that nothing herein contained shall be construed to authorize payment for Sundays and statutory holidays in cases in which payments for such lays have not been made hitherto.

## Leave of Absence to Temporary Employees.

Order in Council, October 20, 1892.-On a report dated 19th October, 1892, from the Acting President of the Privy Council, stating that he has had under consideration the smbject of applications for leave of absence, and for sick leave made from time to time by technical officers, clerks and messengers who are not permanently appointed to the Civil Service, but who are engaged in the inside service in the departments at Ottawa, and recommending the adoption of the following rules :-
(1.) That the head of the department, and, in his absence, the deputy head of the department, may grant to any professional or technical officers and supernumerary or temporary clerks who may be employed under section 47 of the Civil Service Act, and who have been so employed during twelve months continuously, leave of absence for the purpose of recreation, for a period not exceeding three weeks in each year ; such leave to be granted at such time during the year as the head or deputy head of the department may determine.
(2.) That employees whose employment is for one month or upwards, may, in the discretion of the head of the department be paid for days when they are absent in consequence of actual illness, after leave of absence obtained, on certificates furnished to the satisfaction of the head of the departnent; or for days during which absence has been occasioned by contagious or infectious diseases in the families of the persons so engaged; such absence not exceeding one week at any one time and not exceeding two weeks during any year.

This regulation to be retroactive as to cases which have occurred since the lst of September, 1891, and its future operation to be confined to supernumerary and temporary clerks who are employed under section 47 of the Civil Service Act, and to persons temporarily employed as messengers and to professional or technical officers.

The Committee submit the same for your Excellency's approval.

Order in Council, Dec. 30, 1898. -That the Order in Council of 20th October, 1892, granting leave of absence for purposes of recreation to temporary employees, be so amended as to extend the full provisions thereof to messengers and packers temporarily employed, to apply not only in future cases, but to cover all cases in the past, in which leave of absence has been granted to such temporary messengers and packers.

## Medical Certificates.

Order in Council, July 23, 1892.-On a memorandum dated 14th July, 1892, from the Secretary of State, recommending that the Order in Council of the 25 th April, 1892, appointing certain gentlemen to be medical practitioners, under the third subsection of section 51 of "The Civil Service Act" in so far as regards furnishing medical certificates in cases of illness of officers and servants of the Department of Marine and Fisheries, be cancelled.

The Minister further recommends that every duly qualified medical practitioner whose name is registered in the Medical Register of the province in which he resides be appointed as an anthorized medical practitioner for the purpose of issuing medical certificates as required by subsection 3 of section 51 of the Civil Service Act.

The Committee submit the foregoing recommendations for Your Excellency's approval, and order that a copy be sent to each department:

## Rate of Pay for Copying.

Order in Council, April 1, 1886. -That the rate to be paid for all copying done for the several departments of the Government and in preparation of returns for the Senate and the House of Commons, he fixed at five cents (5c.) per folio of 100 words, to commence on the lst April instant.

## Rate of Pay to Reporters.

Order in Council, October 9, 1888. -On a memorandum dated 1st October, 1888, from the Minister of Justice, recommending that authority be given for the payment of the Official Reporters of the Debates of the House of Commons, and of other Reporters, who may be designated, as occasion may require, by the Minister of Justice, to be employed to report Exchequer Conrt cases, or proceedings under Commissions of Inquiry, or upon arbitrations in which the Government is interested, or upon any other matter requiring a short-hand reporter, at the rate of fifteen cents per folio of one hundred words, the reporter, for such remuneration to supply to the Government four copies of the proceedings and evidence in each case.

The Minister further recomniends that the sum of $\$ 3.50$ per diem over and above the actual moving expenses be allowed to such reporters on account of travelling expenses while so employed and when absent from their places of residence, the days of leaving and arriving to be counted as full days. Also, that the provisions of this Order shall relate back to the time from which the scrvices of such reporters were first engaged in the capacity mentioned, viz., from November 1st, 188\%.

The Committee advise that the requisite authority be granted.

Order in Council, July 3, 1890. - That the rate to be paid to Unofficial Reporters for reporting during the Sitting of Parliament, when the official staff is not available, be 25 cents per folio of 100 words, the Reporter, for such remuncration, to supply the Governnient with four copies of the proceedings in each case.

That the sum of $\$ 3$ per diem, in addition to actual moving expenses, be allowed to such reporters on account of travelling expenses while so employed and when absent from their place of residence, the days of learing and arriving to be counted as full days.

That the amount hereby fixed for remuneration shall apply to the accounts for reporting done by such reporters during the last Session of Parliament.

That in all cases when a reporter (not official) is duly in attendance for reporting for a day, and does not, or is not required to report to such an extent as to make the actual amount of his remuneration reach the amount of $\$ 5$ per day, he shall be entitled to receive $\$ 5$ a day for each day he has been required to attend and has been properly in attendance ready to work.

That it be declared that whenever hereafter any reporter, whether official or otherwise, applies for and performs reporter's work during the Recess of Parliament, he shall be considered as having been employed under, and shall be paid according to, the rates fixed by the Order in Council above referred to, of October 9, 1888.

(31.) In counting the length of service by which a superannuation allowance is to be regulated, if the man has served a fraction of a year less than half, his service shall count as for the number of years withont the fraction, and if the fraction is more than half, it shall count as for the number of years next above.
(32.) In counting the salary on which the superannuation allowance is to be calculated, it .shall be taken at one-third of the whole amount received by the officer for the 36 months preceding the Order in Council superannuating him.
(33.) When any officer is permanently employed at a nominally per diem salary, it shall for the future be included in the pay-lists at an equivalent per annum salary.
(34.) When any officer has an official residence or other similar perquisite, his salary shall be stated at such higher sum as may fairly represent these advantages, and he shall pay the abatements on such higher salary, otherwise his superannuation allowance shall count only on the salary on which he has paid abatements.
(35.) The superannuation allowances shall be paid monthly in the manner proposed in the memorandum on that subject submitted by the Auditor.
(36.) An Establishment Book shall be kept in the Finance Department, in which shall be entered every person in the service on the 1st July, 1870, or hercafter to be appointed, who, by foregoing rules, comes within the provisions of the Act, showing the date of his birth and the date of his appointment, together with any other facts upon which his length of service will be counted.
(37.) When any greater length of service is claimed by men now in the service than that from the date of the man's appoiutment to his present office, it shall be the duty of the Auditor to prepare a classified statement of all such claims which, together with a report thereon from the Civil Service Board, shall be submitted to the Privy Council, to the intent that rules may be laid down by it for counting such service.
(38.) When any person is hereafter appointed in later life for any special qualifications, the additional number of years which may be added to his actual length of service shall be stated in the Order in Council appointing him, and such additional years shall be recorded in the Establishment Book, and in order that the same thing may be done with regard to men now in the service, the Secretary of the Treasury Board shall collect from each deputy head, and the clerks of the Senate and House of Commons a statement of all the men now serving under them to whom they are of the opinion that additional service should be allowed under the Act for special qualifications in their appointment. Such statement shall be submitted to the Treasury Board, and reported upon by it, so that an Order in Council may direct such additional years to be recorded in the Establishment Book.
(39.) The Auditor shall prepare a statement to be submitted to Council on 1st Jannary next of all persons on the Establishment of 60 years of age and upwards, and a similar statement shall hereafter be submitted at the commencement of each financial year.
(40.) No person exceeding 65 years shall be retained on the Establishment except upon an Order in Council passed upon the receipt of the statement above provided for, retaining him on the staff for another year.


#### Abstract

Order in Council, May 3, 1886. - That the 34th paragraph of the Treasury Minute of the 11th November, 1870, which paragraph is as follows:-"(34.) When any officer has an official residence or other similar perquisite, his salary shall be stated at such higher sum as may fairly represent these advantages, and he shall pay the abatements on such higher salary, otherwise his superannuation allowance shall only count on the salary on which he has paid abatements ";-be repealed, except in the case of those who now pay superannuation abatement on such allowance or perquisite in addition to the abatement from their salaries.

Sir,-I have the honour to acknowledge your letter of the 7th, asking whether, under any circunstances, superannuation once established by Council may be reopened-always presuming that no clerical error has been made.

The Superannuation Act provides that under the circumstances mentioned therein, the Governor in Council may grant to a person who has served in an established capacity in the Civil Service a superannuation allowance, and that the Order in Council made in the case shall be laid before Parliament. If the grant was made by Letters Patent, the latter could not be cancelled ly authority of an Order in Council, except they had been issued in the name of the wrong party, or contained a clerical error or misnomer, or wrong description of a material fact. (See 38 Vic., cap. 13.) As the grant in the case of a member of the Civil Service is made by an Order in Council, I an of opinion that in practice it wonld be well to adhere to the same rule, and not to cancel or amend the Order in Council, except in cases mentioned in the Act referred to ( 38 Vic., cap. 13.)

Order in Council, October 9, 1895. -That in future all cases in which application is made for the superannuation of any Government employee, there shall be given with the application, for the information of the Treasury Board, the reason or reasons for such superannuation, whether on account of age, or ill-health, or abulition of office, or to promote efficiency and economy-also the age, length of service, present salary, average salary during the past three years, and the proposed retiring allowance of the officer recommended for superannuation Also, whether in any case it is intended to fill the racancy caused by such superannuation by appointment or promotion, and if so, at what remuneration; and generally such information as will enable the Board to determine whether the superannuation asked for should be granted.

The Board further recommend that if the above meets with the approval of Council, a copy of the Order in Council founded thereon be furnished the several departments for their guidance.

## Gratuities.

Order in Council, Feb. 1, 1868. -As frequent instances occur of the death of officers in the service of the Government, leaving their families in circumstances of great and immediate want, and destitute of means to defray the expenses of illness and funeral, the Committee respectfully advise that in all cases of the decease of an officer of the Government on the permanent list, a gratuity equal to his salary be paid to his widow or orphan children, or to such members of his family or household as His Excellency may approve, for two months from the date of his decease.

Order in Council, Dec. 26, 188\%. -The Board having had under consideration the matter of the payment of gratuities to the widows or other representatives of officials of the Government not on the permanent list, are of opinion, and recommend to Council, that the terms of the Order in Council of February 1, 1868, be adhered to.

The Board are further of opinion that should Council, in special cases deem it necessary that the provisions of the above-mentioned Order in Conncil be extended to include payment of gratuities to the widows or other representatives of officials not on the permanent list, the consent of E'arliament should be asked for the payment thereof.

## Insurance of Government property.

Order in Council, July 5, 1881. -The Committee of the Privy Council have had under consider ation, upon the suggestion of the Acting Minister of the Interior, the general question of insurance against fire of Government property ; and they are of opinion, and humbly advise Your Excellency that, in view of the large amount, varied character and widely separated position of the property in the Dominion belonging to the Crown, it is a wise economy for the Governinent to underwrite its own risks, as well on movable as on immovable property, and they recommend that all existing policies (if any such exist) be suffered to lapse and no new ones effected, and that a copy of this Order, should Your Excellency approve of it, le sent to every department of the Government.

## Security of Public Officers.

## (Order in Council, August, 1869.)

On the recommendation of the Honourable the Minister of Finance, the Committee advise that the annexed memorandum from the Board of Audit containing certain rules defining the circumstances under which security is to be required from public officers be approved and adopted.

The Board of Audit has had under considerution the Act respecting the securities of public officers and the Order in Council founded thereon. Although the manner in which security is to be given is therein laid down, there does not appear to be a sufficient definition of the circumstances under which security is to be required. After conference therefore with the other deputy heads who have not seats on the Board of Audit, the Board submit for the consideration of the Government the following resolutions:-

1. Every person collecting or receiving revenues in cash to be paid by him over to the Receiver General must give security.
2. Every paymaster whose business it is to distribute money handed over to him must give security.
3. Every person to whom letters of credit are given, or to whom warrants issue, whether accountable warrants in round sums to meet general expenditure or warrants to enable him to pay sums ascertained to be due, and who pays such sums by his own official cheque against an official account at the bank, shall give security.
4. When a department receives an accountable warrant for general expenditure or warrants to meet sums ascertained to be due, and such warrants are placed to the credit of the department in an official account, the cheques must be signed by the head or deputy head, and at least one other person
in the department who has been designated for that purpose as being cognizant of the transaction and of its being duly received, and in such case it is not necessary that either should give security.
5. The paylists are paid by the bank upon the cheque of the deputy head in the department and of the collector at the ports and inland revenue stations. If the deputy head or collector gives his cheque in favour of the individual or order, he will not be required to give security, but if the whole money is drawn on one cheque to be distributed, the person charged with the distribution should give security.
6. It sometimes happens that in order to save the issue of many warrants or official cheques, money is paid to a department to distribute, although such a transaction may not fall within the ordinary duties of that department. In such cases unless the cheques are signed by another person in the department besides the deputy head, security ought to be given.
7. When for any reason money is casually placed in the hands of any person in a matter not belonging to the regulr duties of his office, he cannot be called upon to give security, and it would be better in all such cases to place the money in the hands of two persons who should both sign the cheques.
8. Where a warrant issues in favour of any person and it is paid to him by a cheque in favour of any other person, he will not give security.
9. Where a warrant or letter of credit issues in favour of a Minister of the Crown to enable him to make certain payments, no security is required, but it would be better, except in special cases, that such credits or warrants should issue in favour of the department as in rule (4), in which case a second signature would be required.

It may be advisable to give some instances of cases which would fall under the above rules to render their operations more intelligible.
(1.) Collectors of customs and excise, the cashier of the Post Office Departinent, the collector of hydraulic rents for the Public Works, the collector of patent fees, Department of Agriculture.
(2.) The paymasters of the Public Works and Militia Departments and the International Railway Commission.
(3.) The accountant of contingencies, the wardens of penitentiaries, and all otner persons receiving accountable warrants for petty expenses.
(4.) All the expending departments would come under this rule, but there should be a distinct order in each department, who should sign the cheques. The payment of interest and other services on general or open warrants, where the cheques are signed by both the Deputy Receiver and Deputy Inspector General would come under this rule, and the paymasters in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.
(5.) All persons authorized to sign paylist cheques.
(6.) It often has occurred when the actual payee is not accessible that warrants have issued to the Receiver General to enable him to pay. Many of such cases will be met by the new arrangement of giving the cheque not in favour of the Receiver General, but of the individual. Such cases may, however, occur again, and would fall under this and the next rule. So also a sum may be paid to the Commissioner of Inland Revenue to distribute for small refunds of duty. Such sums ought to be placed to an official account as in any other expending department, although it may not be the ordinary business of the department, and the cheques should be countersigned.
(7.) Thus a certain sum was placed at the credit of the Secretary of the Treasury Board, to be expended as directed. Such a transaction tormed no part of the duties of his office, and if such a thing is done again, a second person should be named to countersign the cheques.

## Franking Privilege at Ottawa.

Order in Council, February 25, 1892. - By an Order in Council, dated February 25, 1892, the fellowing regulations governing the franking privilege were approved :-

## REGULATIONS.

1. In each department there may be used one franking stainp, such stamp being a facsimile of the usual signature of the deputy head, and to be kept in the custody of some officer or confidential clerk specially intrusced by the deputy head with that duty, and to be affixed by him upon official correspondence only.
2. When envelopes with a printed official address thereon are used, the name of the deputy hearl may be printed on such envelopes.
3. In addition to the printed stamp or printed signature as above provided, the head of the rlepartinent and the private secretary of the head of the department in the name of his Minister, and the deputy head may frank by a written signature or initials; but no other method of franking except as above enumerated will be permitted.
4. No blank or unaddressed envelope shall in any case be franked.
5. The deputy head of each department shall furnish the Postmaster General with an impression of the facsimile stamp which it is proposed to use in his department.
6. The General Officer commanding the Militia of Canada, the Adjutant General of Militia, the Auditor General and the Superintendent of Insurance shall, for the purposes of these rules, be respectively considered as deputy heads of departments.
7. All the official correspondence of the several departments, except that of the heads of departments, the deputy heads and the private secretaries of Ministers, shall be transmitted in envelopes having printed or written thereon the words "On Her Majesty's Service "; and no envelope bearing the superscription shall be used for any private correspondence.
8. From and after the 15 th day of March, 1892, no private correspondence whatsoever shall be transmitted from any department of the Government at Ottawa or elsewhere, or any branch thereof, under frank, nor shall the postage due thereon be charged against the Government.
9. All private correspondence addressed to any member of the Civil Service at Ottawa, or to the care of any civil servant, shall be liable to the same rates of postage as apply to the public generally.
10. Should any letter addressed to any civil servant at Ottawa upon which postage has been paid on delivery prove when open to be on public business, the amount so paid may be refunded on the certificate of the depnty head of the department to which the addressee belongs.
11. Any employee offending against any of these regulations shall be liable to suspension or such other punishment as the Governor General in Council may determine.

## Tariff of Fees on Commissions.

Order in Council, September 7, 1893.-The Committee of the Privy Council have the honour to recommend to Your Excellency the adoption of the annexed report of the Secretary of State, with reference to the tariff of fees upon commissions to public officers:-

That the following tariff of fees chargeable upon cominissions to public officers be confirmed :-

1. Upon commissions to Lieutenant-Governors, Ministers of the Crown, judges of all courts, junior judges, deputy ministers and Queen's counsel, a fee of $\$ 20$.
2. Upon commissions issued to officers or others receiving salaries of $\$ 1,000$ or over, a fee of $\$ 15$.
3. Upon commissions issued to officers or others receiving salaries from $\$ 400$ to $\$ 1,000$, a fee of $\$ 8$.
4. Upon commissions issued to officers or others receiving salaries from $\$ 100$ to $\$ 400$, a fee of $\$ 5$.
5. Upon commissions issued to officers or others receiving salaries of $\$ 100$, or to officers or persons appointed to office, who are paid by fees of office, a fee of $\$ 4$.

He would also submit that in the case of the Solicitor General of Canada, the Controller of Inland Revenue and the Controller of Customs, and of all officers in the service of the Crown who may receive a salary of $\$ 3,000$ or upwards, the fee chargeable on commissions issued to them be fixed at $\$ 20$.

The above to apply to commissions issued under the Great or Privy Seal.
He would further recommend that no commission or document be delivered out of the Department of the Secretary of State until the fee, if any, has been paid.

## Commissions of Inquiry-Rate of Pay.

Order in Council, September 21, 1897. -On a report dated 6th September, 1897, from the Minister of Justice, stating that he has had under consideration the question as to the rate of remuneration which should be allowed commissioners appointed to hold inquiries or investigations into public matters or departmental business, under chapters 114 and 115 of the Revised Statutes of Canada.

The Minister recommends that the fees allowable to a commissioner appointed under the anthority of either of those chapters shall not in any case exceed ten dollars for each full day's attendance or occupation in connection with the work of the commission, exclusive of the reasonable moving and living expenses of the commissioner to be allowed where the commissioner has to travel for the purpose of executing the commission; and that the said per diem allowance shall be deemed to cover letters and interviews on other days as well as on the days for which the commissioner is entitled to such per diem allowance ; and that no further charge be allowed for such letters and interviews; and that a professional man shall not be entitled to any fees or allowances as commissioner to which other commissioners are not entitled as aforesaid.

The Minister also recommends that a copy of this Minute, if approved, be sent to every commissionner hereafter appointed with his commission, or the notification of his appointment, and that such commissionner be at the same time informed that the provisions of the Order in Council will be strictly followed in ascevtaining the amount to which he may be entitled for his services as commissioner.

The Committee advise the adoption of the above, and submit the same for Your Excellency's approval.

## Maximum number of Reports to be ordered by each Department for Free Distribution.

Order in Council, January 19, 1893. - On a report dated January 16, 1893, from the Minister of Finance, stating that by Order in Council, dated May 26, 1886, authority was given for placing on sale by the Queen's Printer, copies of public documents, other than those distributed officially to the Houses of Parliament and the departments, that in accordance with this order a circular was sent to the various departments requesting them to order only such copies as they absolutely needed for official purposes, and due arrangements were made by the Queen's Printer for advertising and supplying copies to the public.

The Minister finds that the number required for parliamentary inside and outside distribution is, as to most of the departmental reports, 1,800 copies of each, and as to five of the most important, 2,050 each. The numbers ordered by the different departments for their own distribution vary from 315 to 10,000 .

The Minister is of opinion that it is desirable to secure greater uniformity and economy in the orders from the various departments, and that the number ordered by each should be based on the call for necessary distribution.

The Minister therefore recommends that each department be authorized to order within its discretion for its own distribution, copies of its reports not to exceed a naximum of 500 copies of each report, and that the Queen's Printer be authorized to reserve for purposes of sale such number of the departmental reports and to arrange for their sale in such manner as may be deemed advisable by the Secretary of State.

The Committee submit the same for Your Excellency's approval.

That authority be given for the printing of 2,400 copies in English, 750 copies in French, to meet the demands for distribution.

## Executive Regulations Governing Revenue Audit.

Sir,-With reference to our recent conversation respecting the submission to the Treasury Board of the rules and regulations drawn up in your office, I have now to state that I have found, on inquiry, that your letter of the 31st December, 1886, was submitted to the Treasury Board in due course, but as it did not ask for confirmation of the rules inclosed, but only stated what your intentions were in auditing revenue accounts, and requesting any directions that the Treasury Board might deem fit to give-as the Treasury Board had no directions to give,'the letter was unanswered; but, in order that the law may be complied with, I have now to state that the rules are approved of.

Rules and Regulations in reference to the Receipt, Entry and Accounting for Public Moneys.
(1.) Receipts with printed consecutive numbers should be used.
(2.) A receipt should be given for each payment.
(3.) All receipts should be entered in a cash book, and each entry should bear the same number as the receipt.
(4.) The counterfoil of the receipt should bear its number, the name of the payer, the amount, and a short memo. of the object for which payment was made ; and it should be signed by the collector, and when payment is made in person, by the payer.
(5.) A deposit should be made to the credit of the Receiver General daily, if the receipts amount to $\$ 25$. If the daily receipts do not amount to $\$ 25$, a deposit should be made whenever that sum or more is on hand.
(6.) As soon as possible after the close of each month, and not later than the 10 th of the succeeding month, a copy of the cash book should be transmitted to the Audit Office, with the corresponding counterfoils of receipts granted, and also the blank when a receipt has been spoiled or cancelled.

Treasury Minute, May 23, 1890. -The Board had under consideration a communication from the Auditor General, submitting certain regulations and forms of returns drawn up in accordance with the general regulations applicable to certain classes of revenue coming under the control of the Department of Marine, which regulations and forms were submitted to exemplify the carrying out of the general regulations.

After careful consideration, the Board approve of the general regulations for the outside service for the audit of the revenue accounts, as follows :-

## Revenue Audit-General Regulations for the Outside Service.

1st. Where possible, every officer or agent employed in the collection of public moneys shall make a daily deposit, if the receipts amount to $\$ 25$; otherwise, whenever that sum is on hand ; and he shall furnish regularly to the proper department, a return of his collections.

2nd. This return shall be made monthly, or at less frequent intervals, to be fixed by the department when desirable.

3rd. It shall be a copy in detail of the collector's cash book, showing the different deposits made in acquittance ; and shall be certified by him and railed to the proper department within five days after the close of the period which it covers, and be accompanied by the corresponding vouchers or papers.

4th. It shall be fully examined and audited in the department and certified by the accountant and examining officer.

5th. When examined and certified, all returns for each period shall be forwarded to the Audit Office, accompanied by a summary, certified by the deputy minister and the accomntant.

And they direct that the particular regulations and forms applicable to each department be submitted to the Board for approval.

## TREASURY BOARD OVER-RULINGS OF THE AUDITOR GENERAL'S DECISIONS BETWEEN THE COMMENCEMENT OF THE SESSION OF 1901 AND THE SESSION OF 1902. <br> Geological Survey : Increases of Salary in excess of Amount authorized by the Civil Service Act.

Note :-For previous correspondence on this subject see Audit Report 1899-1900, pages $A-54$ to $\Lambda-60$.

Audit Office, Ottawa, May 7, 1901.
Sir,-Let me reply to your letter of October 11, 1900, regarding increases from 1st of July last of $\$ 100$ a year each to Messrs. A. E. Barlow and R. W. Brock, and $\$ 150$ a year each to Messrs. D. B. Dowling, C. O. Senecal and R. A. A. Johnston.

I inclose herewith the letter of Mr. Z. A Lash, K.C., of August 28, 1894, which still applies, the circumstances not having changed.

I have not answered earlier mainly because I hoped that parliament would have taken up my urgent appeal for its interference to stop the differences which exist between the Treasury Board and this office.

I now add the substance of my letter of March 26, 1898.
The point involved is, whether the permanent officials of Geological Survey, although appointed for special qualifications are, when appointed, subject with reference to their subsequent increases of salary to the restrictions of the Civil Service Act or not.

There is no object to be gained by spending time on determining whether persons, inadvertently or otherwise, got promotions to which they may not have been entitled.

I could never see that, because, in the case of the Geological Survey certain qualifications are by law substituted for the usual qualifying examination for admission into the service, the tests to be applied to determine fitness for promotion as required by the law in every other service, should be considered as removed without a single word of reference to promotion examinations which were admitted by every one to apply to the Geological Survey as to other departments before the passage of the Act affecting the qualifications for entrance into the service. This view is fully sustained and clearly brought out by the opinion of Mr. Lash, which is part of the file returned herewith.

You will notice Mr. Lash says : 'Section 39 is equally clear. No promotion in either division of the Civil Service shall take place without special examination under regulations made by the Governor in Council, \&c.'

The appeal is under section 32, subsection (a) of the Audit Act. I am, sir, your obedient servant,

Sir,-I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 7th instant, and enclosure, namely, T. B. file No. 26817, being an appeal by the Department of the Geological Survey from the objection of the Auditor General regarding increases of salary to certain technical officers of that department.

The objections of the Auditor General to such increases have been dealt with on several previous occasions by this department, and I am to state that the Minister of Justice adheres to the view expressed in my letter to you of April 28, 1898, with respect to the case of Mr. F. G. Wait, an officer of the department in question.

It is not, of course, disputed that the Civil Service Act applies to the Dapartment of the Geological Survey, or that the technical officers in that department are not exempt from its provisions. The Act does apply, but, in the opinion of the minister, there is nothing in it prescribing or limiting the increases which may be paid to these officers. They do not belong to any of the classes of clerks to which the provisions for an annual increase of $\$ 50$ apply, but to a distinct class of employees, namely, 'officers who have special professional or technical qualifications.' See schedule A to the Civil Service Act.

The minister is of opinion that officers of this class may receive such increases of salary as the Governor in Council thinks proper, provided Parliament provides the necessary funds ; and he thinks that the Appropriation Act, if it provides moneys applicable to the payment of the salaries of these officers, and sufficient to pay them as proposed to be increased, is parliamentary authority for such payment.

The question of the necessity for the passing of a promotion examination does not arise as the officers are not promoted, but remain in the same class.

Treasury Minute, May 10, 1001.-The Board had under consideration an appeal by the Geological Survey Department from the objection of the Auditor General to the payment of increases of salary of certain technical officers of that department as authorized by Order in Council of July 25, 1900.

The Auditor General, in his letter of May 7, 1901 (copy annexed), takes objection to the payment of the increases in question under section 32 , subsection (a) of the Audit Act, on the ground that there is no parliamentary authority therefor.

The board had also under consideration a letter from the Deputy Minister of Justice, dated May 9, 1901, in connection with the subject (copy attached), setting forth that the Minister of Justice is of opinion that the Appropriation Act, if it provides moneys applicable to the payment of the salaries of these officers, and sufficient to pay them as proposed to be increased, is parliamentary authority for such payment.

The board, in view of the opinion of the Minister of Justice and Attorney General, as above mentioned, consider that the objections of the Auditor General are not well founded, and should be over-ruled, and they therefore direct that payment be made to the officers in question as authorized by Order in Council of July 25, 1900.

My view is that the Governor in Council has not the power to give leave of absence with pay, unless it is specifically provided for, as in the Civil Service Act, and thercfore, I think that the superannuation allowance can be paid only on condition that the money received for services during the absence of Commissioner Herchmer be refunded by him.

You know my reference to the Civil Service Act. The section to which I allude gives the Governor in Council the power to grant up to a year's leave of absence, with pay, to members of the Civil Service.

Treasury Minute, April 22, 1901: The Board has unden consideration a report from the Right Honourable Sir Wilfrid Laurier, under date of the 1st April, 1901, submitting for consideration of council the following memorandum from the Comptroller of the North-west Mounted Police, which report and memorandum were referred to the Board on the 4th April, 1901:-
' Ottawa, April 1, 1901.
'By order in council of 31st July, 1900, Lt.-Col. Lawrence W. Herchmer was retired from the command of the North-west Mounted Police under the Superannuation Act, to take effect from that date.
'The same Order in Council granted Col. Herchmer pay as Commissioner of the mounted police to the date of his retirement, and in accordance therewith he was paid from the date he assumed command of the 2nd battalion Canadian Mounted Rifles for service in South Africa, viz:-1st January to 31st July, 1900, 7 months, $\$ 1,486.35$.
'The Auditor General is of opinion that the Governor in Council has not the power to grant leave of absence with pay, unless it is specifically provided for, as in the Civil Service Act; and that the superannuation allowance can be paid to Lt.-Col. Herchmer only on condition that the money received for services during his absence with the South African contingent be refunded by him.
'The Civil Service Act authorizes the Governor in Council to grant up to one year's leave of absence with pay to members of the civil service, but there is no such specific provision in the Mounted Police Act.
'The North-west Mounted Police Act, $57-58$ Vic. (18984) chap. 27 , sec. 17, empowers the Governor General in Council to make rules and regulations for 'generally 'such matters and things concerning the government, discipline and guidance of the ' force as are not inconsistent with this Act.'
'Under this authority regulations have been made from time to time and approved by the Governor General in Council; among such regulations being provision for the granting of leave of absence to officers. The last Order in Council, on this subject, passed on the 24th November, 1892, provides:-
'(a)-(2). That the commissioner may grant to any officer leave of absence not exceeding three weeks in any year, provided that the officer can be spared without prejudice to the public service.
'(b)-(4). That officers who have not had leave for one or more years may be allowed not exceeding two months, provided the leave so granted shall not exceed in
the aggregate an average of three weeks per annum from the date of the previous leave.
'(c)-(5). Applications for leave, or extension of leave, beyond two months, must state whether the absence will necessitate the employment of additional assistance and, generally, give such information as will enable the Minister to decide whether the application should be granted; and if so, on what terms. The rule has been to refer such applications to the Treasury Board, and to have the leave granted by authority of an Order in Council.
'In the case of police serving with the South African contingents an Order in Council was passed on the 2nd February, as follows:-
'That leave of absence without pay be granted to officers, N.C. officers and con'stables of the North-west Mounted Police who volunteer and are accepted for service ' with the Canadian troops in South Africa. * * * *,
'The allowance of pay to Lt.-Col. Herchmer while in South Africa was an exceptional case, partly on account of his retirement, and partly on account of the fact that during his fourteen years service as Commissioner of the North-west Mounted Police he had only one term of two weeks' leave.
' The Order in Council retiring Lt.-Col. Herchmer granted him an allowance, under the Superannuation Act, of $\$ 1,144.00$ a year, to commence from the 1st August. So far no payment has been made made, which has been the cause of much inconvenience to hin

The Board had also under consideration a letter from the Auditor General under date of the 15th April, 1901, to the Secretary of the Board in reply to a letter to the Auditor General from the Secretary of the Board, under date of the 9th April, 1901, which letter of the Auditor General is as follows:-

 'Secretary, Treasury Board.Sir,--I have your letter of the 9 th instant inclosing Treasury Board file No. 72976 regarding the surperannuation of Lt.-Col. Lawrence W. Herchmer, late Commissioner of the North-west Mounted Police, and leave of absence to him pay from 1st January to 31st July, 1900.
' I am strengthened in my view that leave of absence with pay for the whole seven months named cannot be legally allowed, by the fact quoted in Mr. White's letter of the 1st instant, that an Order in Council was passed on February 2 (presumably 1900), granting leave of absence, without pay, to officers, non-commissioned officers and constables of the North-west Mounted Police who volunteer and are accepted for service with the Canadian troops in South Africa.
${ }^{6}$ Under the general regulations of November 24, 1892, made by the Governor General in Council, Lieutenant Colonel Herchmer may be entitled to two months of the leave, in view of the fact that he was employed for fourteen years and received only two weeks' leave during that period. It is not quite clear to me that under the words of the Act which Mr. White quotes, the Governor in Council had authority to make the regulation for leave, but perhaps he had, and I am not inclined to dispute it. I am now, therefore, of the opinion that by returning an amount equal to his pay for five months as Mounted Police Commissioner, Col. Herchmer's superannuation allowance might be paid him. It is of course quite clear that the provision for leave of absence for a year to civil servants does not apply to any public official who does not come under the Civil Service Act and, therefore, not to Col. Ferchmer.

Herchmer, late Commissioner of the North-west Mounted Polioe, from January 1 to July 31, 1900.
' I am to state that the Minister of Justice has no doubt as to the power of the Governor General under the circumstances of this case to grant leave of absence with pay, as he has assumed to do under the Order in Council of July 31 last. There is no need, the minister thinks, of any express statutory authority in order to invest him with that power.
'With regard to the Order in Council of February 2, 1900, the minister does not think that there is anything in that order which prevents His Excellency in Council, where exceptional circumstances arising or coming to his knowledge since the date of the order, justify such action, from granting leave of absence with pay to any officer who has served with the Canadian troops in South Africa.
'The minister is, therefore, of opinion that the statutes providing for the payment of the salary of the Commissioner of the North-west Mounted Police afforded statutory authority for the payment to which the Auditor General objects.

Treasury Board Appeals-Extrá Clerks Leave of Absence: Mr. Arthur Dale, Department Railways and Canals, Messrs. Stevenson, Hampshire and T. W. Kier, Department of Public Works.
Sir,-All are based on an opinion of Mr. Power of the Department of Justice. He says, that in his opinion, I was right in my interpretation of section 49 of the Civil

Service Act. He considers that the section named applied only to permanent clarks. He , however, thinks that the question is not disposed of by that conclusion. He does not see any reason to doubt that the Governor General, on the advice of his responsible ministers, may grant such leave. Then, he says that if the requisite money is appropriated the payment may be made.

Now, section 49 was an enabling clause in the case of permanent clerks. Can it be supposed that the legislature defined the limit of the leave to be granted to permanent clerks and intended that the executive should retain uncontrolled power with reference to extra clerks? Section 49 would have been a restrictive instead of an enabling clause if the executive had otherwise the power to grant unlimited leave.

Then, with reference to appropriation. There is no appropriation from which pay can be made for days on which no work is performed. It will be admitted that you cannot pay an extra clerk employed in the Interior Department from the vote for the Public Works Department and yet it is contended that you can pay him from the Public Works Department appropriation for extra clerks if he has worked nowhere. With as much reason you might claim that, although a vote for the construction of the St. Lawrence Canals would not authorize the construction of the Georgian Bay Canal, it would authorize the payment of a claim when no work has been performed. I quite see that, if the wording of the appropriation described leave of absence as payable out of an appropriation for extra clerks, parliamentary authority would be given.

I may be allowed to say that, in my opinion, the overcrowding of the civil service which has always been a ground of trouble, is to be increased by the practice of recognizing the claim of extra clerks to all their sick or recreation leave, no matter how long or how short the service may have been. It will remove about the only safeguard against a temporary clerk once he enters the service becoming a permanent charge on Dominion funds. As it has been, a deputy minister, no matter how pressing the work was, feared the prospect of incurring a permanent charge if he employed an extra clerk to do it, but in the future, if he is cautious, he will stagger under the temporary pressure.

The service and the temporary clerks would both be benefited if the clerks were temporary in reality; but if it be so arranged that with any foothold they cannot be removed, what is the service to become?

W. Kier, both employees, being temporary clerks, and the proposed payments being in each case for periods during which these clerks were absent upon leave granted by the Governor in Council.

It does not seem necessary to add anything to what has been stated by me on several previous occasions in connection with appeals involving the same point as is here raised. The Minister of Justice is of opinion that there is no doubt whatever as to the legal power of the Governor in Council to grant leave of absence with pay to temporary clerks, and is of opinion that if the Appropriation Act provides the requisite

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funds for paying the salaries of these clerks, that Act is parliamentary authority for the proposed payments.

The minister directs me to state with respect to one point taken by the Auditor General, that it is a mistake to suppose that section 49 of the Civil Service Act is an enabling clause in the sense in which the Auditor General uses that term. If there were no statutory provision with regard to leave, the minister thinks it quite clear that the Crown could, like any other employer, grant leave of absence to its employees. Section 49 restricts the power to do so by prescribing the maximum periods for which leave may be granted under ordinary and under certain exceptional circumstances.

The board had under consideration the correspondence between the Auditor General and the Departments of Railways and Canals and Public Works in regard to these cases, and also the remarks of the Auditor General in reference thereto in his letter of May 6, 1901, to the secretary of the board, and the report of the Deputy Minister of Finance under section 32, subsection (c) of the Audit Act, of May 10, 1901, copies of which last named letter and report are hereto annexed.

The first objection of the Auditor General under subsection (a) of section 32, of the Audit Act is that there is no parliamentary authority for the payments in question, but in view of the opinion of the Minister of Justice as expressed in the letter of the Deputy Minister of Justice dated May 9, 1901, a copy of which is hereto annexed the board are of opinion that the objection of the Auditor General that there is no parliamentary authority for the payment is not well taken. Justice Dept. : Remission of Fine Imposed by the Warden of St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary.

Sir,-I have to inform you that in May, 1898, the warden of the St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary imposed a fine of $\$ 10$ upon Guard L. Normand for being absent on account of sickness, without leave and without furnishing a cartificate from the penitentiary surgeon, although he produced a certificate from his own family physician.

The fine, which was imposed without the authority of the Minister of Justice, was deposited as revenue at the time it was levied. (See Regulation No. 127 of the inclosed copy of 'Penitentiary Regulations.')

The matter having recently been brought to the attention of the minister, he does not approve of the fine, and has directed that the amount be refunded.

I have therefore to request that you will be good enough to send me a cheque for $\$ 10$, payable to the order of L. Normand, and charge the amount to St. Vincent dc Paul Penitentiary revenue.

Sir,-II have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your application of the 6 th instant for refund of a fine of $\$ 10$, imposed by the warden of St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary on Guard L. Normand, for being absent from duty without leave in 1898. This fine, you state, was imposed at the time without the authority of the Minister of Justice, and now that his attention has been called to the matter, he has directed that it be remitted.

I presume the fine, in the first instance, was imposed by the warden under section 26 of the Penitentiary Act, which provides as follows :-
'The warden may impose upon any officer or servant appointed by him or by the Minister of Justice, for any act of negligence or carelessness committed by him, a fine, payable in money of such reasonable amount, not exceeding one month's pay, as the warden, under the circumstances of the case, thinks fit ; and under like circumstances, the Minister of Justice may impose a like fine on the deputy warden and accountant.'

Under this section the warden, it seems to me, had full authority to impose the fine in question ; and consequently, the amount which you now ask to be refunded, having gone into the Consolidated Revenue Fund in due course of law, may not be released therefrom without the express authority of parliament.

Sir,-Referring to your letter of 9 th instant, in which you quote section 26 of the Penitentiary Act, you appear to have overlooked several other provisions. Section 2 authorizes the Minister of Justice to exercise over penitentiaries complete administrative power. Section 9 of the amending Act, 50-51 Vic., chap. 52, authorizes the Governor in Council, subject to the provisions of the Penitentiary Act and of the amending Act, to make regulations respecting, among other things, any matter relating to the establishment, maintenance and management of penitentiaries. The regulation which I quote is made in execution of this power, and is, of course, binding upon the warden. I see no reason for holding it ultra vires. The effect of the view.stated in your letter would be to deny to the minister administrative control, and it would also do away with the effect of the regulation.

Sir,-I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 14th ult. inclosing an appeal from the Department of Justice from my ruling.

The Deputy Minister of Justice in his letter to me of the 10 th May says that I appear to have overlooked section 2 of the Penitentiary Act. I have the section before me. It cannot cancel by implication a section in the same Act which expressly gives the power, without restriction of any kind, to the warden to impose fines on certain officials, the one under consideration among the number. Then, the reasonableness of the provision of the section is an evidence in itself that parliament would have desirect what the words convey. For the sake of discipline, so important everywhere, but particularly so in a penitentiary, the warden, without control of any kind, is given the power of enforcing on the spot fines upon all officials, except the deputy warden who may be fined by the Minister of Justice. I cannot think of any clearer words to convey exact directions as to the officials who were, with regard to fines, to be under the Minister of Justice and the warden respectively, and I cannot think of any more appropriate decision on the question.

Then, the reference of the Deputy Minister of Justice to section 9 of 50-51 Vic., chap. 52 , and to the regulations made under it still further strengthens my view, instead of weakening it. The section is:-
${ }^{\text {' The Governor in Council may, subject to the provisions of the Penitentiary Act }}$ ' and this Act, from time to time make regulations respecting-

> 6 a Officers
> $6 \mathrm{~b}-\quad \& c$.

This clearly limits the power of the Governor in Council in making the regulations, by every provision of the two Acts named and, therefore, by section 26 of the Penitentiary Act which sets forth the classes of officers who may be fined by the warden and the class which the Minister of Justice fines in case of need.

For the sake of $\$ 10$, after three years have elapsed, a guard is to be given the opportunity of making it known all over the penitentiary that the warden was beaten by him and complaint will be made that the warden's authority is not respected. How could the best man in the world keep up a semblance of discipline under such circumstances?

I do not contend that parliament would desire the growth of those caste distinctions which are happily so nauseating to Canadians; but the strengthening of the warden, the giving back bone to the working head of the penitentiary, is in no way connected with the elevation of the individual: it is a necessity to the official who has hanging over him the tremendous responsibility of keeping in subjection all the bold and fierce lawlessness of a whole province and of searching out any faint evidence of a better nature, bringing the small part of good from its concealment and giving it air, sunlight and exercise, so that when its possessor is again permitted to walk among his fellowmen, he may have something to help him live like a man and not be compelled to go back to the penitentiary as the only place congenial to his tastes. How is the warden to perform any of this magnificent duty if' he sees that the humblest official under him, fined for laziness or worse, can have the car of the minister, have the decision against him reversed and have it known all over the penitentiary that the warden has no authority. Dr. Duchesneau's reputation is in the keeping of others. If no thought is given to the great work which he might do, there is no right to do what will inevitably stamp the work as a failure. Naturally in the eyes of the public generally, who do not imagine that the warden is hampered by those who would naturally be expected to assist him, the warden is supposed to have every assistance.

To interpret the 26th section I am trying to put myself in the position of a legislator and to show that it could never have been intended to have had an appeal from
the warden on the imposition of fines. No man who has work of any extent conducted by an agent, listens to the caballing and intrigues of the men. If he finds that the agent is incapable of the proper performance of his duties he replaces him, just as the government, through the reports of the inspector, ought to deal with the warden in a like case.

Then, it can never have been intended that, even if the Minister of Justice had at the moment the fine was imposed, the right to review the warden's decision, he should have the right to revive the matter three years after. The money went into the consolidated fund, thus became parliament's and ceased to be under the control of the minister, or of the government.

My objection is under the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, section 32, subsection (a).

Treasury Minute, June 15, 1901.-The Board had under consideration an appeal by the Department of Justice from the objections of the Auditor General to a refund of $\$ 10$ fine to Guard L. The Board had also under consideration a letter from the Deputy Minister of Justice, dated June 14, 1901, in connection with the case (copy annexed), setting forth that in the opinion of the acting Attorney General, the Minister of Justice, under section 2 of the Penitentiary Act and regulation No. 23, approved by His Excellency in Council, on November 26, 1898, had authority to disapprove of the fine levied by the warden in this case, and to direct that the amount be refunded to the guard ; that this action of the minister was not inconsistent with section 26 of the Penitentiary Act, to which the Auditor General refers, and section 2 of the Penitentiary Act, together with section 9 of the Amending Act, 50-51 Vic., chap. 52, and the regulation above quoted, which was passed thereunder, furnish parliamentary authority for the refund applied for.

The Board after a careful consideration of the case and all the correspondence between the Auditor General and the Department of Justice regarding the matter, and after a full consideration of the objections of the Auditor General as set forth in his letter of June 13, 1901, consider, in view of the opinion of the acting Minister of Justice and Attorney General as above set forth, that the objections of the Auditor General are not well taken and should be overruled, and they therefore direct that the refund to Guard L. Normand, of the St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary be made.

## Trade and Commerce : Increase of Salary to Chief Controller of Chinese Immigration from a Date Prior to that of Order in Council Authorizing the Increase.

Dept. of 'Trade and Commerce, Ottawa, August 25, 1900.
Sm,-I beg to call your attention to an Order in Council of July 13, which increased my salary as Chief Controller of Chinese Immigration from $\$ 800$ to $\$ 1,000$ per annum, to date from the 1st June last.

In conformity with this, a supplementary pay-list was sent you for the balance due for the month of June. It did not come back, nor did I hear anything about it until about one of the last days of July or early in this month. I asked Mr. Simpson what had become of it, and he stated he had never received it. I thereupon sent him a duplicate, which again received no attention ; neither did the regular pay-list for the month of July. Some time in the early part of the current month inquiry was made as to why this pay-list had not come back. We were then informed it had been sent to the Bank of Montreal direct. Upon inquiry, it was found that the figures had been changed so as to make the increase of salary date only from July 13, the date of the Order in Council, instead of June 1, as provided. So far I have had nothing official from you on the subject, further than I have been given to understand that your ruling was that it could only take effect from the date of the Order in Council.

I cannot very well conceive why this individual case should receive such ruling when to my certain knowledge there are not only dozens, but hundreds, of similar cases that have past during the past year ; and in the Customs Department alone, during the month of July last, there were, in round numbers, 100 cases, all of which received their increases from July 1, although some of the Orders in Council were dated as late as the 25 th of the month.

As to your ruling, if such has been the case, I would call your attention to similar rulings of yours in 1898, where the Treasury Board overruled the same, and directed the issue of cheque for the amount provided for under Order in Council (Vide your report for the year 1898, pages A-47, \&c.) The matter appears to have been submitted for the opinion of the Department of Justice, and the ruling of that department was, in effect, that Council had a perfect right to date back increases.

It is not the amount of money involved, but the principle, which I must take notice of ; and I would, therefore, ask for a reconsideration of your ruling, and in order that cheques may issue before it is too late to close the accounts for the past year. I do not like to submit the matter again to Treasury Board, which has already passed on similar rulings; and, therefore, trust that you will take immediate action and advise me as to your final ruling in the matter, and if adverse, your grounds therefor.

Sir,-I beg to acknowledge your letter of August 25 with reference to your $\$ 200$ increase as Chief Controller of Chinese Immigration.

You quote many cases in which increases were given without demur by me. Let me say that I make a distinction between statutory and other increases. The employee who is eligible for a statutory increase has, I think, a right, under contract with the government, if the money be voted, for the statutory increase from the day on which he is cligible. According to my view, an official who was employed at a certain rate of pay without any ground for the expectation of an increase, has practically entered into a contract to do the service without any increase, and under such contract is not legally entitled to be paid, except from the day on which the order giving him the increase was made, i.e., until he did work under the new contract.

You draw attention to the fact that I have been overruled in confining the increases to the kind I have just described. I have, but I am still of opinion that my view is the correct one, and shall act upon that view unless overruled in any particular case, until I have another opportunity of getting the Public Accounts' Committee, either to relieve me from responsibility in passing applications which I do not believe to be regular claims against the country, or to take steps for enacting the course that I think is the proper one.

Should the Treasury Board overrule me there will be no difficulty in paying the additional amount from this year's appropriation, if there should be a sufficient amount to meet it as there no doubt will be.

With reference to your complaint about delays, I can only say that in one way or another I have found my time more than fully occupied since the end of the session, and that I have disposed of what was in my opinion most pressing.

Sir,-I am in receipt of yours of yesterday's date, in reply to mine of August 25, in re my increase of salary as Chief Controller of Chinese Immigration.

I have carefully noted your statements with reference to eligibility for statutory increases, and that you make a distinction between such and other increases of salary. You seem, however, to have overlooked the fact that among the cases to which I called your attention there were but few of statutory increases-they were mostly increases in outside service, which are in no way provided for under the Civil Service Act, and stood exactly upon the same ground as my own case.

I note also your admission that the Treasury Board has decided against you in similar cases, but that you intend to object in every instance until the Public Accounts' Committee relieve you from the responsibility of passing applications of the kind. I can only remark in connection with this that the Public Accounts' Committee has had plenty of opportunities to sustain you in your ruling did it see fit to do so; but I should take it for granted that, inasmuch as when its attention was called to the matter through correspondence, and it took no action, it sustained the ruling of the Treasury Board rather than yours. However, when the minister returns, if he thinks it worth while to submit the matter to Treasury Board it can be done. Of course you understand it is not the amount of money I am contending for. It is the mere principle of the thing, which it strikes me should be mare plain.

I can very well understand that your time is more than fully occupied, and I am sorry to have in any way caused you trouble in the matter ; and would never have done so were it not on principle, as above.

Sir,-I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of May 21, and the accompanying file of the Treasury Board on the appeal of Mr. W. G. Parmelee, from my decision that the $\$ 200$ increase of his salary as Chief Controller of Chinese Immigration, could not legally date from a time anterior to the date of the instrument sanctioning the increase.

My views are still what they were when dealing on January 17 last, with certain cases of similar kind, which were then before the Board, and I therefore repeat the remarks here :-
'I.t is surely quite clear that under an Order in Council defining the time during which an employee of the government was to receive a certain fixed sum for fully

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and plainly defined services, the government would be breaking its contract if it refused to cmploy the person to the end of the time fixed in the Order in Council, or if it refused to pay him the rate stipulated. If this conclusion is correct, must it not be equally correct to say that the employee, having continued his services for the period named and of the kind contemplated by the Order in Council, has no ground for seeking from the government additional remuneration? If the time named has expired and a new period of service has been entered upon, or if the nature of the service has been vied before the expiration of the time fixed, the case is no doubt changed.
'Then, if the employees have no right to demand additional romuneration, it is manifest that the government, dealing as it does only with the money of others, cannot properly grant additional remuneration.
'I have, in other claims similar to these, drawn attention to the fact that, when I have been overruled, no limitations have been acknowledged by the Board as to the character c.f the cases in which the Board might justifiably interfere, nor as to the length of time to which the interference might apply. Overrulings of the kind now sought having recently come fast. Will they not serve as notices that it is worth while to revive claims years old ? If so, every one connected with the management of the Dominion finances will have a right to feel that there is scarcely any limit to the additional labour which may be put upon him. The country has manifestly the deepest interest in the matter, inasmuch as it has to provide for the direet added outlay as well as the cost of management.
'There is no hardship to the employee to leave things as they are, because he was a consenting party to his rate of remuneration and would have chosen another employer if he could have found one who would have suited him better.
'The late government was able to conduct its affairs without this class of cases, and there seems no change in business to necessitate the bringing of them into existence now.
'Then if there is such necessity, regulations governing the cases should be made when there is no special case before the Board.'

The objection is taken under subsection (a) of section 32 of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act.

Sir,-I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 14th instant, and of the accompanying file of papers T. 27640 B., being an appeal to the Treasury Board by the Department of Trade and Commerce from the Auditor General's decision in connection with an increase in the salary of Mr. W. G. Parmelee, as Chief Comptroller of Chinese Immigration, from $\$ 800$ to $\$ 1,000$ per annum, to date from June 1, 1900, as authorized by Order in Council of July 13, 1900.

The reason for the Auditor's decision, as stated in his letter of the 14th instant, is that, in his opinion, the increase of the salary in question could not legally date from a time anterior to the date of the instrument sanctioning the increase.

As you are aware, the present Minister of Justice and his predecessors in office have in numerous instances held that there is no foundation for this opinion of the Auditor General. The Acting Minister of Justice and Attorney General, the Hon. Mr. Scott, directs me to state that he concurs in the views of the minister with regard
to the right of the Governor in Council to antedate increases of salary, and that in the present case he thinks the increase of $\$ 200$ dating back to June 1, was validly granted by the Order in Council of July 13, 1900.

Section 3 (d) of the Chinese Immigration Act, Revised Statutes, chapter 67, which provision is continued in section 5 (d) of chapter 32, of the statutes of 1900, and the vote in the Appropriation Act for the administration of the Chinese Immigration Act afforded, in the opinion of the Acting Minister sufficient parliamentary authority for the increase as granted by the Order in Council of July 13.

The objection of the Auditor General having been made under subsection (a) of section 32 of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, the papers were referred to the Department of Justice, and as appears from the letter of the Deputy Minister of Justice to the Secretary of the Board, under date of June 17, 1901, copy also annexed, the acting Minister of Justice, Hon. Mr. Scott, is of opinion that there is sufficient parliamentary authority for the increase as granted by the Order in Council of July 13, 1900.

The Board, in view of this opinion, are of opinion that the objections of the Auditor General are not well taken and should be overruled, and they direct that payment be made of the increased salary from the date named in the Order in Council above referred to.

Sir,-I have the honour to acknowledge your letter of the 23 rd ulto., on the subject of a statutory increase of $\$ 50$ to Mr. W. H. Harrington, as Superintendent of the Savings Bank branch of this department, in which you observe that 'Mr. Harrington is a first-class clerk at the maximum of his class, and, therefore, not entitled to further increase until he has passed through the actual promotion prescribed by the Civil Service Act.'

In reply, I beg to say that the Order in Council (of which you have a copy), passed in Mr. Harrington's case, was consequent upon a recommendation to Council, which read as follow :-
'The undersigned has the honour to recommend to Your Excellency in Council that Mr. William Hague Harrington, now a first-class clerk in the Savings Bank branch of this department, be promoted to the position of Superintendent of the Savings Bank branch, to be made vacant by the superannuation of Mr. David Matheson, Mr. Harrington to retain his present salary, namely, \$1,800 a year.
' Mr. Harrington has passed the necessary promotion examination for a chief clerkship.'

A promotion has always hitherto been understood as implying not merely a change of duty or of departmental designation-there may be promotion without eitherbut advancement from a lower to a higher class, and the Order in Council authorizes the promotion of Mr. Harrington, a first-class clerk, to a position to be made vacant. by the retirement of a chief clerk.

The order in question was passed on the assurance given by the Postmaster General that Mr. Harrington had passed the necessary examination for a chief clerkship.

It can hardly be questioned that the intention of the Order in Council to promote Mr. Harrington a chief clerkship, as recommended, is evident, and I shall be pleased if, on further consideration, you are able to see the matter in that light.

Sir,-I have your letter of the 8th instant with reference to Mr. Harrington's promotion.

The words of the recommendation to council plainly support the view that it was not desired by the Postmaster General that Mr. Harrington's status under the Civil Service Act should be changed : 'That Mr. Wm. Haig Harrington, \&c., be pro' moted to the position of Superintendent of the Savings Bank Branch, \&c.-Mr. Har'rington to retain his present salary.' The words of the recommendation are, however, not important.

The words of the Order in Council are the same as those of the recommendation. The very fact that they specifically define the kind of promotion which Mr. Harring-

The view you take of the matter is of course that which commends itself to your judgment, but I must demur to the absolute statement that the words of the recommendation to council in Mr. Harrington's case 'plainly support the view that it was not desired by the Postmaster General that Mr. Harrington's status under the Civil Service Act should be changed.'

It is within my knowledge that the Postmaster General did desire a change in Mr. Harrington's satus, and was under the impression that the recommendation made to council sufficiently indicated the fact.

This department evidently attached a meaning to the word 'promotion,' and to the specification of a title which for many years had designated a chief clerkship, which you do not attach, your view apparently being that a man may be 'promoted' without change of rank, and that 'promotion' to the position held by a chief clerk does not imply promotion to the rank of chief clerk.

As regards Mr. Harrington's salary, as that was already the minimum salary of a chief clerk, it was specified in the recommendation to council that it was not to be changed scil. in connection with his promotion.

The department is quite prepared to recognize that both the recommendation to council and the Order in Council would have been more technically complete had the words 'Chief Clerk' been added to the title of 'Superintendent of the Savings Bank Branch;' but it is nevertheless of the opinion that the order as it stands may reasonably be construed as authorizing the promotion of Mr. Harrington to a chief clerkship.

Due note has been taken of your recommendation that no time should be lost in making another recommendation to council in this case.

Harrington, Superintendent of the Savings Bank Branch of this department, I have the honour to inclose to you herewith, as bearing on the question of the intention of the Order in Council passed in Mr. Harrington's case, a copy of a portion of a minute of the Treasury Board, approved by His Excellency in Council on January 23, 1882, setting forth that the Assistant Superintendents of the Money Order and Savings Bank Branches, respectively, shall class as chief clerks.

Sir,-Referring to your letter of the 17 th instant, I have now the honour to return herewith Treasury Board file No. 28,108 , being papers relating to the promotion of Mr . W. H. Harrington, from a first class to a chief clerkship in the Post Office Department. The Auditor General has refused to recognize this promotion as dating from the Order in Council of 28th July, 1899, by which Mr. Harrington was promoted to the position of Superintendent of the Savings Bank Branch of the department, contending that the order in question merely promoted Mr. Harrington to the office uamed in it and did not change his rank as a clerk in the service, and that the onission in that order of an express promotion to a chief clerkship is not cured, so as to cause the promotion to take effect from the 28th July, 1899, by two subsequent Ordjrs in Council, the first, dated 30th April, 1901, amending the previous order by adding words giving Mr. Harrington the rank of chief clerk, and declaring that such had been the intention of His Excellency in Council, and the second, dated 6th June, 1901, ordering that the promotion to a chief clerkship did and was thereby declared to date fam the 28th July, 1899. On the 5th September, 1900, an Order in Council was passed granting to Mr. Harrington a statutory increase to take effect from 1st October, 1900, and the Auditor General having objected that such increase could not lawfully be granted as of that date, because in his view the promotion to a chief clerkship had net taken effect previous to 1st October, 1899, the Order in Council of 6th Junc, 1901, further declared that the increase, approved on 5th September, 1900, did date from October 1, 1900. The Auditor General still maintains his objection and refuses to certify for a cheque covering the increase as from the last mentioned date. He takes his objection under paragraph (a) of section 32 of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, holding that there is no parliamentatry authority for the issue of such a
cheque, and you ask me to advise you, for the information of the Treasury Board, whether, in the opinion of the Attorney General, there is such parliamentary authority.

In reply I am to state as follows:-
It appears from the papers that on the 23rd January, 1882, an Order in Council was passed, the purpose of which seems to have been to reorganize the Money Order and Savings Bank Branches of the Post Office Department, a feature of which rorganization was that there should be a general superintendent over both branches, and by this Oriler in Council it was provided amongst other things as follows:-
' 5 . In undertaking the superintendence of both branches the General Super'intendent must necessarily relinquish a portion of the minor details of supervision 'in each branch hitherto performed by the separato superintendents, and commit 'these minor details to the officers next in rank, those officers are now only 1st class ' clerks, but under the changed organization now recommended, they should have the 'rank and authority of Assistant Superintendents of Money Orders and Post Office 'Savings Banks respectively, and shall class as chief clerks with salaries rising from ' $\$ 1,800$ to $\$ 2,200$.'

The system thus established appears to have since been modified. There is now no general superintendent, and there is a superintendent over each of the two branches, whose duties are not less but no doubt more onerous and responsible than those of the assistant superintendents under the Order in Council of 23rd January, 18.82.

Such being the situation, the Postmaster General made the report to council upon which the Order in Council of 28th July, 1899, was based. In it he recommended that Mr. Harrington, then first-class clerk in the Savings Bank Branch, should be appcinted to the position of superintendent of the branch, to be made vacant by the superannuation of Mr. David Matheson, Mr. Harrington to retain his then present salary of $\$ 1,800$ a year, and the report concluded by stating that Mr. Harrington had passed the necessary promotion examination for a chief clerkship. The following is the Minute of the Treasury Board upon the Postmaster General's report:-
' That Mr. William Hague Harrington, a first class clerk in the Post Office ' Department, who has passed the promotion examination, be promoted to the position ' of Superintendent of the Savings Bank Branch, made vacant by the superannuation ' of Mr. David Matheson, Mr. Harrington to retain his present salary, namely $\$ 1,800$ ' a year.'

The Order in Council thereupon passed, dated 28th July, 1899, was as follows:-
' That Mr. William Hague, Harrington, first class clerk, be promoted to the position ' of Superintendent of the Savings Bank Branch, vice Mr. David Matheson, super' annuated, Mr. Harrington to retain his present salary of $\$ 1,800$ a year.'

It appears clear, the Minister of Justice thinks, from these proceedings that the head of the department and the Treasury Board had in mind, when recommending Mr. Harrington's promotion, that the rank of the chief clerk was incident to the office of Superintendent of the Savings Bank Branch and that their reports must, therefore, show that Mr. Harrington had passed the examination for promotion to that rank in order to warrant his appointment to the superintendency. The minister thinks it may be assumed that the Governor in Council acted upon the same view, and considered, as he afterwards in effect declared, that the promotion to the office of superintendent involved a promotion to the rank of chief clerk.

The minister is of opinion that this view was fully warranted under the circumstances, and he thinks that upon his appointment as superintendent, Mr. Harrington became and was a chief clerk in the service, there being nothing in the Order in Council to the contrary.

The Minister of Justice and Attorney General, therefore thinks that Mr. Harrington was eligible for a statutory increase dating from 1st October, 1900, and that the
provisions of the Civil Service Act afford parliamentary authority for the issue of cheque covering such increase.

The Auditor General further stated that his objection was taken under subsection (a) of section 32, Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, and accordingly the correspondence and papers in the case were referred to the Department of Justice, and the Board had under consideration a letter under date of October 28, 1901, from the Deputy Minister of Justice (copy of which is annexed), from which it appears that the Minister of Justice and Attorney General is of opinion that upon his appointment as superintendent, Mr. Harrington became and was a chief clerk in the service, there being nothing in the Order in Council to the contrary, and that he was eligible for a statutory increase dating from October 1, 1900, and that the provisions of the Civil Service Act afford parliamentary authority for the issue of a cheque coveing such increase.

The Board in view of these opinions of the Minister of Justice and Attorney General, are of opinion that the objections of the Auditor General are not well taken and should be overruled, and that Mr. Harrington's promotion should date from July 28, 1899, and that his first increase should date from October 1, 1900, and they direct that he be paid in accordance with the provisions of the Orders in Council of July 28, 1899, and September 5, 1900.

## Justice Dept.: Per diem Allowance for Expenses without sufficient evidence of amount of Outlay.

Audit Office, Ottawa Marach 1, 1900.
Sir,-I have had frequent interviews with friends of the Mr. Lafortune who was your co-commissioner in the inquiry into the penitentiaries of the Dominion, as to his claims which were not paid by the Dominion. The claims have now been reduced to charges for travelling expenses which were not authorized by you, and which have, therefore, not been paid by this office. It is now maintained that, so far as the sittings in Montreal go, Mr. Lafortune has a right to be considered as a non-resident and particularly during the vacation season of more than two months. The vacation, as you no doubt understand, means the vacation in the law courts. During that time Mr. Lafortune had no other reason for going into Montreal than to attend the meet-$1-4 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~A}$
ings of the commission, and, therefore, as is maintained by his friends, the whole of the expense to which he was put, should have been paid by the Dominion.

Please give your view on this point,-on the actual facts of the case as they are known to you, and on any argument which you may think holds for or against the demand.

With reference to the claim for expenses at St. Vincent de Paul, I inclose an account of Desautels as certified by you. From it I gather that any charges that are legitimate, so far as Mr. Lafortune is concerned, are included in the account. Please say whether this is correct or not. If not correct, will you give the amount under this head which you think should be paid?

The Minister of Justice has intimated to me that he wishes me to write to you on the subject. An early reply will much oblige.

Sir,-I have your letter of 1st inst., and in reply would state that Mr. Lafortune's claims having been reduced to charges for travelling expenses not allowed by the commission, ought not to be difficult of adjustment. During the time the commission was sitting at St. Vincent de Paul, Mr. Lafortune frequently drove his own horse and carriage to attend the sittings, and of which no account was kept. He might very fairly be allowed his transportation by rail in lieu of his private conveyance. His horse was kept at Mr. Desautel's stables at St. Vincent de Paul, and I do not remember seeing any charge made for the keep, and do not think any payment was made by the commission on this account. During the sittings of the commission in Montreal, Mr. Lafortune might very reasonably be allowed his travelling expenses during the vacation season, but limited to this period. He has his place of business in Montreal at which he is in daily: attendance, and the sittings of the commission in the city added nothing to his expenses in travelling to and from his place of business. As a matter of fact Mr. Lafortune attended to the business of his office during vacation as well as before and after, by excusing himself from the sittings of the commission as was necessary for this purpose. He could, however, very reasonably say that his attendance on the commission prevented his taking his vacation, and that the attention given to his office was merely an incident of his being in the city on the work of the commission. The account of Mr. Desautels includes the meals supplied to Lafortune. My certification of the account was given under the impression that the cheque issued by the department in favour of Desautels was $\$ 24$, which appears should have been $\$ 24.50$; otherwise certification is correct.

I return the account of Desautels herewith.

You refer, no doubt, to the $\$ 662$ voted for 'balance of expenses in connection with the commission for the investigation of the affairs of St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary.' This, as you will perceive, is not in Mr. Lafortune's name-in fact there is nothing in the wording of this vote which frees it from the ordinary restrictions which apply to auditing accounts for disbursements.

Mr. Lafortune has received all the pay which he is considered entitled to for his services. He, therefore, is entitled to receive now only the payment for all of his disbursements. which have not already been paid. All other accounts of a similar nature went through the hands of Mr. Noxon, who was chairman of the commission. A statement of the amounts which Mr. Lafortune actually expended for living and moving expenses should be made out by him and forwarded to Mr. Noxon. On receipt of the account, after it has been certified by Mr. Noxon, there will be no difficulty about making payment.

Lafortune has furnished a statutory declaration to the effect that his disbursements amounted to $\$ 3$ per day during the investigation, which would entitle him to the $\$ 662$ above referred to.

I inclose herewith a copy of Mr. Lafortune's declaration, also copy of the Order in Council authorizing the payment of $\$ 3$ per day disbursements, also copy of my application to the Auditor General for a cheque for $\$ 662$, together with a copy of the Auditor's reply, in which he declines to issue the cheque.

Sir,-I have your letter of the 19th instant inclosing the report which you purpose making to the Treasury Board regarding the appeal of the Department of Justice on the claim of D. A. Lafortune, K.C.

It probably is advisable that you should be in possesion of a letter which I wrote in March, 1900 ,on this claim to Mr. Noxon, Inspector of Prisons, Toronto, at the request of the Minister of Justice. Mr. Noxon was chairman of the commission on which Mr. Lafortune sat. I inclose that letter as well as the reply from Mr. Noxon. You will see from the latter the lines upon which Mr. Noxon considers Mr. Lafortune's account should be made out. He thinks that Mr. Lafortune should receive his transportation by rail to St Vincent de Paul for the time during which the commission sat there. Then, he thinks that for the sittings in Montreal, Mr. Lafortune might reasonably be allowed travelling expenses during the vacation season alone. It must be quite possible now to determine the length of both periods, namely, the
sitting at St. Vincent de Paul and that portion of the sitting in Montreal which took place during the legal vacation.

I did not feel that I was in any way bound to prove Mr. Lafortune's case for him. I thought he would be expected to bring to me, before I would be called upon to pay his account, proofs outside of his own declaration. Now, that the department by which Mr. Lafortune was employed thinks that he should be paid by this unusual method, it appears proper that I should let you know what the chairman of the commission thought.

I shall always be glad to assist in doing anything which comes at all within the line of my duty.

Judging by the tenor of the report which you have asked me to peruse I would suppose that your impression is that Mr. Lafortune is a rather injured individual. My impression is that he has himself and nobody else to blame for not having received long ago what was due to him.

The undersigned Deputy Minister of Finance has the honour to report as follows:-

Mr. D. A. Lafortune, K.C. was one of the penitentiary commissioners in 1897 who investigated the affairs of the St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary. By the papers sub-
mitted to the Treasury Board he appears to have attended to the work of the said commission for a period of 234 days. A portion of such time was spent in Ottawa, and in regard to this time he has been paid his disbursements, amounting to about $\$ 40$.

By a statutory declaration made before Mr. Justice Choquet, Mr. Lafortune states he was unaware that he was obliged to keep a record of his daily expenses, and that since the ending of the said investigation he has to the best of his ability and conscientiously, endeavoured to prepare a statement of said expenses, and that he has found that the sum of $\$ 3.00$ represents on an average, his actual daily disbursements, comprising board and travelling expenses, for every day that said commission sat.

The Acting Minister of Justice reported the claim to council on the 24th July, 1901, and by an Order in Council of 30th July 1901, authority was granted for the payment to Mr. Lafortune of the sum of $\$ 3$ per day for disbursements during the sitting of the commission, and calculated as follows:-

An amount was placed in the Supply Act for the last fiscal year (1900-1901) worded as follows:-'St. Vincent de Paul: Balance of expenses in connection with 'the commission for the investigation of the affairs of the St. Vincent de Paul Peni' tentitary, \$662.00.'

Application was made to the Auditor General for payment of the amount in question, before the transactions for the fiscal year 1900-1901 were closed, but through the delay caused by the objection of the Auditor General the vote has lapsed, and if the decision of the Auditor General is not overruled it seems to the undersigned that the only means by which payment can be made will be from the vote for unforeseen expenses.

The Auditor General has refused to pay the money without a statement of details, and Mr. Lafortune, as above set forth, states that he was unaware he was obliged to keep a record of his daily expenses.

The Auditor General further states that if the undersigned permits the gross irregularity in this case, it will be difficult to keep out similar irregularities in others.

The objection of the Auditor General to the payment in question having been taken under subsection (c) of section 32 of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, this report is presented in accordance with said subsection (c).

Sir,-With reference to your letter of the 25 th ultimo, regarding the appeal to the Department of Justice from my decision on the claim of Mr. D. A. Lafortune, K.C. I return herewith the report on the case which you sent to me. I cannot sign it because I consider that no statement of the case is complete which does not draw attention to the fact that, while Mr . Lafortune claims $\$ 3$ a day as his outlay, he does not do what must be the easiest thing in the world to do if the claim is correct, viz. to show how the $\$ 3$ was spent in any one day. There is no reason for his expecting to get $\$ 3$ a day for 234 days, to cover his disbursements, unless he shows that one average day caused him to be out of pocket $\$ 3$. It would be a very bad precedent to grant a fixed sum for disbursements, without knowing that the average outlay for a day was that amount.

There must always be a doubt about the validity of a claim which would naturally be settled by the body which settled other claims of a similar kind, but was not able to see that this one could properly be settled on the basis proposed by the claimant. The chairman of the Commission naturally felt it incumbent on him to get all the accounts closed and must have perfected his knowledge of them by making inquiries ; but apparently he was unable to see his way to meeting the demands of Mr. Lafortune.

It must still be within Mr. Lafortune's power to show that an average day's disbursements were, as I have said, the amount at which he puts them. In my view no consideration should be giren to his claim until he has done so.

My objection comes under sec. 32, subsection (c) of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, on the ground that the money is not justly due.

An Order in Council, dated July 30, was passed authorizing payment of the amount to Mr. Lafortune.

The Auditor General having stated that his objections were taken under subsection (c) of section 32 of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, the Board had under consideration a report dated October 19, 1901, by the Deputy Minister of Finance, and which had been submitted by him to the Auditor Geueral for concurrence; also Correspondence which took place between the Auditor General and the Secretary of Treasury Board in reference to the matter, and the board after a full consideration of all the circumstances of the case are of opinion, that the objections of the Auditor General should be overruled; and they therefore direct that Mr. Lafortune be paid the $\$ 662$ authorized by Order in Council of July 30, 1901, and that the same be charged to the vote for 'Unforseen Expenses.'

## Customs Dept.: Leave of Absence to Clerk, under Section 49, Civil Service Act, Without Statement of Reason.

Customs Dept., Ottawa, Nov. 19,1901.
Sir,-I am directed by the hon. Minister of Customs to inform you that a copy of Order in Council of September 27, 1901, was received at this department, as follows :-
'That the resignation of Miss Jessie Blackburn Christie of her position as a second-class clerk in the inside service, be accepted, to take effect from March 31, 1902, and that she be granted leave of absence from August 12, 1901, to March 31, 1902, with salary.'

The Auditor General has refused to certify the pay-sheet of the Customs Department in order to the issue of a cheque for the salary of the said Jessie Blackburn Christie for the month of October, 1901, for reasons other than that there is no parliamentary authority for the payment, and as set forth in his letter, as follows :-

## ${ }^{6}$ Audit Office, Ottawa, Oct. 3, 1901.

'Sir,-I notice an Order in Council of the 27th ultimo, providing that "the resignation of Miss Jessie Blackburn Christie of her position as a second-class clerk in the inside service, be accepted, to take effect from March 31, 1902, and that she be granted leave of absence from August 12, 1901, to March 31, 1902, with salary." The only authority which I can see for such leave of absence, with salary, is the 49th section, subsection 2 of the Civil Service Act, which reads : "In case of illness, or for any other reason which to him seems sufficient, the Governor in Council may grant to any officer, chief clerk or other employee, leave of absence for a period not exceeding twelve months." It is quite manifest that there must be some reason for giving this leave of absence, with pay, and that it is not expected that mere absence should justify payment of salary. I know of no precedent, even, for such a payment.

Sir,-I have your letter of the 21 st ultimo, covering the notice of an appeal by the Department of Customs against my ruling on the question of leave of absence with pay to Miss Jessie Blackburn Christie.

I beg to say that in my opinion it was never contemplated by the 49 th section of the Civil Service Act that any person should obtain leave of absence in addition to the ordinary annual leave for recreation, unless the Order in Council embodied the ${ }^{-}$ reason for granting the leave.

This office is an office of record to convey to parliament all the vouchers, not in form alone, but in reality, which are necessary to authorize the payment of money. The government has great powers with reference to the expenditure of money, but it has no powers to spend money except such powers as are subject to the criticism of parliament. Whenever it is possible to give reasons for any line of conduct it is required by the constitution that the reasons should be given.

I see clearly that it would not be for me to make any criticism of the reasons which might be given by the government, but as I mention above, the Audit Office is a means of conveying the reasons to parliament and is expected to convey the reasons if they have been given.

The government has the reason and knows the reason, or else it would not have given the leave. It is therefore my duty to object to passing the payment until I am overruled, the reason not being given.

My objection is under section 32, subsection (a) of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, the requirement of section 49 of the Civil Service Act not having been complied with.

It appears from the papers submitted to the Board that by an Order in Council of September 27, 1901, Miss Christie's resignation of her position as a second-class clerk in the inside service of the Customs Department was accepted, to take effect from March 31, 1902, and that by the same Order in Council she was granted leave of absence from August 12, 1901 to March 31, 1902, with salary.

From the letter of the Auditor General of December 3, 1901 (copy annexed), it appears that the refusal of the Auditor General to pass the payment in question was
on the ground that the Order in Council did not embody the reason for granting this leave of absence above referred to, and that his objection was taken under subsection (a) of section 32 of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, the requirements of section 49 of the Civil Service Act not having been, in his opinion, complied with.

It appears from a letter from the Deputy Minister of Justice of December 5, 1901 (copy annexed), that the Attorney General of Canada entertains no doubt that section 49 of the Civil Service Act furnishes ample authority for the Order in Council in question, and that the payments thereby directed are therefore legally sanctioned.

The Board are of opinion that the objections of the Auditor General are not well taken and should be overruled, and they therefore direct that the terms of the Order in Council granting Miss Christie leave of absence from August 12, 1901 to March 31, 1902, with salary, be carried into effect and payment of salary to Miss Christie be made accordingly.

Sir,-I have the honour to report that on the 30 th ultimo, a pay-list of temporary employees in the office of the Chief Astronomer of the Department of the Interior was submitted to the Auditor General for approval. The pay-list contained the name of Mr. F. W. O. SIR,-I am in receipt of the appeal of the Interior Department from my division in the case of Mr. F. W. O. Werry, of the Chief Astronomer's office.

In reply I beg to state that it is clear that section 49 of the Civil Service Act, which provides for the granting of sick leave, is only applicable to permanent officials of the Civil Service and not to temporary employees. I am of the opinion that the Governor in Council has, accordingly, no power to grant prolonged sick leave with pay to others than permanent employees.

My objection is taken under subsections (a) and (c), section 32, Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act.

I shall probably deal at greater length with the case of Miss Costin now before me , in which the same principles are involved.

SIr,-I have the honour to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 21st instant, and the acompanying file of papers T. 28545 B. relating to the appeal by the Department of the Interior from the decision of the Auditor General not to pay salary to Mr. F. W.O.Werry during the time he is on sick leave under Order in Council granting such leave with pay, Mr. Werry being a temporary employee.

In reply I beg to state that the question here involved has been dealt with in several cases, both by the present Minister of Justice and his predecessors in office, the opinion uniformly expressed being that the powers of the Governor in Council to grant leave of absence to employees is not derived from section 49 of the Civil Service Act, that section merely limiting and defining the leave which may be granted to certain classes of employees therein mentioned ; that the section is restrictive and not enabling in its operation. The Minister of Justice entertains no doubt that the Governor in Council may grant sick leave with pay to temporary employees, and he thinks that the leave granted to Mr. Werry by the Order in Council of October 22 last was intra vires of the Governor in Council.

The Minister is therefore of opinion that the Civil Service Act and the Appropriation Act afford sufficient parliamentary authority for the payment of Mr. Werry's salary during his absence on such leave.

Treasury Minute, December 28, 1901.-The Board had under consideration the papers in connection with an appeal by the Department of the Interior against the action of the Auditor General in striking the name of Mr. F. W. O. Werry from the pay-list of temporary employees in the office of the Chief Astronomer, in that department, of November 30, 1901.

Mr. Werry, who is a temporary employee in the above named office, was by Order in Council of October 22, 1901, granted leave of absence, with pay, until May 15, 1902, and the objection of the Auditor General to passing his pay is as stated in the letter from the Auditor General to the Secretary of the Board, of which a copy is annexed, that section 49 of the Civil Service Act, which provides for the granting of sick leave, is only applicable to permanent officials and not to temporary employees, and that in his opinion the Governor in Council has no power to grant prolonged sick leave with pay to other than permanent employees.

The objection of the Auditor General having been taken under subsections (a) and (c), of section 32 of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, the papers were submitted to the Department of Justice, and the Board had under consideration the letter of the Deputy Minister of Justice to the Secretary of the Board of which a copy is annexed, from which it appears that the Minister of Justice is of opinion that the Civil Service Act and the Appropriation Act afford sufficient parliamentary authority for the payment of Mer. Werry's salary during his absence on such leave.

The Board had also under consideration the report of the Deputy Minister of Finance of which a copy is annexed, submitted under subsection (c) of section 32 of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, which report was submitted to the Auditor General for concurrence therein.

The Board after full consideration of the papers in the case are of opinion that the objections of the Auditor General to the payment of Mr. Werry's salary during the leave of absence granted him by the Order in Council of October 22, 1901 are not well taken and should be overruled, and they accordingly direct that Mr. Werry be paid his salary during such period of leave of absence.

Sir,-I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 4th instant, inclosing an appeal from the Department of Railways and Canals aganst my objection to the payment of Miss Costin, temporary clerk, for certain days of absence from the department.

The only legislative authority that I know of for the giving of leave of absence to employees is the 49 th section of 49 Victoria, chapter 17, the Civil Service Act. $1-5 \mathrm{~A}$

This, according to the opinion of Mr. Power, chief clerk of the Department of Justice, applies exclusively to permanent employees, although he argues that the power to grant leave may exist independently with the government. Now, my reason for thinking that this power cannot rest independently with the government is that it is not reasonable to suppose that the section referred to is a restraining clause, so far as the permanent Civil Service is concerned, if the power already existed without restriction with reference to both the temporary and permanent clerks. If such power did exist the section would have been made to apply also to temporary employees, because it is not to be supposed that it would be intended that temporary employees should be given greater privileges than permanent ones.

Then, there is no appropriation from which pay can be made for days on which no work is performed. It will be admitted that you cannot pay an extra clerk employed in the Interior Department from the vote for the Public Works Department, and yet it is contended that you can pay him from the Public Works Department appropriation for extra clerks if he has worked nowhere. With as much reason you might claim that, although a vote for the construction of the St. Lawrence canals would not authorize the construction of the Georgian Bay canal, it would authorize the payment of a claim when no work has been performed. I quite see that if the wording of the appropriation described leave of absence as payable out of an appropriation for extra clerks, parliamentary authority would be given.

I may be allowed to say that in my opinion the overcrowding of the Civil Service which has always been a ground of trouble, is to be increased by the practice of recognizing the claim of extra clerks to all their sick or recreation leave, no matter how long or how short the service may have been. It will remove about the only safeguard against a temporary clerk, once he enters the service, becoming a permanent charge on Dominion funds. As it has been, a Deputy Minister, no matter how pressing the work was, feared the prospect of incurring a permanent charge if he employed an extra clerk to do it, but in the future, if he is cautious, he will stagger under the temporary pressure.

The service and the temporary clerks would both be benefited if the clerks were temporary in reality; but if it is to be so arranged that with any foothold they cannot be removed, what is the service to become?

Sir,-I have the honour to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 31st ultimo relating to the case of Miss Costin, a temporary clerk in the, Department of Railways and Canals.

The Auditor General objects to the payment of Miss Costin for certain days during which she was absent under leave, authorized by Order-in-Council of October 22 last, and the Department of Railways and Canals has appealed to the Treasury Board from this ruling. The Auditor General takes objection to the payment partly under subsection (a) of section 32 of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, holding that there is no parliamentary authority for granting leave with pay to temporary clerks, and that there is no appropriation from which pay can be made for days on which no work is performed.

You ask to be advised as to whether, in the opinion of the Attorney General of Canada, there is any, and if so what, parliamentary authority for the payment in question.

As to the first point taken by the Auditor General, I need do no more than refer to my letter of the 21st ultimo dealing with the same point in connection with the case of Mr. F. O. Werry.

As to the second point, I am to state that Miss Costin did not cease to be a temporary clerk while absent upon leave and dispensed from work, and she is entitled to her pay as such, unless the Order in Council granting the leave provides otherwise.

The Attorney General is of opinion, therefore, that there is parliamentary authority in the Civil Service Act and the Appropriation Act for the payment in question.

Sir,-I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of July 9 last, inclosing an appeal from my decision in connection with the application of the Department of Justice for payments in re Lussier vs. the Queen, under the award of Mr. E. R. Cameron.

I objected to the payments, as they seemed in contravention of the Order in Council of August 19, 1899, which is in the following words: 'That the provisions of the 9 th section of the Order in Council of July 27, 1882, which provides, amongst other things, that at any time, if the public service requires it, the heads of departments or deputy heads, to have the right to call for the attendance of all or any of the officers or clerks at an earlier or later hour than those named, be confirmed.
'That no extra salary or additional remuneration, of any kind whatsoever, be paid to any deputy head, officer or employee of the Civil Service of Canada, unless an amount to provide for the payment has first been specially voted by parliament.'

The Department of Justice says that these payments would not be extra salary or additional remuneration within the meaning of that Order in Council.

To my mind the words, 'No extra salary or additional remuneration of any kind whatsoever,' are evidently introduced for an important purpose, which is to prevent a permanent public employee from obtaining anything but one salary, whether the claim for additional salary arises from work which may be considered as part of the duties of his own branch, or from duties performed outside his branch of the public service.

One can understand that there may have been two different objects in passing the Order in Council, one that one salary should be supposed to be all the remuneration of any kind that a man might look forward to, and the other that, as long as a person did all the work of his own branch, any time that was left to him might be utilized in another branch or department. In my view, the words used in the Order in Council are so wide in their meaning that the intention must have been in using them that a person should be paid only in one branch, and there only his fixed salary. If this view, which strikes me as correct, is accepted by the Treasury Board, then the conclusion is that the payments for which application is made are not legal.

My objection is taken under section 32, subsection (c) of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, on the ground that the payments are 'in excess of the authority granted by Council.'

## Railways and Canals Dept.: Sheik's Island Dams-New Extra Claims on Davis \& Sons' Contracts.

Dept. of Railways and Canals, October 6, 1894.
Sir,-A question has arisen with Messrs. Davis \& Sons, contractors for the construction of the Sheik's Island dams, as to the prices which apply to the several classes of work, and as I do not wish to make a false step, I shall be glad if you will advise me of the schedule of prices I should adopt.

I send herewith the agreement, dated June 19, 1893, for the construction of the Sheik's Island dam works, contract No. 4, Cornwall canal, dated November 5, 1888, and a supplementary agreement for some work on section 4, dated August 25, 1892 ; also copies of letters addressed to Superintending Engineer Rubidge by Messrs. Davis \& Sons, dated July 3, 1890, and September 25, 1891; the estimate of Mr. Rubidge, upon which the contract was based, dated May 1, 1893, and a schedule of prices, to which, under the contract, Messrs. Wm. Davis \& Sons consider they are entitled, and based upon which they ask that the estimates be prepared.

As the monthly progress estimates for August and September are being held back pending your advice, I shall be glad if you will give the matter as early attention as possible.

SIR,-I have the honour to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 6 th instant, submitting certain contracts and correspondence with regard to the construction of the Cornwall canal.

It appears that Messrs. Wm. Davis \& Sons, by a contract of November 5, 1888, undertook the work connected with section 4. This contract is in the ordinary form in use by your department, with specifications and list of prices for the various kinds of work which were to be executed. A second contract was entered into with these contractors, dated August 25, 1892, by which the contractors undertook to do certain additional work in deepening and widening sections 2,3 and 4, and straightening the channel on section 2.

By the terms of this contract, the provisions of the previous contract of November 5,1888 , are incorporated with it and made applicable to the new work undertaken, except in so far as modified by the terms of certain letters annexed. These letters, in so far as they relate to section 4 and to prices, stipulated for a price of 45 cents for earth excavation per cubic yard in widening and deepening the prism, or, as is stated in the contractors' letter of June 20, 1892, 'for all other extra excavation required in the widening and deepening of the enlargement of the Cornwall canal beyond and over and above what is specified in our contract with the government, dated November 5, 1888, and referred to in the plans and specifications accompanying the same at the following prices : earth excavation, 45 cents per cubic yard.'

Referring now to the schedule of prices which accompanies the papers, and according to which the contractors claim to be paid, it would seem to be clear that the contractors are entitled to be paid at the rate of 45 cents per cubic yard, if the several items of earth excavation mentioned in the sohedule, for which 45 cents per cubic yard is charged, by virtue, as it is claimed, of this special agreement, are for excavating in widening and deepening the enlargement of the canal as contemplated by the special agreement.

There is also a third agreement of June 19, 1893, by which the contractors undertook to construct certain proposed dams at Sheik's Island, in connection with the Cornwall canal enlargement under the special covenants and stipulations contained in the contract of November 5, 1888, and for which it is stipulated that the contractors shall be paid 'the several prices, 'in so far as applicable thereto, set forth in their said contract of November 5, 1888, without any extra charge or addition to the said contract prices, all the conditions of which said contract are to be applied mutatis mutandis.'

It now appears that previous to the last-mentioned agreement a price had been fixed by the engineer under the provisions of the contract of November 5, 1888, for masonry made with Portland cement, for which no price had been fixed by the contract itself, and the contractors claim that by virtue of the agreement of June 19, 1893, the prices so fixed for masonry made with Portland cement became applicable to the works to be performed under the latter contract.

I am to state, however, that in the opinion of the minister, the agreement of June 19, 1893, does not fix any prices to be paid for the works to be done thereunder, except those prices which are set forth or mentioned in the contract of November 5,1888 , and, as to works performed under contract of June, 1893, to which none of the prices mentioned in the contract of November, 1888, are applicable, no price appears to have been fixed by contract, and it will be necessary, therefore, to have such prices ascertained under the general provisions of the contract of November, 1888, applicable to the case of extra works or works performed for which no prices are fixed by the contract.

Sir,-Having reference to my letter to you of the 9 th ultimo with regard to the prices which should be allowed to Messrs. Wm. Davis \& Sons under certain contracts between them and the government in respect of the Cornwall canal, and to the conversation which we had with the Auditor General a day or two ago, I have the honour to state that it now appears that the schedule of prices which accompanied your letter of the 6th ultimo, and according to which the contractors then claimed to be paid, does not relate to earth excavation done under the agreement of 25th August, 1892, but relates entirely to work performed under the agreement of 19th June, 1893.

The advice of the Minister of Justice upon the questions intended to be submitted by your letter of 6th ultimo is, therefore, contained in the concluding paragraph of my letter of 9 th ultimo, wherein I had the honour to state 'that, in the opinion of the Minister, the agreement of the 19th June, 1893, does not fix any prices to be paid for the works to be done thereunder, except those prices which are set forth or mentioned in the contract of the 5th of November, 1888, and as to works performed under the contract of June, 1893, to which none of the prices mentioned in the contract of November, 1888, are applicable, no price appears to have been fixed by contract and it will be necessary, therefore, to have such prices ascertained under the general provisions of the contract of November, 1888, applicable to the case of extra works or works performed for which no prices are fixed by contract.'

I may add that the agreement of the 25 th August, 1892, is not, in my opinion, material upon the question of construing the contract of 1893.

## Dept. of Justice, Ottawa, February 4, 1895.

Sir,-I have the honour, by direction, to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 26th ultimo, inclosing further papers in relation to the contract of Messrs. William Davis \& Sons in connection with Sheik's Island dams.

Under their contract dated 19th June, 1893, it is provided that Messrs. William Davis \& Sons, contractors for the Sheik's Island dam, are to be paid at the prices stated in their contract for the fourth section of the Cornwall canal, dated 5th November, 1888, in so far as they are applicable.

You inform me that Messrs. Davis \& Sons contend that the agreement dated the 25 th of August, 1892, is to be read as part of the contract of 5th November, 1888, and that inasmuch as the excavation in question is similar to the work described in the agreement of the 25 th August, 1892, the price of 45 cents per cubic yard, named therein, should apply to the item in question, rather than the price of 32 cents, which you, as Chief Engineer, have taken from the schedule of prices attached to the contract of 5th November, 1888, and applied to Progress Estimates.

From your explanation of the plans connected with the various works I understand that the work in reference to which the price of 45 cents for excavation is claimed is similar to the work contemplated by the contract of the 25th August, 1892.

I gathered from your explanation also that the work contemplated by the contract of August 25, 1892, covers the same location as the agreement concerning the 4th section of the Cornwall canal, dated November 5, 1888. It is, in fact, a contract for the widening and deepening of that work.

Clause 1 of the contract of August 25, 1892, provides :
${ }^{\text {' That the works which under the said respective three indentures of the fifth day }}$ of November, A.D. 1888, the contractors agreed to perform are to be carried out sub-
ject to the alterations and additions mentioned in the said letters hereunto annexed, which are to be read and construed as part of this indenture.'

Mr. Rubidge, Superintending Engineer, in one of these letters, June 20, 1892, writes:
' I beg to band you berewith a letter from Messrs. William Davis \& Sons, the contractors, in which they state the prices for which they are prepared to perform such additional work as may be required in connection with their contracts, viz.: For straightening the channel on section 2 between lock 18 and end of the section.

'For all excavation other than the above on sections 2,3 and 4 , required in widening and deepening the prism :

Messrs. Davis \& Sons in the letter referred to write :
' Also as stated in our letter of April 24, 1891, all other extra excavations required in the widening and deepening of the enlargement of the Cornwall canal, beyond and over and above what is specified in our contracts with the government, dated November 5,1888 , and referred to in the plans and specifications accompanying the same at the following prices :-
' Earth excavation, 45 cents per cubic yard.
'Rock excavation as per contract.'
The late Chief Engineer of your department writes under date, July 5, 1892 :
' I have had several interviews on the subject with William Davis \& Sons, the contractors for these sections, and they have submitted an offer under date, the 20th ultimo, by which they agree to do the work of widening and deepening outside the limits of their present contract at the rate of 45 cents per cubic yard, for earth excavation, the contract prices remaining, otherwise, unchanged.
' For the work of straightening the curve on the portion betwen lock No. 18, and the end of section 2, the contractors' proposed price for earth excavation is 40 cents per cubic yard, the contract price otherwise remaining the same.'

Clause 5 of this contract, August 25, 1892, reads as follows :-
' And it is hereby agreed by and between the parties hereto that the said three indentures of the 5th day of November, A.D. 1888, respectively, and this indenture are to be read together, as constituting the contract between them, with respect to the works in connection with the widening and deepening of the prism on sections 2, 3 and 4 , of the Cornwall canal, and the straightening of the channel on the said section No. 2, between lock No. 18 and the end of section No. 2 and all works therein contemplated.'

In the opinion of the Minister of Justice the agreement of August 25, 1892, is not, for all purposes, to be read as part of the contract of November 5, 1888.

It distinctly appears that these agreements are to be read together with reference only to the works specially named in clause 5 , and from the correspondence it further appears that the special prices for earth excavation have reference to the work contemplated by the agreement of August 25, 1892, and to no other.

Sir,-Referring to your letters of October 9, 1894, and November 6, 1894, upon the accompanying file and to the schedule of prices of November 9,1894 , prepared in accordance therewith, and inclosed under file 6392, I have the honour, by direction, to call your attention to the prices allowed in the schedule for 'earth excavation for regulating weir, 40 c .,' and for 'earth excavation in entrance to canal, 32 c .,' which prices have been extracted from item 55 and item 1 of the schedule on page 6 of the contract of November 5, 1888, and am, by direction, to request that you will be pleased to advise the department whether these prices were correctly allowed under the contract of June 16, 1893, for the class of work referred to.

I inclose copies of the contract of November 5, 1888, and June 19, 1893, under which the present question has arisen, together with the papers.

Sin,-Referring to previous correspondence, and particularly to your letter of March 28 last, with respect to the prices which should be paid for earth excavation under the contract with Messrs. Wm. Davis \& Sons, of June 19, 1893, I am directed to state that the matter has been under the consideration of the Minister of Justice, and, considering the contracts of 1888,1892 and 1893 together, he has come to the conclusion, though not without some doubt, having regard to the view previously expressed by the department, that the effect of the contract of 1892, particularly the 5th clause thereof, is to amend and modify the contracts of 1888 , so that after the execution of the contract of 1892, the three contracts of 1888 and the contract of 1892 have to be read together as constituting the contract between the parties with respect to all the works contemplated in these four contracts, and it would follow, therefore, that when by the contract of 1893 it was declared that 'the indenture of November 5,1888 , and this indenture, are to be read together as constituting the contract between them with respect to the works in connection with the formation of section 4 of the said Cornwall canal,' the indenture of November 5, 1888, so referred to, must be taken to be that indenture as amended by the contract of 1892 , so that the prices provided by the indenture of 1888 as so amended would be the prices in so far as they are applicable, which would apply to the works under the contract of 1893.

This general statement of the position will, the minister hopes, enable you to apply the correct scale of prices in settlement with Messrs. Wm. Davis \& Sons.

Sir,-With reference to your letter of 10th April, 1901, advising that the Minister of Justice has concluded that the prices applicable to the Davis contract of 1893 are the prices of the contract of 1888 as amended by the contract of 1892 , I have the ${ }^{-}$ honour, by direction, to inform you that the excavation for which an estimate is at present required is shown on the plan herewith inclosed, and constitutes the cut at the lower dam on section 5, with the connecting dredging on the southern bank of
the section extending past the Milleroches culvert, and also the cut at the upper dam on section 8, with the excavation on the northern bank of the section required in straightening the approach to the cut.

I am instructed to add that the work to which I refer is not covered by the Davis contracts of 1888 or 1892, but arises under the contract of 1893. Applying to the contract of 1893 the interpretation of the Minister of Justice, as communicated by yourself, it would appear that the price at present to be allowed is forty-five cents ( 45 cents) per cubic yard ; being the price fixed by the contract of 1892 for all excavation in deepening and widening the prism of the canal over and above what is specified in the contract of 1888.

I am, by instruction, to submit to you this application to the present case of the views of the Minister of Justice, and to request your confirmation or correction.

Sir,-I have the honour to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 1st instarit (120205), and in reply I beg to state that if the work referred to in that letter consists of earth excavation in widening and deepening the prism of the canal, outside the limits of the original contract of 1888, and does not consist in excavation for the straightening of the curves within the meaning of the contract of 1892, the price to be paid, according to the interpretation placed by the Minister of Justice upon the contract of 1893 , is 45 cents per cubic yard.

It is of course the function and duty of the engineer to decide as to whether the work in question is or is not of that character.

## Office of the Minister of Justice, Ottawa, June 1, 1901.

Sir,-I concur in the letter to you of the Deputy Minister of Justice of May 7, 1901 ; but I take the word 'straightening' in the contract of 1892 to be used synonymously with the words 'widening and deepening,' and as the straightening referred to in that contract for which the price was fixed at forty (40) cents, only applied to the limited area therein mentioned, namely, between lock 18 and end of section 2, and all other widening and deepening beyond what was specified in the contracts, November 5, 1888, was to be paid at forty-five (45) cents, and the area in the contract of 1893 being outside of the area between lock 18 and the end of section 2, and outside the area covered by the said contracts of 1888 , the price to be paid for all the work in dispute, namely, item earth excavation in entrance to canal and earth excavation for regulating weir mentioned in progress certificate of date June 30, 1900, should be paid for at the price of forty-five (45) cents per cubic yard.

## Audit Office, Ottawa, October 14, 1901.

Sir,-I beg to inclose a bundle of papers in connection with a matter in difference with Wm. Davis \& Sons in regard to their contract with the government for the building of the Sheik's Island dam portion of the Cornwall canal. Please give me your view of the question.

The items are 3 and 4 on the document marked A, which is estimate 34 (estimate not printed). As moneyed out according to the contention of the contractors, and as endorsed by the present Minister of Justice (see letters of May 7 and June 1, from Justice Department to Department of Railways and Canals) they are :

The prices which it was contended by the Railway Department in 1894, and which were approved by the Minister of Justice of the time, Sir John Thompson, were 40c. and 32c. (see letters of October 9 and November 6, 1894 from Justice Department to Department of Railways and Canals).

a difference of $\$ 25,431.62$.
The unsigned memorandum, which is also inclosed, was handed to me by Mr . Fitzpatrick, Solicitor General, as his view of the case. Perhaps the opinion which you gave to me in 1894, will be of advantage. The dates, November 7, 1894, of your opinion, and October 9, 1894, of that of Sir John Thompson, would indicate that you were dealing with the same question as the one submitted to the Justice Department for an opinion, but if so, either I neglected to bring before you the contract of August 25,1892 , or you did not think that it affected the case, and therefore did not mention it. My communication with you was evidently verbal, as appears from the beginning of your letter. Then, there is no copy of a letter to you in the letter book of this office.

The contractors, who practically finished their work in 1898, and who, so far as can be seen, acquiesced in the opinion of Sir John Thompson, given in 1894, may be considered, I suppose, to have, in legal language, slept on their rights.

SESSIONAL PAPER No. 1

Sir C. H. Tupper agreed in opinion with Sir John Thompson, as shown by a letter of the Department of Justice to the Department of Railways on February 4, 1895.

I need say nothing more than that the Department of Railways could never have supposed at the time the contract was being executed that the opinion held by the present Minister of Justice was to hold.

Memorandum by Solicitor General on Davis' Claims.
Re claim of Davis \& Sons, contractors, for excavations in connection with the construction of the Sheik's Island dam. It will facilitate the investigation of this matter to refer shortly to some of the clauses of the three agreements between the contractors and the Department of Railways and Canals and the letters relating thereto.

The first agreement is dated November 5, 1888, and the work to be constructed thereunder is described as follows :-
'The lock to be built, the gates hung and in working order, and the dredging and other works connected with the deepening and widening of the Cornwall canal on section No. 4, completed the first day of November, A.D. 1890, and the supply weir, walls, \&c., by the first day of April, A.D. 1891.'

Paragraph 5 of this agreement provides as follows, amongst other things :-
'The engineer shall be at liberty at any time to order any extra work to be done and to make any changes which he may deem expedient in the dimensions, character, nature, location or position of the works, or any parts thereof, or in any other thing connected with the works, and the contractors shall immediately comply with all written requisitions of the engineer in that behalf. And the decision of the engineer as to the amount to be paid shall be final.'

It having been decided to widen and deepen the canal, on June 20, 1892, as the result of some negotiations, Davis \& Sons wrote to T. S. Rubidge, the resident engineer of canals, making offer for certain additional excavations, as follows :-
(a) Excavations for straightening the canal between lock 18 and end of section 2 of the north side, earth 40 cents per cubic yard.
(b) All other excavations required in widening and in deepening of the enlargement of the canal beyond, and over and above what was specified in their contract of 1888, earth excavation 45 cents per cubic yard.

Mr. Rubidge, the resident engineer, forwarded this letter to Mr. Trudeau, chief engineer of canals, stating that he considered the rates proposed as fair and reasonable, 'taking into consideration the fact that the greater part of their previous work will have to be done over again, and also that all the material to be removed is earth in its natural state.'

Thereupon, on July 5, Mr. Trudeau addressed the secretary of his department, stating that he had had interviews with the contractors and that the offer had been carefully considered by the superintending engineer who thought the prices proposed were fair and reasonable, and concurring in this opinion, recominended that the offer be accepted. Thereupon a contract was signed on August 25, 1892, between the contractors and the Minister of Railways and Canals, which recites that the work of deepening and widening sections 2,3 and 4 of the canal, and straightening the channel on section No. 2, had been decided upon, and an agreement arrived at for the execution of the works by the contractors upon the terms mentioned in a letter addressed to them by the superintending engineer, dated June 20, and upon the terms of the letter of the chief engineer of July 5 ; and then goes on to provide :.

1st. That the works covered by the agreement of November 5, 1888 are to be carried out subject to the alterations and additions mentioned in the letters annexed, which are to be read and construed as part of this agreement, and that the contractors shall complete the work with such alterations and additions.

2nd. That the covenants in the indenture of November, 1888 shall apply to the new works.

3rd. That they shall be paid the prices mentioned in the letters, and
4th. That the indenture of 1888 and this indenture are to be read together as constituting the contract between them with respect to the works in connection with the widening and deepening of the prism on sections 2,3 and 4 of the canal, and the straightening of the channel on section 2, and all works therein contemplated.

When this work was in progress, the chief engineer, thinking it desirable that the work in connection with the canal enlargement should be coupled with the dam on Sheik's island, instructed the superintending engineer to report on the matter, which he did by his letter, dated May 1, 1892, and in which he estimates the work at $\$ 384,000$ less land and damages to mill property, points out the intimate connection between the new work and the work of Davis \& Company, on section No. 4, and concludes as follows:-
' Under these circumstances I think it would be in public interest to at once ascertain from the contractors for section No. 4, which is now nearly completed, upon what terms they would consent to extend their operations to include the building of the dam and the required modification and changes in the structure built or to be built on section No. 4.'

Upon receipt of this letter the chief engineer inclosed the same to the Minister of Railways and Canals, accompanied by a letter of his own confirming the recommendations of Mr. Rubidge, and saying :
'Under all the circumstances, if it can be done, I strongly recommend the Davis contract No. 4 be extended to cover this work, if the Messrs. Davis \& Sons are willing.'

This suggestion was adopted by the minister, and thereupon an Order in Council was passed, dated May 10, 1893, reciting the above facts and concluding as follows :-
'The minister concurring, recommends that authority be given for the extension of the contract with Messrs. Davis \& Sons accordingly, provided that they agree to dothe work at their present contract prices.'

Pursuant to this Order in Council, a contract of June 19, 1893 was entered into, first reciting as follows :-
'Whereas in and by a certain indenture bearing date the 5 th day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, the said contractors did for the considerations therein mentioned contract and agree with Her Majesty for the construction and completion of certain works necessary for the construction of a lift-lock, supply weir, drainage culvert, the deepening and enlarging of the prism on the Cornwall canal, on section No. 4, of said canal, which works are particularly set forth in the specifications annexed to the said indenture.'

And proceeding further to recite the importance, in the public intcrest, of giving the contract to Davis \& Son, and the above Order in Council proceeds as follows :-

1. That the works which under the said indenture of the 5th day of November, 1888 , the contractors agreed to perform, are to be carricd out subject to the addition of the dams above mentioned, \&c.
2. The covenants in the indenture of the 5th November, 1888, are to apply to the works undertaken by this indenture.
3. Her Majesty covenants to pay the contractors for the works therein undertaken, the several prices in so far as applicable thereto, set forth in the said contract of the fifth November, 1888.

The point in dispute between the contractors and the government is shortly this : The department say : You are only to get the contract prices set out in the
contract of 1888 where they are applicable, and where not applicable at such prices as may be fixed by the engineer for extra works performed, for which no prices are fixed by the contract; and that the contract of 1892 must not be looked at in the matter in any way whatsoever.

The contractors, on the other hand, claim that the contract of 1888 was amended by the provisions of 1892, and that where the contract of 1888 is referred to in the contract of 1893, what is intended is not the contract of 1888 as originally made but as amended by the indenture of 1892.

First, then, looking at the three contracts alone, this very significent fact appears, namely, that at the time the contract of 1893 was entered into the contractors had not completed the works provided for by the indenture of 1888 as amended by 1892, and the very first provision of the new contract is a covenant by the contractors to complete the work provided by the 1888 contract. Now what is meant by this clause? Can there be any doubt that by this provision the contractors were required, not to abrogate the contract of 1892 and complete the work as originally provided by 1888, but to complete the work of 1888 as amended by 1892? It is not suggested that this clause has any other meaning, but it seems to me obvious that if such force must be given to paragraph 1, so that where the words 'Indenture of 1888' are used, we must interpret it as reading 'the indenture of 1888 as amended by the indenture of 1892,' there can be no reasonable or fair contention that when this indenture of 1888 is elsewhere referred to, it is not to be interpreted in the same manner.

In the next place, we find that although both the contracts of 1888 and 1892 were for the deepening and widening of the canal, in the contract of 1892 the new deepening and widening contracted for in paragraph 5 is referred to as widening and deepening the prism on sections 2,3 and 4 of the Cornwall canal, and not simply the ${ }^{\bullet}$ widening and deepening of the canal, which are the words used in the original indenture of 1888. When then we come to a recital in the new agreement of 1893 we find the work now under contract described, amongst other things, to be the deepening and enlarging of the prism of the Cornwall canal, and it seems to me that the use of the word 'prism' there, which does not appear in the original contract, but does in the amended contract of 1892, has some significance, and shows that the draftsman had in mind the amended contract and not the original one of 1888.
3. It is important to note also that the 5th paragraph of the indenture of 1892 expressly provides that the indentures of 1888 and 1892 are to be read together as constituting the contract between the parties for all works therein contemplated. Clearly, therefore, when in the document of 1893 the indenture of 1888 is referred to, it must be such contract as amended by the agreement of 1892, and not in its original form.
4. Looking now at the other documents, they also throw a very strong light upon the matter in dispute. It will be remembered that at the time the contract of 1893 was entered into, the prices which the contractors were receiving according to the particular work involved, fell into three classes, 1st, the prices for work as provided by the original contract of 1888, for which the schedule of prices in the original indenture set out governed; 2nd, the prices for the work required for straightening the channel on section between lock 18 and end of section, for which the contractors were to receive 40 cents per cubic yard ; and 3rd, all other excavations other than above, required in widening and deepening the prism.

It is clear, therefore, that when the contractors agreed to do the work on the Sheik's Island dam, at their present contract prices, they understood that the contract prices were those provided for by the original agreement as amended by the agreement of 1892, and consisting of the three classes above mentioned, and it is

equally clear that the Order in Council which provides that they are to get their present contract prices, was intended to have such interpretation. And whether or not unambiguous terms have been used in the operative part of the contract of 1893, to carry out the intention of all parties, there can be no doubt from the recitals and the documentary evidence what the intention of the parties was. But for the reasons above mentioned it appears to me that the words 'Indenture of the 5th day of November, 1888,' do mean, and were intended to mean, that indenture as amended by the agreement of 1892 .
5. That the parties intended that the contractors should receive pay based upon the amended agreement is evidenced also by the estimate of the cost made by Mr. Rubidge, which is based upon a payment to the contractors of 45 cents and 40 cents per cubic yard for portions of the work. And it is based upon the payment of such scale of prices that the original estimate of $\$ 384,000$ was arrived at. And it is to be noted that in allowing the contractors the prices claimed, the entire cost is something like $\$ 10,000$ less than the superintending engineer's estimate.
6. If we look at the two plans which have been subsequently prepared and filed since this case originally came under consideration, and which show the prices paid to the contractors for the three classes of work on the original contract and also the analogous work on the Sheik's Island dam, it is apparent that if the price of 45 cents was a reasonable one, as the engineer himself admits, for the work provided for under the new agreement of 1892 , it would be an equally reasonable price to allow the contractors for the same character of work required to be done in connection with the contract of 1893.

Sir,-Re Sheik's Island dams-Davis \& Sons contract.
The facts, as I understand them from your explanation at our interviews on the subject and from the papers handed to me are, shortly, as follows, :-

Davis \& Sons had a contract for the construction of certain works on section 4 of the Cornwall canal, dated November 5, 1888. During the progress of these work: the government decided to build the Sheik's Island dams in connection with the canal enlargement. Engineer Rubidge had submitted to the department an estimate of quantities, to which he had applied certain prices showing an estimated cost of $\$ 414,000$ for the dams, including $\$ 30,000$ for land and damage. The chief engineer addressed to the minister a letter, dated May 6, 1893, referring to Mr. Rubidge's estimate, pointing out certain reasons why in the public interest it would be advantageous to award the work of constructing the dams to Davis \& Sons, were that firm willing to do the same at their contract prices, and stating that at such contract prices, allowing $\$ 30,000$ for land and damages, the cost would amount to $\$ 404,485$, or some $\$ 10,000$ less than Mr. Rubidge's estimate ; and recommending that the Davis contract be extended to cover this work if these contractors were willing. In due course an Order in Council was passed giving authority for the extension of the contract with Davis \& Sons accordingly, 'provided that they agree to do the work at their present contract prices.' The contract with Davis \& Sons was not a bulk sum contract, but provided for the payment to the contractors for and in respect of the works contracted for, of the several prices or sums set forth in a schedule or list. The items of this list are seventy-six in number, and, I presume, include the various classes of work. material, \&c., entering into the works included in the contract. On June 19, 1893, a contract was entered into between Davis \& Sons and the government, reciting the contract of November 5, 1888, the letter of the chief engineer, dated May 6, 1893, and the Order in Council referred to, and providing that the works which, under the contract of November 5, 1888, the contractors agreed to perform, are to

be carried out subject to the addition of the dams above mentioned, and referred to in the letter of the chief engineer, which letter is made a part of the contract; providing also that each and every covenant contained in the contract of November 5,1888 , on the part of the contractors should apply to the additional works, except in so far as the same are in any way expressly modified by the terms of the engineer's letter; providing also that the contractors accept the terms set forth in the letter and agree to perform, keep and abide by the same. Her Majesty's covenant to pay for this additional work is as follows :- '4. And Her Majesty, in consideration of the premises, covenants and agrees with the contractors that they will be paid in respect of the works undertaken hereunder the several prices, in so far as applicable thereto, set forth in their said contract of November 5, 1888, without any extra charge or addition to the said contract prices; all the conditions of which contracts are to apply mutatis mutandis.' Clause 6 provides that the indenture of November 5, 1888, and this indenture are to be read together as constituting the contract with respect to the works in connection with the formation of section 4 of the said Cornwall canal.'

You have been asked, as Auditor General, to authorize the payment of certain moneys to the contractors in connection with the construction of the dams, and there has been submitted to you an account or estimate certified by the chief engineer, showing the quantities, \&c., of the work and applying thereto certain prices. These prices, in some instances; differ from any of the prices for similar works contained in the list forming part of the contract of November, 1888, and I gather that some of the items, according to the wording in the chief engineer's estimate, do not appear to be included in any item in the list referred to.

My opinion is asked as to the authority of the chief engineer to fix prices differing from those in the list for work included in items contained in the list ; also as to the authority of the engineer to fix prices for work, if any, not included in any item in the list. You also desire my opinion generally upon the legal position of the parties under the contracts.

In the contract of November, 1888, Her Majesty's covenant to pay is in these words : ' 24 . And Her Majesty, in consideration of the premises, hereby covenants with the contractors that they will be paid for and in respect of the works hereby contracted for, and in the manner set out in the next clause hereof, the several prices or sums following, viz.' (here follows the list of prices). The word 'works' is defined by the contract to mean the whole of the work and materials, matters and things required to be done, furnished and performed by the contractor under the contract. The following clause appears : ' 34 . It is distinctly declared that no implied contract of any kind whatsoever, by or on behalf of Her Majesty, shall arise or be implied from anything in this contract contained, or from any position or situation of the parties at any time, it being clearly understood and agreed that the express contracts, covenants and agreements herein contained and made by Her Majesty, are and shall be the only contracts, covenants and agreements upon which any rights against her are to be founded.'

I am of opinion-
(1.) That wherever the work done in connection with the dams is fairly covered by any item or items in the list under the contract of November, 1888, the prices applied thereto in such list must govern, and the chief engineer has no authority to vary such prices.
(2.) I am of opinion that, if any part of the work in connection with the dams cannot fairly be held to come within any item or items in the list, the chief engineer has no authority to fix prices therefor. The contract makes no provision for paying the contractors anything for such parts of the work ; there can be no implied contract on the part of Her Majesty to pay anything therefor, and I am forced to the conclusion
that the prices to be paid for the works to which the list, under the contract of November, 1888, is applicable, are the only prices which the contractors are entitled to demand. This may not have been intended by the parties, but I think it is the legal effect of what has been agreed to. In other words, I think that all the works connected with the construction of the dams must be performed for the prices which the contractors are to receive for those parts which are included in the items of the list.
(3.) The result of this may not be so serious as might be supposed, because I think that the chief engineer, as the person to whom all matters of difference arising under the contract are to be referred, would have considerable discretion in deciding the question as to the applicability of the items in the list to the works upon the dams. It would not, I think, be necessary that the exact wording of these items should precisely apply to the works on the dams. The contract provides that the several prices 'in so far as applicable thereto are to govern.' This question of applicability is one partly of fact and partly of scientific opinion, and if the decision of the chief engineer be given after proper consideration and in good faith, I think it cannot be controverted. I would call attention to the last four items of the list, which provide for the payment of labourers, carpenters, stonecutters and masons for executing works not embraced in any item paid for otherwise.
(4.) I think your duty is to call the attention of the chief engineer to the legal position of the parties as above explained, and to suggest that he should frame his estimate in accordance with the principles above alluded to.

Sir,-I am in receipt of yours of the 14th with respect to William Davis \& Sons' contract for the building of Sheik's Island dam, \&c., and I have considered the questions submitted.

I am of opinion that the expressions in the contract of the 19th of June, 1893, referring to the indenture of 5 th November, 1888, must be interpreted with regard to the surrounding circumstances, and to the various contracts at that time existing between the government and the contractors, and I have no hesitation in saying that these expressions referred to the indenture of 1888 as amended by the indenture of 1892.

By the express terms of the indenture of 1892 , the three indentures of 5 th November, 1888, and the indenture of 1892, are to be read together as constituting the contract between the parties. The three indentures of 1888, therefore, ceased to have an existence separated from the indenture of 1892, and any reference to the one would prima facie embrace the others, unless the context otherwise required.

I see nothing in the context of the indenture of 1893 which otherwise requires. On the contrary, reading the context in view of the surrounding circumstances, I think the references to the indenture of 1888 should not be read as excluding the indenture, which is practically part of it, made in 1892.

In this view, the covenant of the Crown contained in the indenture of 1893, that the contractors will be paid the several prices in so far as applicable thereto, set forth in their contract of 5th November, 1888, must be read as referring to that contract as amended in 1892, and the prices in this contract, as so amended, are the prices, so far as applicable to the works undertaken by the indenture of 1893 , which are to be paid to the contractors.

It is for the engineer to decide the question as to the applicability of those prices to the works done under the indenture of 1893. As stated in my opinion of Novem-
ber 7, 1894, this question of applicability is one partly of fact and partly of scientific opinion, and if the decision of the Chief Engineer be given after proper consideration and in good faith, I think it cannot be controverted.

In giving the opinion of November 7, 1894, I did not have before me the indenture of 1892, nor was my attention called to its existence. I considered the case then as if Davis \& Sons had only one contract for the construction of the works which was dated 5th November, 1888. Had my attention been called then to the indenture of 1892, the opinion I then expressed would not have been altered except to explain, as I have explained in this opinion, that the reference to the indenture of 1888 should be taken as meaning that indenture as amended in 1892.

I do not understand from your letter that you desire any opinion from me with respect to the applicability of the prices in the indenture of 1888, as amended in 1892, to any particular portion of the works done under the contract of 1893. If any such opinion is desired, I would require further information, from an engineering standpoint, than that which is contained in the documents sent, and which I return herewith.

Sir,-As requested in your communication of the 26th instant, re my two applications of August 9 last, in favour of Messrs. Wm. Davis \& Sons, for \$2,422.47 and $\$ 20,467.53$, respectively, and estimate No. 34 , on which they were based, I send you, attached hereto, a map showing the points as to which it became necessary to refer items Nos. 3 and 4 to the Justice Department for advice. A difference of opinion having arisen between the contractors and myself as to the prices which, under their contract, should apply, it was pointed out that the question was not only one of fact, but of law ; hence the reference to the Justice Department. I was advised by the Hon. the Minister of Justice on June 1, 1901, that I was wrong in applying 40 cents per cubic yard to No. 3 and 32 cents per cubic yard to No. 4 ; and that, under the contract, the contractors are entitled to 45 cents per cubic yard on No. 3 and 45
cents per cubic yard on No. 4, and in conformity with this advice, I gave the following certificate, viz. :-
'Certified as regards items Nos. 3 and 4, in accordance with the letter of the Minister of Justice, dated June 1, 1901.'

You ask me to give you the reasons for my own opinion. My reason for applying the prices I did to this work was that I did not consider the cutting through the canal bank, both at the upper and lower dams, and the cutting of the regulating weir, either 'widening,' 'deepening' or 'straightening,' in the sense of the contract. I can add nothing further in the matter. I inclose a cony of the letter of the Minister of Justice referred to above.

Dear Sir,-I have considered the questions arising in connection with the prices to be applied to the work done under the agreement of 1893.

In my opinion of 16th October, I explained that the contracts of 1888 and 1892 are to be read together.

The contract of 1892 provided for 'widening,' 'deepening' and 'straightening' certain portions of the canal. The prices for 'earth work' under the contracts of 1888 were 35 cents, 33 cents and 32 cents per cubic yard. The widening, deepening and straightening referred to would be earth work and had a special agreement as to prices therefor not been made, the prices for earth work under the contracts of 1888 would no doubt have been applied, but the contract of 1892 provides expressly that the price for the widening and deepening to be done under that contract shall be 45 cents per cubic yard and that the price for the straightening shall be 40 cents. Reasons are given in the contract (which is partly contained in a letter) for fixing the higher prices.

The contract of 1893 provides for the building of certain dams at Sheik's Island, and the prices for the works are to be 'the several prices in so far as applicable thereto set forth in their contract of 5th November, 1888.' As above mentioned, this is to be read as if the words were the contract of 1888, as amended or extended by the contract of 1892. The question therefore is what prices in the contracts of 1888 and 1892 are applicable to the work done under the contract of 1893. There are three contracts, all dated on November 5, 1898, but the one referred to in the contract of 1893 is that covering the lift lock, supply weir, \&c., on section 4.

What 'widening' or 'deepening' or 'straightening' a canal embraces must be something well known to engineers and contractors. I cannot well understand how the terms could apply to the building of dams, and it seems to me that each term has a pretty well defined meaning of its own. I have not been informed of the kinds
of work required in building the dams at Sheik's Island. Some of such work may have been widening or deepening or straightening the canal at that place, and if so, then the price to be applied for the earth work would to that extent be 45 cents per cubic yard for widening and deepening, and 40 cents for straightening, but outside of this I can see no reason for applying to earth work a different price than the price for the same kind of work fixed by the contract of 1888 covering the lift lock, \&c., on section 4, and I am of opinion that such price should have been applied.

Sir,-I have the honour by direction to inform you that objection has been taken by the Auditor General to the passing of an application made by this department for the payment to Wm. Davis \& Sons, under their contracts for work on the Cornwall Canal enlargement of certain moneys for work executed in connection with the Sheik's Island dam, namely, for earth excavation in the entrance to the canal, and earth excavation for the regulating weir. The Auditor General objects to the price, 45 cents per cubic yard, allowed for this excavation.

The work in question is covered by a contract made with this firm for works on the canal, namely, one dated November 5, 1888, for section 4, and one dated June 19, 1893, for the construction of dams at Sheik's island for the utilizing of the waters of the channel between that island and the mainland as the channel of the enlarged canal, the contract for section 4 being extended by the addition of the dams.

The difficulty arises out of the fact that on August 25, 1892, a contract had been made with Messrs Davis \& Sons for certain additional work on sections 2, 3 and 4 of the canal, for which the previous contract prices for earth excavation were thereby increased to 45 cents per cubic yard.

The Hon. the Minister of Justice having advised on June 1, 1901, that all the work in dispute should be paid for at the price of 45 cents per cubic yard, a progress estimate was prepared in accordance with this advice, and application was made to the Auditor General for payment. This he has returned, with an expression of opinion to the effect that the higher prices should not be paid.

I am directed to request that the matter be brought before the Honourable the Treasury Board under the provisions of the Audit Act, for their decision whether the Auditor General should be sustained in his objection or overruled.

Among the papers you will find the contracts referred to, a letter from Mr. Newcombe conveying the opinion of the late Minister of Justice, Sir John Thompson, the opinion of the present Minister of Justice and the opinion of Mr. Z. A. Lash, K.C. The opinion of the late Sir John Thompson and Mr. Lash differ from that of the present Minister of Justice. The Auditor General would like to have an opinion from you on this subject and to receive it as soon as possible, as the claim is now before the Treasury Board on an appeal from his (the Auditor General's) decision.

After reading the papers you will, I think, find no difficulty in seeing the points involved, particularly with the aid of the accompanying map and Mr. Schreiber's letter of October 28.

Sir,-Replying to your favour of 3rd instant, I have examined the file of departmental correspondence, with copies of the contracts under which Messrs, William Davis \& Sons are claiming from the government payment of $\$ 25,429.62$ additional for work of excavation in connection with dams at Sheik's island on the Cornwall canal.

My opinion is asked upon the right of Messrs. Davis \& Sons to this additional payment.

The question turns upon the true construction of the contract for the doing of this work.

Three separate contracts have to be considered :
First, the contract made November 5, 1888, for the building of a lock (Lock No. 20 ), and for the dredging and wiher work connected with the deepening and widening of the canal, including the construction of a supply weir, on section No. 4.

The specifications accompanying this contract have not been sent to me, but I gather from the contract itself that the work to be done was that above indicated.

I understand also that two other similar contracts for work on sections 3 and 2 of the Cornwall canal were entered into with Messrs. Davis \& Sons on the same date, November 5, 1888, but neither of the latter contracts is before me.

I understand further that the specifications to the contract for section No. 4 call for a depth of 15 feet and a bottom width of 90 feet to the prism of the canal as
widened under the contract. Under this contract the price for earth excavation under water line throughout the section was 32 cents per cubic yard, and for earth excavation in foundation of weir 40 cents per cubic yard.

This contract called for the completion of the work other than the weir by November 1, 1890, and of the weir by April 1, 1891, but the work was apparently not in fact completed when, on August 25, 1892, a further contract with Messrs. Davis \& Sons was entered into.

This contract incorporated with itself a letter of Messrs. Davis \& Sons to the superintending engineer of the canal, dated June 20, 1892, and a subsequent letter of the chief engineer of canals to the secretary of the department, dated July 5, 1892.

Under the contract of August 25, 1892, Messrs. Davis \& Sons undertook some further work of excavation, in deepening, widening and straightening the channel of the canal. The contract, read with the letters above referred to, shows very clearly what this work of additional excavation consisted in. It was the straightening of the channel of the canal on section No. 2, between lock No. 18 and the end of the section on the north side of the channel, and the widening of the prism of the canal to the bottom width of 100 feet instead of 90 feet, and the deepening of the channel to the depth of 16 feet instead of 15 feet.

The material to be moved in this work of straightening and of additional widening and deepening was earth in its natural state, none of it having been moved before, as was the case with the great part of the excavation embraced in the original contracts of November 5, 1888, for these sections. Moreover, the strip of additional material to be removed in this further work of straightening and of additional widening and deepening was narrow, so that frequent shifting of the contractors' plant would be necessary, and, in view of these circumstances, the price agreed upon for earth excavation in the additional work of straightening called for by the contract of August 25,1892 , was 40 cents per cubic yard, and for all other extra earth excavation required in the widening and deepening, 45 cents per cubic yard, instead of the figures agreed upon for earth excavation under the contracts of November 5, 1888.

The contract of August 25, 1892, refers to the three previous contracts of November 5, 1888, and binds the contractors to carry out the works which were to be performed under these three former contracts respectively, subject to the alterations and additions mentioned in the letters above referred to, and the contractors agreed to complete all of the said works with such alterations and additions on or before November 1, 1893.

The covenant of the Crown contained in the contract of August 25, 1892, is for payment at the increased prices for 'the works undertaken hereunder,' and it was further agreed that the three indentures of November 5, 1888, with the indenture of August 25, 1892, should be read together as constituting the contract with respect to the works on sections Nos. 2, 3 and 4 of the canal.

I may further observe that these three sections of the canal, 2, 3 and 4, are all in the eastern half of the canal, and that Sheik's island and the excavation which is now in question are some distance to the westward of the upper or west end of section No. 4.

On June 19, 1893, and probably before the work under the above mentioned contracts had been completed, a further contract was entered into by Messrs. Davis \& Sons, for the building of two dams, and the making of two cuts through the south bank of the canal, one dam and cut at the lower end of Sheik's island, opposite section No. 5 of the canal, and the other dam and cut at the upper end of Sheik's island, opposite section No. 8 of the canal. In connection with the lower of these two dams a regulating weir was also required across the point of the island. It is for the work of earth excavation in the construction of this regulating weir, and in making the cot at the lower dam on section 5, with the connected dredging on the southern bank of the sec-
tion, and also the cut at the upper dam on section 8, with the excavation on the northern bank of the section required in straightening the approach to the cut, that the claim for the additional payment of $\$ 25,429.62$ is now made by Messrs. Davis \& Sons.

The contention of Messrs. Davis \& Sons is that this work of earth excavation must be paid for at the price of 45 cents per cubic yard as, under the contract of 25 th August, 1892, and letters therein referred to, all extra excavation required in the widening and deepening of the enlargement of the canal beyond that specified in the contract of November, 1888, was to be paid for at that price, viz., 45 cents per cubic yard.

In my opinion this contention of the contractors is not well founded. The larger price of 45 cents per cubic yard mentioned in the contract of 25 th August, 1892, plainly applied only to the excavation in the additional width of 10 feet and additional depth of 1 foot referred to in the letters forming part of that contract. As to all the work of excavation specified in the original contracts of 5 th November, 1888, the prices named in such contracts continued to apply, and that price on section 4 was, for earth excavation under water line throughout the section, 32 cents per cubic yard, and for earth excavation in foundation of weir 40 cents per cubic yard.

In my opinion these prices of 32 cents per cubic yard and 40 cents per cubic yard respectively are the prices which should be paid for the work done under the contract of 19th June, 1893. That contract recites the indenture of 5th November, 1888 , and from first to last makes no reference to the supplementary contract of 25 th August, 1892. Under the last mentioned contract it is quite true that provision is made that the three indentures of 5th November, 1888, and this indenture of 25 th August, 1892, are to be read together as the contract between the parties, but that is plainly (as in fact the instrument states in so many words) with respect to the works on sections 2,3 and 4 of the canal. The contract of 1893 dealt with works on other sections and at some distance from the works previously undertaken, and if there had been any intention to apply to the contract of 1893 any of the provisions of the supplementary contract of 1892, I cannot understand how the contract of 1893 would have been so totally free from any reference to the supplementary contract of 1892.

The contract of 1893 applies to itself each of the covenants entered into by the contractors in the indenture (for work on section 4) of 5th November, 1888, and with regard to payment the express covenant of the Crown is 'in respect of the works undertaken hereunder' that the prices, in so far as applicable thereto, set forth in the said contract of 5th November, 1888, shall be paid 'without any extra charge or addition to the said contract prices.'

This language is to my mind conclusive that the parties at the time understood they were to be paid 32 cents per cubic yard for earth excavation under water line in the entrances to canal at the dams, and 40 cents per cubic yard for earth excavation in the regulating weir.

The reason for extra price of earth excavation under the supplementary contract of 1892 did not exist in the work of earth excavation to be done under the contract of 1893. The bank of the canal through which the two cuts were made at the lower and upper dam must have been in great part of made carth, and the frequent shifting of plant necessary in doing the work of additional widening and deepening under the contract of 1892 would not be requisite in cutting through the canal banks as called for by the contract of 1893.

Not only does the contract of 1893 recite the indenture of 5 th November, 1888, while absolutely silent with regard to that of 25th August, 1892, but the contract of 1893 recites also the report of the Chief Engineer of Canals on the subject of the construction of the proposed dams, stating that at the contract prices of Messrs. Wm. Davis \& Sons the estimated cost of the work, including $\$ 30,000$ for land and damages,

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would amount to $\$ 404,485$. This estimate appearing on the face of the indenture was necessarily before Messrs. Davis \& Sons when they entered into the contract of 1893, and it would seem scarcely possible that they were not aware of the way in which this estimate was made up. The original document is among the papers ou file in the department, now before me, and in reaching the amount of estimated total cost for the dams and weir $(\$ 404,485)$ the Chief Engineer has calculated earth excavation for the regulating weir at 40 cents per cubic yard, and earth excavation in entrance to canal at 35 cents per cubic yard, adopting apparently in his calculation the price of earth excavation in the contract of 5 th November, 1888, for section 2 of the canal, instead of 32 cents, the price in the contemporaneous contract for section 4.

This document showing the calculation of the Chief Engineer shows also the previous estimate of the superintending engineer for the same work, and the prices adopted by the superintending engineer in his calculations were 30 cents per cubic yard for earth excavation in the regulating weir, and 33 cents per cubic yard for earth excavation in entrance to the canal. While this estimate in detail is not incorporated into the contract, the result of it is, and the letter of the Chief Engineer dated 6th May, 1893, which is attached to the contract and in terms made part of it, states the result of the estimates made by the superintending engineer and by the Chief Engineer respectively. The details by which these results were reached were then on file in the department, and I thought it no violent presumption to assume that the contractors had at the time access to them and perfect knowledge of them. If that is so, the circumstance would seem to me decisive of the question, but apart from that circumstance the language of the contract of 1893 seems to me consistent only with applying to the excavation in question the prices of 32 cents and 40 cents specified in the contract of 5th November, 1888, for section 4.

I might further point out that under the contract of 1892 the extra price of 45 cents per cubic yard mentioned in the letter of Messrs. Davis \& Sons of June 20, 1892, extends only to 'all other extra excavation required in the widening and deepening of the enlargement' of the canal.

The question of what is the widening and deepening of the canal may be one more for the determination of engineers than one upon which I can express any opinion, but I have the advantage or disadvantage of a personal acquaintance with the locality in question, and I would scarcely consider the cuts through the canal bank at the dams, or the construction of the regulating weir on Sheik's island, work of either widening or deepening the enlargement of the canal.

I have only to say further that if the work of excavation now in question is not within the description of similar work in items Nos. 1 and 55, respectively, of the schedule of prices in the contract for section 4, of November 5, 1888, it would seem to me no prices at all for this work were fixed by the contract of 1893, in which view it would doubtless be necessary to have such prices ascertained under the general provisions of the contract of November 5, 1888, applicable to the case of extra work for which no prices are fixed by any of the contracts. This observation may have pertinence in regard to earth excavation above the water line and the earth excavation in construction of the regulating weir. The price of 32 cents per cubic yard for earth excavation under the water line is doubtless larger than the contractors would expect to receive for similar earth excavation above the water line, and similarly, the price of 40 cents per cubic yard for earth excavation in the foundation of the supply weir on section 4 may be a price for much more difficult work than that of excavating the regulating weir in question.

## Audit Office, Ottawa, December 26, 1901.

Sir,-I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 26th ultimo, which accompanied an application of the Department of Railways and Canals for an overruling of my decision that a claim of Messrs. Wm. Davis \& Sons, in connection with the Sheik's Island dam contract, for $\$ 25,429.62$ was untenable.

You will please receive inclosed herewith, all the papers which were forwarded to me by you in support of the claim, and an opinion which I have just received from A. B. Aylesworth, K.C., on the claim.

It is apparent that Mr. Schreiber, the Chief Engineer of the Department of Railways and Canals is unfavourable to the claim. Although he signed the estimate 34, which included the disputed claim now under consideration, his certificate included the unusual modification : 'Certified as regards items 3 and 4 in accordance with letter of the Minister of Justice, dated June 1, 1901.' That indicated that he did not follow his own view, but that of the Minister of Justice. By referring to the letter of October 9, 1894, from the Deputy Minister of Justice to the Deputy Minister of Railways it appears that the then Minister of Justice, Sir John Thompson, was against the claim, for the subject was even then before the Department of Justice.

The distinguished King's Counsel, Messrs. Lash \& Aylesworth, have no hesitation in their opinions that the claim has no ground for recognition. The opinions should be read at length by the Board. They are not long and it would be impossible to make abstracts to convey the meaning as it should be. Then the amount involved justifies the bestowing of needed time to its consideration. The only legal opinion on the file, or which has been brought to my notice in any way, which is favourable to the claim, is that of the present Minister of Justice. It is in a letter of May 10, 1901, marked 'H.' It was placed before both Mr. Lash and Mr. Aylesworth by me.

I never saw any ground for the claim. What struck me as particularly strong was the point brought out by Mr. Aylesworth, on page 6, of his opinion, viz. : That the estimate of the Chief Engineer, worked out at the prices already allowed, was referred to in the contract and must therefore have been before the contractors when the contract was being signed, and therefore all parties knew that the prices for widening, deepening and straightening provided for in exceptional circumstances by the contract of 1892, were not to be allowed when the circumstances were not exceptional.

My objection is under subsection (c) of section 32 of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act.

It is impossible, in a force performing the varied duties of the Mounted Police, extending over such a large area of territory, to keep the expenditure exactly within the limit of each sub-head of the appropriation.

The over-expenditure of $\$ 10,960.39$ in the item of 'Scouts, guides, \&c.,' is explained by an underexpenditure of $\$ 13,083.74$ in the sub-head of 'Pay of Force'.

The absence of so many Mounted Policemen on the South African Contingents, and calls for men for service in the Yukon, necessitated the employment of an unusual number of scouts or special constables. and largely increased travelling expenses of members of the force in patrolling all sections of the Territories, -Fred. White, Comptroller.

## Glasgow Exhibition.

Audit Office, Ottawa, December 31, 1901.
Sir,-Referring to your expenditure on account of 'Glasgow Exhibition,' let me call your attention to the following :-

The Order in Council of November 17, 1900, in addition to its other provisions, authorizes the minister to secure outside space, 1,200 feet at 3 d . per foot, ' equalling the sum of $£ 150$ ( $\$ 730$ ).' There is, you will see, an error in the calculation 1,200 feet at 3 d ., amounting to $£ 15$.

The Order in Council referred to also authorizes the construction of a Canadian pavilion at a cost not to exceed $£ 1,500$. There was paid by your department cheque 2319, February, 1901, $\$ 3,893.33$, £850, and Mr. Scott, on March 28, at Glasgow, paid $£ 1,190$ on this account, making a total to June 30,1901 , of $£ 2,040$, exceeding the amount authorized by £5540.
H. M. Murray received through the High Commissioner's office, in December, 1900 , £250, of which £150 was paid for the outside space at the exhibition, leaving $£ 100$ not accounted for. He also received from J. G. Jardine £129 4s. 0d. to pay freight on goods shipped from Paris to Glasgow. No vouchers have been returned against this payment.

Mr. Brodie makes this charge in his account paid by Mr. Scott, May 23, 1901, at Glasgow (voucher 338).

Sir,-In reply to your letter under date, the 31st ultimo., referring to certain expenditure on account of the Glasgow Exhibition, I have the honour to inform you that, with regard to the Order in Council of November 17, 1900, there has been a clerical error in reference to the number of feet authorized for outside space at the exhibition. Twelve hundred feet should read twelve thousand feet, which at 3d. per foot would be $£ 150$.

With reference to the Order in Council authorizing the construction of a Canadian building at a cost not to exceed $£ 1,500$, this item was merely an estimate, and after the arrival of the Commissioner at Glasgow it was found that $£ 1,500$ would only cover the cost of the plain building. Further expenditure was required to make it correspond with the buildings of other nations. This exhibition has been very economically managed and the total expenditure will not, I think, exceed the amount roted by parliament.

With regard to the item $£ 100$ advanced to H. M. Murray, though the High Commissioner's Office, I may say that Mr. Murray has been requested to give a detailed statement covering this advance, and so soon as received it will be submitted to you.

The advance of $£ 129$ 4s. to Mr. Murray from Mr. Jardine was for the payment of freight, and we hope in the course of a few days to receive from Mr. Murray vouchers in support of this item.

Mr. Brodie's charge of $\$ 3.55$ for hotel bills should not have been paid, as his per diem allowance was intended to cover all expenses. He has been requested to make a refund of this amount.

On the statements as above, there are credits from various sales amounting to $11,392 \cdot 04$ francs, making a net expenditure of $479,989 \cdot 60$ francs, which, exchanged at the current rate of $19 \cdot 3$ cents to a franc, amounts to $\$ 92,637.89$, and this with the $\$ 2,918.39$, totals $\$ 95,556.28$, against the advances of $\$ 97,132.97$, leaving a balance in the hands of these disbursing officials of $\$ 1,476.69$. I cannot tell, from the incomplete returns made to this office, what the exact exchange was in the transfer of the money, but presume it was the rate that I have used in the above, as the settlement with your various officials, who were paid a per diem allowance, was based on that rate.

Included in these statements there are these charges, to which I would call your attention : August-Jardine and Cusson's statement (voucher 42), 860 francs, amount deposited with the exhibition authorities, the voucher stating that the receipt is kept for the purpose of getting a refund at the close. What disposal has been made of this amount?

October-Jardine and Cusson's statement (Oct. 3), 3,120.07 francs paid to L. A. Cusson to balance his account, as stated.

Please cause these amounts to be accounted for as soon as possible, either by the return of the necessary vouchers or by a deposit to the credit of the Receiver General: of the amounts in question.

November 24, Dr. A. Blais was paid 170 francs, and November 26, Miss LeBoutillier was paid 50 francs, for which the Quebec government was accountable. Has this money been refunded, and if not, what action has been taken by your department in the matter?

I think that will have to be done this time when the note comes due, which I inclose herewith as a renewal of the old note, on November 1 next. ## Irregularities in Pay-list.

Sir,-I am receipt of your letter of the 5th instant with regard to the living expenses of Mr. H. B. Hagerty, who was temporarily employed in the statistical branch of your department. As a large number of the officials of the statistical branch were paid a living allowance, or living expenses here, I have to ask you to give me full particulars of the principles followed by you in paying these expenses. I find that there have been considerable differences between the amounts paid different officers and, even in some cases, between the amounts paid the same officer for different months. In illustration of what I mean, I would instance the following cases :-D. J. Gleeson received $\$ 75$ for three months' living expenses to October 9 , being at the rate of $\$ 25$ a month. H. B. Hagerty was allowed $\$ 55$ for the month of July ; after that he was allowed $\$ 35$ a month to the end of November, after which time he was allowed $\$ 30$ a month. A. F. McVicar was paid $\$ 17.50$ for $8 \frac{3}{4}$ days in July, which is at the rate of $\$ 2$ a day. For the month of August he was allowed $\$ 75.60$ and $\$ 41.98$ for the month of September. C. P. Roche was allowed $\$ 40$ for two months to September 17, being at the rate of $\$ 20$ a month. In consequence of the differences, noted in these payments, I have to ask whether any restrictions were placed on the officials as to the amounts of living expenses they were allowed to incur. I would also ask why these officials were not required to submit receipts for the amounts paid by them for living expenses.

Sir,-Referring to your letter of the 27 th ultimo, respecting the issue of cheques in favour of Messrs. James Gibson and T. H. Mann, the application is in accordance with a special vote of the last session of Parliament, which reads as follows, viz. :-

Schedule 'A,' Collection of Revenue-Customs-James Gibson for services as Customs Officer at Windsor, Ont., for 360 days ending March 29, 1894 (subject to T. H. Mann's claim of $\$ 279.21$ for advances on collector's order to James Gibson), $\$ 340$.

The services rendered by Mr. Gibson was that usually rendered by a Customs landing-waiter. There was no appropriation to pay the salary heretofore. There is no voucher in this case, as the officer was not paid by the department for the period covered by this vote. I inclose report from S. W. McMichael, Chief Inspector of Customs, respecting Mr. Gibson's service. A cheque for $\$ 279.21$ is asked to be drawn in favour of T. H. Mann, for the reason that he advanced this amount to James Gibson on the collector's order, and the parliamentary vote provides for Mann's claim of $\$ 279.21$.

Customs, Toronto, March 16, 1894.
Sir,-I beg to draw your attention to the unfortunate circumstances connected with the employment of Gibson and Kilroy in the Windsor customs. For about a year past these two men have been working, Gibson at the head office and Kilroy at the Windsor ferry without pay from the department. I believe that about a year ago a letter was received by the collector from the department stating that the services of these two officers should be dispensed with, but owing to some circumstances which I am not able to explain this order was not carried out and the men have been allowed to remain on duty as above stated in the hope and with the assurance, as I have been given to understand, that they would eventually be regularly employed and receive payment for the services rendered during the past year. As both men were penniless and have families the collector has assisted them by endorsing their notes to various merchants from whom they have purchased necessaries of life to the extent of $\$ 400$ for each, and I belicve recently had to pay the notes, so that he is out of pocket to the extent of something over $\$ 800$, and the men are still on duty as acting officers. Gibson was formerly in the service at Windsor for a number of years and owing to his irregular habits was suspended at various times and finally dismissed from the service. Since his dismissal he has reformed and his habits are at the present
time all that could be desired. He is a capable officer. Kilroy was also formerly employed as a temporary officer and his services were dispensed with, I believe, on the ground that there was sufficient staff to perform the work without assistance. Kilroy is a capital officer and all that he does is well done. He has rendered good service at the ferry office. In my opinion the staff at the port of Windsor will require to be increased somewhat at an early day. There are at present only two officers on duty at the Michigan Central Railway and two at the Canadian Pacific Railway. Each of these officers is compelled to work twelve hours out of twentyfour, day and night alternately, which I consider too long a tour of duty. I respectfully submit that there should be three officers at each of these stations.

## Re Collector's Bank Account.

Audit Office, Ottawa, April 22, 1901.
Sir,-The present practice is, that many of the collectors deposit, some every four days and some every eight days, to credit of their 'Collector's Bank Account,' and withdraw the amount and deposit it the same day to credit of Receiver General.

If the receipts amount to $\$ 25$ a deposit should be made each day. If the receipts do not call for a deposit but once a week, it should be made direct to credit of Receiver General.

Sir,-Referring to your letter of April 22 in this matter, the printed instructions to collectors on the back of the bank statement in your hands, require that 'collectors depositing to the credit of the Receiver General every two or four days or weekly will deposit their collections in the bank daily, if they amount to $\$ 25$ or over.'

Copies of letters will be found attached to the bank statements calling the attention of collectors to the fact when the rules were not observed.

At present the requirements as to deposit when the receipts amount to $\$ 25$ is well observed.

## Audit Office, Ottawa, April 23, 1901.

Sir,--The cheques furnished to this office, drawn against the collector's bank accounts, are signed by the collector only. This would indicate that the funds are deposited to his sole credit.

It is the general practice that credits are made out in favour of two officials, and the cheques issued require the signature of both.

Collector's bank accounts should be treated in the same way. The deposits should be made to the joint credit of the collector and some other officer of the port, and the cheques signed by both.

Sir,-I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of April 23, respecting the deposit of funds to the sole credit of the collector, and suggesting that the cheques issued require the signature of two officials.

This matter has been carefully considered in conference with the inspectors, and it is not deemed practicable to carry into effect the rule suggested as to the signing of cheques by two officials in the outside customs service. The collector is responsible as the officer at the head of the port and is under special bonds to account for the moneys which he receives. The customs service is widely scattered and at many ports the collector is the only inside officer always available to sign cheques.

I cannot recollect any case of default in the customs service in recent years which would have been prevented by the signature of a customs officer to the cheques in addition to that of the collector.

Sir,-I have your letter of the 4th inst., in reply to mine of April 23, in reference to cheques issued by collectors.

You state that it is not deemed practicable to have two officers sign cheques, as at many ports the collector is the only officer always available. This reason does not, of course, apply at the larger ports, and no other is raised in your letter.

Receiver General's cheques and letter-of-credit cheques are signed by two officials and it seems to me desirable that cheques issued by collectors should be signed by a second officer, where such is available.

The varied sources from which a collector receives funds, especially at a large port, renders it more desirable that two officers should sign.

With each return a statement is needed, showing how the balance on hand at the end of the month is made up.

## Re Customs Drawback : Bertram Engine Works.

Sir,-I yesterday received an Order in Council, dated the 9 th instant, authorizing a refund of $\$ 4,320.55$ to the Bertram Engine Works Co. for drawback of duty paid on articles used in vessels built and registered in Canada.

Three of these vessels were built in 1895, four in 1896, one in 1897, three in 1898 and one in 1899. The Order in Council of July 19, 1897, provides that all claims for drawbacks must be made within six months from the date of registration. The present order assigns no reason why this provision has been suspended in this instance. When an Order in Council is passed affecting the provisions of a former general order still in force, particular reference should be made to it.

## Re Customs Revenue.

Sir,-The Customs Revenue, as shown by the Public Accounts, does not in all cases agree with the figures shown in the Trade and Navigation Report.

The figures in the former case are based on the cash that has been remitted or deposited by collectors and brought to account; the figures in the latter case are made up from returns furnished by collectors to the Statistical Branch.

The differences are small, but it would be much more satisfactory if there were none.

In every case where there is any difference, the Public Accounts show a larger amount than the Trade and Navigation Reports, both in the year 1899-1900 and the year previous, and possibly other years.

Please explain the cause of the differences at the following ports :-

Sir,-I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 30th ultimo, respecting differences in the Customs Revenue figures shown in the Public Accounts and those in the Trade and Navigation Report.

The figures for 'Customs Duties' are the same in the Public Accounts and in the Trade and Navigation Report of 1899-1900, in respect of the following ports referred to in your letter, viz., Fort Erie, Toronto, Montreal, Halifax, St. John and Vancouver.

As to the difference between the published reports in the statements of 'other revenues' (not Customs Duties), the revenues from seizures are not included in Statement No. 1, Customs Duties, \&c., of Public Accounts, but are included in the Trade and Navigation tables under the head of other revenues.

Part of the revenue from 'Chinese Immigration,' which is entered in the Public Accounts, was collected through the Department of Trade and Commerce, and therefore does not appear as 'other revenues' in the Trade and Navigation tables.

Care will be taken in comparing the statements of Customs Duties and other revenues for $1900-1901$, before being published by the Customs and Finance Departments respectively.

Sir,-In September, 1899, you refunded to the Dominion Atlantic Railway $\$ 32,533.22$ customs duties paid between July 1, 1895, and October 14, 1898, on material imported for the branch of the road formerly known as the Windsor and Annapolis Railway.

Was it stipulated in the agreement for the arbitration that the company should be refunded all duties paid up to the date of the payment by the Government of the award?

The entry papers are certified by the superintendent of the railway to the effect that the goods specified are for the sole use of the section of the road formerly known as the Windsor and Annapolis Railway. What steps did you take to verify this statement? There are entries for bridges and bridge material. Did you call on the company to state where these bridges were erected ?

Many of the entries are for folders, pamphlets, guide books, \&c. What evidence had you that these were not for the use and benefit of the whole road?

Refunds to the amount of $\$ 9,948.33$ were repaid in $1895-96$. Did this amount all accrue previous to July 1, 1895 ? $\$ 38.69$ was refunded in 1897-98. Had it no connection with this claim?

Direct application should have been made to this office for the payment of this account.

Sir,-I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 2nd instant, respecting the sum of $\$ 32,533.22$ refunded to the Dominion Atlantic Railway in September, 1899, for customs duties on goods entered between July 1, 1895, and October 14, 1898.

It was stipulated in the reference to arbitration that the company should be entitled to drawback until the payment of the commutation money, and the agreement surrendering the privilege, signed on October 7, 1898, contains the same provision.

The refunds to the amount of $\$ 9,948.33$ paid in 1895-96 were wholly on account of goods entered at customs during the quarter ended June 30, 1895. The refund of $\$ 32,533.22$ was paid in the same way and under the same form of certificate as in the case of previous refunds to this company, so far as I am aware.

The department accepted the affidavit of the superintendent of the railway as establishing the right of the company to the drawback of duty shown to have been paid, in the absence of any information that would discredit it. Such affidavit would usually be accepted for the free entry of goods under the regulations prescribed by Order in Council.

Sir,-With reference to your letter of the 22 nd instant, in the above matter, I send you herewith circular No. 48, being copy of Order in Council of July 17, 1858, under which system of payments for extra service was in operation in the old province of Canada.

The system appears to have been continued, as provided for under above Order in Council, from 1867 down to December 2, 1895, when an Order in Council dealing with the matter was passed, as per Memo. 791B, inclosed. The practice has been in operation at all ports at which extra services as authorized under said Memo. 791B have been required.

The difference between the sum of $\$ 576$ collected for this service at Vancouver in August last and $\$ 554$ distributed, is accounted for by the sum of $\$ 22$ paid by cheque No. 332 to F. J. Physick, for services in July in supervising bottling of goods in bond. The services were performed in July, but payment was only made by the company in August, which facts appear to have escaped the notice of the officials of the Audit Office.

The total salaries of the Vancouver customs staff, including temporary officers and exclusive of extra services payments, in 1899-1900, were over $\$ 24,000$.

Re Customs Seizures : Distribution to Informers.

Audit Office, Ottawa, July 2, 1901.
Sir,-On Order in Council dated January 25, 1900, provides that payments made for information, when the informer's name is not disclosed to the department, shall in all cases be certified by the collector or inspector, and be attested to by the person receipting for the award on the distribution sheet.

To carry out the intent of this order, I observe that you have had a form pre-pared-No. K-31A, containing blank declaration and certificate. Please explain how the collector or inspector is to acquire the information to enable him to make such a certificate. Is the payment to the informer made in his presence? How could he otherwise certify?

Have you any regulation limiting the time before which the informer must be paid and the declaration furnished? Do collectors or inspectors keep record of the advances made to officers for informer's share, and watch that a declaration of payment is furnished for each case or the money refunded?

The advances made for informer's share for the six months ended December 31 last amounted to $\$ 8,810.71$. No declarations have been furnished for $\$ 6,477.65$ of this amount, of which $\$ 2,390.91$ was advanced to Inspector F. L. Jones, and $\$ 2,648.76$ to F. S. Belton of special branch.

Under the seizure regulations, the informer's name is to be withheld, if he desires it, and the award is paid for him to the officer, the department being relieved of responsibility when the informer's name is not disclosed. The informer's name must, however, be disclosed confidentially to the collector or inspector, who can accordingly certify as to payments made to him. The requirement of a declaration as to payment to the informer has been considered as applying only to seizures made since the date of the Order in Council of February 2, 1900, the receipt of the seizing officer being accepted in respect of seizures prior to February 2, 1900, for the informer's share when the name is not disclosed. In respect of the informer's share for the six months ending December 31, 1900, referred to in your letter, for which no declarations have been furnished, the distribution applied only to seizures made prior to February 2, 1900. In respect of all awards 'for information' made since Juịy 1, 1901, where the informer's name is not disclosed, it is required that the certificate of the collector or inspector for payments be returned to the department along with the distribution sheet within sixty days.

Sir,-In reply to your letter of the 6 th instant re charge of 70 s. for freight on copper coin to St. John, I may say that this seemed an overcharge for the following reasons:-
(1.) The charges on copper coin to Halifax and St. John had, previously, been invariably the same.
(2.) The charge to Halifax in the same voucher was 40 s.
(3.) In a subsequent shipment (February) the charge was 40 s . to both places.
(4.) The charge to Montreal in the same voucher (November, 1899), and again in February, was 70s.

As the shipment in question was per ss. Parisian to Halifax and Portland, the coin for St. John, if not also that for Montreal and Toronto, would be landed at Halifax. In that case something additional to the 40s. charged to Halifax would be added for the carriage to St. John; but surely not so much as for the Montreal lot.

## Insufficient Certificates on Vouchers.

Audit Office, Ottawa, July 26, 1901.
Sir,-I return herewith, on account of insufficient certificate, three vouchers in favour of the Peterborough Canoe Co. for canoes and paddles furnished for the Geological Survey. Two of these vouchers are certified 'per Dr. Bell's order, prices fair and just ;' the third is certified 'Dr. Bell's order, prices as per agreement.' None of these certificates, however, are signed, and therefore they are of no value.

The certificate 'prices as per agreement' is inadmissible, as the purchaser and seller might easily agree on a price which might be far from fair and just. The certificate as to prices should in all cases be 'prices fair and just,' unless the goods are supplied under a formal contract let by public tender, when the certificate should read: 'prices according to contract.' I would also point out that in the present case there is no definite certificate as to the reccipt of the goods. Kindly have the proper certificates supplied.

Sir,-In going over the vouchers for your expenditure during the past fiscal year I find that in a number of cases the certificates thereon are not strictly in accordance with the requirements of section 33 of the Audit Act. That section prescribes two definite certificates, viz.: (1) that the goods have been supplied or the work performed ; and (2) that the prices charged are according to contract or are fair and just. The certificate 'prices according to contract' should only be used when a formal contract has been entered into under public tender. The two certificates referred to need not necessarily be made by the same official, but should be made by those having personal knowledge of the transactions. Every person making a certificate should sign his name in full, the mere initials being insufficient.

I find that your vouchers are deficient in the following respects :-(a) In a number of vouchers there is no certificate whatever, either as to receipt of goods or as to fairness of price ; (b) In other cases there is no certificate as to performance of work or receipt of goods; (c) In other cases the words 'certified correct' are used ; this is manifestly indefinite and is not sufficient ; (d) In some five cases the certificate 'charges as per agreement' is given ; this is unsatisfactory, as I have pointed out to you elsewhere ; (e) In a number of cases the certificate is supported by the initials only of the certifying officer instead of by his full signature. I append lists of the various unsatisfactory vouchers under the above heads. Kindly see that in future the greatest of care is taken to have the certificates strictly in accordance with the requirements of section 33 of the Audit Act.

## Suggested Changes in the Method of Accounting for Petty Cash.

## Audit Office, Ottawa, July 29, 1901.

Sir,- 1 have examined the statements rendered by Mr. T. Burke of your department for expenditure out of petty cash during the past fiscal year. I find that Mr. Burke received during the year nine separate advances of $\$ 25$ each and that he rendered four statements of account, roughly speaking, one at the end of each quarter. In my opinion, a preferable way of dealing with the petty cash would be that at the beginning of the year an advance of say $\$ 25$ be given which would be amply sufficient to cover all petty cash disbursements for any ordinary month ; at the end of each month a statement of the expenditure during that month should be rendered, accompanied by proper vouchers. This statement should be certified by the accountant and approved of by you. The accountant should then issue a cheque out of the letter-of-credit for the exact amount of the statement, thus re-establishing the original advance of $\$ 25$ for the following month. At the end of the fiscal year, however, instead of issuing such a cheque, Mr. Burke should deposit to the credit of the Receiver General the unexpended balance in his hands, after which a new advance might be made for the new year. Such monthly statements should be sent me, with the vouchers for the ordinary letter-of-credit expenditure.

I must also point out the necessity for having every item in the petty cash statements supported by a receipt. In analysing last year's payments, I find that out of 176 items there are receipts in only 104 cases. Out of the remaining 72 items there are memos. to Mr. Burke in 43 cases to make payments ; these are chiefly for cartage, but are not supported by receipts. There is nothing whatever to show for the remaining 29 cases. Neither the separate vouchers nor the quarterly statements are certified as to prices or receipts of materials. This should be done in all cases.

## Canada. <br> North-West Territories. To Wit :

I, Charles C. Bunn, presently residing in the town of Edmonton, District of Alberta, labourer, do solemnly declare as follows :-

1. That I was engaged at Fort Resolution by Mr. J. M. Bell, of the Dominion Geological Survey Department, on the 11th day of April, 1900, to accompany him and his party as a boatman, labourer and 'all-round man,' at wages at the rate of $\$ 1.50$ per day (including Sundays) and provisions.
2. Mr. Bell and his party including myself, left Fort Resolution on April 11, 1900.
3. While working as one of the party I lost my way on the Barren grounds, about four days' travel north of Great Bear lake, during a heavy snow storm, on August 5,1900 ; on that day I was in company with one Louis Tremblay, a half-breed, who also formed one of Mr. Bell's party ; I had sprained my ankle and was, on that account, unable to keep up with Tremblay, who left me.
4. I was alone and lost from August 5, 1900, as already mentioned, until the 13th of the same month, when I arrived at a camp of Indians to the north-east of Great Bear lake, upwards of thirty days' journey from Fort Norman, on the Mackenzio river, the nearest Hudson's Bay Company's post.
5. At my request, some of the Indians took me to the mouth of Dease river, at Fort Confidence, four days' travel from the Indians' camp, where I hoped to overtake Mr. Bell and his party ; on arriving there, however, a note from Mr. Bell was found, of which a copy is hereto attached, and as mentioned in the note Mr. Bell had left a canoe, trolling-spoon and ten cartridges ; Mr. Bell and his party had, however, then seven days start; I had no provisions, and I was lame and sick, and quite unable to travel alone. I therefore returned with the Indians to their camp, and I remained with them a few days, when they brought me to Fort Norman, arriving there on September 28, and they having meantime cared for me and fed me.
6. I was detained at Fort Norman and unable to leave there, owing to it then being impossible to travel by canoe by reason of the then advanced season of the year, when ice was forming and running in the river, until December 27, 1900, when in company with Wm. Patton I left Fort Norman for Fort Resolution, where I arrived on February 4, 1901 ; I was so worn out with the journey from Fort Norman to Fort Resolution that, although Wm. Patton was just starting for Edmonton and I might have started out with him had I been well and strong enough, I was through sickness delayed there until February 19, 1901, when I started for Edmonton, arriving there on March 31, 1901.
7. Between the time of my arriving at the Indians' camp on August 13, 1900, and my arrival at Edmonton on March 31, 1901, I have incurred expenses to the amount of $\$ 192.57$, the particulars of which appear in the several accounts hereunto attached.
8. From the time I was lost until I reached Edmonton, the nearest point from which I could satisfactorily communicate with the government, I travelled on foot over 1,600 miles, and suffered many and great hardships and privations, which I have thought it unnecessary to detail.
9. I claim to be justly and truly entitled to be paid by the Dominion Government (Geological Survey Department) at the rate of $\$ 1.50$ per day (including Sundays) from April 11, 1900, until March 31, 1901, together with such portion of the said several accounts as is properly reckoned as equivalent to board and lodging and travelling expenses, less such balance of account as Mr. J. M. Bell has against me for goods supplied to me, after allowing for use of my dogs for 11 days at $\$ 1$ per day, such balance amounting to the sum of $\$ 7$ or thereabouts, and less the sum of $\$ 100$ received by me on a draft upon Dr. Bell ; and under the circumstances, I feel that the government should also make me a further allowance for my maintenance while remaining at Edmonton pending the adjustment and settlement of my claim.
10. I make this solemn declaration conscientiously believing the same to be true, and knowing that it is of the same foree and effect as if made under oath and by virtue of 'The Canada Evidence Act, 1893.'

I may add that there is a striking similarity between the signature of Mr. Matthew who is employed by you and that of Mr. Matthew who is employed in the Customs Department, and also that the leave of absence of the latter during the month of July, 1900 , corresponds with the time during which the former was employed on the survey in Cape Breton.

Sir,-Let me call your attention to the incompleteness of the certificates, and to the lack of information on many of the vouchers in support of payments against your appropriation for schools, Ontario, Quebec and maritime provinces. Also, that each voucher should contain within itself sufficient evidence to enable me to determine the specific purpose for which the expenditure was incurred. The above vouchers form only a few instances in which there is a lack, both of information and of approval by a responsible officer. Voucher paid by cheque No. 30 contains no certificate as to the receipt of the goods or as to the fairness of the prices charged. Please see that these and similar defects are remedied in future.

The department will, however, request Dr. O. C. Edwards, who is at present in Treaty 8, to make a report regarding these drugs upon his return. I reinclose the account in question, which you will observe has been certified to by the accountant of the department as to charges.

## Payments to Different Officers for Same Service.

## Audit Office, Ottana, April 10, 1901.

Sir,-On September 24, 1897, an Order in Council was passed appointing Dr. O. C. Edwards as medical health officer for the Regina industrial school and the Muscowpetung's and Assiniboine agencies at a salary of $\$ 1,400$ a year, divided as follows: Regina industrial school, $\$ 500$; Muscowpetung's, $\$ 600$; Assiniboine, $\$ 300$. On July 2, 1900, a further Order in Council was passed suspending the previous order from April 1 until the resumption by Dr. Edwards of the duties to which he was originally appointed, he having been for the time making a medical visitation to the Indians in the territory covered by Treaty 8. The Order in Council goes on further to say that the minister will make temporary arrangements for medical attendance at the industrial school and at the agencies during the absence of Dr. Edwards. While Dr. Edwards was employed in connection with Treaty 8 he was paid at the rate of $\$ 8$ a day up to September 25, inclusive. From April 1, Dr. I. J. Ingersoll was paid as medical attendant to the Regina industrial school at a rate equal to $\$ 500$ a year. Dr. E. C. Carthew was paid at the rate of $\$ 600$ a year up to June 30 as medical attendant to the Indians on Muscowpetung's reserve. From July 1, Muscowpetung's reserve appears to have been divided for purposes of medical attendance, Dr. Carthew receiving $\$ 25$ a month as medical attendant at East Muscowpetung's and Dr. W. H. Kalbfleish receiving $\$ 25$ a month as medical attendant at West Muscowpetung's. Dr. Victor Bonjou was paid from April 1 at the rate of $\$ 25$ a month as medical attendant on the Indians of the Assiniboine reserve.

Dr. Edwards appears to have resumed the duties for which he was originally appointed on September 25, as his pay as medical attendant at the school and the reserves is resumed from that date. The other doctors, however, who were acting during Dr. Edwards' absence have continued under pay since that date. Kindly inform me why the regular medical attendant and those who were employed temporarily have both been drawing their salaries from September 26 last.

Sir,-With reference to your letter of the 10th instant, on the subject of the medical services rendered by Dr. O. C. Edwards, as well as the attendance furnished by certain other medical officers therein mentioned, I am directed by the deputy minister to inforra you that it was first intended that Dr. Edwards should resume (upon his return from Treaty 8) the duties of the position that he occupied formerly at Regiria, but it was afterwards decided that no change should be made in the temporary arrangement that had been entered into in the meantime. After Dr. Edwards returned from his trip to Athabaska he was given leave of absence to come east, where he remained some six or eight weeks. His visit to the west having been a very difficult one, it was considered only reasonable that he should be given the leave. He returned to Regina for the purpose of awaiting further instructions from the department ; there were one or two decisions arrived at as to where he should be located, but no conclusion was come to until the minister finally decided that he should accompany the commissioner who has been sent to Athabaska to pay the annuity moners during the present year, as his (Dr. Edwards') services will be largely required in connection with the Indians in this district. It has not been decided what his duties will be after he returns, but it is thought that possibly he may be left in charge of the large district morth of Edmonton.

Sir,-I am in receipt of your letter of April 25, with reference to the payment of the salary of Dr. O. C. Edwards after his return from Treaty 8, and the payment of other medical officers for performing the duties originally assigned to Dr. Edwards. From your letter I would conclude that from the time of Dr. Edwards' return from Treaty 8 , until the date of his leaving with the commissioner sent to pay the annuity moneys, during the present year, his sole duties were awaiting instructions and drawing his salary, the medical services at the Regina school and at the Indian reserves being performed by the medical officers who were employed during Dr. Edwards' absence. I do not see how Dr. Edwards can be legally paid during this period for the performance of services which were actually performed by other medical men who were also paid therefor.

The responsibility in not arranging for the immediate employment of his services can hardly be charged to Dr. Edwards, and I do not think he should be called upon to suffer loss for the delay in the department defining his special duties.

Sir,-Indian Consolidated Fund, cheque No. 1125, is for the payment of $\$ 50$ to Mrs. Margaret Bannatyne, being the salary of the late R. J. Bannatyne, for the month of July. Mr. R. J. Bannatyne was employed as clerk at the Touchwood agency, and died on July 21 last. I am of the opinion that the order in council of February 9, 1875, authorizing the payment of the salary of a deceased officer up to the end of the month in which his decease occurred is applicable only to such officers as are on the permanent list. As Mr. Bannantyne does not appear to have been permanently appointed under an order in council, I think that his salary should have been paid to the day of his death only and not to the end of the month.

## Lack of Uniformity in Checking Amount of Bacon Supplied.

Audit Office, Ottawa, June 8, 1901.
Sir,-I beg to ask your attention to the payments made during the current fiscal year to Lawry \& Son, Limited, of Hamilton, for bacon supplied under contract to the

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various Indian reserves in the North-west Territories. Bacon was supplied to 18: different agencies, there being two deliveries-one by July 1, and one by November 1- in each case, except at Birtle where there was only one delivery. The accompanying statement shows the net amounts charged by Lawry \& Son, the net amounts received by the agents and the difference or shrinkage. From this statement it will be seen that in 22 cases there was less bacon received than appeared in the invoices, and in 13 cases the weights entered in the invoices were accepted. The probability is that in these 13 cases the agents were not so particular about weighing in the bacon. This is also evident if we look at the deductions for tare (weight of sacks, paper, \&c.). Lawry \& Son allowed 2 lbs. off gross weight of each sack in the July delivery and 3 lbs. off each sack in the November delivery for weights of sacks, \&c. Some of the agents seem to have accepted these figures and made a corresponding deduction from the gross weight as determined by them ; others simply give the net weight received, while a few give the gross weight, the tare and the net weight as they found it. The accompanying statement, marked ' $B$,' shows the amount of tare in these cases, according to Lawry \& Son, and according to the agents. The relatively large differences shown here tend to make one suspicious that corresponding differences would have been found in the other cases.

Statement ' $C$ ' shows the number of pounds of bacon charged for the Indians and for the officials in each agency. In two cases it is all charged to the Indians and in one case all to the officials. In the remaining cases it is divided between the two. Kindly let me know how the figures are arrived at. In the July delivery at the Blood agency, after the net amount of bacon- $-1,941$ pounds-was arrived at, a deduction of $1 \frac{1}{2}$. per cent was made, leaving $1,912 \mathrm{lbs}$., which was divided between the Indians and the officials, giving 927 lbs . to the former and 985 to the latter, which was billed at $\$ 10.41$ per cwt. The usual way and the one which should have been followed in this case is to divide the net amount of $1,941 \mathrm{lbs}$. between the officials and the Indians and then calculate the value at $\$ 10.41$ per cwt., less $1 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent. A similar method was followed in the Touchwood July delivery, where a net delivery of $3,804 \mathrm{lbs}$. was charged-507 lbs. to the Indians and 3,240 to the officials.

I notice the following errors in calculating the amounts charged to the different votes :-

Edmonton, November delivery, 600 Ibs . was charged to Vote XI, general expenses, at $\$ 65.46$ instead of $\$ 64.48$. Kindly transfer 98 cents of this charge to the Vote for Destitute Indians.

Moose Mountain, July delivery, 360 lbs. charged to general expenses at $\$ 34.67$ instead of $\$ 34.54$. Please transfer this overcharge of 13 cents to the Vote for Destitute Indians.

From what I have said above it would appear that there is a want of uniformity among the agents as regards the taking in or goods supplied under contract. There should be a uniform system adopted of determining the quantities received which should be followed by every agent.

Sir,-I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of June 8, dealing with the manner in which bacon supplied under contract is weighed in the various Indian agencies in the North-west Territories. As this is a matter which requires the attention of the Indian Commissioner and the inspectors, I have submitted your communication to the commissioner with the request that he should report at an early date, and issue whatever instructions he may think necessary to the Indian agents in order that a uniform result may follow the taking into store of the contract supply of bacon. With reference to paragraph ' $C$ ' of your letter I have to inform you that at the Birtle agency the officials do not draw rations, and at the Assiniboine agency, although they are entitled to rations, the agents report that they would not use any of the bacon and that it would be issued to Indians. Therefore, in these two agencies no bacon was charged to the 'general expense' vote. At Muscowpetung's agency the Indians do not use any bacon. The quantity supplied is entirely for the use of the officials.

## Travel of Rev. Father Paquette.

Sir,-Cheque No. 3537, Manitoba and North-west, is for a payment of $\$ 443$ to Rev. Father Paquette for expenses of a trip to Isle à la Crosse, visiting a school beyond the treaty limits. All I have in the way of vouchers in support of this account is four receipts, as follows :-
(1.) A receipt from Moise Charette for $\$ 165$ for thirty-three days' hire of team, rig and man, at $\$ 5$ a day, including all expenses.
(2.) A receipt from Louis Arcan for the same amount for similar service.
(3.) A receipt from Antoine Napes for $\$ 99$ for hire of a single rig and man for thirty-three days, at $\$ 3$ a day, all expenses included, and
(4.) A receipt from Zephirin Morin for $\$ 14$ for hire of boat and man from east end of Green lake to Beaver river and return.

There is no accompanying statement of expenditure nor any explanation whatever of these receipts which moreover have no certificate of any kind. Kindly explain why this payment was made without proper vouchers. I would also ask why Father Paquette required two teams and a single rig on this trip, as they appear to have been all hired at the same time.

I beg to say that the correspondence with the reverend gentleman led to the payment being made. As the receipts do not bear any certificate I have sent him a voucher in order that he may properly certify to the aecount. I also beg to attach an extract from a letter, dated at Duck lake, January 8, from Mr. Paquette dealing with the subject. This explains fully the reason for taking two teams and a single rig on the trip.

Extract-Letter from Rev. M. J. P. Paquette, January 8, 1901.

' I have the honour to state that I should have been very imprudent to undertake such a trip as to go to Isle à la Crosse at such an advanced season of the year with only one or two conveyances. You are not probably aware that during three or four days of the journey it is impossible to find one bite of hay for the horses, and the rest of the time the grass is so scarce that the horses can hardly find anything to eat ; therefore, one double rig was used only for the provisions for the horses to go and return for over a month's journey. The other double rig was to carry out tents, bedding, stove and necessary provisions. The single rig was for myself and man. In such a long journey it would have been very imprudent to take less horses and rigs than I did without incurring the danger of being a long time on the prairie. As there are no bridges across many large rivers, one of my men got nearly drowned with the horse and broke the rig very badly. Being an old traveller in the North-west, particularly in that wild part of the country I foresaw the difficulties that were to be met with espeeially when the rivers begin to freeze, and snow on the ground. If I had only one rig as you imagine, my man and horse would have been drowned, and I would have been left alone in the wilderness not less than 200 miles from a living soul. Permit me also to tell you that my two other men and myself had great difficulty to draw the man and the horse (half drowned) from the middle of the river.
'As you may understand though our rigs were not very much loaded, on several occasions in crossing swamps, \&c., we broke our whipple-trees and one wheel, and once more we were very lucky to have my three rigs and three men with me. We saw several dead horses along the road, and no doubt I should have had to leave one or two of mine also drowned in the deep mud if I had had only one or two conveyances, and as it was, the day before our arriving at Duck lake two of our horses were so tired that they were scarcely able to walk.'

As Mr. Mitchell was not a member of the civil service and, accordingly, did not come under the provisions of the Civil Service Act, I do not see how he can legally be paid for any time during which he is not engaged in the performance of his duties as agent. I am assuming, you will see, that although you wish to pay his salary for the two months from April 1, the newly-appointed agent will be acting as agent and as such will draw the salary.

Sir,-I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of May 2, with reference to the Order in Council of April 9, authorizing the payment of salary for two (2) months to Mr. J. A. Mitchell, the retiring agent of Muscowpetung's agency. You point out that, in your opinion, such a payment would be illegal. In reply, I beg to state, that, in the absence of any statute dealing explicitly with such cases, it appears to me that the proposed payment to Mr. Mitchell is not illegal. It is proposed to make this payment out of the 'miscellaneous' item included in the vote for 'general expenses' for Manitoba and the North-west Territories. It is quite true that Mr. Mitchell was appointed by Order in Council, but did not come under the provisions of the Civil Service Act. The payment of gratuities, however, to retiring officers who cannot otherwise be provided for, might be authorized by His Excellency in Council, particularly as the economy and efficiency of the service is promoted by making such changes and arrangements. In the present case the agent who was given charge of Muscowpetung's agency had before charge of File Hills agency, and although he received an increase in salary, his new salary fell very short of the combined salaries formerly paid. The department desired to pay Mr. Mitchell for two months as some compensation for his sudden retirement, and felt that no strong grounds could be taken in opposition to the payment owing to the saving which would result in the end, and the greater efficiency that would be promoted in the combined agencies.

Suggestions as to Method of Dealing with Money Received by Agent in Trust for Indians.

Audit Office, Ottawa, Octobèr 4, 1901.
Sir,-Indian cheque No. 4291, Manitoba and North-west, is for a payment of $\$ 16$ to R. M. Wilson, Indian agent at the Peigan agency, 'in trust for John Knowlton, for

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sixteen days work at one dollar per day for repairs to building.' John Knowlton is an Indian, and appears on the Peigan annuity pay-lists, being No. 66, on Division ' C.' Other payments have been made, in this and other agencies, to the agent in trust for the Indians. I understand that, besides payments of this nature, other sums are received by the agent in trust for the Indians for work done, \&c., for others than the government. Kindly let me know under what authority or departmental regulation the agents are empowered to hold moneys in trust for the Indians; whether the agent retains this money in cash or deposits it in a bank to his credit as Indian agent ; how these moneys are ultimately paid over to the Indians or expended on their beholf; what audit, if any, of the trust account is made by your inspectors, and how often; also whether statements showing the condition of these trust accounts are rendered to your department at regular intervals. I would suggest that all cheques for payments in trust be drawn to the joint order of the agent and agency clerk so that the account if kept in a bank should appear to the joint credit of the two officials.

Sir,-In reply to your letter of the 4th instant, respecting Indian cheque No. 4291, for $\$ 16$ to R. N. Wilson, Indian agent at the Peigan agency, 'in trust for John Knowlton,' I beg to say that at this as well as at other agencies where payments are due to Indians the custom has been to make them through the Indian agent. He is obliged to account for the money so received in his cash-book, a copy of which is forwarded to this office accompanied by a statutory declaration as to correctness together with a receipt from the Indian. The inspector for the district is advised when the cheques are issued and is furnished with the list sent by the agent showing to whom the cash belongs and he is required, when inspecting each agency, which takes place annually as a rule, to compare these advices with the cash-book and see that each payment is entered therein, and vouchers or receipts from the Indians filed for all payments made to them. Wherever an agent is convenient to a chartered bank he deposits the money in his name and withdraws it by his own cheque and pays the cash to the Indian. The department will take into consideration your suggestion to issue all cheques for payments in trust to the order of the agent and agency clerk, so that the amount, if kept in a bank, will appear to the joint credit of the two officials.

Sir,-I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 20th instant, inclosing Messrs. Cunningham \& Sons letter and asking for a statement of the facts as far as I am aware. On my arrival at Hazelton, in August last, I asked Mr. Morrison, Mr. Cunningham's agent, if he would be able to cash any cheques to enable me to pay the workmen. He promised to do his best, but stated that owing to constant demand there was rarely much money to be had at Hazelton. While at Babine Lake, I forwarded a cheque to Mr. Morrrison asking him to cash it if possible, and retain the money until my arrival, and asking if not to forward the same to Port Essington, and have it sent up from there. On my return to Hazelton, Mr. Morrison told me of the loss of some freight in transit to him by canoe, but owing to the loss of lists of freight could not say what was missing. He then advanced me the sum of three hundred dollars from'the firm's funds at Hazelton to enable me to pay off the men I had decided not to retain. I. asked Mr. Morrison to recoup himself when the money arrived from below. On my return to Hazelton from the Hagwilget valley, Mr. Morrison informed me of the loss of the money which had been inclosed in a box of papers, books, \&c., and addressed to him, but could give me little information beyond the fact that the Indian in charge, Charles Nelson, had also lost a cheque intrusted to him to cash at Hazelton.

From outside sources, I learned that Charles Nelson was not aware of the valuable nature of the box. Mr. George Cunningham also told me that this Indian had not been told the box contained money. This is much to be regretted as being entirely trustworthy he would have exercised great care to have safely delivered it.

## Final Closing of Suspense Account.

76, Indian Fund, a settlement has been arrived at. In order to close out this old account as on June 30, it is proposed to make a series of entries in accordance with this settlement. Before taking this action, however, it is decmed advisable to submit the whole matter for your consideration in order that the entries may receive your approval, and be considered final. The analysis and proposed settlement wore made
by Mr. Edwin Rochester, of the Accountant's branch of this department. Mr. Rochester will be in readiness at any time to explain to your examiner the basis upon which the settlement has been arrived at. The papers are herewith.

## Audit Office, Ottawa, November 13, 1901.

Sir,-With reference to your letter of September 7, relative to the closing of the Suspense Account in the Indian Trust Fund, I beg to say that I have examined the file of papers sent in connection therewith, and, as I consider it highly advisable that this account be closed for good, I would agree to the various entries set out in the accompanying schedule. These entries agree in the main with those proposed by Mr. Rochester in his report, the chief differences being as follows :-

1st.) The amounts to be credited to the various bands have been slightly altered in some instances, either in regard to the total amount to be credited or in the division between capital and interest. These differences have been pointed out to Mr. Rochester, who agreed as to the correctness of the alterations.
(2nd.) Mr. Rochester proposed to credit land management fund with the amount of $\$ 1,049.73$, which is made up of the difference between the amounts collected from the Six Nations Indians on account of their indebtedness, with the accumulated interest thereof, and the amounts actually paid over to the merchants. I think that the Six Nations should get the benefit of his, and, accordingly, I would recommend the crediting of this amount to the band.
(3rd.) I have made some alterations in the amounts to be charged to the different bands on account of expenditures made on their behalf. In the case of tribes that have a considerable balance to their credit, and that have a more or less steady source of revenue, I have charged the total amount of expenditure incurred on their behalf, with the accumulated interest, even though their capital be temporarily impaired thereby.
(4th.) The expenditures on behalf of certain bands which I have allowed to be charged against Land Management Fund, are as follows :-(1st.) The expenditure on account of five several bands which have no funds whatever to their credit. (2nd.) In the case of four bands which had a very small amount at their credit, I have charged against Land Management Fund the difference between the amounts which they had at their credit and the amounts of the expenditure incurred out of suspense account on their behalf.-(3rd.) In connection with the amount for legal expenses incurred in behalf of the Temiscamingue Indians, I have charged against the interest so much as they have now at the credit of that account ; the balance, amounting to $\$ 2,997.77$ I have charged against management fund. In all of these cases it is understood that a subsidiary loan account is to be opened, which may be credited with such amounts as may hereafter be received on behalf of these bands until the amounts will be wiped out.

After a conversation on the subject with your accountant, I have agreed to charge to Management Fund the amount of $\$ 3,155.55$, which is made up of an advance of $\$ 2,000$ for the expenses of a survey on the Caughnawaga reserve, with accumulated interest to the amount of $\$ 1,155.55$. I have agreed to this on the representation being made that a very large amount has been already charged against their funds on account of surveys, and their funds have been depleted to such an extent that, if any further charges of this nature be imposed on this band, a great deal of ill-feeling would in all probability be created among the Indians. The amount to be credited to Land Management Fund for percentage on collections has been slightly increased, making it now $\$ 1,635.40$. I also send a statement showing how the proposed entries will close $1-13$ J
suspense account, and also the effect of these entries on Land Management Fund. In the latter account an amount of $\$ 1,414.68$, which was transferred to the credit of that account in 1879, with interest accumulated to the amount of $\$ 1,772.04$, must be taken into consideration as there was no valid reason for crediting that amount to management fund at the time. This would leave the actual shortage in Land Management Fund at $\$ 566.87$; from which must be deducted an amount of $\$ 536.41$, which was erroneously credited to Management Fund for percentage on collections but is now reversed, thus making the net shortage on Land Management Fund \$30.46, which amount will in all probability be made good in a comparatively short time by receipts on acount of those bands which have no funds at their credit.

Sir,-The revenue statement of the Indian Trust Fund for June has just been received. It contains 33 deposit receipts dated in May, 82 dated in June and 26 dated in July.

The statement for May was entered on June 20th, and I assume those receipts dated in May were not received till after that date. Is it not possible to have your agents send in their receipts more promptly ?

I would also suggest that the June return be forwarded at the beginning of July; and if necessary a supplementary statement, applicable to the previous year, be forwarded in August.

It is desirable for obvious reasons that all deposit receipts should come to account as promptly as possible. But the fact, that at the close of each month, an adjustment is made between our books and the bank accounts makes it the more necessary. Every additional outstanding receipt adds to the task of adjusting.

You have not furnished any certificate in connection therewith. This certificate should give the numbers and denominations of the stamps damaged, and be certified by the officers who destroyed them.

Should it be again necessary at any time to destroy any stamps, I have to ask to be notified and I shall send a clerk from this office to be present. This is the practice when stamps are destroyed in the Post Office Department.

While agreeing with you that these stamps are of no intrinsic value in themselves, they remaining in your department, I would point out that once they reached the inspectors they represent their face value, and must be accounted for. Hence the necessity that all proper safeguards should be exercised when it is found necessary to destroy any.

The expenditure paid after June 30 belonging to the previous year is charged back to that year. Why not treat the revenue in the same way?

## Re Inspections.

Sir,-Returns have been received from your department of inspections made since April last.

During the intervening time fifteen divisions have been inspected three times, fourteen twice, two once, and two Windsor and Montreal have not been inspected. Why is this the case?

Some returns are certified specifically by the inspector; the majority are merely signed. Presumably the same duty is expected to be performed in all cases. Why is it not certified that the required duty has been performed in both classes of cases ?

What action has been taken in reference to the four electric light plants reported unregistered at St. Catherines by the inspector in August, 1900, and again in January last.

What supervision or check is exercised on the sale of methylated spirits by the inspector ?

What is the explanation of the shortage of $2,606.48$ gallons spirits reported at Quebec?

## Re Excise Seizures.

Audit Office, Ottawa, November 12, 1901.
Sir,-The receipts and disbursements on account of excise seizures for the last five years were as follows :-

The disbursements consist of expenses, $\$ 5,580.76$, refunds, $\$ 484$, and distribution to seizing officers and informers, $\$ 26,951.72$, the total exceeding the receipts during these five years by $\$ 4,530.59$. Chap. 34, section 114, Revised Statutes, provides that all forfeitures and penalties, after deducting expenses shall belong to His Majesty for the public uses of Canada; with a proviso that the net proceeds or any portion thereof may be divided between the seizing officers and the informers, in such proportions as the Governor in Council in any ease or class of cases directs and appoints. Presumably you have drawn on the other revenue accounts for the excess of the disbursements over the receipts, and this you are not authorized to do by the authority quoted above. The practice hitherto followed has been to deduct from the gross proceeds of each seizure the expenses and the duty and distribute the balance among the seizing offieers and the informers. In eases where nothing is paid to an informer, the seizing officers get the whole balance. If you distribute all the net proceeds of seizures in which anything has been realized there will be no surplus to meet expenses connected with cases from which no receipts arise.

The practice followed in the distribution of customs seizures, is to deduct the expenses, the duty paid and 5 per cent of the gross proceeds ; the seizing officer usually, but not always, gets one-third of the balance. If there is an informer, he receives another one-third, and the remaining one-third rests with the government. If there is no informer, other than the government officer, two-thirds of the net proceeds rests with the government.

Sir,-The increase in excise revenuc during 1900-01, as compared with the previous year, was $\$ 495,874.03$. There were decreases during the year at the following places:-

The fact of a falling off in the receipts at some places at a time when the receipts generally are largely on the increase seems to call for some inquiry as to the cause, especially when the decreases are so large as at Belleville, Winnipeg and Vancouver. I would suggest that you should ask your collectors at these places how they account for the decrease.

## Dept. of Inland Revenue, Ottana, November 30, 1901.

Sir, - I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of the 7 th inst., suggesting that this department request the Collectors at Belleville, Cornwall, Owen Sound, Winnipeg, Brantford, Kingston, Charlottetown and Vancouver to explain how they account for the decrease in revenue as compared with the previous year, more particularly as the Excise Revenue of the Dominion showed an aggregate increase of nearly $\$ 500,000$.

The Collectors referred to can give no explanation of the decrease of revenue in their respective divisons other than those apparent in our annual report, viz.: that smaller quantities of exciseable goods have been entered for consumption, within their division, than in the preceding year. This does not necessarily indicate a decrease in consumption within those divisions, as the duty on goods consumed therein may have been paid elsewhere and these goods sent into the divisions duty paid.

If you will turn to page 69 of the report of this department for 1901, you will find that in the division of Belleville, $62,368 \cdot 44$ proof gallons of spirits were entered for consumption, and duties amounting to $\$ 118,499.87$ were collected thereon, while in 1900 (page 67) $75,061 \cdot 31$ proof gallons were so entered, upon which duties aggregating $\$ 142,616.48$ were collected. The decrease is $\$ 24,116.61$, but for the reasons above stated, this does not necessarily establish the fact that a less quantity of spirits was actually consumed in that division than in the previons year.

I regret to say that there is no explanation other than I have given above and our collectors can throw no more light upon it than is already possessed by your department and this. Were it possible to secure the explanation you desire by the course you suggest, I should cheerfully comply therewith.

These allowances are in accordance with Order in Council of June 19, 1900, but as was shown in my letter of June 29, 1900, and subsequent correspondence, the amount of the allowance is considerably in excess of the average expenses incurred by persons travelling in Canada, and as such is in part a remuneration to the commissioners for their services. In this case the payment is an evasion of section 51 of the Civil Service Act which provides that 'No extra salary or additional remuneration of any kind whatsoever shall be paid to any deputy head, officer or employee in the Civil Service of Canada, unless a sum has been placed for that purpose in each case in the estimates submitted and voted by Parliament.'

No allowance above the actual expenses incurred can be legally granted without the authority of parliament, and I am of the opinion that Messrs Smart and Stephen-
son should refund any amount not actually expended by them until such time. The fact that one of the gentlemen at least is in my opinion underpaid for his general services does not affect this matter.

Sir,-On my return from the west recently, I found your letter to me of July 2 last, in which you state that you are of opinion that Mr. E. F. Stephenson and myself should refund any amount not actually expended by us out of the $\$ 10$ per diem allowance authorized to be made to us by Order in Council of June 19, 1900, in connection with the North-west Townsite investigation. I must say in reply that I am a little surprised that this matter should have been allowed to remain in abeyance for so many months, and that the present demand should be made after all the moneys have been paid and the accounts settled. I certainly think that it is within the authoriy of the government to arrange for a fixed living allowance for any officer of he government who is called upon to perform services of importance outside of his office, and in view of the fact that this matter has already been finally adjusted it would be rather unfair to the officers named to ask them to refund any amounts which they have been paid. I need not add that Mr. Stephenson is in the same position as myself in so far as the living expenses incurred on this work are concerned, and as no statements were kept or vouchers taken for the amounts paid, it would be quite out of the question at this late date to furnish an accurate account of the sum expended.

## Payments to North Atlantic Trading Co. as Commission on Immigrants.

Sir,-With reference to the matter of the North Atlantic Trading Co. I beg to say that I have passed your application of the 6th instant for a payment of $£ 3,100$ on account of the amount earned by them in connection with the Immigration Branch during the year ended June 30th last. On examining the lists of names of the immigrants who arrived at the different ports. I find that the total number seems to be 7,540 instead of 7,496 as stated by you. I also notice that you are crediting the company for all immigrants irrespective of age, even the infants. In former years credit was given for adults and children over a certain fixed age only. The memorandum of the agreement with the company for the last year furnished by you does not state that the company is to be allowed for all children irrespective of age. The agreement states merely, that the government shall pay a bonus of $£ 1$ on every bona fide agricultural immigrant, including farm labourers and domestic servants. Another clause states that no bonus is to be paid on any immigrant who is not mentally or physically fit. I would like to have it made clear why you are allowing the company a bonus on young children for the year in question.

## Memorandum of agreement with North Atlantic Trading Co.

The present agreement with the North Atlantic Trading Company dates from July 1, 1900. Under this the company is to represent the immigration interests of Canada in Russia, Germany, Austria, Roumania, Switzerland, Italy Holland, Belgium, France, Norway, Sweden and Denmark, and other countries that may subsequently be agreed upon. The company undertakes to maintain a continuous and active emigration propaganda for Canada in these countries, by advertising, printing and circulating suitable literature, by mail and personal distribution, and by the employment of duly qualified agents, and it is stipulated that in these ways the company shall expend not less than $\$ 10,000$ per annum, and shall from time to time produce evidence that this is being done, and that every effort that can reasonably be expected is being put forth in the countries named. Full settlement for each year's work to be deferred until such evidence is produced. On the other hand it is agreed that the government of Canada shall pay to the company a bonus of $£ 1$ on every bona fide agricultural immigrant (farm labourers and domestic servants included) landing in Canada from the countries named with the intention of settling in Canada; of those from the Austrian Provinces of Galicia and Bukowinia the head of every family to be possessed of not less than $\$ 200$ in addition to transportation to destination ; $\$ 50$, to suffice for a man and wife without children ; $\$ 100$, where the children do not exceed four in number, and where unmarried persons from these provinces over sixteen years of age, come out independently of their families, each such person must be possessed of at least $\$ 25$, in addition to transportation. No bonus is to be paid on any immigrant not mentally or physically fit, or who is a criminal, and any expenses incurred in having such persons cared for and deported may be charged to the company.

The company is to do nothing in contravention of the laws of the countries named. The agreement with the company is for ten years from July 1, 1900, subject to cancellation at any time after five years on three months' notice from either party. In addition to the bonus named the government of Canada is to pay to the company £500 annually, towards the cost of printing suitable literature, the company to report to the Department of the Interior every three months the kind and quantity of literature being published, and where it is being distributed', and to publish as part of such literature any material which may be furnished by the department.

The bonuses are to be paid monthly upon reported arrivals at Canadian ports.

Sir,-Referring to your favour of the 21st instant, regarding the payment of bonuses to the North Atlantic Trading Company, I beg leave to say that under the present agreement it was the intention of the department to pay the bonus named, to all members of the agricultural or domestic servant class. This would include, of course, men, women and children. The clause in the agreement, dealing with persons not mentally or physically fit, is intended to refer to any who were suffering from some mental or physical disease.

It is considered that newcomers should be advised of the regulations which are in force, regarding the settlement of land, and if the department in the carrying out of its Immigration policy sees fit to incorporate the Homestead regulations as part of its literature or as an adverisement, I am of opinion that action of this kind or the expenditure arising therefrom is not wrongly charged to the Immigration Appropriation.

I would ask that this office be supplied with a copy of his diary showing the dates and the places visited during the months covered by the statement.

I would ask under what authority these cheques were issued by your department before the services for which they were intended were performed.

Sir,-I am in receipt of your letter of the 14th instant, in which you refer to certain salary cheques for the month of February which were paid to the immigration officers at Quebec, Montreal, and other places on the 25th instead of the end of the month, and asking the department under what authority these cheques were issued by the department before the services were performed for which payment was made. In reply I beg to say that I understand it has always been customary to issue cheques for the outside service so as to enable the officials to receive their salaries by the end of the month. In the case of Montreal and Quebec, possibly the cheques would reach them a day or two before the end of the month, but this would not be the case at Winnipeg or in the Territories, as well as in most of the agencies in the United States. The desire of the department has been to issue the cheques so that they would be paid on the last day of the month. In some cases, it is quite true that they have been paid two or three days before, but in most cases I think it will be found that the cheques are not cashed until the beginning of the following month. If it is thought advisable to do so the rule may be changed so as to have all cheques issued on the last day of the month, but I am satisfied that in many cases this would be a serious inconvenience to the officials who live at a distance from Ottawa. I may add that inquiry has been made of several of the departments as to the system of paying the outside service salaries, and I understand that there is no regular plan and that each department adopts its own system. It is thought that, in cases where the officials live at considerable distances from the Capital, the cheques might be dated the last day of the month so as to avoid the suggestion of irregular payment, but possibly this would hardly meet the case. I shall be very glad indeed to have your advice as to the best course to pursue in connection with this matter.

Sir, -I am in receipt of your letter of the 29 th ultimo with reference to the issue of the salary cheques of the officers of the outside service of your department. In reply I beg to say that I see no special objection to the issue of the cheques before the end of the month, providing they do not pass into the hands of the recipients before the last day of the month. I might suggest that the cheque be sent to your chief officer at each agency who will hold them until the end of the month or of the period for which payment is made. He could also see that a refund is made before handing over the cheque in cases in which for any reason the employee is not entitled to the full amount for which his salary cheque is drawn. The cheques should in each case reach the chief officer referred to as short a time as possible before the end of the month.

## Expenses of E. Crean meeting Immigrants at Portland.

## Audit Office, Ottawa, May 31, 1901.

Sir,-I beg to call your attention to the following charges in the expense accounts of Mr. Ed. Crean, Travelling Immigration Agent, for board at Portland, Maine, while waiting for arrival of steamers:


I would ask why Mr. Crean returned to Portland immediately upon leaving the immigrants at Montreal, instead of going to his headquarters at Quebec, and thence proceeding to Portland shortly before the expected arrival of the next steamer.

Mr. Crean's movements from January 3, to the end of March, may be summarized as follows :-

Jan. 3-31, 4 days travelling, 25 days waiting for steamer.
Feb. 1-28, 4 " " 24 " $\quad$ " " "
You will please understand that I ask this only because it appears on the face of the account as if a considerable expenditure had been unnecessarily made.

Sir,-Referring to your favour of the 31st ultimo, calling attention to some charges in the expense account of Mr. Edward Crean, Travelling Immigration Agent, for board at Portland, Maine, while waiting the arrivals of steamers, I would say that towards the end of the calendar year, 1900, it was decided by the department that
owing to the fact that Portland would, in all probability, be the port through which a large number of Canadian bound passengers would come, it would be better to station Mr. Crean there for the purpose of looking after the immigrant arrivals. Mr. Crean arrived in Portland in the early part of January and has been stationed there ever since. He has reported to the department quite regularly of his movements and while in some cases it may appear that his expenses are rather high, yet, taking into consideration the nature of his duties and the uncertainty of knowing exactly when boats are to arrive, I am of the opinion that we could not have done otherwise than keep him there during the whole season instead of part of the time there and part of the time in Quebec.

I find on looking over Mr. Crean's reports that he has been pretty steadily at work. On January 26, he writes from Portland: I arrived here on the 4th instant and the ss. Dominion, of the Dominion Line, arrived on January 9. I accompanied the passengers to Montreal, where I arrived on the 10 th, and returned to Portland, arriving on the 11th. On January 15, I accompanied the passengers of the ss. Cambroman and the ss. Tunisian to Montreal and returned to Portland, arriving on the 17th. Am now awaiting the arrival of ss. Vancouver and ss. Numidian, which are expected to arrive to-morrow or Monday. On February 12, he writes: On January 17, I met the passengers of the ss. Vancouver and accompanied them to Montreal, then returned to Portland and met the pasengers of the ss. Numidian, which arrived on January 31, and acompanied them to Montreal, returning immediately to Portland. On February 6, he left for Montreal with the passengers of the ss. Corinthian, returning to Portland on the evening of the 7th, and on the 10th, he met and took care of the passengers of the ss. Dominion. At the time of writing he was awaiting the arrival of the ss. Tunisian, expected Thursday or Friday with 300 passengers. On February 28, he writes that he waited for the Tunisian from the 12 th to the 17 th, on which date he accompanied the passengers to Montreal, arriving there on the morning of the 18th. On the evening of the 18th he left Montreal for Portland, arriving there on the morning of the 19th, and on the evening of the same day he left with the passengers of the ss. Cambroman. He left Montreal for Portland on the evening of the $20 t h$ and arrived there on the 21st. He was then awaiting the arrival of the ss. Vancouver, which was expected on Sunday. On March 18, he writes that from the 1st to the 4 th he was awaiting the arrival of the ss. Vancouver, which arrived at $7.45 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. of the latter date, and he accompanied the passengers to Montreal, returning to Portland and the morning of the 5th. There he awaited the arrival of the ss. Numidian until the 10th, accompanying the passengers to Montreal and returning to Portland on the 11th. There he awaited the arrival of the ss. Sicilian, seven days overdue, and which arrived on the morning of the 17th, and he left with the passengers of this boat at 6 p.m. that day. On April 2, he writes that he left Portland with the passengers of the ss. Sicilian on March 17, for Montreal, returning to Portland' on the 19th, and that he awaited the arrival of the ss. Cambroman, which arrived on March 25, accompanied the passengers to Montreal and returned to Portland on the 27th. On the same day he accompanied the passengers of the ss. Parisian to Montreal and returned immediately to meet the ss. Tunisian, which arrived on March 30. He went forward with the passengers of this steamship, arriving in Montreal on the morning of March 31.

April 20, he reports that arriving in Montreal on the evening of March 31 with the passengers of the ss. Tunisian, he waited in that city until the evening of April 1, as per instructions from the department, in order to accompany a person who was being deported, and he arrived in Portland on the morning of April 2. On the arrival of the ss. Vancouver, on April 7, he accompanied the passengers to Montreal, returning to Portland on April 9, where he remained until the arrival of the ss. Numidian on the 15 th, whose passengers he accompanied to Montreal, returning to Portland on the morning of the 17th. On May 2, he reports that he accompanied the passengers of the ss. Dominion, arriving on April 22, to Montreal, returning to Port-
land, on April 24, and he accompanied the passengers of the ss. Cambroman, arriving on April 28, to Montreal, returning immediately to Portland and arriving on May 1. I doubt very much that in view of the foregoing statement, the department would have saved very much, if anything, if instead of Mr. Crean's running directly between Montreal and Portland he should have gone to Quebec, as suggested in your letter, and proceeded to Portland shortly before the expected arrival of the next steamer.

## Accounts for Advertising at Dawson not Certified by King's Printer.

Sir,-I find from the account received from Dawson that large payments have been made to the Dawson News, the Klondike Nugget and the Yukon Sun for advertising. The Public Printing and Stationery Act provides that all accounts for advertising should be certified to by the King's Printer. Kindly inform me why these accounts were not submitted to him for audit. I inclose the vouchers to have his certificate obtained thereon.

Sir,-I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 9 th instant, in reference to certain accounts for advertising in the Yukon Territory and in connection with which you pointed out that the Public Printing and Stationery Act provides that all accounts for advertising should be certified by the King's Printer. Since receiving your letter the accounts have been submitted to the King's Printer for audit. Dr. Dawson thinks that no useful end can be served by his audit. He agrees with me that the rules for advertising laid down in the Order in Council of the 25th July, 1896, cannot apply, and were never intended to apply, to transactions in the Yukon Territory, and that not one single condition of the Order in Council could have been observed. The King's Printer considers the circumstances of the case exceptional, he says, that under the principles laid down by yourself the certificate should be given by the person 'who has personal knowledge of the facts.' The accounts are examined by Mr. Lithgow, the comptroller, approved by the commissioncr, and bear upon them the certificate required by the regulations, and I, therefore, think under the special conditions should be considered as satisfactory.

Sir, -I am in receipt of your letter of the 28 th inst. with reference to the certifying of accounts for advertising in the Yukon Territory. In your letter you state that Dr. Dawson thinks no useful end can be served by his audit, and also that he agrees. with you that the rules for advertising laid down in the Order in Council of July 25, 1896, cannot apply, and were never intended to apply to transactions in the Yukon

Territory. That Order in Council is general in its wording, and is applicable to all accounts for advertising which are not specifically excepted from its operation. If it was found that the rules thus laid down could not have been observed in connection with the advertising in the Yukon district, an Order in Council should have been obtained excepting such transactions from the working of the original order. I beg, however, to again ask your attention to section 3 of the Public Printing and Stationery Act, which enacts that: 'the proper officer of the department shall superintend and 'execute. . . . . . . . the audit of all accounts for the advertising required 'for the public service.' This is a regulation laid down by parliament and cannot be amended or set aside by an Order in Council, or by the opinion of the King's Printer as to the usefulness of his audit. Until the Act is amended by parliament all such accounts must bear evidence that they have been audited in the department of Printing and Stationery before I am justified in passing them.

Sir,-I have a copy of an Order in Council of the 29th ultimo, providing that, for the purpose of audit of accounts for advertisements ordered in the Yukon Territory, the certificate of the comptroller and the approval of the commissioner shall be sufficient. I beg to point out, however, an obstacle to the carrying out of this order, namely that section 3 of the Public Printing and Stationery Act assigns the audit of all accounts for the advertising required for the public service to the Department of Public Printing and Stationery. I need not point out that an Order in Council cannot set aside the provisions of an Act of Parliament. Until the Act is amended such accounts should be audited by the King's Printer.

## Printing done at Dawson without reference to King's Printer.

SIR,--I beg to call your attention to the acompanying statement showing the amounts paid during the current fiscal year to the Yukon Sun for printing forms, \&c. Section 3 of the Public Printing and Stationery Act provides that all printing, dic., shall be executed subject to the superintendence and audit of the King's Printer. The execuition, accordingly, of any more work of this nature other than through the King's Printer is illegal. I can understand that on account of the distance it might occasionally be necessary to have small orders executed in Dawson, but in order that this might be done, an amendment to that effect should be made to the Act. It seems to me that a great deal of the work done by the Sun might have been anticipated and have been obtained through the King's Printer, the only legitimate source.

## Commission on Gold Dust Paid Canadian Bank of Commerce.

Audit Office, Ottawa, May 8, 1901.
Sir,-In the vouchers received for the expenditure at Dawson during the current fiscal year, I find that Mr. Ogilvie has paid the Canadian Bank of Commerce sums amounting to $\$ 6,313.69$ for commissions on gold dust shipped to the Seattle Assay Office. The amount of gold dust deposited with the bank was $\$ 16,084: 1$ ounces, on which the bank advanced the sum of $\$ 241,261.95$ being at the rate of $\$ 15$ per ounce. The amount realized by the assay was $\$ 239,743.10$, there being a net loss of $\$ 1,518.85$. The bank commission of 2 per cent on the amount realized by the assay amounted to $\$ 4,794.84$, the amount paid to the bank being made up of this commission and the amount advanced by the bank in excess of the assay returns. I would like a copy of the arrangement made with the bank under which it receives a commission of 2 per cent on the gold dust handled. I would also draw your attention to the amount lost in assay, and would ask what steps are taken to prevent a miner from paying his royalty with an inferior grade of gold dust. I think that, while the commission paid the bank for handling the gold dust is properly chargeable against the appropriation, the loss in the assay should not be so charged but should be made a charge against the revenue. I would, therefore, ask you to apply for a transfer crediting the Yukon appropriation and debiting the revenue with the amount lost by assay.

Sir, -In reply to yours of August 25, file 572694, referring to certain shortages in Assay returns on the gold paid in as royalty, I beg to inclose herewith, for your information, a copy of a report from the comptroller, to myself on that subject.

Sir,-I am in receipt of a copy of a letter from the department, dated August 25, Ref. No. 572694, together with your letter asking for a report on the question of loss by assay of gold dust paid as royalty. On April 20, 1899, I sent a circular to all the royalty collectors requesting them to use every care and see that gold dust paid as royalty, was free from dust and properly cleaned. Copy of this letter is inclosed. At the beginning of the present season, I purchased magnets, and supplied one for the use of the collectors at-each office where royalty was paid, asking them to see that the black sand was removed. It is pointed out in the letter from the department above referred to, that the loss on assay $2,000 a$, including freight and charges amounted to $\$ 6,683.53$. This gold dust was from Grand Forks, and was accepted in payment of royalty on claims on Eldorado Creek, Gold and Cheechacke Hills, and contained a considerable portion of nuggets mixed with quartz; but no more, I would think, than fairly represented the average product of the claim. The gold from Eldorado Creek and Gold and Cheechacko Hills varies very much in value. I inclose statement of the values of gold dust furnished me by the Bank of British North America, showing how assay value differs in the gold produced from the same creeks and benches.

Eldorado, from $\$ 15.50$ to $\$ 14.73$.; Gold and Cheechacko Benches, from $\$ 16$ to $\$ 13$. From this, there would have to be deducted $2 \frac{1}{4}$ per cent for freight and insurance, which was the charge made by the Canadian Bank of Commerce during June. I also inclose statement which I got from the Alaska Commercial Company of assays made by Selby, of San Francisco, of twenty-five differents samples taken from the creeks and benches in this district. Although they were very well cleaned, the loss in melt varies from 2 to 4 per cent. Eldorado dust is worth according to this assay, $\$ 14.42$. This is without allowing 14 cents for silver which we do not get when sold in Dawson ; and there would have to be deducted $2 \frac{1}{4}$ per cent freight and insurance, leaving $\$ 14.10$, for what I am informed was a fair sample of the gold of this creek. I inclose a copy of a letter from Sgt. Marshall (who had charge at Grand Forks) to Inspector MacDonell, in reply to inquiries made by me on this subject. Dealing with the third paragraph, assay $2,000, Q$. realized a gain of $\$ 1,325.38$. This dust was from Dominion Creek, a glance at the assay statement inclosed will show that Dominion dust averages over $\$ 1.25$ per ounce, more than Eldorado. It will thus be seen that the government does not make an actual loss on the royalty collected at Grand Forks, but obtained from the bank a temporary credit of $\$ 15$ per ounce, which is more than the dust is worth and this has to be adjusted when the value is determined. Freight and insurance was charged on all dust assayed up to the time that I was instructed by telegraph, dated June 25, from the Honourable Minister of Finance, to warehouse the gold and wait the result of the tenders which were called for at Ottawa. The result of the first shipment disposed of under this tender has been returned to the department in my letter of credit statement for September. I wish to point out that a very large proportion of the royalty was paid in currency this season, almost altogether so, on Gold Run, Dominion, Hunker, Sulphur and Upper Bonanza; these being the creeks that produce the most valuable gold. The payment of royalty is accepted at the rate of $\$ 15$ per ounce. It has been considered advisable to accept currency rather than compel dust to be paid, as that would necessitate the employment of a gold dust expert on each creek, and could not be attended to by the non-commissioned officers of the North-west Mounted Police; in fact, I have yet to see the man in Dawson who can tell the product of the different creeks with any certainty.

Sir,-Referring to my letter to you of the June 25, I have now to confirm th following message sent you this day:-
'Have accepted tender Bank Commerce for handling our gold this season. Deliver 'to that bank all gold at approximate value subject readjustment. Am writing fully.'

For your information I inclose a copy of Mr. Fielding's letter to the Bank of Commerce calling for their tender, and also a copy of the bank's reply. The terms thereof are, I think, sufficiently explicit to enable you to carry out this feature of our business at Dawson. The gold is to be deposited with the Bank of Commerce at an approximate value ( $\$ 15$ an ounce seems to have been the rate in the past) and the receipts and draft for the amounts so deposited are to be sent out with as little delay as possible. When the returns of the assay value come in from the assay office you are to satisfy yourself as to the accuracy and correctness of the bank's statements as per assay office certificates. The bank's commission of 2 per cent is then to be deducted; the account adjusted; and the receipt and draft for the balance forwarded in the usual course. I have received your message of the 6th instant, advising me of the revenue for June as $\$ 434,000$. I need hardly remind you of the necessity of keeping the royalty revenue for 1899-1900 and 1900-1901 distinct.

## Living Allowance Paid Yukon Officials While Travelling to Ottawa.

Audit Office, Ottawa, May 17, 1901.
Sir,-I find from the statement of expenditure at Dawson during the month of March, under letter of credit that Mr. H. E. Baine, one of the draughtsmen employed at Dawson, received an advance of $\$ 400$ on March 9 th for travelling expenses. On the same date he received $\$ 400$ as salary and living allowance from March 1st to April 30th at $\$ 200$ per month including six weeks' leave of absence from March 20th. Mr. Baine appears to have left Dawson for Ottawa on March 16th, arriving at his destination on April 9th. During this time his travelling expenses, including board and lodging en route were paid out of the $\$ 400$ received for travelling expenses. The $\$ 200$ paid Mr. Baine monthly is made up of $\$ 50$ on account of salary and $\$ 150$ for board and lodging allowance. I am of the opinion that this allowance should only be paid while the employees are actually in the Yukon Terriotry. Accordingly Mr. Baine should be paid board allowance for only the first fifteen days of March, his full expenses when travelling being paid from that date. The payment of salary in advance is also
irregular, as no salary should be paid in advance of the regular pay day, that is in this case, before the end of each month. I would also ask under what regulations Mr. Baine is allowed six weeks' leave of absence.

He was allowed his salary and living allowance to November 16, from which date until February 1, he drew neither pay nor living allowance. Mr. Hamilton appears to have left Dawson for Ottawa on November 5, receiving $\$ 225$ as an advance for his travelling expenses, the balance amounting to $\$ 2.60$ being paid at Ottawa, his travelling expenses covering his living expenses throughout his journey. I do not think that he is entitled to his living allowance for this period, when he was absent from Dawson and when his travelling expenses were paid by the government. This case seems to be similar to that of Mr. Baine, who was called upon to refund the amount paid him for living expenses when away from Dawson.

## Living Allowance at Dawson, paid Yukon Officials while travelling on trips of Inspection.

Sir,--I beg to call your attention to the correspondence on the subject of the payment of living allowance to certain officials at Dawson while absent upon trips of inspection, a copy of which will be found on pages L-95, 96, 97 of my last report, and more particularly to your letter of January 14, 1901, in which you say that 'it has now been decided that the regular monthly allowance that is paid officials for living and lodging expenses must cease when these officials are absent on business and that for the time they are so absent they shall receive instead the allowance which is paid mining inspectors, namely, thier actuel travelling expenses. If any amount in excess of this has been paid' it will have to be refunded.' I notice that in the accounts of this year, various trips have been made by the officials, the expenses of which are paid in full, while at the same time they are receiving their regular board allowances. Kindly inform me what refunds have come to hand, either for the past fiscal year or for the present year for board allowances thus drawn in excess.

Sir,-Referring to your letter of the 14th instant, regarding the payment of living allowances while officials are away from Dawson, I beg to say that I quite approve of the position taken by you, that where officials have been given leave of absence to visit their homes in the east, or to visit the east on business, the living allowance should cease. I find, however, that there are many cases where officials have to leave Dawson to go up the creeks for a few days at a time in the discharge of their duties, and I am of the opinion that it would be very hard to make a cast-iron rule that in these cases a deduction should be made in their regular living allowance, as in most cases, if not all, the arrangement made by the officials with the hotels or other persons with whom they board or have lodgings provides for continuous living, and the fact of their being absent for a few days will not permit them to get a credit for the period of such absence. I appreciate the difficulty with regard to this matter and quite approve of the suggestion that the department should not pay double allowance for expenses,--that is, to pay travelling and living expenses to an official while he is travelling on government business and grant him at the same time the usual living allowance. In many cases, however, it seems to be impossible to overcome the difficulty, and in order to show you how difficult it is in this case I inclose you a copy of a letter received from Mr. Senkler, the gold commissioner, on the subject. I think possibly that it might be well to make a rule that the living allowance can only be allowed during the temporary absence on business connected with the department for say four or five days, and leave the matter to the commissioner to decide. I was not aware until my attention was drawn to the fact recently, that the comptroller undertook to grant living allowances to officials who had leave of absence to come east, and I quite agree with what you say in this connection. There can be no possible justification for such an allowance in these cases, and I will see that the amount so allowed is properly credited.

Sir,-I have been sent by Mr. Ogilvie a copy of departmental letter to Mr. McDougall, the Auditor General, dated the 14th ultimo, in which it is stated that the regular monthly allowance which is paid officials for living and lodging expenses must cease when these officials are absent on business. I beg to state that in the generality of cases the officials in Dawson have a regularsmonthly arrangement with the people with whom they board, and that in cases where they are away for a few days they still have to pay the same amount monthly. This is especially the case where some few of the officials keep house together; the expenses of keeping house still goes on and amounts to the same whether they are away for a few days during the month or not. In the case of Mr. Lithgow and myself we have often to go upon the creeks on business; he in order to inspect the officers, myself to make personal examinations of properties in dispute in my court, especially in cases of boundary disputes. I find that it is a great help in coming to a conclusion to make a personal examination of the ground.

The amount allowed at the present time is not sufficient to cover our expenses, and if in addition to the house expenses I would have to pay the expense I would be put to in going out upon the creeks, there would be a considerable increase in my monthly output. I do not think that it is just that we should be put to this extra expense. When I was in Ottawa last summer I spoke to Mr. Smart on the question of allowance, and I believe it was his intention from what he said to me that the head officials should be allowed $\$ 125$ a month instead of $\$ 100$, as allowed at the present time. The actual cost that myself, Mr. Lithgow and Mr. Gosselin are put to per month amounts to more than $\$ 125$ a month each.

The August sale also occupied but one day, the amount realized being $\$ 6,129$, on which Mr . Eilbeck's commission at 3 per cent was $\$ 183.87$. The September sale, which also occupied but one day, realized $\$ 2,425$, on which Mr. Eilbeck's commission at 3 per cent was $\$ 72.75$. The October sale occupied two days, the amount realized being $\$ 19,157$ and Mr. Eilbeck's commission at 3 per cent $\$ 574.71$. The November sale occupied about nine days, the amount realized being $\$ 57,065$. and Mr. Eilbeck's commission at 2 per cent being $\$ 1,141.50$, making his total commi

Mr. Eilbeck received during the last year $\$ 3,000$ as salary as sheriff and $\$ 1,800$ as living allowance. I am of the opinion that the payment for these sales should, under any circumstances have been much smaller and particularly in view of the fact that he was receiving full pay for all his time in his salary as sheriff.

## Accounts for Surveys at West Dawson not Properly Certified.

Sir,-On March 8th last, a payment was made by Mr. Ogilvie, at Dawson, to Chas. M. Wendworth, of $\$ 633.90$. This was for the cost of a survey of cabins and lots in

West Dawson town site, made in 1899, by C. L. W. Barwell, D.L.S., the items being as follows:-

> To survey and plans of cabins on West Dawson town site. . $\$ 20000$ " consultation with Mr. Ogilvie. ................... 5000 " lot survey as per Mr. Ogilvie's instructions. . ......... " paid saw mill for stakes. ...................... ".   .

There is no certificate on these accounts that the services have been performed and that the prices are fair and just, the only approach to a certificate being the words: 'Approved, Wm. Ogilvie.' The item of $\$ 33.90$ paid to the saw-mill for stakes should be supported by a receipted account from the firm from whom the stakes were procured. This voucher is accompanied by an affidavit made by Mr. Woodworth, but it does not appear clear to me why the costs of these services have been repaid to Mr. Woodworth after having been paid by him originally. I would like to have a certificate to the effect that the services were duly authorized, that the work was performed and that the prices were fair and just. I would also like an explanation why it is at this day made a charge against the Dominion government. 1

Sir,-I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 14th inst., in which you ask an explanation respecting the payment of $\$ 633.90$ made on on March 8th last, by Mr. Ogilvie, at Dawson, to Chas. M. Woodworth for the cost of a survey of cabins and lots in West Dawson townsite, made in 1899 by C. L. W. Barwell, D.L.S. The circumstances under which this payment was made are briefly as follows :-

On June 23, 1897, G. B. Johnston et al., made application to the department to purchase 160 acres of land for agricultural purposes opposite Dawson, at what is commonly called West Dawson. They had a survey made of the land and the purchase price was to have been $\$ 3$ per acre. Subsequently, a fever cpidemic broke out in Dawson and a large numeber of people moved across the river and built cabins on the land which Johnston had under cultivation. He remonstated with them without avail, since they claimed that the government authorities had ratified their action, and in fact had ordered them to go there. Mr. Johnson then made a claim against the government for damages which he assessed at $\$ 5,000$. Following this, Mr. Ogilvie arranged with Mr. Johnson and his attorney, Mr. Woodworth, that a grant of the land would be made to them, provided they would relinquish all claim for damages against the government, pay $\$ 10$ per acre for the land, and deal as leniently as possible with the occupants. $\Lambda$ system of survey was devised by Mr. Ogilvie, arranged to create as little disturbance as possible to the occupants, and Mr. Barwell, a Dominion Land Surveyor, was enıployed by Mr. Woodworth to make the survey on the ground. It cost $\$ 633.90$. After every moans had been exhausted to arrive at a settlement with the occupants and without success, Mr. Woodworth, who in the meantime had purhased all rights to the land from his client, took the ground that he should not be put to the expense of ejection proccedings, and to settle the diffienlty he agreed tn abandon all claims to the land provided the actual cost of the surrey were refunded to him. In view of the complicated circumstances, it was thought advisable to make the refund, and thus place the department in a position to sell
the lots to the persons in occupation. M.r. Woodworth furnished an affidavit in triplicate regarding the payment made by him to Mr. Barwell, D.L.S., for the cost of the survey, together with a receipted account from Mr. Barwell, and on March 8 last, a payment of $\$ 633.90$ was made to him by Mr. Ogilvie. The application to purchase has been cancelled and the returns of the survey made by Mr. Barwell havo been handed over to the Examiner of Surveys at Dawson. The Commissioner of the Yukon Territory, or the Examiner of Surveys may, if you consider it necessary, be requested to certify that the work was perfomed, and that the prices were fair and just. It is evident from the circumstances which I have related that they will be ready to give the certificate. They may also, if you wish, certify that the services were authorized in the manner which I have explained.

The entry of $\$ 246.75$ for disbursements up to December 30 , is supported by a pay-list covering the period between November 10 and December 8, 1900. The disbursements covered by the January statement embrace identical payment for wages up to December 8, which are supported by separate receipts dated in the early part of December, and in addition sundry payments for board, livery, \&c. In this way the agent has been given credit, for the amount of the pay-lists, viz. : $\$ 246.75$, a second time ; and, instead of there being a balance of $\$ 99.06$ due him at the end of the operations, the agent should have deposited $\$ 147.69$ to the credit of the Receiver General. Mr. Kisley has thus been overpaid the amount of $\$ 246.75$. I have to ask that you obtain a refund of this amount at your earliest convenience.

Sir,-I beg to acknowledge your letter of the 7th inst., file No. 123234 (2) inclosing copy of a letter received from the Auditor General, together with four coupons referring to Scrip notes received with my return of December 23, 1900. I return the coupons herewith inclosed and have noted the number and amount of each scrip note and regret very much that this was not done when the return was forwarded to you, and the only reason I can give for the omission is that we were very busy and by an oversight omitted to enter the scrip notes.

The Scrip received for counterfoils Nos. 28270, 28271, 28272 was handed to me by Mr. S. W. Gebo and as the work entailed therewith was considerable and Mr. Gebo had other matters to attend to while in town I asked him to call later in the day and sign the counterfoils and obtain the receipts, but unfortunately he did not call at the the office again, and when my assistant made out the cash statement and found the coupons not signed he thought the amount had been received by mail and made a note accordingly. I have obtained Mr. Gebo's signature to the coupons, and inclose a certificate from him that the scrip was handed to me on the date named.

I inclose coupon No. 28275 with the Scrip notes and amount of each noted thereon and I also inclose a letter dated December 19, from Mr. A. W. McVittie asking me to call at the Union Bank and obtain $\$ 400$ worth of scrip, and a letter from same gentleman, dated December 20, inclosing order for scrip for $\$ 120$ and cheque to purchase scrip to the value of $\$ 400$. In this connection, I beg to report that in no case have I ever received directly for indirectly any pecuniary or other benefit as a commission on scrip and when I purchased the scrip for Mr. McVittie, who was acting for Daniel Wannamaugher, I did so to accommodate him and as your circular letter of March 24, 1900, directs me, that when payment is tendered at my office in the purchase of Dominion lands, I am to notify the person making the payment, that scrip or cash, as the payer may wish will be accepted, I consider that I was acting in accordance with the wish of the department when I called at the bank for the scrip for Mr. McVittic.

SIR,-In accordance with your instructions I made inquiry into the above matter, and found the facts to be about as stated in the correspondence in relation thereto, now on file in the department.

Some time subsequent to the robbery, the police arrested a young man, who at the time of the robbery was one of the assistants in the office robbed. I inclose you herewith a copy of the depositions taken at the preliminary hearing of the case, which was dismissed, as there was not sufficient evidence to sustain the charge.

I visited Grand Forks and interviewed Sergeant Raven, of the North-west Mounted Police, who had charge of the matter, but he informed me that although the police had made every endeavour, they have been utterly unable to discover the robber or recover any part of the money stolen.

He stated to me, in addition, that he was perfectly satisfied that Mr. A. C. Robertson, the mining inspector in charge of the office, had no knowledge of, or part in the robbery. I am of the same opinion, but I do think he showed gross ignorance in the duties of his office in allowing so many people to know the combination of the safe. In his evidence at the above investigation, he swore that at least one Latimer, one Spence, and the accused, all knew the combination, and he informed me that he had personally supplied each of these men with it. His excuse for so doing was that he had received no instructions in regard to the duties of his office; that he found the assistants in possession of the combination when he took charge, and that he therefore thought it was proper for them to know it.

## Office of Inspector of Mines, Grand Forks, May 24, 1901.

Sir,-I have to report to you that during the night of May 23 the safe, a fournumber combination, in this office was rifled of its contents.

I closed the office myself on the 23 rd , about $9.15 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$., and locked the safe securely, as well as the office door. On returning to the office about 8 a.m. on the 24 th, I found the office door unlocked, but closed, while the safe door stood open, and all its money contents, excepting cheque for $\$ 200$, payable to W. K. Latimer as salary, $\$ 30$ in gold coin, and $\$ 2$ bill and one 50 cents piece, carried off.

All the papers in the safe had been examined and scattered about the floor.
The drawer in the writing table had also been gone through and a revolver belonging to myself taken.

The only thing in the safe which was not touched was the lower of the three small drawers, which contained my private papers, and gold to the amount of about $\$ 250$; this drawer I kept locked, and carried the key myself.

## Re Local Revenue, Yukon : Payment to F. X. Gosselin for making assessment of Town of Dawson.

It seems to call for some explanation why the Yukon Commissioner and Council employed a Dominion official to assist in making an assessment of the town of Dawson ; how this official could perform his duties as Timber and Land Agent and at the same time make over $\$ 500$ per month.

Dear Sir,-I have your letter of the 8 th instant with reference to the employment of Mr. F. X. Gosselin, Crown Timber and Land Agent at Dawson, by the local authorities at that place as an assessor, and in which you state that some explanation should be made by the Yukon Commissioner and Council as to the employment of a Yukon official to make an assessment of the town of Dawson, and as to how this officual could perform his duties as Timber and Land Agent and at the same time receive over $\$ 500$ per month for his services as assessor.

I may say in reply that my impression is, that so far as the department is concerned, it could not take any exception to Mr. Gosselin's employment so long as it did not interfere with his duties as agent. It is presumed that Mr. Gosselin performed the duties in connection with the assessment outside of office hours, although I have no information at all on the subject. There does not, however, appear to me to be any question as to the right of the authorities to employ him and for Mr. Gosselin to to accept the position, unless the department had given direct instructions that he should not be so employed. Of course, in this instance there was no opportunity of considering the matter at all as he was employed without reference to the department.

I may add that I have understood that it is not an uncommon thing for officials of the government to be engaged to do any special work, outside of the government service, which does not interfere with the duties of their office, and I do not know that any exception has been taken to it. However, for your information, I will be glad to write to Dawson and ascertain the facts in connection with this matter.

## Re Purchase of Law Books.

Audit Office, Ottawa, Oct. 14, 1901.
Sir,-On January 25 th last, Pattullo \& Ridley were paid $\$ 552.35$ for Law Reports, \&c., and on February 1, James Craig was paid $\$ 478$ for Law Reports and $\$ 76.84$ for freight, insurance, \&c., on the same. Please explain why these books were not purchased from Carswell \& Co., direct, or from some other regular dealer. The practice of buying anything on government account from others than the regular dealers in such goods is recognized throughout the service as objectionable.

Judge Craig (presumably the same person) was allowed $\$ 350$ for freight on his Law Library when moving to the Yukon for the reason that these books would cer-
tainly be very useful to the judge, and the bar would also have more or less advantage from having these books available. In view of this allowance, explanations should bo given why freight is again claimed and allowed. The account covers 94 volumes, for 91 of which $\$ 5$ per volume is charged, and for the other 3 a lump sum of $\$ 23$. Among these are 16 volumes of Supreme Court Reports. These reports are sold by the Recorder of the Court to the public at $\$ 2.50$ per single copy and to Carswell \& Co. at $\$ 1.25$ per volume, as they order large numbers of them.

In the account of Pattullo \& Ridley the number of volumes is not given and consequently there is no means of forming any opinion as to price charged.

The account of Mr. Craig is certified by Judge Dugas as follows: 'The above are the prices of Carswell \& Co.'s catologue and freight added', 'Goods supplied, prices fair and just.' It is not clear whether or not the rate of $\$ 5$ per volume covers both the catalogue price and freight. If so, freight should not afterwards be charged, even had the government not previously made an allowance for the freight. Do Carswell \& Co., not give a discount on Catalogue prices ?

The account of Pattullo \& Ridley is certified by Judge Craig, 'Goods received, prices fair and just.'

Sir,-Regarding the purchase from Pattullo \& Ridley of $\$ 552.35$, all I know is that I understood the books were purchased through Mr. Justice Dugas, who asked me to certify as to the price, which I did. I was also under the impression that the books were purchased by the Yukon Council. The books purchased from myself were some reports in my own library which I brought into the Yukon with me. Mr. Justice Dugas suggested to me that if I had the books I should sell them to the Yukon Council to fill up shortages in the library. They were sold at Carswell's Catalogue prices. I received my cheque from the Yukon Council, and I understood that the bcoks were purchased by the Yukon Council out of a fund which they had for the purpose. The lawyers in the Yukon Territory pay annual fees as well as admission fees, and these fees, I understand, while not kept in a separate account, are yet applied for the purpose of purchasing books. It was out of this fund I understood my account was paid.

As to the charge for freight. While I was allowed $\$ 350$ freight on Law Books my freight bill on Law Books was $\$ 565$, so that you will see I brought in a very much larger quantity of books than I was allowed freight on. I will be very happy to forego the $\$ 76.84$ freight, if the government will make up the additional $\$ 215$, which I had to pay on freight, not speaking of wharfage, cartage and other charges. My library, which was an exceedingly large one, was used by the lawyers themselves, and I had to furnish a library at my own expense and keep a housekeeper to keep it clean for the use of the lawyers, while matters of that nature which were required by my brother judge, Mr. Justice Dugas, were all paid for from public funds.

I trust this explanation will be satisfactory.

Sir,-Referring to the letter of the Auditor General re purchase of books from Judge Craig and Mr. Ridley, I beg to say, in the first place, that I did not know that the council was in any way bound to buy books needed for the court more from Mr. Carswell than anybody else. It will be remembered that the money appropriated for that purpose is wholly the product of the fees imposed on members of the bar, and which the council has decided to apply, in all instances, to the purchase of law books.

As to those bought from Judge Craig, the council took the precaution of obtaining from the clerk of the court, Mr. Charles Macdonald, his certificate as to their value. His letter inclosed explains itself. We did not know, of course, anything about the freight paid thereon by the government. Having bought other books from Mr. Ridley, which came direct, I understand, from Carswell, the council thought that it would be proper to have them valued by Judge Craig, who was kind enough to put the ordinary certificate to the list, and it was thought that no better precaution could be taken, so both amounts were paid.

I may add that it may appear from the east that it would be, in all circumstances, better to address ourselves directly to book sellers' when we need books, but from here, where we have had the experience of so many long delays to have orders filled, and where we were so much in need of books such as those we bought, that we were very glad to have the opportunity of obtaining them here, not thinking for a moment that any fault could be found therewith by the Auditor General at Ottawa.

Sir,-Referring to the books purchased from Messrs. Pattullo \& Ridley, I beg to say that this was a consignment of books sent by Messrs. Carswell \& Co. to N. F. Hagel, K.C. Mr. Hagel did not take the books, and going over the list, I thought the prices seemed to be these which would have been charged in Toronto, and were, in my opinion, fair and reasonable. Mr. Ridley assured me that the only advance was that of the freight actually paid.

Referring to Mr. Justice Craig's books, they consisted of a set of old Upper Canada and Ontario Reports, and were very complete. The prices paid for them,

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not sneaking of freight, seemed the proper ones. As to the question of who paid the freight on any of these books, I know nothing. Both lists of books were badly needed, and were a valuable acquisition to the library. I may say that in particular the Ontario Reports are largely used.

## Re Local Revenue, Yukon Election Expenses.

Audit Office, Ottawa, October 15, 1901.
Sir,-Ordinance No. 33, which fixes the fees for election services, provides that each officer for every mile necessarily travelled in discharge of his duties shall be paid 25 cents.
J. M. Eilbeck delivered thirteen ballot boxes at sundry pr,ints between Dawson and White Horse. He was paid for 920 miles-the distance both ways at 25 cents per mile, according to the tariff. Please explain why he was allowed in addition his steamboat fare, $\$ 95$. The White Pass and Yukon route was also paid $\$ 19.50$ for transportation, making the whole cost of delivering the thirteen boxes $\$ 344.50$.
E. Duval was paid $\$ 953.25$ for bringing these thirteen boxes back to Dawson. To make up this amount he was allowed mileage on each box at 25 cents per mile, even when two boxes were brought from the same place. He was paid for 3,813 miles. The ordinance says 25 cents for every mile necessarily travelled. Is it claimed that 3,813 miles were necessarily travelled in collecting these boxes? Presumably these boxes were all collected in one trip for which he should have been allowed mileage both ways. Instead he was paid for thirteen trips one way. This voucher is certified as follows by R. J. Eilbeck, Returning Officer, 'Certified correct and as per agreement. Prices as per ordinance No. 33 ; boxes delivered to me this day.' It is marked 'approved' by the commissioner and 'examined' by yourself. I have to request that you will furnish reasons for the method of making out the account, so much at variance with the tariff and so unusual in the manner of the charges.

## Re Local Revenue-Yukon-Interest paid Bank of Commerce.

Sir,-I have to call your attention to two payments, amounting to $\$ 895.05$ made by the Commissioner of the Yukon Territory out of the Local Revenue, to the Bank of Commerce, for interest on overdrawn account.

This overdraft arose from the delay in getting a refund from the Public Works Department for expenditure on roads, bridges, \&c. It commenced towards the end of December, 1899, and lasted to August following. During that time the average balance at the credit of the Dominion Government in the Bank of Commerce was over $\$ 150,000$, on which no interest is paid.

There is no more reason in the bank charging intcrest on this account, than there would be in its charging interest on the advances made on Letter-of-Credit account; and it should be called on to refund the amount.

A statement is required showing how the advance of $\$ 1,500$ was expended, what services Mr. McGregor was performing during October, 1899, and January, February, March and April, 1900, and why he was not paid his salary and living allowance for these months until October 6, 1900.

I may explain that, as far as I know, the reason why Mr. McGregor was paid his salary to the end of October, 1899, was because he came out from Dawson at that time, and he was again paid after January, as he had then resumed the duties of his office in connection with the enforcement of the regulations and the inauguration of the importation of liquor into the Yukon Territory.

However, as Mr. McGregor's salary and expenses are paid from Local Revenue, any information required in this connection would, I presume, be furnished by the Yukon Council.

Sir,-According to your returns it scems that Mr. J. D. McGregor, Chief Inspector of Licenses, left Dawson for the east about the beginning of October, 1899, and seached there on his return in June, 1900.

While Mr. McGregor was in Ottawa in February, 1900, he was advanced $\$ 1,500$ by the Department of Interior to pay his expenses and also for the services of assistants in connection with preventive service ; and was instructed to account to you for the expenditure connected therewith. You have not furnished to this office any such account of this $\$ 1,500$; please do so.

Were these the assistants referred to by the department when advancing the $\$ 1,500$ ?

On October 6 you paid him his salary and living allowance for October, 1899, and for January, Fcbruary, March and April, 1900, amounting in all to $\$ 1,600$. From October 1, 1899, to April 18, 1900, Mr. Bliss was paid by you as acting Chief License Inspector at the same rate as Mr. McGregor receives.

I have to ask for full information in connection with these rather compliented payments -
(1.) Was Mr. McGregor sent east in October, 1889, by authority of your Council ?
(2.) Why was payment of his salary and living allowance so long delayed ?
(3.) Why was a living allowance of $\$ 120$ per month, which may not be too great in Dawson, paid for the time he was in the east, where the cost of living is certainly less than $\$ 4$ a day?

Sir,-I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 16th ult., inquiring into certain payments made to Mr. J. D. McGregor, chief license inspector.

Referring to the advance of $\$ 1,500$ from Ottawa to Mr. MeGregor, I beg to state that this advance has not yet been adjusted, owing to the fact that Mr. McGregor has accounts for travelling expenses which were held for further inquiry.

Messrs. Robert Lowe, W. H. Boyd and E. McKeown are the assistants referred to who were employed as preventive officers under the direction of Mr. MeGregor.

In October, 1899, Mr. McGregor went east to arrange for a more efficient preventive service, he being, at that time, the only officer engaged in the suppression of the illegal importation of liquor into the territory, as well as the illicit manufacture of it.

He was on leave of absence during November and December, 1899, but resumed his duties from January 1, 1900, and was, I understand, in consultation with the government re the enactment of more stringent liquor regulations and matters connected with the issue of permits.

He went east for the purpose above referred to, after consultation with the Commissioner, and by his permission. The reason the payment of his salary and living allowance was so long delayed arose from the fact that we were advised that all the moneys received from the issue of liquor permits would be paid at Ottawa and the expenses of the preventive service paid out of that fund; this was subsequently rescinded.

With regard to living allowance being paid at the rate of $\$ 120$ per month while east, I beg to say that Mr. McGregor's salary was fixed at $\$ 200$ per month and living allowance at $\$ 120$ and his actual travelling expenses; but it was not provided that the living allowance should be reduced if cut of the territory; consequently, when his account was presented to the Commissioner, he authorized the payment at that rate.

The itemised receipts for the $\$ 85.30$ in connection with the expenses incurred in taking the census at Tagish have been paid by police vouchers which were forwarded to Ottawa with the police accounts.

## Election Commission: Letter of Credit.

Audit Office, Ottawa, December 27, 1900.
Sir,-I have your application of this date for a $\$ 5,000$ cheque in favour of Sil John Boyd and Mr. John D. Falconbridge for expenses of the judicial inquiry into certain election matters.

It is evident from Mr. Falconbridge's letter, which accompanies the application, that the writer does not understand the importance which we attach to using the credit as we expect it to be done. Instead of having the amount of the credit transferred bodily to Toronto to be placed to any one's credit and to be used in any way there, it is expected that one uniform procedure is to be followed. The greatest stress is laid upon the continuous use of the two names in the credit, one being a check upon the other. Then it is intended that the cheques drawn upon the credit be made to the order of the public creditor, the only exceptions being for such sums as may be required to be advanced for travelling expenses or other small outlay immediately required.

Mr. Falconbridge should understand that no payments for the services of the members of the commission or himself should be made out of the credit.

Before any further credit is issued Mr. Falconbridge should explain what use has been made of the $\$ 1,000$ already paid, and make a statement of the disbursements which are expected to be made from the credit sought and when they are likely to be required.

## Extra Pay to a Permanent Employee.

Audit Office, Ottawa, June 5, 1901.
Sir,-I beg to ask for explanation of an account rendered by Mr. G. S. Malepart, the accountant at St. Vincent de Paul penitentiary, amounting to $\$ 29.63$ for services and expenses in connection with the case of Lussier vs. The Queen, submitted to arbitration in June, 1900. In this account Mr. Malepart makes a charge of $\$ 3$ a day for five days' services as secretary taking depositions, and it seems to me this charge should have been disallowed by the department in view of the fact that Mr. Malepart is a permanent penitentiary officer employcd at a yearly salary.

The department has not the right to increase Mr. Malepart's salary, which is fixed by statute.

These are permanent employees in the government service, and as such come under the operations of the following order in council :-19th August, 1900 : That the provisions of the 9 th seetion of the order in council of 27 th July, 1882, which provides amongst other things : 'That at any time, if the public service requires it, the heads of departments, or deputy heads, to have the right to call for the attendance of all or any of the officers or clerks at an earlier hour than those named ' be confirmed.

That no extra salary or additional remuneration of any kind whatsoever be paid to any deputy head, officer or employee permanently employed in the civil service of Canada, unless an amount to provide for the payment has first been specially voted by parliameut.

If this order means anything it means that an order which does not mention and which contravenes it is not legal.

## Department of Justice, Ottawa, June 27, 1901.

Sir,-I have the honour to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 25 th instant, in which you state that you have passed the application of this department of the 6 th instant in connection with the arbitration award and expenses in the case of Lussier vs. The Queen, with the exception of the amounts in favour of Mr. E. R. Cameron, G. S. Malepart, and Miss H. E. Stewart.

Your objection to these items I understand to be that they contravene the order in eouncil of August 19, 1900, whieh provides that no extra salary or additional remuneration of any kind whatsoever shall be paid to any deputy head, officer or employee permanently employed in the civil service of Canada, unless an amount to provide for the payment has first been specially voted by parliament.

In reply, I beg to state that it seems to me to be quite clear that these payments would not be extra salary or additional remuneration within the meaning of that order in council, or of the Civil Service Act. They could not properly be so considered even if they were for services rendered to the government, for the services for which the charges are made were certainly not such as at the time of the appointment of the officers in question could legitimately have been intended or expected to be within the scope of the ordinary duties of their offices (Bradley vs. The Queen, 27 S.C.R. 657).

But the services in question were as a matter of fact not rendered to the government, but to the litigants in the matter of Lussier's claim. So far as the question under discussion is coneerned, it is a mere matter of accident that the expense of them, or part of it, is directed to be paid by the government as one of the litigants. The whole amount with the other costs and expenses of the arbitration might have been ordered to be paid by Lussier, the claimant.

That order was passed on representations made by the Auditor General to the Treasury Board in regard to certain payments asked for by your own department under the decision of the Supreme Court (Bradley $v s$. The Queen, 27 S.C.R., 657) in favour of permanent employees for work done outside their regular office duties; and I have, therefore, taken the directions addressed therein to the departments generally as given, in view of that decision, for their future guidance in the matter of extra work. If, however, the Governor in Council desires to make an exception in the present instance he may, I presume, do so by a special order.

I have passed $\$ 90$ of the $\$ 200$ asked for in favour of Mr. Cameron, namely, $\$ 50$, the amount deducted from the award, and $\$ 40$ to cover out-of-pocket expenses.

In reply I beg to state that under section 927 of the Criminal Code, 1892, as that section is enacted by the Act 63-64 Victoria, chapter 46, which came into force on January 1 of the present year, moneys of this class recovered in the provinces are payable to the treasurer of the province in which the same are imposed or recovered, to be applied by him in the manner prescribed in aid of the administration of justice, except in certain cases specified in the section referred to, and in which such moneys are to be paid over to the Receiver General and to form part of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada. I am inclined, however, to think that the Yukon Territory is not to be considered a province within the meaning of this section, and that fines, penalties or forfeitures for the violation of any law of Canada, and the proceeds of estreated recognizances recovered in the territory should be treated as revenue of the Dominion, and I propose to write in this sense to Mr. Justice Dugas and to the Commissioner of the Territory, and to call upon the Territorial government to pay over the moneys to which you refer as having been received in May last.

## Commoners Appointed to Senate : Mode of Calculating Indemnity.

Audit Office, Ottawa, September 26, 1901.

Sir,--Referring to your expenditure on account of Senate indemnity and mileage for the session of 1901, I notice these payments :

Mr. Godbout's indemnity is reckoned at the rate of $\$ 1,500$ for the session, less $\$ 160$ for 20 days' absence, at $\$ 8$, and Mr . Dechene is paid for 4 days at $\$ 10$ per day.

I also notice from the House of Commons expenditure on account of Indemnity and Mileage, payments to these gentlemen of the following amounts for the same session of 1901 :

Mr. Godbout's indemnity is reckoned at the rate of $\$ 1,000$ for the session, less $\$ 360$ for 45 days' absence at $\$ 8$, and Mr . Dechene is paid the full sessional indemnity of $\$ 1,500$.

You will see from this statement that Mr. Godbout has received for the session of $1901, \$ 1,980$ for indemnity, and two mileages amounting to $\$ 133.20$, while Mr. Dechene has received $\$ 1,540$ for indemnity and two mileages, amounting to $\$ 142$.

As the Act respecting the Senate and House of Commons does not, in my opinion, contemplate that any member shall draw more than one sessional indemnity for one session, together with one mileage, please call the attention of these Senators to this matter and obtain refunds of the over-payments so made.

Mr. Dechene in his Senate declaration, dated May 23, the mileage being based on the declaration, gives his residence at St. Roch des Aulnaies, distant from Ottawa, as stated, by the nearest mail route, 348 miles, and in his Commons declaration of the same date, gives his residence at Village des Aulnaies, which is distant from Ottawa by the nearest mail route, 362 miles. Please obtain an explanation of this difference.

## Audit Office, Ottawa, November 20, 1901.

Sir,-Replying to your letter of the 28th September relative to the payments by you to Senators Godbout and Dechene, I have to state that a letter of credit is issued for only such expenditure as you will have reason to believe will not be subject to any objection in the Audit Office. Knowing as you must have known that these gentlemen when paid by you would each be in the receipt of two mileages and an amount on account of indemnity more than either would have obtained as a senator or member of the Commons for the whole session even though subject to deduction for days of absence, and that such payments are open to objection, you would have been within your duties under the conditions of your letter of credit to have applied to the Finance Department and this Office for a Receiver General's cheque, and thrown upon them the responsibility of dealing with the matter before payment was made.

I would emphasize in reference to these cases the restrictions stated as to the use of the letter of credit which should be applied only to the ordinary services of a department, and ask you to be good enough as an accounting officer to follow that system. If you believe that a payment which you, if the matter were entirely in your hands, would feel justified in making, would be objected to in this office you should apply direct to this office for the payment. If this office should decline to pass the application you would still have recourse to the Treasury Board by appeal.

## Re Leather Trunks for Senators and Clerk and Assistant Clerk of the Senate.

Audit Office, Ottawa, September 25, 1901.
Sir,-Referring to your expenditure on account of 'Salaries and Contingencies, Senate,' I notice payments to S. \& H. Borbridge to the amount of $\$ 2,150$ for 86 leather trunks at $\$ 25$ each. These trunks were supplied, as indicated by the vouchers, one each to 83 senators, 2 to Senator Sheyn (one of these being for last parliament), and one each to Clerk Chapleau and Assistant Clerk Boucher. It appears that your authority for this expenditure is a report of the Committee on Printing of Parliament adopted April 25, 1901, 'that each member of the Senate be supplied with a leather trunk at this, the first session of a new parliament,' and a report of the Standing Committee on Internal Economy and Contingent Accounts presented April 29th.

In my opinion the adoption of the reports referred to is insufficient to authorize the payments in question which should be made only when authorized by statute, nor would the terms of the vote from which the payments were made justify its use for the purchase of leather trunks for the senators and others, the words of the vote being 'Salaries and Contingencies.'

Please let me know on what authority leather trunks were supplied to the Clerk and Assistant Clerk of the Senate, whose names do not appear in the report referred to.

I would also call your attention to the report of the Committee on Internal Economy, \&c., referred to, which asks for provision for leather trunks for 81 senators only. The accounts, as stated, show that 86 were purchased.

Please provide the certificate of an expert in the value of trunks as to the fairness of the charge, it having been stated to me that the price was much too great.

In answer to your communication of the 25 th instant on the above subject, I have the honour to state, as you correctly remark, that my authority for making this disbursement is based on a report of the Standing Committee on Internal Economy and Contingent Accounts, which was adopted by the Senate on the 14th of June, 1900 ; but I may also add, for your further information, that the payment of this amount, less $\$ 125$, was made out of an appropriation specially asked and voted for the purpose.

With reference to your inquiry as to the authority for the supply of similar trunks to the officers occupying seats upon the floor of the Senate, i.e. the Clerk, \&c., I would state that the officers in charge of the distribution of those articles reports that it was done as heretofore, by order of the said committee, and I might add that, on looking over the records of this office, I find that this practice has obtained since 1891, without any question having ever been raised against it.

I would also say that the report of the Committee on Interual Economy and Contingent Accounts does not specify that only 81 trunks are to be provided.

As regards the last paragraph of your letter, which calls for 'the certificate' of an expert on the value of the trunks which have been supplied, on the ground that the information has reached you that the price paid for the same was in excess of what it should be, I must decline complying with your request, but will do the next best thing, that is, will place your letter before the chairman of the above committee at as early a date as possible, and as I am informed the committee made the selection of the kind of trunk they wanted and agreed upon the price to be paid for the same themselves, they will be in a better position than I am to give you all the information you ask.

Replying, I have to say that I do not know of any appropriation specially asked and voted for the purpose in question as stated in your letter, and that the terms of the vote, 'Salaries and Contingencies,' under your control, do not legalize the use made of it in this case.

My statement that the order of the committee asked for permission for 81 trunks, while 86 were purchased, was based on the wording of the report of April 29, 1901, sec. 4.

As regards your declining to furnish the certificate of an expert as to the correctness of the price charged, $I$ have to point out that such a certificate is the only evidence which can prove its correctness and, therefore, is an essential voucher.

Sir,-Adverting to your letter of the 3rd instant, received this day, in reply to mine of the 25 th ultimo, relative to the payment of an account for leather trunks for
the Senate, I have the honour to reiterate my former statement, that a special vote was asked and granted for that purpose ; it is true that the vote appears under the heading of Contingencies, but that is nothing new, for if you refer to the Supply Bill you will see that only a lump sum, under the heading of 'Salaries and Contingencies' appears therein, to cover all the expenses of the Senate, including, beside salaries, debates, translations, printing, stationery, trunks, \&c., \&c. Consequently your contention that the payment of this account from the vote above referred to is not legal, is a misapprehension on your part. As regards the report of the contingent committee of April 29 last, to which you allude, you will notice that, the committee does not recommend the purchase of 81 leather trunks, but simply refers to the fact that a supplementary vote has been asked to defray the cost of the same.

Now with reference to the certificate which you ask me to obtain of an expert, 'as to the correctness of the price charged' for these trunks. I do not think, and I am sure you will agree with me, that this purchase comes under the head of transactions requiring such a certificate, said transactions being more in the nature of a contract than of an ordinary purchase, because the sub-committee to whom this duty was entrusted called for samples and prices asked by different makers and dealers, and in this case I am informed the lowest offer was accepted. At all events, I shall, under these circumstances, adhere to my former decision in the matter.

Sir,-I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 4th ultimo with regard to the purchase of leather trunks for senators.

I hope that I can make my position about the appropriation clear.
I suppose you will admit that a senator has no more right to get a cheque, under your letter-of-credit, for twenty five dollars, unless he can show that it is due to him, than any other man that may present himself at your office with a demand for such a sum. You would have no heșitation in disposing of the claim of the other man. If, however, the senator's claim were for some stationery supplies required to be used in the discharge of his duties, you would at once comply, on condition that the appropriation was not exhausted. The ordinary use of an appropriation is to make payments, legal in themselves, i.e., to meet proper charges for the country to bear. That is, a general appropriation is one which does not define the particular thing which is to be provided for a particular person at a particular price, it is used for things which are regular in themselves.

Now, as explained above, with all respect to senators, they have no more right to get leather trunks than I have to get a leather trunk or the twenty-five dollars which a leather trunk costs. Therefore, they must get the direct authority of parliament in some way. Nothing short of the assent of the three branches of the legislature which is given by an Act of parliament will suffice. In recent years payments which would be irregular are made regular very frequently by describing the person or persons who are to be specially favoured and the extent to which they are to be favoured. The item in the Supply Bill in this case might have been : ' $\$ 2,150$-to provide leather trunks for so many senators, the clerk and assistant clerk'-in which case I should have said there is a special vote (in contradistinction to a general vote) which has legalized the expenditure. The acquiescence of any one branch alone, or two branches even, has no effect whatever in legalizing what is otherwise illegal.

Then, with reference to the other branch of our discussion-the requiring the certificate of an expert :

In your view this was a contract because certain persons were invited to tender. The only kind of contract which can do away with the necessity of a certificate of the fairness and justice of the price by a competent judge of the article being supplied, is a contract given to the lowest tenderer after tenders have been called for by 'public' notice. Anything short of a notice to the whole public may be used to help favourites to get extravagant prices.

In conclusion, let me say that, although it is my duty to hear any explanations of misapprehensions on the part of this office or any argument in opposition to its reasonings, I cannot continue to issue credits where expenditure is made contrary to the directions of the office unless, after an appeal to the Treasury Board, I am over-ruled.

## Re Leather Trunks for Members of Commons, Pressmen and Clerk. .

Audit Office, Ottawa, September 25, 1901.

Sir,-Referring to your expenditure on account of 'Contingencies' for 1900-1901, I notice payments to S. \& H. Borbridge and Geo. May \& Sons, of Ottawa, to the amount of $\$ 4,300$ for 172 leather trunks at $\$ 25$ each. These trunks were supplied, as indicated by the accounts, to 163 members of the House of Commons, to the Clerk of the House, and to 8 members of the press gallery. It appears that your authority for this expenditure is a resolution of the House on the recommendation of the Committee on Printing of Parliament, 'that each member of the House of Commons and those members of the press gallery who have served for three consecutive years be supplied with a leather trunk at this, the first session of parliament,' concurred in April 17th, 1901.

The resolution referred to is insufficient to authorize the payments in question which should be made only when authorized by statute.

The terms of the vote, 'Additional amount for contingencies,' from which the payments were made would not justify its use for the purchase of leather trunks for the members and others. I should like to have a certificate from an expert in such work as to the value of the trunks, it having been stated to me by an expert that they were greatly overcharged.

Please let me know on what authority, a leather trunk was assigned to the Clerk of the House, his name not having been in the resolution of the House.

In this connection I would call your attention to a report of the Committee on Printing of Parliament concurred in September 30, 1896, 'that the practice of supplying each senator and member of the House of Commons with a leather trunk and a box of stationery be discontinued in future and the order of the House authorizing the same dated May 5th, 1892, be rescinded.'

Sir,-I have the honour to acknowledge your letter of the 25 th instant, relative to the expenditure on account of contingencies for 1900-1901 and to certain payments for leather trunks supplied members and others.

On a report of the Joint Committee on Printing, recommending that leather trunks be supplied members and others, the House was pleased to concur in the said report and a sub-committee of the Printing Committee composed of business men was empowered to take steps for the proper carrying out of the order of the House. Tenders were asked for and samples of leather trunks were furnished by several firms. After thorough investigation, contracts were awarded for the number of trunks required to the two firms mentioned in your letter. One hundred and seventy-two have been delivered to members, \&c., so far, and I am informed that the members, without exception, are thoroughly satisfied that the trunks are up to sample, and made of solid sole leather.

I am inclined to think that the expert you mentioned was a disappointed tenderer. If such a question is to be raised I have no authority to deal with it, but it must be settled by the committee which has charge of the matter.

The vote 'Additional amount for Contingencies' was placed in the supplementary estimates by the Finance Department towards the specific payment for these trunks, and in paying for them out of that vote the intention of Parliament was carried out by the Accountant of the House.

The members of the 8th Parliament cannot pass resolutions that will bind all future Parliaments-it can only be done by statute, and even that can be repealedand therefore the members of the 9th Parliament had a perfect legal right to direct that leather trunks should be furnished them, and the duty of the officers of the Commons after, an appropriation has been passed by all the branches of Parliament, is to carry out their commands.

The trunk put down for the Clerk of the House was necessary to store away during the recess official clothes, which have been year after year moth-eaten and consequently lost to the country.
