## Auditor General's Office, Ottawa, March 9, 1904.

I have the honour to transmit my Report on expenditure accounts, appropriation and statutory, and on revenue accounts, for the fiscal year 1902-3.

The following rather lengthy correspendence is intrcduced in this place because it illustrates the practical importance of several amendments that this office has been asking for some years to have made to the Audit Act.

The amendments to provide: 1st. That no contract with the goverument be made after the work is completed; 2nd. That in contracts given without tenders, or where tenders have been called for and the lowest tender has not been accepted, the proper officer of the department be required to certify that the prices are fair and just; 3rd. That in all cases the technical officer on whose expert knowledge the department relied when making the contract, be required to supply the fullest information to the Auditor General and all other government officials who have the duty of dealing with contracts.

If it is observed that a great part of the assistance which I was able to give in saving the large sum of money to the country was dependent upon the accidental communication formed with the late Mr. Monro and through him with Mr. Hoffmeister, it will be seen how dangerous it is to rely upon the Auditor General in such an important matter unless he can have recourse to the Chief Engineer for information.

Excuse may be made for some of my remarks in comnection with this correspondence. They should have been different if written in cooler blood.

The magnitude and number of the transactions going through this office are now so increased that I feel parliament shuuld seriously consider also the amendment of the Audit Act along the other lines suggested in a former report, to enable tinis office to cope with the expansion of the business of the country. I feel so strongly on this point that if parliament does not see its way to bring the matter up this session, I shall at the end of the session ask to be superannuated.

## CORNWALL CANAL, LIGHTING AND POWER: M. P. DAVIS' CONTRACTS.

## Lease No. 12,336 and Agreement of June 25, 1896.

This Indenture of Lease, made in duplicate, this twenty-fifth day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six :-

Between Her Majesty Queen Victoria, represented herein by the Honourable the Minister of Railways and Canals for the Dominion of Canada (acting under and by virtue of an Act passed in the 49th year of the reign of Her Majesty, intituled 'An Act respecting the Department of Railways and Canals, and being chapter 37 of the Revised Statutes of Canada, 1886, and of the 33rd section of chapter 13, 52 Victoria, of the Statutes of Canada, and under the authority of an Order in Council, dated at Ottawa, the eighteenth day of February, A.D. 1896, and of an Order in Council, dated the twelfth day of June, 1896, amending the same), hereinafter called the 'lessor,' of the one part;

And Michael P. Davis, of Ottawa, in the County of Carleton and Province of Ontario, hereinafter called the 'lessee,' of the other part:

Witnesseth that the said lessor, in consideration of the rents, covenants, restrictions, provisoes and conditions contained, described and expressed herein and in the annexed terms and conditions, which are hereby adopted by the lessee, and made part of this indenture, has granted, demised and leased, and by these presents, does demise, grant and lease unto the said lessee all that certain lot of ground, a plan of which is hereunto attached, being part of the property belonging to one of the public works of the Dominion of Canada called the Cornwall Canal, and more particularly described as follows:-

Part of lot 1, at the lower end of Sheik's Island, in the Township of Cornwall, commencing on the centre line of the entrance channel to the regulating weir at a point in line with the extreme lower ends of the side walls of the weir; thence south-easterly at right angles to said centre line 150 feet to a post planted at the southeasterly angle of the land now to be described; thence south-easterly on a prolongation of the last course 595 feet, more or less, to the water's edge of the River St. Lawrence; 1hence northerly following the water's edge to a post planted 100 feet from the toe of the outer slope of the lower dam; thence north-westerly at right angles to the said centre line of the entrance channel to the regulating weir, 175 feet, more or less, to a post planted on a line parallel to and 70 feet distant from the centre of the roadway on the dam; thence westerly along said parallel line 55 feet, more or less, to a line parallel to and 150 feet distant from the centre line of the entrance channel to the regulating weir; thence southerly along said parallel line 500 feet, more or less, to the post planted at the south-westerly angle of the land deseribed; containing by admeasurement four acres and eighty-eight one-hundredth parts of an acre, be the same more or less, and as shown on the plan, tinted red, hereunto annexed and signed Collingwood Schreiber, Chief Engineer, and dated the eighteeth day of May, 1896;

And as pursuant to the said lot of land, and subject to the restrictions, reservations and conditions contained, described and expressed herein and in the annexed general terms and conditions, the lessor has granted, demised and leased, and by these presents docs grant, demise and lease to the lessee, the use for manufacturing and mechanical purposes, as hereinafter set forth, so much of the surplus water, if any on Lock No. 30 level, Cornwall Canal, as the lessor may deem advisable, after navigation and existing mills and mill sites hereinafter to be leased, are supplied; and the lessee shall also have
the privilege of using, at a weir hereafter to be constructed by him, on or adjacent to the land hereby demised and as shown on the plan hereunto annexed, for the purpose of power, the amount of water flowing and to flow into the said canal from Hoople's creek, and any increased flow of water into the said canal from the said creek through any works hereafter to be constructed of the lessee. For the purpose of determining such flow of water, the water shall be measured as it passes through Hoople's creek, at the cost of the lessee, by the most modern improved methods, as often as the lessee may require; provided always that such flow of water shall not create, at any time, a current in the said canal which will in any way impede navigation, and for the further securing said navigation it is hereby understood and agreed that the said flow of water so to be delivered or so to plough through said Hoople's creek shall be delivered into the canal in a direction as nearly parallel to the axis of the said canal as possible; and provided also that should it be necessary, on account of the introduction of such extra water, to provide additional weir discharges, the cost of said weir or weirs shall be borne by the lessee;

To have and to hold, the said lot of land and the said surplus water and such increased flow of water into the said canal from the said creek through any works of the lessee, as appurtenant to the said lot of land for the erection of an electric plant and the operation of the machinery therein, and the privileges, rights and easements thereof for the term of twenty-one years from and after the first day of July, A.D. 1806, and ended on the first day of July, A.D., 1917, and thereafter for a term or period of twenty-one years, renewable as is provided and mentioned in the annexed general terms and conditions;

And the said lessee covenants and agrees to pay Her Majesty the Queen, Her heirs and successors, the rent or sum of one thousand dollars yearly and every year for the rent of the said lot of land and for the use of said surplus water and any increased flow of water into the said canal from the said creek through any works of the lessee; all such water to be drawn and conducted from and out of the Cornwall Canal at the regulating weir, as shown on the plan hereunto annexed.

The said yearly rent shall be paid in advance on the second day of January, and the first day of July, in each year, dating from the first day of July, A.D., 1896, the rent for the first two years, in consideration of the erection of the necessary buildings, machinery and other works, not being charged;

That the lessee shall supply electric power to the satisfaction of the Chief Engineer of Railways and Canals for the working of all the locks on the Cornwall Canal at sixtythree dollars per horse power per ancum;

That the lessee shall also supply and work electric direct current are lights of not less than 2,000 candle power, in perfect working order, at such points and such number as shall, from time to time be deemed necessary by the chief engineer aforesaid, running all night whenever so required, along the canal, and maintain and keep the same in good order and condition and provide all electrical connections, labour, too!s, rlant, material and everything necessary for the regular operation of the plant at his own cost and expense, at thirty cents per light per night;

That the said direct current are lamps shall be perfectly water-proof, strongly constructed and good regulation, and that said arc lamps shall be double feed ( 2 sets of carbons) adapted for seven-sixteenths inch carbons with clear glass globes;

That the lessee shall and will place in such places as directed straight cedar poles twenty-nine feet long and not less than six (6) inches at the top for the arc lamp poles and shall and will place the said posts seven feet in the ground, and that said poles shall be neatly shaved and bound and painted with two coats of lead paint and shall and will suspend, by the most modern device said lamps at such height as he, the said lessee may from time to time be directed by the Chief Epgineer aforesaid, and shall and will provide said lamps and posts with swinging supports, cross-arms, switch-
boards and everything necessary for the lighting, cleaning and whatever else may be necessary for the proper operation of the said lights, and any defect or defects shall at once be remedied by the lessee at his own cost and expense;

That all material, apparatus, \&c., now or hereafter to be used shall be of the best and most modern of their several kinds and the whole work shall be executed in a substantial, workmanlike manner to the satisfaction of the Chief Engineer of Railways and Canals.

That the said lessee shall protect said lamps, swing supports and all other parts of their plant by the most modern devices, to the satisfaction of the said Chief Engineer, against lightning, stones and other casualties.

None of the provisions of this indenture or of the general terms and conditions thereto annexed shall be considered merely comminatory (comminatoires), but, on the contrary, the same shall be observed and enforced, the said provisions being essential to the preservation of the interests of the public, and expressing the exact intention of the parties hercto, and without the said provisions, and each of them, the present indenture would not have been executed;

Tnat no assignment of this lease or of the rights of the lessee thereunder, either in whole or in part, shall be made by the lessee without the consent of the lessor in writing, being first had and obtained;

That for the purpose of ascertaining the quantity of water running through the weir or the head gates constructed by the lessee on or adjoining the lands hereby demised and as shown on the plan hereunto annexed, at any time, the lessor reserves the right to construct and maintain any weir, gauge, moduls or device of measurement, and from time to time to change the same, and shall at all reasonable times and from time to time, as the lessor may desire have access to the premises of the said lessec and any part thereof, with the necessary assistance and workmen, for the measuring or ascertaining the quantity of water drawn or permitted to flow by the said lessec. The said lessor shall have all rights and privileges to make the measurements that may be considered necessary through the tail race or races of the lessee, a sufficient length of time to be allowed to make such measurements without the lessee being entitled to any compensation whatever for loss of water power or damages on account thereof.

Now this Indenture Further Witne.seth, that the said lessee for himself, his beirs, executors, administrators and recognized assigns, hereby covenants and agrees with our Sovercign Lady the Queen, Her heirs or successors, that he shall and will, from time to time, and at all times hereafter, well end faithfully abide by, fulfil and keep all and singular the covenants and conditions in the presents, and in the annexed general terms and conditions contained, applicable to the lessee, according to the true intent and meaning thereof;

Provided Always, and it is hereby expressly agreed, that if the rent hereby reserved, or any part thereof shall be unpaid for fifteen days after any of the days on which the same ought to be paid, although no formal demand has been made therefor, or in case of the breach or non-performance of any of the covenants or agreements herein contained on the part of the lessee, his heirs, executors, administrators, or recognized assigns, then and in either of such cases it shall be lawful for the lessor, at any time hereafter, into and upon the said demised premises, or any part thereof, in the name of the whole, to re-enter and the same to have again, re-possess and enjoy as of her former estate, anything herein contained to the contrary notwithstanding;

Provided Always axd these Presexts are upon the Express Understanding that the lessor reserves the right as follows, namely:-If, at any time hereafter, the land hereby demised and the quantity of surplus water leased, or which may hereafter be leased, according to the intent and meaning thereof, or any part thereof, are or is required for the use of the canal or for any other purpose whatsoever, or if the lessor shall elect to take over any and all buildings and works or erections constructed upon the
land hereby demised or the increased flow of water so passing or to pass through the works of the said lessee through Hoople's creek, and to take over any and all works and lands through which the said increased flow of water passes, thereupon on reasonable notice (not less than twelve calendar months) being given to the lessee to that effect, this lease or lease for the term then current and all the covenants, privileges and rights of the said lessee shall cease and be void, and the lessor shall pay the then value of all such buildings, lands and works with an addition of five per cent thereto, that may be at that time thereon erected or connected therewith and belonging to the lessee; and that in default of agreement as to the valuation of such buildings, lands and works, their value shall be ascertained by three arbitrators, one to be chosen by the Minister cf Railways and Canals, another by the lessee, and the third by the two arbitrators so chosen, and the award of the said arbitrators or any two of them after hearing such evidence as may be offered by either party shall be conclusive as to such value;

## Order in Council, October 9, 1900-Railways and Canals:

On a memorandum dated September 26, 1900, from the Minister of Railways and Canals representing that, in the opinion of the Chief Engineer of the Department of Railways and Canals, in which he (the Minister) concurs, it is highly desirable that the system of electric lock operation and electric lighting, which has been satisfactorily adopted on the Soulanges Canal and is about to be adopted on the Lachine Canal, should be brought into use on the Cornwall Canal, where facilities for the creation of the necessary power already exist.

The Minister further represents that under a lease, dated June 25, 1896, issued to Mr. Michael P. Davis, as authorized by Order in Council of February 18 and June 12 of that year, Mr. Davis has the use of land and water power at the lower end of Sheik's Island, such porrer being created by the construction of the dam at that point from the island to the mainland.

That in the said lease the following provisions are inserted: 'That the lessee shall supply electric power to the satisfaction of the Chief Engineer of Railways and Canals ior the working of all the locks on the Cornwall Canal at sixty-three dollars per horse power per annum.

- That the lessee shall also supply and work electric direct current arc lights of not less than 2,000 candle power in perfect working order at such points and such number as shall from time to time be deemed necessary by the Chief Engineer aforesaid, running all night whenever so required, along the canal, and maintain and keep the same in good order and condition and provide all electrical connections, labour, tools, plant, material, and everything necessary for the regular operation of the plant at his own cost and expense at thirty cents per light per night.'

Further provisions of the said lease relate to the details of the nature and quality cf material, including poles, \&c., to be furnished by the lessee.

The Minister recommends that in pursuance of the said lease provisions, he be authorized to enter into a contract with Mr. M. P. Davis for the lighting of the Cornwall Canal, the number of lights not to be less than 250 are lights of 2,000 candle power each, nor more than 270, at the discretion of the Department of Railways and Canals, to be paid for at 30 cents per lamp for each night during which light is required and supplied; further, for the supply of electric power for the operation of the lock gates and valves, and of the bridges throughout the said canal; the amount to be paid for such service to be sixty-three dollars (\$63) per horse power per annum for a minimum of 400 horse power; it to be an express provision that, in the event of any difference of opinion arising between the contractor and the Department of Railways and Canals as to the number of horse powers actually supplied, the quantity shall be determined by three arbitrators, one to be named by the Department of Railways and Canals, one by the Contractor, and the third by the two so named; or failing agreement, by Judge of the Exchequer Court; the said contract to be in force for a term of twenty-one years.

Between-Her Majesty the Queen represented herein by the Minister of Railways and Canals acting under the authority of an Order in Council dated the ninth day of October, A.D., 1900, as amended by Order in Council dated the sixteenth day of Octciber, A.D., 1900, of the first part;

And Michael P. Davis, of Ottawa, in the county of Carleton, Contractor, of the second part:

Whereas by, indenture No. 12230, dated the twenty-fifth day of June, 1890 made between the parties above named, the said Cichael P. Davis among other things agreed to supply electric power in connection with the operation of the Cornwall Canal,
at $\$ 63.00$ per horse power per annum and to supply and work electric direct current are lights with fixtures and connections for the lighting of the said canal at thirty cents per night per light, as by reference to said indenture will more fully appear.

And whereas it is expedient to determine and fix the number of the said lights, the extent of the said electric powers and the time and manner of payment.

It is therefore agreed between the said parties hereto that the said Michael P. Davis shall under the said indenture furnish and supply to Her Majesty electric current for power purposes as aforesaid not less in any one year than four hundred electric horse powers, and also supply and work electric direct current are lights not less at any one time than two hundred and fifty lights, nor, without the consent of the lessor, more than two hundred and seventy lights.

That the said Michael P. Davis shall supply such lights from the first day of May, A.D. 1901, and current for power from the first day of October, A.D. 1901.

That the rental payable by Her Majesty for the said power and lights as provided in the said indenture shall be paid monthly on the termination of each month of servíce.

In the event of any difference of opinion arising between the said Michael $P$. Daris and Her Majesty as to the number of horse powers actually supplied, the quantity shall be determined by three arbitrators, one to be named by the Minister of Railways and Canals or his successors in office, one by the said Michael P. Davis, and the third by the two so named; in the event of failure to agree upon the third arbitrator, a judge of the Exchequer Court of Canada shall nominate and appoint such third arbitrator.

That nothing herein shall be taken to vary, other than as above specified or provided, any of the provisions of the said indenture.

This agreement shall extend for twenty-one years from the date of the said indenture No. 12336 and shall thereafter be further extended by successive renewals to the first day of July, 1979, thus making the term of this contract co-existant with the leasing portion of the said indenture, and shall be binding on Her Majesty, her successors and assigns, and upon the said Michael P. Davis, his executors, administrators and assigns.

In witness whereof Her Majesty hàs caused these presents to be signed by the said Minister and by the Secretary of the Department of Railways and Canals and the seal of the said department to be hereto affixed, and the said Michael P. ## Audit Office, Ottawa, April 19, 1902.

Sir,-Let me acknowledge receipt of your application No. 440 for $\$ 10,048.80$ in favour of M. P. Davis, for lighting the Cornwall canal from October 28, 1901, to April 1, 1902, being 158 nights for 212 lights, at 30 cents a night for each light.

Mr. Superintendent Stewart, in his letter of January 15, 1902, writes thus ::-"The electric light was turned on the Cornwall canal for the first time on October 24, 1901. Attached is a statement showing how the 216 lights now on are located.'

This certificate is deficient in the following respects :-
(1) It is not stated that the whole number of 216 lights were placed as early as October 24, 1901: a large part of them might have been installed later, as far as Mr. Stewart's certificate goes.
(2) It is not stated that 216 lights were worked every night between October 24 and January 15 ; this would be outside of Mr. Stewart's personal knowledge. The certificates of the different local officers are required instead.
(3) No certificate of any kind is made as to the period between January 15 and April 1, 1902. This is as necessary as the other.

On page 4 of the typewritten contract of June 25, 1896, the following section occurs: 'The lessee shall also supply and work electric direct-current arc-lights of not less than 2,000 candle-power, in perfect working order, at such points and such number as shall, from time to time, be deemed necessary by the Chief Engineer, running all night whenever so required, along the canal, and maintain and keep the same in good order and condition,-at 30 cents per light per night.'

This appears to provide for a difference in quantity of lighting, between the open and closed seasons of navigation, as on the Welland canal, since the number at any time is to be fixed by the Chief Engineer. The bill rendered on behalf of Mr. Davis, however, includes every night between October 24 and April 1. Please let me have a copy of the Chief Engineer's order, providing for an undiminished service during the closed season.

Sir,-In accordance with your telephone message of Wednesday, I went to Cornwall, and personally counted the number of electric lights on the canal.

I find that the statement previously sent you was one light short, and that there were 217 lights on December 1, 1901, instead of 216. This number was on from October 24, 1901. Since that date, there has been one light added, on March 5, 1902. This one is at the north end of the bridge at Cornwall, and was placed there shortly after the time when I said 30 lights were required, during the winter.

It is quite possible that there may have been a few lights less than this number on February 16, 1902, as occasionally a light will go out through some defect in the lamp. I did not keep track of such deficiencies in the number of lights each night.

In fact, it was only for my own satisfaction that I took any notice of the electric light line, as I had been informed that it was not yet accepted by the government, and until it was I had nothing to do with it.

Sir,-Let me acknowledge receipt of your 124165 of April 26 , covering a letter from Superintendent Stewart, dated April 25,

Mr. Stewart says: 'I did not keep track of deficiencies in the number of lights each night. In fact, it was only for my own satisfaction that I took any notice of the electric light line, as I had been informed that it was not yet accepted by the government; and until it was, I had nothing to do with it.'

Since Mr. Stewart not only had no personal knowledge of the lighting, but also considered it outside of his province, the certificates of the local officers are still more necessary. If these officers were not aware that they would be called upon for information, the best we can do now is to ask them to certify from memory that the lighting was practically continuous.

If payment is to be made on the same basis in the future, the duty of verifying and certifying the different lights should be placed with the appropriate local officers.

Please inform me of the date when the government accepted the lights.
The minimum limit of 250 lights, to which you make reference, does not appear to be yet effective as far as the accounts are concerned. Since only 217 lights have yet been installed by the contractor, he cannot expect pay for working 250 , but only for those actually worked.

Since the contracts of June 25, 1896, and October 9, 1900, were not made under advertised public tender, the vouchers for payment will need to be certified 'prices fair and just' by the proper government officer, and this entirely as a matter of value, without regard to the Orders in Council.

As explanatory of the certificate 'prices fair and just,' I shall be glad to insert in my annual report a description of any steps which were taken towards inviting competition for the rental of the water power, the working of the gates and the lighting of the canal.

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## Departalent of Rallwats and Canals, Ottawa, May 7, 1902.

Sir,-I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 2 nd instant, in further reference to the application of this department for a payment to Mr. M. P. Davis for lighting the Cornwall canal.

In reply, I have to say that the lights were accepted as soon as they were installed, namely, on October 24,1901. Under the terms of the lease of June 25, 1896, and of the subsequent contract of October 19, 1900, the question of payment does not depend on the number of lights actually in use, which may be varied, from time to time, within certain defined limitations. These limitations are a minimum of 450 lights and a maximum (unless by consent of the lessor) of 270 lights.

There was, however, no intention, for a moment, of paying for lights not installed, and my certificate clearly shows this.

I regret that I am unable to concur in the suggestions you make in the concluding paragraphs of your letter as to the nature of the endorsement to be placed on the vouchers. Contracts entered into by the department are placed in my hands to see that their provisions are carried out, and it is my duty, on the proper performance of the service contemplated in such contracts, to give my certificate to that effect, in order to payment. This I have done in the past, and must continue to do in the future.

In compliance with the suggestion made by you that the local officers should certify from memory that the lighting was practically continuous, I hare requested the superintendent to obtain certificates from the lockmen; they will be forwarded to you when received.

Sir,-I beg to inclose herewith certificates from the lockmasters and one of the bridgemasters on the Cornwall canal, with regard to the electric lights.

I have not taken any certificate from the other bridgemaster, because the one from the lockmasters at 17 and 18 covers his territory. These certificates cover the whole number of lights on the canal, except perhaps 12 or 15 . I have personally examined the lights sufficiently to know that this is the case, as there are only about that many between the locks which cannot be seen from one lock to the other.

It was necessary to allow the lockmasters to use their own judgment as to the form in which they put their certificates, consequently there are slight discrepancies.

From my own memorandum I know that 217 lights burned from October 24, 1901, to February 28, 1902, or thereabouts; during the month of March there were only 30 lights going; from April 1 to 5, the full 217 were on, and then from the 19th to the end of April the full number were on. The time when the lights were all off during the month of April, 1902, was while the water was out of that level of the canal.

Regarding your refusal to have the certificate 'Prices fair and just' supplied by the proper officer of your department, I beg to request that you reconsider this question. Is it not quite manifest that section 33 of the Audit Act is based upon the assumption that, in fixing the prices of purchases, care must be taken that the public are protected from having to pay more for services or material than they are worth? If public notice is given that tenders will be received and the lowest tender is accepted, no further evidence is needed. If, however, tenders are not called for, the official in the department who has, from the nature of his duties, the most accurate knowledge of the current prices for such services or materials, is required to examine what has been supplied and certify that the price claimed is a fair one. If no one certifies, how can any one tell on whose opinion the price is based, or whether it is based at all on the spinion of a disinterested person who has the needed information to enable him to certify properly?

Then let me invite your attention to section 11 of 49 Vic., chap. 37, An Act respecting the Department of Railways and Canals:-
'The Minister shall invite tenders by public advertisement for the execution of all works, except in cases of pressing emergency, in which deláy would be injurious to the public interest, or in which, from the nature of the work, it can be more expeditiously and economically executed by the officers and servants of the Minister.'

There are under this section two cases only in which the Minister of Railways and Canals may dispense with the inviting of tenders. (1) When for certain reasons the work is done by the departmental officers and servants, and (2) when delay would be injurious.

Certainly (1) does not apply, and it appears to me that (2) does not either.
Be good enough to show that the provisions of this section have been complied with.

Sir,-I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of the 29 th instant, in further reference to the application of the department for a payment to Mr. M. P. Davis for lighting the Cornwall canal.

I have endeavoured in my letter of the 7th inst., especially, to explain to you the attitude I am compelled to take as to the propriety of furnishing the certificate you desire that the price to be paid for these lights is 'fair and just.'

I have directed your attention to the fact that this is not the case of the purchase of supplies or materials, as to which, of course, your observations would very properly apply, but a case where by Order in Council and by subsequent agreements based thereon, the furnishing of electric lighting, at a specified price and for a minimum and maximum number of lights, has been undertaken.

These documents are placed in my hands to see that their provisions are carried out. I satisfy myself that they have been, and certify accordingly. Here my responsibility ends. It is not, I consider, my place to decide or even to discuss whether the price is fair or unfair.

As to your request that I should show you that the provisions of the departmental Act, 49 Vic., chapter 37, requiring the invitation of tenders for the execution of works have been complied with, the fact that the lighting in question is simply the fulfilment of one of the conditions of the above mentioned instruments removes it from the category in which you appear to place it. Sir,-I inclose herewith papers in connection with the contract of M. P. Davis for lighting the Cornwall canal by electricity. You will see from the correspondence what the difficulties between the Railway Department and this office are.

Apparently there were no tenders called for, and no certificate of an expert as to the value of the service that was to be performed.

Apart from the very manifest principle which should hold in such cases, that the country should be protected from applicants getting prices at their own dictation, there are two Acts, viz.: The Audit Act, sec. 33, and the Act with reference to the Department of Railways, sec. 11, which seem to have been disregarded.

I thought it well to send these papers to you, so that if you had a moment to look over them you might be in a better position to give an opinion when we meet here on Friday next.

Dear Sir,-I have now examined the papers you inclosed me with yours of 4 th instant, in connection with the contract above referred to, and I have given the best consideration I can to the position taken by you in your communications of 2 nd and 29th May to the Deputy Minister of Railways and Canals.

I have to express the opinion that you cannot as Auditor General insist upon the production of the certificates you have asked for It is very possible that I do not properly appreciate your duties or responsibilities under the statute with regard to your office, and I am of course not acquainted practically with the course of business as between the various departments at Ottawa, but I have examined the Audit Act as carefully as I can, and have considered especially sections 32 and 33.

Under section 33, it is plainly your duty, before authorizing any payment such as is here asked for, to require the officer in special charge of this part of the public service to certify that the work has been performed, and that the price charged is according to contract, but I do not see how anything more than this can be called for. The certificate that the price charged is fair and just is required only where the price is not covered by a contract. In the present case there is, in fact, a contract fixing the price, and therefore, as it seems to me, no question can be raised whether such price is or is not fair and just. If the price is too high the responsibility must rest upon

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those who have authorized the contract. As matters stand, the price is fixed by the contract, and if payment of it were refused payment of it could, so far as I can see, be enforced by the courts. No court would inquire behind the contract to determine whether or no the price was fair and just, and I cannot see that under the statute the Auditor Gencral has anything to do with the fairness or justice of the price, so long as such price is fixed by contract.

I am not losing sight of the fact that very possibly the making of this contract may have been a distinct infraction of sec. 11 of the Act Respecting the Department of Railways and Canals, R.S.C., c. 37. But I do not see how you can determine whether or not this is the case. Nothing appears on the subject one way or the other from the papers submitted to me. There appears an Order in Council of October 9, 1900, authorizing the agreement of Octoben 19, 1900, under which the claim to payment is now made, but it is to be observed that this agreement of October 19, 1900, in fact amounts to nothing more than a fixing of the quantities of electric horse power and electric light the contractor is to supply. The lease previously entered into and dated June 25, 1896, seems to have conferred upon Mr. Davis the right to supply such electric power and light on the canal as the Chief Engineer of the department might require, and if it was, under this lease, the right of Mr. Davis to supply the light and power in question, there was no possibility in October, 1900 , that there should be competition, or the consideration of tenders, before the agreement then made with Mr. Davis was entered into.

But in any event, it would seem to me, for the reasons I have tried to point out, that neither the Auditor General nor any deputy minister, chief engineer or other officer of the government could inquire into the validity of contracts which had been actually entered into on behalf of the Crown under Order in Council, or go behind such contracts to investigate whether the prices thereby fixed were or were not in fact fair and just. In this respect the statute R.S.C., c. 29 , sec. 33 , in my opinion protects you, and justifies you in authorizing payment upon sufficient vouchers and upon certificate of the proper officer that the work has been performed, and that the price charged is according to contract.

Dear Sir,-I have been out of town this week until to-day, but on returning find lere your favour of 23 rd inst., inclosing the file of papers connected with this contract and copy of the lease of June 25, 1896.

I have examined this lease carefully, but find in it little or no assistance upon the point in question. I find, however, in again examining the Order in Council of October 9,1900 , language which seems to make the matter clear.

You will observe on reference to this Order in Council that the lights are to be 'paid for at 30 cents per lamp for each night during which light is required and supplied.' If this language were incorporated into the contract itself it would scem to me reasonably clear that payment could not be asked in respect of any nights during which light was not 'required and supplied.' Unfortuately the contract of 1900 has
not, in terms, followed the language of the Order in Council in this respect, but I suppose it may be said that the Minister of Railways and Canals had no authority to enter into any contract other than that which the O-der in Council authorizes, and in any event it would seem the just and sensible interpretation of the contract as it stands, that where the obligation of the contractor under the original lease of 1896 was to supply and work eleetric lights at such points along the canal, and in such number as the Chief Engineer should from time to time deem necessary, running all night whenever so required, at ' 30 cents per light per night,' payment was to be made only in respect of such number of lights, and such number of nights, as were actually required by the Chief Engineer and supplied by the contractor.

The agreement of October, 1900, expressly recites this provision of the lease that lights are to be supplied and worked at 30 cents per night per light, and, reading this phrase in the light of the Order in Council under which the contract was entered into, it would seem reasonably clear that payment was to be made only in respect of each night during which light was required and supplied.

It may also be pointed out that under the agreement of October, 1900, Mr. Davis undertook to supply and work 'not less at any one time than 250 lights.' If the contract were to be adhered to strictly as against Mr. Davis, it might be interpreted as requiring him to furnish not less than 250 lights before he was entitled to receive any payment at all, but as he is asking payment merely for the number of lights actually supplied and worked, you will probably consider that no objection should be taken by reason of the number of lights being less than 250 .

Sir,-I have just received your letter of this date in answer to mine regarding the point which occurred to me with reference to the fact that Mr. M. P. What struck me as calling for remark was the fact that a man, who has two accounts for services which are so closely allied as electric lighting and electrical energy and which start from exaetly the same date, should have thought of forwarding one and not have thought of the other. That he should have done so seems very remarkable. It seems to me, on the other hand, that he must have thought there was some reason for excluding the one, when he rendered the other, and that his reason for doing this would be one which should be brought under the notice of those who have anything tio do with passing the accounts. I do not want to find reasons where there are none; but I should like to know that there is no reason, if you can say that such is the case.

Dear Mr. Davis,-I have had correspondence with Mr. Schreiber with reference to the fact that, while I had some time ago an account from him for you for electric, lighting at the Cornwall canal, I had at that time no account for electrical energy, although I have since received an account which contains a charge for the latter service from October 24, the same date from which the charge for electric lighting began to run in the first account.

It appeared to me rather strange that you would have an account for electrical energy, dating from the same day as the account for electric lighting, and not have presented the account for the second work, particularly as it covered a large sum of money. The explanation may be aimple, but I have not received it. Though I have written again to Mr. Schreiber, as his first answer was not satisfactory, I write to you so that I may get such explanation as may remove the cause of further inquiry and enable me to get on with the discussion of the matter. Mr. Schreiber tells me in his answer that the account in question had not been rendered by you at the time referred to; but that is exactly the difficulty with me, viz., why the account was not rendered.

According to the terms of the contracts the company is to operate the whole system for one year after it has been brought into full use-in other words, until May 1, 1903, the government defraying the cost of the same at reasonable rates.

Sir,-With reference to the appeal from my decision on the applications of the Railway Department of April 5 for $\$ 10,048.80$ and of June 23 for $\$ 19,182.36$, in favour of M. P. Davis for electric light and electric energy on the Cornwall Canal, I would draw your attention to the fact that tenders were not called for, and that the Deputy Minister of Railways, who is also Chief Engineer, has declined to give me any information as to the cost to Mr. Davis of works or of services for which he is to get over $\$ 50,000$ a year for 84 years, in all over $\$ 4,000,000$.

Then I may call your attention to the rather singular fact that there were two arrangements in conncction with the matter: the first was made 11 days before the election of June 23, 1896, and the second 29 days before that of November 7, 1900.

As you have observed in the file, Mr. Aylesworth, whom I have consulted, thinks that I cannot effectively deal with the refusal of the Ministers of Railways and Canals at the respective periods named to obey the order of Parliament conveyed in the 11th section of the Railways and Canals Act, R.S., chap. 37: 'The Minister shall invite tenders, by public advertisement, for the execution of all works, except in cases of pressing emergency, in which delay would be injurious to the public interest, or in which, from the nature of the work, it can be more expeditiously and economically executed by the officers and servants of the Minister.'

This is plainly an explicit direction by Parliament that what was done in these eases should not have been done. Whether I am empowered or not to stop the payment, it is none the less my duty to draw the attention, in the strongest terms, of every one who has anything to do with the matter, to the disregard of this most important 'pro!'' vision in all cases, and particularly when such a tremendous sum as $\$ 4,000,000$ is involved.

It must not be forgotten that in addition to $\$ 51,000$ a year, Mr. Davis also has the right to all the rental which the water power will bring.

It may be that Mr. Davis is obtaining nothing but a reasonable return from his investment and services. No one should endeavour to deprive him of a fair return for his investment; but he should get nothing more. If this is all right, and if I were in the position of the government, I should bring the proof by the statement of an electrical expert, supported by the approval of the Chief Engineer.

As you will see from the correspondence, this matter has been long before me, one new point after another in connection with it having come up.

I have sent an engineer to Cornwall, who will report this week. I shall then send in my final report. I have had a telephonic communication from him which indicates that, after allowing a liberal margin, payment is to cost as about $2 \frac{1}{2}$ to 1 .

This you will consider a preliminary letter to give my general view of the subject, so that if you leave Ottawa before my report is in your office you will be informed as to the line which is to be taken here.

## Peterborough, July 10, 1902.

Sir,-As requested by your telegraph of the 8th instant, I beg to report as follows :-

Acting under your instructions I visited Cornwall on the 5th instant, examined the plan in the Government Engineer's office showing the canal and the position of the poles and lights in connection with it. I then went through the canal on the government steamer from Cornwall to the upper entrance, examining as far as possible in the limited time, the lighting and power plant, and the power station at Sheik's Island dam. The canal, which is about $11 \frac{1}{2}$ miles in length, is equipped with a pole line and lights from end to end with poles about 100 feet, and lamps about 400 feet apart, except where the canal is broadened out into a lake by the construction of the dam. The installation of power for operating the lock gates was being made at Lock No. 20, the houses for transformers and other electrical apparatus were in position at other points, and I understand the work of installation was under way. The power house, which is at the lower dam, is a very good and substantial structure, thoroughly well equipped and up to date; provision is made for three large units of power, besides units required for exciters; at present one large generator and the exciters are installed and in operation. Leading to the power house from the broadened canal or lake, is a head-race, or power
canal, of considerable length, over which a steal highway bridge is built forming a continuation of the roadway on top of the dam to the island. The work on the pole line, lighting and power station all seems to be of the best description.

Outside of the lighting of some three or four houses near the power station, I am informed that there is at present no other market for the power beyond its use by the government, and that so far efforts to oltain permission to use the streets and furnish it in Cornwall, have not been successful.

With regard to the cost of the plant and the power and light supplied to the government, the time at my disposal was entirely too limited to arrive at definite figures. I regret that I can only at present make a mere approximation, but should you desire can give more definite and detailed figures later after having time to make a thorough examination. For the present I should say :-

## Audit Office, Ottawa, July 14, 1902.

Sir,-I returned from a trip to the Soulanges and Cornwall canals on Friday last. Thursday was spent on the Soulanges and Friday on the Cornwall.

It is remarkable how similar the two canals are in regard to the actual expenditure on the lighting of the two and the electrical energy required for them.

The Soulanges is 14 miles long and the Cornwall less than 11, but in the latter the lighting is on both sides for a longer distance. On the Soulanges there are 6 locks and 7 bridges. On the Cornwall there are 7 locks, including the guard gate, and two bridges. The electric energy is now used on one canal (the Soulanges) in moving the lock gates and the bridges and is to be used on the Cornwall canal in only the same way.

I inclose a copy of the memorandum of Mr. Munro, the superintendent engineer, showing the cost for the purpose under consideration, so far as the Soulanges is concerned, practically as $\$ 10,000$ per annum :-

3 per cent on $\$ 160,000$, the cost of construction. . . . . . . . $\$ 4,800$

I have verified the cost from our report.
Now, the Davis annual claim on the Cornwall canal, according to his contention supported by the Department of Railways and Canals, is for precisely the same pur-
pose, lighting 250 lamps the whole year, when the canal is closed as well as when it is open- 30 cents a light a night.

That is, the government has as expensive a plant at the Soulonges as Mr. Davis has at the Cornwall. It costs the government as much to run the Soulanges canal plant as it should cost Mr. Davis to run the Cornwall plant.

The government's annual expenditure for interest and all other outlay is in one case $\$ 10,000$, should it be $\$ 50,000$ in the other case where the services are the same and the expenses, so far as the opinions of experts are concerned, are the same?

As this is to continue 84 years and as the government pays 3 per cent for its money, the present value of the $\$ 40,000$ annual loss for the whole time, by paying the Davis annual claim instead of all costs, is $\$ 1,220,000$.

I am now waiting for the written statement of an expert in the prices of electrical apparatus, and the cost of opcrating so as to support this argument.

I hope that this is enough to justify the postponing of the consideration of the appeal by the Board until a full meeting.

It is well to consider the effect on the claim of Mr. Davis due to the agreement of 1896, and that which arises from the addition to it of 1900 :-

## Lease of 1896.

1. M. P. Davis to pay $\$ 1,000$ for the water power ;
2. Mr. Davis to supply electric power to the satisfaction of the Chief Engineer of Railways and Canals for the working of all locks on the Cornwall canal at $\$ 63$;
3. That he shall supply lights of 2,000 candle power at 30 cents a light.

Now, my information from the Soulanges canal is that 2 -horse power is sufficient for a lock, so that if all the locks and bridges were to be moved at once, 50 -horse power would not be required; $\$ 3,150$ would therefore be more than sufficient to pay the charge for electric energy. Then, with regard to electric lighting. It is quite clear that Mr. Davis has no right under this agreement to claim payment except for the number of lights called for by the Chief Engincer and only for the nights which he may require lighting to be done. Therefore, as probably 200 lights might be required, the same number on this $11 \frac{1}{2}$ mile long canal as on the Soulanges of 14 miles, the charge would be:-

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The government in 1896 might , it seems to me, have kept in view the fact that the first-class water power which was being leased to Mr. Davis should have been held by the government until a lessee was found who would have accorded the government power and light on the most favourable terms.

The weaknesses in the government interest, leaving the water power out of the question, were, however, small in 1896 agreement as compared with those of the 1900 document, which, under the interpretation of the department, makes the electric energy have a minimum of 400 h . p. for the purposes of calculation or the equivalent of $\$ 25$. .200 , and the electric lighting, as explained before, $\$ 27,375$. The whole amount as given above, $\$ 51,575$, as against $\$ 15,860$, an increase of $\$ 35,715$ per annum, or an entire present value in increase of over $\$ 1,000,000$.

At the moment, the government is asked to pay for electrical energy at the rate of $\$ 25,200$ per annum since October 24, while no electrical energy has been used there yet.

I make my objections under the Audit Act, sec. 32, subsections (a) and (c). I contend that manifestly section 11 of 49 Vic., cap. 37 , prevents such a contract as that under which this claim is made from being legal. No tenders were called for. This is under section (a).

I also contend that the government has no right to saddle the country with annual payments for years ahead, and without receiving an equivalent. Then, the exorbitant rates allowed make good my objection under section (c) that the money is not justly due.

## Cascades Point, Soulanges Canal, July 12, 1902.

Dear Sir,-In accordance with your request of the 11th instant re cost of the electrical installation and the operating expenses of the Soulanges and Cornwall canals.

I beg to say that, in the short space of time after my visit with you on the Cornwall canal, I can only give you an approximate cost in detail of the electrical installation on the Cornwall canal.

The total cost of the electrical installation on the Soulanges canal, that is, for lighting the canal and operating all the lock gates, sluice gates and highway bridges with electric energy, $\$ 160,000$. The power-house, however, is combined with a waste weir about the middle of the summit level at the Grease river. This waste weir cost about
$\$ 40,000$. Adding this to the total cost of the plant, it would bring it up to $\$ 200,000$. However, with the knowledge that has been gained with this plant, the same plant could now be installed with a great deal less money.

The maximum power required for operating the Soulanges canal, that is, if a lockage is made at every lock, and all the highway bridges are operated all at the same time, it would only require 40 horse-power, but the average power required with a fairly good traffic passing through the canal it would only require about 20 to 25 horse-power to operate the canal.

The following is an approximate cost in detail of the electrical installation on the Cornwall canal:-

The cost of the apparatus which is to connect the motors to the hand mechanism at the locks and highway bridges, is to be added to the above amount, as this apparatus was not on the ground at the time of my visit to the canal, so cannot give any estimate on it. However, I believe the cost of this apparatus will not exceed over $\$ 7,000$.

The above is only an approximation cost of the plant, and the figures can possibly be modified some, by going into it more closely.

The maximum power required for operating the Cornwall canal, that is, if a lockage is made at every lock and the highway bridges are operated all at the same time, it would only require 35 horse-power, but the average power for operating the canal would not require more than about 25 horse-power, however, a 5 horse-power motor will be provided for operating each gate at every lock on the canal, and if each gate will require 5 horse-power to open and close it, the maximum power to operate the canal would then be 65 horse-power, that is if all the locks and all the highway bridges are operated all at the same time, but I see no reason why the lock gates on the Cornwall canal should require any more power to open and close them than the lock gates on the Soulanges canal, which require 3 horse-power to open and close the lower gates and 2 horse-power to open and close the upper gates at each lift lock, and 2 horse-power to operate each highway bridge.

With reference to the operating expenses of the Soulanges canal, the account for operating the canal for 1901 is $\$ 5,200$, but this year since the electric power is applied to operate the canal, one more man is required, who has charge of all the lock and bridge motors, and also looks after all the lock machinery in general. With this additional man, the operating expenses may go up to $\$ 5,700$. This, however, includes all the carbons for the are lamps, are lamp repairs and breakage of all the lamp globes. and other small incidental breakage.

I regret to say that I cannot deal with the question of the operating expenses on the Cornwall canal, for reasons that the electrical installation is not completed, and it would be difficult to judge now just how much talent labour would be required to operate the canal, as the application of power for operating the canal is much different to that applied on the Soulanges canal. However, if the apparatus for operating the

Cornwall canal works as satisfactorily as the apparatus on the Soulanges canal, I see no reason why the operating expenses on both canals should not be about the same.

## Re Davis: Cornwall Canal Lighting Contract.

Dear Sir,-I have yours of jesterday asking return of the papers in connection with this matter.

I have, since our conference at Sault Ste. Marie, read the additions to the file subsequent to my letters to you of June 14 and 25 last, and I have again considered as carefully as I can, the provisions of the Audit Act, intending to have written you some days ago, but holding the papers for a little further consideration.

I am not able to vary the opinion I expressed in my letters to you of June 14 and 25 , but as you have refused to certify the accounts and the matter has gone to the Treasury Board, it is, I presume, no longer in your hands for action.

With the information from Mr. Hoffmeister's report, and your own visits to the Cornwall and Soulanges canals, the course you have taken in this matter is clearly the proper one, if you felt that the circumstances should be brought to the attention of parliament.

I cannot find, from examining and considering the Audit Aet, any indication that parliament intended your office to be superior to, or to exercise any supervision over. the various departments of the government, in so far as questioning the validity of their contracts is concerned, but there appears clear provision in the statute for bringing all such questions to the notice of parliament itself.

The legislation seems to afford a very complete scheme by which your department may be an efficient cheek upon expenditure, and by which parliament may be at once informed if anything unusual or irregular takes place. You have the power (and no doubt the duty) under Section 32 (c) of the Audit-Act, to refuse your certificate if at any time convinced that a cheque is applied for where 'the money is not justly due.' You are by section 33 expressly precluded from authorizing any payment unless upon due voucher that the work has been performed or materials supplied. By Section 10 of 51 Vic., chapter 7 (1888), you are, in reporting to the House, to call attention to every case in which cheques have been issued without your certificate, or in which a payment was 'in any way irregular.' Your duty accordingly, when not satisfied that money claimed is justly due, is to refuse to certify, and thereupon the Treasury Board becomes 'the judge of the suficiency of your objection.'

But the statute has carefully provided that in all such cases the matter must come before parliament upon full report, making it apparently, by section 49 of the Audit Act, your personal duty to present such report if the Minister of Finance does not do so within the time prescribed by the statute.

Responsibility is by this means removed from you and made to rest upon the proper shoulders. The Treasury Board is responsible to parliament, and if parliament considers that in this matter or in any other matter upon which you may take a similar

course, an improvident or improper contract has been entered into, the Minister who is responsible, or the Government, will be held to account.

I do not think there is anything more to be done by you in such a matter, and I may add that with the views you entertain in regard to this particular account, I do not see how you could have done less than you have done in connection with it. I return herewith your departmental file of papers in connection with the claim.

Sir,-In connection with the agreement entered into with Mr. M. P. Davis, for the supply of electrical power-equivalent to 400 horse powers-for the operation of the lock gates, \&ce., on the Cornwall canal, I have been requested to furnish some specific

information as to the estimated apportionment of power to the several works, resulting in the aggregate of power called for by the agreement. I would observe as follows :-

In dealing with the question of the application of electricity to the several purposes of the Cornwall canal operation (which at the present date is a matter of theory and estimate, rather than of conclusive calculation, based on definite experience), provision had to be made, on both the old and new canals, for the lock and guard gates, for the sluice gates or valves, for bridges, and for winches to assist vessels through the locks. In addition, power had to be furnished for the workshops, which serve not only the Cornwall canal, but also the three canals constituting what is known as the Williamsburg canals.

The main item is, of course, the lock gates. On the Soulanges canal, 3 H.P. is used for lock operation at each gate, but it has to be borne in mind that everything. about the gates on this canal is new, and, consequently, works with a smoothness that cannot be looked for from the old gates on the Cornwall. The reports of Mr. Parks, an expert electrical engineer, which I have before me, place the figure considerably higher ; his estimate of the requisite power being the equivalent of 5 H.P. For the Cornwall, 4 H.P. may probably be regarded as a reasonable and sufficient provision.

For the sluice gates and valves, the allowance of one H.P. per gate is the same as on the Soulanges canal.

For the highway bridge the allowance is two H.P., the same as on the Soulanges, but for the old Grand Trunk Railway bridge, used as a highway bridge, 3 H.P. is allowed.

For weir openings the very reasonable allowance of $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{H}$. P. each is made. The weir openings on the Soulanges canal are not electrically fitted, as they are seldom worked, but on the Cornwall the frequent regulation of the water level is necessary in connection with the various manufactories along the canal.

The assistance of vessels through the locks by electrical power is to be a feature of the system, and for this purpose 6 H.P. is provided at each lock.

For the workshops, serving the Cornwall and Williamsburg canals, 60 H.P. is allowed.

On the above basis the following would be the apportionment of power :-

## Payment asked where no Service has been Rendered.

Audit Ofrice, Ottawa, Scptember 29, 1902.

Sir,-I have received your letter of the 26th instant, accompanying the letter of the Chief Engineer of the Department of Railways and Canals, showing the estimated apportionment of electric power on the Cornwall canal to make up the 400 horse power, the minfmum amount according to the agreement dated 1900 , between the government and Mr. M. P. Davis.

The letter of the chief engineer does not touch the question raised by me. An application has been made to me to pay for 400 horse power at $\$ 63$ per horse power per annum, to run from October 24 last, over 11 months now, while there has not as yet been the application of any electrical energy whatever for any government purposes anywhere on the Cornwall canal. I raise no objection to the payment for the electrical energy when we get the use of it. It was provided under the contract of 1896 that the government was to pay for only what it got, and there was no necessity to make a new and highly unfavourable agreement with Mr. Davis for electrical energy.

I have heard remarks as to my former letter to the effect that Mr. Davis' claim was inaccurately brought out in two respects:-

1st. In the comparison between the Soulanges cost and the allowance under the 1900 agreement I neglected to provide for deterioration of plant. That is true; but it does not affect the comparison with the agreement of 1896 with Mr. Davis, where I draw the conclusion that the present value of the loss by acting on the agreement of 1900 instead of that of 1896 will be $\$ 1,000,000$.

2 nd . In connection with this conclusion, that the loss to the gorernment is $\$ 1,000$,000 , it is contended that I should have remarked that Mr. Davis will not make $\$ 1,000$,000 because he cannot get money on as favourable terms as the government.

The government and its officials have nothing to do with the gain or loss of those who may have dealings with the government, except so far as such gain or loss may effect the government financially. We have to think of what the country as a body loses and of nothing else.

Then the government might feel that the cancelling of the lease would be an easy method of getting rid of two serious difficulties besides the lease itself. The two difficulties are, of course, the paying for lights, some of which are not used, and the paying for electric energy, none of which is used.

Sir,-Since writing you last on the Cornwall electric light and energy question, it has occurred to me that although I have diligently endeavoured to find it, without
any success, there must be some fact or explanation to diminish the unpleasantness of the conclusions which I have drawn.

May I suggest that you send my other letters as well as this to the Department of Railways, with the hope that before the question is disposed of by the Board, to be subsequently made public, the possible elucidation may be obtained officially. I cannot speak except to criticize; but it is disheartening that, after 24 years of service, such criticisms as I have made have had no better result than to permit the most inexplicable transaction, considering both its magnitude and character, of any of the transactions which have come before me.

Should the reply from the Railway department show that I have been mistaken to the injury of the department, please let me see it, so that I may withdraw the unfavourable strictures.

Consider the condition, before the 2nd contract was entered into in 1900, of the services which are the subject of the two contracts:-

1st. Electric light.- $\Lambda$ rate per light per night of 30 cents was agreed upon. Only the lights used and when in use were to count for payment. Under such an agreement, while the canal is closed, for nearly half the year, only one-fifth or one-sixth of the number-those in use to light the bridges-would count. If for any reason others were not required, while the canal is open, they would not count.

2nd. With reference to electric energy.-Under the first agreement payment was to be made for the quantity used, and exact provision was to be made for determining the quantity used.

Under the second agreement, that of 1900-
(1) Under the contention of the Department of Railways, lighting is to be paid for on the basis of all the lights available and for every night in the year.
(2) So far as the energy is concerned, by the contention of the Department of Railways, we are now to pay for 400 horse power from October 24, within a few days of a year, and there is no electrical attachment to permit the use of a single horse power.
(3) When the attachment is in, there will be an overpayment of $\$ 35,000$ a year if the electric energy is not applied to other uses. As this may continue for 84 years, the present value of that loss is over a million dollars.

Bear in mind that the present Deputy Minister of Railways and Canals was in office when the agreement of 1806 was made, that he presumably was either the author of the carefully prepared agreement of 1896, the one which so fully guards all the public interests by providing against a surcessful claim by the contractor, for either electric light or energy, the use of which is not obtained by the public. In the same way, he was a party to the provision on page 7 of the 1896 agreement, by which the government could take possession of the plant and water power if it was in the public interest to do so, for any reason.

Now, what do we find? A new agreement made in 1900, for no apparent purpose, except to throw away every safeguard which had been provided with so much labour and forethought, with the same gentleman as Deputy Minister, whose duty it was to prepare the new agreement or to have advised concerning it. In my view, it is incumbent upon him to explain his responsibility in connection with so unaccountable a change of agreement.

By my correspondence with Mr. Schreiber you will see that I could not get from him the explanations for which I was evidently looking. He couldn't have mistaken what I sought.

Mri. Schreiber, although an elderly man, is still one of the keenest, most practical, thorough and prompt men in the public service. In no other case would even a small part of this irregularity have escaped him.

With remarkable composure an application is made for the payment of electrical energy at the rate of $\$ 25,200$ per annum, to run from October 24,1901 , while instead of making provision to enable the government to use the energy from the time when they were to pay for it, by having the work for the connection with the lock gates begin in the early part of the summer of 1901, the contract for this purpose was dated only on May 20, 1902, the work to be completed on August 15, 1902. Is Mr. Schreiber the person to have been found in such an unprepared state and one which might so easily have been prevented?

There is no one in the public serrice to whom I am under greater obligations for pleasant relations than to Mr. Schreiber, and it pains me to make these remarks.

I do not recollect that the question whether the Government could or could not require any less number of lights than 250 to be supplied was before my mind at all for consideration at the time of the writing of my letter. My present memory is that I did not consider, or form any opinion on, that point, but if you wish me to express an opinion upon it, and will be good enough to send me copies of the lease of June 25, 1896, the Order in

Council of October 9,1900 , and the agreement of October 19, 1900, I will try to let you have my views upon the subject at once.

Sir,--Referring to your favours of 16 th and 18th instant, I have now examined the lease of June 25, 1896, the Order in Council of October 9, 1900, and the agreement of October 19, 1900, thereupon entered into.

I understand you wish my view on the question whether the government can, under these contracts, fix the number of lights to be used on any one night, paying only for the number of lights so used at the rate of 30 cents per night.

I think that was the position of matters and the right of the government in the premises prior to the agreement of October 19, 1900, but by the document of the last mentioned date the number of such lights has been, I think, fixed by tie agreement of the parties at not less than 250, and I think, therefore, that if on any night any lights at all are required Mr. Davis has the right, if he wishes, to insist that not less than 250 shall be paid for.

So long as the lease of June 25, 1896, was the only document evidencing the agreement betweeen the parties, the situation was that Mr. Davis had the right to supply at the prices named in the lease, whatever electric power was required for the working of the locks on the canal, and electric lights along the canal at such points and number as should from time to time be deemed necessary by the chief engineer.

As matters stood, so long as this lease was the only contract, it rested wition the Chief Engineer to define the points along the canal at which lights were required, and
from time to time to determine the number of lights. The prices and various particulars in regard to the lights are specified by the lease.

The Order in Council of October 9, 1900, and the agreement of October 19, 1900, specify in distinct language the number of lights to be furnished. They are to be, in number, not less than 250 nor more than 270 , at the discretion of the department, and the government having by this Order in Council and subsequent agreement exercised the right reserved to it under the lease of determining the number of such lights which Mr. Davis should supply, he is, I think, entitled to rely upon such Order in Council and subsequent agreement, and to say that if any lights at all are required from him on any particular night, the number of them shall be not less than 250 .

I return herewith the copies of lease, Order in Council and agreement that you sent me.

## Supplementary Contract Between His Majesty the King and Michael Patrick Davis and the Quebec Bank, Aug. 13, 1903.

Date of contract, August 13, 1903.
Order in Council authorizing.
Public work concerned, Cornwall canal.
Description, varying lease No. 12336, and contract No. 13975, in respect of supply of electric power and lights and payment therefor.

THIS INDENTURE, made the thirteenth day of August one thousand nine hundred and three.

Between His Majesty represented herein by the Minister of Railways and Canals for the Dominion of Canada,

Michael Patrick Davis, of the city of Ottawa in the county of Carleton and province of Ontario, contractor,

Of the second part,

## AND

## The Quebec Bank of the third part.

Whereas by an Indenture of Lease, No. 12,336, dated the twenty-fifth day of June, 1896, and made between Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, of the one part, and the said Michael Patrick Davis, of the other part, for the considerations therein mentioned, the said Michael Patrick Davis covenanted and agreed with Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, amongst other things, to supply electric power to the satisfaction of the Chief Engineer of Railways and Canals for the working of all the locks on the Cornwall canal, at $\$ 63$ per horse power per annum, and also to supply and work electric direct current are lights, of not less than 2,000 candle-power, in perfect working order, at such points and such number as should from time to time be deemed necessary by the said Chief Engineer, running all night whenever so required, along the canal, and maintain and keep the same in good order and condition, and provide all electrical connection, labour, tools, plant, material and everything necessary for the regular operation of the plant, at his own cost and expense, at 30 c . per light per night, and upon such further terms and provisions as were therein expressed and declared concerning the same.

And Whereas by an order of His Excellency the Governor General in Council, made and passed on the ninth day of October, 1900, the Minister of Railways and Canals was authorized in pursuance of the provisions contained in the hereinbefore recited lease, to enter into.a contract with the said Michael Patrick Davis for the lighting of the Cornwall canal, the number of lights not to be less than 250 arc ights of 2,000 candle-power each, nor more than 270 , at the discretion of the Department of Railways and Canals, to be paid for at 30c. per lamp for each night during which light is required and supplied, and further, for the supply of electric power for the operation of the lock gates and valves, and of the bridges throughout the said canal, the amount to be paid for such service to be $\$ 63$ per horse-power per annum, for a minimum of 400 horse-power.

And Whereas by an agreement, No. 13,975, dated the nineteenth day of October, 1900, and made betweeen Her late Majesty Queen Victoria of the one part, and the said Michael Patrick Davis of the other part, after reciting the hereinbefore recited Indenture of Lease No. 12,336 of the twenty-fifth day of June, 1896, and reciting that it was expedient to determine and fix the number of the said lights, the extent of the said electric powers, and the time and manner of payment, it was agreed between the said parties thereto that the said Michael Patrick Davis should, under the said indentare, furnish and supply to Her Majesty, electric current for power purposes as aforesaid, not less in any one year than 400 electric horse-powers, and also supply and work electric direct current are lights, not less at any one time than 250 lights, nor without the consent of the lessor, more than 270 lights and upon the terms and conditions therein further expressed and declared.

And Whereas by an Agreement, No. 13,992, dated the sixth day of November, 1900, and made between the said Michael Patrick Davis of the 1st part, the Quebec Bank of the second part, and Her late Majesty Queen Victoria of the third part, in consideration of certain advances theretofore made and thereafter to be made by the said Quebec Bank to the said Michael Patrick Davis, the said Michael Patrick Davis, with the consent of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, assigned, transferred and set over all his rights, title and interest, in the two hereinbefore recited indentures of the twenty-fifth day of June, 1896, and the nineteenth day of October, 1900, respectively, subject to the terms and conditions therein contained, as security for the payment of the said advances, and in the said agreement was contained a proviso for redemption upon payment by the said Michael Patrick Davis of the said advances when due.

And Whereas the said agreement of the sixth day of November, 1900, is still a valid and subsisting security, and the said indentures of the twenty-fifth day of June, 1896, and the nineteenth day of October, 1900, have not been re-assigned to the said Michael Patrick Davis in pursuance of the provision in that behalf in the said agreement of the sixth day of November, 1900, contained.

And Whereas it has been agreed by and between the parties hereto that the terms and provisions of the said indentures shall be varied and supplemented in manner hereinafter appearing.

Now this indenture witnesseth that in pursuance of the aforesaid agreement, and in consideration of the premises, and of the considerations in the said indentures of the twenty-fifth day of June, 1896, and the nineteenth day of October, 1900, contained, the said parties hereto mutually agree and it is hereby agreed and declared, that as and from the 1st day of July, 1903, and thereafter during the continuance of the term granted and agreed on by and in the said two indentures, the said Michael Patrick Davis shall supply such electric power, not exceeding four hundred horse-powers, to the satisfaction of the Chief Engineer of Railways and Canals, as may by the said Engineer be from time to time required in writing for the working of the locks and other purposes connected with the operation of the Cornwall canal, and further, in like manner, supply and work electric direct curment arc lights, not exceeding at any one time two hundred
and fifty (250) lights, running all night, at such points and in such numbers as shall by the said Chief Engineer be from time to time, in writing designated and required.

Provided always, and it is further agreed as follows:-
(a). That with respect to payment for power and light heretofore supplied, upon the present installation, up to the first day of July, 1903, the power supplied per annum shall be taken to have been one hundred and twenty-five horse powers, and the lights shall be as follows :-

From the twenty-fourth day of October, 1901, to the thirtieth day of November, 1902, both inclusive, and from the thirty-first day of March, 1903, to the thirtieth day of June, 1903, payment shall be made for the actual number of lights which were burning upon the canal under the instructions or authority of the said chief engineer, to be evidenced by his certificate to that effect.

From the thirtieth day of November, 1902, to the thirty-first day of March, 1903, payment shall be made for one hundred lights per night ; and the right is hereby expressly reserved to the said Michael P. Davis to be paid for such additional lights (in excess of one hundred) that he can show were, during such period, actually burning in pursuance of the instructions or authority of the said Chief Engineer, or of any person duly authorized by him.
(b). That with respect to payment for power supplied after the first day of July, 1903, the standard of one hundred and twenty-five horse powers, stated in the preceding paragraph, shall be taken to apply until the present installation, is added to or increased, upon the written requisition of the Chief Engineer as hereinbefore provided.

Upon the present installation being added to or increased, pursuant to such requisitions, payment therefor shall be computed and made as follows :-the present installation, requiring for efficient operation a line load estimated at one hundred and eleven horse powers, is taken, for the purposes of this agreement, (with allowances for extra line load, at one hundred and twenty-five horse powers, and shall form the basis of computation. The additional installation, according to capacity, shall be estimated on the same ratio of line load (with the same ratio of allowances for extra line. load), -the proportion of the capacity of the present installation to one hundred and twentyfive being always adhered to in the result.
(c). That with respect to payment for lights supplied after the first day of July, 1903, the lights supplied from the close of navigation to the re-opening thereof shall be taken to be one hundred lights per night, and for the balance of the year (that is during navigation season) two hundred and fifty lights per night, notwithstanding that during the respective periods the said numbers of lights may not be required by the said Chief Engineer or be actually used. Payment for such lights supplied from the closing of mavigation to the re-opening thereof shall be made on the fixed basis of one hundred lights for four months, computed at 121 days in ordinary years, and 122 days in leap year; and for such lights supplied during the balance of the year, (or navigation scason) on the fixed basis of two hundred and fifty lights for eight months, computed at 244 days. Such payments shall be made on the certificate of the Chief Engineer, or other officer duly authorized by him, that lights to the number required by him, within the respective limits aforementioned, were available for use during the respective periods named.

Should more lights than one hundred be ordered by the Chief Engineer during the close of navigation, within the total limit of two hundred and fifty lights, they shall be paid for, in addition to the amounts above provided, at thirty cents per night per light.

Provided also that these presents shall be read with, and considered as supplemental to the said indentures of June 25, 1896 and October 19, 1900, and that save as hereinbefore otherwise expressly provided, or as not inconsistent with the provisions of these presents, the rents reserved, and the payments to be made by and under the
said indentures, shall be reserved and paid, and the covenants, conditions, stipulations and agreements in the same indentures contained, shall remain in force, and be observed and performed, as fully as if these presents had not been executed.

In witness whereof His Majesty the King has caused these presents to be signed by the said minister and by the secretary of the said Department of Railways and Canals and the seal of the said department to be hereto affixed, the said Michael Patrick Davis has hereunto set his hand and seal and the seal of the said Quebec Bank has been hereunto affixed the day and year first above written.

Extrict from a Report of the Committee of the Honourable the Privy Council, approved by the Governor General on February 6, 190\%.

On a memorandum dated August 20, 1903, from the Acting Minister of Railways and Canals, submitting for the approval of the Governor General in Council a proposed contract to be entered into by His Majesty with Mr. M. P. Davis and the Quebec Bank, in respect of the supply of electric power and lighting for the Cornwall canal, under the provisions of the lease dated June 25, 1896, to Mr. Davis, but since assigned
to the bank, of water power and other privileges at Sheik's island dam, on the said canal.

The Minister recommends that he be authorized to execute the said contract.
The committee submit the same for approval.

Note:-I was consulted about this contract and assented to it.
From this final contract, the third, the present value of the payments to be made, presuming that the requirements of the government on the Cornwall Canal remain as they are now, will be $\$ 680,000$ less than what it would have been if the second contract had remained unchanged. The requirements are, I know, to be increased, but from all the prospects it seems that the prospective saving cannot be less than $\$ 500,000$. The saving from October 24,1901 to this date has been $\$ 52,000$.

## Report to Minister of Railways and Canals, Canada, re Cornwall Canal. (Contracts with M. P. Davis for Electrical Energy, \&c.) Submitted by Louis A. Herdt, A. A. Dion, Roderick J. Parke.

Ottawa, February 14, 1903.
To the Honourable
The Minister of Railways and Canals:
In the matter of the contracts entered into by the Department of Railways and Canals, with Mr. M. P. Davis of Ottawa, for the lighting of, and for provision of electric energy on the Cornwall Canal:

Sir,-Acting under instructions contained in letters addressed to each of us by the Secretary of your department, under date of November 28, 1902, copy of which is attached (Addendum A) we called upon the Chief Ensineer of Railways and Canals at his office, on December 2, 1902, who furnished us with copies of departmental files containing copies of the agreements above referred to, with copies of correspondence relating thereto.

After careful consideration of the documents submitted to us, and full discussion thereon, a visit to the power house at Mille Roches, a general examination of the tansmission line, lamps, motors and other devices, and after obtaining all possible information as to the operation of the canal from officials and employees, we beg to report as follows:-

The hydraulic works, power house, electrical generating and other station apparatus, transmission line, lamps, transformers, motors, \&c., seem to be first-class in every respect. The various works have been carried out in accordance with good modern practice, everything is substantial, well designed, and the lamps and motors appear to work in a very satisfactory manner.

With reference to the lease of June 25, 1896, we find that.-

1. As to electric lighting, arc lights are to be supplied and worked by the lessee at such places and in such number as may be deemed necessary by the Chief Engineer of Railways and Canals-the rate per light per night to be 30 cents.
2. As to electric power, power to operate the lock gates to be supplied at $\$ 63$ per h. p. per annum.

We are of the opinion that-for the time (1896) and the service to be rendered namely, to supply power for 24 hours per day in small units, and to furnish lamps and light them, the whole scattered over a course covering many miles-the prices to be paid were reasonable. It has been made possible since, under certain conditions, mode (f delivery, \&c., and in very large quantities, to sell power at comparatively low rates, but the lease must be judged from the conditions prevailing at the time it was made and what might reasonably be expected as to the future from the data at hand.

Under the lease the lessee was required to construct costly works, and it was necessary to have it cover a long period of time, but it would have been expedient, at least it so appears now, to have made provision for readjustment of prices from time to time. It evidently was not apparent at that time, however, that the prices generally asked for similar services would be reduced with time, but owing to the great length of time covered by the lease, some provision of that kind was a necessary precaution.

The right of purchase reserved by the government compensates to a considerable extent for the absence of such provisions regarding rates.

With reference to the agreement of October 19, 1900, we find:

1. As to electric lighting, the rate per light per night remains at 30 cents, but not less at any one time than 250 lights to be supplied.
2. As to electric power, not less in any one year than 400 h . p. to be supplied, price remaining at $\$ 63$ per h.p. per annum.

Considering the lease of 1896, the conditions of payment were not made sufficiently clear. Take the supply of power. Basing our interpretation of the lease on our knowledge of the conditions to be met in the service contemplated, we believe that the charges were to be computed on the maximum load, or maximum horse power, which could be demanded at any one time, because this would determine the generating capacity to be provided at the power house, which in turn would fix the operating cost.

In an electrical plant where the motive power is water, the cost of operating is practically the same whether the plant carries a load or not. It follows that the price cf electrical energy cannot reasonably be based on energy supplied, but must in whole or in a large part take into consideration the capacity of machinery at the disposal of the service.

Consider the service called for by the government.

1. Electric lighting by arc lamps.

The machinery and station capacity placed at the disposal of the government for this service does not depend on the number of are lamps in actual service, but is entirely fixed by the maximum number called for at any one time.

Although the energy consumed may vary, the generating plant capacity is not changed. Moreover the energy available, but not supplied, cannot be sold to any other party, for systems at present employed to do this service keep a constant draught of current independently of the lights in use. The station operating expenses are not changed, the only possible difference would be in the cost of carbons, trimming and care of the lamps, which would not amount to more than $\$ 200$ to $\$ 300$ per year.
2. Electric energy for motive power.

The same reasoning applies with the possible difference that the energy not supplied may be disposed of to other customers, but only with the reservation that this power may be demanded at any moment by the government. Such conditions make it practically impossible to sell such power to others.

It follows that it is only fair that the price charged should be based in a large part or in the whole on the power available and not on the energy supplied.

Therefore, where a definite generating station capacity had to be provided and made available at any time, the load upon which charges were to be based could not reasonably be left as an uncertain quantity. Electric supply companies whose plants are operated by water power when contracting with individuals on 'flat rates' or a fixed price per horse power per year, have always based their charges on the maximum demand, unless otherwise specifically agreed, and reasonably so.

For the same reasons we believe it was intended that the full rate per horse power per year should be paid on the maximum load, without regard to the time during which such power was used within the year, and even though little or no power was used when navigation in the canal was closed in winter.

It would not be possible to close the power house as long as a single motor or a single lamp was required. The workshops would likely be in operation during the winter, some of the weirs might be used and some light would be required all winter, especially at the bridges, and where the canal crosses the town of Cornwall. The fact that no lights may have been provided in the past should not be used as an argument against their necessity at the present time.

As regards the lighting, the same reasoning should apply, notwithstanding that it is specifically stated in the lease that the number of lights could be varied by the Chief Engineer, and that the price was to be thirty cents per light per night.

The above interpretation of the lease, which is based, as said before, on the conditions to be met in the service contemplated, may not agree with the legal interpreta-tion:-

If such interpretation should be that the actual power supplied from hour to hour, during any one year, should be measured and computed, reduced to an average as to horse power and as to hours, and further reduced to 'horse power per year' to be paid for at $\$ 63$ :-

And similarly, that if the lights be not required every night even during the season of navigation, or for only part of the night, the actual number of lights supplied from hour to hour and from night to night during a year, should be computed, reduced to an average, as to light and as to time, of 'lights per night' to be paid for at thirty cents.

We believe such an interpretation was not intended, and that it would be very unfair to the lessee.

In order to determine the amount to be paid under this interpretation, we have found it necessary to make the following tests and estimates, of which full particulars are given in addenda attached hereto:-

Addendum ' B '-
Tests made on electrical equipment on Cornwall canal.
Addendum 'C'
Equipment and energy required for operating locks, bridges, weirs, winches, \&c., on the Cornwall canal.
Addendum ' D '-
Estimate of cost of generating and transmission plant and are lamps for Cornwall canal service.
Addendum ' E '-
Annual charges.
In considering the earnings of the lessees, we must base his returns on the estimated cost of an electrical installation of capacity required for the purposes of Cornwall canal, namely $\$ 162,500$. (See Àddendum 'D.')

We estimate that the 250 lights might be used only 210 nights in the year.
We estimate that the maximum load of $268 \mathrm{~h} . \mathrm{p}$. (Addendum ' C ') would be requied for nine months per year and that during that time the average load would not exceed half of this, thus:-

250 lights, 210 days, at 30 cents. . . . . . . . . . . . . . . $\$ 15,750$

On the investment, which is not the cost of the plant installed by the lessee, but an estimate of what a plant just sufficient for the requirements of the canal would cost, the above net earnings represent a return of only $1^{\prime} 2$ per cent.

It would seem, therefore, that in 1900 , when the lessee was preparing to install his plant, he was not only entitled to a statement of the requirements of the canal from the Chief Engineer, as provided by the lease, but to a clear definition of the manner in which it was intended to apply the provisions of the said lease, in order that he might provide the required capacity of plant to be installed, estimate the revenue to be derived therefrom, and prevent future misunderstandings as to the payments to which he would be entitled. He could not reasonably be expected to erect a plant large enough for all the possible requirements of the canal and leave the Chief Engineer of the department free to fix later on, on a much smaller amount of power and a smaller number of lamps to be supplied for canal purposes. The original lease was not sufficiently explicit; it was therefore necessary to supplement it by another agreement, in which the number of lights and the power required would be clearly defined.

The agreement of 1900 calls for a minimum of 250 lights and 400 h . p. The 250 lights appear to be no more than sufficient to light the canal, as the lamps which are placed 400 feet apart, are not too close for proper illumination.

In our estimate as to power, the apportionment for the different services approximates closely to the estimate of the Chief Engineer (dated August 25, 1902). Proceeding on the assumption that all the operations for which motors are provided cannot take place at the same time, 268 h . p. would cover all possible requirements at the motors at any one time, an equivalent of $400 \mathrm{~h} . \mathrm{p}$. of electrical generating machinery. (See Addendum ' $D$ '.)

We do not find fault with the time term of the agreement. It was necessary for the government, which had to provide motors and other apparatus for equipping the canal, to make sure of an unfailing supply for a very long time, as there was no available source of electrical energy other than the lessee's, but provision should have been made for future readjustment of rates if it became necessary.

Whilst the principal of basing charges on the maximum power and maximum light as a fixed amount to be paid yearly, is just and fair under the conditions existing at the Cornwall canal, the effect of charging for the quantities agreed upon in 1900, namely, $400 \mathrm{~h} . \mathrm{p}$. and 250 lights all the year round at the rates of the 1896 agreement, is to make the cost of these services at the present time much larger than warranted by the rates generally prevailing for similar services.

In conclusion, now that the conditions as to capital investment and cost of operation can be determined, we would recommend that the government endeavour to effect a compromise with the lessee.

Such compromise, while reducing annual charges to be paid by the government, should secure to the lessec an annual revenue over and above depreciation and cost of operation, representing a fair return on the capital investment; we have estimated the capital investment required for the supply of power and light on the Cornwall canal at $\$ 162,500$ (Addendum ' $D$ '). This return on investment should in no event exceed twelve per cent, thus:

## Contractors Relieved from Obligation of Completing Contracts Within the Time-limit.

Audit Office, Ottawa, February 12, 1904.
Dear Sir,-My attention has been called recently to the many Orders in Council relieving public works contractors from the obligation of completing their contracts rithin the time limit.

From the wording of the Orders it seems that those representing the government in the transactions consider that, while the contractors are accommodated, the government is saved from any loss, because there is not developed by the postponement of the date of completion a means of exacting a heightened charge from the government by the contractor. This seems a manifestly inaccurate conclusion.

When it was determined by the government to have a particular work done, it was concluded that the direct advantage, or the indirect one, or both together, would be at least as great as all the outlay and would, therefore, besides recouping the country for the salaries of engineers and other servants engaged, reimburse eventually the money paid to contractors, and in the meantime the interest as it would periodically mature.

In the case of a wharf, a bridge, or a railway line, you may have entered into no obligation to provide at a particular time the accommodation to the neighbourhood which the work when completed will afford, but as trustees for the people you came to the conclusion that the completed work would provide to the public an advantage equal in value to the interest on the expenditure.

By the privilege given to the contractor, the country has been deprived of the use of the work for the length of the postponement, while the interest is accumulating each day.

The magnitude of the donations from public funds to contractors will be understood to some extent by considering one of the large works-for instance the Hillsboro bridge. It was to have been completed on April 8, 1902. The time was first extendel to November 30, 1902, later to December 31, 1903, and now to December 31, 1904. The following is a statement of the interest in this case:-

## EXECUTIVE REGULATIONS GOVERNING PUBLIC EXPENDITURE.

## Powers of Attorney.

Rules prescribed by the Treasury Board, under sanction of the Governor General in Council, in reference to the mode of acquittal of Warrants for the payment of money by the Government of Canada.

1. No Officer of the Civil Service shall, under any circumstances, be permitted to act as attorney for the receipt of public moneys.
2. No power of attorney will be recognized, received or acted upon by the Receiver General, which is not printed, and of the form to be obtained from the office of the Receiver General, under which only payments can be made, and such power will operate as to any sum of money due only by the Government at the date of the power of attorney.
3. No powers of attorney will be received by the Government for the payment of moneys on warrants which partake of the character of an assignment of the moneys to another party, or purport to be irrevocable, or are in "any respects qualified."
4. General power of attorney, authorizing the receipt of money due, or which may become due after its date, by which any chartered bank or agent of a chartered bank, or any private individual, is constituted the attorney, will be received and acted uppn, if printed and of the special form to be obtained from the office of the Receiver General ; and in the event of the power being to the agent of a chartered bank, the bank must declare itself, by a proper instrument in writing, responsible for the acts of such agent, in respect to the receipts of moneys thereunder.

It is, however, optional with the party executing any power of attorney to a bank or agent of a bank, or any private individual, prior to the execution, to erase the words "or may hereafter become due.'
5. All powers of attorney must be signed in the presence of a witness.
6. In case of the death of the person in whose behalf payment is claimed, the probate of will or other proof that the applicant is entitled to receive the money must be furnished on application for such payments.

Blank forms of powers of attorney may be obtained from the office of the Receiver General and at all the branches of the Bank of Montreal,

Order in Council, December 6, 1882. - Ordered that the various departments be required to register all letters containing cheques.

## Duplicate Cheques.

Treasury Minute, June 18, 1858. -The Board had under consideration a communication from the Auditor General suggesting that uniform regulations be prescribed by the Board with reference to the requirements which are to warrant the duplication of lost cheques.

1. The Board, on the advice of the Department of Justice, direct that if a Government cheque, whether on letter-of-credit or Receiver General's account, does not reach the person in whose favour it is drawn, or is lost or destroyed by such person, the bank on which it is drawn be notified first by such person.
2. That a duplicate cheque be issued, on a bond of indemnity of the form annexed being furnished, sccuring the Government against loss ; such bond to be examined by the Department of Justice after exccution.
3. That a declaration showing whether the original cheque was endorsed or not and how it was lost or destroyed, should accompany the bond, in case it is claimed that the cheque was lost or destroyed.
4. That each duplicate cheque should have the word "duplicate" written in red ink across the face of it.

## Government Cheques-Protection against Fraud.

Treasury Minute, June 13, 1903.-The Board had under consideration the report of the Commissioners appointed to inquire into all the circumstances connected with the recent defalcations in the Department of Militia and Defence, and into the methods of keeping the accounts in the several departments of the Government of Canada, particularly in relation to the issuing of cheques and the receipt and disposal of public moneys, and to report what changes, if any, are deemed advisable for the purpose of securing the fullest possible protection of the public interest, and they approve of the following suggestions made in such report and direct that such suggestions be carried into effect as soon as possible :-
(a.) That a uniform paper of a sensitive nature should be adopted with the words 'Dominion of Canada' or other distinctive symbol as a water-mark. Such paper should be used for both the inside and outsilc services. A water-mark or dandy roll is used in the manufacture of paper for postal notes.
(b.) That a uniform quality of ink of good standard, and a uniform style of cheque be adopted for use in all departments, the wording on the cheques to be varied only by the change in name of the department, \&c.
(c.) That the King's Printer be authorized to decline the issue of chemicals or of pencils for erasing ink marks.
(d.) That the Accountants of the various departments be instructed not to allow any erasures in books or accounts kept in their branches, but that all corrections be made by ruling out the words or figures to be changed.
(e.) That where possible a perforator for perforating the exact amount be used to protect the cheques from alteration. Where time will not admit of the use of a perforator of this kind, others containing the words ' not over $\$ 1000$ ' (or as the case may be) should be used. Where a large number of cheques are drawn at one time, as in the Post Office Department where six or seven thousand are drawn during the first week of cach quarter to pay postmasters, it may be difficult to put this into operation. It is understood that while it is deemed desirable, the Commissioners do not press the use of a perforator if in any way it would retard public business.
( $f$.) That a uniform system ought to be enforced in all the departments as to the numbering of cheques. At present in some departments the cheques have printed numbers, in other departments the numbers are written, while in others they are stamped with a numbering machine. That all cheques should be numbered consecutively in print, commencing at the beginning of each fiscal year at No. 1, all unused cheques to be destroyed in the presence of two officers. Every blank cheque should be accounted for, whether cancelled or issued. No unnumbered cheques should be allowed to exist, except in such departments where it is found necessary for facilitating public business, and then only with the consent of the Treasury Board under such regulations as may be provided. If a register of cheques issued is kept in consecutive numbers no stub or counterfoil is required.
(g.) The Commissioners find in one or two departments that no substitute is provided to sigu cheques, and they recominend in all such cases that an Order in Council be passed nominating an officer to sign in the absence of the signing official.
( $h$.) A covering letter or statement detailing the number of cheques inclosed should be sent with each remittance, and the cheques should not be sent out by the officer who writes them. A record of such letters or statements should be kept in the department issuing them.

The Board further direct that the paper, quality of ink, style and form of cheque to be adopted by the several departments, and the kind of perforation to be used and the extent to which perforators are to be used shall be subject to the approval of the Board, and the suggestion as to the numbering of the cheques shall be carried into effect as soon after the lst July, 1903, as can conveniently be done.

Treasury Minute, June 13, 1903. - The Board had under consideration the report of the Conmissioners appointed to inquire into all the circumstances connected with the recent defalcations in the Department of Militia and Defence and into the methods of keeping the accounts in the several departments of the Governunent of Canada, particularly in relation to the issuing of cheques and the receipt and disposal of public moneys, and to report what changes, if any, are deemed advisable for the purpose of securing the fullest possible protection of the public interest, and they approve of the following suggestions made in such report in regard to the letter-of-credit system, and direct that such suggestions be carried into effect with regard to the statements, accounts and cheques in connection with payments made in respect of the fiscal year 1903-4, and subsequent fiscal years:-

1. That all the bank statements of the paid cheques for the several departments, together with the cheques themselves, be sent direct by the banks to the Finance Department.
2. That a certain number of the officials of the Finance Department be employed solely in the checking and adjusting of these accounts, as well as of the Letter-of-Credit and Receiver General's accounts of that department. The banks should be instructed to render these statements and cheques daily, weekly or monthly as the volume of business and importance of the various accounts demand.
3. That, as provided in section 30 of the Audit Act, a list of cheques, drawn by the various Departments, giving numbers, dates and amounts be sent to the Finance Department at such periods within the month as may be required. When these statements and bank accounts are checked and adjusted, a list of outstanding cheques should be prepared. A Letter-of-Credit Ledger should be kept, and such minor details arranged as may be found necessary for the proper conduct of the work.
4. After adjustment, the paid cheques, list of outstanding cheques and certificate of adjustment should be sent to the Auditor General, the correctness of which could be tested by him after comparison with the semi-monthly or monthly balances furnished him by the banks.

Treasury Minute, July 23, 1903.-The Board had under consideration correspondence with the Auditor General in regard to their Minute of the 13th June, 1903, with reference to the method of dealing with letter-of-credit cheques, the Auditor General contending that the procedure prescribed in such Minute was contrary to The Consolidated Rerenue and Andit Act, particularly Section 30, as it appeared to him that the Statute required the returning of the cheques to the department which issued them and the forwarding of them to the Audit Office by that department. In support of his contention he submits an opinion from Mr. F. H. Chrysler, K.C.

The Board are advised by the Department of Justice that it is competent for the Board under Section 30 of The Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act to prescribe the manner in which the cheques are to reach the Auditor General, and in view of such advice they are of opinion that the procedure laid down in their minute of the 13 th June, 1903, is strictly within the law, yet in order to remove any obstacle, legal or otherwise, that may be in the mind of the Auditor General in regard to the procedure laid down in the minute and to facilitate in every way the audit by the Auditor General and what he deems necessary therefor, the Board directs that clause 4 of their minute of the 13 th June, 1903, which provides as follows :-'4. After adjustment,' \&c., be cancelled and the following substituted therefor:
'4. After the Finance Department has completed its checking of the paid cheques and bank 'accounts, the cheques shall be returned to the department which issued them to be by such 'department sent to the Auditor General.'

Note.-Arrangements were afterwards made to have the bank statement of paid cheques accompany the cheques to the Department which issued them, and thence to the Audit Office.

## Overdrafts of Appropriations.

Memorandum for the Minister of Finance. - You have frequently had occasion to allude in conversation to the overdrafts of appropriations made by departments under their letters-of-credit, and to inquire whether i rencedy could not be found for the evil.

The irregularity occurs:
(1.) Sometimes by overdrawing the credit to the bank, -but
(2.) More often while there is a part of the credit unused, the over-expenditure of one appropriation being possible owing to an equal or greater aggregate under-expenditure of other appropriations.

It may be supposed that the remedy for (1) would be to give instructions to the bank not to cash cheques against an exhausted credit.

When, however, I have been applied to by a bank for instructions with reference to cheques presented for payment against an overdrawn credit, although I could not, as is plain, request the bank to continue cashing the cheques, I have hesitated to ask that the cheque should be dishonoured, as it might be hurtful to the credit of a department to have it generally understood that it was doubtful whether its cheques would be accepted.

Besides, with (1) as with (2), the responsibility should be laid upon the department. If the accountant of a department attends to his duties, he charges each cheque as it is issued against its appropriation and against the letter-of-credit of the department, and may be expected to be fully informed from time to time as to the balance of the credit and of each of the appropriations.

I therefore beg to recommend that an Order in Council based upon a report of the Treasury Board be passed, making it the duty of the accountant of each department to inform the Deputy Minister of the department whenever a cheque which is about to be issued will overdraw an appropriation or letter-of-credit, so that such cheque may not issue until parliamentary or other authority, as provided by the Audit Act, is obtained in the one case, or an additional credit in the other case.

Order in Council, July 7, 1892. -On a report dated July 4, 1892, from the Minister of Finance, submitting the annexed memorandum from the Auditor General with regard to the overdrafts of appropriations made by departments under their letters-of-credit.

The Minister, in accordance therewith, recommends that it be the duty of the accountant of each department to inform the Deputy Minister of the department whenever a cheque, which is about to be issued, will overdraw an appropriation or letter-of-credit, so that such cheque may not issue until parliamentary or other authority as provided by the Audit Act, is obtained in the one case, or an additional credit in the other case.

The committee recommend that a copy of this Minute be sent to the several departments for their guidance in future

## Appropriation Balances.

Order in Council, June 27, 1888. -The Treasury Board had under consideration a communication from the Auditor General respecting the interpretation of section 37 of the Audit Act, which provides for the extension of time for closing the Appropriation Accounts.

The Auditor General states that he understands the section to mean : "That an Appropriation account can be kept open for any time fixed by the Council, up to three months, for the purpose of charging against a vote all services or supplies for which the vote was taken, that is, those rendered before June 30."

As the present practice of bringing down the balances of appropriations for three months, and thereby lengthening the financial year to fifteen months, has been productive of delay in the preparation of accounts for Parliament, and with the view of definitely deciding what course should be followed, the matter was referred to the Department of Justice for opinion.

The Deputy Minister of Justice reports: "The question is, whether, upon an Order in Council having been passed as specified in the section, a department may make additional expenditure and incur increased liabilities upon the strength of the original estimate ; or whether the extension referred to in the section is only for the purpose of enabling a department to pay, after June 30, lialilities that have been incurred previously to that date. It would appear that the latter interpretation is the correct one. The section, without the proviso, categorically provides that any balance unexpended on June 30, shall lapse, and be written off. The proviso does not either expressly or by im$\mathrm{pl}_{\mathrm{i}}$ cation, give a department power to make a new expenditure, and if that power is not contained in the proviso, it is nowhere ; it does not exist. The only meaning to be dravin from the proviso is that the extension is made for the purpose of paying, after June 30 , out of the original appropriations, such accounts as had at that date been incuired."

The Board, after careful consideration of the matter, recommend to Council that for the current fiscal year the present practice be retained, so that no inconvenience may be experienced by the departments, the Auditor General having intimated that he is willing that for the present year such course be adopted ; but as the law is clearlyin accordance with the contention of the Auditor General, the Board are of opinion that under existing circumstances the practice now followed cannot be continued.

## Letter-of-Credit Cheques.

Order in Council, June 27, 1888. -The Treasury Board had under consideration a communication from the Auditor General with regard to the signing of letter-of-credit cheques, and subunitting a list of the names of persons who sign such cheques for the different departments; and they recommend to Council :
(1). That for each department, substitutes be authorized by Order in Council to sign for those in whose favour the letter-of-credit is drawn, and that a copy of the Order in Council be sent to the Bank of Montreal, or other bank on which the credit may be drawn.
(2.) That the departments be instructed not to pernit any person to sign except those authorized by Order in Council.
(3). That no cheques be signed in blank, either in the inside or outside service.
(4). That all cheques be drawn in the form: "Pay to the order of -_" ; and not in either of the forms: "Pay to -or bearer," or "Pay to - or order."
(5.) That authority be given for the signiug of letter-of-credit cheques in the different departments by the following substitutes :-(List not printed.)

## SESSIONAL PAPER No. 1

## Contracts.

Extract from Order in Council, May 23, 1880.-On a joint memorandum, dated March 20, 1880, from the Honourable the Minister of Public Works and the Minister of Railways and Canals, recommending that (hereafter) * ** ** * * * with all tenders submitted, a money guarantee, or approved accepted cheque, shall be given, to be open to forfeiture in the event of the tenderer failing to make the necessary five per cent deposit hereinafter referred to, within eight days after receiving notice of the acceptance of the tender, or of his declining to enter into contract when requested, the amount of such gnarantee to be fixed at a sum not less than $\$ 1,000$ nor more than $\$ 5,000$. That upon acceptance of a tender, and notification by the department concerned, the intending contractor shall, within eight days, deposit with the Government a sum of money equal to five per cent of the amount of his contract. That in all cases where tenders have been called for, the lowest received shall be accepted, unless good and sufficient reasons appear for passing over such tender. The Committee submit the above recommendations for Your Excellency's approval.

The Minister recommends, in accordance with the suggestion therein contained, that notice be immediately given to the Department of Finance by the department having control of the work, in case of the failure of contractors having a contract for the performance of work for the Goverument, and having security deposited with the Department of Finance.

The Committee submit the same for Your Excellency's approval, and advise that a copy of this Minute be forwarded to the Minister of each department for his information.

Memorandum respecting Contractors' Securities. -The undersigned has to report that by Order in Council of June 16, 1888, all cheques and all deposits on account of contractors' securities are turned by this department into cash, and deposited in the Government Savings Bank, and in some instances where the security given is large, the interest accruing on the deposits is paid to the contractors yearly at their request.

The attention of the undersigned has lately been directed to the fact that a firm of contractors having a deposit now in the hands of the Government has recently failed, and it is just possible that cases may arise in which moneys may be paid over by this department unwittingly, for interest, to contractors who have suspended payment. To obviate such a contingency, the undersigned would suggest that the matter be brought before the Treasury Board, with a view of having a Minute adopted to the effect that whenever a firm of contractors having a contract for the performance of work for the Government and having security deposited with this department, fails, notice thereof be immediately given to this department.

## Tenders to be invited for works.

Sections 11 and 12, Railways and Canals Act.-11. The Minister shall invite tenders, by public advertisement, for the execution of all works, except in cases of pressing emergency, in which delay would be injurious to the public interest, or in which, from the nature of the work, it can be more expeditiously and economically executed by the officers and servants of the Minister.
12. The Minister, in all cases in which any public work under his control is being carried out by contract, shall take all reasonable care that good and sufficient security is given to and in the name of Her Majesty, for the due performance of the work, within the amount and time specified for its completion ; and also, in all cases in which it seems to the Minister not to be expedient to let such work to the lowest tenderer, he shall report the same and obtain the authority of the Governor in Council previously to passing by such lowest tender; and no sum of money shall be paid to the contractor on any contract, nor shall any work be commenced, until the contract has been signed by all the parties therein named, nor until the requisite security has been given.

Sections 13 and 14, Public Works Act.-13. The Minister shall invite tenders, by public advertisement, for the execution of all works, except in case of pressing emergency in which delay would be injurious to the public interest, or in which, from the nature of the work, it can be more expeditiously and economically executed by the officers and servants of the department.
14. The Minister, in all cases in which any public work is being carried out by contract, shall take all reasonable care that good and sufficient security is given to and in the name of Her Majesty. for the due performance of the work within the amount and time specified for its completion; and also in all cases in which it seems to the Minister not to be expedient to let such work to the lowest tenderer, he shall report the same and obtain the authority of the Governor in Council previously to passing by such lowest tender ; and no sum of money shall be paid to the contractor on any contract, nor shall any work be commenced, until the contract has been signed by all the parties therein named, nor until the requisite sccurity has beeu given.

## Certificates on Vouchers.

Revised Statutes of Canada, Cap. 29, Sec. 33.-No payment shall be authorized by the Auditor General in respect of work performed, or material supplied by any person in connection with any part of the public service of Canada, unless, in addition to any other voucher or certificate which is required in that behalf, the officer, under whose special charge such part of the public service is, certifies that such work has been performed, or such material supplied, as the case may be, and that the price charged is according to contract, or if not covered by a contract, is fair and just.

Note.-The proper officers to make these certificates are those who have personal knowledge of the facts in each case.-J. L. McD.

## Small Balances due to Estates.

## Audit Office, Ottawa, June 12, 1888.

Sir,-It frequently happens that there is a small sum due to the estate of a deceased person who has left no will, generally for superannuation or salary, when the whole assets of the estate are so small that the cost of obtaining letters of administration would be a large part of them.

I suppose that in strictness the amounts due by the Government cannot be paid legally to any one but the administrator of the estate. However, the amounts are frequently paid, either on receiving a renunciation from all the other known heirs in favour of one, or on a bond approved by the Department of Justice iudemnifying against loss, should a person who has obtained the legal right to claim the payment make a demand for it.

I would suggest that payment, under the circumstances above set forth, should be made to a person who is not legally empowered to demand it, only when the assets of the estate are under one hundred dollars, and after the execution of a bond as above described, approved by the Department of Justice, with any additional safeguards which, in the opinion of the Department of Justice, the special circumstances of the case call for.

SESSIONAL PAPER No. 1

Order in Council, July 24, 1894.-That a number of deaths occur annually among the fishermen who are entitled to fishing bounty, and in the majority of cases the men are poor, die intestate and leave no property worth the cost of administration. The bounty in such cases, by right belongs to the nearest of kin to the deceased, but that, under an Order of the Treasury Board, dated 19th June, 1888, all cases where small sums are due the estates of persons who die intestate and leave little or no property of any consequence, must be referred to the Treasury Board for decision as to the action to be taken, which course necessitates a separate Order in Council in each case.

That as those to whom the money rightfully belongs are, in most cases, in needy circumstances, a general Order be granted, authorizing, in case of death among the fishermen of the class referred to, to pay the amount earned to the widow, father, mother, or children as the case may be, of the deceased, without reference to the Treasury Board.

## Stationery Office

Order in Council, June 26, 1889 (as amended by O. C., July 11, 1889).-His Excellency, in pursuance of the powers vested in him by Revised Statutes, chap. 27, sec. 7, and by and with theadvice of the Queen's Privy Council for Canada, is pleased to direct and order :-

1. In every department the Deputy Head shall sign all requisitions in accordance with sec. 7, chap. 27, of the Revised Statutes, and a clerk, to be named by the head of the department shall, under the direction of the Deputy, have charge of all stationery and printing, and shall receive from the Government Stationery and Printing Offices all printed work and articles of stationery ordered and supplied, and grant receipts for the same, superintending, also, their distribution to the clerks or employees for whose use they have been ordered.
2. The Secretary of State is authorized to prepare a list of all articles to be kept in stock and furnished to the depart:nents upon ordinary requisitions, such list to be subject to the final revision and approval of the Governor in Council.
(Note.-This list was approved by O. C., Nov. 29, 1889.)
3. As soon as such list has been so settled and approved, and printed and distributed to the several departments, all ordinary requisitions upon the Stationery Office shall be issued for those articles only that are therein enumerated.
4. No articles shall be added to such list thereafter except upon the report of the Secretary of State, approved by the Governor in Council.
5. No plain paper or envelopes, such as are used for ordinary correspondence, shall be asked for by any ordinary requisition or issued upon the same for private use of the emyloyees in any deparement, except in the case of Deputy Heads.
6. No paper or envelopes for correspondence, bearing relief stamp, cameo or embossed work or devices, either lithographed or engraved, shall be kept in stock or supplied, except for the use of Ministers or Deputy Ministers, the Governor General's Secretary, the Speakers and Members of the two Houses of Parliament, and the Judges of the Supreme and Exchequer Courts, the Clerk and Law Clerk of the Senate, the Clerk and Law Clerk of the House of Commons, and the Librarians of Parliament.
7. No pocket-knives or pocket-books shall be kept in stock or supplied to any department except upon special requisitions, stating the names and employment of the persons for whose use they are to be procured.
8. No despatch-boxes or brief bags, shall be issued for the use of members of any Government Commission.
9. All requisitions issued uncrer Rules 6 and 7 , or for articles not on the general list (and therefore not procurable upon ordinary requisitions) shall be signed by the Deputy Minister and approved and initialed by the Minister of the Department, or the Clerk and Speaker of each House of Parliament.
10. A return of all articles furnished to each department upon requisition, with the total cost of the supply to such department, shall be made up by the Superintendent of Stationery each six months, as soon as possible after the 30th of June and the 31st of December in each year, in order that it may be submitted to the Governor in Council by the Secretary of State.
11. All former Orders in Council in reference hereto are cancelled.

## Pamphlets and Books.

Order in"Council, December 22, 1888. -The Secretary of State desires to draw the attention of Council to the practice in the past of the granting of authority by Council for the purchase of books for Library exchanges and for distribution among the departments, and he recommends that in the future no such authority be granted, but that all books for Library exchanges be procured under the authority of the Joint Library Committee of Parliament, and paid for out of the sums placed at its disposal ; and that all purchases of books for the use of any department of the government be made on the authority of the Minister charged with its administration, as already provided by Order in Council, through a regular Stationery Office requisition, as required by the Act respecting Public Printing and Stationery. The Committee recommend that this Minute, if approved, be cominunicated to the Library Committee and to each department of the public service.

## Newspapers and Books.

Order in Council, June 18, 1894. -Cancellation of all former Orders in Council in reference to supply of newspapers, books and magazines to departments.

Order in Council, June 18, 1894.-Regulations respecting the purchase of newspapers, books and magazines, to the several departments :-
(1.) That a maximum limit of $\$ 500$ be set apart for cach ministerial department, within which is to be defrayed the cost of newspapers, books and magazines for the use of such department.
(2.) That books and magazines, other than those which are of a technical character and necessary for the proper working of the department, shall be purchased only on authority of the head of the department.
(3.) That no newspapers be supplied to outside offices of any department except on the authority of the Minister of that department.

## Accounts for Advertising.

Order in Council, May 8, 1894.-On a memorandum dated March 28, 1894, from the Secretary of State, recommending that the following regulations be established to regulate and govern advertising for the several departments of the Government.

## regulations.

All orders for advertising which are issued at the seat of liovernment shall be given through the Queen's Printer, and the Queen's Printer shall certify to the accounts before payment.

The copy shall be sent to the Queen's Printer, accompanied by ministerial directions, naming the papers in which the advertisement is to be published, specifying whether in the daily or weekly issue, and the number of insertions in each paper, respectively.

On receipt of these instructions, the Queen's Printer shall print a sufficient number of copies to enable him to furnish duplicates to the papers indicated. These shall be forwarded by him to the publishers: accompanied by an intimation of the number of lines to which the advertisement is to be limited, himself establishing the space on a proper estimate of the solid matter of the notice, with a moderate allowance for the purposes of display, and accompanied also by an instruction to the publishers to render the accounts to him in duplicate, with a copy of the order attached, and with marked copies of the papers in which the advertisements are printed.

The Queen's Printer shall ascertain the established tariffs for advertising of the papers on the Patronage List, and on receipt of these accounts shall certify to the same in accordance with these rates, and transmit the accounts for payment to the departments from which the orders issued, having first satisfied himself that the publication has been as directed, but no newspaper shall be paid a higher rate than that charged to the general public for a similar service

Accounts for advertising required by the Outside Service shall also be rendered, with the orders and marked copies of the publications, to the Queen's Printer, and the advertisements shall by him be measured, certified to, and transmitted for payment in accordance with the rules which obtain for advertisements issued at the seat of Government.

The Queen's Printer shall keep with each paper, accounts of the advertisements directed to be published in it under the different departmental headings, so as at all times to show the state of each account.

Advertisements shall not be inserted in any books or pamphlets, or in any periodicals other than newspapers published weekly or more frequently, and all advertisements shall be limited to a maximum of six insertions in daily and three in weekly papers.

These regalations shall apply to all the departments excepting the Immigration Branch of the Department of the Interior, and the Intercolonial Railway.

The Committee submit the above regulations and recommendations for Your Excellency's approval.

## Advertising in Canada Gazette.

Order in Council, March 22, 1888. - On a report dated March 21, 1888, from the Secretary of State, submitting that the Act respecting the Department of Public Printing and Stationery prescribes that all charges for advertising in the Canada Gazette shall be paid in advance, and that the Queen's Printer reports that in some cases, after such payment, the parties advertising discontinue their notices before all the insertions asked for have been given, and apply for a refund of moneys paid for insertions ordered but not given.

The Minister recommends that the Queen's Printer be instructed that no such return of moneys can be made, as the Government is ready at all times to fulfil the contract entered into with the advertisers in the Gazette, and is in no wise responsible for their discontinuance. The Committee sub. mit the above for Your Excellency's approval.

## Legal Services.

Order in Council, April 12,1879.-On a report dated April 2, 1879, from the Honourable Minister of Justice, stating that it has been represented by the Auditor General that it would facilitate the business of his office were an Order in Council passed making it necessary that the accounts rendered by any legal agent employed professionally by any of the departments of the Government should be submitted to the Department of Justice for examination and approval before payment.

That at present the practice of the departments appears to be to submit such accounts to the Department of Justice before paying the same, but no formal Order in Council exists on the subject.

That an Order in Council does exist providing that all accounts for printing and advertising are to be certified by the Queen's Printer before payment.

That he, the Minister, thinks that it would be proper that a formal Order should be passed with respect to legal agents. He recommends, therefore, that it be ordered that the accounts rendered by legal gentlemen employed professionally by any of the departments of the Government be sub. mitted to the Department of Justice for examination and approval before payment, and that a copy of the order be transmitted to each of the departments of the Government.

## Removal Expenses.

Order in Council, Sept. 8, 1871. -The Committee of Council have had under consideration an extract from the Minutes of a meeting of the Treasury Board held Sept. 7, recommending that the following rules be adopted for the payment of removal allowances to Government employees, and they respectfully advise that the recommendations therein submitted be approved and adopted; -
"Removal Allowances.-No removal allowances can be granted except on report of the Treasury Board. No romoval allowance is to be granted if the salary is increased, except in special cascs, and on a report of the head of the department. A removal allowance is not to exceed the actual cost on account rendered."

## Travelling Expenses.

Order in Council, February 6, 1893. - That all the previous Orders in Council relating to expenses and allowances for travelling and living expenses to officers and employees when travelling on the public service, be repealed, and that it be ordered that from the date of the passing of the Order in Council founded hereon, there be paid to all officers (with the exception of the Lieutenant-Governor of the North-west Territories and the Major General Commanding the Militia, and the Judges, who are otherwise provided for) travelling on public service for the Government of Canada, their actual reasonable travelling and living expenses ; that all advances made to such officers for travelling expenses shall be accounted for within one month from the conclusion of the trip ; that the officers shall render to the Department of Finance a detailed statement of such expenses, and that a certificate be attached to all accounts for travelling, as follows, signed in each case by the officer who has incurred the expenses :-
"The whole of the expenditure was incurred on Government business."

## Triplicate Receipts for refunds on account of Civil Government Contingencies to go to Accountant of Contingencies.

Order in Council, June 10, 1893. -That the following regulation in connection with accounts to be rendered to the Accountant of Contingencies for sums advanced from Civil Government Contingencies be approved of by Council.

That the triplicate receipts for all refunds of balances of amounts advanced from Civil Government Contingencies for travelling expenses and for petty cash, and for all other refunds made on ascount of Civil Government Contingencies, be forwarded by the department or officer making such refunds to the Accountant of Contingencies for the purpose of closing the personal accounts and replacing to the credit of the different departments the amounts so refunded, to enable him to keep a proper check upon the various appropriations.

## Special Qualifications.

## Treasury Board, Ottáwa, Nov. 13, 1883.

Sir, - I have been directed by the Honourable the Treasury Board to call your attention to the 5 th subsection of section 7 of 46 Victoria, chapter 7 (C. S. Act), wherein it is stated that "in the case of attorneys, barristers, engineers, architects, actuaries and land surveyors, the examination may be dispensed with on a report from the deputy head, concurred in by the head of the department, that it is not necessary" ; and in connection therewith to call your attention to the Hansard of last session, page 1035, when in reply to an observation from Mr. Ross, of Middlesex, Sir Hector Langevin stated that these gentlemen are employed in the service in the practice of their profession, and therefore an examination would not be required, as they had already passed technical examina tions before their admission into the ranks of their profession.

I have now to ask whether, in case any of these professional gentlemen are employed in a department where their professional attainments are not required as, for instance, a barrister in the Finance Department, the spirit of the Act would allow of the examination being waved?

1 am of opinion that the spirit of the Act does not allow of the examination being dispensed with in the case mentioned, but that the examination can be dispensed with only in cases where the duties to be performed by the officer seeking promotion are those connected with his profession as an attorney, barrister, engineer, architect, actuary or land surveyor.

## Dating Back Appointments and Promotions.

I am to state that in the opinion of the Minister of Justice, a promotion cannot be dated back, and the Governor in Council cannot properly provide for the payment of the increased salary attendant upon a promotion from a date anterior to that upon which the promotion takes effect.

## Civil Service Promotions: Examination.

Order in Council, April 12, 1893.-His Excellency, in virtue of the provisions of section 39 of "The Civil Service Act," as amended, and by and with the advice of the Queen's Privy Council for Canada, is pleased to make the following regulation :-

Hereafter no clerk on the staff of any department of the Public Service, who was in the service or employment of the Government on the 1st day of July, 1882, and has since been continuously engaged therein, shall, as a condition of promotion, be required to pass an examination in any other subject than the duties of the office to which he seeks promotion, unless in any special case the Deputy Minister by a report concurred in by the head of the department submits to the Board of Examiners other subjects of examination as a test of fitness for such office.

## Salaries : Date of Payment.

Order in Council, January 13, 188\%. -The Committee of the Privy Council have had a memorial from the members of the Civil Service laid before them by the Right Honourable the Prime Minister, praying for relief of their financial embarrassment in reclaiming the advance of salary.

The Committee recommend, with a view to relieving the financial embarrassment, that the paylist for each month be authorized on the 15th day of the month, provided that when the day for passing any pay-list under the provisions hereof shall be a Sunday, or a bank or departmental holiday, the pay-list be issued on the previous day. The salaries of the Ministers to be paid at the end of each month.

Order in Council, March 5, 1888. -The Treasury Board have had their attention ealled to the fact that the terms of the Order in Council of January 13, 1887, governing the issue of the Civil Service monthly pay-cheques have not been strictly adhered to, and that cheques are sometimes issued in advance of the days authorized by the said Order for the issue of the pay-lists. The Board recommend to Council that the several departments be notified that in future the monthly paycheques must not be issued in advance of the rlays authorized by the said Order for the issue of the pay-lists, and that the provisiors of the said Order must be strictly adhered to.

Order in Council, November 14, 1895. -The attention of the Board was called by the Deputy Minister of Finance to the statements of the balances of the several Government accounts with the Bank of Montreal, on the 31st October, 1895, by which it appeared that some of the departments had issued pay-cheques in advance of the due date.

The Board recommend that the attention of the several departments be called to the irregularity of such action, and the Board are of opinion and recommend that steps should be immediately taken to stop the practice for the future.

## Extra Salary.

Civil Service Act, 1888, 51 Vict., cap. 12, sec. 12. -Subsections 1 and 2 of section 51 of the Civil Service Act (R.S.C., cap. 17) are hereby repealed, and the following substituted therefor :- " 51. No extra salary or additional remuneration of any kind whatsoever shall be paid to any deputy head, officer or employee in the Civil Service of Canada, or to any other person permanently einployed in the public service."

## Public Service: Hours of Attendance, Extra Salary.

Audit Office, Ottawa, Angust 11, 1809.

Sir,-The Department of Justice has recently made application to me for payments to members of its staff for extra services rendered in the preparation of returns ordered by Parlianent, on the ground that such payments were permissible, because in accordance with the judgment of the Supreme Court of Canada in the case of The Queen $v s$. Bradley. The account rendered was certified by the Deputy Minister that the work was performed outside of regular office hours and was not in the line of the Clerk's ordinary duties. Two of these accounts I have passed; but, as the practice is sure to grow fast and as it therefore appears to me it would be in the interest of the Public Service that a uniform system in this regard should be established by the Governor in Council, I have refused to pass in the meantime an application of this character sent to me within the past few days.

It is manifest that, if in certain Departments all the work which requires to be done after office hours is paid for, in addition to the regular salary of the clerk who performs the work, while in the other Departments the service which is done after the usual office hours brings no additional remmeration, the permanent heads of the latter Departments will be much more unpopular with their assistants than the deputies in the other Departments with theirs.

You will observe that there is in force an Order in Council of July 27, 1882, which provides that any member of a Departmental staff may be required by the Head of the Department to attend his office at any time his services may be deemed necessary. In view of this provision, it seems to me elear that the Governor in Council intended it to be understood that the officials of the Department were to keep up the work of the Department after the usual office hours when it could not be done during those hours, no matter whether the work could be strictly called the usual work of the Department or not.

In the cases that have arisen so far, the work done, as I have said, has been in connection with the preparation of returns ordered by Parliament; and it seems to me the question should be decided by the Treasury Board or by Council whether or not the preparation of those returns or other similar work falls within ordinary duties in a Department, when done by those who are receiving regular pay as either permanent or extra clerks.

I shall be obliged if you will bring the matter to the notice of the Treasury Board with the view of having some definite and uniform basis established in regard to a practice which I fear, if not regulated, may grow to undesirable proportions, and may cause much dissatisfaction.

Order in Council, 19th August, 1899.-That the provisions of the 9th section of the Order in Council of 27th July, 1882, which provides amongst other things: "That at any time, if the public "service requires it, the Heads of Departments or Deputy Heads to have the right to call for the "attendance of all or any of the officers or clerks at an earlier or later hour than those named," be confirmed.

That no extra salary or additional remuneration of any kind whatsoever, be paid to any Deputy Head, officer or employee permanently employed in the Civil Service of Canada, unless an amount to provide for the payment has first been specially voted by Parliament.

## Salaries: Date of Changes and Increases.


#### Abstract

Order in Council, July 29, 1871.-On a report dated July 29, 1871, from the Minister of Finance, stating that considerable inconvenience has arisen from Orders in Council making promotions and other changes in the Civil Service, and granting superannuation allowances, not naming the time from which they shall count, and that it is desirable that, excepting for special reasons, such changes shall always count from the first day of some month and recommending that it be established as a general rule that unless some other date is specially named in the Order in Council, all such changes shall be held to count from the first day of the month next succeeding the date of the said Order. The Committee submit the above recommendation for Your Excellency's approval.

Sir,-In connection with the papers and other memoranda relating to appointments, promotions, increases of salary and other matters affecting the Establishment, referred for the consideration of the Treasury Board, I am directed to say that the Board are desirous in all cases of having before them the fullest information bearing on the action reconmended, and to ask that particular attention be given to make the papers as complete as possible, especially in regard to the following requirements :-

In consequence of the Civil Service Superannuation Amendment Aot, 1893, and Civil Service Insurance Act, 1893, being now in force, it is absolutely necessary that in the case of appointments, in addition to the full reasons for the action recommended, the age of the appointee be given and a medical certificate submitted as to his state of health. In the case of memoranda recommending the employment of temporary clerks, the certificates required by the Civil Service Act must in all cases accompany the papers, and, in addition, the state of the appropriation from which payment for the extra assistance is to be made musi be set forth.

It is also directed that the certificates, reports and requisitions required under the Civil Service Act (vide sections $15,17,19,21,26,35,37,39$ and 47 ) be furnished with the respective cases to which they relate.

I have further, by direction of the Treasury Board, to state that in all cases where employees of 60 years of age and over are recommended for retirement under the Civil Service Superannuation Act, it will be necessary to give full and explicit reasons, in addition to that of age, for the action recommended, as members of the Board caunot undertake to recommend the superannuation of civil servants for the reason of age only.

In directing your attention to these requirements of the Board, I have to ask that in all cases the papers for their consideration be submitted in as complete a state as possible, and to inform you that in no case will a memorandum be taken into consideration if the papers are not complete.

## Employment of Temporary Clerks.

Section substituted by 58-59 Victoria, Chapter 15, for section 47 of the Civil Service Act (R.S.C., Chap. 17):-When from a temporary pressure of work or from any other cause, extra assistance is required in any branch of either the first or second division, the Governor in Council may, on the report of the deputy head of the department, concurred in by the head of the department, that such extra assistance is required, authorize the employment of such number of temporary clerks, writers, messengers, porters, packers or sorters, as are required to carry on the work of the department.

## Temporary Employees: Certificates of Attendance.

Treasury Board, Ottawa, October 9, 1891.

It being understood that nothing herein contained shall be construed to authorize payment for Sundays and statutory holidays in cases in which payments for such days have not been made hitherto.

## Leave of Absence to Temporary Employees.

Order in Council, October 20, 1892.-On a report dated 19th October, 1892, from the Acting President of the Privy Council, stating that he has had under consideration the subject of applications for leave of absence, and for sick leave made from time to time by technical officers, clerks and messengers who are not permanently appointed to the Civil Service, but who are engaged in the inside service in the departments at Ottawa, and recommending the adoption of the following rules :-
(1.) That the head of the department, and, in his absence, the deputy head of the department, may grant to any professional or technical officers and supernumerary or temporary clerks who may be employed under section 47 of the Civil Service Act, and who have been so employed during twelve months continuously, leave of absence for the purpose of recreation, for a period not exceeding three weeks in each year ; such leave to be granted at such time during the year as the head or deputy head of the department may determine.
(2.) That employees whose employment is for one month or upwards, may, in the discretion of the head of the department be paid for days when they are absent in consequence of actual illness, after leave of absence obtained, on certificates furnished to the satisfaction of the head of the department ; or for days during which absence has been oceasioned by contagious or infectious diseases in the families of the persons so engaged; such absence not exceeding one week at any one time and not exceeding two weeks during any year.

This regulation to be retroactive as to cases which have occurred since the 1st of September, 1891, and its future operation to be confined to supernumerary and temporary clerks who are employed under section 47 of the Civil Service Act, and to persons temporarily employed as messengers and to professional or technical officers.

The Committce submit the same for your Excellency's approval.

## Medical Certificates.

Order in Council, July 23, 1892.-On a memorandum dated 14th July, 1892, from the Secretary of State, recommending that the Order in Council of the 25 th April, 1892, appointing certain gentlemen to be medical practitioners, under the third subsection of section 51 of "The Civil Service Act" in so far as regards furnishing medical certinicates in cases of illness of officers and servants of the Departinent of Marine and Fisheries, le cancelled.

The Minister further recommends that every duly qualified medical practitioner whose name is registered in the Medical Register of the yrevince in which he resides be appointed as an authorized medical practitioner for the purpose of issuing medical certificates as required by subsection 3 of section 51 of the Civil Service Act.

The Committee submit the foregoirs recommendations for Your Excellency's approval, and order that a copy be sent to each departiment.

## Rate of Pay to Reporters.

Order in Council, October 9, 1888.-On a memorandum dated 1st October, 1888, from the Minister of Justice, recommending that authority be given for the payment of the Official Reporters of the Debates of the House of Commons, and of other Reporters, who may be designated, as occasion nay require, by the Minister of Justice, to be employed to report Exchequer Court cases, or proceedings under Commissions of Inquiry, or upon arbitrations in which the Government is interested, or upon any other matter requiring a short-hand reporter, at the rate of fifteen cents per folio of one hundred words, the reporter, for such remuneration to supply to the Government four copies of the proceedings and evidence in each case.

The Minister further recommends that the sum of $\$ 3.50$ per diem over and above the actual moving expenses be allowed to such reporters on account of travelling expenses while so employed and when absent from their places of residence, the days of leaving and arriving to be counted as full days. Also, that the provisions of this Order shall relate back to the time from which the services of such reporters were first engaged in the capacity mentioned, viz., from November 1st, 1887.

The Committee adrise that the requisite authority be granted.

Order in Council, July 3, 1890. - That the rate to be paid to Unofficial Reporters for reporting during the Sitting of Parliament, when the official staff is not available, be 25 cents per folio of 100 words, the Reporter, for such remuneration, to supply the Government with four copies of the proceedings in each case.

That the sum of $\$ 3$ per diem, in addition to actual moving expenses, be allowed to such reporters on account of travelling expenses while so employed and when absent from their place of residence, the days of learing and arriving to be counted as full days.

That the amount hereby fixed for remuneration shall apply to the accounts for reporting done by such reporters during the last Session of Parliament.

That in all cases when a reporter (not official) is duly in attendance for reporting for a day, and does not, or is not required to report to such an extent as to make the actual amount of his remuneration reach the amount of $\$ 5$ per day, he shall be entitled to receive $\$ 5$ a day for each day he has been required to attend and has been properly in attendance ready to work.

That it be declared that whenever hereafter any reporter, whether official or otherwise, applies for and performs reporter's work during the Recess of Parliament, he shall be considered as having been employed under, and shall be paid according to, the rates fixed by the Order in Council above referred to, of October 9, 1888.

(32.) In countina the salary on which the superamuation allowance is to be calculated, it shall be taken at one-third of the whole amount received by the officer for the 36 months preceding the Order in Council superannuating him.
(33.) When any officer is permanently employed at a nominally per diem salary, it shall for the future be included in the pay-lists at an equivalent per annum salary.
$1-2 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~A}$
(34.) When any officer has an official residence or other similar perquisite, his salary shall be stated at such higher sum as may fairly represent these advantages, and he shall pay the abatements on such higher salary, otherwise his superannuation allowance shall count only on the salary on which he has paid abatements.
(35.) The superannuation allowances shall be paid monthly in the manner proposed in the memorandum on that subject submitted by the Auditor.
(36.) An Establishment Book shall be kept in the Finance Department, in which shall be entered every person in the service on the 1st July, 1870, or hereafter to be appointed, who, by foregoing rules, comes within the provisions of the Act, showing the date of his birth and the date of his appointment, together with any other facts upon which his length of service will be counted.
(37.) When any greater length of service is claimed by men now in the service than that from the date of the man's appoiutment to his present office, it shall be the duty of the Auditor to prepare a classified statement of all such claims which, together with a report thereon from the Civil Service Board, shall be submitted to the Privy Council, to the intent that rules may be laid down by it for counting such service.
(38.) When any person is hereafter appointed in later life for any special qualifications, the additional number of years which may be added to his actual length of service shall be stated in the Order in Council appointing him, and such additional years shall be recorded in the Establishment Book, and in order that the same thing may be done with regard to men now in the service, the Secretary of the Treasury Board shall collect from each deputy head, and the clerks of the Senate and House of Commons a statement of all the men now serving under them to whom they are of the opinion that additional service should be allowed under the Act for special qualifications in their appointment. Such statement shall be submitted to the Treasury Board, and reported upon by it, so that an Order in Council may direct such additional years to be recorded in the Establishment Book.
(39.) The Auditor shall prepare a statement to be submitted to Council on Ist January next of all persons on the Establishment of 60 years of age and upwards, and a similar statement shall hereafter be submitted at the commencement of each financial year.

Order in Council, May 3, 1886. -That the 34th paragraph of the Treasury Minute of the 11 th November, 1870, which paragraph is as follows:-"(34.) When any officer has an official residence or other similar perquisite, his salary shall be stated at such higher sum as may fairly represent these advantages, and he shall pay the abatements on such higher salary, otherwise his superannuation allowance shall only count on the salary on which he has paid abatements";-be repealed, except in the case of those who now pay superannuation abatement on such allowance or perquisite in addition to the abatement from their salaries.

SIR, - I have the honour to acknowledge your letter of the 7th, asking whether, under any circumstances, superannuation once established by Council may be reopened-always presuming that no clerical error has been made.

The Superannuation Act provides that under the circumstances mentioned therein, the Governor in Council may grant to a person who has served in an established capacity in the Civil Service a superannuation allowance, and that the Order in Council made in the case shall be laid before Parliament. If the grant was made by Letters Patent, the latter could not be cancelled by authority of an Order in Council, except they had been issued in the name of the wrong party, or contained a clerical error or misnomer, or wrong description of a material fact. (See 38 Vic., cap. 13.) As the grant in the case of a member of the Civil Service is made by an Order in Council, I am of opinion that in practice it would be well to adhere to the same rule, and not to cancel or amend the Order in Council, except in cases mentioned in the Act referred to (38 Vic., cap. 13.)

Also, whether in any case it is intended to fill the racancy caused by such superannuation by appointment or promotion, and if so, at what remuneration, and generally such information as will enable the Board to determine whether the superannuation asked for should be granted.

The Board further recommend that if the above meets with the approval of Council, a copy of the Order in Council founded thereon be furnished the several departments for their guidance.

## Gratuities.

Order in Council, Feb. 1, 1868.-As frequent instances occur of the death of officers in the service of the Government, leaving their families in circumstances of great and immediate want, and destitute of means to defray the expenses of illness and funeral, the Committee respectfully advise that in all cases of the decease of an officer of the Government on the permanent list, a gratuity equal to his salary be paid to his widow or orphan children, or to such members of his family or household as His Excellency may approve, for two months from the date of his decease.

Order in Council, Dec. 26, 1887. -The Boarl having had under consideration the matter of the payment of gratuities to the widows or other representatives of officials of the Government not on the permanent list, are of opinion, and recommend to Council, that the terms of the Order in Council of February 1, 1868, be adhered to.

The Board are further of opinion that should Council, in special cases deem it necessary that the provisions of the above-mentioned Order in Council be extended to include payment of gratuities to the widows or other representatives of officials not on the permanent list, the consent of l'arliament should be asked for the payment thereof.

## Insurance of Government property.

Order in Council, July 5, 1881. -The Committee of the Privy Council have had under consideration, upon the suggestion of the Acting Minister of the Interior, the general question of insurance against fire of Government property ; and they are of opinion, and humbly advise Your Excellency that, in view of the large amount, varied character and widely separated position of the property in the Dominion belonging to the Crown, it is a wise economy for the Government to underwrite its own risks, as well on movable as on immovable property, and they recommend that all existing policies (if any such exist) be suffered to lapse and no new ones effected, and that a copy of this Order, should Your Excellency approve of it, be sent to every department of the Government.

## Security of Public Officers.

## (Order in Council, August, 1869.)

On the recommendation of the Honourable the Minister of Finance, the Committee advise that the annexed memorandum from the Board of Audit containing certain rules defining the circumstances under which security is to be required from public officers be approved and adopted.

The Board of Audit has had under consideration the Act respecting the securities of public officers and the Order in Council founded thereon. Although the manner in which security is to be given is therein laid down, there does not appear to be a sufficient definition of the circumstances under which security is to be required. After conference therefore with the other deputy heads who have not seats on the Board of Audit, the Board submit for the consideration of the Government the following resolutions :-

1. Every person collecting or receiving revenues in cash to be paid by him over to the Receiver General must give security.
2. Every paymaster whose business it is to distribute money handed over to him must give security.
3. Every person to whom letters of credit are given, or to whom warrants issue, whether accountable warrants in round sums to meet general expenditure or warrants to enable him to pay sums ascertained to be due, and who pays such sums by his own official cheque against an official account at the bank, shall give security.
4. When a department receives an accountable warrant for general expenditure or warrants to meet sums ascertained to be due, and such warrants are placed to the credit of the department in an official account, the cheques must be signed by the head or deputy head, and at least one other person in the department who has been designated for that purpose as being cognizant of the transaction and of its being duly received, and in such case it is not necessary that either should give security.
5. The paylists are paid by the bank upon the cheque of the deputy head in the department and of the collector at the ports and inland revenue stations. If the deputy head or collector gives his cheque in favour of the individual or order, he will not be required to give security, but if the whole money is drawn on one cheque to be distributed, the person charged with the distribution should give security.
6. It sometimes happens that in order to save the issue of many warrants or official cheques, money is paid to a department to distribute, although such a transaction may not fall within the ordinary duties of that department. In such cases unless the cheques are signed by another person in the department besides the deputy head, security ought to be given.
7. When for any reason money is casually placed in the hands of any person in a matter not belonging to the regular duties of his office, he cannot be called upon to give security, and it would be better in all such cases to place the money in the hands of two persons who should both sign the cheques.
8. Where a warrant issues in favour of any person and it is paid to him by a cheque in favour of any other person, he will not give security.
9. Where a warrant or letter of credit issues in favour of a Minister of the Crown to enable him to make certain payments, no security is required, but it would be better, except in special cases, that such credits or warrants should issue in favour of the department as in rule (4), in which case a second signature would be required.

It inay be advisable to give some instances of cases which would fall under the abore rules to render their operations more intelligible.
(1.) Collectors of customs and excise, the cashier of the Post Office Department, the collector of hydraulic rents for the Public Works, the collector of patent fees, Department of Agricultnre.
(2.) The paymasters of the Public Works and Militia Departments and the International Railway Commission.
(3.) The accountant of contingencies, the wardens of penitentiaries, and all otner persons receiving accountable warrants for petty expenses.
(4.) All the expending departments would come under this rule, but there should be a distinct order in each department, who should sign the cheques. The payment of interest and other services on general or open warrants, where the cheques are signe $\lambda$ by both the Deputy Receiver and Deputy Inspector General would come under this rule, and the paymasters in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.
(5.) All persons authorized to sign paylist cheques.
(6.) It often has occurred when the actual payee is not accessible that warrants have issued to the Receiver General to enable him to pay. Many of such cases will be met by the new arrangement of giving the cheque not in favour of the Receiver General, but of the, individual. Such cases may, however, occur again, and would fall under this and the next rule. So also a sum may be paid to the Commissioner of Inland Revenue to distribute for small refunds of duty. Such sums ought to be placed to an efficial account as in any other expending department, although it may not be the ordinary business of the department, and the cheques should be countersigned.
(7.) Thus a certain sum was placed at the credit of the Secretary of the Treasury Board, to be expended as directed. Such a transaction tormed no part of the duties of his office, and if such a thing is done again, a second person should be named to countersign the cheques.

## Franking Privilege at Ottawa.

Order in Council, February 25, 1892.-By an Order in Council, dated February 25, 1892, the folowing regulations governing the franking privilege were approved :-

## REGULATIONS.

1. In each department there may be used one franking stamp, such stamp being a facsimile of the usual signature of the deputy head, and to be kept in the custody of some officer or confidential clerk specially intrusced by the deputy head with that duty, and to be affixed by him upon official correspondence only.
2. When envelopes with a printed official address thereon are used, the name of the deputy head may be printed on such envelopes.
3. In addition to the printed stamp or printed signature as above provided, the head of the department and the private secretary of the head of the department in the name of his Minister, and the deputy head may frank by a written signature or initials; but no other method of franking except as above enumerated will be permitted.
4. No blank or unaddressed envelope shall in any case be franked.
5. The deputy head of each department shall furnish the Postmaster General with an impression of the facsimile stamp which it is proposed to use in his department.
6. The General Officer commanding the Militia of Canada, the Adjutant General of Militia, the Auditor General and the Superintendent of Insurance shall, for the purposes of these rules, be respectively considered as deputy heads of departments.
7. All the official correspondence of the several departments, except that of the heads of departments, the deputy heads and the private secretaries of Ministers, shall be transmitted in envelopes having printed or written thereon the words "On Her Majesty's Service "; and no envelope bearing the superscription shall be used for any private correspondence.
8. From and after the 15 th day of March, 1892, no private correspondence whatsoever shall be transmitted from any department of the Government at Ottawa or elsewhere, or any branch thereof, under frank, nor shall the postage due thereon be charged against the Government.
9. All private correspondence addressed to any member of the Civil Service at Ottawa, or to the care of any civil servant, shall be liable to the same rates of postage as apply to the public generally.
10. Should any letter addressed to any civil servant at Ottawa upon which postage has been paid on delivery prove when open to be on public business, the amount so paid may be refunded on the certificate of the deputy head of the department to which the addressee belongs.
11. Any employee offending against any of these regulations shall be liable to suspension or such other punishment as the Governor General in Council may determine.

## Tariff of Fees on Commissions.

Order in Council, September 7, 1893.-The Cornmittee of the Privy Council have the honour to recommend to Your Excellency the adoption of the annexed report of the Secretary of State, with reference to the tariff of fees upon commissions to public officers :-

That the following tariff of fees chargeable upnn comnissions to public officers be confirmed :-

1. Upon commissions to Lientenant-Governors, Ministers of the Crown, judges of all courts, junior judges, deputy ministers and Queen's counsel, a fee of $\$ 20$.
2. Upon commissions issued to officers or others receiving salaries of $\$ 1,000$ or over, a fee of $\$ 15$.
3. Upon commissions issued to officers or others receiving salaries from $\$ 400$ to $\$ 1,000$, a fee of $\$ 8$.
4. Upon cominissions issued to officers or others receiving salaries from $\$ 100$ to $\$ 400$, a fee of $\$ .5$.
5. Upon commissions issued to officers or others receiving salaries of $\$ 100$, or to officers or persons appointed to office, who are paid by fees of office, a fee of $\$ 4$.

He would also submit that in the case of the Solicitor General of Canada, the Controller of Inland Revenue and the Controller of Customs, and of all officers in the service of the Crown who may receive a salary of $\$ 3,000$ or upwards, the fee chargeable on commissions issued to them be fixed at $\$ 20$.

The above to apply to commiss.ons issued under the Great or Privy Seal.
He would further recommend that no commission or document be delivered out of the Department of the Sccretary of State until the fee, if any, las been paid.

## Commissions of Inquiry-Rate of Pay.

Order in Council, September 21, 1897.-On a report dated 6th September, 1897, from the Minister of Justice, stating that he has had under consideration the question as to the rate of remuneration which should be allowed commissioners appointed to hold inquiries or investigations into public matters or departmental business, under chapters 114 and 115 of the Revised Statutes of Canada.

The Minister recommends that the fees allowable to a commissioner appointed under the authority of either of those chapters shall not in any case exceed ten dollars for each full day's attendance or occupation in connection with the work of the commission, exclusive of the reasonable moving and living expenses of the commissioner to be allowed where the commissioner has to travel for the purpose of executing the commission ; and that the said per diem allowance shall be deemed to cover letters and interviews on other days as well as on the days for which the commissioner is entitled to such per diem allowance ; and that no further charge be allowed for such letters and interviews ; and that a professional man shall not be entitled to any fees or allowances as commissioner to which other commissioners are not entitled as aforesaid.

The Minister also recommends that a copy of this Minute, if approved, be sent to every commissioner hereafter appointed with his commission, or the notification of his appointment, and that such commissioner be at the same time informed that the provisions of the Order in Conncil will be strictly followed in ascertaining the amount to which he may be entitled for his services as commissioner.

The Committee advise the adoption of the above, and submit the same for Your Excellency's approval.

## Maximum number of Reports to be ordered by each Department for Free Distribution.

Order in Council, January 19, 1893.-On a report dated January 16, 1893, from the Minister of Finance, stating that by Order in Council, dated May 26, 1886, authority was given for placing on sale by the Queen's Printer, copies of public documents, other than those distributed officially to the Houses of Parliament and the departments, that in accordance with this order a circular was sent to the various departments requesting them to order only such copies as they absolutely needed for official purposes, and due arrangements were made by the Queen's Printer for advertising and supplying copies to the public.

The Minister finds that the number required for parliamentary inside and outside distribution is, as to most of the departmental reports, 1,800 copies of each, and as to five of the most important, 2,050 each. The numbers ordered by the different departments for their own distribution vary from 315 to 10,000 .

The Minister is of opinion that it is desirable to secure greater uniformity and economy in the orders from the various departments, and that the number ordered by each should be based on the call for necessary distribution.

The Minister therefore recommends that each department be authorized to order within its discretion for its own distribution, copies of its reports not to exceed a maximum of 500 copies of each report, and that the Queen's Printer be authorized to reserve for purposes of sale such number of the departmental reports and to arrange for their sale in such manner as may be deemed advisable by the Secretary of State.

The Committee submit the same for Your Excellency's approval.

That authority be given for the printing of 2,400 copies in English, 750 copies in French, to meet the demands for distribution.

## EXECUTIVE REGULATIONS GOVERNING REVENUE AUDIT.

Treasury Minute, June 21, 1886. -The Board had under consideration a communication from the Anditor General to the address of the secretary of the Board, requesting to be informed whether the revenue accounts generally are to be submitted to him for examination and audit and if so, under what regulations.

Ihe Board direct that these accounts be submitted to the Auditor General for examination and audit.

Sir, - With reference to our recent conversation respecting the submission to the Treasury Board of the rules and regulations drawn up in your office, I have now to state that I have found, on inquiry, that your letter of the 31st December, 1886, was submitted to the Treasury Board in due course, but as it did not ask for confirmation of the rules inclosed, but only stated what your intentions were in auditing revenue accounts, and requesting any directions that the Treasury Board might deem fit to give-as the Treasury Board had no directions to give, the letter was unanswered; but, in order that the law may be complied with, I have.now to state that the rules are approved of.

## Rules and Regulations in reference to the Receipt, Entry and Accounting for Public Moneys.

(1.) Receipts with printed consecutive numbers should be used.
(2.) A receipt should be given for each payment.
(3.) All receipts should be entered in a cash book, and each entry should bear the same number as the receipt.
(4.) The counterfoil of the receipt should bear its number, the name of the payer, the amount, and a short memo. of the object for which payment was made ; and it should be signed by the collector, and when payment is made in person, by the payer.
(5.) A deposit should be made to the credit of the Receiver General daily, if the receipts amount to $\$ 25$. If the daily receipts do not amount to $\$ 25$, a deposit should be made whenever that sum or more is on hand.
(6.) As soon as possible after the close of each month, and not later than the 10 th of the succeeding month, a copy of the cash book should be transmitted to the Audit Office, with the corresponding counterfoils of receipts granted, and also the blank when a receipt has been spoiled or cancelled.

Ireasury Minute, May 23, 1890. -The Board had under consideration a communication from the Auditor General, submitting certain regulations and forms of returns drawn up in accordance with the gencral regulations applicable to certain classes of revenue coming under the control of the Department of Marine, which regulations and forms were submitted to exemplify the carrying out of the general regulations.

After careful consideration, the Board approve of the general regulations for the outside service for the audit of the revenue accounts, as follows :-

## Revenue Audit-General Regulations for the Outside Service.

1st. Where possible, every officer or agent employed in the collection of public moncys shall make a daily deposit, if the receipts amount to $\$ 25$; otherwise, whenever that sum is on hand ; and he shall furnish regularly to the proper department, a return of his collections.

2nd. This return shall be made monthly, or at less frequent intervals, to be fixed by the department when desirable.

3rd. It shall be a copy in detail of the collector's cash book, showing the different deposits made in acquittance ; and shall be certified by him and mailed to the proper department within five days after the close of the period which it covers, and be accompanied by the corresponding vouchers or papers.

4th. It shall be fully examined and audited in the department and certified by the accountant and examining officer.

5th. When examined and certified, all returns for each period shall be forwarded to the Audit Office, accompanied by a summary, certified by the deputy minister and the accountant.

And they direct that the particular regulations and forms applicable to each department be submitted to the Board for approval.

The Minister recommends that the leave asked for be granted.

Sir,-I have the honour to inform you that my living allowance as judge in the Yukon Territory has not been paid for the months of October and November. I applied to the Finance Department for the same, but I am now in receipt of a letter from the Deputy Minister of Finance, in which he states that the Auditor Gencral has declined to authorize the payment of my living allowance while absent from Dawson. From this ruling of the Auditor General I wish to appeal to the Treasury Board.

I have no doubt that you are fully informed of all the facts and circumstances leading up to my absence, on sick leave; but at the risk of being tiresome I will shortly repeat the ground which I take in making this demand.

I have considered the living allowance as an allowance not given barely for the extra cost of living in Dawson, but as an allowance given to cover all the costs which a man sustains by reason of his appointment in that distant and out-of-the-way place to make up in some degree for what one is out of pocket by reason of life in the Yukon. In short, all that may befall any man-such as sickness, extra cost of communication with the outside world, and so on. In my own case, I am absent from Dawson simply because I am a resident in Dawson. As you are aware, I took seriously ill there, and under the advice of the two doctors who attended me I have come out for special medical treatment which I could not obtain in the Yukon, and I may say that my entire treatment has been
with good results in my health. It was impossible for me to remain in the Yukon, and I had to come to the outside world, 5,000 miles, to obtain the treatment I needed. All this has occasioned me, for travelling alone, an expense of about $\$ 600$ in coming and going, besides incidentals. In any case, a person who resides in the Yukon Territory should have a vacation, and there is no way of taking one in Dawson. You are forced to come to the outside, as we call it, for any relief from the monotony of life there. This occasions, I need not say, a very great expenditure of money. No public servant in any part of Canada but in the Yukon is placed in the same position, and certainly no judge. All of the expenses of living are enormously greater there than here, and if I had to pay house rent during the year and a half I have been in the Yukon I would have been bankrupt; even without that my expenses for the year have exceeded my income.

I state these facts for the information of the board, and I shall be very much pleased if you will present the case to them for their speedy decision, as I expect to return to my duty in March.

## Audit Office, Ottawa, December 19, 1901.

Sir,-I have a file of papers from the Treasury Board in connection with the living allowance of Judge Craig. I inclose it.

I have really not decided against the allowance, although I have declined in the meantime to pass it.

Residence in the Yukon, on account of the great expense of living there compared with what it is in any other part of the Dominion, is the ground of the allowance, which is nearly as great as the whole salary of a judge in other districts. I presume that you would not consider a judge absent for a lengthened period from the Yukon, even under leave of absence, always, under any circumstances, entitled to the allowance. If Judge Craig is entitled now, it is because there are circumstances in his case which would not exist in every case of a judge's absence. What are they?

## Justice Departaent, Ottawa, December 20, 1901.

Sir,-Referring to your letter of the 19th instant, with regard to the living allowance of Mr. Justice Craig, you state that you presume that I would not consider a judge absent from the territory for a lengthened period, even under leave of absence, always, under any circumstances, entitled to living allowance, and you add that if Judge Craig is now entitled it is because there are circumstances in his case which would not exist in every case of a judge's absence. You inquire what these reasons are.

I do not consider it necessary at present to state any rule for payment of living allowance which would be applicable to a judge under all circumstances while absent from his jurisdiction. My view is that Judge Craig is undoubtedly entitled in the present circumstances. There is no doubt that the payment is authorized by Parliament. Judge Craig came out for medical treatment and rest which he very much required, and he is subject to all the additional cost of travel, \&c., which this involves. He proposes to return to Dawson soon, and I think it is a great pity that he should be embarrassed by the government withholding his living allowance. I hope you will see your way to authorize payment without further delay.

## Audit Office, Ottawa, December 26, 1901.

Sir,-I feel obliged to continue the discussion of Judge Craig's claim for living allowance.

You say: 'My view is that Judge Craig is undoubtedly entitled in the present 'circumstances. There is no doubt that the payment is authorized by Parliament. 'Judge Craig came out for medical treatment and rest which he very much required, ' and he is subject to all the additional cost of travel, \&c., which this involves.'

The parliamentary authority to which you refer is: 'Yukon Territory-living allowances for judges, $\$ 6,000$.' This wording clearly excludes any charge which is not a living allowance to a judge, and for a period during which the judge is resident in the Yukon.

If you cannot use an appropriation which provides for the building of a wharf in Nova Scotia to feed destitute Indians in the North-west, you cannot use an appropriation provided for a living allowance to a judge in the Yukon to pay his travelling expenses when on leave of absence in another part of Canada, where living expenses are so low that judges who are permanently resident there do not enjoy a living allowance.

I know that Judge Craig greatly needed medical care. Everyone whom I happened to meet last winter, and who had been shortly before in Dawson, was enthusiastic in commendation of the good work done by Judge Craig not before it was needed.

Still, there is no appropriation for paying general travelling expenses of judges, even when travelling on public purposes, and if there were, that would not make it lawful to pay travelling expenses on private purposes. If the necessity to travel for health or recreation occurs to a judge it must be looked on by him as a misfortune, and he must bear the expenses of the trip, just as a private individual must do under like circumstances.

When I was in Paris last summer, my attention was drawn, by a very intelligent Frenchman who had travelled in Canada, to the great superiority of our practice, among other things, in living within the appropriations, and especially in conforming to them in character. In France what are called 'virements' are common, the $1,000,000$ francs voted for a popular purpose
is made to take the place of the 100,000 francs voted for a less popular object. Then, as it takes two or three years to prepare the accounts, and as many more to audit them and report upon them, and, as the governments change so frequently, all interest in the matter is lost by the culprit having ceased to exist before his crime is made public.

One need not say that under British institutions the beneficent purpose of keeping the control of expenditure in the hands of Parliament is greatly served by insisting upon a clear definition of the kind of expenditure which the appropriation is to cover and by following the definition closely in the expenditure.

The chains that bind a people are riveted under popular rulers just as irregularities slip into our practices to benefit useful officials, but once the irregularities get there it is hard to remove them. I hope that you will see that there is some reason for not persisting in an effort to have private travelling expenses made a charge against a living allowance appropriation restricted.in express terms to a province which is not the one in which the travelling is being done.

## Departhent of Justice, Ottawa, December 27, 1901.

Sir,-Referring to your letter of 26th instant, respecting the living allowance of Mr. Justice Craig, you told me by letter of 19th ultimo that you had really not decided against the allowance, although you had declined in the meantime to pass it, and you invited a statement of reasons why you should pay the allowance. I stated in reply my opinion that the judge was entitled, and that there was parliamentary authority for the payment, which I supposed ought to have satisfied the legal requirements of the case, but thinking that perhaps some other consideration might additionally appeal to you I mentioned medical treatment and travelling expenses, not as affecting the question of legal liability, but intending thereby to suggest what I think is reasonable that Parliament, in providing this living allowance for the Yukon judges, had regard not only to the excessive cost of ordinary living there, but also the unusual expenditure to which a judge might be subject in respect of medical attention and travelling out and in, made necessary by rigours of the climate. This suggestion in the result seems to have been unfortunate, because it has led you away from the point at issue, and to the assertion that my submission of the case for the adjudication of the Treasury Board is an effort to have private travelling expenses made a charge against an appropriation for living allowance. The reasons which influenced Parliament in providing the allowance are, of course, matters of speculation not affeeting the legal position, and if you do not agree that Parliament had in view the consideration which I suggest, it makes the probability of settling this matter without reference to the Treasury Board so much the more remote, but it in no wise affects Judge Craig's right to his allowance.

I do not agree with your construction of the words of the Supply Act which you quote. They authorize payment of living allowances, but do not exclude anything. It is one of these living allowances which I ask you to pay.

I think, with all respect, that the wharfs of Nova Scotia, the destitute Indians of the North-west, the very intelligent Frenchman, the virements and culprits, and the chains and rivets, to which you refer, all very interesting subjects in themselves, no doubt, are quite foreign to my application.

## SESSIONAL PAPER No.

If you are not disposed to authorize the payment, I hope you will not delay the submission to the Treasury Board. All I ask is a decision by the competent tribunal.

Sir,-I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 9th instant, in reference to Judge Craig's living allowance. I also had a letter from Judge Craig on this subject. At one time I supposed that the Treasury Board meetings might cease with the departure of the Prime Minister and his colleagues for London, to attend the Colonial Conference. I have since learned that this is not the case.

The matter of living allowance has been complicated by another elemest entering into the question. I happened to be in the House of Commons when the living allowances were discussed there. The Opposition last session took the ground that the living allowance should cover everything, and therefore that house accommodation, fuel, light, \&c., should be provided by the judges themselves and not by the government. Several members of the Opposition took part in the criticism, and held that the government was responsible for the improper payments, as it seemed to them, but one member held that it was the Auditor General who had neglected his duty. So far as the Minister of Public Works is concerned, his contention was that whatever he had done in making payments was done at the request of the Minister of Justice. This seemed to throw the responsibility on the Department of Justice, but a responsibility which the Minister of Justice seemed unwilling to assume. Therefore, no Minister, in the meantime, has assumed the responsibility, and I am not clear that the government has.

I really have not sufficient information to deal with this question. Without knowing more, my duty seems to be to call upon the judges to repay the amount expended
on their behalf. I expect to see the Minister of Public Works shortly in connection with this question. No matter whether this question has been pending a long or short time, it seems necessary that it should remain unsettled until the matter of which I have been speaking takes a more definite shape.

## Justice Department, Ottawa, August 21, 1902.

Sir,-I find your letter of 12th June last with respect to Judge Craig's living allowance awaiting reply upon my return to Ottawa.

You first called my attention to the propriety of paying this living allowance on September 19 last, nearly a year ago. You withheld the payment for the months of October and November of last year, and I suppose also for the subsequent months until Judge Craig returned to his jurisdiction. Your ground for so doing was that Judge Craig was not entitled to be paid living allowance during his absence from the Yukon Territory. As I did not agree with your view, I appealed to the Treasury Board in December last. Afterwards we had some further correspondence, discussing the case, but, failing to reach an agreement, I urged you to make the necessary report so that the Treasury Board might determine the objection. The report has not, however, been made, and for the reason, as I understand your letter of June 12, that you heard a discussion in the House of Commons at the last session, in which the Opposition claimed that a judge's living allowance should cover his house accommodation, fuel, light, \&c., and that these should not be provided in addition by the government, one member holding that you had neglected your duty in this regard. You state further that the Minister of Public Works contended that whatever he had done in making payment was done at the request of the Minister of Justice, that the Minister of Justice, however, seemed unwilling to assume this responsibility, and, therefore, you are not clear that the government has assumed it. Therefore, you propose to call upon the judges to repay the amount expended on their behalf, and you state that it is necessary that the matter should remain unsettled until it takes a more definite shape. This latter observation seems to be obvious enough, but what I have been urging is that there has been undue delay in submitting the questions in difference to the determination of the statutory tribunal. Until you heard the discussion in the House to which you refer the only objection was with regard to the judge's absence from the territory, and the alleged discussion which you heard months afterwards does not, of course, justify the delay from December until the time when it took place. Since you consider, however, that the statements made during the debate afford additional reason for not paying the living allowance, you are no doubt now entitled to rely upon them. I can only say that I have no knowledge or information except that contained in your letter as to any additional payments in respect of house accommodation, fuel, light, or otherwise, having been made by the Public Works Department or any other department on account of Judge Craig's maintenance, and I do not agree that your letter states any sufficient reason for withholding the living allowance which the government agreed to pay, and which, as I have stated, was, in my view, earned months ago. The Treasury Board, however, has authority to determine all these objections, and it seems to me clear that if you rely upon them you should embody them in your report, which, in view of the time which has already elapsed, should be submitted immediately. Doubtless you have now had an opportunity of seeing the Minister of Public Works, and of obtaining the information which you desired when writing on June 12.

I urge again, therefore, that you report to the Treasury Board, as required by statute, without further delay.

Sir,-I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 15th ultimo, which accompanied Treasury Board file No. 28527, containing an appeal by the Department of Justice from my objection to the payment of the living allowance to Judge Craig for the months of October, November, December, 1901, January and February, 1902, and for any other period during Judge Craig's leave of absence for which the allowance was not paid.

One ground of my objection is that Judge Craig was out of the Yukon from the beginning to the end of that period, and the living allowance is not made to a judge for any other place. It is made there because of the unusual expenses which living entails in the Yukon, and naturally is supposed to cease when the judge is not put to the extra expense.

I inclose a copy of a discussion which took place in the House on May 5 last, with reference to other outlay by the government at Dawson, which had been considered by the judges as perquisites. These are mainly expenditures for rent, fuel and light. The remarks made by leading members of the Opposition indicated that it was very unsatisfactory that any expenditure, outside of the amount authorized as living allowance, should have been made by the government. Those who entered into the discussion on the part of the government do not seem to have successfully met the strictures of their opponents.

I would refer you particularly to the remarks of the Minister of Justice, which show very clearly the Minister's view that there was no authority for giving the judges anything more than the amounts specially voted for their living expenses. The Minister of Public Works says that whatever was furnished to the judges was so furnished at the request of the Minister of Justice of the day; but, so far as I can see, that does not alter the position of the question at all. Neither had the Minister of Justice any right to authorize this expenditure, nor had the government as a whole the right. If it is necessary to vote money before it can be, not merely properly spent, but before it can be authorized for a particular purpose, it surely cannot be permissible to transfer to the use of any person what has required money to obtain. In fact, it seems really not to justify the using of words to deal with so plain a proposition.

On the face of it, there is no reason why the judges, who are apparently enjoying otherwise all that Parliament thought was sufficient to pay their living expenses, and which the judges themselves accepted as such, should receive through the departments additional sums for this purpose.

## SESSIONAL PAPER No. 1

Whether the objection which I have raised as to the living allowance not being justified during the time that the judge was out of the Yukon district is considered good or not, the fact that Judge Craig has received already from the government $\$ 1,484.13$ in 1900-1, as shown on $\nabla-49$ of the Audit Office Report, and in 1901-2 $\$ 730.55$, in all $\$ 2,214.68$ for the two years, besides his salary and regular living allowance, shows that he is not entitled to $\$ 1,250$, the only amount of his money in the hands of the government, even if, on the other view of the case just mentioned, the government considers he is entitled to the living allowance for the time during which he was absent from the Yukon.

I now find it is quite true that Judge Dugas has had a much larger amount from the government for his private purposes, without having surrendered any part of his living allowance for it. He, of course, is quite equally responsible for the repayment of what he had, and I am taking steps to cause the repayment.

A judge, so far as his salary is concerned, is manifestly in the same position as any other person who draws public money for the performance of certain duties. If he may receive any amount which he chooses to demand for his own personal needs, even if it is only what is used for his comfort, instead of through the medium of money, then any other public servants may do the same, and if all public servants, why not anyene else?

My objections are under Sections (a) and (c) of Section 32, Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act.

## Judge's Chambers, Court House, Dawson, December 16, 1902.

Dear Sir,-I did not reply to your previous letter regarding the retention of my living allowance, \&c., because I hoped that something would be done without any further application on my part, and really because I was too busy to attend to the matter properly. I wrote to the Minister of Justice twice, but received no reply. I directed his attention to the fact that I was the only one of all the officials drawing a living allowance whose allowance had been docked while on the outside, although several that I am aware of have been outside and their living allowance paid in full while out, not to speak of the two judges, one of whom went out before me and one after me, both of whom were paid in full. I cannot understand what I have done, or how I stand in a different position to any of these gentlemen, and why the distinction and discrimination should be made. I am getting somewhat weary of the delay, but I propose to wait a little longer before taking any definite action.

Regarding what you say about retaining this money as a set-off against extra allowance drawn in the way of wood and light, I have only this to say: I think each thing should stand upon its own bottom. I am quite prepared on legal as well as

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moral grounds to fight any action to make me repay anything to the government for wood or light. I have an absolute legal defence in this : When I came into this territory no provision was made for even a court room for me; there was no room in which I could sit down to write my judgments or sign an order. Judge Dugas occupied the rear, back and upstairs of the old log building which was used as a court house. There was one room in which the few books of the territory were kept, and which he and his family occupied as a private sitting room. This room, of course, was wholly unavailable to me; I was therefore on the street, actually and figuratively. A vacant house belonging to the police was on the barracks square, and this I got permission to use from the Commissioner. One-half of this I converted into legal chambers, where I put my library, and in which I sat and did my legal work, which was used by the lawyers constantly, both in coming to me for their work in chambers and as a room in which to read and use my books. This room was kept clean by my private servant, paid out of my own pocket. The wood and light which was made so much of in Parliament last session-two-thirds of it went to heat and light this very room; the other third, of course, was used in heating the other part of the house, which I occupied. The stove which Mr. Borden spoke of in his speech was a stove got to heat this room for the public use, which stove is now stored somewhere about the buildings here. This state of affairs continued up to the time I returned this spring, so that you see I have an absolute answer to the demand for the refund. Apart from that, I did not ask for the wood. I at first objected that so far as my private wood was concerned, I had no right to it, but I was assured by the acting superintendent of public works that I was entitled to it, and that he had orders to carry it over to me. I burnt coal oil for some time in the house, but the manager of the electric light works told me he had instructions to put the light in for me. It had been so done for others by order of the Commissioner. I warned him that I was not liable, and would not pay, and he took his own chances of getting his money, and he did so. One-third of that light I used afterwards in my private house. The balance, as I said before, was used in the public service. To show how little was done for me when I came in here, I may tell you as a fact that I could not obtain a table, chairs, ink-bottle or a pen with which to do my ordinary public work; absolutely no one to give me these things, and I had to buy them out of my own pocket. I have not asked for any refund for this, although the prices of carpenter work in the Yukon were ten times outside prices. I did obtain some shelves for my books after: having to go on my knees for them. I think the department and you yourself, sir, should consider the conditions in here when I came in, and even after, were so entirely different from those on the outside, that these extra things should have been allowed and provided. I may tell you as a fact that when I came here I could not obtain any shelter, or a house of any kind but the one I got, which was a government house. The only alternative was living in a hotel, in a room about $5 \times 8$, without any comforts, where your next-door neighbour, with a thin board partition and open cracks, might be a common prostitute. All these things are unknown on the outside and were unprovided for. I am quite satisfied with the present arrangements, the only reasonable and fair way of working things-to pay us a liberal salary and allow us to provide everything for ourselves. But under the old arrangement, and under the old cost of living, the salary then paid was wholly inadequate to keep one alive in decent condition. My two years' life in the Yukon has left me considerably in debt after exercising the very closest economy.

I shall not trouble you or the department any further on this matter, but I shall not submit to being held up to the House of Commons as a grafter without having the facts fully laid before the House, and as you refer me to those debates in your reply, I may say I was amazed to see that so little information was available in answer to the charges of the Opposition, when I had repeatedly given such information with the very greatesi detail.

SIR,-I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 8th instant, which accompanied Treasury Board file 30620, an appeal from my decision in connection with outstanding claims for bounty on pig iron and steel manufactured by the Dominion Iron and Steel Co., the Hamilton Steel and Iron Co., and the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Co.

In connection with bounty by the Dominion on iron and steel products, there are four points to be determined, and they are of great importance, as the magnitude of the various products brings up the sums involved to millions. The policy of the Dominion is one of generosity ; but the officials who have to pass on bounty earned have no more to do with that branch of the subject than they would have if, instead of paying out money, it were a case in which money had to be collected.

There is : First, bounty on cold pig; second, bounty on molten pig; third, in connection with the bounty on steel, the determination that at least 50 per cent of the charge is pig iron made in Canada, and fourth, there is bounty on steel.

With regard to the quantity of cold pig which as such leaves its place of manufacture, all proof of quantity which seems required is easily supplied by evidences of sale to others.

With reference to molten pig, the charges for the steel furnaces and the quantity of steel made as shown by the ingots as they come from the steel furnaces, if we do as it is now proposed by the Department of Trade and Commerce that we should do, we must rely entirely, without even a test audit, on the book entries of those whose interests would tend to induce them to magnify the amount on which bounty would be payable. The bounty paid for the twelve months which ended on December 31 in the several establishments was as under:

This must be a question of money only, and there would be only $\$ 1$ for supervision to $\$ 500$ for bounty if the government paid the supervision.

There ought to be a report from each officer as to what it would cost to provide complete information, and what it would cost for such information as he would consider advisable, if the former would in his opinion be too expensive.

I may say that in the interest of the Dominion, if millions are being spent, we should make the small expenditure for supervision, if it is at all possible.

In this connection, let me say that, for the sole purpose of being satisfied that the information provided by the Dominion representatives at the different smelters is reliable, we should pay our own employees, not only in the first instance, but we should not require the companies to return it. If the Dominion can afford to make the large bounty payments, it will manage to exist and pay the comparatively small salaries of the Dominion officials.

How will it suit the reputation of the Dominion Government with the taxpayers of the country that with those who are to receive millions of Dominion taxes is left entirely the determining of how much it is to be?

Is it ever to the interest of the stockholders of the smelting companies, who are to receive the millions, that is, if the smelting companies want nothing but what is legally due to them, that it should be known that there is no control on the part of the Dominion?

It does appear to me that section 33, with regard to material supplied, applies to me in this case, and that there is good ground for my declining to pass these bounty claims under Section 32, subsections ( $a$ ) and (c).

I object to the fact that the government official who alone of Dominion officials has any knowledge of the weight of the iron or steel made, has it only from the books of the makers, when by the 33rd section of the Audit Act he ought to have it by his own knowledge.

I further contend that no less general Act, as the Bounty Act, could be intended to amend the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act in any particular, unless the less general Act expressly said so, and therefore, that the 33rd section, Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, applies. It is for the Trade and Commerce Department to show that it is impossible to follow the requirements of the Audit Act, and move Parliament to have the opinions of that department legalized.

I do not look into the regulations, because no regulations made by the government could remove a disability established by Parliament.

That the following engineers, namely, Joseph Robson and Robert Surtecs, who are appointed by the government, and George P. Brophy, who is appointed by the contractors, shall, in the presence of the parties or their representatives, go upon the work of the contractors on the said canal, examine the same, and in the like presence hear the statements of the parties and their witnesses, inquire into, ascertain and report in writing to the Chief Engineer as to what in their judgment, or the judgment
of a majority of them, would be proper and reasonable prices, allowances and deductions, if any, to be made or allowed by him in respect of so much and such portion of the said works, or extra or additional works and alterations and materials, as to which there are differences respecting prices between the parties, and as to such increased prices and allowances, if any, which should be allowed and paid the contractors in respect of any and all of the items of claim so preferred by the contractors against the department, a memo. of which shall be furnished the department within one week from the date hereof.

Provided, however, that items which are covered by specific prices in any written contract between the parties shall not be inquired into by the said engineers, nor shall any prices or allowances be made in respect thereof.

And the Chief Engineer, on his part, agrees to accept such valuations and report as shall be made in accordance with the foregoing, and will certify in accordance therewith; and the contractors bind themselves, and each binds himself, to accept of such valuations and report, and the certificate of the Chief Engineer in accordance therewith, in full satisfaction, upon payment, of all claims in respect of items covered by the report.

Sir,-I duly received 'the report of the valuators on claims preferred by Messrs, Corry \& Laverdure, under the agreement dated September 12, 1901, with the Chief Engineer of Railways and Canals.'

If this report of the valuators is binding on the government, why was action on it delayed so long?

The Chief Engineer of the department has great porvers; but I do not see that he has the power to delegate his authority to others. -Have you had the opinion of the Department of Justice that he has this power without any restriction?

I observe that the award of the valuators on the classes of work to which you had assigned values is apparently $\$ 155,599$, while your allowances gave them $\$ 58,712$,-no exception having been taken by the valuators to your quantities, but only to your rates.

Surely you will scarcely pass the report of the valuators through your hands, under the circumstances, without.making some explanation.

While I suppose that Mr. Hobson must have large experience in prices of work of the kind dealt with in the report, even in the modifications of prices due to the recent labour-saving appliances, this, I should suppose, could scarcely be expected of his two associates, no matter how much respect is due them for their attainments in other branches of their profession.

You, of course, do not place any reliance on the legality which might be imparted to this report from the vote of $\$ 300,000$ for the Trent Canal, Capital, or from the discussion in connection with that vote.

Indeed, it appears to me that, if the government has come to the conclusion that the report should be adopted, there is no way of making the determination effective except by Act of Parliament, clearly defining that the report of the valuators is to be adopted and naming the amount in the report.

Sir,-I am in receipt of your communication of the 12 th instant, respecting the application of section 33 of the Audit Act to the claims for extras in connection with the contract for the construction of Section 2 of the Peterborough-Lakefield Division of the Trent Canal.

In reply, I have to state that I am advised by the law officers of this department that the section of the Audit Act to which you refer has no application to the case in question. Under the language of the section the certificate that the price is 'fair and just' is required only where the price is not covered by contract. In the present case the whole work is covered by a contract; the extra works ordered in this division of the canal are performed in accordance with and under the terms of the contract, and the prices for such extra works are ascertained and fixed, as well, in pursuance of the agreements therein contained. There is a manifest distinction between the case of extras performed under and in accordance with a contract, whereof the prices are fixed in the manner prescribed therein, and the case of supplies ordered or works performed without any semblance of a contract. In the latter case it is reasonable that the prices should be certified as fair and just.

This distinction, I am advised, is contemplated by the section of the Act referred to, and, in that view, the certificates at present upon the estimate are not inconsistent with the requirements of the Act.

Sir,-I have the honour, by direction, to inform you that objection has been raised by the Auditor General to the payment of a certain amount applied for by this department as due to Messrs. Corry \& Laverdure, contractors for work on the Trent Canal, Section 2, Peterborough-Lakefield Division.

The facts are as follows :-
The contract for the works in question was dated May 7, 1896, and comprised, amongst other works, the construction of a hydraulic lock, the material of which was to be concrete.

In the course of construction, certain items of work were executed, some of which were recognized by the departmental engineers as extra work, and prices were fixed for them. Objection was, however, raised by the contractors to the acceptance of the prices proposed, and considerable discussion and difference of opinion ensued; very large claims being preferred by the contractors. In order to the satisfactory and equitable settlement of the difference, without appeal to the Exchequer Court, it finally appeared desirable to call for independent expert opinion. Accordingly, on September 12, 1901, an agreement was, with the sanction and approval of the Minister of the department, made by the Chief Engineer with the contractors, whereby three independent engineers were appointed, namely, Mr. Joseph Hobson and Mr. Robert Surtees by the department, and Mr. George P. Brophy by the contractors, to examine the works, hear statements and make inquiries, and to ascertain and report what should be the reasonable prices, allowances and deductions in respect of the claims for extra work put forward by the contractors. The said agreement stipulated, however, that items covered by specific prices in any written contract between the parties should not be inquired into, nor should allowances be made therefor ; the valuation and report so resulting was to be accepted as binding on the Chief Engineer in making his certificate, and as binding on the contractors, on payment in accordance therewith, as in full satisfaction of all claims in respect of items covered by such report.

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The claims presented by the contractors on September 19, 1901, amounted to $\$ 420,837.37$.

The engineers so appointed made full examination of the work, and took a large amount of evidence; finally making a report, dated January 18, 1902, dealing with the several items of the contractors' claim, as in the terms of the said agreement, and attaching to each item the allowance or deduction which seemed proper. They added, under date of February 6, 1902, a supplemental statement setting out in schedule form, their conclusions, showing the several items dealt with by them, the prices allowed, the totals due under those prices, and the totals of balances found by them to be due the contractors, after deduction of amounts covered by progress estimate. The aggregate of these totals they set down as $\$ 122,829.50$. As to this, however, the Chief Engineer of the department has noted that in respect of one item, namely, item No. 7 , 'entrance piers to lift locks,' for which they have allowed the bulk sum of $\$ 8,693$, they omitted to make deduction of the sum of $\$ 5,963.96$, which has been already paid, and their total should, consequently, be reduced by that amount, making it $\$ 116,865.54$.

On November 22 last, the Chief Engineer of the department sent in a progress estimate, No. 73, based on the said valuations and report of the expert engineers, such estimate covering work done up to October 31, 1902. The grōss amount of such estimate being $\$ 587,355.04$, and his previous estimate, No. 72 , having been $\$ 466,369$, the gross amount to which the contractors would be entitled under his estimate, No. 73 , is $\$ 120,986.04$, less the usual 10 per cent drawback.

On this estimate the usual application to the Auditor General was made for the issue of a cheque in payment. The amount, however, asked for in this application was limited to $\$ 56,000$ (in place of the full amount shown by the engineer's certificate to be due), the appropriation available being insufficient to cover the full amount. This application the Auditor General has declined to pass.

I am to request that you will be pleased to submit the case to the Honourable the Treasury Board, in order that the objections of the Auditor General may be either sustained or over-ruled, it to be understood that such decision will apply to the whole of the amount of the Chief Engineer's certificate in progress estimate No. 73, and not merely to the actual amount of the application made to the Auditor General.

I inclose the papers in the case, including the contract and the several agreements in question, the reports of the expert engineers, and the evidence taken before them.

## Audit Office, Ottawa, January 27, 1903.

Sir,-I have your letter of the 16th instant, accompanying Treasury Board file No. 30307, an appeal from the Department of Railways and Canals against my decision in the case of Corry \& Laverdure.

You will note the correspondence which has taken place between the Department of Railways and Canals and this office, which pretty fully sets out the differences.

I would ask you to consider section 33 of the Audit Act, which reads as follows:-
' No payment shall be authorized by the Auditor General in respect of work performed, or material supplied by any person in connection with any part of the public service of Canada, unless, in addition to any other voucher or certificate which is required in that behalf, the officer under whose special charge such part of the public service is certifies that such work has been performed, or such materials supplied, as the case may be, and that the price charged is according to contract, or if not covercd by a contract, is fair and just.'

Please also look at the discussion (see inclosed extract) which took place in 1878, when the Audit Act was introduced, and observe what has been the uniform practice since the passage of that Act.

So far as I can understand the contention of the Department of Railways and Canals in this matter, it is that if the work, the price of which is under consideration, was dealt with at all in a contract, although prices are not fixed, then the prices are not necessarily subject to the certificate by the Chief Engineer. Now, we must look at what the object is in enacting a particular section. If you examine section 11 of the Railways and Canals Department Act, which has been on the statute-book from before the time when the Audit Act was passed, you will notice that contracts for works are to be let after tenders have been called for by public advertisement; and the Deputy Minister of Justice, in a recent opinion, has said that when contracts dealing with works are to be made, it is the duty of the department to call for tenders by public advertisement.

It is, of course, fair to assume, when speaking of payments being authorized by contract, or being certified as to price by the Chief Engineer, either that 'the price fixed by contract' means the price when the lowest tender has been accepted, or, if the price is not subject to a contract, that the other safeguard has been applied, viz.: the obtaining of the Chief "Engineer's certificate that it is fair and just. It is quite manifest that this view would be defeated if, when tenders have not been called for, the certificate of the Chief Engineer has not been required. From a reading of the discussion which took place when the Audit Act was being considered, participated in by leading members of the House, by the then Minister of Public Works and Railways and by Sir Charles Tupper, it is quite manifest that this was expected to be the operation of this section. This is the rule which has been observed since then. If it is to be departed from now, it would be only proper, in the public interest and in the interest of the government, that Parliament should be made aware of the fact that a different interpretation has been given to the law from what was evidently intended when the law was enacted, and Parliament should be asked to sanction the change of practice.

If, for some reason applying to this case alone, it is advisable that the general rule be inoperative, Parliament should be asked to vote the specific sum which it is thought proper to pay to this company on account of the case of hardship, and payment be, of course, made only after the action of Parliament shall have been taken.

I have not seen any Order in Council sanctioning the change of practice adopted in this case by the Railway Department. So far as my view goes, it would be a most dangerous thing to establish this precedent, which would be considered to warrant a payment which is not supported by a call for tenders, the one accepted being the

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lowest, unless special reasons to the contrary exist, or by a statement of any official of the department that the price is fair and just.

Perhaps you could see your way, before a decision is reached, to ask the Department of Railways and Canals for a more explicit and definite statement of the exact point, both with reference to the aspect of the law to which I have called attention and to good practice which justifies the proposed departure from the ordinary course.

I do not mention, in the meantime, the sections under which my objection is taken, in the expectation that you may obtain further information from the Department of Railways and Canals before I make a final statement of my views.

## Extract from 'Hansard,' April 4, 1878.-Discussion on Bill re Audit of Public Accounts.

On the 34th clause:
Mr. Cartwricht said that it was a new elause, which was intended, as far as possible, to meet the case of extras. It certainly required to be carefully considered, and it was suggested as being as good a check as they were likely to devise. The clause was as follows:-
' No payment shall be authorized by the Auditor General in respect of work performed or materials supplied by any person in connection with any part of the public service of Canada, unless in addition to any other voucher or certificate which may be required in that behalf, the officer under whose special charge such part of the public service is, certifies that such work has been performed, or such materials supplied, as the case may be, and that the price charged is fair and just.'

Mr. Tupper said that the great difficulty was this: a contract might be given to the lowest tenderer, but for acertain class of material the charge might, in the estimate of the officer in question, be twice as much as was fair. Nevertheless, he was obliged to vouch that the price was fair and just, when, in his opinion, it was most exorbitant.

Mr. Langevin said that perhaps the hon. the Minister of Public Works would explain how this clause would act.

Mr. Mackenzie said that there had been two or three examples. For instance, a dispute had arisen as to particular work done on the Ottawa river, when the claims of the contractors of a dam, which was considered a kind of work which one of the engineers maintained was provided for in the specifications, came up. The contractors held that this was not the case. The estimate, however, was sent in by the local engineer, corering the work done, and finally it was determined, after reference to other engineers, including the Chief Engineer, that it really had not been provided for in the specifications. In this case, suppose the engineer of the locality had returned this claim as an extra, the Auditor General would have prevented the issue of the certificate, unless the officer in whose department this particular work was included, certified that it really was the work of the kind described by the local officer. In another class of work, masonry on one of the canals was classed as simple masonry, at so much a yard -it might be $\$ 8$ or $\$ 9$; and, as a rule, a very large proportion, and sometimes the whole of the block stone used was delivered upon the works long before any part of it was built. The contractors had to get estimates upon it, and it would be very easy for the local engineer, if he was either ignorant or ill-disposed, to give a certificate in excess of the real value of the block stone laid down.

Mr. Tupper. The wording would be improved if the words 'and that the price charged is in conformity, or that it is fair and just.'
$1-44 \frac{1}{2}$

Mr. Mackeazie. I have an invincible repugnance to using the word 'extras.' I have no objection, therefore, to insert : 'and that the price charged is according to contract, and if not covered by contract, is fair and just.'

Section, as amended, agreed to.

Memo. re file 431, Corry \& Laverdure Contract.-Refusal of Auditor General to pass. Estimate No. 73.

The Auditor General, in his letter of January 27, 1903, to the Secretary of the Tredsury Board, points out, as a preliminary objection to payment, that the estimate is not certified by the Chief Engineer as 'fair and just' under section 33 of the Audit Act, and intimates that this failure to so certify is a departure from the ordinary course.

The objection taken is not, in my view, a valid objection, and the failure to so cartify is not a departure from the ordinary course previously followed in this department.

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Section 33 of the Audit Act provides :
' No payment shall be authorized by the Auditor General in respect of work performed, or materials supplied, by any person in commection with any part of the public service of Canada, unless, in addition to any other voucher or certificate which is required in that behalf, the officer under whose special charge such part of the public service is, certifies that such work has been performed, or such materials supplied, as the case may be, and that the price charged is according to contract, or, if not covered by a contract, is fair and just.'

This language requires the certificate of the officer ' under whose special charge such part of the public service is' shall certify, \&c. This does not refer to the Chief Engineer, who has general control or charge, but to the superintending engineer, or the engineer or officer in special charge at the works. I merely refer to this, at this stage, because the Auditor General in his letter mentions the Chief Engineer, contrary to the usual, and, I consider, the proper course.

The language of the section is that the certificate must be 'that the price charged is according to contract, or, if not covered by a contract, is fair and just.'

The estimate, No. 73, in question, covers items of extra prices and allowances upon the construction of Section No. 2 of the Peterborough-Lakefield Division of the Trent Canal. All the work performed was within the scope of, or contemplated by, a contract, No. 12418, dated May 7, 1896, entered into between the Crown and Messrs. Corry \& Laverdure. Most of the items dealt with the construction of the hydraulic lift-lock at Ashburnham, and the allowances and extra prices were on the basis of changes in the contract, of unforeseen contingencies connected with the prosecution of the contract work, and of difficulties arising and situations and work insufficiently understood, through the bulk of the work being of a design entirely new, and the first of its kind constructed in Canada.

The contract makes ample provision for the fixing of prices by the Chief Enginecr, in all such cases, by a certificate in writing. The certificate placed on estimate 73 is sufficient under the contract.

Under these circumstances, I consider that section 33 of the Audit Act has no application; the work is covered by contract, and the fixing of prices for unforeseen emergencies, and changes arising under the contract, is also covered by contract. I would distinguish between a case of this kind and one where work is performed or supplies furnished under no semblance of a contract.

The Auditor General draws attention to the discussion had in the House at the time of the introduction of section 33, and draws conclusions from this discussion in support of his contention. It is familiar law that discussions of this kind may not be used to interpret a statute. The question which the courts consider is not what the legislators may have thought they were enacting, but what they actually did enact. The question of intention may be gathered from the statute itself, from the context, the recitals or the preamble-not otherwise.

From the point of view of good practice, I consider that the present practice of the department, followed in this case, is correct, namely, of certifying prices fixed by the Chief Engineer, under or in accordance with the provisions of the contract, in the same manner as those prices would be certified which are expressed in figures in the contract itself.

Disputes very frequently arise at the works between the contractors and the engineering staff having special charge of the work, which are of necessity referred to the Chief Engineer, under a provision of the contract to that effect. The latter official weighs each case as impartially as possible upon its merits or the wording of the clauses in question, and gives his opinion, and his certificate thereon-sometimes in favour of the views taken by the engineering staff, sometimes sustaining the contractor's view. In such a suppositious case, if the contractor's view is sustained, it would be unreasonable to apply section 33 of the Audit Act to the extent of saying that the engineer,
or official in charge of the work, must, contrary to his views, perhaps, certify the prices (allowed by the Chief Engineer) to be fair and just, and that, if he fails or declines to do so, the certificate and decision of the Chief Engineer is necessarily valueless. I do not think that the statute contemplated such a situation, or intended that in such an event the decision of the Chief Engineer, a skilled and technical officer having general control or charge over all works of this kind, could be over-ridden or defeated by a subordinate engineer, having special charge of the work. Certainly the contract entered into between the Crown and the contractors contemplates no such conflict of authority, nor any necessity to appeal to an authority higher than the Chief Engineer. It is unnecessary to quote the clauses of the contract-they are familiar; they leave the whole question of extra works, and of the increasing or diminishing of the prices respecting such extra works to one official, on behalf of the Crown-the Chief Engineer.

The contract is silent as to the methods the Chief Engineer may employ in deciding to grant his certificate, and as to the arguments, evidence or opinions to which he may listen in forming his decision. It is also silent as to the form of his certificate.

This form of contract, and the provision for general control of prices or allowances under the contract, is in use in practically every instance of important engineering works, irrespective of the country or jurisdiction in which such works are carried on. The form actually in use in this case was drafted long ago by the Department of Justice, and, in the Crown's interests, remembering that no contract can provide for every contingency that may arise, can hardly be improved.

In the case of Goodwin vs. The Queen, 28 Supreme Court of Canada (1898), 273, a question arose respecting the application of prices under a contract, and on submission to the Department of Justice, the contractor's view was favoured. The Chief Engineer accordingly certified the estimate as follows :-
'Total amount certified on this contract, $\$ 376,970.40$.
${ }^{6}$ Certified as regards item No. 5 in accordance with letter of Deputy Minister of Justice, dated January 15, 1896.

> 'Collingwood Schreiber, Chief Engineer.'
and the engineer at the works, Thomas Monro, added to his usual certificate on the estimate, that the amount was correct, the following words :-
'Signed by me, subject to the conditions stated in my letter of February 26, 1896.

> т. М.'

It was held that these certificates were sufficient.
Mr. Justice Girouard's remarks on the subject, at page 328-9, are interesting :
'The principal, and I may say the only, serious objection raised by the Crown to the form of the monthly estimate of the engineer of February 26, 1896-which it is sufficient to examine independently of the reservations made by the resident superintendent engineer-is that it has been certified by the Chief Engineer, on the 27 th of the same month, 'in accordance with the letter of the Deputy Minister of Justice, dated January 15, 1896.' Taking for granted that he was the sole judge of all matters in dispute under the contract, did he agree to the views embodied in that letter? Undoubtedly he did, and deliberately so. He had ample time to consider the matter, the letter having been written more than a month previously. We must suppose that he is an intelligent, competent, firm and fair man, as he is represented to be the sole arbiter between the parties, though in Her Majesty's service in the double capacity of Chief Engineer and Deputy Minister of the Department of Railways and Canals. He did not remonstrate or resist, but very properly, in my opinion, accepted the final decision of the Minister of Justice, the law adviser of the Crown designated by statute, upon a point which was considered by him aud both the Crown and the contractor as one of construction of contract and a legal question. Naturally he certified the esti-

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mate in accordance with that decision, thereby concurring in it. No threat or coercion was used to induce him to sign. I am inclined to apply here the general rules which govern consent in contracts: error, fraud, violence or fear alone vitiate such consent. Nothing of the kind is suggested.'

Since the present case arose under a contract, the work performed by Messrs. Corry \& Laverdure was covered by, and the prices fixed in accordance with, a contract, and since the Chief Engineer, being in general charge of the work, is not required by section 33 to certify in any event that the prices were fair and just, I consider that the obtaining of the 'fair and just' certificate from the engineer in special charge at the works is not, in this case, as a matter of law, required, and that in view of the certificate of the Chief Engineer complying with the provisions of the contract, it is not, as a matter of good practice, necessary.

## Re Corry \& Laverdure.

Dear Sir,-I have not been able until to-day to go over the file of papers in connection with the above contract, that you consulted me about in Ottawa last week. I find that a contract in writing was entered into between Messrs. Corrry \& Laverdure and the Crown, under date May 7, 1896, for the construction of certain work on Section No. 2 of the Trent Canal. Under this contract very important powers are conferred upon the engineer, and I may point out that by section 1 of the contract the word 'engineer' is defined to be the Chief Engineer for the time being having control over the work.

The specifications accompanying the contract, and which are declared to be part of it, are signed by Richard B. Rogers as Superintending Engineer, and by Mr. Collingwood Schreiber as Chief Engineer, and these specifications (especially paragraph 165 of them) very clearly show that the engineer to whose satisfaction the work is to be done, and whose certificates are requisite before payments under the contract are to be made, is Mr. Collingwood Schreiber, as Chief Engineer of the departmen't.

I think it important to point out that among the powers of the engineer under this contract the right is conferred upon him, by section 5, to order at any time any extra work to be done, and by the same clause the contractors are not to be entitled to any payment for any extra work unless such extra work shall have been first directed in writing by the engineer, and the price to be paid for it previously fixed by
the engineer, in writing, and the decision of the engineer as to the amount to be paid in respect of it shall be final.

It is further provided, by section 8 of the contract, that the engineer shall be sole judge of the work and material, both as to quantity and quality, and no work shall be deemed to have been executed, nor shall the contractors be entitled to payment therefor, unless the same is to the satisfaction of the engineer, evidenced by his certificate in writing.

Section 33 of this contract provides that all matters of difference which may arise, the decision whereof is not specially given to the engineer, shall be referred to the Exchequer Court.

On May 23, 1899, Mr. Schreiber, as Deputy Minister and Chief Engineer, notified the contractors in writing that certain extra work would be required, for which he then fixed certain prices.

On August 4, 1899, a supplemental contract was entered into between Messrs. Corry \& Laverdure, on the one part, and the Crown (represented by the Minister of Railways and Canals) on the other part, for the doing of the extra work referred to in the notice, May 23, 1899, at the prices in such notice mentioned.

This work having been done, differences of opinion seem to have arisen between the contractors and Mr. Schreiber as to the amount which the contractors should be paid, and an agreement in writing was entered into, under date September 12, 1901, between Mr. Schreiber, as Chief Engineer of the department, and Messrs. Corry \& Laverdure, that three engineers named in the agreement should examine the work, and inquire into and report to Mr. Schreiber what in their judgment would be proper and reasonable prices to be allowed by Mr. Schreiber in respect of so much of the work as to which differences existed.

It was, however, provided in this memorandum of agreement, that items which were covered by specific prices in any written contract between the parties should not be inquired into by the said engineers.

By this memorandum the Chief Engineer agreed to accept the valuation and report of the engineers named, and that he would certify in accordance therewith.

This agreement is said to have been entered into by Mr. Schreiber on behalf of the department, and with the sanction and approval of the Minister.

On the same day a supplemental agreement was signed by the Minister and by Messrs. Corry \& Laverdure, providing that the inquiry above referred to should be made without prejudice to whatever action, if any, might be thereafter taken upon the report of the three engineers; that if these engineers should report that an additional sum bebeyond that agreed upon by the contracts should be allowed, the Minister would submit such report to Council for determination, it being distinctly understood by the contractors that the reference to the three engineers did not acknowledge the existence of any claim against the department by reason of any finding the referees might make, and that the Governor in Council should have the same discretion in dealing with the claim after such report as if no reference thereof had been made.

The engineers named in the above mentioned agreement of September 12, 1901, have reported that in their judgment the prices agreed upon on August 4, 1890, for the extra work required were not reasonable and proper allowance for such work, and naming other larger prices which, in their opinion, would be proper and reasonable to nllow, and in the result an additional claim for a very large sum is now made against the government by the contractors.

The Department of Railways and Canals having requested the issue of a cheque in favour of the contractors for part payment of the amounts recommended by the engineers above referred to, you have asked my opinion whether, under section 33 of the Audit Act, you can properly authorize such payment unless Mr. Schreiber, as Chief Engincer of the department, certifies that such work has been performed, and that the price charged is according to contract, or is fair and just.

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I am of opinion that section 33 of the Audit Act applies to the payment requested, and that it prohibits you from authorizing the payment unless Mr. Schreiber certifies that the work has been performed, and that the price charged is according to contract, or, if not covered by contract, is fair and just.

This is but repeating the distinct words of the statute. The officer to certify is, in my opinion, Mr. Schreiber. The contract here, and the action taken by the department under it, manifestly contemplate that payments shall be made only on the certificate of the engineer, and, as I have at the beginning of this memorandum pointed out, the word 'engineer' in the contract clearly means the Chief Engineer for the time being having control over the work. Such Chief Engineer, to my mind, plainly answers the description of the officer under whose special charge such part of the public scrvice is. He will act, so far as he may see fit, upon information and certificate from his assistants, acting under his instructions and directions, in whom he has confidence, but the responsibility under this contract seems plainly to rest upon the Chief Engineer of the department, and nothing to my mind can be more clear than that it is suck Chief Engineer of Canada, on behalf of the department, who alone has the right under the contract to signify its acceptance by the Crown, and meanwhile, from time to time, to issue certificates upon which progress estimate payments will be made.

With regard to the contents of the certificate required under section 33 of the Audit Act, there is, in my opinion upon the language of the statute, no room for doubt. You are forbidden to authorize payment until you have a certificate that the work has been performed, or the materials supplied, as the case may be. Equally you are by the statute forbidden to authorize payment until you have the certificate of the proper officer either that the price charged is according to contract, or, if it is not covered by contract, then that such price is fair and just.

In the present case, as in any other, either the price charged is covered by the contract or it is not. If it is covered by contract you are, I think, entitled to have a certificate from the proper officer that the price charged is according to the contract. On the other hand, if the price is not fixed by the contract, then you must have a similar certificate that the price charged is fair and just.

In my opinion you are required to insist that one or the other of such certificates should be furnished to you. I do not see how you are in a position to determine which certificate is the proper one in any given case. That must depend on the special facts of the panticular case, and could, I should suppose, be determined only in and by the department under whose charge such part of the public service might be.

In the present case, the papers on file would seem to show that the price now claimed is not covered by contract. The whole reason for the agreements of September 12,1901 , would seem to have been that the contractors were not content with the provisions of their contracts in regard to prices for the work they had done. To the extent to which extra work had been done by them without previous written directions from the engineer, and without previous fixing by him of the price therefor, a strict reading of the contract would have prevented the contractors receiving any payment at all. To the extent to which such extra work had been required by writing, and previous prices therefor had been fixed, the contractors were apparently submitting that contingencies developing in the progress of the work, and apparently unforeseen at the time the contracts were entered into, had demonstrated that the contract prices were inadequate and ought to be measurably increased. Such considerations must have afforded the reason for entering into the agreements of September 12, 1901, for a reference to independent engincers. The careful stipulation of the Minister that, while he sanctioned the inquiry, he declined to be bound by the report, except that he would submit it to Council for consideration, seems to demonstrate that all parties felt at the time that the previous contracts were being departed from. These previous contracts certainly never contemplated any delegation by Mr. Schreiber to any other engineer
or engineers of his important functions and powers under the contracts, but, of course, it was always open to him, as Chief Engineer, to consider and to weigh carefully the riews and opinions of other engineers who might, by reasaon of examinations of their own, or by reason of any other circumstances, have had special advantages in forming opinions with regard to the quality or value of the work. Influenced by such views or opinions, Mr. Schreiber might very possibly modify the conclusions he would otherwise have come to, but there would not appear to me to be, under this contract, any power given to Mr. Schreiber to substitute for himself as judge between the parties any other engineer or body of engineers.

I would think, therefore, upon the special circumstances of this case, that it probably was not the fact that the prices now claimed were according to contract, though in this I may be in error, and if Mr. Schreiber can certify that the prices are according to contract, that would seem to me to be an end of the matter, so far as this feature of the case is concerned; but if he is not able, or not willing to give such certificate, it is, in my opinion, requisite, under this section of the statute, that you should be certified that the prices are fair and just before you can authorize the payment requested.

I return herewith the file of papers you left with me.

Sir,-I have the honour, by direction, to ask that your opinion may be given in the matter following:-

On May 7, 1896, a contract was entered into with Messrs. Corry \& Laverdure for the construction of Section 2, Peterborough-Lakefield Division of the Trent Canal. The work comprised the construction, in cement, of a hydraulic lift lock, -the first of its kind in Canada, and a class of work but little known elsewhere.

The contract contained the usual conditions with respect to extra work, and placed in the hands of the Chief Engineer the fixing of prices therefor.

Questions arose as to the prices to be paid for certain items of such work, and ultimately, in order to a settlement without recourse to expensive litigation, a special agreement was, with the concurrence of the Minister, made between the Chief Engineer and the contractors, under which expert outside opinion from three engineers, two appointed by the department and one by the contractors, was obtained as to the prices that should be allowed; the Chief Engineer agreed to acceept their valuation, undertaking that his certificate should be governed by the decision so reached, the contractors, on their part, binding themselves to accept the same in full satisfaction of all claims in respect of items covered by the report. It was expressly provided in this agreement that items covered by specific prices in any written contract between the parties should not be dealt with by the said engineers.

The engineers made examination on the spot and furnished their report, and on November 25, 1902, the Chief Engineer gave a progress estimate, No. 73, based thereon.

This estimate bore the following certificates:-
'I hereby certify to the correctness of the aforegoing estimate, in accordance with the report of the expert engineers hereunder mentioned.

## 'Rich'd B. Rogers, Superintending Engineer.

' I hereby certify to the correctness of the aforegoing estimate, in accordance with the report of the expert engineers mentioned.
G. A. Mothersill.
' In certifying the aforegoing estimate to be correct, I do so as regards all the items on page 8 , except item (B), in view of the report of the three expert engineers, made upon their personal examination of the work and the hearing of evidence with respect thereto.

' Collingwood Schreiber, Chief Engineer.'

The Auditor General has declined to authorize payment of this estimate.
On December 17, 1902, he acknowledged the receipt of the estimate, and asked for a copy of the report of the expert engineers. This was furnished him, together with a copy of the agreement above mentioned.

On December 31, 1902, he wrote in general terms, criticising the qualifications of the three engineers, and raising a question of the powers of the Chief Engineer to so utilize their services.

On January 12 he wrote, drawing attention to section 33 of the Audit Act, and particularly to its requirement of a certificate that the price charged is according to contract, or, if not covered by a contract, is fair and just. He states: 'This scems to make it impossible for me to pass these applications in their present shape, your certificate being that "the prices are as reported on by the valuator." (His quotation is somewhat inaccurate.)

Section 33 of the Audit Act reads as follows :-
' No payment shall be authorized by the Auditor General in respect of work performed, or materials supplied, by any person in connection with any part of the public service of Canada, unless, in addition to any other voucher or certificate which is required in that behalf, the officer under whose special charge such part of the public service is, certifies that such work has been performed, or such materials supplied, as the case may be, and that the price charged is according to contract, or, if not covered by a contract, is fair and just.'

The view taken by the department in the matter is as follows:-
(1.) The Chief Engineer had a perfect right to obtain an outside valuation of this work, and also to agree that, so far as he is concerned, it would be adopted.
(2.) The usual form of the Chief Engineeer's certificate on estimates-one which has proved satisfactory to the Auditor General-reads as follows :-'Total amount certified on this contract, $\$ \ldots . . .$. . Chief Engineer.' In the present case, the Chief Engineer has gone further: he not only certifies the estimate to be correct, but explains as to certain items the reason of his certificate, which he was under no obligation to do.
(3.) Turning to the certificate desired by the Auditor General, a certificate that prices are 'fair and just' would be out of place, as such is stated to apply to cases not covered by 'a contract.' There remains, therefore, only his other alternative, namely, a certificate that the price is according to contract.

The expression used in section 33 of the Audit Act is not 'specified in the contract,' which would indeed be inadequate, because of these very questions of extra work for which special prices have to be fixed, and which prices are-and have been in the present instance-fixed in accordance with the special provisions of the contract, in other words, 'according to contract.'
(4.) Section 33 of the Audit Act cannot be regarded as laying down any precise form of words for the certificate, and, as above shown, neither the department nor the Auditor General has so treated it in the past.
(5.) The Chief Enginecr, in his present certificate, has complied, and more than complied with the requirements of the Act.

In submitting for your consideration the above views, I inclose all the papers in the case, including memoranda from the law clerk of the department, the contract, the agreement, the report of the engineers, and the evidence taken by them; including also an advisory letter from Mr. Aylesworth, K.C., addressed to the Auditor General
on the 9 th instant, in which he enters very fully into the several points involved. I am to express the hope that you will favour the department at as early a date as your convenience will admit of, with your opinion in the matter.

## Department of Justice, Ottawa, April 14, 1903.

Sir,-I have the honour to acknowledge receipt of your letter of March 24 last127995 -in which you seek the advice of this department upon a question which has arisen in connection with the contract of Messrs. Corry \& Laverdure for the construction of Section 2, Peterborough-Lakefield Division of the Trent Canal.

The facts, as stated by you, are as follows:-
The work on this section comprises the construction in cement of a hydraulic lift lock, the first of its kind in Canada, and a class of work but little known elsewhere. The contract contains the usual conditions with respect to extra work, and placed in the hands of the Chief Engineer the fixing of prices therefor. Questions having arisen as to the prices to be paid for certain items of such work, a special agreement was, with the concurrence of the Minister of Railways and Canals, made between the Chief Engineer and the contractors, under which a report of three outside engineers, two appointed by the department and one by the contractors, was obtained as to the prices which should be allowed, the Chief Engineer agreeing to accept their valuation, and to certify in accordance therewith, and the contractors binding themselves to accept the same in full satisfaction of all claims in respect of items covered by the agreement. It was provided by the agreement that items covered by specific prices in any writtetn contract between the parties should not be inquired into by the engineers, nor should any prices or allowances be made in respect thereof.

The engineers made examination on the spot, and furnished their report, and, on November 25, 1902, the Chief Engineer gave a progress estimate based thereon, wílich estimate bore the following certificates:-
' I hereby certify to the correctness of the foregoing estimate, in accordance with the report of the expert engineers hereunder mentioned.

## Rich'd B. Rogers, Superintending Engineer:'

A certificate to the same effect signed by G. A. Mothersill, and a certificate by the Chief Engineer, in the following terms:-
'In certifying the aforegoing estimate to be correct, I do so as regards all the items on page 8 , except item (B), in view of the report of the three expert engineers, made upon their personal examination of the work, and the hearing of evidence with respect thereto.

> 'Collingwood Schreiber, Chief Engineer.'

The Auditor General has declined to authorize payment of this estimate on the ground that section 33 of the Audit Act has not been complied with, inasmuch as, in his opinion, there is no certificate, such as is required by that section, that the price is according to contract, or, if not covered by contract, is fair and just.

You state the views taken by your department in the matter as follows:-
(1.) The Chief Engineer had a perfect right to obtain an outside valuation of this work, and also to agree that, so far as he is concerned, it would be adopted.
(2.) The usual form of the Chief Engineer's certificate on estimates, one which has heretofore proved satisfactory to the Auditor, reads as follows:- 'Total amount certi-

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fied on this contract, \$....... , Chief Engineer.' In the present case, the Chief Engineer has gone further : he not only certifies the estimate to be correct, but explains, as to certain items, the reason of his certificate, which he was under no obligation to do.
(3.) Turning to the certificate desired by the Auditor General, a certificate that prices are fair and just would be out of place, as that certificate is stated to apply to cases not covered by a contract. There remains, therefore, only his other alternative, namely, a certificate that the price charged is according to contract, and (in effect, you say) these prices have been fixed according to contract.
(4.) Section 33 of the Audit Act cannot be regarded as laying down any precise form of words for the certificate, and, as above shown, neither the department nor the Auditor has so regarded it in the past.
(5.) The Chief Engineer, in his present certificate, has complied, and more than complied, with te requirements of the Act.

These views you submit for the consideration of this department.
In reply, I beg to state as follows:-
The Chief Engineer had certainly a right to obtain an outside valuation, but he had not, in my opinion, a right to bind himself to accept it, and certify in accordance with it. The parties to the contract have committed to him the fixing of the prices for extra work, and are entitled to have them fixed according to his own judgment. He had no right to delegate to others the exercise of the discretion entrusted to him, and his agreement to certify according to the reports of the experts was, if it is to be considered simply as an agreement of the Chief Engincer, in my opinion, such a delegation. I think, however, that the agreement signed by the Chief Engineer may have effect as a modification of the original contract between the parties. The agreement professes to be made by the Chief Engineer on behalf of the department, and with the sanction and approval of the Minister. It is signed on behalf of the government only by Mr. Schreiber, as Chief Engineer, and in that respect does not comply with the requirements of section 23 of the Act respecting the Department of Railways and Canals, R.S.C., chapter 37, which provides that no contract in writing shall be binding upon His Majesty unless signed by the Minister, or unless signed by the Deputy Minister and countersigned by the Secretary of the department, or unless signed by some person specially authorized by the Minister in writing for that purpose. I observe, however, that on the same day, namely, September 12, 1901, after the agreement between the Chief Engineer and the contractors had been executed, a supplementary agreement was signed by the Minister and the contractors, which recites the agreement made by the Chief Engineer, and adds certain terms which are expressly provided to be supplementary to it, and I think that the execution by the Minister himself of this supplementary agreement necessarily confirms the agreement of the Chief Engineer, and, in fact, amounts to an execution of that agreement by the Minister, or a ratification of it, which would be sufficient to take the case out of the statute and modify the original contract to the extent shown by these two later agreements construed together. I am of opinion, therefore, that these several contracts must be read together, and that the effect is to bind the Crown by a contract to the prices fixed pursuant to the latter agreement by the engineers, to whose determination they were referred. It follows that it would be quite proper for the Chief Engineer to certify that these prices, as fixed by the engineer referees, are according to contract.

I see no reason to doubt that the Auditor General is entitled to insist upon a certificate as required by section 33 of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, and as the case here is that the price charged is according to contract, the certificate should be framed accordingly. Paners returned herewith.

Sir,-I have the honour, by direction, to return to you the papers in the above matter, as to which, by my letter of January 14 last, it was asked that a decision of the Honourable the Treasury Board might be obtained, in view of objection raised by the Auditor General.

These papers were got back from you in order that an opinion might be had from the Department of Justice on an advisory letter addressed to the Auditor General by Mr. A. B. Aylesworth, K.C., dated March 9, ultimo, a copy of which the Auditor General furnished you on the 11th, in which Mr. Aylesworth expressed the opinion, in reply to the question put before him by the Auditor, that the Audit Act prohibits payment unless the Chief Engineer certifies that the price is 'according to contract,' or, if not covered by contract, is 'fair and just.'

On an opinion from the Department of Justice, dated the 14th instant, that it would be 'quite proper for the Chief Engineer to certify that these prices, as fixed by the engineer referees, are according to contract,' and that the Auditor General is entitled to such certificate, which should be framed accordingly, the Chief Engineer has added the words 'according to contract' to his certificate.

The Auditor General, however, under date the 27 th instant, though furnished with such certificate and a copy of the opinion of the Department of Justice, has intimated his wish that the matter should be appealed to the Treasury Board.

## Re Corry \& Laverdure.

Sir,-Referring to your letter of March 11 last, I beg to return herewith Treasury Board file No. 30307, being papers in connection with the appeal of the Department of Railways and Canals from your decision in the above matter, with some additional correspondence which has taken place since your letter of above named date.

It would appear from the subsequent corespondence that the Chief Engineer of Railways and Canals had modified his certificate, and I shall be glad to be advised, for the information of the Treasury Board, whether you still adhere to your decision to refuse payment of the amount applied for by the Department of Railways and Canals. I shall be glad to know whether the modification in the certificate in any way, and to what extent, affects the objections you have made, and I shall also be glad to have any further remarks you may wish to make upon the subject, and to know whether your objections to the payment (if you still have objections) are, as stated in your letter of the 11th ultimo, taken under clauses ( $a$ ) and (c) of section 32, Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act.

I shall be obliged if you will kindly let me have your reply at your very earliest convenience.

Sir,-I have your letter of the 30th ultimo, inclosing the Corry \& Laverdure Treasury file 30307.

That the file should have been supplemented at all from the state in which it was when I last saw it is unusual. The additions are:

1st. A letter from the Department of Railways to the Department of Justice, asking for its opinion on the case as stated by the former.

2 nd . The opinion of the latter.
3rd. A correction of the position of the Department of Railways to comply with its reading of the opinion of the Department of Justice.

It seems to me advisable that the steps taken in working out this important matter should not be lost, and, therefore, that all errors in the case as presented, should be stated by the Treasury Board, and, therefore, all needed corrections indicated.

It is true that you will probably consider it advisable to send the case in the usual way to the Department of Justice for its opinion. It, however, has been already under examination of that department for the giving of the opinion above mentioned. Then, Mr. Aylesworth has furnished his exhaustive opinion.

Now, in my view, the Chief Engineer, in certifying that the prices are according to contract, should do so by a separate statement, unconnected with any other person's statement, instead of in connection with that of the expert engineers. Mr. Aylesworth thinks that the certificate should be that the prices are fair and just, because that part of the work was not under contract, while the Deputy Minister of Justice thinks that that part of the work was under contract, and, therefore, that the prices should be certified by the Chief Engineer as required by that state of things.

These two legal authorities thus differ, but they both manifestly support my view that, although Mr. Schreiber may consult any one for information, he cannot delegate his authority to any one. In this case he seems to desire to delegate it, even by his amended certificate, to the expert engineers.

Sir,-I have the honour to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 7th instant30307, Treasury Board-and inclosed file of papers relating to the contract of Messrs. Corry \& Laverdure for certain work on the Trent Canal, Peterborough-Lakefield Division, and to the appeal of the Department of Railways and Canals from the objections of the Auditor General to the payment to the contractors of the amount of progress estimate No. 73 under this contract.

In my letter to the Secretary of the Department of Railways and Canals, of the 14th ultimo, I have explained fully my views as to the legal points involved in this controversy, and I see no reason to modify the opinion expressed in that letter.

The Chief Engineer has now amended his certificate upon the said estimate, as quoted by me in the said letter, by inserting after the word 'correct' the words 'according to contract,' and I am of opinion that the certificate in its present form complies with the requirements of section 33 of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act; that the reference in the certificate to the report of the expert engineers does not invalidate it, and that the Auditor's present objection is not well taken.

I am, therefore, of opinion that there is parliamentary authority in the Appropriation Act for the payment of the amount of this estimate, if the amount at the credit of the vote for work is sufficient to pay it.

The Minister of Justice and Attorney General concurs in this view. Papers returned herewith.

## Finance Department, Ottawa, May 14, 1903.

The undersigned Deputy Minister of Finance has the honour to report that as Secretary of the Treasury Board he received from the Secretary of the Department of Railways and Canals a letter, under date of January 14, 1903, setting forth that objections had been raised by the Auditor General to the payment of a certain amount applied for by that department as due to Messrs. Corry \& Laverdure, contractors for work on the Trent Canal, Section 2, Peterborough-Lakefield Division, and requesting that a ruling of the Treasury Board be obtained as to whether the objections of the Auditor General should be sustained or over-ruled.

From subsequent correspondence with the Auditor General it appears that his objections to the payment in question are taken under subsections (a) and (c) of section 32 of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, and this report is submitted in accordance with the provisions of said subsection (c) of section 32.

In the letter of the Secretary of the Department of Railways and Canals, above referred to, the facts of the case are stated to be as follows :-
'The contract for the works in question was dated May 7, 1896, and comprised, amongst other works, the construction of a hydraulic lock, the material of which was to be concrete.
' In the course of construction, certain items of work were executed, some of which were recognized by the departmental engineers as extra work, and prices were fixed for them. Objection was, however, raised by the contractors to the acceptance of the prices proposed, and considerable discussion and difference of opinion ensued; very large claims being preferred by the contractors. In order to the satisfactory and equitable settlement of the difference, without appeal to the Exchequer Court, it finally appeared desirable to call for independent expert opinion. Accordingly, on September 12, 1901, an agreement was, with the sanction and approval of the Minister

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of the department, made by the Chief Engineer with the contractors, whereby three independent engineers were appointed, namely, Mr. Joseph Hobson and Mr. Robert Surtees by the department, and Mr. George P. Brophy by the contractors, to examine the works, hear statements, and make inquiries, and to ascertain and report what should be the reasonable prices, allowances and deductions in respect of the claims for extra work put forward by the contractors. The said agreement stipulated, however, that items covered by specific prices in any written contract between the parties should not be inquired into, nor should allowances be made therefor; the valuation and report so resulting was to be accepted as binding on the Chief Engineer in making his certificate, and as binding on the contractors, on payment in accordance therewith, as in full satisfaction of all claims in respect of items covered by such report.
'The claims presented by the contractors, on September 19, 1901, amounted to $\$ 420,837.37$.
' The engineers so appointed made full examination of the work, and took a large amount of evidence; finally making a report, dated January 18, 1902, dealing with the several items of the contractors' claim, as in the terms of the said agreement, and attaching to each item the allowance or deduction which seemed proper. They added, under date of February 6, 1902, a supplemental statement setting out, in schedule form, their conclusions, showing the several items dealt with by them, the prices allowed, the totals due under those prices, and the totals of balances found by them to be due the contractors, after deduction of amounts covered by progress estimate. The aggregate of these totals they set down as $\$ 122,829.50$. As to this, however, the Chief Engineer of the department has noted that in respect of one item, namely, item No. 7, 'entrance piers to lift-locks,' for which they have allowed the bulk sum of $\$ 8,693$, they have omitted to make deduction of the sum of $\$ 5,963.06$ which has been already paid, and their total should, consequently, be reduced by that amount, making it $\$ 116,-$ 865.54.

On November 22 last the Chief Engineer of the department sent in a progress estimate, No. 73, based on the said valuations and report of the expert engineers, such estimate covering work done up to October 31, 1902. The gross amount of such estimate being $\$ 587,355.04$, and his previous estimate, No. 72, having been $\$ 466,369$, the gross amount to which the contractors would be entitled under his estimate, No. 73 , is $\$ 120,986.04$, less the usual 10 per cent drawback.
' On this estimate the usual application to the Auditor General was made for the issue of a cheque in payment. The amount, however, asked for in this application was limited to $\$ 56,000$ (in place of the full amount shown by the engineer's certificate to be due), the appropriation available being insufficient to cover the full amount. This application the Auditor General has declined to pass.'

The application for the payment of the $\$ 56,000$ referred to in the above quoted letter was dated December 16, 1902, and the certificate of the Chief Engineer of Railways and Canals on the estimate accompanying the application reads as follows:-
' In certifying the foregoing estimate to be correct, I do so as regards all the items on page 8 , except item (B), in view of the report of three expert engineers, made upon their personal examination of the works and the hearing of evidence in respect thereto.'

Mr. R. B. Rogers, the superintending engineer, and Mr. G. A. Mothersill, the check clerk in the Department of Railways and Canals, also certified to the correctness of the estimate 'in accordance with the report of the expert engineers.'

The correspondence having been referred to the Auditor General, the views of that official are set forth in his letters of January 27 and March 11, copies of which, and of the opinion of Mr. Aylesworth, K.C., referred to in the leetter last referred to, are annexed, and the attention of the Board is specially called thereto.

On the receipt of the last mentioned letter from the Auditor General, the papers were returned to the Deputy Minister of Railways and Canals for such remarks as he might wish to make in the matter, and the question was by him referred to the De-

partment of Justice, and in consequence of a letter from the Deputy Minister of that department, under date of April 14, 1903 (copy annexed), the Deputy Minister of Railways and Canals amended his certificate on the estimate above referred to to read as follows (the words underlined being added) :-
'In certifying the aforegoing estimate to be correct according to contract, I do so as regards all the items on page 8, except item (B), in view of the report of the three expert engineers, made upon their personal examination of the works and the hearing of evidence with respect thereto.'

The correspondence having again been referred to the Auditor General, and that official having stated that he had the same objections as before, and under the same subsections (see his letters of May 4 and 6,1903, copies annexed), the correspondence was referred by the undersigned, as Secretary of the Treasury Board, to the Department of Justice for the opinion, under clause (a) of section 32 of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, of the Minister of Justice and Attorney General of Canada, as to whether there was parliamentary authority for the payment, and the Deputy Minister of Justice, in a letter to the undersigned, under date of May 81903 (copy annexed), states that he is of opinion that there is parliamentary authority in the Appropriation Act for the payment of the amount of the estimate in question, if the amount at the credit of the vote for the work is sufficient to pay it, in which view he states that the Minister of Justice and Attorney General concurs.

Treasury Board Minute, June 18, 1903.-The Board had under consideration the correspondence in connection with an appeal from objections raised by the Auditor General to the payment of the sum of $\$ 56,000$, applied for by the Department of Railways and Canals as due to Messrs. Corry \& Laverdure, contractors for work on the Trent Canal, Section 2, Peterborough-Lakefield Division, the same being part of a larger amount due, the appropriation being insufficient to cover the full amount.

The objections of the Auditor General having been taken under subsections (a) and (c) of section 32 of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, the Board had under consideration a report from the Deputy Minister of Finance, under date of May 14, 1903, presented in accordance with subsection (c) of said section 32, and the documents referred to in such report, and they had also under consideration a letter from the Deputy Minister of Justice, under date of May 8, 1903, in which he states that he is of opinion that there is parliamentary authority in the Appropriation Act for the amount of the estimate in question, if the amount at the credit of the vote is sufficient to pay it, in which view he states that the Minister of Justice and Attorney General concurs.

The Board are of opinion that the objections of the Auditor General are not well taken, and should be over-ruled, and they direct that payment be made of the amount applied for.

# Post Office Dept. : Appointments to Third-class Clerkships under Sec. 20, C. S. Act Amendment, 1903.

Would you kindly furnish this department with the interpretation asked for in Mr. McDougall's letter?

I may say that no person from this department was appointed a third-class clerk who had not been appointed by Order in Council and passed some examination, cither preliminary or qualifying, or that demanded under the grade system instituted by the Postmaster General in an Act of about a year ago.

I would also be pleased if you would kindly express your opinion as to whether a person employed at a given rate per day, say from $\$ 1$ to $\$ 1.50$, who has not passed the Civil Service examination, and whose engagement with the department was not made under Order in Council, can be regarded as an employee who is entitled to third-
class clerkship under the provisions of the above-mentioned section. I may say that this department has not included any of that class in its recommendation.

Sir,-I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 30th ultimo, in which you ask my advice upon certain questions arising under section 20 of the Act of last session in amendment of the Civil Service Act.

With regard to the effect of the proviso in so far as it purports to dispense with the qualifications depending upon age and the passing of the qualifying examination, I can best answer your questions by inclosing a copy of a letter dealing with the same points which I sent to the Deputy Minister of Inland Revenue of 29th ultimo.

As to your last question, it is my opinion that some part of the two years' continuous service which must have been put in in order to satisfy the requirements of the proviso to section 20 must have been in the capacity of writer, clerk, packer, sorter or messenger, temporary or otherwise, in one of the departments at Ottawa, within the meaning of those terms as they are used in the Civil Service Act. I would suppose that the employment which you describe cannot be held to have been in any such capacity.

Sir,-I have the honour to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 23 rd instant with respect to the objection raised by the Auditor General to certain appointments to third-class clerkships in your department under section 20 of the Act of last session in amendment of the Civil Service Act.

In reply I beg to state that, as I understand the questions raised by these objections, I think they may be disposed of by the application to each case of the following propositions :-

1. Any one otherwise qualified for appointment to the third-class under the proviso to section 20 is not disqualified by his age whatever it may be. This is clearly the meaning and effect of the words, 'without regard to his age.'
2. Any one otherwise qualified for such appointment is not disqualified by reason of his not having passed the qualifying examination. That is expressly and explicitly provided, and that is the whole effect of the provision so far as examinations are concerned. The qualifying examination being dispensed with, it is not necessary that the person to be appointed should have passed any examination at all, for the passing of the preliminary examination was never, and is not under the new Act, required as a condition of appointment to the third-class, and a packer, sorter and messenger, if he otherwise fulfills the conditions prescribed, may be appointed, although he has never passed either the qualifying or preliminary examination.

Sir,-I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter inclosing the opinion of the Department of Justice with reference to the legal restrictions of the proviso in section 20 of the Civil Service Act of last session.

By section 15 of that Act it is provided that under ordinary circumstances a third-class clerk is required to have come up to the standard secured by the ability to pass the qualifying examination, and therefore needs for his governmental duties such qualifications.

By the opinion of the Department of Justice, inclosed in your letter, it would appear that, under the proviso of section 20 , he may attain the same position without knowing his letters. He may also be similarly employed while he is either too young or too old to walk.

It is quite manifest that the entire removal of educational and age restrictions in an Act which revives them so clearly for the same class of service is the result of an accidental ommission in the 20th section, which will probably be dealt with next session.

In the meantime, I do not feel justificd in accepting any action on the section until I am provided with some authoritative statement of the Government as to its intentions in applying the limitations to the proviso of the 20th section.

If you consider that the amendment to the Civil Service Act of last session provides for their payment, will you state what section and part of section apply? I suppose you rely on section 28 , which to me does not seem to make provision for supplementing a contingency appropriation by an amount from Consolidated Fund.

This objection does not apply to those permanent packers and messengers who have been appointed third-class clerks.

To the Honourable the Treasury Board.
The undersigned has the honour to state, for the information of the Honourable the Treasury Board, that a communication, dated December 24 last, was received from the Auditor General, stating that he had amended the pay-sheet for December by striking out the names of the third-class clerks recently appointed under the amendment to the Civil Service Act, 1903, whose age exceeded 35 years, and also those who had not passed the qualifying examination, and that he would like to see the interpretation of the proviso contained in section 20 of the amendment in question.

The matter was submitted to the Department of Justice, and it was pointed out that no person from this department had been appointed a third-class clerk who had not previously been appointed by Order in Council and who had not passed some examination, either preliminary or qualifying, or that required under the amendment to the Post Office Act of 1902. A reply was received to the effect that the employees in question had been legally appointed as permanent third-class clerks. A copy of the letter from the Department of.Justice was submitted to the Auditor General, and inquiry was made as to when the clerks in question could be paid.

On the 14th instant a letter was received from the Auditor General, stating that inasmuch as there were only ten vacant clerkships in the department, he did not con-
sider that more than ten third-class clerks could be appointed, and that section 28 does not seem to make provision for supplementing a contingency appropriation by an amount from Consolidated Fund.

The January pay-list was amended by the Auditor General by removing the names of all the temporary persons who had recently been appointed third-class clerks, notwithstanding the fact that he had allowed a number of these clerks to be paid for December. In a letter dated 15 th instant, the Auditor General stated that after further consideration he did not think the department was entitled to appoint these clerks under section 28 of the amendment of last session, as to appoint a third-class elerk under that section would practically mean that the department could make a clerk permanent without an appropriation for a permanent elerk having been made by Parliament, and if this could be done then every person employed as a temporary clerk in the service could be made a permanent clerk without Parliament sanctioning it directly.

The undersigned, by direction of the Postmaster General, would, therefore, respectfully submit for the decision of the Honourable the Treasury Board, the question as to whether the third-class clerks in question, who were appointed by the Orders in Council of December 12 and 31, have been legally appointed third-class clerks, and, if so, whether under section 28 the salaries of such third-class clerks cannot be paid out of money voted by Parliament for the year ending June 30, 1904, and applicable for the payment of salaries or the increase to the salaries of any persons in the public service.

Copies of the correspondence and of the Orders in Council are inclosed herewith.

## Audit Office, Ottawa, February 9, 1904.

Sir,-I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 20 th ultimo, which accompanied a communication from the Deputy Postmaster General addressed to you, which, besides setting forth correspondence between the Department of Justice and himself, and this office and himself, requests the Treasury Board to determine whether the employees who were the subject of the Order in Council to which he refers, were eligible to become, under the Order in Council, third-class clerks.

I have had this appeal in my hands for more than two weeks, although I felt that it must be a matter of serious inconvenience, particularly at this season of the year, to persons of comparatively small pay to be out of it. We have now arrived at a perfectly safe way of paying them, at their old rate, I hope.

I could not see my proper course clear before me. I was in hopes of developing some less unpleasant means of performing my duty than requiring the Treasury Board to take the responsibility of answering for the making permanent any of the classes dealt with in this Order in Council. I am now no nearer a solution than I was at the beginning.

It is maintained that legal interpretation of the words of the two sections involved -the 20th and 28th of the Civil Service Aet of the last session-is quite clear, that by these two sections anyone who has been a labourer for two years in this service, if he has spent a day as a messenger, may be appointed a permanent third-class clerk, a position to which the government itself says that, under ordinary circumstances, it is necessary in the interest of an efficient service that an examination should be passed, not a preliminary examination, but the higher, the much more important one-the qualifying, and Parliament has endorsed that statement.

Then there is no limit under this section as to age. Why?

There is an apparent argument in this that, as all which is paid to the civil servant when he is retired is the money paid by him to the State with the interest on it,-he gets nothing but his own. It is forgotten, however, that the great reason urged for a superannuation system was that it enabled the Government to free itself of men when their services ceased to be valuable. In the same way, under our retirement system, its weak spot, if it should prove to have any, will be in its being found that men will be brought under it when they are so advanced in life as to cease to have the power to earn their salaries before they have sufficient at their credit to provide them with a livelihood for the end of their years. Then there is the natural tendency to retain the fellow employee as long as possible, so as to save him from the necessity of facing a cold world with insufficient means to save him from want-this, of course, at the loss of the State.

Therefore, without this 20th section, the admitting to the permanent service of a person who was over age was as great an irregularity as admitting one who had nnt the knowledge qualification.

Then, with reference to the 28th section, the admitting a man to the permanent service without refcrence to Parliament removed the whole control of the legislature. Now, one may tell me that if the law officers say that the ordinary legal interpretation of the words of the two sections make it possible to justify the admission of the absolutely most unpromising men in the land, I have nothing to say. These men, to whom I object, may be the best labourers or even the best carpenters in the country, and, as such, worthy of every respect; but in this connection, in view of the test which is provided for us, they are absolutely out of court, except for what the 20th and 28th sections may do for them.

Now, although it is contended by lawyers that the interpretation of a statute cannot be changed from the meaning of its words by what may have happened to show a different intention in the debate on it, there surely must be something more weighty on the shoulders of those who wish to draw from certain words in two sections something with reference to certain persons which is directly opposer to other provisions of a general character which exist in several other Acts-in fact, which form the general policy of the country and which are expressly repeated in this same Act,

The wisdom of having a reasonable literary qualification for everyone whose business is deciphering writing, framing replies and performing other duties as à result, is not only plain on the face of it, but is endorsed by the experience of everyone whom I have heard discuss the matter, and who has been responsible for the oversight of the clerical work of civil servarts.

It is manifest that if the members of the Treasury Board, they being all members of the Goverment, have come to the conclusion that the 20th and 28th sections, or any other section, are unwise legislation, the Government will not use the legislation which seems unwise. The Government may cancel its Order in Council, or any part of it.

The Government, having used any permissive legislation, must take the responsibility of saying that at the time the law was used it was supposed to have been in the public interest.

As is shown by my argument, I consider that there is not parliamentary authority for the proposed payments. My objection on this ground comes under subsection (a) of section 32, Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act. Under subsection (c) I also object on the ground that the appointments are not in the interest of economical government.

I think it well to quote from the report of the select committee appointed last year by the Imperial Parliament to inquire whether any plan could be advantageously adopted for enabling the House more effectively to make an examination, not involving criticism of policy, inio the details of national expenditure. The paragraph to which I refer is No. (2) under the head of 'Extra-Departmental Control,' and reads as follows:-

## (2) The Action of the Comptroller and Auditor General.

'Under the Exchequer and Audit Act of 1866 this officer (who is completely independent of all departments, including the Treasury, and whose tenure of office is similar to that of a judge), was appointed not only to see that no money was issued without authority, but also to examine on behalf of the House of Commons the accounts of the expenditure of the grants in Supply and to report to Parliament.
'The Comptroller and Auditor General, in examination-before us, stated that he conceived his functions to go beyond mere audit, and that, encouraged by the Public Accounts Committee, he entered also into the merits of expenditure. In answer to question No. 756, he said:-
'I should say that my duty is to examine the accounts of the expenditure of the grants in Supply on behalf of the House of Commons-that is to say, I am a Parliamentary officer whose duty it is not only to certify to the correctness of accounts as rendered, but, further, I am directed by the Act to report to Parliament. As regards reporting, I conceive I have something of a free hand. There are some points which I am obviously to report, such as any excess over a grant of Parliament, any clear irregularity, and so forth; but I have also a duty to report on the accounts; and availing myself of that opportunity, I think it my duty to report anything which, in my judgment, falling within my proper functions, it concerns the House of Commons to know. In the first instance, my object is to report in such a way as to assist the House of Commons in making its way through what may be a very bulky volume of accounts; but beyond that I do not feel myself debarred from calling attention to anything which has occurred in the course of my audit during the year which indicates loss or waste, or anything of that kind which I think it is well that Parliament should know. Of course, in doing so I have to act with great care and discretion. It is not for me to criticise administrative action as such; the departments are responsible for their own action as regards general administration; but if I find the result of administrative action has been a loss, or a wastefulness of, in the public money, then I think it is not going beyond my duty of reporting as an officer of the House of Commons if I call specific attention to matters of that kind, even though the account itself would not disclose the facts.'
'Your committee consider that this retrospective examination both by the Comptroller and Auditor General and by the Public Accounts Committee has been well done, and they recommend the Public Accounts Committee, even more than in the past, to encourage the Comptroller and Auditor General to scrutinize and criticise improper or wasteful expenditure, and to indicate where censure is in his opinion required.'

It seems clear that if at the reporting stage I am expected to have the duties here set forth, I must a fortiori have the duty of following a similar line when the action might have the effect of preventing the wrong.

The undersigned has the honour to report that as Secretary of the Treasury Board he received a letter under date of January 18, 1904, from the Deputy Postmaster General, submitting, by direction of the Postmaster General, for the decision of the Treasury Board, the question as to whether certain third-class clerks who were appointed by Orders in Council of December 12 and 31, 1903, had been legally
appointed to such clerkships, and if so, whether under section 28 of the Act of last session amending the Civil Service Act, the salaries of such third-class clerks cannot be paid out of money roted by Parliament for the year ending June 30, 1904, and applicable for the salaries of any persons in the public service.

It appears from the letter of the Deputy Postmaster General that the Auditor General amended the pay-sheet for December by striking out the names of the thirdclass clerks appointed under authority of the Orders in Council above referred to, whose age exceeded 35 years, and also those who had not passed the qualifying examination.

The Deputy Postmaster General further states that the matter was submitted to the Department of Justice, and it was pointed out that no person from the Post Office Department had been appointed a third-class slerk who had not previously been appointed by Order in Council, and who had not passed some examination, either preliminary or qualifying, or that required under the amendement to the Post Office Act of 1902, and a reply was received to the effect that the employees in question had been legally appointed as permanent third-class clerks, a copy of which letter was submitted to the Auditor General.

The Deputy Postmaster General further states that on January 14, 1904, a letter was received from the Auditor General stating that inasmuch as there were only ten vacant clerkships in the department he did not consider that more than ten third-class clerks could be appointed, and that section 28 does not seem to make provision for supplementing a contingency appropriation by an amount from Consolidated Fund.

It further appears from the letter of the Deputy Postmaster General that the January pay-list was amended by the Auditor General by removing the names of all the temporary persons who had recently been appointed third-class clerks, notwithstanding the fact that he had allowed a number of these clerks to be paid for December. In a letter dated January 15, 1904, the Auditor General stated that after further consideration he did not think the department was entitled to appoint these clerks under section 28 of the amendment of last session, as to appoint a third-class clerk under that section would practically mean that the department could make a clerk permancut without an arfropriation for a fermanent clerk having been ma ${ }^{1}$ by Parliament, and if this comld be done, then every person employed as a tempora:J clerk in the service could be made a permanent clerk without Parliament sanctioning it directly.

The matter having been submitted to the Auditor General, that official, under date of 9th instant, states that he considers that there is not parliamentary authority for the proposed payments, and that his objection on this ground comes under subsection (a) of section 32, Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act. He further states that under subsection (c) he also objects, on the ground that the appointments are not in the interest of economical government.

This report is accordingly submitted under the provisions of said subsection (c).
The objections of the Auditor General are set forth in his letter of February 9, 1904, and a copy of that letter and of a letter from the undersigned, dated 10th instant, are hereto attached.

## Department of Justice, Ottawa, February 12, 1904.

Sir,-I have the honour to acknowledge your letter of the 10th instant-32217and of the accompanying file of papers relative to the appeal by the Post Office Department from the objections of the Auditor General in connection with the appointment of certain third-class clerks in that department, and his consequent refusal to certify for the issue of cheques in payment of the salaries of these clerks.

The Auditor's objections are made under paragraph (a), as well as under paragraph (c), of section 32 of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, he holding that there is no parliamentary authority within the meaning of the former paragraph for the issue of these salary cheques, and you ask for the opinion of the Attorney General of Canada as to whether or not there is such authority.

I understand that the appointments in question depend for their validity upon the provisions of the Act of last session (chapter 9) in amendment to the Civil Service Act, either because the appointment being made under the proviso of section 20 of the Act, the appointees have not passed the qualifying examination, or are of an age exceeding that limited by the Civil Service Act, and therefore but for that proviso could not lawfully be appointed, or because they have been appointed at the salary they were receiving, which is in excess of the minimum salary of the third-class, which would have been unlawful but for the provisions of section 20 of the Act, or because recourse must be had to section 28 in order to find parliamentary authority for the payment of their salaries.

The argument of the Auditor General is directed mainly against the policy of the Act if it does authorize such appointments, and with that feature of the case I am not called upon to deal. But he also contends, as I understand his position, that properly construed, the sections invoked in support of the appointments, do not give the requisite authority for them.

So far as the failure of the appointees to fulfil the requirements as to examination and age are concerned, he says in effect that the dispensation with these requirements, which the proviso to section 20 seems to contemplate, is directly opposed to other provisions of a general character which exist in several other Acts, and which, in fact, form the general policy of the country and are expressly repeated in this Act. This is true in a sense. The provision for such appointments, notwithstanding lack of the qualifications generally required, is opposed to, or rather an exception from, the geneal rule and policy of existing civil service legislation, but this is not the only exception of the same sort, and if Parliament has clearly provided for the exception, as in my opinion it has in this proviso, the fact that the provision is exceptional, or that it is impolitic or unwise, as the Auditor General thinks it is, is immaterial in considering its legal effect.

So as to section 28, the Auditor's objection is that the employees in question were up to the date of their appointment temporary only and paid out of the vote for Contingencies, and he urges that the admitting of a man to the permanent service without reference to Parliament removes the whole control from the legislature, and that the section should not be construed as authorizing such action.

In my opinion, however, Parliament has precisely and clearly provided in this section for such cases as that in question. Applying its terms to these employees, it will be seen that there are sums of money voted by Parliament for the financial year ending June 30, 1904 (the Contingencies vote), applicable to the payment of the salaries of these persons, who were and are in the public service within the meaning of the section, in their previous capacities as temporary employees, and such being the case, and they having under the provisions of the Act been transferred to other positions in the public service, these moneys are, by virtue of section 28, applicable in or towards payment of their salaries as so transferred, and for the present financial year, if there were no such moneys, or not sufficient of them, the Consolidated Revenue Fund might be resorted to for such payment.

I am therefore of opinion that sections 20 and 28 of the Act referred to afford parliamentary authority for the appointment and payment of the salaries of the thirdclass clerks in question, and I am to state that the Attorney General of Canada concurs in this view.

## Extract from the Minutes of a Meeting of the Honourable the Treasury Board, held at Ottawa on the 16th day of February, 1904.

Treasury Board Minute, February 16, 1904.-The board had under consideration the correspondence in connection with the appeal by the Post Office Department from objections raised by the Auditor General resarding the appointment and payment of certain third-class clerks in that department.

The objections of the Auditor General having been taken under subsections (a) and (c) of section 32 of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, the board had under consideration a report from the Deputy Minister of Finance under date February 10, 1904, presented in accordance with subsection (c) of said section 32, and the documents referred to in such report. The board had also under consideration a letter from the Deputy Minister of Justice, dated February 12, 1904, in which he states that he is of opinion that sections 20 and 28 of the Act of last session (chapter 9), in amendment to the Civil Service Act, afford parliamentary authority for the appointment and the payment of the salaries of the third-class clerks in question, in which view he states that the Attorney General of Canada concurs.

The board are of opinion that the objections of the Auditor General are not well taken and should be overruled, and they direct that payment be made of the salaries of the third-class clerks in question.

## Experimental Farms-Proposed Temperary Use of Maintenance Vote not Legal.

## Dept. of Agriculture, Central Experimental Farar, Ottawa, Dec. 19, 1902.

Dear $\operatorname{Sir}$,-Ir reference to the matter brought under your notice when I last called on you, I beg to submit the following:-

Early in the fiscal year I was informed by the Hon. Minister of Agricultu:e that, owing to the urgent need of a bacteriological laboratory for the veterinary branch of his department, it would be necessary to draw temporarily from the vote of the expe.imental farms in the department of Public Works to assist in the construction of this building. It was understood at the time that the sum to be so used would be aboat $\$ 2,000$. Recently I learned that the amount which had been actually drawn for this purpose was $\$ 4,920.52$, which, with the sums already expended for buildings, repairs, \&c., on the several experimental farms, had quite exhausted our vote, leaving us 110 means of paying from this vote obligations which have been incurred.

As there seems no way now by which the sum expended on the bacteriological laboratory can be returned to our vote in the department of Public Works until.supplementary estimates are passed, I have surgested to the Minister that we advance the sums necessary for obligations incurred and accruing from the vote for the Maintenance of the experimental farms, such sums to be covered by the subsequent return to the experimental farm maintenance vote, from supplementary estimates, of the amount taken from that vote. This suggestion has the Minister's approval, and I write now to ascertain whether this plan would be approved by you, and if not, if you could suggest the adoption of any other course.

I may add that the obligations already incurred amount approximately to $\$ 1,000$, and that the total likely to be required before a supplementary vote would be available would probably amount to between $\$ 2,000$ and $\$ 3,000$.

Sir,-Will you excuse my not answering carlicr your letter of the 19 th ultimo with reference to the shortage in the vote of the experimental farms in the Department of Public Works, owing to your unexpected expenditure for a bacteriological laboratory. I have been fully occupied with. work, in addition to the usual claims upon my attention, in getting out our annual report.

I would have suggested that you might have drawn something from the vote for unforeseen expenses, but I know that the vote has been fully used. No part of the expenditure which you are now desirous of making can at all come under the heads which would justify the issue of a Governor General's warrant. I am afraid that all that can be done will be to either put off the work until the session, or to put off the payment until after the beginning of the session, the work bsing performed in the meantime.

## $R e$ Cattle Inspection.

Audit Office, Ottawa, October 19, 1903.
Sir,-I wrote you September 4 that fees for cattle inspection had come to acecunt from Winnipeg and other places for which no returns have been received.

I have to-day received the reports of inspections made by Chas. Little, V.S., at Winnipeg, during five months ending June 30, 1903, but without any accompanying summary or letter.

A considerable proportion of the inspections made were for settlers, for which no fees were exacted. Is this in accordance with the statute?

The return for February calls for $\$ 109.25$ for inspections made for dealers, but I do not find that any deposit has come to account.

Were there no inspections made at Winnipeg between July and February?

Sir,-In reply to your letter of the 19th inst., re cattle inspections, the accountant submits the following explanations: On the 17th inst. he forwarded by mail a return
of inspection made by Charles Little, V.S., of Winnipeg, cove-.ing a period of five months ending June 30, 1903, but he neglected to send the usual letrer accompanying same.

With reference to the proportion of inspections of settlers' stock, the inspecting officers of this department made inspections without charging the settlers any fees whatever. This is in accordance with our regulations.

The return for February calls for $\$ 109.25$. A deposit was made on April 15, 1903, of the sum of of $\$ 427.25$, which included February and March fees.

Inspections were made at Winnipeg between July, 1902, and February, 1903, but Mr. Little, who was the inspecting officer, was paid $\$ 1,000$ a year and was permitted to retain the fees on all animals inspected with the exception of those of bona fide settlers, for which no fees were to be charged. On the 1st February last a new arrangement was made with Mr. Little and he is now paid $\$ 1,500$ a year and all collectable fees are to be forwarded to the department.

## Re Patent Fees and Trade Marks.

Audit Office, Ottawa, June 25, 1903.
$\mathrm{S}_{\mathrm{Ir}}$,-In accordance with the Treasury regulations a deposit should ke made every day if the receipts are over $\$ 25$.

On five days during May no deposit was made, while the receipts for each day were much more than $\$ 25$.

The deposits each day should be made after midday and should include all the funds on hand at time of deposit.

On six occasions during May the deposit made was short of the balance on hand at the close of the previous day.

The deposits made on June 1 ( $\$ 1,141.97$ ) covered receipts of May 29 and 30, and part of the 28th, the receipts having in this case also on each day bren more than $\$ 25$.

Sir, -I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 25 th ultimo in regard to the deposit of Patent and Copyright and Trade Marks' fees, and stating that in accordance with Treasury Board regulations a deposit should be made every day if the receipts have been more than $\$ 25$.

In reply to the second paragraph of your letter, in which you state that on five days during May no deposit was made although the receipts for each of those five days was much more than $\$ 25$, I have to say that three of these five days in quest:on were Saturdays. As the bank closes at noon on Saturday, it is impossible to make a dcposit after midday. In such a case the deposit is made upon the Monday following. In this connection I may add that the only other circumstance necessitating the ho.ding of cash by the department beyond the day upon which it has been received, is the fact of its receipt by the department at an hour too late to allow of its being denosited.

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Depositors of fees not infrequently make their deposits at the department as late as four o'clock, and fees frequently arrive too late by mail to allow of their being put through the regular course of delivery, checking and deposit upon the afternoon of their receipt, but all such cash is invariably deposited the following day.

In reply to the statement in the fourth paragraph of your letter, that on six occasions during May the deposit made was short of the balance on hand at the close of the previous day, I have to say this was owing to the fact that the department receives fees in the forms of foreign money orders and postal notes, and Canadian money orders and postal notes. The money orders and postal notes are made out in favour of the Commissioner of Patents, and they have to be endorsed with a stamp, as follows:
'For deposit to the credit of the Receiver General,

> (Signed) F. C. Chittick,
pro Commissioner of Patents, Canada,'
which is intended as a guarantee against any loss to the Government whatever. Frequently an advice note is not received by the postal authorities until some time after the departmen has rectived the money order, and on many occasions the department has had to carry foreign money orders for as long a period as two weeks, and єren longer, before being able to have them redeemed, owing to the advice notes having missed a steamer. The practice has been to carry money orders and roital notes over for two or three days, and in that time they might amount altogether to two or three hundred dollars, but, as I have stated, cash is deposited upon the day of its receipt, except when received too late to allow of that, in which case it is invariably deposited upon the following day, or, if received too late for deposit upon a Saturday, on the following Monday. I inclose a form on which the department makes entries of money orders and postal notes received, and this form is forwarded to the postmaster, who sends to the department in return a certificate made out in favour of the manager of the Bank of Montreal covering the total amount of the money orders and costal notes presented to him for redemption. Until an advice note has been received by the postal authorities they do not of course redeem an order, and the postmaster does not give the department the certificate in any case until the advice notes covering the money orders specified upon the form have been received.

With reference to the deposit made on June 1 of $\$ 1,141.97$, covering receipts of the 28th, 29th and 30th May, the receipts having, apparently, been more than $\$ 25$ on each of these dates, I may say that this is one instance where money orders and postal notes were, according to the practice of the department already referred to, retained for two or three days, when a certificate, made payable to the manager of the Bank of Montreal, was secured from the postmaster here.

## Customs Revenue.

Customs Dept., Ottawa, December 30, 1902.
Sir,-I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 25 th ult., respecting the decrease of customs revenue at certain ports during the past fiscal year, notwithstanding an increase of $\$ 3,317,669.45$ in the total customs revenue for this year as compared with the previous year.

On looking over the list of decreases, there does not appear to be any ground for suspicion that the decrease has arisen in any case from the non-accounting of funds, but is due to the fluctuation of business or transfer of entries from one port to another.

For instance, the erection of the iron and steel plant added abnormally to the revenue at Sydney in 1900-1.

Valleyfield, P.Q., was detached last year from St. John, P.Q., and made a chief port. The revenue collected at Valleyfield is to be included in the comparison of the two years.

New Glasgow, N.S., was also detached from Pictou, and made a chief port last year. The revenue at New Glasgow is similarly to be taken into account.

Rat Portage was detached from Port Arthur, and Parry Sound from Collingwood, at April 1, 1901, and erected into main ports.

The revenues at Rat Portage and Parry Sound are, therefore, to be taken into account for comparison.

White Horse, Y.T., was erected into a port in April, 1901, and the revenue collected at the Yukon passes last year have been included in the entries under White Horse. These collections were formerly entered under Victoria, B.C., or as 'Yukon passes.'

Re Overpayment of Advertising.

Sir,-I have the honour to acknowledge receipt of your letter of November 21 last, returning seizure vouchers No. 611 of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1902, and calling my attention to an overpayment of $\$ 17.90$ in the accounts for advertising covered by this voucher.

Upon reference to the accounts, which I return herewith, you will notice that the advertisements were inserted for two weeks, and that the certificate of the King's Printer is based upon six insertions.

I would explain that, through an error, the Collector of Customs at St. John, N.B., was authorized by this department to have the goods in this instance advertised for two weeks, and, in consequence of such instructions, the accounts were paid at the amounts submitted, which are not in excess of contract rates when time is considered.

I understand that, in view of these facts, which have been explained to you by the accountant, of the department, you have decided not to press for refund of the amount paid in excess of the certificates of the King's Printer.

## Re Indian Corn Imported Free.

Audit Office, Ottawa, May 22, 1903.
Sir,-According to Trade and Navigation Report for 1901-2, there was imported during that year, free of duty, 4,485,072 bushels of Indian corn, and 2,487,115 bushels exported, leaving a balance for domestic use of $1,997,957$ bushels.

The returns of the distilleries for the same year show that 315,461 bushels of domestic corn were used, of which 237,769 bushels were used by Walker \& Co., of Walkerville.

Please let me know what regulations are in force to determine that no corn imported free is used in any of the distilleries.

As no vouchers are furnished in support of this statement, I have to inquire what steps are taken by your department to ascertain the amount of duty paid.

Sir,-Referring to your letter of the 11th instant in the above matter, I have to state that it has not been found practicable, as a general rule, to obtain proof of the actual amount of duties paid on materials used in the construction of ships.

The department has relied on the declaration of the builder in the form provided in the regulation established by Order in Council, to the effect that the amount of drawback claimed does not exceed the actual duty paid on the materials used in the construction of the said vessel.

Copy of Order in Council (Memo. 1144 B.) is inclosed herewith.
The drawback on ships is paid as a specific sum under the provisions of Section $245(\mathrm{~m})$ of the Customs Act, which authorizes the Governor in Council to make regulations for granting a specific sum in lieu of any drawback of duty on articles which have been used in Canadian manufactures.

Sir,-Referring to your letter of the 29 th ultimo in the above matter, I am to state in reply as follows:-

The first item, of $\$ 2,881.27$, covers deposits by various parties on fruits and other perishable articles. There would not be any use in having these removed from the balance at the close of the fiscal year. They have to remain as standing deposits as security for the due entry of the goods, as explained in my letter of June 4, 1901.

The deposits between January 10 and June 20, 1902, have been removed from the bank balance since the month of December last, and in regard to deposits (3) made by the Imperial Oil Co., Ogdensburg Oil Co., and Messrs. Gall, Schneider Co., I would state that full information in connection with these will be found in the bank statements for the months of January and February last, which have to-day been sent to the Audit Office.

The item of $\$ 52.65$, covering balance over in cash account of shipping office from February 9, 1897, does not refer to this department.

It was found upon inquiry at Montreal, on April 1 last, that this is a balance over in collections in the shipping office representing an error in payment of wharfage dues by persons unknown.

The practice hitherto followed in regard to old outstanding cheques is the same as followed in respect of departmental letter-of-credit cheques, and when port cheques are outstanding over two years the amounts thereof are deposited to the credit of the Receiver General on account of casual revenue.

A number of the outstanding cheques issued from 1892 to 1902 have, however, been lost, and bonds are being obtained in most of the cases so as to have new cheques issued.

Sir,-I have before me an account rendered by Mr. H. M. Ami, for his expenses, amounting to $\$ 50246$, to receive personally from the Geological Society the Bigsby medal, the payment being authorized by Order-in-Council of March 4, 1903 and charged against the Geological Survey appropriation for 1902-03.

The vote of $\$ 60,000$ taken at the last session of parliament is available for the following services only:-

Explorations and surveys ; Printing and publication of reports, maps, etc.; Wages of assistant explorers, draughtsmen, clerks and others; Purchase of specimens, books, instruments, stationery, mapping materials, maintenance of museum, laboratory apparatus, chemicals and miscellaneous expenses ; Advances to explorers.

I cannot see that Dr. Ami's expenses can be classed under any of these heads. His trip to England was to receive an honour conferred on him personally, and not in his capacity as a member of your staff, and, accordingly, in my view, his expenses cannot be charged against the Geological Survey appropriation. If the government consider it advisable that these expenses be paid from the public moneys they should have obtained a special vote for this item.

Cheque No. 267, issued in November last, is for a payment of $\$ 11$ to Mrs. Louis Laforce, for maintenance of Betsy Johnson for 11 weeks, viz., from October 11 to November 1, 1901, and from September 9 to November 4, 1902.

It will be seen from this that both Flora Currie and Mrs. Laforce have been paid for the maintenance of this Indian woman for the three weeks between October 11 and November 1, 1901. Kindly obtain a refund of this overpayment of $\$ 3$.

I would also point out that the voucher in support of the payment of $\$ 53$ to Flora Currie is not certified in accordance with section 33 of the Audit Act, but it is only approved by J. D. McLean as acting Deputy Minister. Kindly furnish me with a properly certified voucher.

## Discrepancies in Accounts Rendered by the Lake of the Woods Milling Co. for Supplies for Rupert's Land Industrial School.

Audit Office, Ottawa, August 13, 1903.
Sir,-Indian Consolidated Fund cheque No. 3380 is for a payment of $\$ 62.53$ to the Lake of the Woods Milling Co., being the balance of an account for $\$ 2,049.08$ for flour, oats, \&c., supplied between February 4, 1901, and November 27, 1902, on which payments amounting to $\$ 1,986.55$ had been made from time to time. These payments were paid in settlement of accounts rendered by the company for supplies furnished the school. The accounts may be divided into two lots, the first lot amounting to $\$ 1,482.15$ being rendered between March 31, 1901, and March 31, 1902, and the second lot amounting to $\$ 504.40$ being rendered between May 7, 1902, and November 29, 1902. The second lot of accounts, which are certified to by W. J. Chisholm, Inspector of Agencies, as acting principal, agree in every respect with the items charged during that period in the account rendered in connection with cheque No. 3380, with the exception of an overpayment of $\$ 45$, which is adjusted in the final settlement. The first lot of accounts which are certified to by Jas. G. Dagg, as principal, differ widely from the items charged during the same period in the account settled by cheque 3380 , as appears from the following summary of accounts :-

Dear Sir,-Replying to your favour (137-39) of the 23rd inst., re apparent discrepancies between statement rendered Mr. Inspector Chisholm, covering goods supplied Mr. J. G. Dagg, late Principal of Rupert's Land Industrial School, and invoices submitted by him to your department, would say: Mr. Dagg would order a quantity of flour for delivery as required, and at prices to protect himself against any advance, and would ask for memo. invoice covering the quantity of flour so ordered. Before this order was filled he would instruct his teamster to get so many bags of bran, shorts, rolled oats or oats, as he required, in lieu of flour of similar value, and which change in order we never thought of questioning, seeing that Mr. Dagg had power to order in the first place. The memo. invoice he would get from us when placing the order did not go through our books; we only charged up as deliveries were made, and the statement rendered Mr. Chisholm was as per our books and correct. You will readily understand that this company would not under any circumstances connive with any person or firm, and if there is any trouble between Mr. Dagg and your department, politically or otherwise, we do not wish to be drawn into it.

## Departalent of Indian Affairs, Ottawa, October 26, 1903.

Sir,-In reply to your letter of the 21st instant., I beg to say that the department distinctly disapproves of the course which was pursued by Mr. Dagg when Principal of the Rupert's Land Industrial School, in regard to the orders which he gave to the Lake of the Woods Milling Co., and the manner in which he arranged with the company to fill the orders. The department was unaware, until after the transaction had occurred, of the course taken by Mr. Dagg. He acted in the matter altogether without instructions from either the department or its inspector. He is not now, as you are aware, an officer of this department, and it was not until after he left the Indian service that the last statement was received from the Lake of the Woods Milling Company, upon which the discrepancies became apparent. With reference to the concluding paragraph of your letter, I beg to say that the department is not aware that similar practices have been followed at any other Indian industrial school, or at any Indian agencies. It is considered most unlikely that anything of the kind has occurred at other Indian schools or agencies.

## Payments to Thorburn \& Sons for Lumber for Grist Mill at Crooked Lakes.

## Audit Office, Ottawa, October 23, 1903.

Sir,-In June, 1902, an advance of $\$ 300$ was made by cheque 6799 to Magnus Begg, Indian agent at Crooked Lakes, for expenses in connection with the rebuilding of the grist mill at that agency. Out of this advance Mr. Begg paid $\$ 220$ to W. J. Silman for pulling down the old mill and erecting the new mill, and $\$ 79.80$ to Thorburn \& Sons for lumber, \&c.; the balance, 20c., being refunded by him. On July 8, 1903, cheque No. 6124 was issued in favour of Thorburn \& Sons for the amount of $\$ 163.40$, in payment of the balance of their account for lumber for the new grist mill. The account is for the amount of $\$ 243.20$, from which is deducted the sum of $\$ 79.80$ paid in 1902 by Agent Begg. Although this later account thus appears to cover the former one, I find no agreement whatever between the two, either as regards quantities or price. I would like an explanation of the differences between the accounts. I also notice that Thorburn \& Sons were paid the amount of $\$ 130.80$ by cheque No. 7096, issued in July, 1902, for lumber for the grist mill. It would be well, under the circumstances, to make sure that this lumber is a separate lot from that charged for in either of the other accounts.

Sir,-I beg to direct your attention to Messrs. Thorburn \& Sons' account amounting to $\$ 79.80$, which you forwarded with your letter of the 30th August, 1302, No. 248-12, when accounting for the expenditure of the proceeds of the cheque No. 6799 for $\$ 300$, on account of the re-building of the grist mill. On the 26 th June last, you forwarded, with letter No. 545-20, an account from the same firm, which shewed supplies furnished in all to the value of $\$ 243.20$, on which the $\$ 79.80$ above referred to had been paid, leaving a balance due of $\$ 163.40$, which was paid by cheque No. 6124 . Although the latter account appears to cover and include the former, yet, upon comparison, they do not agree with either as regards the quantities or prices charged. The department desires that you will look very carefully into this matter at once, and furnish an explanation. In this connection I wish also to direct your attention to account No. 523 in favour of Thorburn \& Sons for siding and flooring supplied for the mill. This account amounted to $\$ 130.80$, and was paid by cheque No. 7086. The department wishes to know whether this was a separate lot of lumber from that charged for in either of the above-mentioned accounts. You should give this matter your immediate attention.

## Crooked Lake Agency, Brosdview, November 2, 1903.

Sir,-With reference to Messrs. Thorburn \& Son's account of $\$ 79.80$, receipt No. 276 , paid out of accountable cheque No. 6799 , and voucher No. 608 for $\$ 163.40$, paid by cheque No. 6124, as regards the quantities and prices charged not agreeing, I have the honour to state that some of the items in account of $\$ 79.80$ were returned and changed for lumber more suitable to our requirements, as for instance, the 1,600 feet of siding w $\%$ returned and equivalent value got in flooring (part of item of 2,000 feet charged in voucher No. 608) to finish lining up the mill, and granary inside upstairs and down. The flooring was $\$ 4$ per thousand cheaper and gave better service for inside lining, as flooring has not the bevel on the edge that siding has. The two lots of cedar boards are included in the item of 2,000 feet sheeting, the term 'board' and 'sheeting' being used here for the same lumber. There was an error in the price charged for 150 pounds cut nails, $\$ 7.13$ in first account, which was rectified in voucher No. 608 to $\$ 6.75$. The spikes and other nails were bulked together and therefore charged for at 100-pound rate. The lumber was got in the fall of 1902, although the second account was not rendered
until June, 1903, after repeated applications for it. The second account was rendered by Thorburn \& Sons in full for $\$ 243.2$, and upon checking it over, it was found that they had omitted to give credit for the cash $\$ 79.80$ paid to them in August, 1902, and which was accordingly deducted. With regard to voucher No. 523 paid by cheque No. 7086, this was a separate lot of lumber entirely from either of the above-mentioned accounts.

Sir,-In reply to your letter No. 692-20 of the 2nd instant, I have to say that the explanations are by no means considered satisfactory. The department depends upon the certificate of the Indian Agent for the absolute correctness of accounts presented, and when it is found that these accounts are incorrect, and that details have been certified to that are erroneous, it tends to weaken the department's trust in the Agent's certificates. There seems to be no reason why you should have certified to the accounts for $\$ 79.80$, or why you should have ordered or received lumber which was unsuited to your requirements. You should explain these points fully, if it is possible for you to do so. The substitution of a general voucher with different details, including the first one issued, is considered a reprehensible proceeding. You and your clerk should be careful to guard against such errors in future.

Crooked Laike Agency, November 19, 1903.
Sir,-With reference to departmental letter of the above date, with regard to Messrs. Thorburn \& Sons' accounts, I have the honour to state that the lumber ordered was suitable so far as we could calculate at the time of ordering, but not being practical carpenters and builders, more of some lumber was ordered than was actually required, but on being changed, full value was got in what was substituted for it, and as in the case of 'siding' changed for flooring was more economical. In one of the two cases the lumber ordered, on being freighted out to the Agency, was not of good quality and was therefore returned, and better lumber received in its place. The firm not always having on hand just the dimensions ordered, we had to take the nearest, as the supply of lumber kept on hand in these small towns is not large, and we can not always get the size and kind ordered. The department got full value in the lumber charged in the account, both as regards quantity, price and quality, as I took care that such were correct before I certified to the account. I am always as particular in certifying to departmental accounts as I should be were they my own private accounts. As a further confirmation, I sent to Messrs. Thorburn to kindly send a certificate that the department duly reccived the lumber paid for in said voucher, which I herewith beg to inclose. The clerk and myself will be very particular to guard against these apparent errors in future. We had a great deal of trouble in getting this account for settlement, and both
the clerk and myself had to go into town to Messrs. Thorburn's office and stay until we got the account made out, so that it could be sent for payment before the fiscal vear closed. In this case the miller, Mr. Sutherland, measured all the lumber carefully, and I inclose his statement to that effect. The clerk is very careful in all his accounts.

Kindly obtain a fuller statement showing how this amount is made up and the dates between which the services were rendered.

Sir,-In reply to your letter of the 20th instant, with regard to an account of Mr. J. G. Harvey for legal expenses, the amount of which had been deducted from a fine imposed for supplying liquor to Indians, \&c. (Indian Trust Fund general receipt No. C 14626), I beg to inform you that it is the custom of this department to require its agents to remit the full amount of all collections to the department, and make requisition for the payment of any charges that there may be against the same. In explanation of the reason why this course was not pursued in the above instance, the following explanation is made by Agent Marlatt :-
' I am aware that the procedure in paying the legal account of Mr. Harvey is irregular, but I cannot see how it can be helped in this casc. Mr.-Harvey resides in the village of Dauphin, and the cases were tried in Winnipegosis. The justice of the peace remitted the fines to Mr. Harvey, and he in turn remitted them to me, less the amount of his account. I returned his cheque with explanations, and requested the full amount, informing him that his account would be paid in the regular way by the department; he has again returned the original cheque, stating that "I do not think it necessary that I should wait payment of my account until the whole matter can go through Ottawa." Evidently he thinks a bird in the hand is worth two in the bush.'

Mr. Har̀vey's account was submitted to the Department of Justice for taxation kefore it was accepted, and I inclose the same herewith.

Sir,-I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your communications of the 23 rd , ult. and 6 th, inst., relative to the return of certain vouchers.

I forward herewith vouchers for $\$ 829.22$ and $\$ 894.72$ certified as to prices being fair and just.

The expenditure covered by cheques Nos. 70180, 70195, 71717 and 72302 was in connection with the purchase of the necessary equipment connected with the Metric System of Weights and Measures and which are never obtained through the Department of Public Printing and Stationery. As I find that cheque No. 70180 is for binding I will submit a sample of the work done to the Department of Printing and Stationery for the necessary certificate.

Cheque Nos. 71717 and 72302 are for regular metrical supplies ordered from France through Messrs. E. H. Richer \& Son, of St. Hyacinthe, the vouchers respecting which I return herewith.

Cheque No. 70195 covers the purchase of books relative to the Metric System of Weights and Measures. A specimen book will be submitted to the Department of Printing and Stationery for certificate.

With reference to the payments covered by cheques Nos. 72293, 72294 and 72310 I regret to say I am unable to forward you but one voucher at present.

The first cheque is in connection with an order for Standard Metric Sets of Weights and Measures ordered from W. \& T. Avery of London, England, in the month of January last. Delivery was promised within a perion of three months. A portion of the goods arrived and were paid for in July last (cheque No. 72291). The balance was expected daily and a draft to cover the estimate cost was obtained (cheque No. 72293) a further portion of the original order was received late in October ult., but there is still a further lot to come. The draft is consequently withheld by the Department until the small balance of the original order (January, 1903) is received when the vouchers will be completed and forwarded you.

The second cheque (72294) is to cover 200 sample metric sets ordered from Paris, France. The goods have just been received at the Department and chequed off with the invoice and voucher forwarded herewith.

The third cheque (72310) is in connection with translation performed by Mr. A. Fréchette. The translation has been performed but as the proofs from the King's Printer have not, owing to the extreme length of the Session, yet been examined by Mr . Fréchette the cheque is withheld until this portion of the work is completed. Mr. Fréchette has been requested to complete this work in order that payment may be made and voucher supplied your office.

The aggregate defalcation, as stated, was determined at $\$ 1,680.92$, but subsequent examination increased the amount to $\$ 1,681.45$. This has since been reduced as follows:-Amount of credit in Bank of Commerce, Rossland, $\$ 152.04$; duplicate cheque of Stein \& Co. issued to replace cheque not cashed by Deputy Collector Jones, $\$ 283.17$; and the amount to the credit of Mr. Jones at Department of Finance on account of 'Retirement Fund'' $\$ 44.15$; leaving the net defalcation, $\$ 1,202.09$.

The defalcation took place between March 27 and April 17, 1899. This officer was not under a bond of a Guarantee Company, as that form of security was not put into effect until July 1, 1899.

There are no collectors or deputy collectors since July 1, 1899, not under bond of a Guarantee Company.

## Re Excise Refunds.

Sir,-The refunds and drawbacks of Excise Revenue amounted to $\$ 150,227.17$ in 1901-02, and to $\$ 246,590.12$ in 1902-3, an increase of $\$ 96,362.95$.

The greater part of this increase occurs under the following services :-
Crude fulminate exported :
$\$ 56,304.59$ in 1901-02
$68,543.92$ in 1902-03 \$12,239.03 increase.
Malt ex-warehoused for consumption-drawback of 5 per cent :
$\$ 19,342.77$ in 1901-02 80,743.92 in 1902-03 \$61,401.15 increase.
Tobacco and tobacco cuttings exported :
$\$ 42,486.39$ in 1901-02
$52,598.75$ in 1902-03 \$10,112.36 increase.
These large increases, especially in malt ex-warehoused for consumption, seem to call for explanation.

Sir,-I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your communication of the 2 nd inst., asking for an explanation as to the increased refunds of 1902-3 over 1901-2.

In reply, I beg to state :
1st. The increase in connection with crude fulminate is due to the fact that in 1902-3 a greater quantity was manufactured and exported than during the preceding year, the quantities being 149,100 and $121,607: 30$ pounds respectively.

2nd. The increase in connection with malt refunds is due to the fact that the sums paid in any one fiscal year does not necessarily apply to transactions arising during that particular period. The refunds paid in 1901-02 (\$19,342.7\%) all arose on transactions of the preceding fiscal year. The refunds paid in 1902-03 therefore embraced all the refunds due to 1901-02, a portion of the refunds appertaining to 1902-03 and small balances from 1899-1900 and 1900-01.

The aggregate refunds paid during 1902-3 amounted to $\$ 80,743.92$, made up as follows :-

$\$ 80,74392$
In 1902-3 many claims were received early enough to enable them (aggregating $\$ 29,826.56)$ to be paid and charged against the year to which they belong.

The balance of refunds due to 1902-3 have been paid and charged against 1903-4.
The increased refunds paid in connection with tobacco and tobacco cuttings exported are simply due to the fact that, as compared with the preceding year, an incresed number of proofs of exportation were fyled at the department in 1902-3.

## Irregularities in Attendance Certificates.

Audit Office, Ottawa, Dec. 4, 1902.
Sir,-I notice on the pay-lists for your temporary employees that were sent to me at the end of last month for my certificate, that a deduction of eight days was made from the salary of Miss Gillies, of the Immigration Branch, being for absence during the month of July last. The attendance cértificates sent me in support of the July pay-list did not show any absence for Miss Gillies, the officer signing that certificate certifying that she had been in attendance every day that month with the exception of Sundays and statutory holidays. This does not seem to be the only case in which the attendance certificate of the Immigration Branch has not been in accordance with the actual facts, as a few days ago an officer of that branch requested to see the attendance certificates of the Immigration Branch for the months of March and April, as he wished to ascertain therefrom how many days a certain clerk had been absent on leave in those months. According to the certificates, however, the clerk in question had been present every day during the two months. Uhder the circumstances, I wish that you would explain how these irregularities occurred, and give proof that no errors still exist in the pay-lists.

Ross, M.P., in which you take exception to certain payments which have been made for the professional services of nurses who attended upon him during his illness last summer, has been brought to my attention. In this relation, I wish to point out that in view of the remoteness of the Yukon from railway communication, and the inclemency of the weather during a great part of the year, it has always been customary for the department, since the inception of our offices at Dawson, to provide hospital treatment for such of our officials who may require the same, if taken ill while in the performance of their official duties. When Mr. Ross was stricken with the very serious attack of paralysis, from which for a time his life was despaired of, it was felt that he should not be in a less favourable position, as regards medical treatment, than it has been usual to extend to our ordinary officers, and the Minister therefore authorized the expenditure for the professional services referred to in your letter now under reply. Mr. Ross' case was an exceptional one, which required constant and very careful treat-* ment, and it was deemed necessary to have the services of a medical man, as well as those of the two trained nurses. I may explain that the allowance of $\$ 500$ per month, which is made to the Commissioner of the Yukon Territory, is especially intended to keep up the Government House, and that the Commissioner pays all the expenses incurred in this relation.

## Comptroller's Office, Dawson, Y.T., April 23, 1903.

Sir,-I am in receipt of your letter of the 3rd inst., Ref. No. 754303, re expenditure made for the maintenance of public buildings in the Yukon Territory, requesting explanations regarding certain payments, inclosing copies of two letters from the Auditor General. The first heater supplied by the J. \& T. Adair Hardware Co. was found to be too small for the new office at Gold Bottom, and it was returned, being brought to Dawson by one of our own teams, which had been employed on road work. It was slightly damaged in transit, and was placed in the police court building in Dawson, where it is at present. A larger, but lighter, heater was purchased for the Mining Inspector's office at Gold Bottom. The payment of freight on the three cases of coal oil sent to the Mining Recorder at Forty Mile is correct. The Dawson Hardware Co. prepaid the freight, expecting to send the oil by steamer, but the steamer was taken off the run, and it was sent in a small boat rowed down the river when the ice was running. Mr . R. M. Blair stated that he was compelled to pay this additional charge to secure delivery of the oil. The matter was investigated when he came to Dawson.

Sir,-I am in receipt of your letter of the 29th ultimo, in reply to mine of March 23rd, with reference to certain payments to the J. \& T. Adair Hardware House for heaters purchased for the Mining Inspector's office at Gold Bottom. The explanation given by Mr. Lithgow in his letter of April 23, a copy of which you sent me, is scarcely satisfactory, and I would like a further explanation with reference to these heaters. The facts of the case, as gathered from the accounts, appear to be as follows : On October 18, 1902 , sundry office supplies, amounting to $\$ 58$, and including a 28 -inch air-tight heater with pipes, damper and stove board, were purchased for the Mining Inspector's office, and on October 30 a large heater, costing $\$ 32.50$, with $\$ 1.50$ freight, was purchased for the same office, both these accounts being paid by cheque No. 110, issued on December 10, against the appropriation for maintenance of public buildings. On January 10, cheque No. 171 was issued in favour of the J. \& T. Adair Hardware House for $\$ 288.75$. This cheque covered, among other items, a charge of $\$ 34$ for one large heater with freight charges, supplied on October 30 for the Mining Inspector's office at Gold Bottom. It appears to me that the heater which, according to Mr. Lithgow, was found to be too small for the office, and which was brought back to Dawson and used in the police court building, must be the 28 -inch heater charged for in the invoice dated October 18, and that consequentiy the second charge on October 30 for a heater costing $\$ 34$, is a double payment. I am borne out in this by the dates given in

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the two accounts, which appear to be duplicates, as if these were separate heaters bought at separate times, the dates would be different instead of being identical, the dates given being presumably the date of actual purchase, as shown by Messrs. Adair's books.

## No Vote for Forestry Expenditure in British Columbia.

## Audit Office, Ottawa, March 2, 1903.

Sir,-I $\cdot a m$ in receipt of your application of the 15 th ultimo for a transfer entry debiting Dominion Lands Income, Contingencies, and crediting Dominion Lands Income, Forestry, with the amount of $\$ 3,133.58$, being amounts paid during the current fiscal year on account of fire ranging, \&c., in the North-west Territories and the railway belt in British Columbia. In the first place, I do not think that these payments can be charged against the appropriation for Contingencies of the Dominion Lands and Crown Timber Offices, as they do not appear to be of the nature of Contingencies as defined by the Contingencies Act. In the second place, the appropriation for Forestry is worded as follows : 'Protection of Timber in Manitoba and the North-west Teritories and Tree Culture in the North-west Territories.' To this appropriation properly belong all payments for fire ranging, \&c., in Manitoba and the North-west Territories. There appears to have been no provision made for similar payments in British Columbia, but I do not consider myself justified in passing a transfer of such payments from the appropriation to which you have charged them in the first place to an appropriation to which, manifestly, they do not belong. It appears to me that this transfer is asked
by you on account of the expenditure for Protection of Timber and for Tree Culture being greater than was anticipated. The only remedy I can suggest is that you apply at the approaching session of Parliament for a supplementary vote on account of Forestry. This vote should provide for protection of timber in the railway belt of British Columbia, and also for tree culture in Manitoba, as I understand from Mr. Stewart, tree culture operations are actually earried on in Manitoba as well as in the Territories, although only the North-west Territories are mentioned in that part of the vote. I regret that the press of business caused by the preparation of my annual report has prevented my discussing the matter earlier.

## Payment for Leave not Authorized.

Sir,-I find on examination of the attendance certificates sent to this office with your monthly pay-lists for temporary employees that Mrs. L. Norton appears to have considerably exceeded the leave allowed her by the regulations. Mrs. Norton was allowed special leave of absence on account of sickness from July 5 to August 26 by Order in Council of September 3 last. In addition to this time, she appears from the attendance certificates to have been absent some 45 days in all since the 1st of January, for which she received pay. The greatest number of days for which she could be paid without special leave granted under Order in Council is 35 days, i.e., three weeks' annual leave and two weeks' sick leave. She thus appears to have been paid for ten days to which she was not entitled according to the regulations. Kindly have this matter looked into and, if it appears she has been paid in excess, have the amount deducted from the next pay-list.

## Re Dominion Lands Revenue : Homestead Entries at Yorkton.

## Audit Office, Ottawa, July 4, 1903.

Sir,-An examination of the return of the agent of Dominion Lands at Yorkton for the month of April last, reveals the fact that he issued over one thousand seven hundred $(1,700)$ homestead receipts upon which $\$ 5$ had been paid on each on account, instead of $\$ 10$, as provided by the Dominion Lands Act.

As this is the first instance upon which payments were received on account of homestead entries, I should be glad to know under what authority the agent acted; also, if any of these balances have since been paid.

I may add that it was simply a question of expediency, as there had been for some years difficulty in inducing many of these settlers to make homestead entries, and rather than have any further question in the matter or delay, it was thought advisable to adopt this course. Certainly no harm can come from it, as no patent will issue to any person until all the fees have been paid in full.

## Re Timber Dues, Yukon.

Audit Office, Otrawa, December 17, 1903.
Sir,-Receipt No. 2292, dated Dawson, November 11, 1902, issued by Agent A. H. Povah, is for $\$ 750$, and reads as follows :-

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' Paid by H. W. Newlands, legal adviser, on behalf of H M. Henning, Dawson, the sum of seven hundred and fifty dollars, being a portion of $\$ 3,000$ paid to him by the Dawson Electric Light anad Power Co., in payment of the seizure dues on 1,500 cords wood at the rate of $\$ 2$ per cord. The balance, $\$ 2,250$, is held by the legal adviser, subject to instructions from the Commissioner.'

I do not find that this balance is accounted for in the revenue of 1902-3. Has it been paid, and if so, when ?

I have to call your attention to section 27 of the Audit Act which directs that the gross revenue shall be deposited to the credit of the Receiver General.

This regulation should be strictly observed. You have the power, through your letter of credit, to withdraw the whole or part of any deposit which may be decided to have been made in error. Government funds should not remain in hands of officers for an indefinite time.

The regulation of the Department of the Interior is that the regular monthly allowance paid officials for living and lodging expenses must cease when these officials are absent on business, and that for the time they are so absent they shall receive their actual expenses. See Audit Report 1900-1, page L-104.

Consequently the allowance for three and one-third months, paid Mr. McKinnon while he was absent.from Dawson, should be refunded.

## Re Yukon Local Revenue : Interest paid the Canadian Bank of Commerce.

Audit Office, Ottawa, Sept. 22, 1903.

Sir,-The expenditure of the Yukon Council during the year ended June 30 last was $\$ 626,021.38$, and the receipts $\$ 357,039.33$, a deficit of $\$ 268,982.05$, made up principally of expenditures for roads and bridges, and in capping the Eldorado Gusher.

These works seem to have been carried on by the Yukon Council for the account of the Dominion Government. There was recently repaid to the council $\$ 126,642.50$ on account of roads anad bridges, and $\$ 50,000$ on account of the Gusher.

To meet these expenditures the council overdrew their account in the Canadian Bank of Commerce, and have been paying interest on the over-drafts as follows :$\$ 895.05$ in 1900-1, $\$ 1,081.10$ in 1901-2, and $\$ 7,412.26$ in 1902-3.

The average balance at the credit of the Dominion Government in the Bank of Commerce during the year was over $\$ 400,000$.

Under the circumstances, at least the interest on the amount assumed and paid for by the Dominion Government should be refunded.

## Re Yukon Local Revenue: Election Expenses.

Audit Office, Ottawa, June 17, 1903.
Sir,-The following charges in connection with election expenses seem to call for some explanation :-

The Yukon 'Sun.'-Printing $17 \frac{1}{2}$ thousand ballots at $\$ 60$ per M. The White Horse 'Star' only charges $\$ 20$ per M., while the general charge here is $\$ 2.50$ per M.

The Yukon 'Sun.'-Printing 100 proclamations at 80c. each, 200 proclamations at $62 \frac{1}{2}$ c. each. The White Horse 'Star' only charges 21c. each for 60 proclamations.

In District No. 2 C. L. Dearing is paid services self and assistant, 14 days with ballot boxes, $\$ 5$ per day each, $\$ 4$ per day each for expenses, and $\$ 1$ per day each for eight dogs and feed. John H. Barker, for similar work, is paid $\$ 5$ per day for self and assistant for expenses and $\$ 1.50$ per day for each dog and feed.

Five of the polling places are described as Mounted Police posts, yet the deputy returning officer has been paid $\$ 25$ in each case for rent of booth.

Sir,-I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 17 th ult. in connection with the Yukon election expenses. The difference between the prices charged by the White Horse 'Star' and the Yukon 'Sun' is due to the fact that the price of living, rent and all other expenses are much less at White Horse than in Dawson. In road construction the workmen. at the White Horse end were paid $\$ 4$ per day and board and at Dawson $\$ 5$ per day and board.

There is a printers' union in Dawson which fixes the scale of wages, the minimum rate being $\$ 250$ per month. I understand that the White Horse 'Star'-which is only published weekly-is operated by the proprietors, and they do not require any assistance.

Regarding the hire of dog teams, there is no fixed rate for such services, and the returning officers made the best arrangement they could. This is particularly the case in going to Clear and Duncan Creeks. There is no trail, and in many places no roadhouse accommodation.
C. L. Dearing simply went with proclamations, whereas the other men had to carry and deliver the large tin ballot boxes.

Referring to the polling booths, I inclose copy of a letter from the Assistant Commissioner of the North-west Mounted Police, in which he states that the police posts were not used by the deputy returning officers, but that private buildings were hired.

## North-west Mounted Police, Dawson, Y.T., Nov. 25, 1901.

Sir,-Referring to the account of Mr. A. Klimesch, of Selkirk, for $\$ 444$ for board, lodging and attendance on a sick and destitute man named Patterson in the fall of 1899, I beg to report as follows :-

Patterson having accidentally broken his leg while employed on one of the Victoria Yukon Trading Company's scows, was handed over to the police by his companious at Selkirk. Constable Pennycuick, who was in charge, called in Hospital Corporal Lincoln, of the Yukon Field Force, to put the leg in splints, and moved the injured man to Mr. Klimesch's hotel, where he could get proper attention; this was necessary, as the two policemen then at Selkirk were sometimes both away for two days or more. I have no doubt whatever that from the mere fact of the police bringing Patterson to his hotel that Mr. Klimesch looked to them (the police) to see that he was recompensed. For this reason, I feel that it is my duty to make every effort to have the account settled. Had I any fund at my disposal from which the account could be paid, Klimesch would have had his money long ago. He is certainly entitled to remuneration, and, while repudiating any liability in the matter as far as the police are concerned, it seems only right and just that as he took over the injured man in good faith from the police, we at least should try and see that he is not a loser thereby. It is true that Mr. Holland, the manager of the V. Y. T. Co., afterwards assumed responsibility for any expense incurred, but the company later on repudiated the account and claimed that Patterson should have settled it himself. This, we are well aware, he was not able to do.

Sir,-I have the honour to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 9 th inst,. regarding payment of $\$ 5,127.49$ from the local revenue, Yukon Territory, for the quarter ending December 31, 1902, on account of 'Eldorado Gusher,' and requesting an explanation of these payments.

Some miners on No. 3 A, Eldorado, in sinking a deep shaft in the expectation of discovering a second bed-rock, at a depth of $222 \frac{1}{2}$ feet, struck a gusher of water, which

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threw out over two sluice heads. This occurred in December when the temperature was very low. The water ran down the creeks, freezing and forming glaciers and threatening great destruction to the town of Bonanza and the miners engaged in winter work on Eldorado and Bonanza. It was imperative that immediate steps should be taken to prevent the destruction of valuable property. At that time there was not a sufficient number of the members of the Yukon Council in the Territory to form a quorum, as the elected members term had expired. The Aeting Commissioner, after consulting the Department of the Interior, authorized this expenditure, and it will be provided for in the Supplementary Estimates of 1903. A separate account of this expenditure was kept, as it was not considered that it could be fairly charged to our appropriations for Roads, Bridges and Public Works.

## Re Yukon Local Revenue: Quarantine Expenditure.

## Audit Office, Ottawa, March 7, 1903.

Sir,-On August 22, 1902, you paid the White Pass and Yukon route $\$ 8,500$ for maintenance and lodging 93 passengers on steamer White Horse while in quarantine at Dog Island from June 2 to 18, inclusive, 17 days at $\$ 500$. There is a memorandum attached which indicates that this amount included $\$ 1,743.35$ for wages of crew, $\$ 1,421$ for meals for crew, $\$ 215$ for equipment destroyed, and $\$ 462$ for drugs, \&c.

This is a most unusual charge, and I have to ask for full particulars in reference thereto.

Sir,-I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 7th inst. re quarantine expenditure, Local Revenue, Yukon Territory.

The steamer White Horse, plying between White Horse and Dawson, arrived at Dawson on June 1,1902 , having a severe case of small-pox on board. The steamer had a full complement of passengers, and was ordered into quarantine. The government had no means of placing the passengers and crew in quarantine if they had left the steamer, so the Commissioner arranged with the agents of the steamer to pay them $\$ 500$ per day for the use of the steamér for boarding and lodging the passengers and crew and to compensate the company for the detention of the steamer. The memo. attached has nothing to do with the matter, as the agreement made was for $\$ 505$ per day. This was considered the most advantageous and economical arrangement that could have been made.

It is considered that the appropriation of $\$ 52,000$ for hospitals, charity, care of indigents, quarantine, \&c., was authority for this payment.

## Re Local Revenue Account: Over-expenditure.

Audit Office, Ottawa, March 3, 1903.

Sir,-The returns of the Comptroller of the Yukon Territory for the six months ended December 31 last, show that the revenue amounted to $\$ 222,033.15$, made up as follows :-


The expenditure during the same period was $\$ 375,124.52$, and the shortage from the previous year was $\$ 18,694.73$. Deducting the revenue, there is still a shortage of $\$ 171,786.10$, presumably borrowed from the Canadian Bank of Commerce.

One item of the expenditure is for roads, bridges, \&cc., $\$ 217,298.43$.
The total amount appropriated by ordinance for the whole year was $\$ 369,675$.
I shall be glad to know on what autliority the over-expenditure was made, and how it is proposed to meet it.

Sir,-I have the honour to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 3rd inst., calling attention to the over-expenditure from the Local Government, Yukon Territory, for the six months ending December 31, 1902.

The reason of this over-expenditure arises from the fact that the Dominion Government undertook the construction of certain roads in this Territory during last summer, and appropriated the sum of $\$ 178,500$ for this purpose. This amount was found inadequate to complete the roads, the construction of which had been undertaken, and the Local Government paid the difference and completed the work. The matter will be brought before the Federal Government, and, no doubt, a sum will be placed in the estimates to reimburse the Local Government for this expenditure. We were also called upon to disburse a considerable sum on account of the Eldorado Gusher, amounting to $\$ 5,352.49$, to December 31. Some miners on No. 3 A, Eldorado, in the hope of striking a second bed-rock, sunk a deep shaft and at the depth of $222 \frac{1}{2}$ feet struek a gusher of water, which flowed over the creek, froze and formed glaciers, and also flooded out the miners working on the creek.
'To prevent great destruction, the government was compelled to dig a trench some six miles long and keep it open until the gusher could be successfully capped.

The whole expenditure to this date is in the neighbourhood of $\$ 45,000$.

## Re Local Revenue: Yukon.

Sir,-There seems to have been a balance of $\$ 1,135.75$ on June 30,1901 , unaccounted for by the poundkeeper at Dawson. Has this money been since paid, and if not, what action has been taken in reference thereto ?

Accounts for indemnity to the members of the Yukon Council should be certificd as to attendance. The regulations provide for a deduction of $\$ 25$ for each day that a representative is absent from any sitting of the Council, or any committee of which the is a member, but no deductions were made in any of the accounts furnished.

Hugh McKinnon, Chief Preventive Officer, gets from time to time an advance to pay salaries and living allowances to his staff. Why should not these officers not be paid direct ? On June 30 last, Mr. McKinnon had $\$ 3,000$ of advances for which no vouchers have been furnished.

The sum of $\$ 1,941.75$ was deducted from the pay of the men working on roads for board bills with R. R. Reid. When was this amount paid Mr. Reid?

Sir,-In some cases the practice is followed of paying the men employed at road work by cheque. In other cases the paymaster gets one cheque for the whole amount and pays the men in eash. If at all possible, payment should be made by cheque to each person.

The pay-list for the West Dawson and Glacier Creek road for October, 1902, covered by cheque No. 3314, contains the following entry : 'H. F. McKinnon, 70 hours at 75 c., $\$ 52.50$, less board, $\$ 18.25$, balance $\$ 37.25$,' evidently an error of $\$ 3$.

Sir,-I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 3rd November re payments to workmen on the construction of government roads, pointing out that in some cases they are paid by cheque and in others by paymaster.

Whenever it is possible cheques are drawn payable to the order of each workman; but in some cases, where the work is a long distance from Dawson, it is necessary to make payments through a paymaster, and in these cases he gives his own cheque, and the cash is seldom paid. This is done to prevent delay, particularly in places where there is no mail service.

It is noted that there was an over-payment of $\$ 3$ to H. F. McLennan, workman on the Glacier Creek road. This pay sheet was made out by a clerk temporarily employed during the rush, and his services have since been dispensed with.

A. L. McPherson was paid $\$ 360$ on June 30 for hire of four horses from June 13 to 30,18 days at $\$ 20, \$ 360$. On July 2 he was paid $\$ 720$ for horse hire, \&c., made up as follorvs :-

I inclose you a copy of the account of advances and expenditure. It was at first the intention to make all payments for the construction of this road from the special vote known as 'The Department of the Interior Road Construction Vote,' but on July 3, when Mr. A. J. McPherson started on his survey, there were no funds available from this vote, and an advance was made to him froin the local revenues of the Yukon Territory, which was afterwards refunded.

Before the construction of the road was completed, it was found that there was not sufficient money left in the road construction vote to complete this trail, and the balance necessary was paid from the local revenues of the Yukon Territory.

Referring to the payment made to Mr. A. L. McPherson for hire of horses, I may say that this account was in dispute for some time, and that the Acting Commissioner held an investigation, and it was decided to make a settlement in accordance with the report of the Engineer, a copy of which is inclosed for your information; also, copy of a memorandum from the Superintendent of Public Works on the same subject.

Sir,-The Auditor General has again called my attention to the delay in depositing fees and transmitting monthly statements of the same. He points out that your return for October last was not received here until January 23, and that the deposit was not made until December 29.

The Treasury Board regulations provide that each officer employed in the collection of public money shall make a daily deposit if the receipts amount to $\$ 25.00$; otherwise whenever that sum is on hand; and that the monthly return to the department shall be mailed within five days after the close of the period which it covers.

You will be good enough, therefore, to comply with these regulations as far as possible, or if on account of the peculiar conditions of the Yukon Territory they are in any way impracticable, please specify the difficulties.

In any case I can see no justification for a delay of about two months in depositing fees.

Sir,-Replying to yours of the 13th inst., I beg to say:-The very matter complained of by the Auditor General has given, not only much annoyance, but almost endless clerical work. I drew Inspector Corry's attention to the matter when he was here last summer, and we went into the whole affair most fully, and as Mr. Corry is in Ottawa at present he can probably explain matters more satisfactorily than I can myself by letter.

This Bailiwick is larger in area than the province of Ontario. The N.W.M.P. handle our outside work, as they have detachments at all points where mining is conducted. Many of these points are hundreds of miles distant, and extremely inaccessible, taking weeks to get returns. We keep what is supposed to be monthly accounts with 23 different law firms, who I regret to say in many cases fail to pay promptly. I was obliged to write certain firms a very severe letter some time ago (copy attached), which had a satisfactory effect in two cases only. I am now mailing a copy of your letter to each firm. Fact of the matter, money here from October until miners commence to wash up is very scarce. The lawyers are nearly all good, but owing to peculiar conditions I really cannot avoid sympathizing with them, although I am worried by their dilatory payments.

If there is any way in the world that either you or the Auditor General can suggest to improve upon my present system or expedite matters in any way, shape or manner, I shall most willingly comply. I am satisfied from this on I shall not experience so rauch trouble, as your letter will help me out, and we shall be able to forward our statements and remittances more promptly hereafter.

Sir,-In pursuance of a recommendation of Inspector Dawson, a lot was purchased at Edmonton, and advertisements calling for tenders for the erection of a jail have recently been issued. The title was acquired last autumn. At the date of purchase two lessees, viz., Mr. Baldwin and Mr. Milner, were operating coal mines on the property, under lease from the late owner. These leases have been extended, by direction of the Minister of Justice, until July, 1904. The lessees pay a royalty of ten cents a ton upon all coal mined by them. The royalty is collected and deposited by the agent of the Department of Justice at Edmonton. The deposit receipts are forwarded to this department, and placed to the credit of Penitentiary revenue in the usual manner.

## Commoner appointed to Senate-Mode of Calculating Indemnity.

Audit Office, Ottawa, November 18, 1903.

Sir,-I notice from your expenditure on account of Senate indemnity and mileage, that you have paid the Hon. Mr. Edwards the full sessional allowance of $\$ 1,500$ and $\$ 5$ mileage for the session of 1903.

I also notice that Mr. Edwards was paid from the House of Commons expenditure $\$ 50$ for 5 days' attendance and $\$ 6.20$ mileage, as a member of that House for the session of 1903.

You will see from this statement that Mr. Edwards received $\$ 1,550$ for indemnity and two mileages, amounting to $\$ 11.20$.

As in previous correspondence on this matter, I repeat my objection, viz., that the Act respecting the Senate and House of Commons does not, in my opinion, contemplate that any member shall draw more than one sessional indemnity together with one mileage for one session. Please call Mr. Edwards' attention to this and obtain from him a refund.

The difference in mileage, though small, requires explanation.

Sir, -I have the honour to acknowledge receipt of your communication of the 18th instant, on the subject of the amount of indemnity paid the Hon. Mr. Edwards for his attendance at the Senate during the last session of Parliament, and in answer to your suggestion that I should call on him for a refund of $\$ 55$, which you claim he was overpaid, would state, as on previous occasions, in similar cases, that under the Indemnity Act, as now in force, no such interpretation as that which you place upon it can be entertained. As proof of this, let us assume that Senator Edwards had attended as member of the Commons for 30 days, and was then summoned to the Senate, his indemnity for such attendance at the lower House would have been $\$ 300$. Then supposing that after 30 days' attendance at the Senate, the latter would have been prorogued, would I have been justified, under your interpretation of the above referred Act, in allowing him $\$ 1,200$, by taking his attendance at the Commons into consideration? Unless I am much mistaken, I rather think you would be the first to take exception to such ruling. The Act is certainly faulty, and does not meet the present requirements, in many more instances than the one above cited; for instance, the fact of a Senator falling ill just before the commencement of a session and remaining absent till towards the end of the same may cause him a loss of over $\$ 1,000$, whereas, had he fallen ill after being in attendance, if only for the opening day, no such loss would have been incurred. Until the Act is recast, I see no other way but to interpret it strictly in accordance with its wording.

Sir,-Let me ackowledge the receipt of your letter of the 5th ult., with inclosed accounts and copy of resolution of the Internal Economy Commissioners, relative to the certification of certain accounts of the House of Commons. In reply, I have to state that, in my opinion, the certificate of Mr. Dubé on the accounts in question and similar accounts charged to the same appropriation, while adding to the strength of the voucher, does not meet the requirements of section 33 of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, which states that it is the officer under whose special charge such part of the public service is who shall certify that the work has been done or the materials supplied, as the case may be, and that the prices are fair and just. The officer in this case must be the Sergeant-at-Arms, indicated by the wording of the vote from which the expenditure is made, viz., 'Sergeant-at-Arms' estimate.' The Rules, Orders, \&c., of the House of Commons (par. 107) also state that the Sergeant-at-Arms shall be responsible for the safe-keeping of the furniture and fittings of the House of Commons, and for the conduct of the messengers and inferior servants of the House.

Whatever other certificate may be required, it is quite certain that that of the Sergeant-at-Arms is necessary as to the receipt of materials or that the services have been performed, as well as to the fairness of the price.

You have overlooked that part of my letter of May 20, as to the necessity of indicating on all of the accounts the particular service for which the expenditure was made, as well as that pointing out the delay in payment of a part of the accounts.

Sir,--In reply to your favour of the 5th instant, asking for the accounts referred to in your letters of July 3 and 21, I beg to say that I return the said accounts herewith.

These accounts have all been approved and certified by the Board of Internal Economy of the House of Commons. As Secretary of the Board I beg to certify to that fact.

I observe that they are initialled by His Honour the Speaker and further certified by myself as Clerk of the House, and by the Superintendent of Messenger Service and Housekceper.

I communicated to you some time since a resolution of the Board of Internal Economy of the House of Commons, adopted on May 13, 1902, to the effect that in the future the purchase of supplies for the Sergeant-at-Arms' Branch of the House of Commons should be made under the direction of Mr. Speaker and the Internal Economy Committee.

By virtue of that resolution, the certificate of the approval and confirmation of these accounts by the Board of Commissioners settles the question as to their propriety. The Honourable the Speaker holds that the expenditures of the House of Commons are not to be regulated by the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, which does not, in his view, apply to the House of Commons. The expenditures of the House are regulated solely by the Acts respecting the House of Commons, which is not to be considered technically as a 'public service' within the meaning of the Revenue and Audit Acts.

The audit of the accounts of the House of Commons by the Auditor General is, I understand, undertaken not by virtue of any parliamentary enactment, but merely
by reason of the recommendation of the Committee of Public Accounts, adopted by the House of Commons in the session of 1880. Previous to that date the Commissioners audited the accounts of the House themselves, or had them audited under their own directions. The transfer of the audit did not, it is contended, affect the power of the Commissioners to direct purchases and payments, to approve and confirm accounts when presented and laid before them. It is, therefore, argued, that these accounts, having been incurred by order of His Honour the Speaker, approved and confirmed by the Board of Internal Economy, should be accepted by the Auditor as correct without further certificates than such as are already appended thereto.

The rule of the House of Commons referred to in your letter of July 3 last past, does not apply to the case. They merely direct that the Sergeant-at-Arms shall be responsible for the safe-keeping of the Mace, furniture and fittings of the House, and for the proper conduct of the messengers and servants.

If the Commissioners of Internal Economy had power to adopt the resolution of May 13, 1903, then they have the power to direct what certificates are necessary for the due authentication of the accounts of the House of Commons.

Sir,-I duly received your letter of the 7th ultimo, in reply to mine of July 3 and 21.

I do not see my way to adopting your view that the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act does not apply to the auditing of the expenditure of the House of Commons, as it does to that of the executive departments of the public service.

The Board of Internal Economy occupies, in my opinion, the position with regard to the House of Commons outlay that the Minister who is at the head of a department does with reference to his department. The Sergeant-at-Arms, as I view it, must take the directions from the Board of Internal Economy as to the goods which he is to purchase, the kind, and the places where he is to buy-in fact, in everything, apparently, except in two respects, that is with reference to whether (1) the goods have been received and (2) the value. With reference to these two points he takes orders from no person. He cannot, with respect to the two points, put the responsibility on anyone else.

With reference to your contention that the Audit Act does not apply, I beg to say that, although it was maintained by Mr. Wicksteed, the late law clerk, that, before the specific action of Parliament in assigning to the Audit Office the duty of auditing the expenditure of Parliament, the Audit Act did not apply to the expenditure of Parliament, I do not think that it was because the view adopted by Mr. Wicksteed was generally taken in Parliament as being at all certain, that the then Speaker moved to have a resolution of Parliament specifically declaring that it should apply.

Then, if it was intended by Parliament that the Audit Act should not apply, it would have been so laid down in the resolution.

The words of the 33 rd section make it quite clear that it is the head of the branch which has the duty of attending to a particular service who is to certify that the goods have been received and that the prices are fair and just. The Sergeant-at-Arms has the messenger staff under his control, and, therefore, the chief messenger. If it had been intended by Parliament that the department should have the right to employ any person who seemed suitable for the service, the official to do the work would not have been determined by the Audit Act.

## House of Commons-Re Fees and Charges on Private Bills.

Sir,-I have received your statement of the receipts and expenditure in connection with Private Bills. The total receipts you show to be $\$ 30,921.57$. of which $\$ 29$,816.12 was credited to $1902-3$, and $\$ 1,105.45$ to 1903-4. You furnished, in March last, a statement of the receipts during February, but none subsequently. In consequence, I am unable to determine what items in your statement belong to 1902-3 and what to 1903-4. Kindly give me the requisite particulars at as early a date as possible.

You show disbursements amounting to $\$ 7,597.48$, but only $\$ 4,649.88$ of this amount is charged up in the accounts of 1902-3, and part of the balance has not yet been charged to 1903-4.

Your statement does not give the date of receipt-information necessary for audit purposes.

I assume that the Printing Bureau furnish statements showing the charges for printing each Bill. These statements should be furnished to this office, as well as the other information required. The counterfoils of the receipts issued should be furnished.

The rules and regulations in reference to the receipt, entry and accounting for public moneys have been established by Treasury Minute (see Audit Report, 1901-2, page A-23).

## The Senate-Re Refund of Fee on Private Bill.

Sm,-The regulations of the Senate in reference to Divorce Bills provide that the fee of $\$ 200$ shall be subject to the order of the House.

Under authority of this regulation, it has been the practice to refund the fee on any Bill not passed during any particular session. It does not seem evident, however, that this regulation went any further.

The resolution of the House passed on April 29 makes no reference that it applies to a fee paid in 1901, and there is nothing to show that the House was cognizant of the point that the fees had not been paid in the current session.

No explanations seem to have been furnished why the refund was not made in 1901.

The usual course followed, when it is desired to refund fees or tolls paid some years previously and which have been trasferred to credit of Consolidated Fund, is to have an item to cover voted by Parliament.

In my letter of the 2nd I had reference to the fees collected during the present session.

I shall be glad to hear from you further on the subject, and, in the meantime, I am holding your application.

Sir,-Replying to your communication of yesterday, received this day, in further reference to the above subjeet, I beg leave to state that there has been no regular practice followed as regards the time for refunding said fees. The resolution of the Senate of the 29th of last month should, perhaps, have mentioned the year in which this Bill was introduced. This office, however, has supplied this deficiency, which, I think, should be sufficient. The mention of Stovel's name fixes the date.

No explanations are required in cases of this kind-it is always agreed to as a matter of right.

The usual course followed is not, as you state, to have an item put in the Estimates to cover the amount to be refunded (see Journals of the House of Commons of 1875, page 170, and 1882, page 207).

I could have paid out the amount in question from moneys received from that source this year, now in my hands, but I considered the course I pursued to be the most regular.

I have no doubt that there are other cases, but these two are sufficient to establish a precedent.

Accounts should be given in support of these charges, and they should be defined more minutely, such as the number of times, the period of employment and the rate of pay.

In regard to the extra cost when snowed up for four days: This happened on the Newfoundland railway, between Port Aux Basques and St. John's, and the $\$ 20$ was expended in obtaining provisions from small farm houses or shanties along the way. It was impossible to get receipts for the different amounts.

In reference to the vehicles at St. John's, it was necessary for Commander Spain to visit all the different shipping offices and government offices at that place, in regard to the chartering of a steamer for the Hudson Bay expedition, and also in connection with the naval reserve, and this amount was expended for cab hire.

The amount of $\$ 12$ was for inspecting the different sealing steamers anchored in St. John's harbour, which occupied three days, and was given to the captain of the steam tug, which was placed at Captain Spain's disposal, as a gratuity to himself and crew for the work done.

In regard to the fur coat: As Captain Spain had to visit St. John's, Newfoundland, in the depth of winter, a journey of about 650 miles over a narrow gauge railway through Newfoundland, it was absolutely necessary that he should be provided with a fur coat, and the minister approved of this. The coat is now in possession of the department.

The fact that the department considers a charge of $\$ 10$ for four days at Halifax a reasonable charge for board is not sufficient evidence that it was paid. The usual proof of payment should be given.

In regard to the several charges for which you say Commander Spain found it impossible to obtain vouchers, I beg to point out that the absence of such vouchers does not obviate the necessity of giving accurate details. I presume Commander Spain kept a daily record of the amounts he spent for provisions, \&c., while on the snow-bound train in Newfoundland, and of any other small expenses of this nature. This record, certified by Commander Spain and approved by yourself, should be sent me. I am still of opinion that the charge of $\$ 100$ for a fur coat is not a proper charge on the appropriation, and should be refunded by Com. Spain. I would remind you I have not received a receipted voucher for this payment. May I ask what disposition you purpose making of this coat? Why do you keep it in the department instead of disposing of it at once?

Sir,-I find that, so far, in the current fiscal year there has been no charge made on the votes for the following services :-

Wages of crew and maintenance of Lurcher's Shoal Lightship ; construction and equipment of a steel lightship for Lurcher's Shoal ; maintenance of buoy service between Montreal and Kingston ; salary of U. P. Boucher, Assistant Engineer in Charge of Aids to Navigation between Platon and Montreal ; additional aids to navigation
generally on St. Lawrence route, including the purchase of a steamer for tidal and surveying purposes.

As the vote for construction of lighthouses is overdrawn to a considerable amount, I presume some payments have been made from it which properly belong to one of these appropriations. I shall be glad if you will have this matter looked into and cause instructions to be issued to the clerks of your department concerned, so that in future payments may be made in the first instance from the proper appropriations.

Sir,-I have to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 30th ultimo, stating that you find that so far in the current fiscal year there has been no charge made on the votes for the following services :-

Wages of crew and maintenance of Lurcher Shoal Lightship ; construction and equipment of steel lightship for Lurcher Shoal ; maintenance of buoy service between Montreal and Kingston ; salary of U. P. Boucher, Assistant Engineer in Charge of Aids to Navigation between Platon and Montreal ; additional aids to navigation generally on the St . Lawrence route, including the purchase of a steamer for tidal and surveying purposes.

And, in reply, I am to inform you, first, with reference to the wages of crew and maintenance of Lurcher Shoal Lightship and the equipment of a steel lightship, that no amount has yet been paid, as the contract for the building of a lightship has only lately been completed with the Polson Iron Works, of Toronto. The lightship is now under construction.

In respect to the maintenance of buoy service between Montreal and Kingston, I may say that after the main estimates of last year were presented to Parliament, the Department of Railways and Canals transferred their buoy steamer Scout and their gas buoys, showing the approaches to the canals, to this department, and the supplementary vote was asked for their mainenance. As this service is part of the maintenance of lights and buoy service of the Dominion, the supplementary vote in question was added to the main vote, as it was not considered advisable to open a separate account for the buoy service between Montreal and Kingston.

With reference to the salary of Mr. U. P. Boucher, Assistant Engineer in Charge of the Aids to Navigation between Platon and Montreal, I am to inform you that previously Mr. Boucher's salary was charged to Maintenance of Lights for Quebec, but as it was found advisable to appoint him at a stated salary, an Order in Council issued, and his salary was voted. This amount also was added to the vote for Maintenance of Lights.

With reference to the additional amount for aids to navigation generally, I am to inform you that after the regular vote for construction of lights, which was placed in the main estimates, it was found that other aids were required, viz. : automatic and gas buoys,, tank for gas, construction of lighthouses and lighthouse piers, and a supplementary vote was asked for. As this amount was for the same purpose, viz., construction, the amount was added to the regular construction vote.

With reference to the purchase of the steamer included in the amounts, this is also for aids to navigation, as the ship is intended for tidal service in the St. Lawrence from Quebec to Belle Isle.

If you will refer to the main estimates, presented to Parliament for the year 19034, page 61, for Maintenance and Repairs to Lighthouses, and also for Construction of Lighthouses, you will find the full amounts voted last year in the proper column, showing how the several rotes are to be applied, and I may add that all the expenditure in question was discussed and anticipated by council and the amount voted was to cover same.

Sir,-I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 3rd instant with reference to the votes in the Supply Bill of the current fiscal year, to which I called your attention in my letter of the 30th ultimo, against which no charges have yet been made.

These votes are separate and distinct provisions made by Parliament for specific purposes, and as such they must be administered by the department having charge of them under the authority of the Governor in Council.

It is not discretionary with the department to treat them separately or as parts of ether votes; the vote, for instance, for Maintenance of Buoy Service between Montreal and Kingston is as distinct from the vote for Maintenance of Lighthouses as the appropriation for Ocean and River Service is from that for Lighthouse and Coast Service.

It is necessary, therefore, that the transfers I have asked to be made should be applied for at once, so that the appropriations against which several payments are now being illegally charged may not be overdrawn. One of these appropriations-that for Construction of Lighthouses-is now overdrawn to a considerable amount, so that I shall not be able to certify to a renewal of your credit until the several entries causing this overcharge have been properly adjusted.

While dealing with this matter, I beg to bring to your notice your letter of the 11th ult., in which you say that certain transfers affecting appropriations covered by your letter of credit, to which I had previously called your attention, would be applied for, and to point out that the necessary application to enable me to make these transfers has not yet reached this office.

As the vouchers sent me in support of your expenditure during the current fiscal year are now being arranged under the headings of the various votes under the control of your department, I shall be obliged if you will give this matter your early attention. Any further delay in making these transfers will be a source of much inconvenience and trouble in the examination and audit of the accounts.

## Re Steamboat Inspection: Refuna to Hon. Mr. Farquharson.

Dept. of Marine and Fisheries, Ottawa, June 9, 1903.
Sir,-Application has been made to the department by the Hon. Mr. Farquharson, M.P., of Prince Edward Island, for a refund of steamboat inspection ducs paid on the steamship Coila as far back as 1892 and 1889.

The Coila was registered in the United Kingdom, and in these years steamboat inspection laws were not enforced on steamships registered outside of Canada, and were only applicable to Canadian registered vessels. Under misconception the steamboat inspector collected dues for these two years, amounting in all to $\$ 68$.

The department is satisfied that these amounts were illegally imposed upon the steamer, and considers that the amount should be refunded to Mr. Farquharson. I will be obliged to you if you will inform me whether, in your opinion, that the amount will have to be voted in Parliament, or, as the amoust is so small, could you allow it to be paid out of the appropriations for the current year.

Farquharson for a refund of steamboat inspection dues, I beg to state for your information that in my letter of the 9 th instant, I mentioned to you that the steamboat inspection fees for which Mr. Farquharson is seeking a refund were illegally collected, that is to say, there was no authority at that time to impose fees upon steamships registered outside of Canada. This is the ground on which Mr. Farquharson claims a refund.

In regard to your second question as to who collected the fees referred to, and when they were deposited to the credit of the Receiver General, I will have to make inquiry and inform you later on.

In regard to your third question, I have to state that the section under which fees are at present collected from Canadian steamships, is section 37 of the Act, that in regard to collecting fees from steamships not registered in Canada, the collections are made under an Order in Council based on the provisions of subsection 3 of section 3 of the Act.

## Re Steamboat Inspection: Abolition of Fees.

Dept. of Marine and Fisheries, Ottawa, Oct. 7, 1903.

Sir,-An Act passed by both Houses of Parliament this session and assented to on the 13 th August last, abrogated the imposition of steamboat inspection fees and dues.

At the time the Bill became law a large proportion of the steamboat owners had paid their inspection fees, and the question is now under consideration as to whether the fees paid since the 1st January last should be refunded. I think it as well to consult with you as to how the refunds can be made with as little trouble to both departments as may be possible. Heretofore, in the case of a refund of sick mariners' dues it has been the practice of the department to require from the claimant the receipts which he received from the Collector of Customs at the time of the payment.

In the case, however, of steamboat inspection fees in question, this department has a complete record of the fees received; the names of the steamboats and the amount which each steamboat paid.

Under these circumstances, it appears to me that it might be considered unnecessary to require the production of the receipts held by the steamboat owners when we have already in the department complete evidence as to the payment of the fees.

There is another point on which I must wait for your recommendation, namely, whether it will be sufficient for this department to furnish you with a list of the refunds to be made, and having done so, will you issue the individual cheques or will you place a lump sum at the disposal of this department to issue the cheques in payment of the refunds.

I will be happy to hear from you in the matter as to what would best suit the convenience of both departments.

Sir,- I am in receipt of your letter of the 7th inst., in reference to the amendment to the Steamboat Inspection Act passed during the present session, and stating that the question is now under consideration as to whether the fees paid since the 1st January last should be refunded.

The Act was assented to August 13 last, and as there is no provision in it for the refund of fees paid since January 1st, no such refund can now be made. Any fee, abrogated by the Act, paid since August 13, should, of course, be refunded. If there are any such you might send an application to this office, giving details.

You will, of course, have noted that the amended Act only abrogates the inspection fee.

The annual tonnage duty fixed by the Governor in Council, not exceeding 10 cents for every gross ton, is retained.

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With reference to your statement that, as there is no provision in the new Act for the refund of fees paid since last January no refund can now be made, I have to mention I was under the impression that, although no provision is made in the new Act for refunding the fees referred to, the fees could be refunded under the authority contained in the 78th section of the Audit Act, and I will be obliged to you if you will further communicate with me on that point.

With regard to your statement that the amended Act only abrogates the inspection fees, and that the annual tonnage duty on the tonnage of steamboats is still retained, I have to state that I do not quite understand how you arrive at the conclusion, namely, that the new Act does not abrogate all taxes imposed on steamboats by the old Act, and I will be pleased to hear further from you on that point also, as the section was designed to abrogate the tonnage duty and the inspection fees.

You are correct in stating that the department has entered into an agreement with the Richelieu and Ontario Navigation Company to pay a bulk sum for wharfage to the Government. Copy of the agreement will be sent you.

So far as the department is aware, there are very few vessels or steamers calling at the wharfs mentioned in your letter, with the exception of the Richelieu and Ontario Navigation Company's steamers.

The agent of this department was instructed to procure the returns from the wharfingers, so that they might be sent you, but it appears that he has had some difficuily in getting anything further than letters.

The reason for making an agreement with the Richelieu and Ontario Navigation Company, to pay a bulk sum for wharfage, was due to the fact that many of the wharfingers between Quebec and Chicoutimi, on the Saguenay river and the places mentioned in your letter, are agents for the steamboat company, and it was considered in the public interest to make this agreement.

Sin,-The usual practice is to allow wharfingers a commission on their collections, usually 25 per cent. The wharfinger at Carleton, P.Q., was, it seems, allowed $\$ 50$ in lieu of commission. During the fiscal year 1902-3 the total collections only amounted to $\$ 16.11$, and your agent at Quebec paid him the balance of $\$ 3.89$ to make up $\$ 50$ out of receipts sent him by other wharfingers.

Harbour masters are allowed fixed amounts instead of commissions. In the greater number of cases the allowance is greater than the collections, but in no case is the difference made up.

I have to ask you on what authority the payment was made to the wharfinger at Carleton.

In any case, your agent should not have made it. If it is the policy of the department that wharfingers with a fixed amount allowed for their services shall be paid that amount, even though their receipts do not amount to the allowance, then the payment should be made by the department, either through its letter of credit or by direct application.

The positions of the various buoys she could inspect from time to time after being placed by the present contractors. This service would probably cost about $\$ 12,000$ per annum.

The steamer is, however, not very strong either in hull or machinery, is very slow, and no doubt small for the purpose. She was built in 1863, purchased by the department in 1884 for $\$ 15,000$. Since then about $\$ 6,000$ has been spent upon her hull and about $\$ 1,000$ on her engine and boiler.

Sir,-The circumstances in connection with my letter of February 17, 1903, placing a value of $\$ 7,000$ upon the old steamer 'Bayfield' are as follows:-

On February 9, Messrs. John Harrison \& Sons Co., Limited, wrote enquiring if the department wished to sell the old boat. On the 12 th you requested me to report as to the advisability of disposing of the boat and as to her value.

I could not recommend holding on to her, and I had no large idea of her value, but believed in asking a good price for her. I telegraphed Captain MacGregor and Mr. Nisbet, the engineer, for valuations. The former answered: ' $\$ 7,000$; can get $\$ 5,000$ cash for her here' (in Goderich). Mr. Nisbet valued her at $\$ 4,000$ (telegram and letter attached). I therefore recommended the larger sum, as a basis upon which to open negotiations, but I never expected to realize anything like it.

When Mr. Harrison was induced to enlarge his first offer to $\$ 3,250 \mathrm{I}$ asked and was given leave to telegraph Captain Mactiregor and a couple of other parties, who. I thought, might wish to purchase. The captain replied that the parties he had in view were closing a deal for a smaller boat. No answers were received to the other telegrams.

As the demand for boats of the 'Bayfield's' age was not brisk, the opening of navigation was close at hand, and if the boat was left tied up she would, at her age, rapidly deteriorate and would require a caretaker, I thought it in the best interests of the department to accept what was offered by a responsible firm.

## Re Sick Mariners' Fund.

Dept. of Marine and Fisheries, Ottawa, February 12, 1903.
Sir,--I have the honour to state that an application has been made by Messrs. Wm. Thomson \& Company, of St. John, N.B., for a refund of $\$ 15.22$, paid by their SS. Unison, at the port of St. John, N.B., on the 16th day of December last, in error, on account of Sick Mariners' dues. The facts of the case appear to be as follows :-

The SS. Unison arrived at the port of Sydney, C.B., on or about the 9th of December last, anchored at that port, discharged her cargo, and consequently had Sick Mariners' dues collected from her. She then continued her voyage to St. John, N.B., in ballast, for the purpose of taking in a return cargo, and the Collector of Customs at that port, overlooking the fact that her arrival at the port of St. John was only the completion of her voyage, imposed the Sick liariners' tax the sccond time, and collected it on the 16th of December last.

As the action of the Collector at the port of St. John was illegal, the owners of the vessel have applied for a refund, as the law only requires a vessel to pay the tax once on a voyage.

You will find the amount collected at the port of Sydney, C.B., on the 18th of December last, deposit receipt No. 708, from the Royal Bank of Canada, sent you in the Minor Revenue Statement of this department, No. 10, December 29, 1902.

You will find the amount collected at St. John, N.B., on the 16th day of December last, deposit receipt No. 317, dated 31st December, 1902, from the Bank of Montreal, Minor Revenue Statement of this department No. 11, dated 5th of February, 1903.

Will you kindly send me a cheque for the amount collected at St. John, N. B., namely, $\$ 15.22$ ?

I inclose you the two receipts, dated St. John and Sydney respectively, which kindly return for the use of the ship.

## Re Modus Vivendi.

SIR,-I have your application for a refund of $\$ 132$ to Solomon Jacobs, master of the United States fishing vessel Alice M. Jacobs, the fee having been collected in error, the vessel being a steam fishing vessel.

The Act 55-56 Vict., chap. 3, authorizing the issuance of licenses to United States vessels, does not specify that licenses shall not be issued to steam vessels.

Sir,-I have your letter pointing out that the Act 55-56 Vietoria, chapter 3, authorizing the issue of licenses to United States vessels, does not specify that licenses shall not issue to steam vessels.

I may say that the department does not issue licenses to United States vessels generally, but to 'United States fishing ressels.' It is true the Act does not specifically exclude steamers; but it has been the strict policy of this department to refuse to recognize this class of vessels as being contemplated as fishing vessels under the convention of 1818, under the provisions of which these special licenses are being issued as a matter of grace to these vessels, and I may add that it is the intention of the government to continue to so construe that treaty.

Apart entirely from the question of policy, there is nothing to compel the issue of a license where it is deemed advisable to withhold it, and many United States fishing vessels which would otherwise be eligible to licenses, are debarred by being 'blacklisted' for offences and persistent attempts to defeat the Canadian laws and regulations.

In the present instance, Captain Jacobs is an old offender, to whom no concessions whatever would be granted, and he succeeded, after three refusals, in securing this license from a Collector at an out-of-the-way port, through entire want of bona fides, and the license has been formally cancelled by the Minister, which necessitates the return of the fee.
