



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### Auditor General's Report

It will be seen from the summaries of the Appropriation Accounts on pages b-4 and b-2 that the gross amount voted to meet the estimated expenditure of the fiscal year ended March 31st, 1923 was \$334,332,595.21 and the expenditure actually incurred under this provision was \$280,725.821.55. In addition to this amount there was expended during the fiscal year, under the authority of Special Statutes, \$179,916,856.35, making the gross expenditure for the fiscal year under review \$460,642,677.90.

Under Section 61 of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, the Auditor General, in reporting for the information of the House of Commons the result of the examination of the appropriation accounts, is directed to call attention to

every case in which:-

- (a) Cheques have been issued without his certificate;
- (b) a grant has been exceeded;
- (c) money received by a department from other sources than the grants for the year to which the account relates has not been applied or accounted for according to the direction of Parliament;
- (d) in which a sum charged against a grant is not supported by proof of payment;
- (e) a payment so charged did not occur within the period of the account, or was for any other reason not properly chargeable against the grant or was in any way irregular;
  - (a) No cheques for the issue of which direct application had been made to the Auditor General were issued during the year without the required certificate; but it must be borne in mind in connection with the issue of cheques on Parliamentary grants that the cheques issued under letters of credit authorized in favour of the proper departmental officers by the Minister of Finance on the recommendation of the Auditor General exceed in number and amount the cheques issued under direct application to the Auditor General. The Auditor General has no direct control over the issue of letter of credit cheques. These cheques come to his notice in the first instance when he receives the monthly applications from the departments concerned to repay the Banks named therein the total of the cheques issued during the previous month, and later on, in more detailed form, when the supporting vouchers are received by him for audit. Letters of Credit are authorized by the Minister of Finance under the provisions of Section 40 of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act and the practice at present prevailing in respect of payments from public funds has been in effect since the Act came into force. The spending departments must assume full responsibility for the issue of their letters of credit cheques and the expenditure to which they apply.

- (b) Grants to the number of seventeen were exceeded during the year, the total excess being \$368,783.39. It will be necessary, as in previous years, to obtain the sanction of Parliament for this excess expenditure.
- (c) Section 35, Subsection 1, of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act directs that all public moneys from whatever source of revenue derived shall be deposited to the credit of the account of the Minister of Finance and Receiver General. There have been some instances during the year in which the proceeds of the sale of surplus stores, instead of being deposited to the credit of the Receiver General, were used by the departments concerned to pay certain items of the expenditure under their control; thereby, in effect, increasing, without the authority of Parliament, the grants provided in the Supply Bill for the services so affected. I have ealled the attention of the respective departments to this improper use of the revenue and pointed out to them the obligatory provisions of the Statute. The salaries of rural postmasters have, under long established practice, been paid direct from revenue, the net revenue only being deposited to the credit of the Receiver General.
- (d e) There is nothing of importance to report under these two headings.

The objections and criticisms of any importance that were deemed necessary in respect of any items of expenditure included in this report will be found in the correspondence published in connection with the details of expenditure under the various department headings.

#### Audit of Stores

A test audit of the stores at the Printing Bureau was made during the year and with the exception of some minor differences between the stock actually on hand and the quantities called for by the stores ledgers the result of the audit was, on the whole, satisfactory.

An audit was also made by a chief examiner of this office of the stores and expenditure in the Yukon Territory in accordance with the provisions of the Yukon Act. His audit revealed a shortage in the liquor supplies on hand at one of the depots to an amount of over \$2,000. This shortage was reported to the Gold Commissioner and I have been informed that the full amount involved has

since been made good by the responsible vendor.

During the summer months a chief examiner was sent to the western provinces to make a test audit of the accounts kept at the principal branch offices of the Departments of Indian Affairs, Interior, Immigration and Colonization and Customs and Excise. Correspondence arising from his report on the stores, revenue receipts and trust accounts under the control of the Department of Indian Affairs is published in this report after the detailed statement of expenditure given in Part I.

### GRANTS FOR SPECIFIC AMOUNTS

Grants of this nature are authorized either by special statutes or by specific items in the Supply Bill. Occasionally grants are authorized by Orders in Council from votes for general purposes.

#### SESSIONAL PAPER No. 1

The expenditure under these grants, as a general rule, is not audited in detail by the Auditor General, so that he is not in a position to report to the House of Commons the final disposition made of the moneys so voted or authorized. All he may do in the way of audit is to satisfy himself that the amount of the grant has been voted or otherwise authorized and the cheques have been made payable to the proper persons.

There are some exceptions in which grants authorized by Parliament are subject to audit in detail by the Auditor General, as, for instance, the annual


grant of \$150,000 to the Ottawa Improvement Commission.

- (c) de l'argent reçu par un département, d'autres sources que les crédits de l'année à laquelle le compte se rapporte, n'a pas été employé ou inscrit dans les comptes suivant les directions du Parlement;
- (d) une somme imputée sur un crédit n'est pas appuyée de la preuve du paiement;
- (c) un paiement ainsi inscrit n'a pas été effectué pendant la période dont il est rendu compte ou, pour toute autre raison, ne pouvait pas convenablement être imputé sur l'octroi, ou était irrégulier de quelque manière que ce soit:
  - (a) Aucun chèque dont l'émission a été directement demandée à l'Auditeur général n'a été émis pendant l'année sans les certificats requis; mais il faut se rappeler, à propos de l'émission des chèques sur les crédits parlementaires, que les chèques émis en vertu de lettres de crédit autorisées, en faveur des hauts fonctionnaires attitrés, par le ministre des Finances, sur la recommandation de l'Auditeur général, dépassent, comme nombre et comme somme, les chèques émis en vertu d'une demande directe à l'Auditeur général. Celui-ci n'a aucun contrôle direct sur l'émission des chèques de lettres de crédit. Il ne connaît l'existence de ces chèques que lorsqu'il reçoit les demandes mensuelles des départements concernés de rembourser aux banques désignées la somme totale des chèques émis pendant le mois précédent et, plus tard, sous une forme plus détaillée, lorsque les pièces justificatives lui parviennent. lettres de crédit sont autorisées par le ministre des Finances en vertu des dispositions de l'article 40 de la Loi du revenu consolidé et de l'audition, et la pratique actuelle au sujet des paiements effectués à même les fonds publics est en vigueur depuis que la Loi a pris effet. Les ministères doivent prendre la pleine responsabilité de l'émission de leurs chèques de lettres de crédit et de la dépense à laquelle ils se rapportent.

- (b) Dix-sept crédits ont été dépassés, pendant l'exercice, d'une somme totale de \$368,783.38. Il faudra, comme par les années passées, obtenir du Parlement la sanction de cette dépense supplémentaire.
- (c) L'article 35, paragraphe 1, de la Loi du revenu consolidé et de l'audition stipule que tous les deniers publies, de quelque source qu'ils proviennent, doivent être déposés au crédit du compte du ministre des Finances et du Receveur général. Il est arrivé, au cours de l'année, que dans certains cas les produits des ventes de surplus de magasins, au lieu d'être déposés au crédit du Receveur général, ont été employés par les départements intéressés à payer certains item de la dépense qui relève du contrôle de ces départements, de sorte que ces départements ont ainsi, de fait, augmenté, sans l'autorisation du Parlement, les crédits autorisés par le bill des Subsides pour les services en question. J'ai attiré l'attention de chacun de ces départements sur cet emploi irrégulier des recettes de même que sur les dispositions obligatoires de la loi. Depuis longtemps déjà les appointements des directeurs de la poste rurale ont été payés directement à même les recettes, les recettes nettes sculement étant déposées au crédit du Receveur général.
- (d i) H n'y a rien de bien important à relever relativement à ces deux item.

Les objections et les critiques quelque peu importantes que nous avons eru devoir faire touchant les item de la dépense se trouvent contenues dans la correspondance publice dans ce rapport et qui a trait à l'exposé détaillé de la dépense sous la rubrique des différents départements.

#### INVENTAIRES DES MAGASINS

On a fait, au cours de l'année, un inventaire de contrôle des magasins de l'Imprimerie Nationale et, réserve faite de quelque légères différences dans les quantités des marchandises en magasins et les quantités indiquées dans les livres des magasins, le résultat, dans l'ensemble, a été satisfaisant.

L'examinateur en chef de ce bureau a aussi fait un inventaire des magasins et une vérification de la dépense du territoire du Yukon en conformité des dispositions de la Loi du Yukon. Cet inventaire a mis à jour le fait qu'à l'un des dépôts il manquait pour environ \$2,000 de liqueurs. Ce déficit a été porté à la connaissance du Commissaire de l'or et j'ai appris que le montant en question

avait depuis été remboursé par le vendeur responsable.

Au cours des mois d'été, on a envoyé un examinateur en chef dans les provinces de l'Ouest dans le but de faire une vérification de contrôle des comptes tenus aux principaux bureaux-succursales du département des Affaires indiennes, et des ministères de l'Intérieur, de l'Immigration et de la Colonisation et de la Douaue et de l'Aceise. La correspondance qui a suivi le rapport de cet examinateur sur les magasins, les récépissés des recettes et les comptes en fiducie relevant du contrôle du département des Affaires indiennes se trouvent publiés dans ce rapport à la suite de l'état détaillé de la dépense que l'on trouvera à la Partie I.

#### CRÉDITS POUR DES SOMMES DÉTERMINÉES

Les crédits de ce genre sont autorisés soit par une législation spéciale, soit par un item particulier dans le bill des subsides. Il arrive parfois que des sommes sont autorisées par des arrêtés du conseil à même les crédits pour fins générales.

#### DOC. PARLEMENTAIRE No 1

En règle générale les dépenses faites à même ces crédits ne font pas l'objet d'une vérification détaillée de la part de l'Auditeur général, de sorte que celui-ci ne se trouve pas en mesure de l'aire rapport à la Chambre des Communes sur l'emploi définitif que l'on a fait des deniers ainsi votés ou autorisés. Tout ce qu'il lui est loisible de faire dans le sens d'une vérification c'est de se rendre compte que le montant du crédit a été voté ou autorisé et que les chèques ont été faits à l'ordre des personnes qui y avaient droit.

Il se trouve certaines exceptions où les crédits autorisés par le Parlement font l'objet d'une vérification détaillée de la part de l'Auditeur général, ainsi, par exemple, le crédit annuel de \$150,000 à la Commission d'Embellissement

d'Ottawa.

ÉTAT DES DÉPENSES POUR FRAIS DE COUR, PUBLICITÉ ET IMPRESSION

Maintenant que le travail extraordinaire auquel nous avons dû nous astreindre durant les années de guerre a quelque peu diminué d'intensité, j'ai cru bon d'insérer de nouveau dans ce rapport les sommaires sous les rubriques précitées et dont l'omission dans les rapports des dernières années a donné lieu à un grand nombre de demandes de renseignements à ce bureau.



Mr. Van Bruyssel should, it seems to me, be called upon to render an account showing he has incurred expenses to the extent of \$2,000 on the business assigned to him by the Minister of Agriculture.

Dear Sir,—Referring to your letter of 20th instant, with regard to Mr. van Bruyssel's claim for \$160.11, representing an amount expended for special travelling expenses and cables in connection with enquiries which were prosecuted by Mr. van Bruyssel in Europe under the instructions of your Department I have considered the Order in Council of 30th September, 1921, and the correspondence submitted, and I observe that as to the services described in the Order in Council the Minister was authorized to pay Mr. van Bruyssel the sum of \$1,000 as an advance in payment of expenses to be incurred, and upon the completion of the work such further sum as in the opinion of the Minister might be found reasonable, not to exceed \$2,000 for all services rendered; probably the intention of the Order in Council was that the payments thereby authorized should not exceed \$2,000 in all; but it should be observed that the amount of compensation within this limit was to be determined by the Minister, and that the enquiry for which the expenditure was authorized related to the flax industry. It would appear that the charge of \$160.11 now in question was incurred under the special instructions of your department with relation to the sale of horses in Holland, and for cables. I doubt that an enquiry with respect to horses was within the scope of the Order in Council, and moreover I see that Mr. van Bruyssel quotes a letter from you from which I infer that \$147.26 has already been paid and appropriated on this account and is thus out of question. There remains therefore only the sum of \$12.85 for cables, which I would allow, and therefore I conclude that Mr. van Bruvssel is entitled to receive the balance of the amount allowed by the Minister under the Order in Council, plus the charge for cables.

DEAR SIR,—Referring to your letter of the 8th instant asking for information in regard to certain accounts in favour of R. W. Zavitz of the Live Stock Branch of this Department, I have to advise you that Mr. Zavitz joined the service of the Live Stock Branch in December, 1919, as a Poultry Inspector, in connection with Record of Performance and was stationed at Guelph, Ontario. During the summer of 1920 with the growth of the work he was brought to Ottawa and gave part time to supervision of this work. Later in 1921 when it became evident that the work was going to assume still larger proportions, he was stationed in Ottawa and has spent more and more of his time here coincident with the growth of the work, until during the last year he has spent nearly all his time in Ottawa.

The establishment of a position to be known as Supervisor of Record of Performance is under consideration, and it is the intention to ask the Civil Service Commission to establish such a class in the near future. In that event it is quite probable that Mr. Zavitz would receive the appointment since he is the officer directly in line for such a position, which would, of course, be filled by

promotion, and in the meantime it is the intention to continue to pay part of his expenses while in Ottawa, the allowance for same not to exceed \$30 per month, unless, of course, instructions are received from you to the contrary.

You add that "in the meantime, it is the intention to continue to pay part of his expenses while in Ottawa, the allowance for same not to exceed \$30 per month, unless, of course, instructions are received from you to the contrary."

I would point out to you that from the date upon which he established residence in Ottawa, no such allowance could be legally paid to Mr. Zavitz without the authority of the Governor in Council. An Order in Council should

now be obtained covering all such payments made or proposed.

#### Payment of Overtime to Surveyor of Customs at Halifax

(Note.—For beginning of this correspondence see A.G.'s Report, 1921-22, page D-158)

Department of Customs and Excise, Ottawa, December 20, 1922.

Sir,—I am in receipt of your letter of the 6th instant, in which you enquire respecting the services rendered by Mr. William Gleeson, Surveyor at the Port of Halifax, for which the Department allows him \$1 per day as overtime pay.

In reply, you are advised that this allowance is made to Mr. Gleeson for services which he is required to render outside of his regular hours. In his capacity as Surveyor, he has charge of the outside staff. This includes supervision of the officers on duty at wharves and railway stations, examining passengers' baggage and checking cargoes. A number of these officers are on duty before 8 o'clock a.m. and after 6 p.m., for which they receive overtime pay.

The Surveyor is required to visit the various places after regular hours, to see that the work is being properly performed and give advice when necessary. It is exceedingly important that the work at these places be properly supervised and in doing this, the Surveyor simply continues on duty before and after his regular hours, as may be necessary. He has not been required to show the hours served as overtime each month, as they are not regular. The intention is that the Surveyor should visit the officers on overtime duty at irregular intervals. In this way it is considered that a better service is maintained.

The overtime services of the supervising officer may not exceed an hour on one day, while another day's duty may require several hours. The Department considers that Mr. Gleeson is receiving a moderate sum for extra service which requires much experience and carries with it considerable responsibility.

# Payment of Amount due by Crown to other than the Persons, to whom it is Actually Due.

Department of Customs and Excise, Ottawa, June 22, 1923.

Re Green vs. Wardell

Sin,—You will remember that on April 6, 1922, the Department made application to you for the issue of a cheque in favour of J. E. Gillis, Green's Solicitor, for an amount of \$200, same to be chargeable to Casual Revenue. On the 19th of the same month you advised that according to an informal opinion received from the Department of Justice, moneys due by the Crown were not subject to attachment by garnishee proceedings and that any moneys due Wardell by this Department were, therefore, payable to Wardell himself, only, or to such person as may have been legally appointed by him as his attorney to receive such moneys.

You subsequently advised under date of Sept. 20th ultimo that Mr. Gillis had obtained from Mr. Justice Tweedie of the Supreme Court of Alberta an order authorizing the Sheriff of the District of Macleod to receive the money due by the Government to Wardell and to give a valid receipt for the same. A duly certified copy of that order was received in the Department and is still on file here. You stated, however, that before payment could be authorized by you you would have to obtain from the Justice Department an opinion as to whether or not this order is sufficient authority to pay to the Sheriff of Macleod

as receiver, the moneys due by this Department to Wardell.

The matter was taken up with the Department of Justice by Mr. Gillis himself and on October 20th ultimo the Deputy Minister of Justice advised him that his view of the matter was that Wardell could not have recovered this amount from the Crown although the Crown has apparently the power to make a grant, but whether the power should be exercised in this case for the benefit of the creditors is a question to be determined by the Government upon the report of the responsible Minister who is not the Minister of Justice. I have, therefore, submitted the matter to the Honourable the Minister of this Department and I am directed to advise you that he has no objection to payment of the moneys due Wardell by the Department being made to the Sheriff of Macleod as receiver for J. H. Green, in accordance with the order made by Mr. Justice Tweedie. I am enclosing herewith a duly certified copy of the order and would, therefore, request that you issue a cheque for \$400—same to be charged to Casual Revenue—to the order of A. B. McDonald, Sheriff of the Judicial District of Macleod, Alberta, as receiver for Green.

In the last paragraph of your communication of Sept. 20th ultimo you requested the Department to explain the discrepancy between the amount of \$400 as mentioned in the order made by Mr. Justice Tweedie and the amount of \$200 mentioned in the previous correspondence as being due Wardell by the Department. The amount payable to Wardell is really \$400 and it was apparently in error that an amount of \$200 was mentioned in the previous correspond-

ence.

Sir,—I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 22nd inst. (No. 3208) with further reference to the case of Green vs. Wardell, and asking for the issue of a cheque for \$400, charged against Casual Revenue, in favour of A. B. McDonald, Sheriff of the Judicial District of Macleod, Alberta, as receiver for Green.

In your letter, you state that the matter was taken up with the Department of Justice by Mr. Gillis, Green's Solicitor, and that on October 20th, last, the Deputy Minister of Justice advised him that in his opinion "Wardell could not have recovered this amount from the Crown although the Crown has apparently the power to make and grant, but whether this power should be exercised in this case for the benefit of the creditors is a question to be determined by the Government upon the report of the responsible Minister."

Before I can definitely act in this matter, it will be necessary for me to have a copy of the opinion furnished Mr. Gillis by the Deputy Minister of

Justice, which, no doubt, has been communicated to you. At the same time, I am of opinion that your application cannot be passed by me, without the special authority of an Order in Council. While such Order in Council would have been required by me in any case, the necessity of such appears to have been recognized by the Deputy Minister of Justice who advises that the question of the exercise of the power to make and grant in this case for the benefit of the creditors is one to be determined by the Government (that is the Governor

in Council) upon the report of the responsible Minister.

The original claim in this case was for \$200 being Wardell's share of the award in Excise Seizure No. 124; a cheque was drawn in Wardell's favour for this amount which cheque was later on deposited to Casual Revenue as Mr. Wardell could not be located. This \$200 is, as far as I know, the only amount connected with this ease which lies at the credit of Casual Revenue, and, consequently, is the only amount that can at any time be paid from that account. The other amount of \$200, for which claim is now made, is, I understand, Wardell's share of the award in another Excise scizure, although this is not shown in any of your letters. No cheque appears to have been drawn for the payment of this second amount of \$200, which would appear therefore to have formed part of your Excise Scizures revenue; if such is the case, it can only be paid from Excise Seizures if paid at all.

I would point out that the judgment in favour of Mr. Green against Wardell was for \$250, with costs taxed at \$72.30, a total of \$322.30. This being the case, I would ask why it is proposed to hand over the whole amount of \$400 to

the Sheriff of Macleod, as receiver for Green.

The certified copy of the order of the court for payment to the Sheriff of the amounts due Wardell by your department, which you state you were enclosing with your letter, did not accompany that letter.

# Exemption of Provincial Commissions from Payment of Sales Tax

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE, OTTAWA, March 17, 1922.

Sir,—I have the honour to refer to your letter of the 21st January last, with accompanying copy of letter from Mr. Fred F. Mathers, Deputy Attorney General of Nova Scotia, in which two questions are raised, namely:

(1) Whether the Special War Revenue Act, 1915, as amended, in its application to the Crown as represented by a province, is constitutionally valid; and

(2) What is the extent of the liability to sales tax of the Nova Scotia Power Commission, which was incorporated by chap. 6 of the Statutes of Nova Scotia, 1919, entitled "The Power Commission Act"?

Mr. Mathers makes two submissions. First, he says that the British North America Act provides by sec. 125 that no lands or property belonging to Canada or to any of the provinces shall be subject to taxation, and that the sales tax, though it may not technically come within the letter of this provision, certainly comes within the spirit of it.

Secondly, he says that the Commission is a corporation, but that its members are appointed by the Crown and hold office during pleasure; that the Commission does not exist for the purpose of profit; that it has no capital stock, and that it is really acting for and on behalf of the Crown and should be entitled to the same exemption, in respect of sales tax, as the Crown as represented by the Province is entitled to.

He submits that the sales tax is not intended to apply to His Majesty as represented by any province, except where goods are purchased or imported by

His Majesty, as so represented, for the purpose of resale.

Your Department, it is stated, has ruled that the Commission is liable to the sales tax in respect of goods sold to or imported by the Commission whether for its own consumption or for resale. You ask for my ruling on the questions which Mr. Mathers has raised.

As to No. 1: I have to say that the recent decision of Sir Walter Cassels, President of the Exchequer Court, in the Attorney General of British Columbia vs. the Attorney General of Canada, is an authority for the validity of the sales tax in its application to the importation of goods by or on behalf of the Crown in the right of any province; and, in my opinion, the tax is equally valid in its application to sales and deliveries of goods made within the province to

the Crown in the right of the province for the purpose of resale.

As to No. 2: On consideration of the provisions of The Power Commission Act, I am of the opinion that the Nova Scotia Power Commission is a public utility corporation existing only under the appointment of the Crown as represented by the Province, and, with respect to all of its more important operations, subject to the authority and control of the Crown as so represented. It is true that the Commission is given certain powers which may be exercised independently of the Government of the Province, but I think these powers are given to it as a department of the Government as a servant or agent of the Crown acting by and on behalf of the Crown, for the public benefit of the Province.

I agree with Mr. Mathers that the intent of the statute is to apply the sales tax to His Majesty as represented by any province, only where the goods purchased or imported are intended for resale. Hence, the Commission is not subject to sales tax in respect of sales and deliveries and importations of goods for its own use or consumption, but is, in common with all other departments of the Provincial Government, subject to sales tax in respect of goods purchased or imported for purposes of resale, as for example, under the provisions of sec.

27 of The Power Commission Act.

# Department of Justice, Ottawa, April 5, 1922.

Sir,—I have the honour to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 31st ultimo with regard to my ruling of the 17th ultimo, concerning liability to sales tax of the Nova Scotia Power Commission. You state that this ruling will affect a considerable number of institutions under the control of the different provinces, and therefore you wish me to state the grounds on which the said ruling is based.

Under sec. 19BBB (1) of the Special War Revenue Act, 1915, as enacted by chap. 50 of the Statutes of 1921, His Majesty as represented by the government of any province of Canada is expressed to be liable to sales tax in respect of goods sold to or imported by His Majesty, in such right, for the purposes of resale. This express provision for the imposition of the sales tax as against His

Majesty as represented by the government of any province, where the goods are purchased or imported for resale, in my opinion excludes any implication that Ilis Majesty, as so represented, was intended to be subject to the sales tax, where the goods are not purchased or imported for resale but for use or consumption in the performance or execution of the functions or undertakings of the Government.

Since His Majesty, as represented by the government of a province, acts through his appointed or established officers, servants and agents, who may be incorporated or unincorporated bodies or persons, the liability to sales tax as well as the exemption, extends to such officers, servants and agents in respect of goods purchased or imported for the Government's service. For this proposition there is no lack of authority. Hence, the question presented in the case of The Nova Scotia Power Commission was whether that body was an incorporate office or agent of the Crown as represented by the Government of the Province of Nova Scotia—and therefore entitled to the privilege or exemption of the Crown as regards liability to sales tax—or whether it was a corporate body independent of the Government and as such subject to the same liability to sales tax as any private individual; and on careful examination of the provisions of The Power Commission Act (chap. 6 of the Statutes of Nova Scotia, 1919), I had no difficulty in coming to the conclusion set forth in my letter to you of the 17th ultimo.

I must add, however, that each case depends on its own special circumstances, and therefore, this ruling applies to otler cases only where the person or body concerned stands in substantially the same position, in relation to the Crown and the Government of a province, as The Nova Scotia Power Commission. I may add further that my opinion as to the University of Manitoba stands, as that appears to be a distinguishable case, though perhaps not entirely free from doubt.

# Audit Office, Ottawa, February 15, 1923.

Sir,—I have received from the Department of Customs and Excise a copy of a ruling given by you on March 17th, 1922, concerning the liability of the Nova Scotia Power Commission as to the sales tax and also of a letter of April 5th, 1922, with further reference thereto.

I have before me for payment a claim of the Canadian General Electric Co., Limited, for a refund of \$56,231.64 being the total amount remitted to the Department of Customs and Excise as sales tax on electrical apparatus furnished the Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission since June, 1920, for the sole

use of the Commission and not for resale.

The last clause in your letter of April 5th, 1922, contains the following:—
"Each case depends on its own special circumstances, and, therefore, this ruling applies to other cases only where the person or body concerned stands in substantially the same position in relation to the Crown and the government of a province, as the Nova Scotia Power Commission."

Before authorizing the refund in question I should like to be advised by you as to whether the Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission stands in substantially the same position to the Government of Ontario as the Nova Scotia Power

Commission bears to the government of that province, and if so, whether a refund may be legally made of the sales tax paid since June, 1920.

Sir,—Referring to your letter of the 15th instant, with regard to a claim of the Canadian General Electric Co., Limited, for a refund of \$56,231.64 on account of sales tax on sales to the Hydro-Electric Commission, I am of opinion upon examination of the legislation relating to the Hydro-Electric Commission that the Commission must, for the purposes of the present reference, be regarded as a servant or agent of the Crown acting by and on behalf of the Crown for the public benefit of the Province, and that, therefore, Mr. Newcombe's opinion of the 17th March, 1922, with regard to the Nova Scotia Power Commission applies. It follows that a refund may legally be made of any sales taxes paid by the Canadian General Electric Company on sales which would not have been subject to the tax if made to the Ontario Government.

## Payment by Department of Sales Tax after May 24, 1922

Sir,—I have to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 10th instant, calling attention to the provision in Statute 12-13, George V, Chapter 47, Section 15, regarding Sales Tax on accounts rendered to Departments of the Government of Canada.

In reply I have to state that in a few instances only the Sales Tax shown on accounts submitted to this Department for goods purchased, has been allowed to stand for payment; and then only after inquiry from the Collectors of Customs and Excise concerned, to ensure that the same had actually been collected and paid into the Consolidated Fund as Revenue remitted from their Ports.

Consequently, it may be stated that the only cases of payment for Sales Tax on expenditure accounts of this Department, are those on which the amount had already been carried to account as Revenue received.

Had the amounts not been paid in these few cases, the result would have been that the parties concerned, having paid the amount as Revenue, would have filed a Refund Claim for the amount so paid; and in the end, this Department would have paid the amount, not as an expense account, but as Returned Duties.

The cases are so few and the amounts so small, that it is submitted such action would not have been warranted.

#### Employment of Assistant Inspectors of Customs at rates above Minimum of Class

These men were originally appointed in December last, under the class position of Accountants, at \$2.400, which class, however, has since been abolished. If they are now to be classed as Assistant Inspectors of Customs and Excise their salary must be fixed at the minimum salary of that class, that

is at \$2.040.

If these men are performing the same duties as they performed when graded as Accountants, and if it is desired that their salaries remain at \$2,400, I would suggest that new certificates be issued for them, placing them in some suitable class to which a minimum salary of \$2,400 is attached.

Sir,—On June 15th, 1921, I wrote you with reference to the eases of Messrs. N. J. Meagher (IR-D5-77) and G. Turner (IR-D9-46) for whom certificates were issued for temporary appointment as Assistant Inspectors of Customs and Exeise at salaries of \$2,400 a year. These men were originally appointed as Accountants but when that class was abolished, they were classed as Assistant Inspectors of Customs, retaining the same salary. In my letter I pointed out that the minimum salary rate for Assistant Inspectors of Customs was \$2.040, and suggested that new certificates be issued, placing them in some suitable class to which a minimum salary of \$2,400 was attached.

In your reply, dated June 22, 1921, you stated that the certificates issued were in order under Section 4 of the Civil Service Act of 1920, which Section provides "that in the case of temporary employees required in Canada outside the city of Ottawa, if such minimum rate be less than the prevailing rate of pay for the work incident to the position in the place or locality where the work is required to be performed, the Commission may engage a temporary employee at such prevailing rate instead of the minimum rate, if the said prevailing rate does not exceed the maximum rate of the class in which the position

is elassified."

In addition to the two gentlemen referred to above, a number of others were employed in the same capacity at approximately the same time, and their cases were dealt with in an exactly similar manner, and it was held in this office that your justification of the rate of \$2,400 a year, although classed as Assistant Inspectors of Customs, was applicable in these other cases.

From the last renewal certificates sent me, it would appear that three of

the officials thus appointed are employed at Ottawa, viz:

R. A. Bishop, Position, IR-D4-68. G. H. Code, Position, IR-A-96. C. M. Ingall, Position, IR-D4-71. As the section of the Act authorizing the payment of prevailing rates is only applicable to employees required outside the city of Ottawa I do not consider that these three men can be legally paid at the rate of \$2,400 as Assistant Inspectors of Customs.

## Drawback Claim of Spanish River Pulp and Paper Mills, Ltd.

AUDIT OFFICE, OTTAWA, January 23, 1923.

Sir,—I have before me your application for a cheque for the amount of \$25.854.14 in favour of the Spanish River Pulp and Paper Mills, Limited, in payment of their claim No. D-36577 for Drawback of Duty and Sales Tax on imported materials used in the manufacture of newsprint paper exported.

According to the work sheet attached to the claim there was produced during the month of September, 1922, 4,740,318 pounds of newsprint paper, of which 4,618,966 or 97.44 per cent was exported and 121,352 or 2.56 per cent

used in home consumption or stored.

In the manufacture of this newsprint there were used 1,756,000 pounds of imported groundwood, 92,000 pounds of Canadian groundwood, and 2,108,000 pounds of local groundwood in addition to other materials. As the drawback of duty can only be claimed on imported material, the only groundwood on which drawback might be claimed is the 1,756,000 pounds of imported groundwood.

Unless the contrary can clearly be established by the manufacturers, I am of opinion that it must be inferred that the imported groundwood entered proportionally into the newsprint exported and into that stored or used for home consumption, that is in the proportion of 97.44 to 2.56; and that, accordingly, the drawback of duty can only be paid on 97.44 per cent of the 1,756,000 pounds of groundwood imported, or on 1,711,046 pounds only, instead of on 1,756,000 as claimed by the manufacturers and allowed by your department.

Sir.—I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 23rd instant raising a question as to the proper quantity on which to pay drawback to the Spanish River Pulp and Paper Mills, Limited, in their Claim D-36577.

In reply I would refer you to the enclosed Memo. 2391-B, Order in Council dated the 25th March, 1920, in effect on and from 6th June, 1919, being the

General Regulations governing Drawbacks.

In Section 1 thereof, you will note that a drawback of 99 per cent of the duties paid on the materials used, wrought into, or attached to the articles exported may be allowed; provided that when both imported and domestic materials of the same class are used in the manufacture of the articles exported. such drawback shall not be computed on a greater quantity of material than entered into the exported goods.

In such cases, drawback may be claimed in respect of a quantity equal to but not exceeding the quantity imported upon which duties have been paid, as per copies of entries attached to the claim and those that are marked "refer."

Sir,—I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 27th ulto. in reply to mine of the 23rd ulto, with reference to the claim No. D-36577 of the Spanish River Pulp and Paper Mills, Limited, for drawback on newsprint paper exported.

The interpretation which you appear to place on the provisions of the Order in Council of March 25th, 1920, making General Regulations governing drawback on articles manufactured or produced wholly or in part from imported materials in respect of articles exported from Canada, differs somewhat from

my interpretation thereof.

Those regulations provide as follows:—"When imported materials on which duties have been paid are used, wrought into or attached to any article manufactured or produced in Canada, there may be allowed on the exportation of such articles beyond the limits of Canada a drawback of ninety-nine per cent of the duties paid on the materials used, wrought into or attached to the articles exported." This clause, to my mind authorises payment of the drawback of ninety-nine per cent, not of the whole duties paid, but only of the duties paid on materials used in the articles exported, so that, if the whole of the goods into the manufacture of which the duty-paid materials entered were not exported, the drawback is only payable on the proportion of the duty-paid materials that entered into the manufacture of the goods actually exported.

I do not see that the succeeding clause in the regulations, which provides "that, when both imported and domestic materials of the same class are used in the manufacture of the articles exported such drawback shall not be computed on a greater quantity of materials than entered into the exported goods," alters the case. As the drawback is only payable with respect to duty-paid imported materials, I am of opinion that the word materials in this clause must

be taken to mean duty-paid imported materials,

If the interpretation which you put upon these regulations is the one intended, I think that these regulations should be amended so as to indicate clearly the intention of Council.

# Claims for Returned Duties for Goods Spoiled

AUDIT OFFICE, OTTAWA, May 28, 1923.

Sir,—Cheque No. 6290 issued in August last, on account of Returned Duties, is for a payment of \$10,263.43 to the Tuckett Tobacco Co. Ltd., of Hamilton, being a refund of Excise Duty paid on 3,675.8 pounds of raw-leaf tobacco and 1,467,100 eigarettes which had become worm-eaten and which were destroyed in order to avoid the possibility of the entire stock of manufactured goods becoming similarly affected.

In connection with this payment I beg to ask your attention to section 92 of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, which defines the powers of the Governor in Council with respect to the remission of duties and forfeitures. The concluding clause in the first subsection of this section is as follows:-"Provided that no duties of Customs or Excise, paid to His Majesty on any goods, shall be remitted or refunded on account of such goods having, after the payment of such duties, been lost or destroyed by fire or other unavoidable accident." It seems to me that the tobacco and cigarettes in this case come within this provision and that consequently the duty may not be remitted.

Sir.—I acknowledge receipt of your communication of the 28th ultimo with reference to refund of Excise Duty paid by the Tuckett Tobacco Co., Ltd., Hamilton, on certain cigarettes, which subsequently became worm-eaten and were destroyed, in order to prevent a spread of the pest.

In reply, I would state that Section 92, of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, refers to goods destroyed by fire when in possession of the manufacturer, after payment of duty, and which goods were not in marketable condi-

tion.

In this case, however, the goods were in possession of the Crown and were rendered unfit for sale by having become worm-eaten, in consequence of which, it was necessary to destroy same, in order to exterminate the pest.

It would therefore appear, that the Statute may properly be interpreted to include a case of this nature, as distinguished from one in which, after payment of duty, the goods are destroyed by fire.

Sir.—I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 5th inst., (file No. 105,545) in reply to mine of May 28th, with reference to the refund to the Tuckett Tobacco Co., Limited, of excise duty paid by them on certain eigarettes which became worm-eaten and had to be destroyed.

In your reply it is stated that in this ease the goods were in possession of the Crown, and were rendered unfit for sale by having become worm-eaten, in consequence of which it was necessary to destroy them, and that it would therefore appear that the Statute may properly be interpreted to include a case of this nature, as distinguished from one in which, after payment of duty, the goods are destroyed by fire.

It is difficult to reconcile the above statement with the particulars of the case as set forth in the Order in Council authorising the refund of the duties in this case. From that Order in Council, I gather that a certain amount of imported raw leaf tobacco was withdrawn from the warehouse, on which a duty of 40 cents per pound was paid, that this tobacco was manufactured into cigarettes, upon which a further duty of \$6 per thousand was payable, and that these cigarettes formed part of the duty-paid stock of tobacco in the possession of the Tuckett Tobacco Company, Limited, which had become worm-eaten, with the probability that the entire stock of manufactured goods might become similarly affected.

It would appear to me that these cigarettes were destroyed, so far as marketable condition was concerned, by becoming infested with worms, after payment of the specified duties and when in the possession of the company, that the pest of worms must be regarded as an unavoidable accident and that, accordingly, under Section 92 of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, the duty could not be refunded.

The goods were, notwithstanding, in the possession of the Crown, for the reason that, in common with all other stock in the licensed premises, they were under control of Officers of this Department, and no portion thereof could legally be removed from the factory, except under official supervision and entry in the official accounts.

Sir,—I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 11th inst., with further reference to a certain refund of Excise duty paid to the Tuckett Tobacco

Company, Limited, on account of cigarettes destroyed.

The main argument in your letter appears to be that the goods were actually in the possession of the Crown, for the reason that, in common with all other stock in the licensed premises, they were under control of officers of your department. I find some difficulty in accepting this view of the matter. I can understand that goods deposited in a bonding warehouse, the duties on such goods not having been paid, may be regarded as being in the possession of the department, although even in that case Section 64 of the Inland Revenue Act provides that all goods warehoused shall be at the risk of the owner, and, unless destroyed by fire, the duty shall be payable thereon as if entered for consumption; but I do not see how goods on which the duty has been paid, and which have been entered ex-warehouse can be considered in the possession of your department, even although there may be some slight formalities with regard to removing them from the licensed premises, which term, as I understand it, includes the whole factory.

The question of possession, however, appears to me to have no bearing on the case. Section 92 of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act provides that no duties of Customs or Excise, paid to His Majesty on any goods, shall be remitted or refunded on account of such goods having, after the payment of such duties, been lost or destroyed, etc. Nothing is said in this section with regard to the goods being, or not being, in the possession of the department, the simple reading to my mind being, if the duty has been paid and if the goods are afterwards destroyed, a refund cannot be made.

S<sub>1R</sub>,—I am in receipt of a copy of an Order in Council of the 5th inst., (P.C. 52/1025) authorising the refund to Charles Schwan, of Carlsruhe, Ontario, of the sum of \$82.80, being the duty paid on 2,760 pounds of malt which had been used in the manufacture of 2,313 gallons of malt liquor which became sour and unfit for use.

I shall be glad if you would refer me to any section of the Inland Revenue Act, which specially provides for a return of the duty in such cases. In the absence of such special provision, it appears to me that this is one of the cases in which, under Section 92 of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, the Governor in Council has not the power to remit the duty, the goods, after the payment of the duty, having become unfit for use, that is, destroyed so far as mercantile value is concerned.

Sir,—I acknowledge receipt of your communication of the 13th instant, respecting a refund of the sum of \$82.80 paid to Charles Schwan, Brewer, of Carlsruhe, representing the Excise duty paid on a quantity of malt used for the manufacture of beer, which turned sour and was subsequently destroyed with the consent of the Department, under supervision of two Officers.

There is no provision in the Inland Revenue Act for a case of this nature, consequently the authority of an Order in Council was obtained, under Section

92 of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act.

The Section just referred to provides that, "The Governor in Council, whenever he deems it right and conducive to the public good, may remit any duty," etc., etc., "Provided that no duties of Customs or Excise paid to His Majesty on any goods shall be remitted or refunded on account of such goods having, after the payment of such duties, been lost or destroyed by fire or other unavoidable accident.

It is submitted that, in the proper interpretation of this clause, the words "lost" and "destroyed" are limited, by the associated words, to accidental loss or destruction.

As respects the case in question, the beer was not accidentally destroyed. It had turned sour, was thereby rendered unmarketable, and was *intentionally* destroyed, with Departmental consent, under official supervision.

Sir.—I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 18th inst., with further reference to the case of a refund of the sum of \$2.80 paid to Charles Schwan, Brewer of Carlsrule, representing the excise duty paid on a quantity of malt used for the manufacture of beer, which turned sour and unfit for use and was disposed of by being run into a sewer, in the presence of two officers of your department.

Your authority for making this refund is stated to be Section 92 of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, which sets forth the powers of the Governor in Council respecting the remission of duties and forfeitures. The latter clause of the first subsection of that section provides, however, "That no duties of Customs or Excise, paid to His Majesty on any goods, shall be remitted or refunded on account of such goods having, after the payment of such duties, been lost or destroyed by fire or other unavoidable accident."

In your letter you submit that in the proper interpretation of this last clause the words "lost" or "destroyed" are limited, by the associated words to accidental loss or destruction. This point I do not question. The question, to my mind, depends on the construction of the words "lost" and "destroyed" in this clause. It seems to me that the actual accidental loss or destruction occurred when the beer became sour and unfit for use and had no longer any marketable value.

I do not imagine that you would consider a similar claim for refund in a case where the beer was found to be sour after leaving the licensed premises; and yet, as far as I can see, there would be as much authority under Section 92 for making the refund in such a case as there is in the present instance, nothing in the clause requiring the goods to be in the possession of or under the control of your department.

I think that your department should apply to the Justice Department for a ruling on the interpretation of the clause in question, which affects a number of other cases, before passing any more claims of this or of a similar nature.

This claim is made under sub-section 2 of section 279 of the Inland Revenue Act, as enacted by Chapter 28 of the Statutes of 1918; which section is as follows "In all tobacco manufactories where less than fifty per cent Canadian raw leaf tobacco is used, and where ten per cent, or more, of other materials is used, such materials shall be subject to a duty of twenty-three cents per

pound, actual weight."

This section is rather indefinite, as in the first place it does not distinctly state that when fifty per cent or more of Canadian raw leaf is used the other materials shall not be subject to any duty, and in the second place no period of time is mentioned as a basis for determining whether such other materials are subject to duty or not. As regards the first of these points, I think it may be safely inferred that the intention was that when fifty per cent or more of Canadian raw leaf is used no duty on the other materials is collectable. There is greater difficulty, however, with regard to the second point. I understand that it has been the practice of your department to base the question as to whether or not duty is collectable on the operations of the fiscal year, as if the words "during any fiscal year" directly followed the first phrase "is used" in the section quoted above. This construction cannot, in my opinion be placed on the Act.

According to a memorandum attached to the claim, it would appear that while during the fiscal year 1922-23 more than fifty per cent of Canadian leaf was used, there was less than fifty per cent used during the quarter ended June 30th, 1922, and that especially during the month of April, 1922, the quantity of foreign leaf was in excess of the Canadian leaf used, 138,677 pounds of foreign leaf being taken for use during that month as against 84,847 pounds of Canadian leaf, to which was added 66,801 pounds of other materials. Duty appears to have been paid by the Company three times a month, viz,—on the 10th, 20th and 30th days of each month, and I am of opinion that so long as during any of these ten day periods the amount of Canadian leaf used was under fifty per cent, the duty was rightfully collected and the company has no claim for a refund.

The validity of this claim depends largely on output of this company prior to the period covered by the claim. If, prior to April 1st, 1922, they were using less than fifty per cent of Canadian leaf, they were then clearly subject to the duty under the act as "A manufactory where less than fifty per cent Canadian raw leaf is used," and would continue so to be until such time as the quantity of Canadian leaf used reached fifty per cent of the total.

1317/23—Claim of W. C. Macdonald, Reg'd. Inc., for refund of Duty on Tobacco.

Sir,—With reference to your letter of the 23rd instant (105545) I am of opinion that subsection 2 of section 279 of the Inland Revenue Act, chapter 28 of the statutes of 1918, does not impose any duty on other materials, when fifty

per cent or more of Canadian raw leaf is used.

With regard to the second question referred to in the Acting Auditor General's letter of the 8th June last, I observe that the statute is silent as to what periods of time are to be taken into consideration for the purpose of determining the percentage of Canadian raw leaf tobacco used. The Governor in Council, however, has power, under section 311 of the Act, to make regulations upon this subject. I understand that by the existing regulations the duty is payable on the 10th, 20th and last day of each month in respect of the quantities taken for use during these periods. If so, I should think that in the absence of any other provision, these are the periods which should govern for the purpose of determining the percentages. I would suggest, however, for your consideration that it might be advisable to amend the regulations to provide that the percentages be ascertained either monthly or annually.

SIR.—In the examination of the returns of Sundry Collections for the fiscal year 1922-23 I find that the only ports showing amounts collected on account of cartage are the following:

The above statement shows that only nine ports made any collections during the year on account of cartage, and that the amounts collected in each case were small, with the exception of the port of Montreal, where quite a large

amount was collected under this head.

I should like to be informed as to the circumstances under which a charge for cartage is collectable from the importer, and as to the reason for that charge being made at so few ports. I should also like to be informed as to any special conditions that may exist at Montreal, resulting in a very considerable amount being collectable under this head, while in all the other ports no collections at all are made, or only negligible amounts.

Monsieur,—J'ai reçu votre lettre du 6 courant dans laquelle vous demandez des renseignements sur les services rendus par M. William Gleeson, visiteur des douanes au port d'Halifax et pour lesquels le ministère lui alloue un surplus de

salaire de \$1 par jour.

En réponse, je dois vous dire que cette allocation est accordée à M. Gleeson pour les services qu'il est obligé de rendre en dehors des heures régulières de travail. A titre de visiteur, il a la direction du personnel extérieur. Cela comprend la surveillance des fonctionnaires en devoir sur les quais et aux stations de chemin de fer, examinant les bagages des voyageurs et vérifiant les cargaisons. Plusieurs de ces fonctionnaires sont au travail avant 8 heures du matin et après 6 heures du soir, et reçoivent pour ce travail supplémentaire une compensation appropriée.

Le visiteur doit visiter ees divers endroits après les heures régulières de travail pour s'assurer si le travail est convenablement fait et donner des avis au besoin. Il est excessivement important que le travail en ces endroits soit bien surveillé, et c'est dans ce but que le visiteur prolonge simplement son travail avant ou après les heures régulières au besoin. On ne lui a pas demandé de ealculer les heures supplémentaires ainsi occupées pour chaque mois, vu que ce service est intermittent. Le but visé, c'est que le visiteur visite inopinément les fonctionnaires en devoir en dehors des heures régulières, et c'est de cette manière que l'on pourra obtenir le meilleur service.

Le travail supplémentaire du visiteur peut être de moins d'une heure en certains jours, mais dans d'autres cas, il faut plusieurs heures. Le ministère considère que M. Gleeson reçoit une rémunération très modérée pour ce service supplémentaire exigeant beaucoup d'expérience et comportant une grande responsabilité.

#### Re Green vs Wardell

Monseur,—Vous vous rappelez que le 6 avril 1922, le ministère vous a demandé d'émettre un chèque en faveur de J. E. Gillis, l'avocat de Green, au montant de \$200, imputable au revenu casuel. Le 19 du même mois, vous nous avez dit que d'après une opinion exprimée par le ministère de la Justice, les sommes dues par la Couronne ne pouvaient être l'objet d'une saisie-gagerie et que tout montant dû à Wardell par ce ministère devait être en conséquence payé à Wardell lui-même seulement, ou à toute personne légalement désignée par lui comme son procureur pour recevoir ce montant.

Vous avez plus tard dit, à la date du 20 septembre dernier, que M. Gillis avait obtenu du juge Tweedie de la cour suprême de l'Alberta, un jugement autorisant le shérif du district de Macleod à recevoir l'argent dû par le gouvernement à Wardell et à en délivrer un récépissé. Une copie dûment certifiée de ce jugement a été reçue par le ministère et est encore conservée dans les dossiers. Cependant vous avez déclaré qu'avant d'autoriser le paiement de ce montant vous vouliez avoir l'opinion du ministère de la Justice sur la valeur légale de ce jugement comme autorité suffisante pour justifier le paiement de la somme au shérif du district de Macleod comme receveur des argents dus à Wardell par le ministère.

La question a été soumise au ministère de la Justice par M. Gillis lui-même, et le 20 octobre dernier, le sous-ministre de la Justice a donné son opinion en disant que Wardell n'avait pas une cause légale de réclamation contre la Couronne mais que la Couronne avait apparemment le pouvoir de payer une allocation, et que, pour déterminer si, dans ce cas, le pouvoir discrétionnaire du gouvernement pouvait être exercé au bénéfice des créanciers, il fallait une décision du gouvernement sur le rapport du ministre responsable, qui n'est pas dans ce cas le ministre de la Justice. C'est pourquoi j'ai soumis la question à l'honorable ministre de ce ministère, et j'ai reçu instruction de vous dire que le ministre n'a pas d'objection à payer le montant dû à Wardell par le ministère au shérif de Macleod à titre de receveur pour J. H. Green, conformément au jugement rendu par le juge Tweedie. Je vous envoie ci-inclus copie dûment certifiée du jugement, et vous demande en conséquence d'émettre un chèque au montant de \$400 imputable au revenu casuel, à l'ordre de A. B. McDonald, shérif du district judiciaire de Macleod, Alberta, à titre de receveur pour Green.

Dans le dernier paragraphe de votre lettre du 20 septembre dernier, vous demandez au ministère d'expliquer la différence entre le montant de \$400 mentionné dans le jugement du juge Tweedie, et la somme de \$200 mentionnée dans la correspondance antérieure comme étant due à Wardell par le ministère. Le montant payable à Wardell est réellement de \$400, et c'est apparemment par erreur qu'on a fait mention de \$200 dans la correspondance antérieure.

Monsieur,—J'ai l'honneur d'accuser réception de votre lettre du 22 courant (n° 3208) au sujet de la cause Green vs Wardell, et demandant d'émettre un chèque au montant de \$400 imputable au revenu casuel, en faveur de A. B. McDonald, shérif du district judiciaire de Macleod, Alberta, à titre de receveur pour Green.

Dans votre lettre, vous dites que la question a été soumise au ministère de la Justice par M. Gillis, l'avocat de Green, et que le 20 octobre dernier, le sous-ministre de la Justice vous a dit que, dans son opinion: "Wardell n'avait pas une cause légale de réclamation contre la Couronne, mais que la Couronne avait apparemment le pouvoir de payer une allocation, et que, pour déterminer si, dans ce cas, le pouvoir discrétionnaire du gouvernement pouvait être exercé au bénéfice des créanciers, il fallait une décision du gouvernement sur le rapport du ministre responsable."

Avant que je puisse prendre une décision définitive sur cette question, il me faudra une copie de l'opinion donnée à M. Gillis par le sous-ministre de la Justice, opinion qui, sans doute, vous a été transmise. De plus, je suis d'opinion que votre demande ne peut être accordée sans une autorisation spéciale par arrêté

en conseil. En outre de la nécessité d'un arrêté en conseil dans tous ces cas, il y a une indication spécifique dans ce sens donnée par le sous-ministre de la Justice, quand il dit que pour exercer le pouvoir discrétionnaire du gouvernement d'accorder une allocation dans ce cas au bénéfice des créanciers, il faut la décision du gouvernement (c'est-à-dire le Gouverneur en conseil) sur rapport du ministre

responsable.

La réclamation originale dans ce cas a été de \$200, étant la part de Wardell dans la prime sur la saisie d'accise n° 124; un chèque a été émis pour ce montant en faveur de Wardell, chèque qui fut plus tard versé au revenu casuel vu que l'on n'a pu trouver Wardell. Cette somme de \$200 est la seule, d'après ce que j'en connais, qui se rapporte à ce cas, et elle a été versée au revenu easuel, et en conséquence c'est le seul montant qui puisse être payé en tout temps sur ce compte. L'autre montant de \$200 que vous réclamez maintenant est, je comprends, la part de Wardell dans la prime sur une autre saisie, malgré que ce fait n'apparaisse pas dans vos lettres. Il ne paraît pas qu'aucun chèque ait été émis pour ce deuxième montant de \$200, qui semble être par conséquent une partie des recettes provenant des saisies; s'il en en est ainsi, la seule manière de le payer serait de le prendre sur ces recettes de saisies.

Je veux vous faire remarquer que le jugement en faveur de M. Green contre Wardell désignait un montant de \$250, qui, avec les frais s'élevant à \$72.30, forment un total de \$322.30. Dans ce cas, je vous demande pourquoi l'on demande de payer le montant de \$400 au shérif de Macleod à titre de receveur pour Green.

Je n'ai pas trouvé avec votre lettre la copie certifiée du jugement de la cour autorisant le paiement au shérif des montants dus à Wardell par votre ministère, copie que vous dites devoir être incluse avec votre lettre.

# Commissions provinciales exemptées du paiement de l'impôt sur les ventes

Ministère de la Justice, Ottawa, le 17 mars 1923.

Monsieur,—J'ai l'honneur de répondre à votre lettre du 21 janvier écoulé de même qu'à la copie d'une lettre de M. Fred F. Mathers, sous-procureur général de la Nouvelle-Ecosse. Dans cette dernière lettre deux questions se posent; savoir:

(1) Si la Loi spéciale des Revenus de guerre, 1915, telle que modifiée, lorsqu'elle s'applique à la Couronne représentée par une province, est valide au point

de vue constitutionnel; et

(2) Dans quelle mesure la Commission d'Energie de la Nouvelle-Ecosse constituée en corporation aux termes du chapitre 6 des Statuts de la Nouvelle-Ecosse intitulé, "La Loi de la Commission d'Energie", est-elle tenue de se conformer aux dispositions relatives à la taxe sur les ventes?

M. Mathers soumet deux solutions:

En premier lieu, il déclare que l'Acte de l'Amérique britannique du Nord stipule à l'article 125 qu'aucune terre ou propriété appartenant au Canada ou à l'une quelconque des provinces ne doit être sujette à l'impôt, et que l'impôt sur les ventes, tout en ne faisant pas techniquement partie de la lettre de cette disposition, entre certainement dans l'esprit de cet article.

En deuxième lieu, que la commission est constituée en corporation mais que ses membres sont nommés par la Couronne et ne restent en fonctions que durant

bon plaisir; que le but de cette Commission n'est pas de réaliser un profit; qu'elle ne possède aucun capital, et qu'en réalité elle agit pour la Couronne et en son nom et qu'elle devrait avoir droit de jouir des mêmes exemptions, au point de vue de l'impôt sur les ventes, que celles dont jouit la Couronne représentée par

la province.

Il dit aussi que l'impôt sur les ventes ne doit pas s'appliquer à Sa Majesté, représentée par l'une quelconque des provinces, réserve faite des cas où des marchandises sont de fait achetées ou imposées par Sa Majesté, ainsi représentée, dans le but de les revendre. Votre ministère, me dit-on, a décidé que la Commission doit payer l'impôt sur les ventes pour toutes les marchandises vendues à la Commission ou importées par elle, que ce soit pour son propre usage ou dans le but de les revendre. Vous me demandez mon avis sur les questions soulevées par M. Mathers.

Quant à la question n° 1, je dois déclarer que la décision rendue récemment par Sir Walter Cassels, président de la Cour de l'Echiquier, dans la cause du Procureur général de la Colombie-Britannique vs le Procureur général du Canada, constitue une autorité établissant la validité de l'application de l'impôt sur les ventes à l'importation des marchandises faites par la Couronne ou en son nom du droit d'une province; et, à mon avis, l'application de l'impôt est également valide tant au point de vue des ventes qu'au point de vue des livraisons de marchandises faites dans la province à la Couronne représentée par la

province dans le but de les revendre.

Quant à la question n° 2: Après avoir étudié les dispositions de la Loi de la Commission d'Energie, je suis d'avis que la Commission d'Energie de la Nouvelle-Ecosse est une entreprise d'utilité publique constituée en corporation n'existant comme telle que lorsque ses membres sont nommés par la Couronne représentée par la province et, au point de vue de ses plus importantes opérations, relevant de l'autorité et du contrôle de la Couronne ainsi représentée. Il est vrai que la Commission jouit de certains pouvoirs qu'elle peut exercer indépendamment de l'Etat, ou de la province, mais je crois que ces pouvoirs lui sont accordés à titre de division gouvernementale, à titre de serviteur ou d'agent de la Couronne agissant par la Couronne et en son nom dans l'intérêt public de la province.

Je suis de l'avis de M. Mathers lorsqu'il dit que le but de la loi est de n'appliquer l'impôt sur les ventes à Sa Majesté représentée par une province quelconque, que lorsque les marchandises achetées ou importées le sont dans le but de les revendre. D'où il suit que la Commission n'est pas tenue de payer l'impôt sur les ventes au point de vue des ventes, des livraisons et des importations de marchandises faites pour son propre usage ou pour sa propre consommation, mais qu'elle doit payer cet impôt sur les ventes, tout comme tous les autres ministères du gouvernement provincial, lorsqu'il s'agit de marchandises achetées ou importées dans le but de les revendre, comme par exemple dans

le cas prévu à l'article 27 de la Loi de la Commission d'Energie.

Monsieur,—J'ai l'honneur d'accuser réception de votre lettre du 31 du mois écoulé ayant trait à la décision contenue dans ma lettre du 17 du mois écoulé touchant l'application de l'impôt sur les ventes à la Commission d'Energie de la Nouvelle-Ecosse. Vous déclarez que cette décision s'appliquera à un nombre considérable d'institutions relevant du contrôle des différentes provinces et vous me priez, en conséquence, de vous exposer les raisons sur lesquelles j'ai basé cette décision.

Aux termes de l'article 19BBB (1) de la Loi spéciale des Revenus de guerre, 1915, sanctionnée par le chapitre 50 des Statuts de 1921, il est stipulé que Sa Majesté représentée par le gouvernement de l'une quelconque des provinces du Canada est tenue de payer l'impôt sur les ventes lorsqu'il s'agit de marchandises vendues à Sa Majesté ou importées par Elle, de ce droit, pour la fin de revente. Cette stipulation expresse de l'imposition de l'impôt sur les ventes appliquable à Sa Majesté représentée par le gouvernement d'une province quelconque, lorsque les marchandises sont achetées ou importées pour la fin de revente ne comporte aucunement, à mon avis, l'idée que Sa Majesté ainsi représentée, devrait être sujette à l'impôt sur les ventes lorsque les marchandises ne sont pas achetées ou importées dans la fin de revente mais pour servir ou être employées dans l'accomplissement ou l'exécution des fonctions ou des entreprises de l'Etat.

Puisque Sa Majesté, représentée par le gouvernement d'une province agit par l'entremise de ses fonctionnaires nommés ou établis, de ses serviteurs et de ses agents, pouvant être des institutions ou des personnes constituées ou non en corporation, l'application de l'impôt sur les ventes, de même que l'exemption, s'étend à ces fonctionnaires, serviteurs et agents lorsqu'il s'agit de marchandises achetées ou importées pour le service de l'Etat. Cet avancé ne manque pas d'autorités. D'où il suit que la question posée dans la cause de la Commission d'énergie de la Nouvelle-Ecosse se résumait à savoir si cette institution était un bureau ou un agent constitué en corporation de la Couronne représentée par le gouvernement de la province de la Nouvelle-Ecosse-et par conséquent lui permettait de jouir du privilège ou de l'exemption dont jouit la Couronne touchant l'application de l'impôt sur les ventes—ou si cette Commission était une institution constituée en corporation indépendante du gouvernement et à ce titre sujette à l'application de l'impôt sur les ventes tout comme tous les autres individus; et après avoir étudié attentivement les dispositions de la Loi de la Commission d'Energie (chapitre 6 des Statuts de la Nouvelle-Ecosse, 1919), je n'ai pas hésité à tirer la conclusion indiquée dans la lettre que je vous ai adressée le 17 du mois écoulé.

Je dois ajouter, cependant, que chaque cas doit être jugé à la lumière des circonstances particulières à ce cas et que, par conséquent, cette décision ne s'applique aux autres cas que lorsque la personne ou l'institution en cause se trouve pratiquement dans la même position, au point de vue de sa relation à la Couronne et au gouvernement d'une province, que celle dans laquelle se trouve la Commission d'Energie de la Nouvelle-Ecosse. Je puis ajouter aussi qu'au point de vue de l'Université du Manitoba je suis toujours du même avis, puisque ce cas semble être bien distinct, bien qu'il y aurait peut-être lieu d'entretenir

En réponse je dois vous dire que dans quelques cas seulement il a été permis que la taxe sur les ventes indiquée sur les comptes soumis à ce ministère pour l'achat de marchandises, tienne lieu de paiement; et cela seulement après renseignements obtenus des percepteurs de la douane et de l'accise intéressés, afin de s'assurer que ces droits avaient été récllement perçus et payés au fonds consolidé, comme revenu, remis de leurs ports.

En conséquence, on peut déclarer que les seuls cas de paiement de la taxe sur les ventes pour les comptes ayant trait aux déboursés faits par ce ministère, sont ceux sur lesquels le montant avait déjà été inscrit au compte comme revenu

reçu.

Au cas où les montants n'auraient pas été payés dans ces quelques eas, il en aurait résulté que les intéressés, ayant payé le montant comme revenu, auraient transmis une réclamation afin d'obtenir le remboursement du montant ainsi payé. En dernier lieu, ce ministère aurait payé le montant, pas en tant que compte de dépenses, mais comme ristournes.

Ces eas sont si peu nombreux, et les montants si faibles, que l'on soumet

Monsieur.—Le 15 juin 1921, je vous ai écrit relativement aux eas de MM. N. J. Meagher (IR-D5-77) et G. Turner (IR-D9-46), pour lesquels des certificats ont été émis pour leur nomination temporaire comme inspecteurs adjoints des Douanes et de l'Accise, au traitement de \$2,400 par année. Ceux-ci avaient d'abord été nommés comptables, mais lorsque cette classe a été abolie, on les a classifiés comme inspecteurs adjoints des Douanes, avec le même traitement. Je vous faisais remarquer dans ma lettre, que le taux minimum du salaire pour les inspecteurs adjoints des Dounes était de \$2,040, et je vous suggérerais d'émettre de nouveaux certificats, en les plaçant dans quelque catégorie leur convenant à laquelle était attachée un traitement minimum de \$2,400.

Dans votre réponse, datée du 22 juin 1921, vous dites que les certificats émis étaient en règle en vertu de l'article 4 de la Loi du Service civil de 1920. Cet article stipule "qu'au cas où des fonctionnaires temporaires sont requis en dehors de la ville d'Ottawa, si ledit taux minimum est inférieur à l'échelle courante des traitements pour une besogne inhérente à la position dans l'endroit où cette besogne doit être accomplie, la Commission peut engager un fonctionnaire temporaire audit taux courant, au lieu du taux minimum, si ledit taux courant ne dépasse pas le taux maximum de la classe selon laquelle la position est clas-

sifiée."

En outre des deux fonctionnaires précités, il en a été employé un certain nombre d'autres à peu près à la même date, pour exercer les mêmes fonctions. #### Réclamation de drawback de la Spanish River Pulp and Paper Mills, Limited

Bureau de l'Auditeur général, Ottawa, le 23 janvier 1923.

Monsieur,—J'ai reçu votre lettre me demandant d'approuver l'émission, par votre ministère, d'un chèque de \$25,854.14 en faveur de la Spanish River Pulp and Paper Mills, Limited, en paiement de leur réclamation n° D-36577 relativement au remboursement de la douane et de la taxe de vente imposées sur les matériaux importés employés dans la fabrication du papier à journal exporté.

Le bordereau des opérations attaché à la réclamation révèle qu'au cours du mois de septembre 1922 on a fabriqué 4,740,318 livres de papier à journal dont on a exporté 4,618,966 ou 97.44 p. 100 et dont on a emmagasiné ou consommé

au pays 121,352 ou 2.56 p. 100.

On a employé en sus des autres matériaux, dans la fabrication de ce papier à journal 1,756,000 livres de bois défibré importé, 92,000 livres de bois défibré eanadien et 2,108,000 livres de bois défibré local. Comme on ne peut réclamer le remboursement de la douane que sur les matériaux importés, on n'a droit de réclamer le remboursement que sur les 1,756.000 livres de bois défibré importé.

A moins que les manufacturiers n'établissent clairement le contraire, je suis d'avis que l'on doit déduire que le bois défibré importé est entré proportionnellement dans la fabrication du papier à journal importé, emmagasiné ou consommé au pays, c'est-à-dire dans la proportion de 97.44 et 2.56. Par conséquent, la douane ne saurait être remboursée que sur les 97.44 p. 100 des 1,756,000 livres de bois défibré importé, soit sur 1.711,046 livres sculement, au lieu de sur 1.756,000 livres, comme le réclament les manufacturiers et comme le concède votre ministère.

de celles qui sont marquées "référer".

Monsieur,—J'ai l'honneur d'accuser réception de votre lettre du 27 écoulé écrite en réponse à la mienne du 23 écoulé, relativement à la réclamation n° D-36577 de la Spanish River Pulp and Paper Mills, Limited, pour un drawback sur le papier à journal exporté.

L'interprétation que vous semblez donner aux dispositions de l'arrêté en conseil du 25 mars 1920, établissant des règlements généraux de drawback sur les articles fabriqués ou produits en tout ou en partie de matériaux importés qui entrent dans la fabrication d'articles exportés du Canada, diffère de ma propre

interprétation.

Ces règlements stipulent que: "Quand des matériaux importés sur lesquels on a payé la douane sont employés pour ou dans la fabrication d'articles manufacturés ou produits au Canada ou attachés à ces derniers, on effectuera, au moment de l'exportation des dits articles en dehors des frontières du Canada, un drawback de 99 p. 100 des droits payés sur les matériaux employés pour ou dans la fabrication des articles exportés ou attachés à ces derniers." A mon avis, cette clause autorise le paiement d'un drawback de 99 p. 100, non de tous les droits payés, mais seulement des droits payés sur les matériaux employés pour la fabrication d'articles exportés, de sorte que si on n'exporte pas toutes les marchandises fabriquées avec les matériaux sur lesquels on a payé la douane le drawback est payable seulement sur la proportion des matériaux sur lesquels on a payé la douane ct qui sont entrés dans la fabrication des marchandises exportées.

Je ne vois pas que la clause suivante des règlements, qui stipule "que, quand des matériaux importés et domestiques de la même espèce sont employés dans la fabrication d'articles exportés le drawback ne saurait être basé sur une plus grande quantité de matériaux que celle qui est entrée dans la fabrication des marchandises exportées," ne change rien à la situation. Vu que le drawback est payable sculement sur les matériaux importés sur lesquels on a payé la douane, je suis d'avis que le mot matériaux employé dans cet article signifie les matériaux

importés sur lesquels on a payé la douane.

Si l'interprétation que vous donnez à ces règlements est l'interprétation voulue, je crois que les règlements devraient être modifiés de façon à indiquer clairement l'intention du conseil.

sur des cigarettes que les vers ont attaquées et que l'on a dû détruire.

Dans votre réponse, on dit que dans ce cas les marchandises étaient entre les mains de la Couronne, et sont devenues impropres à la consommation parce qu'elles ont été attaquées par les vers et qu'on a dû les détruire et que, par conséquent, on peut interpréter la loi, dans un cas de cette nature, tout comme celui où, après le paiement des droits de douane, les marchandises sont détruites dans un incendie.

Il est difficile de concilier la déclaration ci-dessus avec les détails du cas exposés dans l'arrêté de l'Exécutif autorisant le remboursement des droits de douanc. Dans cet arrêté, je comprends que l'on a retiré des magasins une certaine quantité de tabac en feuilles importé, sur lequel on a payé un droit de 40c. la livre, que, de ce tabac, on a fabriqué des cigarettes sur lesquelles un nouveau droit de \$6.00 le mille devait être payé, et que ces cigarettes faisaient partie d'un stock de tabac sur lequel on avait payé les droits de douane et qui se trouvait, entre les mains de la Tuckett Tobacco Co. Ltd.

D'après moi, ces cigarettes furent détruites, an point de vue de la mise sur le marché, dès qu'elles ont été attaquées par les vers, après le paiement des droits fixes de douane alors qu'elles se trouvaient entre les mains de la compagnie, et la destruction, par les vers, doit être considérée comme un accident inévitable et, par conséquent, conformément à l'article 92 de la Loi du revenu consolidé et de

Le principal argument exposé dans votre lettre semble être le fait que les marchandises se trouvaient en réalité en la possession de la Couronne pour la raison que, tout comme toutes les autres marchandises dans les magasins patentés, elles se trouvaient sous le contrôle de fonctionnaires de votre ministère. Je ne puis que difficilement accepter cette opinion. Je comprends bien que lorsqu'il s'agit de marchandises déposées dans un entrepôt de la douane et que les droits sur ces marchandises n'ont pas été payés, ces marchandises peuvent être considérées comme étant en la possession du ministère, bien que même dans ce cas l'article 64 de la loi du Revenu de l'Intérieur stipule que toutes les marchandises entreposées le sont au risque du propriétaire et, à moins qu'elles ne soient détruites par le feu, les droits doivent être payés sur ces marchandises tout comme si ces marchandises étaient inscrites en vue de la consommation; mais je ne vois pas comment des marchandises sur lesquelles les droits ont été payés et qui ont été inscrites à la sortie de l'entrepôt peuvent être considérées comme étant en la possession de votre ministère, même lorsqu'il existe certaines formalités de peu d'importance relativement à la sortie de ces marchandises des magasins patentés, expression qui, si je comprends bien, comprend toute la fabrique.

La question de possession, cependant, me semble ne compter pour rien ici. L'artiel 92 de la loi du Revenu consolidé et de l'Audition stipule qu'aucun droit de douane ou d'accise, payé à Sa Majesté sur des marchandises quelconques, ne doit être remis ou remboursé du fait que lesdites marchandises ont été, après le paiement des droits, perdues ou détruites, etc. Il n'est pas question dans cet article du fait que les marchandises sont ou ne sont pas en la possession du ministère, le seul sens de cet article étant, si je me rappelle bien, que lorsque les droits ont été payés et que les marchandises sont subséquemment détruites, le

Ne trouvant aucune disposition dans ce sens, il me semble que ce cas entre bien dans la catégorie des cas où, aux termes de l'article 92 de la loi du Revenu consolidé et de l'Audition, le Gouverneur en conseil n'a pas le pouvoir de remettre les droits, lorsque les marchandises, après le paiemnt des droits, sont devenues impropres à la consommation, c'est-à-dire ont été détruites pour autant qu'il s'agisse de la valeur marchande de ces marchandises.

Rien, dans la loi du Revenu de l'intérieur, ne prévoit un cas de ce genre. En conséquence, on a obtenu un décret en vertu de l'article 92 de la loi du Revenu

consolidé et de l'Audition.

L'article mentionné dispose que "Le gouverneur en conseil, lorsqu'il le juge opportun et dans l'intérêt public, peut remettre tout droit", etc., etc., "Toutefois, aucun droit de douane ou d'accise payé à Sa Majesté sur des marchandises, ne doit être remis ou remboursé parce que lesdites marchandises, après le paiement de ces droits, auront été perdues ou détruites par le feu ou par tout autre accident inévitable."

Nous soumettons que, dans l'interprétation de cette clause, les mots "perdues" et "détruites" sont limités, par les mots suivants, à la perte ou la destruc-

tion accidentelle.

Dans le cas en question, la bière n'a pas été détruite accidentellement. Elle a sûri, est devenue, de ce fait, invendable, et elle a été détruite intentionnellement avec le consentement du ministère et sous la surveillance d'un de ses fonctionnaires.

Votre autorisation d'effectuer ce remboursement proviendrait de l'article 92 de la loi du revenu consolidé et de l'audition qui indique les pouvoirs du Gouverneur en conseil concernant la remise des droits et les annulations. La dernière clause du premier paragraphe de cet article dit cependant "qu'aucun droit de douane ou d'accise payé à Sa Majesté sur des marchandises ne doit être remis ou remboursé parce que les dites marchandises, après le paiement de ces droits, auront été perdues ou détruites par le feu ou par tout autre accident inévitable".

Dans votre lettre, vous soumettez que, dans l'interprétation de cette clause, les mots "perdues" ou "détruites" sont limités, par les mots suivants, à la perte ou la destruction accidentelle. Je ne discute pas ce point. A mon avis, la question dépend de l'interprétation des mots "perdus" ou "détruites". Il me semble que la perte ou destruction accidentelle a eu lieu lorsque la bière a sûri, est devenue impropre à la consommation et a perdu toute sa valeur marchande.

Je n'imagine pas que vous accueilleriez une réclamation de ce genre si la bière avait été trouvée sûrie après avoir quitté les lieux patentés; et cependant, d'après ce que je peux voir, l'artiele 92 autoriserait tout aussi bien le remboursement dans un tel cas que dans le cas actuel, puisque rien dans la clause n'exige que la marchandise soit en la possession ou sous le contrôle de votre ministère.

Je crois que votre ministère devrait demander au ministère de la Justice une interprétation de la clause en question qui se rapporte à un certain nombre d'autres cas, avant d'admettre d'autres réclamations de ce genre.

# Réclamation de remboursement de droits de "W. C. Macdonald, Reg. Incorporated"

BUREAU DE VÉRIFICATION, OTTAWA, 8 juin 1923.

Monsieur,—J'ai reçu votre lettre du 31 mai demandant l'émission d'un chèque au montant de \$79,176.12 en faveur de W. C. Macdonald, Regd., Incorporated, pour payer sa réclamation n° 76308, du remboursement d'un droit d'accise payé sur des matériaux employés dans la fabrication de tabac pendant la période comprise entre le 1er avril et le 20 juin 1922.

Cette réclamation se base sur le paragraphe 2 de l'article 279 de la Loi du revenu de l'intérieur, telle que contenue au chapitre 28 des statuts de 1918, article qui se lit comme suit: "Dans toutes les fabriques de tabac où l'on emploie moins de cinquante pour cent de tabac canadien brut en feuille et où l'on emploie dix pour cent ou plus de d'autres matériaux, les dits matériaux sont sujets à un

droit de 23c. par livre, poids réel."

Cet article est plutôt vague, car d'abord il ne dit pas clairement que lorsque l'on emploie cinquante pour cent ou plus de tabac canadien brut en feuille, les autres matériaux ne sont sujets à aucun droit, et ensuite il n'indique aucune période de temps devant servir de base pour déterminer si les autres matériaux sont sujets à un droit ou non. Pour ce qui est du premier de ces points, on peut conclure en toute sûreté, je crois, que lorsqu'il est employé 50 pour 100 ou plus de tabac canadien brut en feuille, aucun droit n'est à réclamer sur les autres matériaux. Il y a une plus grande difficulté au sujet du second point. Je comprends que votre département a l'habitude de baser la question de savoir si un droit est réclamable ou non sur les opérations de l'exercice, comme si les mots "pendant l'exercice" suivaient immédiatement le premier membre de phrase, dans l'article cité. Cette interprétation, à mon sens, ne peut être donnée à la loi.

D'après un mémoire attaché à la réclamation, il semble que si, pendant l'exercice 1922-23, on a employé plus de 50 pour cent du tabac canadien en feuille, on en a utilisé moins que 50 pour 100 pendant le trimestre terminé le 30 juin 1922, et que, surtout dans le mois d'avril 1922, la quantité de tabac étranger a dépassé celle du tabac canadienne employé. Pendant ce mois, on a employé 138,677 livres de tabac étranger contre 84,847 livres de tabac canadien, et l'on a ajouté 66,801 livres d'autres matériaux. La compagnie sembla avoir payé ses droits trois fois par mois, savoir: le 10, le 20 et le 30 de chaque mois, et je suis d'avis que si, pendant l'une quelconque de ces dizaines de jours, la quantité de tabac canadien employée a été inférieure à 50 pour 100, le droit a été perçu avec

raison et la compagnie n'a aucun remboursement à recevoir.

La validité de cette réclamation dépend largement de la production de cette compagnie avant la période couverte par la réclamation. Si, avant le 1er avril 1922, on a employé moins que 50 pour 100 de tabac canadien, on était évidemment passible d'un droit, en vertu de la loi, à titre de "manufacture où l'on emploie moins de cinquante pour cent de tabac canadien en feuille" et il doit en être ainsi tant que la quantité de tabac canadien en feuille employé n'atteint pas 50 pour 100 de la quantité totale.



#### Sick Mariners' Dues paid at Lower Rate than that fixed by Statute

AUDIT OFFICE, March 15, 1923.

Sir,—In October last the sub-collector of Customs at Shediac, N.B., remitted the amount of \$17.04 as Sick Mariners' Dues collected from the vessel "Yorkton", of 1,136 tons, being at the rate of  $1\frac{1}{2}$  cents per ton.

Section 383 of the Canada Shipping Act, as enacted by Chap. 38, 1920, provides for the collection on every ship of a duty of two cents for every ton which such ship measures, so that there was a shortage of \$5.68 in the amount

remitted.

From the correspondence on this matter, of which I have received a copy from your accountant, it would appear that the sub-collector at Shediac was unaware of the increase in the rate made in 1920 and he charged the vessel at the former rate. As ignorance of the law can not be regarded as a valid excuse I am of opinion that the sub-collector must be held responsible for the amount short collected unless the Governor-in-Council remits the uncollected portion of the duty under the provisions of Section 92 of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act.

#### Payment of Salary and Living Allowance to Medical Officers taking Special Courses of Instruction

Audit Office, April 6, 1923.

Sir,—I understand that Drs. J. A. Morais and J. M. Robertson, both of whom were appointed as Temporary Medical Officers, Grade 1, at salaries of \$2,400 a year, in the spring of 1922, took special courses of instruction during the winter of 1922-23, the one at Toronto and the other at Harvard. During the time that they were thus engaged they were paid their salary of \$200 a month and in addition a living allowance of \$100 a month.

As these gentlemen cannot be regarded as being actually engaged on the active work of your department while taking these special courses, I am of opinion, that special authority must be obtained for the payment to them both

of salary and of living allowance.

When these two medical men were assigned to your department by the Civil Service Commission were they not supposed to be duly qualified for the positions to which they were appointed. If so, what was the necessity for their continuing their studies at the public expense.

# DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH, April 10, 1923.

Dear Sir,—This is in reply to your letter under date of April 6th, referring to the case of certain Medical Officers of this Department, who during the winter months when the tide of immigration is low are sent to stations other than those to which they were originally assigned and during the period in which they are kept there are paid a living allowance of \$100.00 per month.

If Canada is not to be flooded with hopeless mental and physical defectives or those who later will develop into individuals who become charges on the municipalities and provinces in which they happen to locate, these defective ones must be stopped at the Port of Entry. This is the object of the Immigration Act. To be able to detect these defectives as they pass from the ship, our Officials must be sent to places where these can be seen and studied, namely, to hospitals in large cities and to special institutions where these are gathered for housing and treatment.

Our Medical Officers are just as definitely "engaged in the active work of our Department" while observing and noting these individuals in institutions as they are when picking out similar ones in the inspection line. They are required not only to pick out the actual dereliet but to be able, in perspective, to see the possible dereliet. I do not think anybody conversant with the medical profession could possibly suppose that advanced specialists, capable of doing the type of work demanded at our Ports of Entry, could be obtained at a salary of \$2,400.00 per annum. Our Medical Officers are not continuing their study for their own benefit at the public expense. They are working to obtain knowledge and information for the public. This special knowledge would enhance very little their position should they go into the active practice of medicine. The number of medical men required in private practice in this country with these qualifications is very limited. The work which our Medical Officers carry on has one special object only, namely, the public welfare.

Very many municipalities are complaining that they have now on their hands as public charges individuals who should have been stopped at the time of their arrival. The Department, since its institution in 1919, has been and is

making every effort to prevent these situations arising.

In conclusion may I quote from the letter of the Civil Service Commission to this Department, after the general situation and the requirements in each particular case had been fully laid before the Commissioners: As follows:—

#### DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH, January 23, 1923.

Dear Dr. Roche,—This letter is in furtherance of our recent conversation in connection with the allowance in lieu of house, fuel and light for Medical Officers of the Department of Health transferred from their headquarters.

You, I think, quite understand that, if the Medical Officers of the Department of Health, are thoroughly instructed in the medical aspects of each one of the services under our charge, such as immigration, quarantine, laboratory work, etc., the number of Medical Officers can be kept at a minimum as we can use them in the various services as required. To be able to do this they have to receive special technical instruction, and it is our custom, when occasion allows, to send them to points where this can be obtained. All this is in addition to the regular movements which may be necessary on very short notice among the services.

The principle of paying these Officers an allowance is approved by Order-in-Council No. 2163, dated June 25, 1921, but the amount of this allowance must be determined as between the Department and the Civil Service Commission. An amount of \$100.00 per month would be considerably less than the amount to be paid if these officers rendered accounts, supported by vouchers, of their actual reasonable living expenses. The Department—stating the circumstances in each case—has been making application to the Commission for its approval of the payment of this amount of allowance when required. This necessarily takes time and as these changes are imperative and must be made quickly, the delay militates against smooth and efficient administration and the Officers have often to depend on their personal private funds to meet their obligations in a strange place.

Accordingly, since the general principle has been approved, if your Commission can now approve of the plan above set out and will inform the Auditor General "that Medical Officers temporarily transferred from their assigned head-quarters may be paid, in lieu of house, fuel and light, a monthly allowance of \$100.00 during the period of their transfer," administration in the Department

will be considerably simplified.

# Civil Service Commission, January 27, 1923.

Sir,—Referring to the correspondence which has been exchanged between this office and your Department in regard to the payment of a living allowance of \$100.00 per month to Medical Officers while absent from Headquarters, I am now directed to inform you that the Commissioners have agreed to the proposals contained in your letter of the 23rd instant and I am notifying the Auditor General to that effect.

The apparent delay in dealing with these cases is due to the fact that the main part of the correspondence was carried on with the Chairman personally

rather than through the Commission office and it was, therefore, necessary to withhold the decision until his opinion could be obtained. As the Chairman has

been absent on account of illness this naturally took time.

While communicating to you the Commissioners' approval of your proposals I am, nevertheless directed to put clearly before you the Commission's feeling in regard to this matter. The Commission considers that the living allowance may be fairly justified when a medical officer is on duty away from his headquarters and it has, in every case approved of such allowance. questionable, however, whether an officer who is pursuing a course of studies at a University can logically be said to be on duty unless the Department is assured of benefiting by the said studies in his future services. The Commission receives frequent requests for leave of absence for Civil Servants to attend courses at Universities. Inasmuch as such absence is liable to seriously inconvenience the Department all such requests are consistently refused, even without pay, excepting in cases where the course of studies is along the line of the employee's present work and is calculated to fit him for promotion in the Service. In these cases leave of absence is granted, without pay. There have been one or two cases where it has been represented to the Commission that it is to the Department's interest to have the employee take the course in question and the Commission has approved of leave of absence, with pay. One such case is before me now in which the employee, having completed his course, more or less at the expense of the Department, has resigned his position. It is this feature of the case which has given rise to doubt in the Commission's mind as to the wisdom of the policy proposed by your Department. The Department of Health has gone a step farther than any other Department in proposing to allow, not only salary, but living expenses as well, to an employee while studying at the University.

It is manifestly to the advantage of the Department to have the Medical Officers take these courses if the Department can be sure of benefiting by the knowledge thus acquired, but the Commission feels that if such an unusual departure from the regular rule is to be authorized for the Department of Health it can only be justified by placing the Medical Officers in question under contract

to remain with the Department for a certain term of years.

I am sure that the Department will realize that the Commission in dealing with all the departments of the Government Service, has many problems of this kind to face and that if the concession made to the Department of Health were pleaded as a precedent by other departments which employ scientific and professional men, the Government might find itself educating many men for advancement in their profession without receiving any adequate return in service.

# Payment of Sales Tax after May 24, 1922

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH, April 24, 1923.

Dear Sir,—I have your letter of the 10th instant in connection with the refunding of amounts paid as sales tax on accounts rendered the Department after May 24th, 1922.

The Act referred to was assented to June 28th, 1922, and Section 15 was one of the Sections that was deemed to have come into force on May 24th, 1922. To get a ruling whether or not the sales tax would apply on purchases made by the Federal Government, the Purchasing Commission took the matter up with

the Commissioner of Customs and Exeise and it was some time after this date before we were advised that the sales tax would not apply. In the meantime, the sales tax was included on the accounts paid, but these amounts would be forwarded by the various firms to the Department of Customs and Exeise for

deposit to the credit of the Receiver General.

To go through all the accounts paid during this period and piek out the amounts paid as sales tax would take considerable time and the various firms could hardly be expected to make the refund without first obtaining it from the Department of Customs. Under the circumstances, considering the amount of work that would be necessary and the small amount of money involved, would it not be advisable to leave the money paid, contrary to this provision, shown as deposited to the credit of the Receiver General by the Department of Customs, instead of by this Department.

# DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH, April 30, 1923.

Dear Sir,—This is in reply to your letter under date of April 24th in respect to a payment made by the above-mentioned cheque. The facts of this case are

as follows:-

On January 24th, the Shipping Master at Vancouver, B.C., reported that Seaman Ramsay, ex "Canadian Observer," had died at St. Paul's Hospital, Vancouver, and that there was no money available to discharge the indebtedness to the Undertaker for funeral expenses. Correspondence was exchanged with a view to finding out whether the Canadian Government Merchant Marine would be liable for these expenses. It was found that the "Canadian Observer" had fulfilled all its obligations towards Ramsay by returning him to his home port and securing for him admission to hospital under the provisions of the Merchant Shipping Act. The surviving relative was absolutely unable to provide any funds towards meeting these funeral expenses.

It has been the practice for many years, whenever ship owners were not liable for funeral expenses and the family of the deceased was financially unable to meet the expenditure, to make an allowance towards remunerating the Under-

taker which was, in most instances, all he received.

It has been considered by the Department that the treatment of a sailor is not finished until, in the event of his death, his remains have been interred. In cases in which the relatives of the deceased were able and desired to control the funeral arrangements, the Department has insisted that they do so. In the absolutely destitute cases not only this Department, but previously the Department of Marine and Fisheries, when this Section of the Act was administered by that Department, for many years, carried out the policy outlined above.

# Certified Statements, covering all Absences, Required for all Employees

AUDIT OFFICE, June 28th, 1923.

Sir,—Section 43 of the Civil Service Regulations provides that a report shall be made forthwith to the Auditor General of all cases of sick and special leave. This regulation applies to all branches of the service, both to those employed at the departments at Ottawa and to those employed elsewhere.

While this information has been given me for sometime past with reference to the permanent employees at Ottawa paid from Civil Government, I have not

been getting it as a rule in regard to the other employees.

In order to give practical effect to this regulation, and to allow of a satisfactory audit of the paylists, I have to request that hereafter there be sent me month by month in support of each paylist a properly certified statement of all the absences, with the cause of such absence, whether with full pay, on half pay or without pay.

In cases of absence without pay for a prolonged period, the names should be carried on the paylists, in their regular order, so long as their connection with

your department continues.

#### Ministère de la Santé, 10 avril 1923.

CHER MONSIEUR,—J'ai l'honneur de répondre à votre lettre du 6 avril, relativement à certains officiers médicaux de ce ministère qui, pendant les mois d'hiver, alors que l'immigration n'est pas considérable, sont envoyés à certaines stations différentes de celles auxquelles on les avait d'abord nommés et reçoivent durant ces périodes une somme de \$100 par mois à titre de frais de subsistance.

Si l'on ne veut pas que le Canada soit inondé d'individus tarés au point de vue physique et moral, ou qui deviendront plus tard à la charge des municipalités ou des provinces dans lesquelles ils se scront établis, il faut arrêter ces individus aux ports d'entrée. C'est là le but de la loi d'Immigration. Afin de pouvoir découvrir ces individus tarés au moment où ils débarquent des bateaux, nos officiers doivent être placés à des endroits où ils peuvent voir ces gens et les étudier, c'est-à-dire dans les hôpitaux des grandes villes et dans les institutions spéciales où on les réunit afin de leur faire subir un traitement.

Nos officiers médieaux sont aussi "activement à l'emploi du ministère" lorsqu'ils étudient ces cas dans les institutions qu'en arrêtant des individus du même calibre lorsqu'ils débarquent des vaisseaux. Ils doivent non seulement pouvoir désigner ces épaves humaines, mais encore pouvoir distinguer les tarés possibles. Je ne crois pas que personne connaissant un tant soit peu la profession médicale puisse supposer que l'on peut obtenir les services de spécialistes experts pour faire le service de nos ports d'entrée à un traitement de \$2,400 par année. Nos officiers médicaux ne continuent pas leurs propres études aux frais du public. Ils travaillent afin d'obtenir des renseignements et de se perfectionner dans l'intérêt public. Ces connaissances spéciales ne leur seraient que d'une bien faible utilité s'ils s'engageaient dans la pratique active de la médecine. Dans la pratique privée, la demande est très limitée pour les médecins qui ont ces connaissances spéciales. Nos médecins font leur travail principalement dans un but philanthropique.

Un grand nombre de municipalités se plaignent qu'elles sont aujourd'hui obligées de pourvoir aux besoins d'individus à qui on aurait dû refuser l'admission au pays dès leur arrivée. Depuis sa création, en 1919, le ministère de la Santé

s'est appliqué à prévenir ces situations.

Pour conclure, je citerai un extrait d'une lettre de la Commission du Service Civil adressée au ministère, après qu'on eut expliqué la situation générale et les

besoins de chaque cas particulier aux commissaires:

"Relativement à la correspondance échangée entre ce bureau et votre ministère au sujet du paiement d'une allocation de subsistance de \$100 par mois aux médecins absents du bureau-chef, je suis chargé de vous informer que les commissaires approuvent les propositions faites dans votre lettre du 23 courant et j'avertis l'Auditeur général de ce fait (27 janvier 1923).

CHER DR. ROCHE,—Cette lettre est en quelque sorte la continuation de notre récent entretien au sujet de l'allocation aux médeeins du ministère de la Santé, au lieu d'une maison chauffée et éclairée, lorsque ceux-ci sont transférés de leurs

quartiers-généraux.

Vous comprenez très bien, je crois, qu'en faisant suivre des cours aux médecins du ministère de la Santé sur les divers sujet relevant de nos services, tels que l'immigration, la quarantaine, les travaux de laboratoire, etc., nous pourrons maintenir le nombre de nos médecins au striet minimum en les affectant aux divers services selon les besoins. Il leur faut suivre des cours techniques spéciaux avant d'être en mesure de faire cela, et nous avons l'habitude de les envoyer où ils peuvent suivre ces eours lorsque l'occasion favorable se présente. Ceci est ajouté à tous les déplacements réguliers qui peuvent être nécessaires à n'importe

quel moment dans nos services.

Les allocations à ces médecins sont approuvées en principe par l'Arrêté en Conseil n° 2163, daté le 25 juin 1921; mais le montant de cette allocation doit être déterminé par le ministère de concert avec la Commission du Service Civil. La somme de \$100 par mois est de beaucoup inférieure à celle qu'il faudrait payer si ces médecins produisaient des comptes de leurs frais réels de subsistance, avec pièces justificatives à l'appui. Le ministère—en indiquant les circonstances dans chaque cas—a demandé à la Commission d'approuver le versement de cette allocation au besoin. Cette procédure demande du temps et comme ces changements sont impératifs et doivent se faire rapidement, tout retard nuit au bon fonctionnement de l'administration et les médecins sont souvent obligés de compter sur leurs propres fonds pour subvenir à leurs besoins dans des centres étrangers.

Monsieur,—Relativement à la correspondance qui a été échangée entre ce bureau et votre ministère au sujet du paiement d'une allocation de subsistance au montant de \$100 par mois aux officiers médieaux, pendant leur absence des quartiers-généraux, je dois maintenant vous dire que les Commissaires ont accepté les propositions que contient votre lettre du 23 courant et je donne avis à l'Auditeur général en conséquence.

Si on a semblé retarder un peu le règlement de ces cas, c'est que la plus grande partie de la correspondance s'est faite avec le président personnellement, plutôt qu'avec la Commission et, conséquemment, on a dû attendre, avant de rendre une décision, l'opinion du président. Comme ce dernier a dû s'absenter

pour cause de maladie, toute l'affaire a été retardée.

Tout en vous communiquant l'approbation que les commissaires accordent à vos propositions, je dois, cependant, vous exposer clairement les vues de la Commission sur cette question. La Commission est d'avis que l'allocation de

subsistance est certainement justifiable lorsqu'un officier médical est de service en dehors des quartiers généraux et elle a, dans chaque cas, approuvé cette allocation. Il est douteux, cependant, que l'on puisse dire, logiquement, qu'un officier qui suit un cours d'études dans une université se trouve de service, à moins que le ministère soit assuré de retirer des avantages de ces études par des services futurs. La Commission recoit de nombreuses demandes de congé pour des employés civils qui désirent suivre un cours universitaire. Comme ces absences pourraient causer un tort considérable au ministère, toutes ces demandes sont refusées, même sans salaire, sauf dans des cas où le cours d'études se rapporte au travail actuel de l'employé et le prépare à une promotion dans le service. Dans ces cas, le congé est accordé, mais sans salaire. Il y a eu un ou deux eas où on a représenté à la Commission qu'il était dans l'intérêt du ministère qu'un employé suive tel cours, et la Commission a approuvé l'absence avec salaire. J'ai instement à régler un de ces cas maintenant où l'employé, après avoir complété son cours, plus ou moins au frais du ministère, a résigné sa position. C'est ce point de vue de la question qui a créé un doute dans l'esprit de la Commission quant à la sagesse de la politique que propose votre ministère. Le ministère de la Santé va un peu plus loin que tous les autres ministères, en demandant d'accorder, non sculement le salaire, mais les frais de subsistance à un employé pendant qu'il suit un cours universitaire.

Il est évident qu'il est à l'avantage du ministère que des officiers médicaux suivent ces cours, si le ministère est sûr de tirer profit de la science ainsi acquise, mais la Commission croit que si on doit autoriser une telle exception à la loi générale pour le ministère de la Santé, cette exception ne peut être justifiée qu'en forçant ces officiers médicaux à signer un contrat par lequel ces derniers s'engagent à demeurer au service de ce ministère pendant un certain nombre

d'années.

Je suis sûr que le ministère comprendra qu'en traitant avec les divers ministères du gouvernement, la Commission a plusieurs problèmes de cette nature à résoudre et que si les autres ministères se prévalaient de l'exception faite en faveur du ministère de la Santé dans le cas d'hommes scientifiques et professionnels, le gouvernement aurait peut-être à se charger de l'éducation d'un grand nombre d'hommes afin de les perfectionner dans leur profession sans en retirer un profit raisonnable en service futur.

### Paiement de l'impôt sur les ventes après le 24 mai, 1922

Cher Monsieur,—J'ai reçu votre lettre du 10 courant portant sur le remboursement des montants payés, sous forme d'impôt sur les ventes, sur les

comptes soumis au ministère après le 24 mai 1922.

La loi en question a été sanctionnée le 28 juin 1922 et l'article 15 était un des articles supposés avoir été mis en vigueur le 24 mai 1922. Dans le but d'obtenir une décision établissant si oui ou non l'impôt sur les ventes s'appliquait aux achats faits par l'Etat, la Commission des Achats a soumis la question au Commissaire de la douane et de l'accise et ce ne fut qu'un certain temps après cette date que nous fûmes avertis que l'impôt sur les ventes ne s'appliquait pas à ces cas. Dans l'intervalle, l'impôt sur les ventes a été inclus dans les comptes

payés, mais ces montants seront remis par les différentes compagnies au ministère de la Douane et de l'Accise pour être déposés au crédit du Receveur général.

Le fait de repasser tous les comptes payés pendant cette période et de relever les montants payés à titre d'impôt sur les ventes requerrait un temps considérable et l'on pourrait difficilement demander aux différentes compagnies de faire ces remboursements sans d'abord les avoir obtenus du ministère des Douanes. Dans ces circonstances, tenant compte de la somme de travail que cela représenterait et des faibles montants à rembourser, ne serait-il pas opportun de laisser le montant payé, contrairement aux dispositions de cet article, déposé au crédit du Receveur général par le ministère des Douanes, plutôt que par ce ministère.

### Ministère de la Santé, le 30 avril 1923.

Cher monsieur.—Voici la réponse à votre lettre en date du 24 avril relativement au paiement fait par le chèque susmentionné. Les faits de la cause sont les suivants.

Le 24 janvier le capitaine de navigation à Vancouver fit rapport du décès du marin Ramsay, du Canadian Observer, survenu à l'hôpital St. Paul à Vancouver. Il fit remarquer en même temps qu'il n'y avait pas d'argent disponible pour couvrir les frais de funérailles. Il y cut échange de correspondance en vue d'établir si la Marine Marchande du gouvernement canadien ne devait pas être responsable de ces déboursés. On a découvert que le Canadian Observer avait rempli ses obligations vis-à-vis de Ramsay en le ramenant à son port et en obtenant son admission à l'hôpital en vertu des dispositions de la Loi de la Marine Marchande. La famille du marin décédé se trouvait à ce moment dans l'impossibilité de pourvoir aux frais impliqués par les dites funérailles.

A chaque fois que les propriétaires de vaisseaux ne sont pas tenus responsables des frais funéraires et que la famille du défunt n'est pas capable, financièrement parlant de faire face à de tels déboursés, c'est la coutume depuis plusieurs années d'accorder une allocation en vue de rémunérer l'entrepreneur

funèbre; dans bien des cas e'est tout ce qu'il a reçu.

Le ministère considère que le traitement à accorder à un marin n'est pas complet à moins que, advenant son décès, l'on ait pourvu à ses funérailles. Si la famille du défunt est en mesure de pourvoir à ses funérailles, le ministère en général insiste qu'il en soit ainsi. Mais dans les cas de pauvreté absolue non seulement notre ministère, mais aussi autrefois, le ministère de la Marine et des Pêcheries alors que l'administration de cet article de la Loi tombait sous ce dernier ministère, a depuis plusieurs années suivi la politique dont il est question plus haut.

Dear Sir,—I have the honour to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 6th ultimo in which reference is made to Immigration cheque No. 7386, issued on the 26th September, 1921, for payment of \$106.50 to R. Aime Tison for translation work.

This payment to Mr. Tison came about in the following manner:—

We found it necessary owing to numerous amendments to the Immigration Act in recent years, to compile and publish a consolidation. The Government Printing Bureau could not undertake the translation work and refused to accept copy until it was properly translated and put in shape for printing. We had no person belonging to the Department competent to undertake this translation work which is of a highly technical character. At this point we consulted an Official of the Government Printing Bureau who was looking after

the printing of the English as well as the French edition and we asked for the name of some person who was accustomed to that work. In this way we had recommended to us, Mr. R. Aime Tison and we were informed that Mr. Tison had in charge the editing and translating of the Canada Gazette and that he was accustomed to doing translating and editing for other Departments for which he received a regulation charge of \$1.50 per page. We were informed that Mr. Tison did this extra work at home in the evenings.

Our work was therefore handed to Mr. Tison. The results so far as work is concerned were satisfactory to the Department. We paid the account because the man had been recommended to us from a Government source and we were informed that he was accustomed to doing such work out of hours and getting paid for same. On another occasion some years ago we paid an official translator of the House of Commons or the Senate for similar service.

Sir.—I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 18th ultimo, in reply to mine of December 6th, 1922, with reference to the payment of \$106.50 to R. Aime Tison, a permanent official in the Department of Public Printing and Stationery, for translation work. In connection with this payment I beg to refer you to Sections 22 and 45B (4) of the Civil Service Act.

Section 22 enacts as follows: "In the absence of special authority of "Parliament no payment additional to the salary authorized by law shall be "made to any Deputy Head, officer, clerk or employee permanently employed "in the Civil Service in respect of any service hereafter to be rendered by "him, whether on discharge of his ordinary duties of office or of any other "duties which may be imposed upon him or which he may undertake or "volunteer to discharge or otherwise perform."

Section 45/B (4), provides that "The Commission shall make regulations "under which the deputy head may for sufficient reason, authorize the payment of such additional remuneration as may be prescribed in such regulation to employees, not in administrative, or executive positions, for work done outside

" of prescribed hours."

I am not aware of any regulations having been made by the Civil Service Commission, under the authority of the section last quoted, which would be authority for the payment in question, and I doubt whether any regulation that might be made could legally apply to Mr. Tison's case on account of the position held by him as Editor of the Canada Gazette. In the absence of any such regulation I am of the opinion that the special authority of Parliament must be obtained to legalize this payment.

With regard to the case of payments to official translators of the House of Commons or Senate, to which you refer in your letter, I beg to point out that a special exception is made in their case by Section 35 of the Civil Service Act.

#### Travelling Expenses of Ottawa Officials to be paid from Civil Government Contingencies

DEPARTMENT OF IMMIGRATION AND COLONIZATION, OTTAWA, Jan. 23, 1923.

Dear Sir,—Under an Order in Council passed November 7th, 1913, the travelling expenses of Officials on the Inside Service at Ottawa were to be charged from April 1st, 1914, to Civil Government Contingencies instead of to the various appropriations as previous to the latter date. Because of this regulation we have on many occasions been charging to Civil Government Contingencies

expenses which I consider should have been charge to other votes.

For example, during the summer of 1922 we had an Inside Service Official temporarily transferred to perform the duties of the Canadian Government Official at New York. He was there for several months and the expenses of this position are ordinarily charged to Immigration Contingencies. But because he was an Inside Service Official the expenses were charged to Civil Government Contingencies. Another of our Inside Service Officials was recently transferred for a period of about six months to Antwerp. The expenses of this position are ordinarily chargeable to Immigration Contingencies. But on account of the aforementioned ruling we were compelled to charge them to Civil Government Contingencies.

I could go on and mention quite a number of similar cases where I consider the expenses have in a sense been wrongfully charged to Civil Government Contingencies. The purpose of this letter is to ascertain your opinion as to whether we should continue as we have been doing or whether we should charge expenses

in such cases as I have mentioned to other votes.

Dear Sir,—Referring to your letter of the 23rd instant as to the effect of an Order in Council of November 7, 1913, directing that all the travelling expenses of the officials at Ottawa be paid out of Civil Government Contingencies, on the travel of certain members of the Department of Immigration and Colonization who were engaged temporarily at places outside of Ottawa. I am of opinion that the Order in Council to which you refer applies to such officials.

As the Order recites, the object in view was to consolidate under one vote the travelling expenses of all officials at Ottawa, and due notice was given the various Departments to make the necessary provision in their estimates for Civil Government Contingencies so that the directions of the Treasury Board in this

respect might be rigidly enforced.

It seems to me no exception to this Order was contemplated.

Mr. Murphy arrived at Glasgow on the afternoon of March 14th, and charges up his board and lodging until March 31st; amounting in all to £19-15s.-0d. It seems to me that the reasons for allowing charges for board in such a case for a longer period than two or three days should be given, as only under registed allowers are board by allowed for a language period.

special circumstances can board be allowed for a longer period.

I might also point out that all accounts for removal expenses should be submitted to the Treasury Board for approval.

## Payment of Bonus to Employees classed as "Part Time Officials"

SIR,—The following Immigration officials, who were classed as "Part Time" officials, and paid at a rate less than the minimum rate of their class, have been paid the bonus by the Department of Immigration and Colonization.

J. Deans, agent, North Battleford, salary	\$650	00
Ganga Ram, inspector, Vancouver, salary	720	00
H. Glover, inspector, (Chinese) Union Bay, salary	900	00
R. B. Hallied, inspector, (Chinese) Chemainus, salary	900	00

The Department informs me that these men were actually devoting their whole time to immigration business but that on account of the comparatively small amount of work devolving upon them, it was not desired to pay them the full salary attached to their class, and that, accordingly, they were classed as

part time officials with a salary below the minimum of their class.

Under the bonus regulations part time officials are not entitled to participate in the bonus. If it is considered that the bonus should be paid in such cases the regulations should be amended, or a special classification should be given such officers which would permit of their receiving the bonus under the present regulations. Kindly advise me if you consider that these men should be asked to refund the bonus paid them, or if steps will be taken by you to legalize the payments.

## Charges by Agent C. A. Laurier, Manchester, N.H., for use of his own Automobile

AUDIT OFFICE, OTTAWA, October 11, 1923.

Sir.—In the examination of the expense accounts of your emigration agents in the United States, I find that the majority of them, if not all, were allowed to use their own automobiles on public service, for which they were allowed 15c. a mile.

My attention has been particularly drawn to the accounts rendered by Mr. C. A. Laurier, agent at Manchester, N.H., for his expenses attending exhibitions at various points in the states of Maine, New Hampshire and Vermont.

Mr. Laurier appears to have done all his travelling by automobile, there being no charge whatever for railway fares in his accounts. The following is a statement of his mileage when attending the exhibitions between August 26th and October 13th, 1922.

While I recognize the fact that the automobile may in many cases be used economically in the public service, still I am of opinion that its use should be watched very earefully, and should be allowed only when a distinct saving of time may be effected. The indiscriminate use of the automobile, especially when owned by the official himself, should not be allowed. In the case before me as there must be good train service in the district covered by Mr. Laurier, it seems to me that it would have been much more economical had Mr. Laurier travelled by train. The following statement makes a comparison between some of the charges made by Mr. Laurier and those made by Miss Gagnon, who acted as an assistant to Mr. Laurier and who travelled by railway:

From this it would appear that the cost of travelling by automobile is from four to five times the cost by railway.

I shall be glad to have your opinion as to the relative advantages in travelling by automobile and by train.

DEAR SIR,—In reply to your favour of October 11th calling my attention to the use by Mr. Laurier, our Agent at Manchester of his automobile while attending the fairs, I would say that authority was given the following agents:—

Geo. A. Hall, Milwaukee,

F. A. Harrison, Harrisburg, Pa., W. D. Nethery, Columbus, Ohio, O. G. Rutledge, Syracuse, N.Y. and C. A. Laurier, Manchester, N.H..

to use their motor cars on Government business and charge 15c. per mile. It is at times a great advantage to the Department for their Agents in the United States to use their motors, while engaged in field work, as they can personally call on their prospects at their homes in the country which cannot be done while travelling by rail, unless liveries are hired which cost more but I am of the opinion that when the arrangement was sanctioned by the Minister of the Department in 1920 it was not intended that automobiles should be used when travelling from fair to fair unless the exhibitions were some days apart and agents had prospects to visit between fair dates; neither was it ever intended that the agents should charge for the use of their automobiles during the progress of the fairs as appears to have been done by Mr. Laurier. The agents are supposed to be present in person at the fairs, meeting prospective settlers and furnishing information to one and all re Canada and if they are performing this duty properly they cannot at the same time be driving about the countryside in their autos.

As already stated there can be no question about the value of the automobile for certain purposes but in the case of Mr. Laurier with an almost unbroken list of fairs to attend from the end of August until the middle of October, he should have adopted the use of the railways which would have been much more economical and at the same time would not have interfered in any way with his attendance at any of the exhibitions. The entire question of the use of the automobile

is to receive immediate consideration.

# Payment of Actual Expenses, instead of Living Allowance, to Emigration Agent in the United States

AUDIT OFFICE, OTTAWA, May 21st, 1923.

Sir.—On April 19th last, two certificates were issued by the Civil Service Commission for the temporary appointment of Mr. A. E. May as Emigration Agent, Grade 2, at a salary of \$2,400 (prevailing rates), the one certificate being for a period of six months from September 27th, 1922, the second certificate extending the period of employment to August 31st, 1923.

According to the classification schedule, Emigration agents stationed in the United States may be paid a living allowance at the rate of \$300 a year in addition to their salary, which allowance in Mr. May's case would amount to \$153.33 for the period between September 27th, 1922, the date of his appointment, and the close of the fiscal year. I find, however, that during that period he received the following amounts for living expenses at Kansas City. His head-quarters in addition to his actual expenses when away from headquarters:

Rent of apartments\$ 270	
Light of apartment 3	82
Meals in Kansas City	45
Total 8 507	

I am of opinion that he can be allowed only \$153.33 on this account and that he should be called upon to refund the excess of \$353.94, together with any amounts that may have been paid him during the new fiscal year over and

above the legal rate of allowance.

I also notice that Mr. May appears to have been at Ottawa on September 27th, the day from which his appointment dates, and that, instead of proceeding directly to Kansas City, he went first to Edmonton, Alberta, and from there to Kansas City. Kindly inform me whether this trip to Edmonton was made strictly on departmental business or whether it was made for the purpose of removing his family or for other private purposes.

Mr. May has charges amounting in all to \$33.45 for cars fares in Kansas City, from the similarity of the charges for this service day after day, it would appear as if he might be charging his car fares between his residence and his office to which, of course, he cannot be considered to be entitled.

Dear Sir,—In reply to your favour of May 21st, re expenses of Mr. A. E. May at Kansas City, I would state that Mr. May is one of several field men who were appointed temporarily to work in different portions of the United States in an effort to increase emigration into Canada. To do this properly it was necessary to send practical men from Canada who were thoroughly acquainted with Canadian conditions, and also had a personal knowledge of the kind of land available and its precise location. These men have no headquarters in the United States although they were instructed to work in certain States and to make use of all information available in our permanent office located in the district in which they were working.

The natural consequence is, that they use our permanent office in their locality as a kind of pivot point to work out from and therefore, more time is

spent there than at other points.

I think that with the above explanation you will agree with me that these officers cannot be considered to be in the same category as a permanent Immigration Agent, and under these circumstances their full living expenses are legitimate charges.

### Employment of Special Agents in the United States

Audit Office, Ottawa, January 5, 1923.

Sir,—In the course of the examination of the vouchers for your expenditure on account of Immigration during the current fiscal year I find that the following special agents have been employed for extended periods at various points in the United States apparently without reference to the Civil Service Commission.

W. R. Ingram, Indianapolis, April 19th, to November 30th less 1 day in

July and 1 day in October, at \$200 a month.

J. C. Koehn, Mountain Lake, July 20th to November 30th less 1 day in

October, at \$1,800 a year.

John McColl, assistant to agent, Indianapolis, August 11th to November 30th, less 1 day November, at \$200 a month.

M. Mills, Great Falls, July 3rd to November 30th, less 1 day in October,

at \$2,000 a year.

G. H. Mooney, Detroit, July 6th to November 30th, less 1 day in October,

at \$200 a month.

Alex. Peddie, Indianapolis and Detroit, April 13th to November 30th less 3 days in July and 1 day in October, at \$200 a month.

I have no information at present as to the employment of these men after November 30th, as I have no accounts as yet later than those for November.

Subsection 4 of Section 23, as amended, of the Civil Service Act provides that employees required on short notice for emergency work outside the Dominion of Canada may be engaged by the Officer requiring such extra assistance, but that the names of the persons so employed shall be reported forthwith to the Commission and no such employment shall extend beyond ninety days, unless approved by the Commission. In the cases in question a break of one or two days without pay appears to have been made after each period of ninety days employment. This short break, however, would not warrant you in continuing their employment without the approval of the Commission, the employment being continuous to all intents and purposes. I have, accordingly, to request you to obtain the approval required by law for their employment after the first ninety days.

## Irregular Employment of Special Immigration Officers

AUDIT OFFICE, OTTAWA, November 20, 1923.

Sir,—Mr. R. L. Chevrier has been employed as a special immigration officer at Montreal from May 21st, 1922, at a salary of \$100.00 a month. Mr. G. L. Stewart has been employed in the same capacity at Toronto from September 19th, 1922, at a salary of \$150.00 a month.

In neither of these cases have I received the certificate of the Civil Service Commission authorizing the employment. I find, however, that in each case a period of one or two days, for which no payment of salary is made, occurs at the

end of each month.

In my opinion an interval of such brief period does not cause a break in their continuous employment under the Civil Service Act, and I shall be obliged if you will communicate with the Civil Service Commission and obtain the necessary certificate for each, approving of their employment up to the present time and for any further period which the department may deem necessary. It seems clear to me that the course followed by the department in these two cases is an evasion of the statute.

Subsection 4 of section 23 of the Civil Service Act requires the officer employing the temporary help to report to the Commission, through the deputy-head, the names of the persons so employed. May I ask if, in the cases of these two men, such reports to the Commission were made for each thirty days period of

employment.

## Living Expenses of H. M. Mitton, Emigration Agent at Antwerp

Audit Office, Ottawa, June 13, 1923.

Sir,—Mr. H. M. Mitton was promoted from Emigration Agent, Grade 2, at Peterborough, England, to Emigration Agent, Grade 3, at Antwerp, Holland, effective from June 1st, 1922. Although no living allowance was attached to the position of Emigration Agent on the Continent of Europe until September 1st, 1922, Mr. Mitton continued to draw the living allowance of \$500 a year attached to his former position, and also charged in his expense account his living expenses at Antwerp, his new headquarters, as well as when travelling. Later on the living allowance was adjusted, so that virtually he was paid that allowance in his new position from September 1st, only, as authorized by Order in Council of October 20th, 1922.

I find however in his expense account for the month of September a charge of 1,000 francs for rent of an apartment, as well as charges totalling to 454 francs

for meals in Antwerp. I also find in his October account a charge of 1,000 francs for rent of an apartment. The October expense account is the last one I have received so far.

I am of opinion that, as Mr. Mitton was in receipt of a properly authorized living allowance from September 1st, 1922, these charges for rent of quarters and for meals at Antwerp should not have been allowed, as the living allowance

is intended to cover such charges.

I am further of opinion that authority should be obtained for the payments of Mr. Mitton's expenses at Antwerp between June 1st, the date of his assignment to that post, and September 1st, the date from which the payment of a living allowance was authorized.

Dear Sir,—Your letter of the 13th June last relating to the living allowance paid to Mr. H. M. Mitton was held pending the return from Europe of Mr. Morisset, the Chief Accountant of this Department, who had been looking into the accounts of Mr. Mitton at Antwerp. I find now that by date of April 30th last Mr. Morisset wrote to the Department on the very point raised in your letter above mentioned, and do not think I can do any better than to quote the extract of his letter dealing with the subject of the allowance to Mr. Mitton. He said.—

You will notice that Mr. Mitton's full board and room for September and his room for October at Antwerp have been left in his accounts.

Although these charges may appear extraordinary in view of the fact that he was also paid separately a living allowance at the rate of \$500.00 per year for these two months, I say in all sincerity and in fairness to Mr. Mitton that it would be most unjust under the circumstances to disallow the living expenses for the two months above mentioned. The whole question was thoroughly looked into by me and fully discussed with Mr. Willians and Mr. Mitton, and Mr. Willians fully concurs in my decision. It is true that these payments are contrary to the literal terms contained in the Orders in Council fixing the dates of Mr. Mitton's permanent appointment at Antwerp on June 1st, 1922, and of his living allowance of \$500.00 on the Continent on September 1st, 1922, but in this case, these dates, if arbitrarily applied, would certainly impose a hardship on Mr. Mitton, which the Department never intended to impose.

I have evidence in hand that Mr. Mitton had to pay for the rent of his house in England to the end of October, 1922, when it was sub-let by

him at a loss.

He was advised by cable on the 31st of August that from September 1st no living expenses at Antwerp would be allowed. It will be realized that up to that date Mr. Mitton was in total ignorance as to the date his appointment at Antwerp was to take effect, and therefore, no action was taken by him to close his house in England, where his family were living, until the receipt of the cablegram of August 31st. It cannot be reasonably expected that the disposing of his house in England and the moving of his family could be effected the next day following the receipt

of the cable. As a matter of fact Mr. Mitton was able to bring his family to Antwerp in the first days of October only, and it was not until the end of October that he was able to dispose of his house in England.

Therefore, in view of the above considerations, I am prepared to

allow Mr. Mitton for his expenses as quoted here below:-

(a) House allowance at Peterborough for three months from June 1st to August 31st. 1922, \$500.00 per year at 12.72 <sup>3</sup>/<sub>10</sub> Belgian franes to the Dollar, which was the rate on August 31/22.

(b) Both his house allowance in England and his living expenses in

Antwerp for September, 1922.

(c) His house allowance in England and his room rent in Antwerp, without meals, for October, 1922, he then being in a position to take his meals at home upon arrival of his wife.

If, applying the literal terms of the Orders in Council relating to this case, the Auditor General is making objections, an Order in Council should then be passed regularizing the above expenses.

I concur in what Mr. Morisset says and I hope you will agree that although the payment of both a living allowance and living expenses may not be absolutely in accordance with the terms of the Orders in Council referred to in your letter, under the circumstances Mr. Mitton is legitimately entitled to these expenses.

Sir,—In the course of the examination of your expenditure for the fiscal year 1922-23 I find that \$250 was paid to Mr. C. F. Carter by cheques No. 6710 for \$200 and No. 6946 for \$50, being a part of the total expenses of himself and wife on a trip through Western Canada.

According to a notation on the voucher submitted in support of these payments, the total expenses of the trip were about \$750, and your department's contribution of \$250 was in accordance with an arrangement made with Mr.

Carter by Mr. R. J. C. Stead, your Director of Publicity.

I think that you will agree with me that all payments of this nature should be carefully scrutinized by this office, as well as by your own department. To that end, it is essential that I be furnished with full particulars of each case, showing the arrangement entered into and the connection it has with immigration to Canada.

Your vote for the current year provides for the making of grants to Immigration or Colonization Societies or Associations as may be authorized by the Governor-in-Council; I think that that principle should be extended to cases such as the present one, and that all payments of expenses or grants towards expenses to persons who are not officials of your department should also be authorized by the Governor in Council.

DEAR SIR,—I have the honour to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 8th instant referring to an expenditure of \$981.35 by Commissioner Thomas Gelley of Winnipeg to cover the expenses of a trip through Canada of Baron Sandberg and wife.

The history of this case briefly is that for years the Department has been seeking ways and means of reaching prospective immigrants in certain Continental countries; one of these was Holland. Some few years ago Baron Sandberg was largely instrumental in forming what is known as the Netherlands Emigration League. This League is regarded by the Government of the Netherlands as the channel through which emigration matters could be safely handled. The League receives its support largely, if not wholly, from the Dutch Government.

After some months of correspondence between the Department and Baron Sandberg and after our officers on the Continent had come into contact with him and his work, it was decided that it would be greatly to our advantage to have Baron Sandberg and his wife take a trip through Canada to see for themselves

the opportunities offered for Dutch farm hands. I may say that the year before he came out he had sent us a number of excellent farm hands whom we placed in the Province of Ontario. Baron Sandberg was therefore invited to visit Canada and we secured for himself and his wife from the transportation companies, free transportation. We had an officer accompany them throughout the various stages of their visit and it was considered that the Department should pay the hotel and other travelling expenses in view of our interest in Dutch immigration. As indicating that the view taken at that time of the importance of the visit was the correct one. I may say that since the return to Hollland of Baron Sandberg and wife we have had an increased flow of the agricultural classes and at the present moment there are en route to Canada between sixty and seventy young Hollanders to be placed on farms, whose passages are paid in part by the Dutch Government. This is an almost unprecedented move on the part of any Foreign Government and we believe that it has come about very largely owing to the favourable report made to the Dutch Government by Baron Sandberg.

The Department carries on propaganda work in various ways. The printing and distribution of literature is a recognized form of expenditure, but not more so than the use of delegates either sent from Canada to some other country

or delegates from some other country to Canada.

L'article 45B (4) pourvoit à ce que "La Commission fasse des règlements sous l'autorité desquels le sous-ministre peut pour des raisons adéquates autoriser le paiement de toute indemnité supplémentaire qu'il peut être preserit dans ces règlements en faveur des employés travaillant en dehors de leurs fonctions administratives ou exécutives, à des travaux effectués hors des heures officielles."

Les règlements concernant le boni ne permettent pas aux fonctionnaires à emploi irrégulier de toucher le boni. Si on est d'avis que le boni doit être payé dans ces cas, il va falloir amender les règlements, ou reclassifier ces employés de manière à leur permettre de toucher le boni sous l'autorité des règlements actuels. L'intention n'était pas non plus que les agents exigent une rétribution pour l'emploi de leurs automobiles au cours des foires, comme M. Laurier semble l'avoir fait. Les agents sont supposés être présents en personnes aux foires, afin d'y rencontrer les futurs colons et de fournir des renseignements à tout le monde au sujet du Canada, et s'ils accomplissent ces fonctions comme ils le doivent, ils ne peuvent pas se promener en même temps dans la campagne avec leurs automobiles.

Comme je viens de le dire, il n'y a pas de doute que l'automobile est très précieuse à certains égards, mais en ce qui concerne M. Laurier, comme il avait une liste quasi ininterrompue de foires auxquelles il devait assister, à partir de la fin d'août jusqu'au milieu d'octobre, il aurait dû se servir des chemins de fer, ce qui aurait été bien plus économique, et ce qui ne l'aurait pas en même temps

empêché d'assister à aucune des expositions.

Toute la question de l'emploi des automobiles va être mis à l'étude immédiatement.

May, comme agent d'émigration. classe 2, à un salaire de \$2,400 (taux courants); le premier certificat était pour une période de six mois à compter du 27 septembre 1922, et le second prolongeait la période d'emploi jusqu'au 31 août 1923.

D'après la classification du service, les agents d'émigration stationnés aux Etats-Unis peuvent recevoir une allocation de subsistance au taux de \$300 par année, en plus de leur salaire; cette allocation de subsistance, dans le eas de M. May, devrait être de \$153.33 pour la période du 27 septembre 1922, date de sa nomination, et la clêture de l'exercice financier. Je trouve, cependant, que pour cette période, M. May a reçu les montants qui suivent comme frais de subsistance à Kansas City, où il est stationné, en plus de ses frais réels en dehors de cet endroit.

Je suis d'avis qu'on ne peut lui accorder que \$153.33 pour ce compte et qu'on devrait lui demander de rembourser la différence, soit \$353.94, ainsi que tout montant qu'il aurait pu recevoir au cours de l'exercice actuel en plus du taux

légal de l'allocation.

Je remarque aussi qu'il semble que M. May se trouvait à Ottawa le 27 septembre, date de sa nomination, et que, au lieu de se rendre directement à Kansas City, il alla d'abord à Edmonton, Alberta, et de là à Kansas City. Veuillez être assez bon de me dire si ee voyage à Edmonton a été entrepris pour le ministère seulement, ou dans le but d'aller chercher sa famille, ou pour toute autre affaire privée.

M. May charge divers montants formant un total de \$33.45 pour service de tramways à Kansas City, et si on en juge par la similarité des montants chargés pour ee service jour après jour, il semble qu'il charge son passage sur les tramways entre sa résidence et son bureau, frais auxquels il n'a, naturellement, aucun

droit.

octobre, à \$200 par mois.

Alex. Peddie, Indianapolis et Détroit, du 13 avril au 30 novembre, moins 3

jours en juillet et une journée en octobre, à \$200 par mois.

Je ne possède pas de renseignements à l'heure actuelle quant à l'emploi de ces fonctionnaires après le 30 novembre, vu que je n'ai pas encore de comptes

postérieurs à ceux de novembre.

Le sous-article 4 de l'article 23, tel que modifié, de la loi du service civil, stipule que les employés requis à bref délai pour une besogne urgente en dehors du Canada, peuvent être engagés par le fonctionnaire ayant besoin de ladite aide, mais que les noms des personnes ainsi employées seront signalés immédiatement à la Commission du Service civil. De plus, ces emplois ne dépasseront pas la période de quatre-vingt-dix jours, à moins d'être approuvés par la Commission.

Dans les cas en question, il semble y avoir eu une interruption d'un ou de deux jours, sans rémunération, après chaque période de quatre-vingt-dix jours d'emploi. ## Frais de subsistance de M. H. M. Mitton, agent d'émigration à Anvers

Monsieur,— M. H. M. Mitton a été promu du poste d'agent d'émigration, classe 2, à Peterborough, Augleterre, à celui d'agent d'émigration, classe 3, à Anvers, Belgique, telle promotion devant prendre effet le 1er juin 1922. Bien que la position d'agent d'émigration sur le continent européen ne comportait aucune allocation de subsistance avant le 1er septembre 1922, M. Mitton a continué de toucher l'allocation de subsistance de \$500 annuellement que comportait sa position antérieure. Il fait aussi figurer dans son compte de frais ses dépenses de subsistance à Anvers, son nouveau quartier général, tout comme quand il voyageaît. Plus tard son allocation de subsistance a été mise à point, de sorte que virtuellement il n'a touché cette allocation dans sa nouvelle position que depuis le 1er septembre, tel que la chose a été autorisée par l'arrêté du conseil du 20 septembre 1922.

Je constate cependant que dans son compte de frais pour le mois de septembre, il fait entrer la somme de 1,000 francs pour le loyer d'un appartement et un autre article formant la somme de 454 francs pour des repas à Anvers. Dans son compte du mois d'octobre je trouve également la somme de 1,000 francs pour le loyer d'un appartement. Le compte du mois d'octobre est le dernier qui m'est parvenu.

Puisque depuis le 1er septembre 1922 M. Mitton touchait une allocation de subsistance régulièrement autorisée, je suis d'avis que ces frais de loyer et de repas à Anvers n'auraient pas dû être payés parce que l'allocation de subsis-

tances est destiné à les couvrir.

Je crois de plus qu'on devrait faire approuver le paiement des frais de M. Mitton à Anvers pour la période écoulée du 1er juin, date de sa nomination à ce poste, jusqu'au 1er septembre, date à laquelle on a autorisé le paiement d'une allocation de subsistance.

Monsieur,—Nous attendions pour répondre à votre lettre du 13 juin dernier relative à l'allocation de subsistance versée à M. H. M. Mitton, le retour d'Europe de M. Morisset, le comptable en chef de notre ministère, qui a examiné les comptes de M. Mitton à Anvers. Je constate à présent que le 30 avril dernier M. Morisset écrivait au ministère sur le sujet même que vous mentionnez dans votre lettre précitée. Je ne saurais mieux faire que de citer le passage de sa lettre qui traite de l'allocation versée à M. Mitton. Le voiei:

"Vous remarquerez que M. Mitton a laissé dans son compte le plein montant de sa pension et le loyer de sa chambre pour le mois de septembre et le loyer de sa chambre pour le mois d'octobre, alors qu'il était à Anvers.

Cela peut paraître extraordinaire vu que pour ces deux mois il a touché en outre une allocation de subsistance au taux de \$500 par année. Toutefois, bien sincèrement et en toute justice pour M. Mitton, je dis que dans les circonstances il serait tout à fait injuste de lui refuser les frais de subsistance pour les deux mois susmentionnés. J'ai étudié la question à fond et je l'ai discutée avec M. Williams et M. Mitton et M. Williams partage mon opinion. Il est vrai que ces versements constituent une violation de la lettre des arrêtés du conseil qui décrètent que la nomination permanente de M. Mitton à Anvers remonte au 1er juin 1922 et que le paiement d'une allocation de subsistance de \$500 sur le continent est autorisé à partir du 1er septembre 1922, mais si l'on s'en tient arbitrairement à ces dates, on créerait une situation difficile à M. Mitton, ce que le ministère n'a jamais contemplé.

J'ai la preuve en main que M. Mitton a payé le loyer de sa maison en Angleterre jusqu'à la fin d'octobre 1922, alors qu'il la sous-loua à perte.

On l'avisa par câblogramme le 31 août qu'à partir du 1er septembre on ne lui accorderait plus de frais de subsistance à Anvers. On comprendra que jusqu'à cette date M. Mitton ignorait complètement à quelle date devait commencer à compter sa nomination à Anvers, et par conséquent il n'avait fait aucune démarche pour se débarrasser de sa maison en Angleterre, où habitait sa famille jusqu'au moment de la réception du câblogramme du 31 août. On ne peut raisonnablement prétendre qu'il pouvait disposer de sa maison en Angleterre, et faire venir sa famille à Anvers le lendemain de la réception du câblogramme. De fait M. Mitton ne put faire venir sa famille à Anvers que dans les premiers jours d'octobre et ce n'est qu'à la fin d'octobre qu'il put disposer de sa maison en Angleterre.

Par conséquent, en raison des considérations précitées, je suis disposé

à approuver le remboursement à M. Mitton des frais suivants:-

(a) Loyer de maison à Peterborough pour trois mois à partir du 1er juin jusqu'au 31 août 1922, à \$500 par année, à 12.72<sub>10</sub> de francs belges au dollar, taux du cours le 31 août 1922.

(b) Le loyer de sa maison en Angleterre et ses frais de subsistance

à Anvers pour le mois de septembre 1922.

- (c) Le loyer de sa maison en Angleterre et de sa chambre à Anvers, non compris les repas, pour le mois d'octobre 1922, puisqu'il pouvait alors prendre ses repas à domicile depuis l'arrivée de sa femme.
- Si, s'en reportant à la lettre de l'arrêté du conseil relatif à ce cas, l'Auditeur général refuse d'approuver cette décision pour autoriser ce paiement."

Je partage l'avis de M. Morisset et j'espère que vous conviendrez que, bien que le paiement simultané d'une allocation de subsistance et de frais de subsistance n'est pas conforme aux stipulations de l'arrêté du conseil mentionné dans votre lettre, dans les circonstances M. Mitton a légitimement droit de se faire rembourser ces frais.

Cher Monsieur,—J'ai l'honneur d'accuser réception de votre lettre du 8 courant, à propos d'un déboursé de \$981.35 fait par le commissaire Thomas Gelley, de Winnipeg, afin de couvrir les dépenses d'un voyage à travers le

Canada, du baron Sandberg et de sa femme.

Brièvement, cette affaire s'explique par le fait que le ministère cherche depuis des années, des moyens d'atteindre les futurs immigrants dans certains pays continentaux. L'un de ceux-ci est la Hollande. Il y a quelques années le baron Sandberg a beaucoup contribué à la formation de ce que l'on appelle la Netherlands Emigration League. Le gouvernement hollandais considère que cette Ligue est l'agence qui pourrait régler en toute sûreté les questions d'émigration. La Ligue reçoit son appui, en grande partie, sinon entièrement, du

gouvernement hollandais.

Après que le ministère et le baron Sandberg eurent échangé de la correspondance pendant plusieurs mois, après que nos fonctionnaires sur le continent furent venus en contact avec lui et avec sa besogne, il fut décidé que ce serait grandement à notre avantage que le baron Sandberg et sa femme fassent un voyage au Canada, afin de se convaincre par eux-mêmes des chances d'emplois pour les ouvriers de ferme hollandais. Je puis dire que l'année précédent son voyage, il nous avait envoyé un certain nombre d'excellents ouvriers de ferme qu'il avait placés dans la province d'Ontario. Le baron Sandberg fut donc invité à visiter le Canada, et nous avons obtenu pour lui-même et pour sa femme des compagnies de transport, leur transport gratuit. Nous les fîmes accompagner par un fonctionnaire dans tous les endroits qu'ils visitèrent pendant leur voyage, et on a jugé que le ministère devrait payer leurs dépenses d'hôtel et autres dépenses de voyage. par suite de l'intérêt que nous avons porté à l'immigration hollandaise. Afin de vous démontrer que l'opinion que nous nous étions faite de cette visite était exacte, je puis dire que depuis le retour du baron Sandberg et de sa femme dans leur pays, il s'est produit une grande augmentation dans l'affluence des classes agricoles. Il y a actuellement en route pour le Canada, entre soixante et soixantedix jeunes hollandais, devant être placés sur des fermes, dont les traversées sont payées en partie par le gouvernement hollandais. C'est une action presque sans précédent de la part d'un gouvernement étranger, et nous croyons qu'on peut en attribuer le mérite dans une très grande mesure au rapport favorable fait par le gouvernement hollandais au baron Sandberg.

Ce ministère fait de la propagande de diverses manières. L'impression et la distribution de littérature sont une forme reconnue de déboursés, mais pas plus que l'emploi de délégués, soit envoyés du Canada dans quelque autre pays, ou

des délégués de quelque autre pays envoyés au Canada.

Kindly see that this abatement for the Retirement Fund is made in all

future payments of salary.

Robertson, chief surveyor of your department, when visiting Brantford between January 24th and March 20th last. I understand from your accounting branch that Mr. Robertson was acting as agent at the Six Nations Reserve during that period. In these accounts I find several items to which I have to take exception.

should be furnished by Mr. Robertson.

On four occasions during the period covered by Mr. Robertson's accounts he appears to have returned to Ottawa for the week end, arriving in Ottawa on Saturday morning and leaving again on Sunday night, at a cost of approximately \$30 for each trip. I should like to be assured that each of these week end trips was necessarily undertaken on departmental business.

In connection with these week end trips I notice that Mr. Robertson makes

the following charges for meals at Ottawa:

As Mr Robertson's headquarters are supposed to be at Ottawa, these charges cannot be allowed and should be refunded.

In the hotel bill at Brantford paid on March 17th, amounting to \$26.05, there is a charge of \$1.55 for laundry which cannot be allowed and should be refunded.

Mr. Robertson's expenses have been charged to your vote for Ontario and Quebec; as he is an Ottawa official I have to ask why these expenses were not paid from Civil Government Contingencies, in accordance to the Order-in-Council of November 7th, 1912.

Sir,—I am in receipt of your letter of the 19th inst. (No. 112-75) in reply to mine of the 11th with regard to the expenses of Mr. D. F. Robertson when

visiting Brantford in January, February and March last.

The explanation given by Mr. Robertson of his various trips to Ottawa may be regarded as satisfactory. With regard to the living expenses at Ottawa, I would say that while there may be some reason for allowing them in this case still such charges should be watched very carefully and allowed only in very exceptional circumstances, as the practice is one that would be very apt to be abused.

The reasons given in your letter for charging these expenses to the Ontario and Quebec vote instead of to Civil Government Contingencies, viz., (1) That the vote for Civil Government Contingencies would not bear the charge without a supplementary vote being obtained and (2) that as Mr. Robertson was Acting

Indian Agent it was considered that the agency should be charged with his expenses, cannot be considered sufficient: the Order in Council of November 7th, 1913, directs that the expenses of all Ottawa officials be charged against Civil Government Contingencies; if it were desired to charge such expenses against any other vote special authority to do so should have been obtained from Council.

## Department of Indian Affairs, Ottawa, June 21, 1923.

Dear Sir,—In reply to your letter of the 14th instant, asking why eleven years were allowed to lapse before payment was made to Mr. Louis Kaufman for building a Roman Catholic church at Shawanaga, I beg to say that when the building of a church was undertaken, payment was to be made by the Indians and to assist them permits were issued to cut sufficient logs to exchange for lumber for this church.

The plans of the original church were changed and an addition as a residence for the priest was erected. This residence was necessary as the priest visits the reserve for a few days at stated periods and there was no home convenient for his accommodation. Mr. Kaufman supplied extra lumber and hardware, also paid for labour, thus increasing the cost of the building to \$852.92, and received payment in logs to the value of \$404.46 only, thus leaving an expenditure made by Mr. Kaufman of \$448.46 for which he was not reimbursed.

Mr. Kaufman and the Indians tried to arrange matters but it was impossible for the Indians to make payment unless the money was raised by illegally cutting logs.

The Department could not allow this, consequently when the matter was referred to the Department in 1921 for settlement and it was ascertained that the Indians were all in favour of paying Mr. Kaufman, as evidenced by the resolution of the Indian Council passed on the 21st November, 1921, it was decided to grant their request.

Order-in-Council was obtained 9th June, 1922, granting authority to pay Mr. Kaufman the balance owing to him and accordingly cheque No. 1977 for

\$448.46 was issued in Mr. Kaufman's favour.

### Re-embursement for Expenses arising out of Cancelled Sale.

Sir,—I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 9th instant, with respect to Ontario and Quebec cheque No. 274, issued on May 29th, 1922, for the sum of \$81.55, to one Carroll Haffell Powell, of Kingston, for certain disbursements made by him in connection with the sale to him of Little Horse Shoe Island, which sale was subsequently cancelled.

This Department on the 2nd day of August, 1921, sold what is known as Island No. 3 in Lake Ontario to one Carroll Haffell Powell, and subsequent investigation convinced the Department that the sale was made in error, in that this island No. 3 was at the time of survey in 1863 considered a part of what is known as Horse Shoe Island, and as such was included in a patent covering the western portion of the island, which patent issued to one James Eccles, on the 5th day of December, 1872.

Upon cancellation of the sale of Island No. 3 to Mr. Powell, a claim for certain disbursements made by him in connection with the purchase was presented to the Department through his solicitors, Messrs. Nickle, Farrell & Day, of Kingston. A copy of this claim is attached hereto, and with reference particularly to the item of \$50, the explanation given is that the expenditure was incurred in the purchase of dynamite for the purpose of blasting a sheltered harbour for a motor-boat.

With reference to the third and last paragraph of your letter, you are correct in assuming that the certification of the Justice Department on the 24th of January, 1923, was intended to show that in the opinion of that Department, Mr. Powell had a legal claim against this department for the sum of \$81.55, as

itemized in the statement hereto appended.

If it were not so used I do not think that Mr. Powell should be allowed to retain the dynamite in addition to being reimbursed for its purchase.

## Payment towards Construction of Provincial Highways

SIR,—Nova Scotia Cheque No. 615, drawn on December 12, 1922, is for the payment of \$3,000 to the Town of Truro as partial cost of reconstructing 3,325 feet of Halifay-Truro highway through Millbrook Indian Reserve

feet of Halifax-Truro highway through Millbrook Indian Reserve.

From a letter from the Town Clerk of Truro, which is attached to the voucher, I infer that this reserve is included in the Town of Truro, and that the total cost of that part of the road which passes through the reserve was \$3,495.

It appears to me that although this section of road passes through the Indian reserve it formed a part of the Halifax-Truro Highway, and as such was constructed or re-constructed more for the benefit of the public in general and of the town in particular than for the immediate benefit of the Indians. Under these circumstances would it not have been more equitable if a greater part of the cost had been borne by the municipality instead of only about one-seventh of the cost.

As you will note it was first intended that this grant be paid from the funds at the credit of the Caughnawaga Indians, but it was later considered inadvisable as this course would have depleted the funds of this band to a much greater extent than that anticipated when the first estimates were being submitted by the Quebec Provincial Government. Provision to meet this expenditure was therefore made in the Supplementary Estimates of 1922-23.

ways in settlement of your department's share of the expenditure on the Provincial Highway through the Tyendinaga Indian Reserve, between January 31st, 1919, and Deember 31st, 1920.

This payment is made up as follows:—

Jan. 31, 1919, to Jan. 31, 1920—Cost of construction. \$14.395.78.

Department's share, 30 per cent...... \$ 4,318 73

Jan. 31, 1920, to Dec. 31, 1920—Cost of construction, \$41,352.93; maintenance, \$1,125.50. Total, \$42,478.43.

In connection with this payment, I have to ask if any agreement was entered into between the Provincial Government and your Department, with regard to the division of the costs of this road; if any such agreement was made, kindly let me have a copy of the same.

I notice that in this case your department is charged with 30 per cent of the cost of construction for the first year, and with 20 per cent of the combined cost of construction and cost of maintenance for the second year, the amounts paid being based on the figures supplied by the Provincial Engineer of Highways. In the case of a similar payment to the Quebec Provincial Government for a contribution to the Caughnawaga-Malone Highway, through the Caughnawaga Reserve, the amount paid by your department was only 10 per cent, and that 10 per cent was based not on the amount of \$181,000 to be paid to the contractor, but on \$122,371.80, the amount arrived at by the Dominion Highways Commissioner as being the strictly necessary expenditure under the Canadian Highways Act and regulations thereunder. I should like to be advised as to why the payment to the Ontario Provincial Government was treated in a different manner from that to the Quebec Provincial Government.

#### DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HIGHWAYS, TORONTO, November 15, 1921.

DEAR SIR,—The Provincial Highway easterly from Toronto to Ottawa and the Quebee boundary passes through the southern portion of the County of Hastings. A portion of this highway from approximately the village of Marysville to the town of Descronto, passes through the Tyendinaga Indian Reserve; also a short section in the vicinity of Shannonville.

Under the Provincial Highway Act a portion of all expenditure on Provincial Highways within the County is chargeable to the corporation of the county. For the year 1919 this proportion was thirty per cent of the expendi-

ture, and for the year 1920 the proportion was twenty per cent.

The County of Hastings, in making payment of the amount levied upon the county, have objected to being held responsible for expenditure within the Indian Reserve; and I am recently advised by Mr. Robert Cook, M.P.P., that upon representations made to the Department of Indian Affairs, your Department has consented to relieve the County of Hastings from liability for expenditure within the Indian Reserve.

Upon the advice of Mr. Cook, I am therefore enclosing to you statements of our expenditure for the years in question. As shown by the summary accompanying the statements for the two years, the amount of \$4,318.73 is due on account of expenditure in the year 1919; and \$8,495.69 for expenditure in the

year 1920.

I would be pleased to receive from you confirmation of our understanding in the matter, that your Department will assume the obligation of the county of Hastings with respect to the Provincial Highway in the Tyendinaga Indian Reserve.

A copy of the Provincial Highway Act and amendments thereto is herewith enclosed.

Sir,—I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 11th inst., (No. 23034-2) in reply to mine of the 9th inst., respecting a payment of \$12,814.42 to the Ontario Department of Public Highways in connection with the Highway

through the Tyendinaga Indian Reserve.

It appears from your reply that under the Provincial Highways Act a portion of all expenditure on Provincial Highways within any county is chargeable against the corporation of that county, and that the proportions so chargeable were fixed at 30 per cent of the expenditure for 1919 and 20 per cent for 1920. It further appears that the county of Hastings objected to being held responsible for expenditure within the Indian Reserve and that accordingly your department agreed to relieve the county from liability for such expenditure.

The amount paid by you to the Province of Ontario on account of construction was \$12.589.32 being 30 per cent of \$14,395.78 for 1919, and 20 per cent of \$41,352.93 for 1920, and \$225.10 on account of maintenance for 1920

being 20 per cent of \$1,125.50.

I beg to point out that the Department of Railways and Canals had already paid to the Province of Ontario the sum of \$16.168.29, being 40 per cent of \$40,420.72 the amount established by the Highways Commission as being the actual, necessary and reasonable cost to December 31, 1920, of the Highway through the Tyendinaga Reserve.

You will note that while the cost of construction to December 31, 1920. is given by the Ontario Department of Highways as \$55,748.71 the cost as passed by the Federal Highways Commission as being necessary and reasonable was \$40,420.72, a difference of \$15,327.99.

I am of opinion that any contribution to the construction of this highway that your department might feel called upon to make should be based on the reasonable cost as established by the Highways Commission, not on the actual amount paid out by the Ontario Government. At the same time I think that all payments of this nature should be authorized by the Governor in Council, and have accordingly to request you to obtain the authority of Council for this payment.

## Overpayments on Account of Salary to Agent J. Weir

AUDIT OFFICE, OTTAWA, June 12, 1923.

Sir.—I beg to ask your attention to the payments made since April 1st.

1919, to John Weir, Indian Agent, on account of salary.

Mr. Weir was originally graded as Indian Agent, grade 4, effective from April 1st, 1919, the minimum salary of that grade being \$1,440 per annum. Later on his classification was changed, on account of a change in his position, to Indian Agent, Grade 5, with a minimum salary of \$1,980 less \$480 for house, light, rations, etc., received. During the fiscal year 1919-20 he was paid a salary of \$1,200, to which was afterwards added arrears to the amount of \$300, making the total salary for that year \$1,500, the minimum of grade 5 less \$480 for allowances; from April 1st, 1920, he was paid at the rate of \$1,620, the department evidently assuming that his appointment was a permanent one. On February 2nd, 1922, a certificate was issued by the Civil Service Commission increasing his salary to \$1,740, effective from October 1st, 1921, and on July 15th, 1922, a further certificate was issued increasing his salary to \$1,860 from October 1st, 1922. The first of these certificates was acted upon and he was paid at the rate of \$1,740 from October 1st, 1921, the second certificate, however, was not acted upon, as on August 29th, 1922, the Civil Service Commission notified you that their attention had been drawn to the fact that Mr. Weir was a temporary employee who had been recommended for permanency under the blanketing-in regulations and that, accordingly, the two certificates previously issued for salary increases were cancelled. Mr. Weir was subsequently made permanent under the blanketing-in regulations, effective from April 1st, 1921.

As the payments up to the time you were notified of the cancellation of the certificates granting the increases were made in good faith and had at the time the authority of the Commission, I think it might be difficult to establish a legal claim against Mr. Weir for the overpayments, but, at the same time I am of opinion that he should be called upon to refund the overpayments made since the cancellation of those certificates which would amount to \$70, being for seven months at the difference between \$1,740 and \$1,620 a year.

# BLACKFOOT AGENCY, GLEICHEN, ALTA., March 6, 1923.

Sir,—In reply to your letter fyle 31-104 dated 28th February, re painting the Agency buildings, I beg to inform you that W. T. Davidson had the contract and one of the men working for him was A. O. Forland. This man had to leave for the coast on July 22nd, and Davidson gave him an order on the Agency for the amount of wages due to be paid from money due on the contract. Forland was given a cheque on the Trust Fund account in the local bank for \$66. The advance for this work had not yet arrived from Ottawa and Forland could not leave without his money, therefore, I could not see any other way out of the matter. The advance \$700 was not received until Aug. 11th. Immediately the advance was received an adjustment was made.

The work was inspected by the Indian Agent before payments were made. There was no other person to inspect and the buildings painted were the houses

of the employees and the Indian office.

I am forwarding the written authority from Mr. Davidson for the payment of the \$66 as requested.

Sin,—Let me refer you to your letter of March 13th last (File No. 31-104), repecting an advance of \$700 made to Mr. G. H. Gooderham, Indian Agent at the Blackfoot Reserve, by Trust Fund cheque No. 2951, for painting the Agency

Buildings.

In reply to that part of my letter of February 23rd, in which I say that I shall be glad to receive any evidence you may have that the various payments made to Davidson on account of his contract were made only after work to at least that value had been satisfactorily executed by him, you say that "the Agent certified to the correctness of the accounts, which is satisfactory evidence to the Department that the contract was properly carried out, as the Department has such confidence in the Agent that he would not certify to the accounts had it been otherwise."

I beg to point out that not only has your department to be satisfied as to the correctness of an account, but this office also must be satisfied and must be in a position to satisfy Parliament as to its correctness. For that reason a definite certificate such as is provided for by Section 45 of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, should be given in each case. In the case under discussion Mr. Gooderham should have given a definite certificate to the effect that the work had been performed and that the price charged was according to contract, and should also have certified that the advances made from time to time to Mr. Davidson were only made after work to at least the amount of the advances had been satisfactorily performed.

You further state in your letter that pending receipt of funds from Ottawa, Mr. Gooderham drew upon his Agency Trust Funds to make payments to the contractor. This diversion of Trust Funds, even temporarily, for any purpose other than that for which they are held is a practice that should not be allowed in any case, but such Trust Funds should be guarded jealously for the special

purpose for which they were placed in trust.

## Buildings, Samson's Reserve—Unsatisfactory Certificates for Progress Payments

Audit Office, Ottawa, March 3, 1923.

Sir.—I have to request that you kindly furnish me with an explanation of the following three payments made during last summer to W. J. Baldry, Wetaskiwin, for material supplied and labour performed under contract in the erection of a farming instructor's house on Samson's reserve, Hobbema agency.

On August 25th, a certificate was issued by Mr. C. W. Kirby, Indian Agent, who appears to have acted as building inspector, to the effect that material had been supplied and labour performed to the value of \$1,168.30 and recommending an advance of \$1,000 to Mr. Baldry. This advance was made by cheque No. 3035.

On September 18th a second certificate was issued by Mr. Kirby, certifying to further work having been performed on this contract to the amount of \$550 or \$1,718.30 in all, and on this certificate a second advance of \$1,000 was

made to Mr. Baldry by cheque No. 3278.

On October 24th a third certificate was issued certifying to further work having been performed to the value of \$1,005 or \$2.723.30 in all, and on this certificate a further advance of \$1,150 was made to Mr. Baldry by cheque No. 4156, making the total payments to him on account of his contract \$3,150, being the full amount of his contract for \$3,500, less 10 per cent drawback.

All the above payments were certified to by Mr. Orr, your architect.

The point on which I should like an explanation is the reason for making payments to Mr. Baldry on both the second and third certificates, considerably in excess of the amount of work performed as certified to by Mr. Kirby.

With reference to the 2nd and 3rd certificates, I beg to point out that the Department, when recommending the payment of these accounts, was satisfied that the labour and material had been supplied, entitling the contractor to pay-

ments as shown on the certificates.

Indian Agent Kirby, who issued the certificates, was acting as Inspector of Construction and, in issuing certificates No. 2 and 3 for the amounts as shown, must have been satisfied that the labour had been performed and the materials supplied, warranting these payments. Also, if you refer to Certificate No. 2, you will notice that Indian Agent Kirby states that \$985 was required to complete the contract, and, as the previous payment on the contract was only \$1,000, it is quite evident that the contractor was entitled to the amount as shown on the second certificate. Furthermore, at the time the third certificate was issued, the building was completed, as the certificate shows that no labour and material was required to complete the contract.

Sir,—I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 5th inst. (No. 21-112) in reply to mine of the 3rd inst., with reference to the payments made during the summer of 1922 to Mr. W. J. Baldry, of Wetaskiwin, for the crection of a farming instructor's residence on Samson's reserve, Hobbema agency.

It would appear from your reply that the progress payments made by your department were based on the amount of work shown on the building inspector's certificates as yet to be done, and not on the amount of work and material supplied to date as shown in that certificate. I am of opinion that this was not the proper way of dealing with the matter. The progress payments should be based solely on the value of work actually performed and material supplied as shown by the certificate of the inspector of construction. Any discrepancy appearing between that amount, together with the amount required to complete the contract, and the original amount of the contract should have been called to the attention of the inspector, and an explanation or an amended certificate obtained from him. With reference to the third certificate issued in this case, it should have been definitely stated thereon that the work was completed and that such was a final certificate.

Swan of Punnichy as Inspector of Construction at the rate of \$6.00 a day. From an examination of the accounts I find that the following payments were made to Mr. Swan:—

As Mr. Orr cannot have personal knowledge of the number of days in each month on which Mr. Swan was present on the work I think that in addition to his certificate I should have a statement from the Agent at Punnichy, showing the actual days in each month for which Mr. Swan should be paid.

Sir,—On October 5th, 1922, a certificate was issued by the Civil Service Commission for the temporary employment, for a period not exceeding six months, of Mr. Robert Paterson of Calgary as Inspector of Construction at the Blackfoot Reserve, Gleichen, at a salary of \$7.00 a day, effective from August 19th, 1923; on April 27th last a second certificate was issued extending the period of Mr. Paterson's employment for a further period of three months from February 19th.

The classification schedule fixes the remuneration of the class "Inspector of Construction" as follows:—

Prevailing rates not exceeding \$7 a day for service as required.

Monthly— 100 105 110 115 120 125 130 135 140

Yearly —1200 1260 1320 1380 1440 1500 1560 1620 1680

I presume that it is intended from the above that when the services rendered are continuous the monthly rates shall apply, but that when the services are not continuous the inspector may be paid up to \$7 a day for services as required, that is for services actually rendered.

From an examination of your expenditure for the fiscal year 1922-23 I find that Mr. Paterson was paid \$7 a day for every day from August 19th to February 28th, or \$1,358 for 194 days.

From an examination of Mr. Paterson's expense accounts, he appears to have continued to reside in Calgary, making only occasional trips to the Blackfoot Reserve. During the period ending February 28th, 1923, I find that he made 36 trips to the Reserve, viz:— 6 in September, 9 in October, 9 in November, 5 in December, 6 in January and 1 in February. Each of these trips occupied about one and a half days, as he would require to leave Calgary early in the afternoon and return to Calgary the following evening. I consider that Mr. Paterson was entitled to be paid only for the days on which he was actually engaged, at the most for two days for each trip to the reserve, or for 72 days in all for the 36 trips, instead of for 194 days as he was paid.

In addition to his salary as above Mr. Paterson was paid his expenses for each trip, amounting in all to \$439.85 as follows:—

I presume that Mr. Paterson was paid in the same way after February 28th, but as any payments to him after that date would be paid from the current year's appropriation, they have not as yet been examined by me.

Sir, I shall be glad to have the opinion of the Civil Service Commission on the application of the rates of compensation given in the classification schedule for the position of Inspector of Construction.

The rates in question are as follows:—

Yearly —\$1200 1260 1320 etc. to 1680. Monthly— 100 105 110 etc. 140.

Daily—Prevailing rates not exceeding \$7 for service as required.

A number of certificates have been issued from time to time by the Commission for the appointment of Inspectors of Construction at a daily rate. In my opinion a man appointed to this class at a daily rate is entitled to pay only for those days on which he is actually engaged on inspection work. I find, however, that in some cases the department concerned has paid the appointee continuously at the daily rate, whether he was or was not actually employed on each day. This application of the daily rate brings the monthly compensation up to \$210 or \$217, which far exceeds the maximum of \$140 a month for continuous employment.

I should like to be informed as to whether my view of the matter, as expressed above, is or is not, in the opinion of the Commission, the correct

one.

We therefore purchased Block 123, District Lot 271, North Vancouver, from the Reverend Sisters, and as it is now Government property, it is non-taxable, and we have assumed the payment of the taxes on Lot 69, on which the school buildings are situated.

Your total expenditure under the head of Indian Education appears to me to be naturally divisible into two heads, viz: (1) the maintenance of existing schools and (2) the acquisition of school buildings either by purchase or by erection by the department. As these two classes of expenditure are of an entirely different nature, might I suggest that it would be advisable in future, when preparing your estimates, to ask separate amounts for the maintenance of the schools and for the erection or purchase of new schools.

It further appears that the property was purchased, for the sum of \$2,000, by your department in pursuance of the Soldier Settlement provisions of the Indian Act, but that in making settlement, the right of Mrs. Mountour to a moiety of the estate was overlooked and the whole of the purchase money paid to the son, Thomas Claus, who, it is understood, has left the country.

I understand that the Province of Quebec Fund was intended for the payment of the salaries of teachers and missionaries, and for the relief of distress.

especially among the unorganized Indians of the province. I do not consider that that fund, nor any part of it, should have been used to correct an error made by your department. As the whole proceeds of the sale of the estate had been paid over to the brother, Thomas Claus, there were no funds left in the hands of your department from which to pay Mrs. Mountour's share, and the only way, in my opinion, by which she could be legally paid was to obtain a special vote of Parliament for the amount of her share.

#### Greater Production Scheme: Work continued after Cancellation of the Authority for the same

I find, however, that, notwithstanding the rescinding of the original Order in Council, the Greater Production activities have been continued all through the year 1922, although not to as great an extent as before.

Kindly advise me as to your authority for continuing this work after the passing of the Order in Council of January 16th, 1922.

Sir,—I beg to refer you to my letter of February 23rd last and your reply thereto of February 26th, with regard to the continuance of activities under the Greater Production Scheme after the passing of the Order in Council of January 16th, 1922, which rescinded the authority for earrying on that work.

Although the authority for carrying on the Greater Production Scheme was cancelled as from January 16th, 1922, the activities were continued to a certain degree during the season of 1922 and again, in a somewhat less extent, during the season of 1923. The moneys received after the cancellation of authority were dealt with in the same way as before, Mr. Graham depositing all receipts to his credit in a special account at Regina and making all payments in connection with the work from that account. As the special authority originally conferred on Mr. Graham under the War Measures Act was removed by the cancelling Order in Council of January 16th, 1922, I consider that the further continuance of this scheme was contrary to the provisions of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act which provides (Sect. 35) that "All public moneys, from whatever source of revenue derived, shall be paid to the credit of the account of the Minister of Finance and Receiver General," and further (Sect. 41) that "The Auditor General shall see that no cheque issues for the payment of any public money for which there is no direct parliamentary appropriation."

I am of opinion that Mr. Graham should be required to transmit forthwith for deposit to the credit of the Receiver General all moneys now in his hands in connection with the Greater Production Scheme, and further to remit, from time to time as they may be received, any moneys that may accrue hereafter from the sale of grain, equipment, etc. If it is considered advisable to continue the scheme along the same lines the coming year it will be necessary to obtain parliamentary authority for its continuance.

# Greater Production Scheme—Interest on other Trust Accounts Transposed to Greater Production Account

AUDIT OFFICE, December 21, 1923.

Sir,—In examining the statements rendered by Mr. W. M. Graham in councetion with the Greater Production Scheme, I find that he has credited the Greater Production Account with the interest allowed by the bank on the amounts on deposit in two other of his Trust Accounts, viz: Grazing Leases Account and Indian Bands Trust Account. The first of these accounts consists of the amounts collected for the lease of Indian lands, which amounts are ultimately distributed among the Indians or transmitted to the department to be placed to the credit of the bands concerned. The second account consists chiefly of amounts received from your department for distribution to the Indians.

When Mr. Reid of this office visited the Regina office last summer he was given to understand by Mr. Graham that the reason that the interest accruing

on these accounts was transferred to the credit of the Greater Production Account was that as the interest could not be said to belong to any particular band or bands it could not be distributed, and it was accordingly considered that it might be transferred to the Greater Production Account.

I am of opinion that the interest in these two accounts should not have been so transferred to the Greater Production Account with which it had no direct connection, but that, as it could not be assigned to any particular band of Indians it should have been remitted to your department as Casual Revenue.

The total interest thus transferred from the time of the inception of the Greater Production account up to March 31st last was \$902.90, made up as

# Surplus Military Stores-Regina Warehouse Account

AUDIT OFFICE, OTTAWA, December 4, 1922.

Sir,—On inquiry of your Accountant with respect to certain transfers made by Mr. W. M. Graham from Regina "Warehouse Account" to "Greater Production Account" I was informed by him that "when large quantities of clothing, equipment, hospital supplies, etc., were taken over from the Militia and Defence and from the Soldiers' Civil Re-Establishment Departments, they were stored in our Regina warehouse and are being sold to Indians and schools, and all expenses including wages, etc., are being defrayed from the proceeds of the sales."

I beg to say that this procedure is not in accordance with the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act. Although these stores may have been transferred by the other departments to your department free of charge they still remain government stores and the disposal of them must be accounted for in the same way as surplus stores acquired by your department by purchase would be accounted for. The creation of a special fund administered by Mr. Graham or by any other officer of your department is not in my opinion authorized by Statute or by any regulations of the Treasury made thereunder. The actual proceeds of all sales must be deposited to the credit of the Receiver General, and any expenditure incurred in connection with the care or the disposal of the stores must be made in the ordinary way through your appropriation.

Kindly furnish me with a statement showing in detail the supplies taken over by your department with any valuation that may have been put on the same; also the particulars in detail of all sales and all expenditures to date, supported with proper vouchers. All moneys at present in Mr. Graham's hands in connection with the "Warehouse Account" should be deposited at once by him to the credit of the Receiver General.

Sir,—In reply to your letter of the 4th instant respecting the disposal at Regina of supplies transferred to this department by the Department of Militia and Defence and the Soldiers' Civil Re-Establishment Department, I have to say that when the department was offered these large quantities of supplies, it was faced with the problem of storing and distributing them to the best advantage possible. It was decided that Regina was the most central point and facilities had to be provided for, viz: a warehouse, staff, and other incidental expenses. There was no appropriation by Parliament to meet this expenditure and one could not be obtained without increasing our estimates, which was not permissible. As schools drawing grants and Indians who had funds could be served from these stores at less cost than if they had to purchase elsewhere, sales have been made to them, and a fund thus established to meet all expenses of building a warehouse, paying wages, transportation charges and all other incidental expenses. Monthly statements of all receipts and expenditure by Mr. Graham, together with vouchers, have been rendered, and these will be submitted to you forthwith for examination.

Mr. Graham has also been requested to furnish a statement showing in detail the supplies taken over with any valuation that may have been put on

them.

Kindly let me know how these stores were dealt with at the various superintendencies and agencies as well as in your department. Were any of these stores sold, or were they all distributed gratuitously to the Indians? I should like to be furnished with any returns and statements that may have been received in your department in connection with these stores.

#### Public Moneys from whatever Source of Revenue Derived should be Paid to Credit of Receiver General

Sir,—I have received from your Accountant's Office statements, with vouchers, up to December 31st last, of Mr. W. M. Graham's Elkhorn School Account.

This account, which appears to be of the nature of a trust account and which dates back to July, 1918, may be summarized as follows:—

I have been given to understand by your accountant that it is the intention of your department to reopen this school in the coming spring and that the balance of this account will be applied to the re-establishment of the school. It appears to me that this manner of dealing with the earnings of the school is a wrong one, and contrary to the provisions of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act, which requires in Section 35, that all public moneys, from whatever source of revenue derived, shall be paid to the credit of the Receiver General. Since the whole expenses in connection with the maintenance of this school are paid from public funds, I am of opinion that any earnings of the school must be regarded as public moneys, and as such should be dealt with in accordance with Section 35 of the Audit Act referred to above.

I should also like to have some information with regard to the amount of \$191.80 handed to Mr. Graham by Rev. A. E. Wilson. Was this the balance of a trust account administered by Mr. Wilson, and if so, what was the nature of

that account?

Dear Mr. Kearns,—I have to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the

27th February, 1923.

When these funds came into the hands of the department from the Indian Commissioner, the intention was to use them for the purchase of necessary equipment for the Elkhorn Industrial School which is to be opened under the auspices of the Church of England, and by doing so the appropriation for Indian education would be supplemented. This method of dealing with the small fund would be preferable to a refund to Casual Revenue. Any purchases charged to this credit would, of course, be made under the control of the Purchasing Commission and would be subject to your audit.

I would point out that these amounts accrued from the sales at the closing of the school; the item of \$191.80 as shown in the bank book kept by Mr. A. E. Wilson—trust account—may have arisen from the sale of produce. The bank

book is open to your inspection.

If you find any unsurmountable difficulty in the way of letting us use the funds, kindly let me know.

Sir,—I beg to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 9th instant (No. 116823-1), in reply to mine of the 27th ultimo, with reference to the funds in the hands of Mr. W. M. Graham, Indian Commissioner, resulting from the sales at the closing of the Elkhorn Industrial School. In that letter you state that the intention was to use these funds for the purchase of necessary equipment at the reopening of the Elkhorn school, by doing which the appropriation for Indian education would be supplemented.

This proposed method of supplementing your vote is entirely at variance with the principle of parliamentary control over expenditure and with the provisions of the Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act. Section 2 of that Act defines the term "public moneys"; Section 35 of the same Act directs that all public moneys, from whatever source of revenue derived, shall be paid to the credit of the Receiver General; Section 41 directs that the Auditor General shall see that no cheque issues for the payment of any public money for which there is no direct parliamentary appropriation.

These provisions of the Act form, in my opinion, an unsurmountable difficulty against the use or the proposed use of the funds in question, which should be deposited forthwith to the credit of the Receiver General as Casual Revenue.

dette.

Louis Kaufman pour la construction d'une église catholique romaine à Shawanaga je dois vous dire que lorsque la construction d'une église avait été décidée il avait été convenu que le paiement en serait effectué par les sauvages et pour les aider à cette fin des permis avaient été délivrés afin de leur permettre de couper assez de billes pour les échanger pour du bois destiné à la construction de l'église.

Les plans originaux de l'église ont été modifiés et il a fallu construire une rallonge devant servir de résidence pour le missionnaire. Cela avait été jugé nécessaire vu que ce prêtre venait passer quelques jours à la réserve à certaines périodes fixes et qu'il n'y avait pas de logement convenable pour lui. M. Kaufman a fourni ce qu'il fallait en plus de bois de service et de quincaillerie, paya anssi la main-d'œuvre, ce qui augmenta le coût de la bâtisse à \$852.92. Comme il reçut en billes la valeur de \$404.46 seulement il se trouvait à avoir fait une dépense de \$448.46 qui ne lui avait pas été remboursée.

M. Kaufman et les sauvages ont cherché à trouver une solution mais il était impossible pour les sauvages d'effectuer ce paiement à moins d'obtenir l'argent

nécessaire en coupant illégalement le bois de la Couronne.

Le département ne pouvait pas permettre cela et par conséquent lorsque la question a été soumise au département en 1921 pour en arriver à un règlement et qu'il a été constaté que les sauvages étaient tous en faveur de payer M. Kaufman, comme le prouvait la résolution du Conseil des sauvages, adoptée le 21 novembre 1921, il a été décidé de se rendre à leur requête.

L'arrêté en conseil a été obtenu le 9 juin 1922 autorisant le paiement de la balance due à M. Kaufman et par conséquent le chèque n° 1977 pour \$448.46 a

été émis en faveur de M. Kaufman.

La vente de l'île n° 3 à M. Powell ayant été annulée il fit parvenir au département, par l'entremise de ses avocats, MM. Nickle, Farrell & Day, de Kingston, une réclamation pour les dépenses qu'il avait encourues. Ci-joint vous trouverez copie de cette réclamation et au sujet de l'item de \$50 en particulier l'explication donnée est que cette dépense a été encourue pour l'achat de dynamite dans le but de miner le roe en vue d'obtenir un abri couvert pour un bateau à essence.

Relativement au troisième et dernier paragraphe de votre lettre vous avez raison de supposer que le certificat du ministère de la Justice du 24 janvier 1923 était inclus pour montrer que selon l'opinion du ministère M. Powell avait droit de réclamer en justice la somme de \$81.55 selon les détails compris dans le

Cher Monsieur,—La route provinciale allant de Toronto vers l'est jusqu'à Ottawa et la frontière québécoise passe dans la partie sud-est du comté de Hastings. Une partie de cette route, depuis le village de Marysville jusqu'à la ville de Descronto, passe par la réserve indienne de Tyendinaga, de même qu'une courte section, au voisinage de Shannonville.

D'après la loi des grandes routes provinciales (Provincial Highway Act), une partie de toutes les dépenses affectées aux routes provinciales dans un comté est imputable sur la corporation de ce comté. Pour l'année 1919, cette proportion était de trente pour cent de la dépense et, pour l'année 1920, de vingt pour

cent.

Le comté de Hastings, en payant la somme prélevée sur le comté, a rejeté la responsabilité de la dépense faite dans la réserve indienne; et M. Robert Cook, M.P.P., me disait récemment que sur des représentations faites au département des Affaires indiennes, votre ministère avait consenti à dégager le comté de Hastings de la responsabilité des dépenses encourues dans la réserve indienne.

Sur l'avis de M. Cook, je vous envoie un état de nos dépenses pour les années en question. Comme l'indique le sommaire qui accompagne les états des deux années, la somme de \$4,318.73 est exigible sur les dépenses de 1919, et celle de \$8,495.69 sur les dépenses de 1920.

Voulez-vous être assez bon de confirmer le fait que d'après notre entente sur ce point, votre ministère assumera l'obligation du comté de Hastings au sujet de cette partie de la route provinciale qui passe sur la réserve Tyendinaga.

Il appert par votre réponse que, d'après la loi des grandes routes provinciales, une partie de toutes les dépenses faites pour les routes provinciales dans un comté est imputable sur la corporation de ce comté, et que les quote-parts exigibles ont été fixées à 30 p. 100 de la dépense en 1919, et 20 p. 100 en 1920. Il appert en outre que le comté de Hastings a rejeté la responsabilité de la dépense encourue sur la réserve indienne et qu'en conséquence votre ministère a consenti à dégager le comté de la responsabilité de cette dépense.

La somme payée par vous à la province d'Ontario pour cette construction est de \$12,589.32, soit 30 p. 100 de \$14,395.78 pour 1919 et 20 p. 100 de \$41,-352.93 pour 1920, et \$225.10 pour l'entretien en 1920, soit 20 p. 100 de \$1,125.50.

J'ai l'honneur de faire remarquer que le ministère des Chemins de fer et Canaux a déjà versé à la province d'Ontario la somme de \$16,168.29, soit 40 p. 100 de \$40,420.72, somme établie par la commission des grands chemins, comme étant le coût réel, nécessaire et raisonnable de la grande route, dans la réserve de Tyendinaga jusqu'au 31 décembre 1920.

Vous remarquerez que si le coût de la construction, jusqu'au 31 décembre 1920, d'après le ministère ontarien des Grandes routes, est de \$55,748.71, le coût accepté par la Commission fédérale des Grandes routes comme étant nécessaire

et raisonnable était de \$40,420.72, soit une différence de \$15,327.99.

Je suis d'avis que toute contribution à la construction de cette grande route que votre ministère pourrait être appelé à faire devrait être basée sur le coût raisonnable tel qu'établi par la Commission des Grandes routes, et non sur la somme déboursée par le gouvernement de l'Ontario. Je crois aussi que tous les paiements de cette nature devraient être autorisés par le gouverneur en conseil et je dois en conséquence vous demander d'obtenir l'autorisation de ce paiement par le Conseil.

M. Weir a d'abord été classé comme agent des Indiens, catégorie 4, à compter du 1er avril 1919, avec traitement minimum de \$1.440 par année. Plus tard, on a changé sa classification parce qu'il avait changé de position et était devenu agent des Indiens, catégorie 5, au traitement minimum de \$1,980, moins \$480 pour logement, éclairage, nourriture, etc., fournis. Pendant l'exercice 1919-20, il a reçu un traitement de \$1,200, auquel on a ajouté dans la suite \$300 d'arrérages, ce qui portait à \$1,500 son traitement total pour cette année-là, c'est-à-dire le minimum de la catégorie 5, moins \$480 pour choses fournies; à partir du 1er avril 1920, il a reçu \$1,620. Le département présumait évidemment sa nomination permanente. Le 2 février 1920, la Commission du service civil a émis un certificat augmentant son traitement à \$1,740, à compter du 1er octobre 1921, et le 15 juillet 1922, un nouveau certificat augmentant son traitement à \$1,860 à compter du 1er octobre 1922. Le premier de ces certificats a pris effet et le traitement de \$1.740 a été payé à partir du 1er octobre, mais le deuxième certificat n'a pas été mis en vigueur et le 29 août 1922, la Commission du Service civil vous a averti qu'on lui avait signalé le fait que M. Weir était un employé temporaire dont on avait recommandé la permanence en vertu des règlements d'admission en bloc et qu'en conséquence les deux certificats précédemment émis pour augmentations de traitements étaient annulés. M. Weir, dans la suite, a été admis à la permanence en vertu des règlements d'admission en bloc, à compter du 1er avril 1921.

En réponse à cette partie de ma lettre du 23 février dans laquelle je dis que j'aimerais avoir une preuve que les différents paiements faits à M. Davidson pour son contrat n'ont été effectués qu'une fois les travaux exécutés d'une manière satisfaisante, du moins à concurrence de la somme versée, vous dites que l'agent a certifié l'exactitude des comptes, ce qui est une preuve satisfaisante aux yeux du département que le contrat a été exécuté comme il faut, car le département a assez confiance dans l'agent pour croire qu'il ne certifierait pas les comptes s'il en était autrement."

Le 18 septembre, il a été émis un deuxième certificat par M. Kirby, certifiant l'accomplissement d'autres travaux d'après ce contrat, pour un montant de \$550 ou \$1,718.30 en tout. D'après ce certificat il a été fait une deuxième avance de

\$1,000 à M. Baldry par le chèque n° 3278.

Le 24 octobre, il a été émis un troisième certificat comme quoi il avait été accompli d'autres travaux s'élevant à une valeur de \$1,005 ou \$2,723.30 en tout. # Suggestion de séparer les crédits pour l'érection ou l'achat de nouvelles écoles.

Monsieur.—Dans une demande que j'ai reçue dernièrement pour l'émission d'un chèque au montant de \$48,000 pour l'achat du pensionnat Kenora tenu par les Révérends Pères Oblats, il est dit que ce montant est inclus dans le budget de l'année courante. Comme il n'y a pas de montant voté spécifiquement à cette fin, je conclus qu'il a été englobé dans le crédit général pour l'instruction des Sauvages, et je comprends aussi que ce même crédit doit contenir le montant de \$75,000 pour la construction d'une nouvelle école dans le voisinage d'Edmonton.

Le total de vos dépenses sous la rubrique de l'instruction des Sauvages me paraît devoir se diviser naturellement en deux articles, savoir: (1) l'entretien des écoles en existence, et (2) l'acquisition de nouvelles écoles, soit par achat, soit par construction aux frais du département. Monsieur,— Je désire attirer votre attention à ma lettre du 23 février dernier et à votre réponse du 26 suivant relativement à la continuation des opérations sous le régime du Projet d'une plus grande production après l'émanation d'un arrêté du conseil du 16 janvier 1922, qui révoquait toute autorisation à continuer et travail.

Le premier de ces comptes consiste des montants perçus pour la location des terres indiennes et qui sont destinés à être distribués entre les Indiens ou transmis au département pour être placés au crédit des tribus intéressées. Le second comprend les sommes reçues de votre département pour distribution entre les Indiens.

Lorsque M. Reid de cette division fit une visite au bureau de Regina l'automne dernier M. Graham lui laissa entendre que la raison pour laquelle l'intérêt provenant de ces comptes avait été transféré au compte de plus grande production reposait dans le fait que cet intérêt ne pouvait pas être censé appartenir à une tribu ou à des tribus en particulier et par conséquent on a cru qu'il était convenable de transférer ces intérêts au compte de plus grande production.

C'est mon opinion que l'intérêt sur ces deux comptes n'aurait pas dû être ainsi transféré au compte de plus grande production avec lequel il n'avait aucun rapport mais qu'on aurait dû, vu qu'il était impossible d'en faire bénéficier une tribu quelconque, le remettre à votre département sous la désignation de Recettes

casuelles.

Le total des intérêts ainsi transférés depuis l'établissement du compte du projet de plus grande production jusqu'au 31 mars dernier représente la somme

La création d'un fonds spécial administré par M. Graham ou par tout autre fonctionnaire de votre département n'est pas, je crois, autorisée par les Statuts ni par aucun règlement du Trésor. Des relevés mensuels indiquant les recettes et les dépenses ainsi que les reçus à l'appui ont été rédigés par M. Graham et nous allons vous les envoyer immédiatement pour les soumettre à votre examen.

On a aussi prié M. Graham de préparer en détails un relevé indiquant les tournitures transférées au département avec les valeurs estimées dans chaque cas.
