OF THE

SECRETARY OF STATE

OF CANADA

FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 1903.

To His Excellency the Right Honourable Sir Gilbert John Elliot, Earl of Minto, G.C.M.G, &c., &c., &c., Governor General of Canada.

My Lord,—I have the honour to lay before Your Excellency a statement showing the operations of the Department of the Secretary of State for the year ended December 31, 1903.

The steady increase in the work of the various branches of my department which has characterized each year for a considerable time past has been maintained during the twelve months now closed. This increase has been especially notable in the number of companies to which letters patent were issued under the Companies Act of 1902, and the amount of revenue resulting from the collection of fees thereon, the simplification of procedure under the new Act as compared with the tedious requirements of the statute which it replaced being heartily commended and evidently appreciated by the commercial world, to which the restrictions and the frequent delays unavoidable even with the best intention and closest application, under the former Act were particularly vexatious. The total number of charters issued last year was 187 as compared with 126 in 1902, and going back ten years, the increase in the one year was within two of the total reached in 1893. The addition to the revenue is of course proportionate and it is remarkable that the returns, viz, \$47.400, from this source alone were considerably more than double the entire revenue in the previous year, when the total from all sources was \$21,403. Comparing these figures with those of a decade ago the one item of letters patent of incorporation has yielded more than nine times as much as the then total amount. It is moreover interesting and satisfactory to note that the present revenu

under The Companies Act covers the salary list of my staff. And the complete revenue for the calendar year equals the entire office expenditure; so that the department is self-sustaining. The usual detailed information concerning the companies incorporated or granted supplementary letters patent will be found in the report of the Deputy Registrar General, Appendix A.

NATURALIZATION OF ALIENS.

The administration of the Act of 1902 providing for the registration in my Department of naturalization certificates granted throughout the Dominion formed another very important feature of the year's work. The measure has been attended with the most gratifying results. Not only have the returns required by the Act been received regularly since its adoption, but compliance also with the law in respect of naturalizations granted prior to 1902—some of them dating as far back as 1852—which involved considerable labour and in some cases unsuccessful searches, was both general and satisfactory. Nearly fifty thousand names have so far been returned and are now being recorded in two distinct alphabetical lists, one for past naturalizations up to January 1, 1902, and the other for naturalizations granted since that period.

In the face of the flow of immigrants now seeking homes in Manitoba, the Northwest Territories and the Yukon Territory, and with a view to increasing the facilities for their naturalization, it was deemed advisable to further amend the Naturalization Act. To that end and for other purposes hereafter set forth, legislation was passed as embodied in chapter 38 of the Statutes of 1903, of which the following are the features.

Section II of chapter 113 of the Revised Statutes of Canada dealing with the presentation of the certificate of the alien to the Courts having jurisdiction to grant naturalization, has been made clearer in so far as the jurisdiction of county courts in the matter, in the provinces of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia is concerned. Jurisdiction in Manitoba has been enlarged so as to allow naturalization proceedings to be carried out within the judicial district of the King's Bench instead of in the county in which the alien resides, or before a Judge of the Court of King's Bench sitting in Court if the alien resides in the eastern judicial district.

In the Yukon Territory application for naturalization is to be made to the Territorial Court during its sittings in the circuit within the jurisdiction of which the alien resides,

In the North-west Territories more convenience is afforded by the enactment that for the issue of naturalization papers application may be presented to a judge of the Supreme Court sitting in chambers instead of in court.

Safeguards surrounding the granting of naturalization have also been provided. In all the provinces (but not in the North-west Territories) a notice of the presentation of an application for naturalization requires to be posted in a conspicuous place, in the office of the clerk three weeks before the court considers the same, in order to allow proper time for the filing of any opposition (if there be any) to its being granted. The time in the North-west Territories for the posting of such notice in the court house in which the judge holds his chambers is limited to two weeks.

The period of residence in Canada for British subjects by birth who have become aliens and are desirous of returning to their native country, which under the old Act had been fixed at three years, has been changed to three months.

Under the provisions of the new amending Act, a tariff of fees payable for the preparation and transmission of naturalization returns was approved by Your Excellency in Council on September 1, 1903, and appears to afford adequate remuneration to the clerks of courts performing that service. The disbursements for this purpose are made by my department, and while the aggregate expenditure is comparatively small, the multiplicity of detail and the large number of individual payments entail a great deal of careful and laborious attention. Further reference to the naturalization returns will be found in the report of the work done in the registry branch of my department, in which the names of all persons naturalized are now recorded, the report showing in tabulated form the total number of each nationality. Similar statements will be included in my report yearly hereafter.

SCHOOL TEACHERS IN SOUTH AFRICA.

Since my last report the original engagements of the Canadian school teachers sent out to the new South African colonies by my department on behalf of the Imperial Government have terminated, and many of the teachers have returned to their homes. In all cases I am glad to say the selection made by the educational authorities of the several provinces has been justified by the result; and that the services of the teachers have given complete satisfaction is amply proved by the re-engagement for a period of years of any who were willing to remain in South Africa. Two additional teachers were engaged on behalf of the Transvaal Government in 1903, viz.: Miss Amy Iddles and Miss E. Iva Yerxa both of St. John, N.B., who accepted positions in the Normal School, Johannesburg, for a term of three years. The necessary arrangements for the passages of these ladies were made by my officers and they sailed from St. John in April last.

It is with much regret that I have to record the death of two of the teachers who had gone to South Africa in the previous year, viz.: Mr. Eldon Mullin, M.A., head master of the High School, Pretoria, formerly principal of the Normal School, Fredericton, N.B., and Miss Sylvia Blanche Lee of Cookshire, one of the ladies who sailed in April, 1902.

PASSPORTS.

My Department is constantly in receipt of requests for information upon the subject of passports concerning which there is a widespread lack of knowledge. As the matter is one of considerable importance at the present time in view of the war in the far East I have thought it wise to republish the regulations governing the issue of passports, and also the information based on that furnished by the Foreign Office respecting the passport regulations of foreign countries in which it will be observed several changes have been made since my last report.

In connection with this subject it will not be out of place to invite the attention of the travelling public to the desirability of providing themselves with passports before setting out upon any journey into foreign lands. Although there are many countries in which these documents are not required it is always well to carry them if only as a rea-

dy means of identification both individual and national in cases of accident or other emergency.

REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE.

The statement of the revenue of my department, in accordance with the usual practice, is for the fiscal year ended June 30 last, in order that the figures may agree with those published in the report of the Auditor General. The total shows a remarkable increase over that of the last preceding year, the amount received being much more than double that collected in 1902 which in its turn was larger by over one half than that of 1901. The increase is mainly due to the very great growth to which allusion has already been made, in the number of companies incorporated or granted supplementary letter patent under the Companies' Act of 1902. Comparing the full revenue for the calendar year a similarly gratifying increase is found, the total being \$54,099.20, as compared with \$35,666.32 for the year ended December 31, 1902. With this revenue the department, as I have already observed, is self supporting, the income being now sufficient to cover the entire salary list and departmental expenses.

A statement of the disbursements under the Naturalization Act the appropriation for which was not available until after the session of parliament, will be included in my next report, for the current fiscal year. So far, it may be mentioned, the outlay is about \$5,000, which covers the payment of nearly all the accounts for returns of all persons naturalized in Canada from confederation up to June 30, 1903.

Since the coming into force of 'The Naturalization Act, 1902,' the work of this branch has materially increased. Two clerks have been constantly employed, during the past year, in indexing the names together with schedule of particulars required by the Act, contained in the returns which have been received and the work is progressing in a satisfactory manner.

There have been received, up to date, in round numbers, about 1,000 returns, covering the periods prior to and including that ended December 31, 1903; of these the returns under Section IV; i.e. prior to January 1, 1902, containing 35,293 names and for the two succeeding half yearly periods, ended December 31, 1902 and containing 3,813 names, making a total of 39,106 names have, thus far, been indexed, carefully examined and compared.

The returns have been classified, numbered and filed with the accompanying certified copies of certificates, in such manner as to facilitate reference to any particular

return, at a moment's notice.

An index of the names of returning officers under the Act has been kept showing the number of names and certified copies of certificates returned by each.

An index also of the several counties and districts shows the particulars regarding

each.

Considerable difficulty has been experienced in deciphering the names contained in these returns, a large proportion of which are foreign and obscure; in some cases the clerical work has been carelessly performed, rendering the transcription of these names a somewhat difficult task.

I may add, that in many cases these returns are rartial and incomplete, this is true especially of those for the period previous to January 1, 1902, by reason of the fact that some of the officers concerned have neglected to keep a record of all the particulars, required by the Act and in some few cases the records have been lost or destroyed.

A table subjoined shows the various nationalities embraced in the returns already indexed but it will be observed that in a great many cases the former nationality is not

given.

I submit the annexed synopsis, with accompanying index, of letters patent, issued during the year, to all companies incorporated under 'The Companies' Act, 1902,' embodying the name of the company, the date of incorporation, the amount of capital stock, with the number of shares and amount of each share, the names of corporate members with place of residence, the first or provisional directors of the company, the chief place of business, and the objects or purposes for which incorporation was granted; also, of all companies which have been granted supplementary letters patent during the same period under the said Act, and the purposes for which such supplementary letters patent were issued.

A list of companies licensed under 61 Vic., chap. 49, to carry on mining operations with the privileges of a free miner within the Yukon and North-west Territories of

Canada, is included herein, and

APPENDIX D.

DEPARTMENT OF THE SECRETARY OF STATE OF CANADA, RECORD OFFICE, January, 1904.

To the Honourable
The Secretary of State.

SIR,—I have the honour to report on the work performed and the progress made in the Record Office during the year 1903.

The number of searches and deliveries shows an enormous increase over previous years owing to the fact that several writers on historical subjects have required very

numerous informations which, in most cases, were furnished to them.

The rapidity with which the employees of this office have been able to search for 3,276 papers and to give the required information in over 2,650 cases speaks highly for their personal ability and proves, beyond all doubt, that the system of indexing the documents inaugurated twenty years ago by the undersigned on his assuming the functions of Keeper of the Records, and the task of organizing this branch of the public service, is thoroughly efficacious.

I now pass on to a summary of the work done in sections B. and C. of this branch.

Section B.—During the year two hundred and seventy eight (278) requisitions for documents and information have been received and acted upon. Three thousand two hundred and seventy six (3,276) searches necessitated thereby have given the following result: In manuscripts, in two thousand one hundred and eighteen (2,118) cases, files were communicated or information given to the applicant, and in two hundred and thirty two (232) cases, the search was fruitless. As regards the printed documents; of those required, six hundred (600) have been delivered and three hundred and twenty six (326) were not in the office.

The Record Office, in 1903, as well as in previous years, has had the advantage to be of assistance and give valuable information and extracts of documents to several eminent historical writers; amongst others can be mentioned P. B. Casgrain, Esq., for his paper on La Maison Montcalm; Miss Texter, New Haven, Conn., U.S.A., on the establishment of French Royalists in Upper Canada, and Mr. Placide Gaudet,

Ottawa, for his work on the Acadians.

- Section C.—The work of indexing in triple form and of classifying the papers of the first period has progressed satisfactorily. Eleven thousand nine hundred and fifty nine (11,959) papers have been so indexed and two thousand three hundred and nine (2,309) files formed therefrom. In the execution of this work, some very interesting papers and documents have been found, amongst a number of which I may be allowed to single out the following:—
- 1. "Observations sur l'administration de Lord Dalhousie en Canada et réflexions générales sur l'administration des colonies ' by A G. D., 20 pp. folio, closely written.
- 2. Copy of a letter addressed to Lord Bathurst by the Duke of Wellington 6th December, 1825, on the defences of Canada.
- 3. Information gathered by F. R. Baddely, Lieut. R. E., relating to the population, fisheries and commerce of the district of Gaspé, in 1833.
- 4. Journal of an exploring expedition from Gaspé Bay through the interior of the district of Gaspé to Cascapédiac, by Mr. Erring, September and October, 1833.

- 5. Exploration of the remote parts of the district of Quebec, 1833.
- 6. Exploration des parties inconnues des comtés de Rimouski, Bonaventure et Gaspé, by Joseph Hamel, Québec, 1833.
- 7. The expediency of cutting a canal between the Bay of Fundy and the Gulf of St. Lawrence is the subject-matter of a petition of the Chamber of Commerce of St John, N.B., to Sir John Harvey, Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick.
- 8. The annexation of the Magdalen Island to the Province of Prince Edward Island, is also a very interesting collection of documents in 1839.
- 9. In the same year also is found the report and survey of water communication from Lake Erie by the Welland and St. Lawrence canals to Quebec.

Additions, during the year, to the Library of Reference, amount to 707 volumes and pamphlets.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING PASSPORTS.

- 1. Applications for passports should be made in writing and inclosed in a cover addressed to 'The Honourable the Secretary of State, Ottawa.'
- 2. The charge for a passport, whatever number of persons may be named in it, is four dollars. The fee payable must accompany the application. Postage stamps will not be received as payment.

- 3. Passports are granted only to British-born subjects, or to persons naturalized in the Dominion of Canada. A married woman is deemed to be a subject of the state in which her husband is for the time being a subject. Passports are not limited in point of time but are available for any time or for any number of journeys to foreign countries. When the party is a naturalized British subject he will be so designated in his passport.
- 4. Passports are granted to all persons either known to the Secretary of State or recommended to him by some person who is known to him; or upon the application of any chartered bank in the Dominion of Canada; or upon the production of a certificate of identity, a blank form of which may be obtained at the department, signed by any mayor, magistrate, justice of the peace, minister of religion, physician, surgeon, solicitor, or notary resident in the Dominion of Canada. In certain cases the applicant's certificate of birth must be produced in addition to the certificate of identity.
 - 5. If the applicant for a passport be a naturalized British subject, his certificate of naturalization must be forwarded to the Department of the Secretary of State, with the certificate of identity granted in his hehalf; and his certificate of naturalization will be returned with the passport to the person who may have granted the certificate of identity, in order that he may cause such naturalized British subject to sign the passport in his presence.
 - 6. A passport cannot be issued by the Department of the Secretary of State on behalf of a person already abroad; such person should apply for one to the nearest British mission or consulate; a passport cannot be issued abroad to a colonial naturalized British subject, except for a direct journey to the United Kingdom or to the colony where he has been naturalized
 - 7. The bearer of every passport issued by the Department of the Secretary of State should sign his passport as soon as he receives it; without such signature either the visa may be refused, or the validity of the passport questioned abroad.
 - 8. Travellers who may have any intention of visiting the Russian Empire, the Turkish Dominions, the Kingdom of Roumania, Persia, Venezuela, or Hayti, at any time in the course of their travels, should first have their passports visés at the nearest Russian, Turkish, Roumanian, Persian, Venezuelan, or Haytian consulate as the case may be. For the information of travellers proceeding to any of these countries via Great Britain, it may be stated that the addresses in London of these consulates are respectively as follows:—The Russian Consulate-General, 17 Great Winchester Street, E.C.; the Consulate-General of the Sublime Porte, 29 Mincing Lane, E.C,; the Roumanian Consulate-General, 68 Basinghall Street, E.C.; the Persian Consulate-General, 120 Victoria Street, S.W.; the Venezuelan Consulate, 31 King William Street, E.C.; the Haytian Consulate, 32 Fenchurch Street, E.C. Passports may also be visés at any of the other Consulates of Russia, Turkey, Roumania, Persia, Venezuela, or Hayti in the United Kingdom. Travellers about to proceed to any other country need not obtain the visa of the Diplomatic or Consular Agents of such country, except as an additional precaution, which is recommended in the case of passports of an old date.
 - N.B.—Although British subjects are now free to enter most foreign countries without passports, and the rules about passports have generally been relaxed, nevertheless colonial British subjects travelling abroad are recommended not to omit to provide themselves with passports, for even in those countries where they are no longer obligatory, they are found to be convenient as affording a ready means of identification, and more particularly when letters have to be claimed at a poste restante. For residence in Germany or Switzerland, a passport is indispensable.
 - Note—Naturalized British subjects should bear in mind that their naturalization has no effect within the limits of the Foreign State to which they originally belonged, unless they have ceased to be subjects of that state, in the manner prescribed by the laws thereof, or in pursuance of a treaty or convention to that effect.

PASSPORT REQUIREMENTS OF FOREIGN COUNTRIES.

Argentine Republic.—No regulations in force. Persons born in 'His Majesty's dominions should, if they intend to become resident, even for a short time, obtain from a British consulate in the Republic a certificate of nationality for purposes of identification, and to secure exemption from military service.

It is desirable that persons intending to travel in the Republic should provide themselves with such certificates, which are issued on personal application, and on pro-

duction of certificates of birth.

Austria-Hungary.—Although passports are not legally necessary in every case, travellers are advised to carry them. For purposes of residence a passport or other document to prove identity, is necessary.

Belgium.—It is desirable for travellers to possess passports. For purposes of residence registration at the Police Office of the district is required, and a passport is accepted as evidence of identity.

Bolivia.—See Peru.

Brazil.—Passports not actually required, but travellers are advised to carry them for purposes of identification. If intending to become resident they should register their names and addresses at the nearest British consulate.

Bulgaria.—Travellers should carry passports of recent date. Bulgarian visa not required. Residents should provide themselves annually with certificates of registration under the Ottoman Order in Council.

Central America.—Possession of passports desirable both for personal security and purposes of identification.

Costa Rica.—No regulations in force.

Guatemala.—Alien residents are required to present at the Guatemalan Foreign Office passports visés by the Diplomatic or Consular officer in Guatemala of their native country.

Honduras.—No regulations except in times of disturbance.

Nicaragua.—No regulations in time of peace. To leave the country a local passport has, however, to be obtained from the Ministry of War.

Salvador.—Travellers should carry passports, and should, in addition, obtain passports from the Government of Salvador. (Charge for latter, 25 cents.)

Chile.—No regulations in force.

China.—Passports are not required at open ports. For travelling into the interior a special passport must be obtained from a British consul, which is valid for one year. (Cost, 3 dol, 50 c. Mexican.)

Colombia.—Passports are not required for entrance to the country in time of peace. For travelling in the interior it is advisable to obtain special passport from a British consul (charge 2s. 6d.). Immigrants without resources must be provided with a passport issued gratis by the Colombian Consul at port of departure.

Corea.—Passports are not required within a radius of 100 li (33 miles) from the open ports. Persons traveilling in the interior must obtain a passport through the British Consul. (Fee, 3.50 yen, about 7s.)

Cuba.—Although passports are not legally necessary, travellers are advised to carry them. Persons intending to reside in Cuba for any length of time should have their names registered at the British Consulate-General.

Denmark.—No regulations in force. But passports or similar documents may be required by the police from persons accepting employment in Denmark before furnishing them with an 'opholdsbog' (situation book), and also from music hall artistes.

Iceland.—No regulations in force.

St. Thomas.—No regulations in force. A local government passport must, however, be procured when leaving the island, the cost of which varies according to destination.

Dominican Republic.—Passport necessary. In order to leave the country a Dominican passport must, in addition, be obtained, for which a fee of about 1l. is charged.

Egypt.—Passports not required by law, but travellers are advised to carry them. For travelling in other parts of the Ottoman dominions, see Turkey.

Ecuador.—See Peru.

France.—The possession of a passport may save inconvenience, since evidence of

identity may at any time be required.

For permanent residence, or in order to exercise profession or trade, a declaration, furnishing particulars with respect to the family, nationality, profession, &c., of the person making the declaration, is required to be made at the Mairie of the Commune within a few days of arrival.

Algeria.—Regulations similar to France, both as regards passports and residence, &c.

French Guiana.—Regulations similar to France, both as regards passports and residence, &c.

Madagascar.—Travellers are advised to carry passports.

Martinique.—Passports required by law, but law seldom enforced.

New Caledonia.—Possession of passport desirable in view of existence of penal establishment.

Réunion.—No regulations affecting Europeans in force.

Saïgon.—Regulations similar to France, both as regards passports and residence, &c.

Tahiti.—No regulations affecting Europeans in force.

Tunis.—Regulations similar to France, both as regards passports and residence, &c.

German Empire.—The possession of a passport is not obligatory, but, as evidence of identity may at any time be required, it is very desirable for travellers, especially if they intend to reside for any length of time, to be provided with passports. Children sent to schools in Germany should carry passports.

Greece.—No regulations in force, except as regards persons entering the country by the land frontier, who are sometimes required to be in possession of passports.

Hayti.—A Passport (visé by a Haytian Consul) must, on arrival, be shown at the Port Office. It should also be produced and registered at the nearest British consulate. On leaving the country the visa of a British consul and that of the 'Commandant de la Place' (which costs about 2s.) must be obtained.

Italy.—The possession of a passport is not obligatory, but travellers may at any time be required to give a satisfactory account of themselves, and to establish their identity.

Eritrea.—Travellers proceeding to Italian colonies should, unless they carry special letters of recommendation to the authorities, provide themselves with passports, and obtain a visa from an Italian consulate.

Japan.—Travellers are advised to carry passports.

Liberia.—No regulations in force, but a passport issued by the Liberian Secretary of State is required from residents leaving the country. For this 50 cents is charged.

Mexico.-No regulations in force.

Montenegro.—No special regulations exist, but a passport properly visé is required for travelling through the surrounding Turkish and Austrian territories.

Morocco.—It is advisable for travellers to be provided with passports, which are sometimes necessary, e.g., for travelling inland, or for embarking on board the French steamers for Oran. Any one wishing to travel into the interior should consult His Majesty's Minister at Tangier or the British Consul for the district through which his route lies.

British subjects residing for more than a month in Morocco are required, under the Morocco Order in Council, 1889, to register themselves at the British Consulate.

Muscat.--No regulations exist. Travelling in the interior is unsafe without an armed excort.

Netherlands.—The possession of a passport is not strictly necessary, but is recommended for purposes of identification.

Dutch Guiana: Curaçoa and Dependencies.—No regulations in force. Travellers are advised to provide themselves with passports as evidence of nationality.

Netherland East Indies.—Travellers, on arrival, must register themselves at the office of the chief local authority. For travelling inland in the islands, or for residence, a passport must also be obtained from the Local authorities, respecting which the British Consul should be consulted.

Paraguay.—No regulations in force. Neither passports nor certificates of nationality are required from foreigners by the local authorities. It is as well, however, for persons travelling in the interior of the country to be provided with passports.

Persia.—A passport bearing the visa of a Persian consular officer must be produced on entering Persia, and the passport should be countersigned by the Persian passport officer before leaving the country.

Peru, Ecuador and Bolivia.—A passport is not actually necessary, but it is desirable to possess one in order to be able to obtain from a British diplomatic or consular officer the certificate of nationality required in the event of civil disturbances.

Portugal.—Travellers are advised to provide themselves with passports. For residence, proof of nationality is required, and in travelling a passport may save the bearer much inconvenience.

Azores.—Passports are not required except in times of public danger.

Cape Verde Islands.—Passports are not actually required, except in times of public danger, but they are useful in view of the fact that all foreigners have to personally register themselves at the Mayor's office as soon as possible after arrival.

Loanda.—Passport necessary.

Madeira.—No regulations in force.

Mozambique.—Travellers should be provided with passports.

Roumania.—Persons travelling to Roumania must be provided with passports bearing the visa of a Roumanian consul in the United Kingdom. On arrival they should at once obtain the visa of the British Legation or of a British consulate, and then, within twenty-four hours of arrival, apply to the Roumanian authorities for a permit to reside in the country. For a stay of less than eight days, this formality may be dispensed with, and the permit will be stated upon the passport by the police officials at the frontier.

Russia.—Visitors to Russia must be provided with passports bearing the visa of a Russian diplomatic or consular officer. Without such visa they will not be allowed to enter the country. To persons of the Jewish faith the visa will not be granted unless they are bankers or persons of the highest social standing.

The passport will enable the holder to reside in Russia for six months, when it must be exchanged at the Prefecture of St. Petersburg, or at the Chancery of a pro-

vincial Governor, for a Russian 'Billet de Séjour,' to be renewed annually.

The cost of such a "Billet de Séjour," varies from 7r. 15c. to 1r. 29c. Each "Billet de Séjour," on first issue or renewal, must be delivered to the local police officer for inscription or visa. For non-renewal of a 'Billet de Séjour,' at the time of its expiration a fine is exacted.

On leaving Russia a police certificate must be obtained, which is granted on the first visit of the traveller to Russia at a cost of 75c. On subsequent visits 6r. 50c. is charged. If a 'Billet de Séjour,' has been obtained it must be returned, when the passport will be handed back to the owner with the necessary authorization to leave.

Travellers to Russia should on each journey obtain a new passport to avoid the necessity of obtaining a "Billet de Séjour" on arrival, which they will be required to do when a passport is used six months after the date of the Russian visa attached to it.

Servia.—Travellers must be provided with passports in proper form, in order to establish their identity and nationality. Without such passports they will not be allowed to enter the country. The visa of a Servian consular officer is only required in the case of persons entering Servia from Turkey, but is not necessary in the case of travellers passing through Servia without stopping.

Siam.—No special regulations in force, but British subjects are required to register themselves at the British Consulate-General within one month of arrival. For travelling in the interior a passport must be obtained from the Siamese Government. Fee for registration, 2s. 6d.; and for passport, 2s.

Spain.—It is most advisable for travellers to be provided with passports. The visa of a Spanish consul is not necessary, but will be found useful in travelling in provincial

towns and country districts.

In the Province of Barcelona, British subjects should, on arrival, personally show their passports to His Majesty's Consul, who will thereupon furnish them with a certificate, which they are required to present, within twenty-four hours after their arrival in Barcelona, at the office of the Civil Governor (in country towns and villages at the

office of the Mayor) in order that their names, description, &c., may be registered. A fine, and possibly expulsion, may result from non-compliance with this regulation.

Canary Islands.—No regulations in force.

Sweden and Norway.—No regulations in force.

Switzerland.—A passport is necessary in order to obtain a "Permis de Sejour," which must be taken out, after their arrival, by persons intending to reside in Switzerland. Children sent to schools in Switzerland should carry passports.

Turkish Empire.—Persons travelling to Turkey must be provided with a passport bearing the visa of a Turkish consular officer. Without such passport they will be refused admission to the country. British subjects desiring afterwards to travel within Turkey must obtain a permit through a British consul. On leaving Turkey the visa of a British consul should be obtained.

Tripoli.—Regulations similar to Turkey.

United States.—No regulations in force.

Hawaiian Islands,—No regulations in force.

Philippine Islands.—Passports not required.

Porto Rico.—Travellers are advised to carry passports.

Uruguay.—No regulations affecting Europeans in force. Travellers are, however, advised to have passports as evidence of nationality, in case of need.

Venezuela.—Travellers should be provided with passports bearing the visa of a Venezuelan consular officer.

Zanzibar.—No regulations in force.

APPENDIX H.

1. Upon Commissions to Lieutenant Governors, Ministers of the Crown, Judges of all Courts, Junior Judges, Deputy Ministers and King's Counsel, a fee of \$20.

2. Upon Commissions issued to officers or others receiving salaries from \$1,000 or

over, a fee of \$15.

3. Upon Commissions issued to officers or others receiving salaries from \$400 to \$1,000, a fee of \$8.

4. Upon Commissions issued to officers or others receiving salaries from \$100 to

\$400, a fee of \$5.

5. Upon Commissions issued to officers or others receiving a salary of \$100, or to

officers or persons appointed to office, who are paid by fees of office, a fee of \$4.

Upon Commissions to the Solicitor, General of Canada, and all officers in the service of the Crown who may receive a salary of three thousand dollars or upwards, a fee of \$20.

The above to apply to Commissions issued under the Great or Privy Seal.

No commission or document to be delivered out of the Department of the Secretary of State until the fee, if any, has been paid thereinto.

N. B.—No fee to be exacted upon commissions appointing Commissioners to make inquiries into matters affecting public interests. (O. C., December 5, 1891.)

APPENDIX I.

REGULATIONS AND TARIFF OF FEES UNDER THE ACT RESPECTING LOAN COMPANIES.

Intending applicants for Letters Patent under this Act shall give two weeks previous notice in the Canada Gazette of their proposed application, stating therein:

(a.) The names in full and address and calling of the proposed Board of Directors, and with special mention of the names of not less than three of the applicants who are

to be the provisional Board.

(b.) The proposed name of the company, which shall not be that of any known company or partnership or individual or any name under which any known business is being carried on, or so nearly resembling the same as to be calculated to deceive or cause confusion. A subsisting name may, however, be given in whole or in part with the consent of the company or person entitled thereto, and the name of any existing company whose franchises and assets are to be acquired may be given to the applicants if the Governor in Council is satisfied that such company has the best right to that name.

(c.) The place within Canada where the head office of the company is to be

established.

(d.), The object for which incorporation is sought.

(e.) The amount of the proposed capital stock, the number of shares and the amount of each share.

At any time not more than two months after the last publication of such notice, the applicants may petition the Governor in Council, through the Secretary of State, for the issue of such Letters Patent.

Such petition shall state the facts set out in the notice published in the Canada Gizette, and shall be supported by affidavits or statutory declarations under the provisions of The Canada Evidence Act establishing:—

(a.) That the proposed name is unobjectionable in the sense herein before indicated.

(b.) The sufficiency of the notice required by the preceding regulations.

(c.) The truth and sufficiency of the petition and of the facts therein set forth, including the verification of the signatures of the petitioners by an affidavit or statutory declaration made by the witness thereof.

A notary, a justice of the peace or a commissioner authorized to receive affidavits, shall be competent persons before whom any affidavit, affirmation or declaration required

by this Act, or regulations made thereunder may be taken or made.

The following shall be the schedule of fees payable for Letters Patent under this Act:—

(a.) When the proposed capital stock is \$100,000-\$200.

(b.) When the proposed capital stock is more than \$100,000, and less than \$1,000,000, the fee to be \$200, and two dollars and a half for every additional \$10,000 or fractional part thereof in excess of \$100,000.

(c.) When the proposed capital stock is \$1,000,000 the fee to be \$500.

(d.) When the proposed capital stock is over \$1,000,000, the fee to be \$500, and \$5 for every additional \$10,000 or fractional part thereof in excess of \$1,000,000.

No steps shall be taken in the Department of the Secretary of State towards the issue of any letters patent under this Act until the fee therefor has been paid.

The Secretary of State shall be charged with the administration of this Act as far

as the issue of Letters Patent thereunder is concerned.

Upon the granting of Letters Patent under this Act, notice shall forthwith be given by the Secretary of State in the Canada Gazette, and the company to which such notice relates shall cause the same to be published on four separate occasions in at least one newspaper in the county, city or place where the head office of the company is established.

CHAPTER 17.

(Revised Statutes of Canada.)

An Act respecting the Civil Service of Canada.

(As amended by 51 V., c. 12; 52 V., c. 12; 55-56 V., c. 14; 57-58 A.D. 1886 V., c. 18; 58-59 V., cc. 14 and 15; 60-61 V., c. 14, and 63-64 V., c. 14.)

HER Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

SHORT TITLE.

1. This Act may be cited as "The Civil Service Act.' Short title 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 1.

INTERPRETATION.

2. In this Act unless the context otherwise requires,—Interpreta-(a.) The expression "Head of a Department" means the "Head of a Minister of the Crown for the time being presiding over such Department."

(b.) The expression "Deputy," "Deputy Head," or "Deputy "Deputy Head of the Department," means the Deputy of the Head. Minister of the Crown presiding over such department, and also includes the "Auditor-General," in all cases in which such meaning is not inconsistent with his powers and duties under "The Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act." 48-49 V., è. 46, s. 2.

3 EDWARD VII.

CHAP. 9.

An Act to amend the Civil Service Act.

[Assented to 24th October, 1903.]

HIS Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows :-

1. Paragraph (b.) of section 2 of The Civil Service Act, R.S.C., c. 17, chapter 17 of the Revised Statutes, is amended by inserting s. 2 amended. after the word "department", in the third line, the words "and also the Clerk of the Privy Council".

2. Section 12 of the said Act is repealed, and the follow-New s. 12.

ing is substituted therefor:—

"12. The salary of a Deputy Head of a department, or of Salaries of a person having by statute the rank of a Deputy Head, on Deputy Heads, appointment shall be three thousand five hundred dollars per annum, with an annual increase of one hundred dollars to a maximum salary of four thousand dollars per annum, such increase to be made by the Governor in Council on the recommendation of the Head of the department: Provided, however, that the Deputy of the Minister of Justice, if at the time of his appointment he is a barrister of at least ten years' standing, and the Deputy of the Minister of Finance and Receiver General, if at the time of his appointment he has been at least ten years in the service of one or more of the chartered banks of Canada as general manager or as a manager of a branch of such bank, or in both capacities, and the Deputy of the Minister of Railways and Canals, if at the time of his appointment he is a civil engineer of at least ten years' standing, may be paid one thousand dollars per annum in addition to the amounts hereinbefore provided for."

3. For the purpose of determining the salaries of the As to present present Deputy Heads, and of persons having by statute Heads.

the rank of a Deputy Head, such Deputy Heads and persons shall be credited their period of service, either as Deputy or in some other capacity in the public service, and shall thereafter be paid such salary as they would by length of service have become entitled to had they been appointed under the provisions of section 12 of The Civil Service Act, as amended by this Act: Provided that notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this Act, the salary of the present Deputy Minister of Finance so long as he remains in office shall be the maximum salary for the Deputy of that Department as authorized by this Act.

As to Deputy Heads not now entitled to maximum salary. 4. If any Deputy Head or such other person having by statute the rank of a Deputy Head is not in receipt of the maximum salary of four thousand dollars, his salary may be increased by yearly increases of one hundred dollars each until he receives the said maximum salary.

Certain salaries not affected.

5. Nothing in this Act shall operate to diminish the salary or emolument of any present Deputy Head or person having by statute the rank of a Deputy Head, who, at the passing of this Act, is in receipt of a salary larger than would be payable to him under this Act.

As to present Deputy Minister of Justice. 6. This Act shall not apply to the present Deputy of the Minister of Justice until the conclusion of his present engagement as one of the commissioners for the revision of the statutes of Canada.

New 8, 13.

7. Section 13 of The Civil Service Act is repealed, and

the following section is substituted therefor:—

Duties and powers of Deputy Head.

"13. The Deputy Head of each department shall, subject to the directions of the Head of the department, oversee and direct the officers, clerks and employees in the department, and shall have general control of the business thereof, and shall perform such other duties as are assigned to him by the Governor in Council. He shall give his full time to the public service and shall discharge all duties required by the Head of the department, or by the Governor in Council, whether such duty is in his own department or not; and no Deputy Head shall receive any pay, fee or allowance in any form in excess of the amount provided for him in section 12 of this Act."

Chief Clerkships, Grade A.

• S. In addition to the class of Chief Clerkships referred to in sections 15 and 16 of the said Act, another class, to be known as that of "Chief Clerkship, Grade A," is hereby created.

Salary.

2. The minimum salary paid to a Chief Clerk, Grade A, shall be two thousand four hundred dollars per annum, with annual increases of one hundred dollars up to a

maximum of two thousand eight hundred dollars per annum.

3. A Chief Clerk in any department may, without being Conditions of required to undergo any special or other examination, be grade A. promoted to Grade A by an Order in Council passed after-

(a.) The Deputy Head has reported that the duties devolving upon such officer are of special importance, and that the officer recommended for such promotion is specially qualified for their performance;

(b.) The concurrence of the Head of the department in

such report; and

(c.) The salary has been voted by Parliament.

4. If a person on appointment to a Chief Clerkship, Grade A, is at the time of such appointment in receipt of a salary greater than the minimum salary of such Chief Clerkship as above provided, he may be appointed to such Chief Clerkship at the salary he is then in receipt of, provided it does not exceed the maximum salary of such Chief Clerk-

ship as above provided.

5. The provisions of subsection 3 of section 24 of The Con- In office solidated Revenue and Audit Act, as that section is enacted of Auditor by section 1 of chanter 16 of the statutes of 1801. by section 1 of chapter 16 of the statutes of 1891, shall apply to promotions to Chief Clerkships, Grade A, in the office of the Auditor General, who shall also have in respect of such promotions the powers hereby vested in the Governor in Council.

9. Section 16 of The Civil Service Act is repealed, and the New s. 16.

following is substituted therefor:—

"16. The minimum salary of a Chief Clerk shall be one Salary of chief thousand nine hundred dollars per annum, with an annual clerk. increase of fifty dollars up to a maximum of two thousand five hundred dollars per annum."

10. Section 18 of The Civil Service Act is repealed, and New s. 18.

the following is substituted therefor: -

"18. The minimum salary of a First Class Clerk shall be Salary of first one thousand five hundred dollars per annum, with an class clerk. annual increase of fifty dollars up to a maximum of one thousand nine hundred dollars per annum."

11. Section 20 of The Civil Service Act is repealed, and New s. 20.

the following is substituted therefor:—

"20. The minimum salary of a Second Class Clerk shall Salary of be one thousand two hundred dollars per annum with an second class annual increase of fifty dollars up to a maximum of one thousand five hundred dollars per annum."

12. Section 4 of chapter 14 of the statutes of 1900 is 1900, c. 14, repealed, and the following is substituted therefor:

Salary of junior second class clerk.

"4. The minimum salary of a Junior Second Class Clerk shall be eight hundred dollars per annum, with an annual increase of fifty dollars up to a maximum of one thousand one hundred dollars per annum."

Status not to be affected.

13. Nothing in this Act shall be held to reduce the status of any clerk in the Service; and if the salary of any such clerk is less than the minimum salary of his class under the provisions of this Act, his salary may forthwith be increased to such minimum.

Increase beyond former maximum.

2. Any person (whether permanent or temporary) who is in receipt of the maximum salary, as heretofore established, of the class (permanent or temporary) in which he is then serving shall, on the expiry of one year from his having first been in receipt of such maximum, be eligible for the increase of salary provided by this Act.

R.S.C., c. 17, schedule A amended. 14. Schedule A to *The Civil Service Act*, as amended by section 12 of chapter 15 of the statutes of 1895, and by section 1 of chapter 14 of the statutes of 1900, is amended by adding thereto the following paragraph:—

" (g.) Third Class Clerks."

Examinations.

Third class

15. The second or "qualifying" examination prescribed by *The Civil Service Act* shall qualify for appointment to Third Class Clerkships, and no person, except as hereinafter specially provided, shall be appointed to any such clerkship unless he has passed such "qualifying" examination, or unless he is exempt therefrom by the said Act.

Salary.

16. The minimum salary of a Third Class Clerk shall be five hundred dollars per annum, and the maximum salary shall be seven hundred dollars per annum.

Salary on appointment.

17. Except as hereinafter provided, the salary of a Third Class Clerk on appointment shall be the minimum salary hereinbefore provided for.

Annual increases.

18. The Governor in Council may, after a Third Class Clerk has served one year, increase his salary, by amounts not exceeding fifty dollars in any one year, up to the maximum salary of a Third Class Clerk hereinbefore provided for; but no such increase shall be made except upon the report of the Deputy Head of the department, concurred in by the Head of the department, that such clerk is deserving thereof.

Application of R.S.C., c. 17.

19. Except as herein otherwise provided, the provisions of *The Civil Service Act* and any amendments thereto shall apply to Chief Clerks, Grade A, and to Third Class Clerks appointed under this Act, and the said Act and amendments

shall be read and construed as if the provisions of this Act were incorporated therein.

20. Any person who either before the passing of this Act Appointment was or thereafter may be writer, clerk, packer, sorter or of certain employees as messenger, temporary or otherwise, in the service of the third class Government of Canada, employed in one of the departments clerks. at Ottawa or in the office of the Auditor General, may, under Order in Council, be appointed a Third Class Clerk at a salary not less than the salary of which he was in receipt or to which he would be entitled at the time of such appointment (but limited always to a sum not exceeding the maximum salary of the Third Class): Provided always that any such person, who in the capacity aforesaid, or in any other capacity, has been continuously in the said service for two years prior to the passing of this Act, may be so appointed without regard to his age and without passing the qualifying examination, and the said Order in Council shall be held to create the Third Class Clerkship in respect of which such appointment is made, and the Governor in Council may, in the case of any such person whose salary is at the time of his appointment as Third Class Clerk less than five hundred dollars a year, increase such salary to five hundred dollars a year, on the report of the Deputy Head of the department, concurred in by the Head of the department, that such clerk is deserving thereof.

21. Section 37 of the said Act is repealed, and the follow-New s. 37, ing is substituted therefor:—

"37. When the Deputy Head of a department in which As to officers a vacancy occurs reports, for reasons set forth in such re-requiring port,qualifications.

"(a.) That the qualifications requisite for such office or employment are wholly or in part professional or technical;

"(b.) That it would be for the public interest that the examination herein provided for should, as regards such

vacancy, be wholly or partially dispensed with;

"The Governor in Council may, without reference to the Selection and age of the person, if the Head of the department concurs in appointment. such report, select and appoint such person as is deemed best fitted to fill the vacancy, subject to such examination as is suggested in the report.

"2. City Postmasters and Post Office Inspectors, Inspec-Exception as tors, Collectors and Preventive Officers in the Customs to certain officers. Department, Inspectors of Weights and Measures, and Deputy Collectors and Preventive Officers in the Inland Revenue Department, may be appointed without examination and without reference to the rules for promotion herein prescribed.

"3. Notwithstanding anything in this Act, a person who As to examinhas served for three years as an officer or acting officer in the Chstoms.

Customs in the outside service, may be appointed to the position of Examining Officer in the outside service of the Customs, subject to such examination, in duties of office and other qualifications, as is prescribed by the Deputy Head in a report to be concurred in by the Head of the department."

Section 39 amended.

Subsection 2 of section 39 of the said Act, as that section is enacted by section 8 of chapter 12 of the statutes of 1888, is amended by striking out the word "only" in the second line, and by inserting after the word "May" in that line the words "and at such other time as is from time to time fixed by the Governor in Council."

CHAP. 26.

An Act further to amend the Post Office Act.

[Assented to 29th June, 1897.]

TER Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows :-

1. Subsection one of section nine of The Post Office Act, R. S. C., c. 35, chapter thirty-five of the Revised Statutes, is hereby s. 9 amended.

amended by adding thereto the following paragraph:-

"(r.) make regulations for security being given by any Regulations person or body corporate to Her Majesty for the due per-by Postmaster General. formance of his duties in any matter relative to the Post Office of Canada by any officer, employee, clerk or servant employed by or under the Postmaster General, or by any one employed in the Canada Post Office, or by any one performing, whether with or without authority, any business of the Post Office of Canada; and also for the establishment and maintenance of a fund, to be derived from moneys received from officers, employees, clerks and servants employed by or under the Postmaster General, wherewith to make good to the Crown any loss by reason of any officer, employee, clerk or servant employed by or under the Postmaster General, or of any one performing any business of the post office, failing to duly discharge his duties in any matter relating to the Post Office of Canada."

2. Hereafter railway mail clerks will not be required to Railway mail pass the promotion examination provided for by section from promothirty-nine of The Civil Service Act.

3. The said Act is hereby further amended by adding Sections thereto the following sections:-

Establishment of railway mail service branch.

"119. The Governor in Council may establish a branch of the Post Office Department to be called the Railway Mail Service Branch, to be composed of a controller, with head-quarters at Ottawa, superintendents at points to be determined by the Postmaster General, and such other employees as are from time to time necessary for the proper conduct of the business of the branch.

Controller and other employees.

"120. The Governor in Council may appoint to such branch an officer to be called 'the Controller of the Railway Mail Service of Canada' together with such superintendents, railway mail clerks, transfer agents and other employees as are deemed necessary; and such controller, superintendents, railway mail clerks, transfer agents and other employees may be appointed from among persons in the Civil Service; and, in such event, such appointments shall not, within the meaning of The Civil Service Superannuation Act or any other Act, be regarded as new appointments, but shall be regarded as mere transfers from one branch of the Civil Service to another.

Qualification of controller.

"121. No person shall be eligible to be appointed Controller of the Railway Mail Service unless he has been for at least ten years employed in the Canada Post Office.

New appointments.

"122. New appointments to the said branch shall be made as provided for by *The Civil Service Act* and the amendments thereof.

Duties of controller.

"123. The duties of the controller, under the direction

of the Head of the Department, shall be:-

"(a.) to have control over the superintendents, railway mail clerks, transfer agents and other employees in such branch in the discharge of the duties from time to time assigned to them by the controller, and to deal with all breaches or neglect of duty, with power to suspend such persons for such breaches or neglect of duty or other sufficient cause, during the pleasure of the Postmaster General:

"(b.) to issue mail schedules and distribution lists;

"(c.) to deal with all matters pertaining to the internal economy of postal cars;

"(d.) to deal with all delayed or mis-sent mails or mail

matter;

"(e.) to regulate the receipt and despatch of mails between post offices and railways, and to perform such other duties as are from time to time assigned to him by the Head of the Department.

Salary.

"124. The salary of the controller shall be determined by the Governor in Council, and shall not exceed two thousand five hundred dollars per annum.

CHAP. 20.

An Act further to amend the Post Office Act.

[Assented to 13th June, 1898.]

[ER Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:

Rate of postage on letters within Canada.

1. On all letters transmitted by post for any distance within Canada, except in cases otherwise specially provided for, there shall be charged and paid one uniform rate of two cents per ounce weight, any fraction of an ounce being chargeable as an ounce, and such postage rate of two cents shall be prepaid by postage stamp or stamps at the time of posting the letter.

Prepayment obligatory.

2. Letters wholly unpaid shall not be forwarded by post; but letters which are addressed to any place in Canada and on which any postage has been prepaid by stamp shall be forwarded to their destination charged with double the amount of the postage thereon not so prepaid, which amount shall be collected on delivery.

Exemption.

3. This section shall not have force or effect until a day to be named by the Governor General by his proclamation, and upon such day the section substituted for section 20 of The Post Office Act by section 4 of chapter 20 of the statutes of 1889 shall be deemed to be repealed, and this section

On and after the first day of January, one thousand Rates of eight hundred and ninety-nine, newspapers and periodicals, postage on newspapers printed and published in Canada, mailed by the publisher in and periodithe post office at the place where they are published and cals after 1st January, 1899. addressed to regular subscribers or newsdealers in Canada, resident elsewhere than in the place of publication, shall be transmitted by mail to their respective addresses as follows: —If they are required to be transmitted by mail a distance within twenty miles from the place of publication or within a circular area of a diameter not exceeding forty miles, and if their publication is of no greater frequency than once a week, they shall be so transmitted free of postage within one or other of such areas to be selected by the publisher in accordance with regulations in that behalf to be established by the Postmaster General; if they are required to be transmitted a greater distance, or if their publication is of greater frequency than once a week, then in either of such cases postage thereon shall be paid on and after the said first day of January, and until and inclusive of the thirtieth day of June next following, at the rate of one-quarter of one cent, and thereafter at the rate of one-half of one cent, for each pound weight or any fraction of a pound weight, which shall be prepaid by postage stamps or otherwise, as the Postmaster General from time to time directs; provided that—

Weight, how determined.

"2. For the purpose of determining the weights of such newspapers or periodicals, each newspaper or periodical transmitted separately through the mails shall be held to weigh not less than one-half of one ounce.

Powers of Postmaster General. "3. The Postmaster General may decide whether any publication, for which transmission at the rates herein mentioned is claimed, is or is not a newspaper or periodical within the meaning and intent of this section, and whether the requirements thereof have or have not been complied with in regard to it, and from time to time may make any regulations he deems necessary to give full effect to the provisions of this section, or to prevent fraudulent evasions thereof."

Section 42 amended.

4. Section 42 of the said Act is hereby amended by adding thereto the following subsection:—

Books for the blind, free of postage.

"8. Books for the use of the blind shall be free of Canada postage under such regulations as are from time to time made in that respect by the Postmaster General."

New section 44.

5. The subsection substituted for subsection 1 of section 44 of the said Act by section 10 of chapter 20 of the statutes of 1889, is hereby repealed and the following is substituted therefor:—

Dead letters, how dealt with.

"44. Except as in this Act otherwise provided, letters or other articles which, from any cause, remain undelivered in any post office, or which, having been posted, cannot be forwarded by post, shall, under such regulations as the Postmaster General makes, be transmitted by postmasters to the Post Office Department, or to such other places as the Governor in Council directs, as dead letters, there to be opened and returned to the writers or senders on payment of any postage due thereon with three cents additional on each dead letter to defray the cost of returning it, less, in the case of insufficiently prepaid letters or other mailable matter posted in Canada, such amount of postage as nas been prepaid thereon; or such dead letters may, in any case or class of cases, be otherwise disposed of as the Postmaster General directs; provided always that with regard to letters the only places other than Ottawa to which they may be so transmitted and dealt with as dead letters, shall be the cities of Montreal, Toronto, Victoria, Winnipeg and Halifax, subject to such regulations as are approved by the Governor in Council."

Examination of post office clerks.

6. Hereafter clerks employed in post offices shall not be required to pass the promotion examination provided for by section 39 of *The Civil Service Act*, but shall be examined on the work of the post office, at such times and by such persons as are from time to time designated by the Postmaster General.

[Assented to 11th August, 1899.]

[Assented to 23rd May, 1901]

HIS Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

R. S. C., c. 35, s. 2 amended. 1. The paragraph substituted by subsection 1 of section 2 of chapter 20 of the statutes of 1889 for paragraph (i) of section 2 of The Post Office Act, is repealed and the follow-

ing is substituted therefor:-

"Post letter" defined.

"(i.) The expression 'post letter' means any letter transmitted by the post or delivered through the post, or deposited in any post office, or in any letter box put up anywhere under the authority of the Postmaster General, whether such letter is addressed to a real or a fictitious person or not, and whether it is intended for transmission by the post or delivery through the post or not; and a letter shall be deemed a post letter from the time of its being so deposited to the time of its being delivered to the person to whom it is addressed, or so long as it remains in the post office or in any such letter box or is being carried through the post; and a delivery to any person authorized to receive letters for the post shall be deemed a delivery at the post office, and a delivery of any letter or other mailable matter at the house or office of the person to whom the letter is addressed, or to him, or to his servant or agent, or other person considered to be authorized to receive the letter or other mailable matter, according to the usual manner of delivering that person's letters, shall be a delivery to the person addressed."

CHAP. 28.

An Act to amend the Post Office Act.

[Assented to 15th May, 1902.]

R.C.S., c. 35. IN amendment of The Post Office Act, His Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

To whom this Act shall apply.

1. This Act, instead of *The Civil Service Act*, shall apply to every person hereafter appointed to a position as messenger, porter, packer, letter carrier, mail transfer agent or box collector in either the inside or outside division of the Post Office Department, and, except as hereinafter provided, to every person heretofore so appointed who elects to accept the provisions of this Act.

Five grades.

2. The classes of persons mentioned in section 1 shall be divided into five grades, to be called grades "A," "B," "C;" "D" and "E" respectively.

Pay per day.

3. The salaries of those in grade "A" shall be at the rate of \$1.25 per day; of those in grade "B," at the rate of \$1.50 per day; of those in grade "C," at the rate of \$1.75 per day; of those in grade "D," at the rate of \$2 per day; and of those in grade "E," at the rate of \$2.25 per day.

Probation.

4. Every such appointment hereafter made shall be subject to probation for a period of six months, (or until such earlier time as he is, on the recommendation of the proper officer, confirmed in his appointment) during which the appointee shall be classed in grade "A." Upon the appointment being confirmed, he shall be classed in grade "B"; after two years' service in grade "B" he shall, if duly recommended for promotion, be classed in grade "C"; after two years' service in grade "C" he shall, if duly recom-

mended for promotion, be classed in grade "D"; and for

the performance of work of a specially arduous and responsible nature, promotions may from time to time be made from grade "D" to grade "E."

2. In case of inefficient or unsatisfactory service or conduct, Reduction

5. Candidates for appointment shall be subject to such Examinaprevious examinations as are from time to time prescribed tions. by the Governor in Council.

6. Any person heretofore appointed to and filling any of How present the positions mentioned in section 1, and desiring to occupy employees may come a corresponding position under this Act, may elect to accept under this the provisions of this Act instead of the provisions of The Act. Civil Service Act, by signifying such election in writing, signed by him, and delivered or transmitted by registered letter, addressed to the Secretary of the Post Office Department, within three months after the passing of this Act; and thereupon this Act, instead of The Civil Service Act, shall apply to him, subject to the following conditions:—

First, Such election shall not affect his rights or position under The Civil Service Superannuation Act or The Civil

Service Retirement Act, 1898;

Secondly, Any one who, at the time of his election, is serving a probationary period, shall be classed in grade "A"; any one who has been or shall be confirmed in his position shall, if duly recommended, be classed in grade "B," unless more than two years and less than four years have elapsed since such confirmation, in which event he shall, if so recommended, be classed in grade "C"; and if more than four years have elapsed since such confirmation, he shall, if so recommended, be classed in grade "D," subject to reduction as mentioned in section 4.

7. Every person mentioned in section 1 shall be entitled Annual leave each year to two weeks' leave of absence with pay. He may of absence. also, on account of satisfactory service, be granted additional leave of absence with pay, for a period not exceeding ten days in each year, or a bonus at the rate of two dollars for each day Additional of such additional leave, and in that case he shall have his leave, or bonus. option between the said additional leave and the said bonus.

- 8. Any person hereafter appointed to any of the positions 1898, c. 17. mentioned in section 1 shall be subject to The Civil Service Retirement Act, 1898.
- 9. 10. No person shall be eligible for appointment as Chief Post Office Superintendent unless he has been a clerk, or officer of higher rank, in a city post office for at least ten May combine years. His appointment as such superintendent shall not, unless and until so determined by the Governor in Council, have the effect of removing him from the position held by him in the service at the time of his appointment as super-Proviso: limit intendent, provided that his total salary shall not exceed three thousand dollars per annum.

CHAP. 49.

An Act to amend the Post Office Act.

[Assented to 13th August, 1903.]

HIS Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

Railway mail clerks.

1. The following, in lieu of any other provision to the contrary, shall apply to all persons hereafter appointed as

railway mail clerks:—

Appointment and salary.

(a.) A railway mail clerk shall be appointed on probation for a period of at least six months, at a salary of four hundred dollars a year, with an additional allowance for mileage; and on the confirmation of his appointment he may be paid at the rate of five hundred dollars a year and mileage, with annual increases of fifty dollars until the maximum of one thousand two hundred is reached.

Examination.

(b.) Railway mail clerks shall pass a yearly case examination; and no railway mail clerk shall be entitled to an increase of salary in any year in which he has not passed a satisfactory case examination, and no increase shall be granted except on the report of the Deputy Head, concurred in by the Head of the department, stating that the clerk is deserving of such increase.

Reduction of salary.

(c.) The salary of a railway mail clerk may be reduced when the case examinations are not satisfactory.

Age and qualifications.

(d.) Excepting train porters, no persons over thirty years of age (other than those who at the time of the passing of this Act are temporarily employed in the Post Office service) shall be eligible for appointment as railway mail clerks; and no person shall be appointed unless he has passed the second or qualifying examination prescribed by The Civil Service Act, or unless he is a graduate of the Royal Military College or of any university in Canada.

(e.) Railway mail clerks appointed under this section shall 1898, c. 17, to be subject to the provisions of The Civil Service Retirement apply.

(f.) - (k.) Except as herein otherwise provided, the provisions R.S.C., c. 17, of *The Civil Service Act* and of chapter 26 of the statutes of and 1897, c. 26 1897 shall apply to all railway mail clerks employed under this section.
- 2. Section 4 of chapter 28 of the statutes of 1902 is 1902, c. 28, s. amended by striking out the word "six" in the second line 4 amended. and substituting therefor the word "three," and by inserting in the eleventh line after the words "responsible nature" the words "or in recognition of special efficiency and good conduct."
- 3. Notwithstanding anything in section 6 of the said last-1902, c. 28, s. mentioned Act, the election provided for by that section 6 amended. may be exercised at any time within six months after the passing of this Act.
- 4. The probationary period referred to in the said section Probationary 6 shall be deemed to be the period of employment in any period, how reckoned. capacity in the public service prior to the date of appointment or employment under The Civil Service Act by or under the authority of the Governor in Council, unless such service exceeds three months. If such prior service exceeds three

months, then the first three months of such service shall be deemed to be the probationary period.

In the case of certain employees. 5. If any person to whom the said chapter 28 of the statutes of 1902 now applies, was employed in the public service prior to the date of his appointment or employment by or under the authority of the Governor in Council under The Civil Service Act, and if his prior service, reckoned in the manner prescribed in the next preceding section, would have entitled him, at the date when he became subject to the provisions of the said Act, or at any subsequent date not later than the fifteenth day of August, 1902, to a grade higher than that in which he was classed at such date, he may be placed in such higher grade, and he shall be deemed to have served therein from the date when he would have become so entitled, and may be paid accordingly.

R.S.C., c. 17, schedule B amended.

- 6. So much of Schedule B to *The Civil Service Act* as relates to clerks in city post offices, as amended by section 15 of chapter 28 of the statutes of 1902 is repealed, and the following is substituted therefor:—
- "Clerks in City Post Offices, Inspectors' Offices, and Superintendents of Railway Mail Service Offices.

"4th Class, on appointment, \$400; by annual increases of \$50 up to \$700. Any stamper and sorter may be promoted to the 4th class, and on such promotion his initial salary as such 4th class clerk shall be not less than his salary as such stamper and sorter at the time of such promotion.

"Junior 3rd Class, on appointment, \$700; by annual in-

creases of \$50 up to \$800.

"Senior 3rd Class, on appointment, \$800; by annual increases of \$50 up to \$900.

"Junior 2nd Class, on appointment, \$900; by annual in-

creases of \$50 up to \$1 000.

"Senior 2nd Class, on appointment, \$1,000; by annual

increases of \$50 up to \$1,200.

"1st Class, specific duties with fixed salaries in each case to be determined by the Postmaster General; no salary to

be less than \$1,200, or more then \$1,500."

2. Any clerk in any of the said offices who, at the passing of this Act is in the third class, shall be deemed to be a junior third class clerk, his salary until otherwise ordered continuing to be the amount which he is then enjoying, subject to annual increases not exceeding fifty dollars until it reaches eight hundred dollars a year.

As to second class clerks.

3. Any clerk in the second class at the time of the passing of this Act shall be deemed to be a senior second class clerk, except that if his salary be less than one thousand dollars,

it shall, until otherwise ordered, continue to be the amount which he is then enjoying, subject to annual increases, not exceeding fifty dollars each, until it reaches twelve hundred

dollars a year.

4. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in The Civil Promotion in Service Act, any clerk shall be eligible for promotion to any service. higher class in the outside branch of the Post Office Department without being required to pass any examination except such as many be prescribed under regulations to be passed by the Postmaster General and having reference to the duties to be performed by such clerk.

7. So much of Schedule B to The Civil Service Act as R.S.C., c. 17, relates to Post Office Inspectors and Assistant Post Office schedule B amended as Inspectors is hereby repealed, and in lieu thereof the follow- to inspectors ing provisions shall apply:

and assistant inspectors.

(a.) The salary of a Post Office Inspector on appointment shall be two thousand dollars, with increases of fifty dollars a year for six years, and one hundred dollars a year thereafter up to a maximum of two thousand six hundred dollars.

(b.) Any Post Office Inspector who, at the passing of this Act, has completed six years of service as such may be granted an increase of one hundred dollars a year up to the

maximum of two thousand six hundred dollars.

(c.) Any Post Office Inspector who, at the passing of this Act, has completed less than six years of service as such may be granted an increase of fifty dollars a year until he has completed six years of service, and one hundred dollars a year thereafter up to the maximum of two thousand six hundred dollars.

(d.) The salary of an Assistant Post Office Inspector on appointment shall be twelve hundred dollars, with increases of fifty dollars a year for the first six years, and one hundred dollars a year thereafter up to a maximum of one thousand eight hundred dollars

(e.) Any Assistant Post Office Inspector who, at the passing of this Act, has six years of service as such may be granted an increase of one hundred dollars a year up to a maximum

of one thousand eight hundred dollars.

(f.) Any Assistant Post Office Inspector who, at the passing of this Act, has completed less than six years of service as such may be granted an increase of fifty dollars a year until he has completed six years of service, and one hundred dollars a year thereafter up to a maximum of one thousand eight hundred dollars.

(g.) The increase of salary under this section shall be payable at the expiration of one year from the date of appointment, or at the expiration of one year from the date on which the Post Office Inspector or Assistant Post Office Inspector last received an increase, as the case may be.

(h.) No Post Office Inspector or Assistant Post Office Inspector shall receive an increase except under the authority of an Order in Council, based on the recommendation of the Deputy Head, concurred in by the Head of the department.

R.S.C., c. 35, new s. 126. 8. Section 126 added to *The Post Office Act*, by section 3 of chapter 26 of the statutes of 1897, is repealed, and the following section is substituted therefor:—

Salary of superintendent.

"126. The salary of a superintendent shall on appointment be fifteen hundred dollars, with annual increases of one hundred dollars up to a maximum salary of eighteen hundred dollars."

CHAP. 18.

An Act further to amend the Act respecting the Department of the Geological Survey.

[Assented to 13th June, 1898.]

HER Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

- 1. When the services of temporary assistants having Temporary special professional or technical qualifications are required assistants in the department of the Geological Survey, the Minister Survey. of the Crown presiding over that department may, upon the requisition of the Deputy Head and Director of the department, employ such number of temporary assistants as are necessary, having the qualifications requisite for appointment as technical officers of the department under section 4 of the Act respecting the Department of the Geological Survey, chapter 11 of the statutes of 1890.
- 2. Notwithstanding anything contained in The Civil Examination Service Act or any Act in amendment thereof, it shall not not required. be necessary that any person appointed a temporary assistant under the next preceding section shall have passed any examination under The Civil Service Act, and such person may be paid at the rate of more than four hundred Payment of dollars a year and out of moneys voted by Parliament for salaries. the contingencies of the department, or any other moneys voted by Parliament and applicable to such payment, although such moneys may not have been specially voted for such purpose.

CHAP. 15.

An Act to amend the Act respecting the Department of the Interior.

[Assented to 11th August, 1899.]

[N amendment of the Act respecting the Department of the Interior, chapter 22 of the Revised Statutes, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

Temporary technical employees.

1. When it becomes necessary to employ temporary assistants in the Surveyor General's branch of the Department of the Interior, for the performance of services requiring technical, scientific or professional qualifications, the Minister may, upon the requisition of the Deputy Minister, employ as such temporary assistants any persons who are reported to him by the Deputy and the Surveyor General to be possessed of the special qualifications requisite for such services.

As to present employees.

2. Any person who is now temporarily employed in the Surveyor General's branch of the Department in professional or technical work, and who is reported by the Deputy Minister and the Surveyor General to the Minister to have the special qualifications requisite for such work may be continued in such employment so long as his services therein are required.

Examination c. 17, not required.

- Payment of technical employees.
- 3. Notwithstanding anything contained in The Civil under R.S.C., Service Act or any Act passed in amendment thereof, it shall not be necessary that any person so employed or continued in employment shall have passed any examination under that Act, and any such person may be paid at the rate of more than four hundred dollars a year, and out of moneys voted by Parliament for the contingencies of the department, or out of any other moneys voted by Parliament for the services in connection with which such person is employed or continued in employment.

HER Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

SHORT TITLE.

1. This Act may be cited as "The Civil Service Super-Short title. annuation Act." 46 V., c. 8, s. 18.

APPLICATION OF ACT.

(f.) Notwithstanding anything therein or in any other Act contained, the provisions of The Civil Service Superanpointees over nuation Act, chapter eighteen of the Revised Statutes, shall not apply to any person who is appointed to any branch of the Civil Service of Canada after the passing of this Act, and whose age at the time of such appointment exceeds forty-five years. 56 V., c. 12, s. 2.

SUPERANNUATION

Conditions of allowance.

3. The Governor in Council may grant to any person who has served in an established capacity in the Civil Service for ten years or upwards, and who has attained the age of sixty years, or is incapacitated by bodily infirmity from properly performing his duties, a superannuation allowance calculated on his average yearly salary during the then last three years, and not exceeding the following rates, that is to say:—

Rates of allowance.

(a.) If he has served for ten years, but less than eleven years, an annual allowance of ten fiftieths of such average salary, and if for eleven years and under twelve years, an annual allowance of eleven fiftieths thereof, and in like manner a further addition of one fiftieth of such average salary for each additional year of service up to thirty-five years, when an annual allowance of thirty-five fiftieths may be granted; but no addition shall be made for any service beyond thirty-five years;

Maximum rate for 35 vears.

(b.) If the service has not been continuous, the period or service not to be counted. periods during which such service has been interrupted shall not be counted, and the Order in Council made in any such case shall be laid before Parliament at its then current or next ensuing session. 46 V., c. 8, s. 2.

Gratuity earned.

Gratuity in case of bodily injury on duty.

10. If any person to whom this Act applies, is constrained, when yearly allowance not from any infirmity of mind or body, to quit the Civil Service before the period at which a superannuation allowance might be granted him, the Governor in Council may allow him a gratuity not exceeding one month's pay for each year of his service; and if any such person is so constrained to quit the service before such period, by reason of severe bodily injury, received without his own fault, in the discharge of his public duty, the Governor in Council may allow him a gratuity not exceeding three month's pay for every two years' service, or a superannuation allowance not exceeding one-fifth of his average salary during the then last three vears. 46 V., c. 8, s. 9.

Provision for abolition of office, reduction of staff,

11. If any person to whom this Act applies is removed from office in consequence of the abolition of his office for the purpose of improving the organization of the department to which he belongs, or is removed, or retired from office to promote efficiency or economy in the Civil Service, the Governor in Council may grant him such gratuity or superannuation allowance as will fairly compensate him for his loss of office, not exceeding such as he would have been entitled to if he had retired in consequence of permanent infirmity of body or mind, after adding ten years to his actual term of service. 46 V., c. 8, s. 10.

Pensioners under sixty if required, under penalty of loss of allowance.

12. Every person who receives a superannuation allowliable to serve ance, and is under the age of sixty years, and is not disabled by bodily or mental infirmity, may be called upon to fill, in any part of Canada, any public office or situation for which his previous services render him eligible, and which is not lower in rank or emolument than that from which he retired; and,

[Assented to 29th June, 1897.]

IER Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:-

Deductions for superannuation fund to dismissed public servant.

1. The Governor in Council may, on the recommendation of the Treasury Board, pay to any person dismissed from the may be repaid public service of Canada, who at the time of such dismissal was contributing to any civil service superannuation fund under the provisions of The Civil Service Superannuation Act, or any Act in amendment thereof, the whole, or such portion as the Governor in Council deems expedient, of the amount so contributed by such person to such fund; and the Governor with interest. in Council may also, on the recommendation of the Treasury Board, in addition pay to such person interest to the date of such dismissal on the contributions so repaid, or any portion thereof, at such rate of interest, not exceeding five per cent per annum, and calculated in such manner, as the Governor in Council deems advisable.

Retroaction.

2. This Act applies to any person heretofore or hereafter dismissed from the public service.

Payment in discretion of Governor in Council.

3. Nothing herein shall be construed to confer upon any person any right to demand or enforce the repayment of any amount contributed by him to any such fund, or any interest thereon, and all payments made under this Act shall be wholly in the discretion of the Governor in Council.

CHAP. 10.

An Act to amend the Civil Service Superannuation Act.

[Assented to 25th June, 1903.]

IIS Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the .L. Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows :-

Reckoning of time of service.

1. The period of service upon which a superannuation allowance is to be calculated under the provisions of The Civil Service Superannuation Act, chapter 18 of the Revised R.S.C., c. 18. Statutes, or any Act in amendment thereof, shall be determined as follows:-

(a.) If the actual period of service includes a fraction of a year less than one-half, such service shall be taken to be the number of years served, not including the fraction;

Fraction of vear under half.

or over.

and Half year

(b.) If the actual period of service includes a fraction of a year equal to or greater than one-half, such fraction shall be deemed to be a full year, and service shall be calculated as if the full year had been served.

Existing superannuations confirmed.

2. All superannuation allowances heretofore granted under the provisions of chapter 4 of the statutes of 1870, or chapter 8 of the statutes of 1883, or chapter 18 of the Revised Statutes, or of any amendment to any of those chapters, calculated in the manner provided for in the first section of this Act, are hereby confirmed.

CHAP. 13.

An Act respecting Government Civil Service Insurance.

[Assented to 1st April; 1893.]

HER Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows :-

- 1. This Act may be cited as The Civil Service Insurance Short title. Act.
- 2. In this Act, unless the context otherwise requires, the "Minister" expression "Minister" means the Minister of Finance and defined. Receiver-General.
- 3. The Minister may contract with any person to whom Insurance The Civil Service Superannuation Act applies, or who may contracts authorized. be hereafter appointed to a permanent position in any branch of the Public Service of Canada, for the payment of a certain sum of money to be made upon the death of such

2. Any such contract is hereinafter called the "insurance Interpretacontract"; the person so contracting with the Minister is hereinafter called the "insured"; and the amount so contracted to be paid is hereinafter called "insurance money."

4. When the insured is a married man or a widower with Apportioning children, the insurance contract shall be for the benefit of of insurance in case of his wife, or of his wife and children, or of his wife and some married man one or more of his children, or of his children only, or of or widower with children. some one or more of them; and when the insurance contract is effected for the benefit of more than one, the insured may apportion the insurance money among them as he deems proper.

Apportionment in case

5. When the insured is an unmarried man, the insurance of unmarried contract shall be for the benefit of his future wife, or of his future wife and children, and the insured may apportion the insurance money among them in such manner as he sees fit; but if, at the maturity of the contract, he is still unmarried, or is a widower without children, the insurance money shall fall into and become part of his estate.

Form of apportionment.

6. Any apportionment under the next two preceding sections may be made in the insurance contract, or by a declaration endorsed thereon or annexed thereto and signed by the insured.

" Children " defined.

7. When it is stated in the insurance contract, or in a declaration endorsed thereon or attached thereto, that the insurance contract is for the benefit of the wife and children generally, or of the children generally, of the insured, without specifying their names, then the word "children" shall mean all the children of the insured living at the time of his death whether by the same wife or by different wives.

Share of persured.

8. Where an apportionment has been made as hereinson dying be-fore the in- before provided and one or more of the persons in whose fayour the apportionment has been made die in the lifetime of the insured, the insured may, by an instrument in writing endorsed on or attached to the insurance contract, declare that the shares formerly apportioned to the persons so dying shall be for the benefit of the wife and children of the insured, or of one or more of them, as he sees fit; and in default of such declaration, the shares of the persons so dying shall be for the benefit of the survivor, or of the survivors of such persons in equal shares if more than one; and if all the persons so entitled die in the lifetime of the insured, the insurance money shall fall into and become part of the estate of the insured.

If there is no apportionment.

9. When no apportionment is made of the insurance money as hereinbefore provided, all persons interested shall be held to share equally therein.

Minister may decline to contract.

10. The Minister may decline to enter into an insurance contract in any case where there are, in his opinion, sufficient grounds for his declining to do so.

Tables to be prepared.

11. The Minister shall cause tables to be constructed fixing the premiums to be paid by the insured to the Minister as the consideration for such insurance contracts, and also all other tables necessary for the carrying out of the provisions of this Act.

2. All such tables shall be based on the H. M. Mortality Basis of tables Table of the Institute of Actuaries of Great Britain, and on

a rate of interest of six per cent per annum, no allowance

being made for expenses.

3. Such tables shall be framed so that the premium to Premium, obtain an insurance contract may be paid in one sum, or in how payable. annual, semi-annual, quarterly, or monthly instalments, and either during the life of the insured or during a limited period.

- 12. The minimum and maximum amounts payable at Amount of death which may be contracted for under this Act shall be insurance limited one thousand dollars and two thousand dollars respectively.
- 13. Every applicant for insurance shall furnish with his Medical cerapplication a medical certificate in such form as is prescribed tificate. by the Minister.
- 14. The Governor in Council may from time to time make Regulations regulations for the following purposes under this Act:
 - (a.) For regulating the mode and form of making contracts;
- (b.) For prescribing the mode of proving the age and identity and the existence or death of persons;

(c.) For prescribing the mode of paying sums of money in

connection with insurance contracts;

(d.) For dispensing with the production of probate of a will or letters of administration, either generally or in any particular class of cases;

(e.) For prescribing the accounts to be kept and their

management;

(f.) For determining beforehand the cases or classes of cases in which insurance contracts may be surrendered and a cash surrender value paid therefor, or a free or paid-up insurance contract issued instead thereof, and for prescribing the manner in which such cash surrender value or amount of paid-up insurance shall be determined;

(g.) For any other purpose for which it is deemed expedient to make regulations in order to carry this Act into effect.

15. In the event of any person to whom The Civil Service Additional Superannuation Act* now applies taking advantage of the payment if payment if insured now provisions of this Act, a deduction at the rate of three per comes under cent per annum shall be made from the salary of such R.S.C., c. 18. person towards making good the superannuation allowance provided for by the said Act, such deduction to be instead of the deduction now payable under section six of the said Act.

16. The provisions of this Act shall be carried out by the Superintenstaff of the Finance Department, under the direction and dent of insusupervision of the Superintendent of Insurance.

Annual report

17. The said superintendent shall, within three months after the thirtieth day of June in each year, prepare for the Minister a statement showing the amount received for premiums during the twelve months ending on the said thirtieth day of June for all insurance contracts entered into previous to the said date, and the amount of all sums paid in connection there with during the said period, the number of new contracts entered into since the previous statement and the gross amount thereof, with such further details and particulars as are deemed advisable.

To be laid ment.

2. The Minister shall lay the said statement before before Parlia- Parliament within thirty days after the commencement of the session thereof next after the date of the said statement.

CHAP. 17.

An Act to provide for the abolition of the Civil Service Superannuation Act and for the retirement of members of the Civil Service.

[Assented to 13th June, 1898.]

HER Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

- 1. This Act may be cited as The Civil Service Retirement Short title. Act, 1898.
- 2. This Act shall apply, instead of The Civil Service Super- To whom Act annuation Act.—
- (a.) to every person hereafter appointed to the Civil Service;
- (b.) to every person now in the Civil Service who before the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, with the consent of the Governor in Council, elects to accept the provisions of this Act in lieu of those of The Civil Service Superannuation Act.
- 3. The Civil Service for the purposes of this Act shall in-Who shall be clude all officers, clerks, employees and other persons men-deemed civil tioned or referred to in section 2 of The Civil Service Superannuation Act.
- 4. A fund, to be called the "retirement fund," shall be Retirement formed for the retirement of the persons to whom this Act fund applies, subject to the conditions and qualifications hereinafter contained.

Formation of fund.

5. The said fund shall be created by the reservation out of the salary of each person of five per cent of his salary; in addition to which, in the ease of any person now in the service who has been subject to any such deduction, and who, with the consent of the Governor in Council, elects to accept the provisions of this Act in lieu of those of The Civil Service Superannuation Act, there shall be transferred to his credit and form part of the said fund, a sum equal to the amount of all such deductions from his salary, and interest, compounded half-yearly, at the rate of four per cent per annum.

Separate account for each person.

6. The amount reserved, in the case of each person, together with any sum transferred to his credit as in the next preceding section mentioned, shall be entered in a separate account; and interest at the rate of four per cent per annum shall be computed on the first days of January and July in each year on all sums, whether of principal or interest, to the credit of the retirement fund, and such interest shall be credited thereto and form part thereof.

No claim while In service.

Interest.

7. No person shall, during his continuance in office, have any claim or right to any part of the retirement fund.

Payment on retirement or dismissal.

8. On the retirement or dismissal of any person, the amount to his credit in the retirement fund shall be payable to him: Provided always, that if he is, in the opinion of the Governor in Council, unfit to manage his own affairs, such amount may be dealt with for the benefit of such person, or of his wife or children or other next of kin, in such manner as the Governor in Council determines.

If person is mentally infirm.

Payment on death.

1. If a person dies while in the Civil Service, the amount to his credit in the retirement fund shall be paid to his legal representatives.

Commencement of Act. 10. This Act shall come into force on the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight.

The undersigned, constituting the Board of Civil Service Examiners of the Dominion of Canada, have the honour in conformity with the requirements of the Civil Service Act to submit their report for the year ended December 31, 1903.

GENERAL PROMOTION EXAMINATION.

The general promotion examination for the employees of the Civil Service, the Excise Branch of the Department of Inland Revenue excepted for the reasons hereinafter set forth, was this year held on Tuesday, May 12, and following day, at Halifax, St. John, Ottawa, Toronto, Winnigeg, and Vancouver, and were personally conducted at two of the 'centres,' Montreal and Ottawa, by members of the board, and

at the remaining 'centres' by the employment of sub-examiners. Candidates presented themselves from the following departments, viz.:—Customs, Post Office. Inland Revenue (inside service) Militia and Defence, Indian Affairs, Geological Survey, Agriculture, and Public Works.

The attendance at this examination, as has been noted from time to time in the annual reports of the board, is not large in consequence of the unwritten law which allows employees to be promoted from one class to another on their first examination providing the percentages obtained at that examination are sufficient to qualify them for the higher ranks. But the need for such examination appears to be ever present, and to meet this condition one of the amen lments to the Civil Service Act adopted by parliament at its last session provided that in addition to an annual May promotion examination special examinations may be held at 'such other time as is from time to time fixed by the Governor in Council.'

The attendance at the general promotion examination, and the results thereof, will be found in tabulated form in subsequent pages.

EXCISE PROMOTION EXAMINATION.

As has been explained in previous reports of the board, the general promotion examination held in the month of May is invariably adjourned for the purpose of permitting the examination to be resumed at a later period in the year to meet the case of the employees of the excise branch of the Department of Inland Revenue, who are unable to absent themselves from their duties during the month of May. Accordingly an excise promotion examination may be held annually outside the month of May, but it seldom happens that the requirements of the department render it necessary to hold an examination oftener than every other year.

This year the examination was held on July 21, and four following days at Toronto and Montreal, the board being represented by one of its members at Montreal, and at Toronto by one of its sub-examiners. The papers at this examination being of an altogether special and technical character, it is customary to have associated with the presiding examiner an officer of the Department of Inland Revenue, in order that the candidates may be afforded such assistance as is necessary to enable them to thoroughly comprehend the problems submitted to them.

The answer papers, without the names of the candidates, are submitted to experts of the Department of Inland Revenue who report the results to the board, by whom, in turn, they are communicated to the Secretary of State, with the name prefixed.

. The questions treated by the candidates at the Excise Promotion Examination are not printed in the report of the board for the reason that being necessarily very much alike each year, their publication would enable intending candidates to prepare answers in advance, or have them prepared by more competent men. This consideration has commended itself to the board, and in consequence the papers in question are not now printed in its annual reports.

The attendance at and the result of the Excise Promotion Examination will be found in a subjoined table.

SPECIAL CLASS EXCISE EXAMINATION.

The Department of Inland Revenue having reported that the requirements of the department necessitated the holding of a special class excise examination this year arrangements were made whereby the general excise promotion examination was adjourned to permit such examination being held. Accordingly a special class excise examination was held on October 21 and three following days at Halifax, St. John. Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg and Vancouver, the board being represented by one of its members at Montreal and Toronto, and by sub-examiners at the other centres.

The remarks made above with regard to the general excise promotion apply equally to the special class examination. The work of the candidates without their names is submitted to experts of the Department of Inland Revenue for appraisement, and their report is forwarded to the board by whom it is communicated to the Department of Inland Revenue with the names of the candidates inserted therein. The questions set at this examination are not included in this report for the same reason which has precluded the printing of the general excise promotion examination papers.

The attendance at this examination which it may be observed was unusually large will be found stated in later pages.

ENTRANCE EXAMINATIONS.

The undersigned have the honour to report that personally on the usual days in November last at Montreal, Ottawa and Toronto, and by sub-examiners at Charlottetown, Halifax, St. John, Quebec, Kingston, Hamilton, London, Winnipeg, Calgary, Vancouver and Victoria, the preliminary and qualifying examinations prescribed by the statute for entrance into the public service were held. Port Arthur was included in the published list of places where the entrance examinations would be held, and the necessary arrangements to that end were duly made, but at the last moment the gentleman who had been appointed to conduct the examination was unavoidably detained elsewhere, and in consequence the examination was postponed. Subsequently an Order in Council was passed fixing Wednesday, November 25, and three following days, for the examination at that 'centre' and the same was accordingly held on these dates. No examination was held at the remaining 'centres,' Sault Ste. Marie, Regina and Nelson, as no applications were received from persons desirous of taking the examinations at these places

A comparison of the attendance this year at the entrance examinations with that of previous years will show that it has not diminished to any appreciable extent. Out of a total attendance at the qualifying or higher grade examination of 404 candidates 274 were successful and 132 were unsuccessful. Of the latter number 57 succeeded in all subjects but one, leaving only 75 absolute failures. It is gratifying to be able to report that the work of a great many of the suc-

cessful candidates was of a high order of merit, and that even among those who failed a higher average of proficiency than usual was exhibited. On the whole it may be said that for the past two or three years a marked improvement in the work of candidates has been noticeable, showing that a better class of persons are now seeking employment in the public service.

The Board regrets to have to report that the papers of two of the candidates who wrote at St. John have been cancelled for copying. The evidence in these cases was so unmistakable that the board had no hesitation in cancelling the papers of the candidates concerned, not, however, until the parties had been afforded an opportunity of filing a defence which was taken advantage of by only one of the candidates whose explanation was not considered satisfactory. Both these candidates will be debarred from presenting themselves again for examination, and as both are temporarily employed in the public service this is tantamount to the loss of their position. The rule which debars a candidate found guilty of copying or allowing his paper to be copied from presenting himself again for examination was designed to check, if not wholly eradicate, this evil practice in connection with our examinations, and it is hoped with this example before them intending candidates for examination will studiously avoid compromising themselves in this way.

SUB-EXAMINERS.

The board have again pleasure in reporting that the staff of sub-examiners continue to give every satisfaction in the performance of their duties.

No candidates presenting themselves at Sault Ste. Marie, Regina and Nelson at the last examination, the services of the sub-examiners at those places were not required, and they received no emolument from their office as such.

FEES.

The fees received from the candidates at the Promotion Examination in May and deposited to the credit of the Receiver General amounted to \$74.

The fees received from the candidates at the Excise Promotion Examination in July and deposited to the credit of the Receiver General amounted to \$52.

The fees received from the candidates at the Special Class Excise Promotion Examination in October and deposited to the credit of the Receiver General amounted to \$122.

The fees received from candidates at the Entrance Examination in November and also deposited to the credit of the Receiver General amounted to \$2,304.

Candidates at the Promotion Examination numbered 37, at the Excise Examination 26, at the Special Class Excise Examination 61, and at the Entrance Examinations 788.

9. Every candidate for examination shall be required to satisfy the Requirement Board :of candidate.

1. If coming up for the Preliminary examination only and if intending Preliminary to serve in the Inside Departmental Division, that he is of the full age of examination, fifteen years and not over thirty-five; if coming up for the Qualifying age. Qualifying examination, that he is of the full age of eighteen years; and if for the examination, Inside Departmental Division, not over thirty-five years old.

Note.—The proof of age shall be by a properly certified extract from the Proof of age. birth registration, and should this not be procurable, then by such other evidence as may be satisfactory to the Board.

Sound health.

Proof of health.

Note.—The proof of health shall be by the certificate of a practising physician.

Character.

3. That his character is such as to qualify him for employment in the Civil Service.

Proof as to character.

(Note.) The proof of character shall be by the certificate of a minister of religion, mayor, or justice of the peace.

APPLICATIONS.

Application for admission to examinabe used.

10. The applications for admission to the examination shall be by means of forms which will be supplied to the candidate by the Board, and said tion, forms to forms correctly filled up shall be re-addressed to the secretary, at least one month before the day appointed for commencing the examination.

Fees to be paid.

Admission to next ensuing

examination.

11. A fee of two dollars in the case of the Preliminary Examination and of four dollars in the case of the Qualifying Examination, shall be paid by each candidate, and shall be collected on the first day of the examination as the Roll is being called. In the case of candidates coming up for examination in one subject the fee shall be two dollars, and a fee of one dollar shall be payable for the privilege of taking optional subjects. Should insuperable difficulties preclude the attendance of a candidate at the examination for admission to which he has sent the regular application and certificates such candidate, on communicating the facts to the secretary, may be admitted at the next ensuing examination, by simply sending an application without new certificates.

EXAMINATIONS.

12. The examinations shall be open to all persons who shall have complied with the requirements of the Civil Service Act, as to proof of age, health and character, and in doing their examination work, the candidates language may shall be at liberty to use either the English or the French language.

33. The Board of Examiners shall prepare and cause to be printed (confidentially) the questions to be used at the Preliminary, Qualifying (including Options) and Promotion examinations, excepting always the Promotion papers on 'Duties,' which papers the Departments interested will supply.

How examination shall be commenced.

34. The examiner will begin by calling the roll and marking, opposite to the names of the candidates in attendance, the word 'present,' and to these he will communicate the number by which they are to be severally identified throughout the examination.

Place and time of examinations.

63. The ninth section of 'The Civil Service Act' is added hereto for convenience of reference and is as follows:-

'The Board may obtain the assistance of persons who have had experience in the education of the youth of Canada, and with such assistance shall hold or cause to be held, periodical examinations for admission to the Civil Service, in the cities of Halifax, St. John, N.B., Charlottetown, Quebec, Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto, Hamilton, London, Winnipeg, Victoria and such other places as are determined by the Governor in Council; it shall not be necessary to hold such examinations in all the said places, but the places at which the examinations shall be held, shall be determined from time to time by the Governor in Council; examinations shall, as far as possible, be in writing, and the cost thereof shall be defrayed out of moneys previously voted by Parliament for that purpose.'

The impression that they alone are successful, who amass great wealth or achieve marked distinction, is an error of education which must be corrected before we can cheerfully and hopefully accept and discharge the duties and responsibilities, often irksome and unpromising, that environ us here. This is a trite injunction, and has lost much of its force by iteration; yet, like the familiar virtues, which constitute the character of a good man, its observance lies at the foundation of and constitutes every really successful career. A successful man is he who is affluent in friendship, in goodness rather than greatness. Victor Hugo, in closing the volume devoted to the reminiscences of his full and varied life, says that he has grasped the hands of the most men, and that before Heaven there is nothing worth kneeling to but goodness.

Some still existing superstitions among Scotch fishermen are as follows:—At the beginning of the herring season the crew all try to seize the herring first on board to see if it be a male or female. If it is a male their fishing may be expected to be a poor one; if a female, a good one. Sometimes, however, the skipper secures it and hides it away, salting it and laying it aside for the season. 125-MILE SPEED ON ELECTRIC CAR.

100

Berlin, October 8.—One hundred and twenty-five miles an hour—the fastest railway speed in history—was achieved on the experimental electric track between Berlin and Zossen this forenoon. Neither the huge car nor the track was damaged in any way. The 'Daily News' correspondent watched the course of the car from the station of Dahlwitz, eighteen miles from Berlin, where it attained its greatest burst of velocity.

Enveloped in a cyclone of white dust the car lunged past with a roar like Niagara, producing an indescribable sensation of power and speed. The eye could hardly catch the outline of the car before the rear end vanished in the distance.

German engineers have now realized their ambition of driving a railway car 200 kilometers (125 miles) an hour. The experiments will immediately be turned to advantage in connection with the proposed 150 kilometer (ninety-four mile) an hour service between Berlin and Hamburg. The engineers declare they will try for even higher speeds and hope to reach 140 miles an hour.

By transformation, the current, which was between 13,000 and 14,000 volts, was reduced to about 450 volts. The car used to-day had four motors, having altogether 1,100 horsepower. The car is constructed on the Siemens-Halske principle. Another kind of car will be used in the additional high-speed tests. The lives of all on board the experimental care were heavily insured.

Julien was a great creature, if not a great musician. It was a sight to . see him at the promenade concerts, curled and white-waist-coated, leading his band, and dropping exhausted into his arm-hair at the end of his British Army Quadrilles, or some similar piece. Nothing put Julien out more than a crying child, and I have known him to stop the band and sit down till the indignant mother had been ejected. Costa was an ideal conductor as regards his command of his orchestra and chorus, but his tendency to overwhelm everything with brass was painful to the audience and fatal to the singer. Probably the fact that at the opera he had his seat between the orchestra and the stage, instead of behind the orchestra, as at present, had something to do with his overwhelming instrumentation. Some still existing superstitions among Scotch fishermen are as follows:— At the beginning of the herring season the crew all try to seize the herring first on board to see if it be a male or female. If it is a male, their fishing may be expected to be a poor one; if a female, a gool one. Sometimes, however, the skipper secures it and h des it away, salting it and laying it aside

for the season. The boat must not be turned against the sun.

Certain animals considered of ill omen must not be spoken of in the boat, and ministers in this respect occupy the same place as rabbits, have and pigs. Fishermen do not like to lend anything to a neighboring boat lest their luck should go with it. If they lend a match they will contrive—secretly if possiele—to break it and keep part, hoping thereby to retain their luck. Their dislike to have anything stolen is increased by the fear that the thief may have stolen their luck with it. To ask the question 'Where are you going?' of any one, who is going on board, is equivalent to destroying all his chances for that time. Persons with certain names are held to be of bad omen, the dreaded names being different in different villages.

125-MILE SPEED ON ELECTRIC CAR.

100

Berlin, October 8.—One hundred and twenty-five miles an hour—the fastest railway speed in history—was achieved on the experimental electric track between Berlin and Zossen this forenoon. Neither the huge car nor the track was damaged in any way. The 'Daily News' correspondent watched the course of the car from the station Dahlwiz, eighteen miles from Berlin, where it attained its greatest burst of velocity.

Enveloped in a cyclone of white dust the car lunged past with a roar like Niagara, producing an indescribable sensation of power and speed. The eye could hardly catch the outline of the car before the rear end vanished in the

distance.

German engineers have now realized their ambition of driving a railway car 200 kilometers (125 miles) an hour. The experiments will immediately be turned to advantage in connection with the proposed 150 kilometer (ninety-four miles) an hour service between Berlin and Hamburg. The engineers declare they will try for even higher speed and hope to reach 140 miles an hour.

By transformation the current, which was between 13,000 and 14,000 volts, was reduced to about 450 volts. The car used to-day had four motors, having altogether 1,100 horsepower. The car is constructed on the Siemens-Halske principle. Another kind of car will be used in the additional high-speed tests. The lives of all on board the experimental car were heavily insured.

STORIES OF MUSICAL CONDUCTORS.

Julien was a great creature, if not a great musician. It was a sight to see him at the promenade concerts, curled and white-waist-coated, leading his band, and dropping exhausted into his armchair at the end of his British Army Quadrilles, or some similar piece. Nothing put Julien out more than a crying child, and I have known him to stop the band and sit down till the indignant mother had been ejected. Costa was an ideal conductor as regards his command of his orchestra and chorus, but his tendency to overwhelm everything with brass was painful to the audience and fatal to the singer. Probably the fact that at the opera he had his seat between the orchestra and the stage, instead of behind the orchestra, as at present, had something to do with his overwhelming instrumentation. I once heard Costa and his orchestra completely out-shouted by an indignant audience at one of the opera concerts at old Convent Garden, Mario was announced and did not appear, and the audience refused to hear any one else, so Costa thought to drown the malcontents with the overture from William Tell; but he found out his mistake, after a scene closely resembling that at Ephesus in the days of Paul, and wisely gave in.

In the recently published Life of Sir George Grove mention is made of Costa's indebtedness to Sainton for drilling his band, and the same may be said of Julien's debt to Mellon, who also conducted the ballet music at the opera. Costa, at a rehearsal of the Handel festival choir at the Crystal Palace, once called out, 'He is singing flat, that man in the blue tie,' and on being congratulated afterward upon his acumen said naively, 'I heard some one singing flat, and I saw a man in a blue tie,' and shrugged his

shoulders.







SIR,—I have the honour to present herewith the annual report of the operations of this department. The details are grouped under their proper heads in the reports of the several branches under the Accountant, the Superintendent of Printing, and the Superintendent of Stationery, respectively.

On October 24, 1903, Parliament rose after a session of seven months and a half—by far the longest session since the confederation of the provinces. On March 12, 1904, it assembled after a recess of only four months and a half, an unprecedentedly short time in which to overtake the work left, under order, and to get ready the necessary reports and documents required for the coming session. The amount of printing was therefore double, while the time of recess was much shorter than in former years. It is hardly necessary to say that there was no suspension of working hands. All were busy, and much overtime work has been necessary. The Commons Hansard made six volumes and the Senate Debates made two; in each language—sixteen volumes in all. The other sessional volumes of Votes and Journals were correspondingly increased in size.

The task was further complicated by the uncertainty as to whether a session or a general election would have to be met. This made it imperative to provide for both eventualities to such an extent as not to be seriously embarrassed by either. The staff was divided—a part was put to set voters' lists and a part to get ready the reports most essential for the discussion of the estimates. Some of the voters' lists will run out of date and will have to be done over again; but others will be in force for some time yet. The reports necessary for discussion of the estimates in Parliament have, however, at the date of present writing, been got ready as follows:—

The reports of the Departments of Railways and Canals, Justice, Mounted Police, Insurance, Fisheries, and Adulteration of Food, will be ready in the first week of April.

With the limited accommodation at the Printing Bureau the struggle to get out the work has been very great. While the Blue Books necessary for Parliament were got out, as above shown, other important publications had to be put aside for a time. The adoption of Linotype machines alone rendered it possible to get ready so many of the reports. They could not have been produced by hand composition, for there would not have been room enough within the walls to stow the necessary number of compositors. The new web press contributed to the result by disposing of the longer numbers, and leaving the flat-bed presses open for other work to go on simultaneously.

BINDERY.

I beg respectfully to direct attention again to the utter inadequacy of the space available for handling the mass of sheets turned out of the press room. This has been pointed out in the successive annual reports of the department since the year 1890, and every increase in the output of the composing and press rooms only brings the inadequacy of the bindery into stronger relief. The space in the sheet bindery is sufficient only for the daily work of Parliament—such as the Minutes, the Orders, the Bills, and the three editions of the Commons Hansard and of Senate Debates. When, however, the departmental reports are thrown into it delay must arise, because of the sheer physical impossibility of draining a large reservoir through an outflow of small calibre, and the greater the capacity of the reservoir the more the disproportion is evident. The Audit Report is in the House in sufficient numbers, but the remainder of the edition of 5,300 copies for general distribution over the Dominion are, at the present moment, in the bindery, clogging the flow of other work by occupying the whole table room with its multitudinous sheets. The King's Printer who was in office in 1889 reported then that the bindery was too small, and, in 1892, the corridors and passageways were so encumbered with sheets that an outside firm with an improvised staff of sixty hands worked for months before the accumulation could be cleared away. If that was the case thirteen years ago, how much more acute must be the difficulty now, when the requirements of the Government are so much greater?

The publications of Government continue to grow in number and size. The tables of trade and navigation are not smaller, though there is now an additional monthly issue of 360 pages, equivalent to an annual volume of 4,320 pages. The tables of trade and commerce are a comparatively recent addition to the reports, and make a volume of 1,000 pages; but there is also a monthly report of about 150 pages, equivalent to an annual volume of 1,800 pages. This year a weekly issue has been commenced, which will doubtless grow in volume. In the twelve years since 1891 the Patent Record has grown from a thin annual volume of 660 pages to two portly quarto volumes amounting to 2,400 pages. The Labour Gazette is a monthly magazine published in English and French, and makes an annual volume of 1,042 pages in each language. Bulletins increase in frequency from the departments, often in long numbers, and each with an urgency claimed to surpass that of anything else which could possibly be already in hand. All these must pass through the sheet bindery, shown to be inadequate twelve

years ago. It will be seen in the report for 1901 that the necessity of enlargement was generally admitted in a debate in the House upon the adoption of a report from the Joint Committee on Printing. To meet the requirements of the Government of a country in active growth and extension there should be some power of elasticity in the practical machinery of administration to correspond.

As has been pointed out, the introduction of typesetting machines has alone rendered possible the increased output of composition, and hand composition is being more and more limited to tabular matter. Machines were introduced in the Dominion of Canada first at the Printing Bureau, and their successful working there demonstrated the supreme importance of the invention. It was at first supposed that they could be used only for the narrow columns of newspapers; but the Bureau, in February, 1892, issued the first book set on a Linotype machine in Canada, and, in fact, outside of the office of the New York *Tribune* machines were not at that date in use in the United States. The invention came at a fortunate time, not only for the public service but for the benefit of the work-people themselves, though that was not recognized at once. All over the world machines are now in use, and the quantity of composition done is far greater than ever before. The voluminous Saturday and Sunday issues of the daily press are striking indications of the changed conditions in the trade.

Typesetting machines exercise a beneficial influence over the whole class of compositors, for they imperatively demand a high standard of intelligence and conduct. A machine is equivalent, in output, to five men. If a hand compositor is unsteady and loses time the output of one man is, to that extent, lost; but an unsteady man on a machine kills five men's work, and must be got rid of. The clatter of the machines is not conducive to conversation, and to work them at all demands the silent attention of the operators. The last doubter has now been convinced that typesetting machines have come to stay, and that nearly all plain solid setting will be done by their aid.

It has also been recognized in printing offices everywhere that a compositor can no longer act as a copyist or editor for rough drafts. The reduction of draft into copy, if declined by the author, will have to be done by the typewriter. Any sort of copy loosely thrown together to be vamped up into shape on the margins of successive proofs and revises, will not suit the Linotype machine. It is far less costly and much quicker for a writer to correct his draft by the aid of a typewriter than to elaborate his ideas by the printer's assistance. To operate a typesetting machine demands the undivided attention of the operator, and he has no time to do anything but follow his copy—he cannot edit it.

VOTERS' LISTS.

The recurrence of the correction of the electoral lists emphasizes the necessity of providing in the Printing Bureau for extraordinary emergencies and efforts. When the building was opened in 1888 there was a voters' list room capable of holding forty men. The standing galleys were at hand in locked closets in the centre of the same room. A revision went on outside of the regular work, and when it was over the men were dismissed. In recent years the room had to be taken for current work, and to make space for additional workmen, the standing lists had to be relegated to the cellar under the opposite wing of the building. Much time is now lost getting them out and return-

ing them by gas light, hoisting them to the third story, and wheeling them on trucks twice the length of the building.

As stated before, the process of reprinting the voters' lists had been commenced, and a certain amount of work had been done, when the summoning of a session required all hands to be put upon the preparation of the sessional reports. The precise position of the work on the lists is as follows, province by province:—

Nova Scotia.

All the lists for 1903 were set and sent out. This work will need to be done again, as the new lists for 1904 are about due. They should be ready in March or April, though none are in yet.

New Brunswick.

Some of the lists for 1903 were set, but they are superseded by the lists for 1904, many of which have come in.

Prince Edward Island.

No lists are made for this province,

Quebec.

The lists for this province used to be revised in the spring, about April, and the copy was in and many were set. The Quebec legislature at its last session changed the date to September, and ordered new lists to be made. The following are done and sent out:—

The lists for this province are difficult to conclude in one statement, for they come in dispersedly during six or seven months. A few scattered ones reached the Bureau in August, and they came in with increasing frequency in September, October and November, continuing into December and January. A statement marked ' Λ ' is appended, showing the dates on the certificates of final revision. The dates they reached the Bureau were much later, but the dates of the certificates show how wide

is the period over which the revision extends. On that account the lists used in an election may be of two different years, and no one can be sure which will be used until the writs are issued. The statement marked 'A' shows the position of the matter on February 1, 1904.

The latest extant lists of this province have been printed and sent out. The discrepancies between the local and Dominion divisions were so numerous that nothing but familiar local knowledge could separate the overlapping names. They were printed according to the provincial divisions as on the last occasion. The dates upon them are June, 1903.

British Columbia.

The correction of these lists is incomplete. Under provincial law new lists will be made up on May 10.

In view of recent losses by fire in other places, I would again observe that the Printing Bureau is fireproof as to the first three stories only, and that the attie is not fireproof, but the roof is supported in the usual way by rafters and the flat is floored with the usual boarding. Two elevators and a glass skylight over the main hall lead into the attic. The elevator shafts are not closed by iron doors at each floor, nor are the flats isolated by rising and falling hatches. Very large quantities of sheets and books are stored on this floor, and I beg to recommend that it be made to correspond with the rest of the building. This could readily be done by raising the walls and putting on a flat roof. The present roof is leaky and needs repairs. A flat roof would be better in every way, and would remove the weak spot which endangers the whole building.

ADVERTISING.

The total amount certified by this department for government advertising during the year ending June 30, 1903, was \$41,078.02, the details of which are set forth in statement F. These accounts being paid by the several departments for which the advertising is done, the amount is not included in the statement of receipts and expenditure of this department.

The number of advertising accounts audited was 3,450; circulars issued, 3,146. There was, moreover, a considerable amount of correspondence in connection therewith.

REPORT OF THE JOINT LIBRARIANS OF PARLIAMENT

The Joint Librarians of Parliament have the honour to report as follows for the year 1903-4:—

The recess having been so short, there is little to say as to the affairs of the Library since the last report was presented.

Personal relations having been established with the officials of the various organizations in England concerned in the political and fiscal discussion, the Library is possessed of a complete collection of the pamphlets and books produced on these questions during the last six months.

The relations established, after long correspondence, with the various outlying colonies continue in a satisfactory manner; and the exchanges of the Library are now very large.

The Library is indebted to the Honourable Clifford Sifton, the Minister of the Interior, and to Joseph Pope, C.M.G., for documents covering the whole of the Alaska Boundary Award. The Imperial papers and map on this subject, so far as published, have been provided by the Librarians. The American official papers will also be provided when they are printed.

In view of the interest taken in railway matters, the reports of the various railway companies in the United States were applied for, and a large number have been received.

The various annals relating to statistics and business have been received, so far as issued.

Mr. Flint, the Clerk of the House of Commons, has kindly donated to the Library a collection of Statutes and Blue-books from his office.

The Librarians desire to acknowledge the constant kindness and helpfulness of Hon. L. P. Brodeur, late Speaker of the House of Commons, and of Hon. L. G. Power, LL.D., the Speaker of the Senate, during the Parliamentary term.

The Librarians beg to again invite the attention of the Government and of both Houses of Parliament to the necessity which has arisen of providing additional space for the growing wants of the Library. As can be seen by all sorts of shelving placed on the floor of the Library and at every possible space, efforts are constantly being made to find new temporary accommodation for the books. This has been carried on for several years past, but the time is coming near when no new device will be available. As it would take several years to provide an annex to the Library, the question of building it is one to be considered as soon as Parliament will find it convenient. The congested state of all the shelves in every section is a source of trouble and delay whenever a book is required to be found at a short notice, and the evil is growing worse every day.

During recess continued efforts have been made to bring up to date the Law and Political Economy sections to meet the requirements of the legislature.

The work of the different catalogues has been pushed forward to completion for all the additions. Several parts of the Canadian and American Catalogue have been remodelled and copied, with a view of preparing the printing of the same in the near future. For the information of the members of Parliament, it may be stated here that the General Catalogue of the Library has never been reprinted since 1858, and that the Law and Political Economy Catalogue has been reprinted in 1880. It would be a great

advantage to the public at large to publish the Canadian Section of the Catalogue, as demands for the same are frequently made to the Librarians. In anticipation of this emergency, the Canadian Catalogue has been prepared and is almost ready to be placed in the hands of the printer.

The Canadian and American sections have received several important editions. The price of the works out of print on America and Canada is constantly on the increase on account of the keen competition among the American Librarians for scarce books. Among the additions to the above section may be mentioned:



SIR,—We have the honour to submit herewith reports and statistics in connection with the penitentiaries and the territorial jails of Canada for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1903.

The tabulated statistics include only the penitentiaries under the control of this branch of the service. The reports and statistics connected with the penitentiaries under police control in the Yukon Territory, and also of the territorial jails, will be found in Appendices 'M,' 'N' and 'O', respectively.

The number received from jails shows an increase of sixteen per cent over the record of the previous year. Manitoba Penitentiary shows an increase of 123 per cent as compared with the number received during the previous year.

The number liberated on parole constitute nine per cent of the average population; pardons 2.8 per cent and deaths 1.3 per cent. No escape occurred during the year.

The health of the convicts has been very satisfactory. It is, perhaps, best illustrated by the per capita cost of the prison dispensaries, if it be taken for granted that the surgeons and hospital overseers are equally careful to avoid waste and recklessness in the use of medicines. The relative cost of the dispensaries is as follows:—

In view of the unsatisfactory hospital accommodation at Dorchester, and the additional hospital charges at Kingston, caused by the insane ward, the comparative result is especially creditable to the hospital management at those institutions.

It is a subject of deep regret that one-eighth of the total number are mere youths who have already reached the grade of criminality that involves penitentiary treatment. The continuous contact with professional criminals obliterates any self respect or sense of shame that they may possess and in a few years they are discharged—bereft of reputation or ambition—to swell the ranks of the class who regard society as their enemy and therefore their rightful prey. The environments and influences of a penal institution are not enobling, and lads who are yet in the formative period of their habits and character should not be subjected to the contaminating influence if other treatment be possible.

The probation system—which is merely suspended sentence combined with official surveillance—seems specially applicable to the cases of embryo criminals. In several of the adjacent states this system has been made legally applicable to certain classes of offenders, and so far as we can ascertain the results have been in every way satisfactory. Public sentiment seems to favour an extension of the system to all classes of offenders. The selection of suitable persons as probation officers is essential to the success of the system.

Sentences of 7 years and more constitute 30 per cent of the total. Life sentences represent nearly 4 per cent.

It is difficult to ascertain the previous prison experience of the inmates, owing to their persistent efforts to suppress the facts. So far as is known to the officials, however, the number who have served a previous term or terms in Canadian penitentiaries number 266, in foreign prisons 12, in provincial reformatories 36, in provincial and county jails 339. One convict admits 25 previous convictions. If others were equally frank he would not feel lonely. Such cases illustrate the folly of attempting to make the punishment fit the crime. Public safety would be better conserved by an intelligent endeavour to make the punishment fit the criminal, as evidenced by his history and general character. If the principle of fixed terms of sentence produces such results, it would seem necessary to consider whether the antiquity of the practice is sufficient reason to warrant its retention as a basic principle of our penal code.

The expenditure includes \$4,800 for additional land purchased in pursuance of a special vote of parliament for that purpose. The average daily population was greatly reduced by reason of the fact that the prison was, for several months, quarantined on account of an epidemic of diphtheria. The disease was orought in by a prisoner who had contracted it before his arrival. There were nine cases within the prison, none of which proved fatal.

The expenditure includes \$500 for additional land and \$1,200 in connection with the installation of a water service, both of which are valuable assets.

MATERIAL CONDITION.

Kingston.—The reconstructed west wing is now completed. It contains 152 large, well lighted and thoroughly ventilated cells, each furnished with water closet, wash basin, electric light, bed and table. The cell barriers are made of soft core steel, three-quarters of an inch in diameter. They are four feet wide, the full height of the cells and secured by locking bars which are operated from the end of each range. Wheels are placed outside the corridor barriers, by operating which any cell can be unlocked while the others remain securely fastened; or all can be unlocked at once. The wheel itself can be locked to prevent anyone working it without authority. Similar locking bars are in use in the south wing. The barriers and locking bars were made in the prison workshops.

The east wing is being reconstructed. It was built about seventy years ago, contained 280 cells, and occupied less space than is set apart for the new east wing which will contain only 152 cells. The cells were constructed in accordance with the ideas regarding prison construction then prevailing. They were little more than two feet wide, less than eight feet long and about seven feet high. The narrow bed, when down, occupied the whole cell, except a foot or two at the door, where the convict stood while he unhooked his bed from its fastenings in the wall. They were dark and unventilated except through the wide flat bars of the door at one end and a grated aperture at the other. Often the inmates suffered severely from the draughts which were unavoidable accompaniments of so primitive a means of ventilation. In accordance with your directions these relics of a past age are being taken down and, in their place, a cell block will be erected containing 152 cells similar in size and equipment to those in the west wing.

Originally all the cells at this penitentiary were similar to those in the east wing. In 1895 the work of reconstruction in the south wing was begun. It was completed in 1898, and the following year the reconstruction of the west wing was commenced. It was completed last year. When the east wing is rebuilt all of the cells at the Kingston penitentiary will compare favourably with those of the best modern penal institutions elsewhere. The work is all done by convicts, under the supervision of the trade instructors. Very few of the convicts when received are skilled workmen. Few have learned any trade. They are at best unskilled labourers. The trade instructors train them until they become—many of them—very fair workmen. While they are being trained it is not to be expected that they can do as much in a given time as skilled workmen can accomplish. That so much has been accomplished with unskilled labour reflects credit on the officers in charge.

The industrial buildings, the dome and the cell wings are all heated by exhaust steam. During the coldest weather the buildings are comfortably heated. The hope of the engineer expressed last year that, by the installation of underfeed stokers and the use of exhaust steam for heating purposes, he could reduce the consumption of coal about thirty per cent has been realized.

Two and three-quarter acres of land containing a quarry of excellent stone, sufficient to supply building material for prison requirements for many years, has been acquired.

A shed for the storage of coal is required. It was hoped that it could be built during the year, but it has been decided to delay its erection until the reconstruction of the east wing is further advanced.

The various buildings and the enclosing walls, connected with this institution, are maintained in a state of thorough repair.

St. Vincent de Paul.—Important works have been carried on during the past year. The heating system has been rearranged. Exhaust steam is now used instead of live steam for heating the dome, cell wings, chapel and industrial buildings. The change has effected a large saving in fuel, and has enabled the engineer to heat the buildings in the coldest weather. The work involved was considerable. A duct across the yard from the power house to the cell wings, to contain the steam pipe, was sunk through rock to a depth of ten feet and lined with cut stone. The steam

mains throughout the prison were taken out and replaced by mains of larger size. The steam engines in the several shops were removed and electric motors installed.

Not the least important of the works undertaken during recent years was begun last spring. It is the installation of new waterworks. The old waterworks were installed a quarter of a century ago. Their capacity, 200 gallons per minute, was not sufficient to ensure adequate fire protection, and the mains were about worn out. Larger mains are being laid and pumps having 500 gallons per minute capacity will be installed. They will be driven by a direct connected motor, the power for which will be supplied by the electric light dynamos. A pump house is under construction. It is being built of large blocks of rock faced ashlar and will be a very solid structure. In addition to the electric pumps one of the old steam pumps, and one boiler, will be installed as an emergency substitute. In case of an accident to the electric motor the steam pump will keep the prison supplied, temporarily.

A building constructed of rock-faced ashlar was erected to accommodate the stone-cutters. It is a roomy building with space enough for seventy-five workmen.

Plans are being prepared for a building for the engineer, blacksmiths and tinsmiths, to take the place of the antiquated structure now occupied by them. Work will be begun when the installation of the new waterworks shall have been completed.

With the exception of the old stonecutters shed, and the workshops occupied by the engineer, blacksmiths and tinsmiths, which are being replaced, the buildings at this institution are maintained in a state of good repair.

The work performed during the year required labour of considerable skill, yet it was all done by convicts under the direction of the officers in charge.

Dorchester—This penitentiary was opened in 1880. It was then very far from being complete. The cell accommodation was barely sufficient for the convicts transferred to it from the old provincial prisons. The hospital, industrial buildings, store houses and stables were cheap wooden structures intended for temporary use. The prison yard was enclosed by a wooden stockade. The farm buildings were those found on the property when it was acquired for prison purposes, primitive structures, scattered about the place without order or regard for supervision or convenience. The water supply was drawn from a wooden reservoir into which a small stream trickled from a neighbouring spring. Not infrequently the reservoir was found to be empty when water was most needed. It was the intention when the prison was opened to utilize convict labour in the erection of new cells, permanent industrial buildings, the yard wall, hospital, farm and other necessary buildings. Until recently little progress was made in this direction. A cell wing containing 196 cells was opened in 1886, and a commodious boiler house built. Until four years ago these were the only permanent buildings erected.

The original stockade lasted nine years. Instead of building a wall of stone, cement or brick, another stockade was erected in 1889. It is now much impaired. Recently it was banked to a height of three feet, and further secured by cross ties and props. With care it may last a few years longer, but permanent walls should be crected at an early date.

Four years ago work was resumed on the permanent buildings and has been continued to the present time. The following structures have been erected:—

1. A large reservoir of cut stone and brick.

- 2. The first section of the permanent industrial buildings—a stone shed for the accommodation of convicts engaged in cutting stone for prison buildings.
- 3. A large barn with stable accommodation for one hundred and fifty head of cattle.
 - 4. A large piggery with convenient slaughter house attached.

Rock-faced ashlar was used in the walls of all these buildings. It was quarried on the reserve, cut and dressed by convict labour. Most of the lumber used was cut in the prison mill from logs taken from the reserve.

Stone for the second section of the industrial building is being quarried and will be dressed during the winter.

The kitchen has been remodelled and equipped with steam cooking utensils. An oven for baking bread was built in the new kitchen. The steward who was formerly baker instructor now oversees the baking of bread in addition to his other duties. The services of a baker instructor are thereby dispensed with.

The preparation of materials for, and the erection of the buildings required at this institution will keep the convicts busily employed for many years.

The buildings are carefully looked after and kept in good order.

Manitoba—The filter beds for the treatment of sewage were completed last fall and are working well. The disposal of prison sewage is now satisfactory to the most exacting.

The steam heating plant was thoroughly overhauled and put in good working condition. The result is in every way satisfactory. The buildings are comfortably heated, and the consumption of coal somewhat reduced.

A brick making plant will be installed at once. Large quantities of brick will be required every year for some time to come. They will be made by convict labour.

An extension of the cell wing and an industrial building are urgently required. With brick made by prison labour the cost of these buildings will be greatly reduced.

The farm produced last year, over ten thousand bushels of oats and barley on one hundred and eighty acres of land.

British Columbia.—Considerable progress has been made with the erection of the addition to the cell wing. The foundations have been laid and the basement walls built. The work will be pushed forward as expeditiously as possible. It was found that cement blocks would cost much less than stone for the cell fronts. A machine was installed and several convicts instructed regarding its operation. They soon became expert in the work and able to turn out excellent blocks at a cost of less than one-fourth the price of stone. All the brick used is made by prison labour, and next winter it is proposed to employ convict labour to cut the wood that will be required for burning brick the following year. It will be cut on the island, in Pitt Lake, recently acquired for penitentiary purposes.

No outside labour is employed. All the work is done by convicts, and considering how little they know of any trade when admitted to the prison, it says much for the patience and energy of the trade instructors that so much is accomplished.

The buildings are all in good repair.

Regina Jail.—The farm has been enlarged by the purchase of 160 acres of excellent land adjoining the reserve on the east. Owing to the outbreak of diphtheria the jail was quarantined for several months. Outside work was in consequence much curtailed, expecially spring work on the farm. About fifty acres were put under crop. It is hoped that next year a much larger area will be cultivated.

The erection of a small wooden building for an hospital has been begun and will soon be completed. Should contageous disease again break out the hospital will be invaluable.

Work on the new cells was impossible while the prison was under quarantine. They will be completed next fall.

The heating system has been changed from steam to hot water. The consumption of fuel will be less, the services of a night fireman are no longer required, and the danger attending the use of a high pressure boiler for heating purposes has been removed.

Prince Albert Jail.—Satisfactory progress has been made with the laying of the water pipes to connect the reservoir at the jail with the aermotor pump at the river bank. Eleven hundred feet of pipe was laid. Twenty-two hundred feet more have yet to be laid to complete connection. The work is very heavy owing to the nature of the ground and the depth necessary to escape frost, namely nine feet. The soil, a few feet below the surface, is a mass of boulders, some so large as to necessitate tunnelling. Surface water also gives much trouble.

The reservoir is finished and a building designed for a workshop and toolhouse erected over it. A quantity of stone and sand was hauled for the basement walls of the jailer's kitchen which will be built as soon as more urgent works are completed.

The cell accommodation at the jail consists of twenty cells—five for female prisoners, and fifteen for males. These have met the requirements of the district up to the present time, but with the very large influx of population increased cell accommodation may soon become necessary.

The buildings, fencing and other property are kept in excellent repair.

APPENDIX A

WARDENS' REPORTS



Kingston, August 1, 1903.

The Inspectors of Penitentiaries, Ottawa.

Sirs,—I have the honour to present my fifth annual report (with appendices) and to transmit statistical tables and returns from the various departments of the Kingston

penitentiary for the year 1902-3.

The original appropriation granted was \$187,500. To this was added by supplementary vote of parliament for special gratuity to retired officers, \$5,514.49, making a total of \$193,014.49. Of this amount there was expended a total of \$189,987.01, leaving a balance of \$3,027.48 unexpended.

Briefly stated, the expenditure under the various heads was as follows:-

The item under industries is larger by some \$19,000 than the amount estimated for. This arose from the exceptionally high price of binder twine material and the use of manila hemp exclusively nearly the whole year. Taking all other departments together the expenditure is less than the appropriation by over \$21,887.

Regarding the expenditure of \$74,078.70 for the official staff, I beg to point out that, of this amount, over \$5,500 went to pay retiring allowances voted by parliament and \$1,500, at least, to pay salaries of officers engaged in general departmental work

and not, strictly speaking, officers of this penitentiary.

A reference to the per capita cost for the year covered by this report and that of the year preceding will, I think, strongly justify my contention that the method of calculating it renders the result valueless, for the purpose of comparison between institutions or between one year and another. The fiscal year 1901–2 was for this penitentiary, a far more successful period than the year just closed. Our per capita revenue for the former year was \$136.73, and for the latter \$67.92, nearly double in 1901-2 what it was in 1902-3. Yet the net per capita cost for the former period was \$307.97 as against \$243.42 for the year just closed. The truth is that whenever we invest largely in lands or buildings, or machinery, or improvements of any kind, although the results of these investments may stand as a valuable asset of the institution, we get no credit for their value in the make up of the accounts, and no matter how industrious we may have been or how successfully we may have managed commercially, the showing of net per capita cost is bound to advertise us to the world as spendthrifts, while some other institution which didn't invest a dollar in purchase of land or machinery or for permanent improvements of any kind, may, without showing a per capita revenue of 50 cents, show a per capita cost far below ours and secure praise for economy, in parliament and out of

it. As was said in last year's report, if the officers in any particular prison wish to make a good showing and catch the public eye, let them eat, drink and be merry, and do absolutely nothing in the way of substantial improvements.

The Farm.—Despite the early drought and notwithstanding the discouraging outlook for farmers up to the middle of May, the year has been a fairly successful one so far as the operations of the farm department are concerned. The usual number of convicts have been quite constantly and profitably employed in the fields, and the financial statement shows a balance on the right side. As with all departments the farm balance sheet for any single year is misleading. It may happen that large expenditures are made and charged against that particular year, whereas the improvements or machinery purchased may remain for several succeeding years as valuable assets and relieve the necessity for expenditure during those years. Again it may happen that a large number of machines, implements or horses are worn out and condemned and the cost value written off the stock sheets, and at the same time large expenditures be made in order to replace the animals or articles so condemned. Thus the balance sheet for that particular year will be adversely affected by the loss of stock on hand and the cost of whatever is purchased to replace it. In the statement presented with this report, the amount of stock on hand is unusually large and favourably affects the balance. Much of this stock will be condemned and written off before our next report, and the balance may thus be turned to the wrong side through mere chance, although the farming operations may be fairly successful.

The fattening of cattle as an additional farm industry is contemplated and an additional report on the subject will be laid before you. We have a large quantity of clover hay every year, and much of our farm land is adapted to the growth of roots. It is considered more profitable to feed roots to cattle than to pigs, and we all know that clover is comparatively valueless as food for horses. In these days successful farming demands a variety of methods, and there is no reason why our management should be handicapped by theories and regulations which prevent the full exercise of skill and judgment. Our barns are filled with hay, and we must feed it or sell it, or

build new barns.

The Quarry.—In my last report I was obliged to tell you that our quarries were exhausted of beds that could be profitably worked. I am glad to report that, during the year, we have been successful in securing, for a reasonable sum, in fairly close proximity to the prison, a first class quarry which, it is thought, will meet our require-

ments for many years.

The stonecutting department, the blacksmith's department, and the carpenters, have all been busily engaged in completing the new west wing and preparing material for the new east wing. Shortly after the beginning of the calendar year, the west wing was ready for occupation, and we had the pleasure of transferring thereto all the convicts from the cells of the old unsanitary and condemned eastern block. Some time in February we commenced the removal of the old cell block, and at the close of the year considerable progress was made. I consider it very desirable that the work of reconstruction be pushed forward with all possible speed.

Heat, Light and Water.—The three boilers in boiler house No. 1 have been supplied with automatic underfeed stokers which, for a time promised to be and to do all that was claimed for them. After a few months experience, however, it was found that we had difficulty in producing sufficient steam with the three boilers in operation; and the smoke nuisance was only partly abated. An examination of the boilers showed that the whole three were damaged and that repairs were imperative. This necessitated the removal of the brick work forming the fire space, and upon recommendation of the boiler inspectors, we enlarged the fire chamber when restoring the masonry, and to our delight, we find that two boilers will do, with ease, what three did with difficulty before the change was effected. The utilization of exhaust steam effects a large saving in the cost of heating, and there is room for the further extension of the system.

The electric plant installed a few years ago continues to do, without trouble, the

work of lighting the whole prison and supplying motor power to the shops.

Our water supply is ample, and we have the satisfaction of knowing that notwithstanding the fact that typhoid fever was epidemic on both sides of us last winter, we escaped the scourge entirely. It has always seemed to me that we used twice as much water as is needed for all our varied purposes, and I consider that a full investigation into our water supply system and our sewage system might result in the saving of money without destroying or lessening the efficiency of these services.

Ticket-of-Leave.—Thirty-four convicts were released on parole during the year. Three are now serving terms of imprisonment here for offences committed while the license was still in operation. Conviction cancels such licenses and the portion of the original sentence unexpired when the license was granted still hangs over the convict. How many paroled prisoners have found their way into other prisons I have no means of knowing, nor can I tell how many are at large who have failed to report their whereabouts to the police. I maintain that the Ticket-of-Leave Act has, for its paramount object, the recognition of long continued good behaviour in prison. If any other reason exists for the exercise of elemency, the power to commute or pardon should be utilized. As at present operated, the Act gives unfair advantage to the short term convict who hasn't earned its favours, and acts with infinitely reduced advantage to the long term convict who by continued exemplary conduct has earned the full benefits which the law was intended to confer.

The Insane Ward.—The important question as to the proper disposition of insane criminals is still with us and, so far as I can discover, is as far from solution as it was twenty years ago. The Penitentiary Act provides for the removal of an insane convict to an asylum for the insane during the period of his insanity and for his return to prison if he recovers before the expiration of his sentence. Practically the clause is a dead letter. Insane convicts remain with us, subject to such treatment as can be given within closed walls and prison cells during the whole term of sentence and, often for weeks and months longer. If there be anything in the modern theories as to the proper treatment of the insane, our present system of prison asylums is indeed difficult of defence. I admit the apparently insurmountable difficulties in the way of the satisfactory solution of the question, but the existence of those difficulties need not paralyze the sympathy and philanthropy of the public or forbid the active consideration of the problem. We have forty insane convicts in a single building, favoured with the daily visits of the surgeon and left to the management of prison guards. How many of these should have been sent to prison at all? How many should remain in prison? What shall be done with those who do remain?

Binder Twine.—At the beginning of the year we were without manufactured product and without material. The quantity of twine on the market was not commensurate with the demand and, in common with many factories, we were obliged to decline orders for several hundred tons. As soon as we could secure fibre (about July 5) we started production and succeeded in keeping up with local demands, and in supplying a few carloads to distant parts where the harvest is later. About September 10, our mill was closed down for the season, and shortly afterwards Mr. T. P. Connor, who had occupied the position of superintendent from the installation of the plant, was retired. The resignation of Mr. Price (assistant superintendent) had been accepted a few months before. On January 1st, Mr. Dickinson took charge as superintendent, and the factory was in constant operation for the rest of the year. The material used during the year was exclusively manila fibre of good average quality.

From a disciplinary standpoint the year just closed may be said to have been comparatively free from occurrences of an exceptional or extraordinary character. There was one attempt to escape by a weak minded convict who was quickly run down by his keeper, taken out for trial and given three months extra sentence for his foolish attempt. There has been nothing approaching the gravity of revolt or conspiracy and the offences against the prison regulations, though numerous, were mostly of a trivial character.

For the movements of convicts, changes in the staff, transfers, discharges, deaths,

&c., I beg to refer you to the several tables accompanying this report.

Again accept my thanks for your indulgence and assistance rendered during the year. I must, in justice to my fellow officers, report that the staff have rendered faithful service during the year.

APPENDIX TO WARDEN'S REPORT.

Memorandum for the Warden.

I have the honour to submit the following report of the various works performed during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1903.

West Wing —This wing containing 152 cells was completed during the year and has been occupied since January.

East Wing.—After the completion of the west wing the east wing was closed off from the dome with bulkheads of planks and the demolition of the small cells commenced. Satisfactory progress is being made. Blacksmiths, stonecutters and carpenters are engaged in preparing materials for the reconstruction of the cells.

Kitchen.—A section of the stone wall 48 feet by 15 feet was removed between the kitchen and the passage and the wall above supported on I beams and stone piers. The stone floor of passage was taken up and a new floor laid of cement concrete. A brick wall through the steward's storeroom was taken down and rebuilt 8 feet back to make room for officers' mess-room on ground floor. Waterclosets were built off the kitchen and in the storekeeper's department. Iron barriers have been placed at both entrances to kitchen. Officers' mess-room fitted up with shelving and cupboards and the whole neatly painted.

Stable.—The old slate was taken off and the roof covered with galvanized iron in rolls, and a coat of roofing cement applied.

Accountant's and Chief Keeper's Offices.—Alterations have been made consisting of a staircase built at north entrance door giving access from the yard to and office on the first floor for the accountant. The ground floor has been remodeled for the chief keeper's office. Lockers built for holding convicts' effects and both offices painted.

Fences.—Most of the wooden fences which were badly rotted have been taken down and replaced with new posts and cyclone wire fencing.

 $\it Dock.$ —Another portion of the dock was removed during the winter and rebuilt with new timbers.

North Lodge.—A new floor was laid through the entrance with cement concrete.

Farm House.—The frame house on the farm purchased recently has been put in good repair, and painted and papered.

Barns.—The room formerly used for a tool room in No. 1 barn has been lined inside with matched lumber and converted into a granary with two large bins.

Boiler House.—Considerable mason work had to be done for the installation of stokers.

Tank.—The large iron tank of about 12,000 gallons formerly used for water supply at Warden's residence has been brought down and buried in yard to hold oil for binder twine department.

Quarry.—The quarry gang is at work in the new quarry where plenty of stone of good quality can be obtained to supply the prison for a number of years.

Roofs.—Repairs are being made to all roofs and a coat of roofing cement put on them.

Tin and Paint Departments.—The tinsmiths, painters and printers have been moved back to part of the carpenter shop.

Accountant's Office.—The office formerly used by the accountant has been painted and grained.

Walls.—Portions of the low walls around gardens east and west of the main entrance gate were taken down where it was necessary and rebuilt and the walls all pointed.

Tailor and Shoe Shops.—Tailors and shoemakers have been engaged in making clothing and shoes for the Indians of the North-west Territories, and uniforms, discharge and prison clothing for this institution.

B. C. Penitentiary and Regina Jail.—120 cell door pivots and patterns for closet fittings have been made for British Columbia Penitentiary and 10 cell door barriers for Regina jail.

In addition to the above considerable work has been performed in repairs to buildings and for other departments.

The Inspectors of Penitentiaries, Ottawa.

Sirs,—I have the honour to present you the report for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1903.

I have taken part in the administration at different times during the year, and on March 7, 1903, I received instructions from warden Dr. J. A. Duchesneau, to take charge of the institution, and since that date have performed the duties of warden.

The appropriation for last year was \$121,000, of which we expended \$108,606.32, including the sum of \$3,438.05, which was paid as gratuities to different officers whose resignations were accepted by the department, leaving an unexpended balance of \$12,393.68.

Quarry.—On account of the great number of works in course of execution this summer, and in order to hasten their completion, we had to suspend for a certain time the working of the quarry, in order to use the hand-labour of the quarry for other purposes; we have on hand a sufficient quantity of stone to employ the stonecutters a good part of the summer. I expect that next September the work will have gained sufficient headway to allow us to continue the working of the quarry.

Sewerage.—The duct from the south wing to the building occupied by the electric dynamos, work on which was commenced in the spring of 1902, is on the point of being completed. The work has been long and tedious owing to the difficulties offered by the ground. This duct has been cut through solid rock. Notwithstanding the difficulties of this important work, I am convinced that it will be fully completed this fall at the latest.

Water works.—In accordance with the instructions received from the department, we have commenced to replace the old pipes, which were used for supplying the institution with water, by new ones.

In order to carry on this work, we were compelled to employ the quarry gang to

excavate for this purpose.

This work has proved to be the most difficult that has ever been undertaken at the penitentiary, owing to the disadvantages offered by the ground, part of the excavating being done through solid rock.

We are pushing the work rapidly and I am confident it will be fully completed

before the hard frost sets in this fall.

Pump House.—We are now building a new pump house directly opposite the one now in use. This fine building is of rock faced ashlar stone, and will be fitted with a double-action electric pump. In addition to the above we will have one of the old pumps with a boiler placed in a position for immediate use in case of an emergency,

The above work is under the strictest surveillance and is progressing rapidly, and I am pleased to state that up to the present no accidents have occurred. Notwithstanding the extent and importance of this work, I am perfectly convinced that the whole will

be in operation in January, 1904.

Farm.—In the course of the year many improvements have been made on the farm. The largest part of the excavation, which was between the railway and the penitentiary has been filled with stone taken from the excavation inside of the wall of the penitentiary. The fences have been repaired and the road macadamized in different places, rendering access more practicable for vehicles.

It is very difficult to pronounce on the produce which we may have from the farm. The scarcity of rain is not calculated to assure us for the coming crop. At all events, I believe that we will have sufficient produce for the needs of the institution.

Stone-shed.—This fine building is constructed of rock faced-ashlar stone, possesses all the modern appliances, and is large enough to accommodate about seventy-five stone-cutters.

Brick-work.—We purchased last spring a new machine for brick and tile making. The machine has given entire satisfaction. With the quality of the clay and sand that we have on the premises, we have every reason to believe that the enterprise will be a complete success this season.

School and Library.—The report of the schoolmaster shows that the attendance at school has been more or less interrupted in different times of the year. This is explained by the fact that in view of the great number of works which were under way, and the population being less than usual, we have been forced at different times to deprive some of the convicts of the privilage of the school.

North Lodge.—This superb structure, from the point of view of architecture, and on account of its importance, possesses all the modern improvements and is intended for different offices, principally the office and store of the store-keeper. It will be ready for occupation in the course of the fall.

Electric Installation.—The installation of the electric light is perfect and gives the best service to the institution.

Taking everything into consideration, I am under the impression that the works carried on this year have been of more than ordinary importance. Some of them were commenced some years ago, and I feel no hesitation in stating that they will be completely terminated this fall.

The discipline of the prison has been satisfactory throughout the year.

In conclusion, I wish to express my sincere thanks for your kind interest and also to thank the staff of this institution for the respect and devotedness which they have accorded me in the discharge of my duties.

(APPENDIX.)

Memorandum for the Warden.

I have the honour to submit the following report on building and other industrial work at the St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1903:—

Exhaust Steam Heating.—It having been decided to utilize the exhaust steam from electric light and power engines for heating purposes, a duct has been excavated to a depth of ten feet below grade line from power-house to dome. In the bottom of this has been laid a 12-inch. dia. sewer pipe, to be used later in connection with the separation of sewerage matter from surface water. The duct is 5 feet by 4 feet 6 inches, is built of cut stone, and will be covered with rough dressed stone flagging and graded over. The exhaust mains and electric light cables from power house to dome are laid in this duct. The dome, wings, R. C. chapel, shop, building, baths and stable, are now heated by exhaust steam from electric light engines. This change throws out of commission the battery of four boilers under dome, the hot water heater in baths, and stoves in stable.

The steam sewage and water duct power house to stable is being continued from stable up south west side of yard to stonecutters new building. This will provide for laying of water, sewer and steam pipes and electric cables for accommodation of stonecutters shop and blacksmith, machine and tinsmiths shops, to be erected later on the same line, as stonecutters shop and stable.

Motor Power, &c.—The estimates and specifications for this equipment having proved satisfactory, orders were placed, and have been filled. The entire machinery is now run by motor power. The tailors shop and change room is equipped with electric gooses, the four guard towers with electric heaters. This change does away with the large locomotive boiler in blacksmith shop, stoves in tailors shop and change room, and stoves in towers. The annual saving in coal effected by these changes will be very material, and a very much more satisfactory method of handling machinery obtained.

Brick-making.—Brick and tile manufacture for the season has been commenced. All brick required for building and tile required for farm irrigation will be manufactured on the premises in future. The large quantity of these products required annually, when manufactured by prison labour—instead of purchasing—will create an appreciable saving in the annual expenditure and afford instructive employment for the convicts.

Water-works.—In accordance with estimates and specifications prepared and approved, orders have been placed for a triplex electric pump and motor, for a generator set to raise the voltage from 110 to 500 volts, to drive pump motor. The pump will have a capacity of 500 gallons per minute operating at 125 lbs. pressure per square inch, and will be equipped with 8-inch. mains from river to the prison. The new building required for accommodation of the new pump has been commenced, and the excavation for water mains undertaken. Work was commenced on May 4th. It is hoped to have the plant in operation before winter.

The new pumping plant, in addition to providing adequate fire protection, will effect a large saving annually. The steam boiler used for driving steam

pumps at a cost of \$1,500 to \$1,600 per annum being discontinued.

New Stonecutters Shop.—This building has been completed. It is in all respects a modern building and will add greatly to the shop accommodation.

Dome and Wings.—Many of the cell barriers have been repaired during the year. The cells, passages, windows and doors painted, and glass roof of dome repaired.

Tramway.—The tramway trestle bridge, and tram line to quarry have been repaired. The bridge is now good for some years. The fact, however, must not be overlooked that a new stone bridge will have to be constructed in the near future.

Quarry.—The quarry has been worked to very good advantage during the year, the new derrick erected last year facilitating the work very much.

General Repairs.—There has been the usual amount of repairs to buildings and prison equipment done during the year.

Industries Generally.—The various trades have been well provided with work

during the year, in some branches more than could be completed with despatch.

The coming season promises no exception in the amount of work which will be required from all the trade branches. The building of new pump house and excavations for water mains, brick and tile manufacture, installation of pumping machinery, stonecutting, quarrying, excavations and building ducts in yard, will require much activity on the part of the officers entrusted with the execution of the different works. In conclusion I have to recommend that the building of a new blacksmith, machine and tin shop be proceeded with as soon as the pump house is completed.

Gentlemen,—I have the honour to submit my annual report, consisting of the usual statistical tables and reports of the various departments of the Dorchester Penitentiary for the year ended June 30, 1903.

The daily average was 220.7, as against 214 last year and 210 the previous year. The increase may be accounted for by the large influx of foreign population at the steel works and coal mines of Cape Breton County.

The conduct of the prisoners generally has been good and the discipline well main-

tained. There have been no escapes.

As will be seen by the surgeon's report, the health of the prison has been good. There have been but two deaths, against four last year, and eight the previous year.

The only accident which could be considered of a serious nature was that of a convict who lost the four fingers of his right hand by allowing it to come in contact with

an edger at which he was working.

Of the thirty convicts who were released on parole during the year, not one has

returned, showing the care with which the Act is being operated.

The chaplains' reports show that they have attended to their duties with commendable zeal and faithfulness, and as a result an improvement in the moral tone of the prison is manifest.

The operations of the farm have been fairly successful. Hay and cereals were an

excellent crop, while potatoes and other vegetables were an average crop.

The large new barn has been completed and is now occupied. The foundation for a new stone piggery was laid last fall and work on it is now in progress. It is expected that this much-needed building will be completed and ready for occupation by November next.

A large number of convicts have been employed all the year in the quarry and stonecutters shed preparing stone for the new building to be commenced in the autumn when the piggery is finished. The other industries have been well conducted and vigorously prosecuted. The new kitchen and bakery have been completed and are occupied with much advantage and comfort. All the officers have been faithful in the discharge of their duties. The retirement of Mr. J. A. Gray, who had for twenty-three years been the efficient and courteous accountant of this institution, is very much regretted by all. The officer who takes his place will, it is hoped, prove a worthy successor.

Sirs,—I have the honour to submit my annual report together with crime statistics and other reports in connection with this penitentiary for the fiscal year ended 30th June 30, 1903.

The daily average during the year was 120·4 as against 109·1 in the previous year.

The conduct and industry of the convicts through the year has been very good.

As I have mentioned in former reports, we are sadly in need of proper accommodation for both man and beast.

In my report for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1901, in recommending the building of a farm stable and other buildings, I said, "more important even than this is the addition of a new wing. The entire building now in use is below the standard of

modern requirements.

'From the point of view of security of prisoners, it is altogether deficient, entailing an immense amount of personal supervision and a constant strain on the officers in charge, which the later methods of building can dispense with. Besides this the danger of fire is far greater than that in other institutions of the same kind that have the advantage of being constructed on more scientific principles.

'The main building to-day has only 106 cells while we have 112 prisoners. The population from which the penitentiary is fed is constantly increasing, and there can be little doubt that by the time this wing is built it will be not a whit too large for the

necessary accommodation.'

Our convict population has been steadily increasing ever since and of course will continue to increase with the immense number of immigrants who are now coming into this western country. Our convict population to-day is 150. I hope a wing will be commenced in the spring and hurried to completion.

I should like to see something done to our officers' quarters to make them more comfortable, owing to the isolated situation of this penitentiary there is nowhere for them to live except in the buildings now in use. In the present condition of these

buildings it increases the already heavy tax on my officers for fuel.

I would again recommend that another tank with a capacity of 5,000 gallons be placed in the attic. In case of fire, the well going dry as frequently happens, or if the present tank requiring repairing, it is very desirable to have a reserve supply.

We had a good erop this year although not quite as heavy as last year.

We have had no escapes.

APPENDIX.

Paper submitted by Warden Irvine at the meeting of the National Prison Congress held at Louisville, Kentucky, October, 1903.

SUBJECT :-- PRISON DISCIPLINE.

Order is the fundamental principle of nature. Discipline is merely the enforcement of methods to secure order. It is an entirely erroneous idea to suppose that discipline is a restriction of liberty. The laws of a country constitute the real security of its citizens. The discipline of an institution in like manner constitutes the safety and protection of both its officers and inmates. The nation, the municipality, or the institution that does not enforce a respect for and compliance with its laws and regulations is in a dangerous condition and is unworthy of respect.

Too much stress cannot be laid upon the fact that rigid discipline is intended for the protection of those who do right, and not as a punishment or hardship to any one. In enforcing discipline the restriction falls exclusively on those who violate general

rights or the rights of other individuals.

An important advantage of discipline in an institution is the fact that it trains the convict in habitual compliance with authority. His conviction shows that he is lacking in that respect, and the effect of firm discipline develops self-restraint and builds up

character on a firm and proper basis.

The true root idea of discipline has been very well defined as self-sacrifice, and obedience is only one of the secondary elements, and so I suppose the prisoners really are being punished for failure in self-sacrifice to common human needs and purposes; thus, obedience must be forced on them, and so far as they are curable they must be led back by prison discipline to the fit and proper state of humanity which demands reasonable and willing self-sacrifice from the individual in his relation to his fellow beings. Now, in order to attain proper discipline in a prison, it is imperative that the officers of the prison, and especially those in charge, should have a thorough knowledge of its objects and the methods by which it can be made effective. Too much care cannot be taken in the selection of such officers. I am of the opinion that before officers are placed on permanent duty, they should undergo a probationary term at a training depot, where their character and temperament can be studied and their fitness to assume the responsibilities of the position determined.

Firmness and kindness is a sine qua non. If an officer loses his temper he weakens his authority; whereas, if he has perfect self-control he can act in regard to a case which, if hastily treated, might assume a more serious aspect. It is obvious that an officer's training must be thorough, not only in the matter of detail, but in the management of the many classes of men who may from time to time be committed to his care.

The disposition of every man must be carefully studied and great care should be taken in judging a man's temperament during the first few weeks that he is placed

under the officer's charge.

Some prisoners are apt to be mentally stunned by the somewhat sudden appreciation of the position in which they have placed themselves, and this may induce a feeling of despondency, which, at first glance, might be taken for sullenness. It is during this time that the officer in the immediate charge of the prisoner may, by kindly treatment, influence him for good; or, by harsh words or manner, render him callous or obstinate.

If an officer always appears tidy and well dressed, cheerful and alert, he will imbue the prisoner with his own activity and smartness; whereas, if he goes about his duty ill-dressed and generally slovenly, not taking any interest in the work, the prisoner will naturally follow his example.

It is equally necessary that the convict who resists prison authority and, generally, undertakes to run the institution in accordance with his own ideas, should be firmly and effectively subdued, irrespective of the severity or form of punishment that may be found

necessary to accomplish that object.

Convicts should at all times be kept busy, and officers should show them an example in demeanour and quickness in attending to their duties. If a prisoner shows a preference for a trade it is always advisable to put him in the way of learning or exercising that trade. When a man has had no previous training he should be appointed to that work for which the warden considers him best adapted. If a prisoner displays any desire to become a finished mechanic, I think every opportunity should be given him in that direction. All encouragement of this sort tends to make the prisoner's life less monotonous and, at the same time, prepares him for earning an honest living after his discharge. Men of many diverse temperaments are sent to our institutions and their characteristics must be carefully studied by the officers in charge, in order to carry out the intention of the sentence and, at the same time, endeavour to lead the man to a better course in life.

The warden of the penitentiary should be held responsible for the proper discipline of the institution, and should have the power of rejecting any officer sent to him whom

he deems unfit.

The warden, being so held responsible, should deal personally with all prisoners who commit, or are charged with committing a breach of prison discipline. If a prisoner offends he should be at once confined in his cell and brought before the warden in his orderly room, or room set apart for seeing prisoners, at the regular hour set apart for that purpose. The greatest care and discrimination is necessary in dealing with prisoners brought before him for breach of discipline, as the mental and other characteristics of each man have to be considered in awarding punishment. When a prisoner is brought before me, and I see that the prisoners and officers are at all excited over the case, I remand the prisoner until the following day, when the aspect of affairs is generally very different.

Another thing the warden has to guard against is to see that his officers do not resort to a system of 'nagging,' or continually 'talking at' a prisoner. I have seen a company of a regiment driven to a state of mutiny by the senior non-commissioned officer acting in this manner, and how much more important it is to guard against such

a thing in a penitentiary where the results are liable to be more serious.

The punishments authorized are much the same in all penitentiaries. Judging from many years' experience, I have concluded that the most effectual mode of punishing an intelligent convict is to deprive him of his remission. The 'ticket of leave' system is of undoubted value as an inducement to good behaviour, but the remission of sentence, if properly carried out, should be even more effective in producing the same result. Remission, however, should not be regarded as a prescriptive right, and prisoners should be made thoroughly to understand that it is a privilege to be acquired only by obedience and industry.

The awarding of punishments by the warden is one of the greatest factors in prison discipline. So soon as the convicts find that they receive justice at his hands they will take punishment for an offence without resentment, whereas, if a convict is hastily tried and severely punished for a trivial offence it is apt to make him sullen, and this feeling

will soon pervade the whole prison.

BRITISH COLUMBIA.

NEW WESTMINSTER, July 2, 1903.

Sirs,—I have the honour to submit my annual report, accompanied by statistical and financial statements for the year 1902-03.

The expenditure of this institution for the year was \$46,736.64.

In comparing this penitentiary with larger institutions, as to per capita cost, it should not be forgotten that the cost of living here is much higher than at any other penitentiary in Canada; also that we have a staff equal to the handling of twice the number of convicts in a prison of modern construction with a stone wall inclosing the premises.

The following tabular statement shows the movement of convicts for the year just

We continued brickmaking this year, and, owing to your decision to have first tier of cells in new wing built of pressed brick, it was necessary to work our brickyard with that object in view; as a consequence, we will this year make about 75,000 of pressed and 250,000 common brick.

We started the erection of new wing about the middle of October. At the northeast corner we found a bed of sand, which necessitated our going down some twelve feet before securing a proper foundation. We expect, before the winter sets in, to have half of outside walls erected, and will place over this a temporary canvas roof, so that we can continue, during the winter, building the cells. With this protection we expect to have two and one half to three tiers of cells erected before the spring season sets in.

The work of building is in charge of Instructor Imlah, under the supervision of Chief Trade Instructor Disney. Both officers have been attached to the staff for sometime in other capacities. We expect to fully complete this building of modern construction, with convict labour and our own staff without any outside expense whatever for labour. When completed, we will have accommodation for two hundred and twenty prisoners. The outside walls are constructed of brick and the window barriers of steel pipe, which is less expensive, just as strong as heavy iron rods, easier to erect and less impediment to light. The steel barriers for cells, also the locking-bar arrangements, are being manufactured for us at the St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary; all the rest of the work in connection with this building will be done on the premises.

In tearing down the small building attached to present cell wing, I found that it was practically sandstone veneer, and on making investigation I found that the whole construction of the wing and main building is of same nature.

We have secured your permission, and will, as soon as wet weather sets in, commence the construction of the bakery in our basement, in connection with the kitchen,

in order that the steward may supervise both departments.

We received on October 14 ten convicts from the Yukon.

I regret to say that the N.W.M.P. officials did not see their way clear to have us manufacture boots, shoes and clothing for prisoners in the Yukon, preferring to purchase on the spot. I consider that this reciprocity could not, in any way, be objected to by the outside manufacturer, any more than he would object to our manufacturing boots, shoes and clothing for our own convicts.

During the year we had a visit from Inspector Dawson and Architect Adams. I am pleased to see that the Inspector's visits will now be made annually instead of sex-

tennially.

The discipline has been exceptionally well maintained during last year, and the

officers continue to do their duty faithfully.


So far as I can learn, those favoured with a ticket-of-leave have, by their conduct, fully justified the Minister's elemency.

APPENDIX B

SURGEONS' REPORTS



KINGSTON.

Kingston, Sept. 1, 1903.

The Inspectors of Penitentiaries, Ottawa.

Strs,—I have the honour to submit herewith my annual report of the medical department of this penitentiary for the year ended June 30, 1903.

The affairs of this department have not been marked by any novel or abnormal features to justify any lengthened report, but there are always a few matters embraced in its administration to which it is deemed necessary to refer in the annual report.

The usual number of prisoners come to us, though at one time physically healthy, now broken down in health. Of the causes concerned in this state of feeble physical constitution, the criminal methods of earning a living, their depraved habits, and an inadequate supply of food often producing, through malnutrition, mental and physical impairment might be assigned important places. On this account, many persons, no doubt, with good intentions but with low physical and mental vitality were frequently led into criminous methods of living, and continued in them till received into prison so diseased in body that it often requires months of treatment before restored to their wonted physical health. A large number are affected with syphilis and require specific treatment to tide them over the period of their detention in prison. This class, owing to lowered tone of the system, is more vulnerable to acute diseases, many of which lapse into a state of chronicity from which recovery is always tedious and doubtful.

The general sanitation of the prison has been all that could be desired; the personal cleanliness of the prisoners was a noticeable feature of the care bestowed upon them, and the ventilation of the dormitoires, workshops and other buildings has been of the most satisfactory character. Together with these precautions, every effective means of ridding disease producing germs from the prison apartments are employed; these means are in accord with the views of those who pursue scientific study. To be able, however-to eradicate completely these pathogenic organisms in an institution where a large number of persons are congregated together, representing different nationalities and making the prison a microcosm in itself, would mark with special emphasis the beginning of a new era in bacteriology.

It is generally admitted that a contaminated water supply is often responsible for recurring invalidism in institutions, but I am pleased to be able to state here that there has been no cause for alarm during the past year. The bored well on the premises appears to be inexhaustible in its pure water supply for drinking purposes.

We have had an absolute immunity from any infectious disease, which is an indication that the apportionment of work assigned to each one directed towards the care of the inmates has been performed with commendable devotion to duty. The results which have been so far achieved appear to warrant a continuance of the good work.

The bread furnished the prisoners has been kept up to its usual good standard. The food was well cooked, and was served in quality and quantity to meet the health requirement.

There are no sick treated in their cells, as it is found expedient to have those complaining and unable for duty, enter the hospital as soon as possible to receive the care and attention their condition requires. The hospital during the year has been thoroughly renovated, and was well looked after by the trained orderlies who are selected for that duty, under the supervision of the hospital overseer. There has been considerable disease of a chronic character during the year, many of these cases coming from the outside make their home in the hospital, as they are unfit to engage in prison labour. A special building for this class of prisoners would conform to some well established methods,

and would isolate them from the really sick. The recrudescence of small-pox again in this vicinity made it imperative that all the inmates not vaccinated should be vaccinated. The number exceeded that of any previous year, and at the end of the year every prisoner was able to present a mark of having received the virus. Many of those vaccinated were obliged to remain in the hospital till the subsidence of the inflammatory stage.

There was considerable sickness amongst the officers during the year. It was mostly of a bronchial character, and its severity in some cases necessitated a prolonged and unavoidable absence from duty. A few prisoners suffered from tuberculosis in its pulmonary form during the year. One entered the prison with his lungs involved in the diseased process, and it did not require long before marked symptoms of the advancement of the disease manifested themselves. As the disease is generally slow in its progress, those affected appear to enjoy light work in the open air as long as they are able to do it. There has been no evidence that this insidious foe of humanity has spread in the institution by contagion. With a knowledge of its contagious character, especially where persons are congregated together, as in an institution, every precautionary measure is employed. The opinion is gaining ground in reference to tuberculosis that it may not be regarded as such a highly infectious disease, but as a disease communicable under certain conditions of receptivity and requiring only reasonable measures to prevent its spread.

The west wing has been completed, and the old cells, antiquated in design and absolutely unfit for modern prison requirements, and being constructed when cleanliness, sunlight and necessary accommodation were not a prime factor in prison administration, have been transformed into veritable rooms with sanitary plumbing and conveniences, all of which tend to better prison conditions and contribute to the health and comfort

of the prisoners.

The number of comparatively young prisoners requiring the use of spectacles is very large in prison work, but this is not to be wondered at when it is known that the experience of those who have observed numerous cases of eye disease, has determined that in many cases, especially those occurring early in adult life, the influence of heredity in

shaping the form of the eye and predisposing to disease is very considerable.

A few prisoners discharged in good health during the year were returned to us, the lessons of the past not having been sufficiently admonitory to have given serious direction to their thoughts. The original endowments of the recidivist is generally below the average in mentality, and gives strong evidence to the assumption of a low physical organization of the parentage, in reference to which the poet and philosopher have not ceased to tell us from time immemorial that from the poisoned fount no healthful stream can flow. The signs of degeneracy are frequently stamped on this individual, but it may be remarked that many of the so called signs of degeneracy may be observed in persons of the highest character and greatest mental attainments.

Insune Ward.—It has been said that of the uncertainties of our present state the most dreadful and alarming is the uncertain continuance of reason. Insanity is no new disease; it dates back to the earliest ages, and still invades the household of the rich and the poor alike, producing unhappiness and misery where hitherto reigned ease and contentment. We are unable so far to explain many of the phenomena of abnormal psychic manifestation, but the labours of those who are working in this field of inquiry will no doubt, in time, clear up many points on the subject which are at present surrounded by great uncertainty. The ward has been thoroughly renovated during the year, and is always kept scrupulously clean and in good order. At the close of the year there were thirty-four inmates, mostly all of whom are continually engaged in some employment in connection with the ward. As soon as an inmate recovers his mentality he is at once discharged into the general prison, and is permitted to engage in work. Of this class nineteen were discharged during the year. The number of insane in the ward at end of year was 29; admitted during the year 28; admitted from this prison 22; transferred to provincial asylums on expiration of sentence, 2; discharged cured, 13; improved to resume work, 3.

Prison of Isolation.—There were only seven prisoners of the penal class in this ward at the end of the year, all of whom were in good health. This ward is kept clean and in a good sanitary condition. There has been no sickness of any consequence amongst this class, and the heating has been very satisfactory. The inmates are kept continually at work and make themselves generally useful. Some of the prisoners released during the year were returned again to this ward, they having been so much in prison that they have lost all that self-respect, ambition and interest which impel men to worthy effort.

Female Prison.—At the end of year there were fifteen inmates in this ward, all of whom were in good health. They receive all necessary care and attention from those whose duty it is to look after them. The various wards and cells have received their annual renovation; the sanitation has been satisfactory, and there has been scarcely any sickness during the year. The hospital attached to this department is always ready for the reception of patients.

Prescriptions.—The number of prescriptions dispensed during the year, independent of hospital patients, amounted to:—For officers, 917; prison of isolation, 93; hospital for insane, 272; female prisoners, 268; dispensary patients, 3,353; number of teeth extracted, 167; number of days in hospital, 3,532.

So cordial has been the co-operation of all the officers, that I desire to bear cheerful testimony to their efficient support in the discharge of my official duties. The assistance rendered by, and the uniform kindness of, the hospital overseer, Mr. Gunn, have been appreciated and merit a special acknowledgment.

I know that the department intends to build an hospital. We need it very much.

The hospital dietary is served in quality and quantity suitable to patients.

During the present year I had to attend many cases of sickness amongst the officers. I am glad to notice that the instructions given by the department as to sickness were carried out in full, and it produced a very good effect.

Many sad accidents occurred during the year, but all the patients have recovered.

Guard George Charbonneau, fracture of the leg, still on treatment.

Convict Alexis Généreux had his hand crushed in a machine. The amputation

was performed the same day. He has recovered.

Sirs,—I have the honour to submit my annual report as surgeon of this peniten-

tiary for the year ended June 30, 1903.

The health of the convicts has been good, there having been no serious cases of illness, with the exception of one case which terminated fatally, and the number admitted to hospital having been less than last year.

With regard to the two convicts returned as having become insane during the year, it is probable that both were weak minded when admitted to the penitentiary. One

was a negro and the other a Chilian.

The number of days spent in hospital was 364, an average of 20 · 22 days for each patient. The convict who died was only 28 days in hospital, but was treated for a long time in his cell before being admitted to hospital.

The number of new prescriptions made up during the year was 1,169.

The usual tables are appended showing the work done during the year.



To the Warden,

SIR,—Our chapel register records at this date of compiling the annual report for the year ended June 30, the names of one hundred and forty-six (146) men and seven (7) women, being an increase of six men compared with our last year's figures. The number is not excessively large when we remember that many of those in our midst are citizens of the United States. However, I regret that it was not possible to report a 'marked decrease' in the percentage of criminals within our prison walls.

I am glad to be in a position to state that at no former period in the penitentiary's history have so many men been found approaching the Tribunal of Penance, receiving the sacraments of the church and practising their other religious duties with greater

feryour than during the past twelve months.

We have had no deaths, and comparatively little sickness, a fact which helps to prove that the prison is cleanliness itself—kept in perfect order so far as the sanitary condition is concerned.

It is a matter for regret that the foregoing figures show an increase in the number of prisoners under my charge, and more especially so, as the times being prosperous and work easily obtained, this increase would seem to be the result of inclination to vice, rather than the effect of enforced idleness.

It is gratifying to me to be able to state that the deportment of the men in the

chapel continues to be generally good.

The number of men under my care who have availed themselves of school privileges this year is smaller than usual, i.e. eleven; and I beg again to place on record my growing conviction that it would be to the interest of the institution as well as of prisoners themselves, if all the younger men at least, who are unable to read and write were required to attend the school until they could do so; and that attendance at school be insisted upon as a part of the discipline rather than as a reward for good conduct. The convict who has the companionship of a good book is less likely to give annoyance in his hours of solitude than the one who has only his own reflections on an unsatisfactory past for entertainment.

The more I see of the effect of prison life upon the young convict, the more earnestly do I wish that the time may soon arrive when those convicted of a first offence may be kept apart from the older and more confirmed criminals, whose influence over

them appears to be the greatest hindrance to their reformation.

DORCHESTER, N.B., July 1, 1903.

SIRS:—I have the honour to present my annual report as Protestant Chaplain of this penitentiary for the year ended June 30, 1903.

On that day there were under my charge 142 prisoners, of whom seven were women, as against 121 for the corresponding day of the preceding year, and as against 105 for

the same day in 1901.

I regret to say that this numerical return is considerably larger than that made on any corresponding day in my twenty years service. This increase has an uncomfortable look, but it is fully accounted for when the greatly extended economical conditions of Sydney, N.S., are brought into the account, that neighbourhood alone having supplied more than the total increase during the year, and it will be reasonable to expect a similar state of affairs for some time to come.

Only one of the whole number of persons under my care died during the year.

There is something that looks like monotony in the unvaried yearly statement that all Bible classes, choir practices and chapel services are marked by an interest and attention that is hearty, as distinct from the demeanour of discipline; but this is an approach to monotony that no one would greatly desire to see varied.

My weekly Bible class continues to be increasingly interesting to the prisoners, and no less encouraging to myself. The attendance during the year at this voluntary Bible

elass has reached 80, and has never fallen below 50.

My last report looked towards a probable enlargement of the chapel in the near future. A careful detailed examination was made last fall by Mr. Inspector Dawson, which resulted in the conclusion that for the present, and possibly for some years to come, the chapel would suffice. But if the conditions before referred to, such as prevail at Sydney continue, this decision may in the near future require to be reviewed. Meanwhile we are able to manage.

In view of the peculiar disability that newly discharged prisoners are for the most part under, I have a strong and growing feeling that in centres like St. John, Halifax, and Sydney a Prisoners' Aid Association similar to that in Montreal—which is in connection with St. Vincent de Paul—should be formed for the purpose of affording protection and help to such discharged prisoners as are desirous of reforming. I hope

to be able to report progress in this direction before long.

That there is a hopeful side to the whole question of penology may be illustrated in the following interesting statement of fact. The department, in its exercise of executive elemency has, during the year just closed, granted no fewer than 30 tickets of leave. It is a remarkable and gratifying fact that not one of these prisoners so favoured forfeited his parole. This is, I think, strong testimony to the value of the system when the privilege is carefully granted.

The influence of the chaplain for good is much in the hands of the staff, and through the medium of this report I wish to say that no body of men—from the warden

down—could be more helpful.

ADDENDUM.

The fact that, for a year or two the crime of the violation of the persons of women, and especially of young girls under age, has been abnormally great, impels me to say something on the subject that I have long felt that I would like to say.

I wish to say that in such cruel, cowardly and brutal cases there is no such remedy as the lash. And I am thankful that within the last two years, judges in the maritime provinces have in several instances constituted the lash a part of the

punishment.

To some, it may look like putting the penological clock back, to resort to the lash in this 20th century, as being a return to the brutal, rather than to the moral. My answer is that in brutalized natures where all capacity for moral considerations has been destroyed, it is the only argument that such human or rather, inhuman brutes can understand. And I have in my lengthening experience observed cases, where long sentences had no terrors for the criminal but where they blanched and trembled before the lash.

So far as to this mode of punishing the class of crimes referred to I would be glad to be permitted to add a word on the place and the time or times, for most effectively administering the punishment. I observe that such of their Honours as have ordered the use of the lash have so ordered it, as that it is to be administered in the penitentiary, and not in the jail in the district where the crime was committed. I respectfully submit that this is to miss the force of the lesson, where the lesson should be taught. Administering the punishment in some private way in the penitentiary, is, in my judgment to defeat the object.

It may be that detailed and more defined legislation on this branch of the subject

may be required.

SESSIONAL PAPER No. 34

Once more: Their Honours occasionally order that a certain number of strokes be administered as the convict is about to be discharged. I see the *intention*; but I submit that, if a man has behaved himself well and penitently, it becomes a very painful and ungracious duty to the officials to whip him, and would undoubtedly tend to obliterate all moral improvement effected, and to substitute therefor a settled feeling of embittered resentment.

Whilst it is difficult to measure spiritual results and there are many things to discourage the chaplain in his efforts to help the men morally and spiritually, notwithstanding which my work during the year just closed has been as hopeful as any former year. I know of two or three that have been discharged that are evidently leading a better life. I have had letters from some of the discharged convicts and their friends which have encouraged me in my work very much. Ours is pre-eminently a work of faith. We have to go on without seeing much of the fruit of our labour. I am hopeful that some have 'learned their lesson,' as it was expressed in a letter I had from the brother of one of my hopefuls.

The attention at the Sunday services is all that could be desired. I am indebted

to the warden, deputy warden, and all the officers for assistance in my work.

I have to repeat what I said in my last year's report, that the ticket-of-leave system is quite an incentive to good conduct, and that recommendations for this elemency should rest mainly with the head officers of the penitentiary. Deserving convicts in some cases have no one to help them in bringing their case before the Honourable the Minister of Justice, besides the warden and the deputy warden are in a position to know if the conduct of any convict is deserving of such elemency.

The library and the school are greatly appreciated by many of the convicts.

Sirs,—I have the honour to submit herewith farm statements for the year ending June 30, 1903.

The farm work for the year was very satisfactory both as regards produce and improvements, the only failure was in the early varieties of potatoes.

The new farms were taken over on April 9, 1902, consequently only a small part

could be prepared for this year's crop.

Apart from the ordinary farm work, the following improvements were done by the farm gangs, viz.: 5,170 feet of four foot drains made and laid with three and four-inch drain pipes, 1,500 feet of stone drains laid in the old ditches, before being filled and levelled 1,220 feet of permanent fence made, 1,260 feet of stone road, and 1,550 feet of heavy stone fence removed to the old quarries during winter. The swamp on the Gagnon farm west of the penitentiary was underdrained, and is now ready for cultivation. The sand pits on the Jolicœur farm were filled and levelled, also the land from which the sand for the filtration beds was taken, was graded, together with a number of minor improvements. The majority of the convicts employed were undergoing their first experience in farming.

Field drainage and like improvements cannot be too strongly encouraged. A good quality of field drain pipes are being manufactured on the premises, the only requisite is convict labour sufficient to attend to the farm crops with a separate gang for drainage during summer and autumn, as this work cannot be done successfully during

winter, in this climate.



REGINA, Sept. 29, 1903.

The Inspectors of Penitentiaries, Ottawa.

Sirs,—I have the honour to submit the annual report of this institution for the fiscal year 1902–3. I have first to record the sad occurrence of the death of the late jailor which took place on April 9.

I have been in charge as jailor since June first, only, and am therefore not in a po-

sition to make a full report.

Owing to an unfortunate outbreak of diphtheria the jail was closed for the receiving of prisoners for several months which explains the low daily average. During two of the months, March and April, the average dropped below 10 prisoners, several of whom for different reasons were unfit for work. From that it can be understood that the outside work in the early part of the season was necessarily curtailed, the effect of which was badly felt later on. However, all the land available for cropping was sown, amounting to about 40 acres of wheat, 10 acres of oats and 3 acres of roots.

The farm account shows an adverse balance this year, which requires a little explanation. To it are charged implements to the extent of \$80, which are still on hand, there is also an expenditure of \$136 for seed, for the next year's crop. I am now keeping a proper farm account, as instructed by you, showing stock on hand at beginning and end of year, which will in future make the account more intelligible.

Towards the latter part of the year the building of an hospital for contagious

diseases was commenced.

In conclusion, I beg to thank you for the promptitude with which you have in every instance dealt with my communications since I have been in charge.

SURGEON'S REPORT.

REGINA, Sept. 28, 1903.

To the Inspectors of Penitentiaries, Ottawa.

SIRS,—I have the honour to present to you the surgeon's report of Regina jail, for

the year ended June thirtieth last.

The average of health among the prisoners as regards ordinary diseases, has been fair, but unfortunately an outbreak of diphtheria occurred in October of last year, which necessitated the jail being quarantined for some time. The health of the officers however, has not been good, one or other of them having been off duty from illness during the greater part of the year.

One death occurred during the year, the late jailor William MacIvor, who died of

pneumonia in April last.

Owing to the fact that at the time of occurrence of the first case of diphtheria there were no adequate means of isolating infectious cases, the disease spread rapidly for

a few days, but when permission was granted to use the female ward for isolation

purposes, the outbreak was quickly checked.

Immediately on the outbreak of the first case minimizing doses of anti-diphtheritic serum were administered to all the officers and prisoners, and also the throats were sprayed with an antiseptic solution several times a day. This was continued until bacteriological examination shewed negative result. Repeated bacteriological examinations of the throats of the prisoners shewed some of them to be infected with the germs of the disease, for an unusually long period, necessitating the continuance of the quarantine until May of this year.

The Isolation Hospital, which is now under construction, will I hope enable us to

handle any infectious cases without interfering with the regular work of the jail.

There is at present no provision for separating those who are ill with ordinary non-contagious diseases from the healthy prisoners and they are subjected to the same restrictions. It would be a great improvement if the ward formerly used as a female ward were set apart for an infirmary, where during the period of convalescence the invalids could be allowed more freedom than is allowed the healthy prisoners.

The danger of contamination to surgical cases too, would be greatly minimized. At present there is no accommodation for surgical cases, nor adequate facilities for properly treating them, except the minor cases. I would strongly recommend that this corridor be set apart for hospital purposes. The cases treated during the year are as shewn

in the subjoined table.

In conclusion I beg to express my appreciation of the courtesy extended to me by the officers of this jail.



Jailer's Report.

PRINCE ALBERT, July 6, 1903.

To the Inspectors of Penitentiaries, Ottawa,

Sirs,—I have the honour to submit my annual report, together with returns for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1903.

There have been no deaths or escapes during the year. One prisoner attempted to

escape, but was promptly recaptured.

The daily average during the year was $6\frac{1}{3}\frac{1}{6}\frac{3}{5}$. The net per capita cost is above that of last year. This increased cost has been caused by the purchase of farm lands, building reservoir and workshop, and expenditure for skilled labour and necessary materials

required in the construction of the water works system.

During the year a considerable amount of work was done by the prisoners. The reservoir has been completed. It will hold about 40,000 gallons of water, and is built entirely of stone and cement. The walls are 2 ft. thick and the floor 2 ft. thick of solid cement concrete. A workshop was built over the reservoir. This is a great convenience. Heretofore all work had to be done outside. We have put down 1,126 ft. of the water pipe and 2,238 ft. more will be required. Considerable difficulty is being experienced in digging the trench, as the surface water is causing much trouble and we are working through an almost solid bed of granite boulders and limestone. On an average we take out 5 to 6 loads of stone to 100 ft. of trench. In a great number of instances we have to tunnel under the boulders.

The new farm lands that we have acquired will need fencing.

I am pleased to be able to say that the whole building has been devoted to jail purposes, the court and court officials having been furnished with accommodation elsewhere. The room used as a court room will be divided and utilized one part for an hospital ward and the other for a work room.

The jailer's quarters have been moved from the centre of the building and the

administration offices moved to the rooms immediately adjoining the prison proper.

Farm.—We had a fairly good crop of vegetables and sheaf oats on the farm. Ten acres of oats were sown on breaking, and altogether 13 acres have been sown with oats and the crop looks very promising. I am utilizing all available prison labour on the trench for water pipes and will be unable to clear the brush from any more of the farm lands this season.

During the winter months a gang of prisoners were engaged at work taking out stone from the river bed and hauling sand from the pit on the north side of the river. These materials were taken out for a new kitchen but more necessary works have delayed its erection.

We were favoured with a visit from Inspector G. W. Dawson and Mr. E. J. Adams, architect, during the past summer. These official visits are of great benefit to the officers and to the institution as a whole, and I should be glad to have them made semi-annual.

The conduct of the prisoners, generally, has been good.

The prisoners, besides being engaged on the above works, have been employed in sawing wood, gardening, and on necessary repairs to the prison buildings.

SURGEON'S REPORT.

PRINCE ALBERT, July 1, 1903.

The Inspectors of Penitentiaries, Ottawa.

Sirs,—I have the honour to submit my annual report for the year ended June 30 1903.

There has been more illness among the occupants of the jail this year than in former

years.

In February an insane woman was sent to the jail. She appeared to be recovering from an attack of scarlet fever. Precautions were taken to prevent the contagion spreading. A formalin disinfector was procured so that the cells and corridors could be

made safe for other prisoners.

Great difficulty is experienced in handling the insane who are sent here. Proper accommodation and appliances are lacking for the restraint of those who are violent. We receive no account of the condition of insane prisoners sent here. A copy of the evidence upon which they are committed would throw some light on the character of the individual case.

Until the water is obtained from the river the supply will not be satisfactory.

I regret that the town of Prince Albert has not taken advantage of the offer as to

drainage, made by the department.

Hospital accommodation has not yet been supplied. I hope to see the rooms fitted up this year as there is an urgent necessity for them.

FARM REPORT.

PRINCE ALBERT, N.W.T., August 3, 1903.

To the Inspectors of Penitentiaries, Ottawa.

Sirs,—I have the honour to submit my annual report for the year ended June 30, 1903.

The crop raised on the farm last year was on the whole fair. The vegetable crop was a very good one. Vegetables to the value of \$69.85 were grown; these were used in the prison kitchen.

The ten acres under cultivation was sown with oats and nine tons of sheaf oats

valued at \$10 per ton were taken off. These were consumed by the prison stock.

The balance of the farm should be fenced in. This will have to be done before any

more land can be brought under cultivation.

The land under cultivation this year has again been sown with oats and the crop looks very promising.

NORTH-WEST MOUNTED POLICE.

Dawson, Y.T., December 1, 1903.

Sir,—Under authority of an order in council dated February 4, 1903, the officer commanding the North-west Mounted Police in the Yukon was appointed inspector of penitentiaries for the Yukon Territory.

In accordance with section 16 of the Act respecting penitentiaries, I beg to submit

my annual report as inspector for the year ending December 1, 1903.

Two N. W. M. Police guard-rooms in the Yukon are used as penitentiaries, namely the one at Dawson and the other one at Whitehorse. The former has been inspected by me at least once a month during the preceding twelve months and the latter three times in the same period.

WHITEHORSE PENITENTIARY.

Superintendent A. E. Snyder is warden of the guard-room used as a penitentiary at Whitehorse. During the year he has had but one convict in his charge who was sentenced to serve two years in the guard room. This was Orlando McCraney who was imprisoned for theft by Mr. Justice Dugas on July 26, 1901, and who was pardoned on December 16, 1902.

Thirteen convicts en route, at various times, from Dawson to the British Columbia penitentiary have, however, been held in Whitehorse institution pending the arrival of a British steamer at Skagway; some have been detained as long as five days.

The building used as a guard-room, common jail and penitentiary though warm and comfortable, is too small for the purpose. Frequently there is not cell accommodation for all of the prisoners. Females and lunatics have to be cared for in the same room with other prisoners and as the cell partitions are of 2x4 scantling with spaces between, it is difficult to maintain discipline and prevent those under confinement from conversing with one another. I have asked the comptroller of the North-west Mounted Police for authority to build a proper guard-room next year.

Corporal McClelland is in charge of the prisoners at Whitehorse. The building was clean, properly ventilated and every possible precaution was observed for the safe custody of those in his charge. There were no complaints from any of the prisoners. The necessary records and books were properly kept. Prison clothing was in good order and clean. The food is cooked in the troop kitchen and carried to the guard-

room. What I saw was of good quality and sufficient in quantity.

During the day-time convicts are kept at work about the barracks or vicinity, with constables of the N.W.M. Police as escorts. There is no enclosure for them to labor in. They are employed in grading and levelling the grounds, sawing wood and assisting to erect buildings. If a convict be an artizan he is, if possible, given employment at his trade.

All property, equipment, tools, &c., of the institution belong to the N.W.M.P.

There has been no money received; all expenses are charged against the police vote and in return the Department of Justice refunds to the police \$2 per diem per convict.

The estimates for the coming year are included in those forwarded to the Comptroller of the N.W.M.P. at Ottawa.

DAWSON PENITENTIARY.

The building used as a guard-room, common jail and penitentiary is a log structure and is not suitable for the purpose. It is old, and while it has been kept in fair state

of repair, it will not be long before it will have to be replaced by a more suitable building. Its location also is not a desirable one, facing as it does on the main street of Dawson, nor is the interior arrangement of the building such as would afford an easy and swift exit of the inmates in ease of an outbreak of fire. In fact the doors are so awkwardly placed, on account of the shape of the building, that should such a calamity as an outbreak of fire take place, I fear a serious loss of life might occur. Another fault to be found with the present site is that adjacent to, and within three feet of the north wall of the guard room, is a two-storied structure occupied as a mess house by the staff of the Canadian Bank of Commerce. From the upper windows of this building it is possible to see into the penitentiary and for persons to converse by signs with the inmates of the cells were he or they disposed to do so. This also adds to the danger from fire as should a conflagration break out in the Bank of Commerce building nothing could save the penitentiary. The latter is built in the shape of an L, and under one roof are convicts, common jail prisoners, female prisoners and policemen sentenced to imprisonment for breaches of discipline. Occasionally also one or more lunatics are confined in the guard-room as we often have not sufficient men to put a staff in the insane asylum building as well as in the jail.

Superintendent A. R. Cuthbert of the N.W.M.P. is warden of the penitentiary and has a provost sergeant and an assistant provost in immediate charge of the guard

room.

The escorts during the day time are furnished by members of the N.W.M.P., which duty is taken turn about by the members of the division. At night a guard is mounted, sentries posted in the various corridors and a flying sentry outside. The number of escorts of course varies with the number of prisoners, each escort having one or two convicts to look after. Owing to the very short days in winter and the fact that all prisoners have to be worked in the open, there being no enclosure in barracks, the greatest care has to be taken that none escape. It is a daily occurrence for an escort to carry a lantern with him in order to see his prisoner during the greater portion of the working hours. Nevertheless, I am glad to be able to report that no prisoner has succeeded in making good his escape within the past twelve_months. One prisoner broke away from his escort in the dark but was recaptured within three days. Several dashes for liberty have been made within the last few years, but on every occasion the prisoner has been apprehended.

In the male convict portion of the prison there are 22 cells. Last year with the consent of the comptroller I had these cells refloored and lined with sheet iron, as the woodwork between them had shrunk to such an extent that it was possible to pass notes from one cell to another. The doors are locked by means of a lever which bolts all

doors in each corridor at once.

In the female portion of the penitentiary there are 7 cells and day and night matrons are employed to look after the inmates, of which there are at the present time two. In order to reach the women's ward one has to pass through the common jail portion of the building which contains 14 cells. Besides these there are 4 cells for police prisoners, 1 observation cell, 4 for casuals and capias prisoners, 2 dark cells for punishment, 1 cell for condemned felons, 2 for prisoners awaiting trial and one used as a store closet, in all 58 cells.

Provost Sergeant Hildyard has proved himself an excellent man for the position he fills. The whole premises are kept very neat and clean and it is a constant cause of remark among all visitors to the institution to see how scrupulously tidy everthing is.

The rations for the prisoners are drawn daily from the quartermaster's store and cooked in the convicts' kitchen by one of the prisoners. There have been but few complaints regarding food supplied, either as to quantity or quality. The washing for the institution is done by the female convicts and also all repairs to the clothing is attended to by them.

The convicts' uniform consists in summer of striped awning—brown and white—with the convicts' numbers stamped on the back of the coat. The women are dressed in navy blue serge. In winter the men are clothed in Mackinaw, one-half the suit of yel-

low and the other half black. The women are provided with cloaks to wear over their dresses. The latter are exercised daily for an hour in the open air. Various denominations hold services in the penitentiary mess room every Sunday which the convicts are allowed to attend.

I have on an average once a month visited the penitentiary and asked the convicts if they had any complaints, but none have as yet been brought to my notice, except in one instance when convict Sattler complained of loss of remission of sentence. His complaint was referred to you and the action of the warden upheld.

All moveable and immoveable property belongs to the Mounted Police. No money receipts have been taken in and all expenses have been charged to the Police Vote,

which in turn is re-imbursed by the Department of Justice,

The convicts are employed, as at Whitehorse, in improving the grounds, which until a couple of years ago were a swamp, adding additions to and erecting new buildings, sawing wood and when possible a prisoner is allowed to follow his trade, if an artizan.

Two executions have taken place during the year in Dawson, namely those of Fournier and LaBelle, the murderers of Bouthilette, Beaudoin and Constantin. These two men were hung on January 20. An enclosure was erected for the purpose adjoining one end of the penitentiary. The gallows was completely enclosed and heated, as the temperature was at 55 degrees below zero.

One convict, Andrew Greenan, who was sentenced by Mr. Justice Dugas on June 3, 1901, to three years penal servitude for theft, was released on August 31, on ticket-

of-leave, by your order.

With regard to the prevention of crime in the Yukon I beg leave to bring to your notice the fact, that like all mining camps, Dawson attracts a large percentage of the criminal classes. These arrive either via Skagway from Seattle, San Francisco or other coast towns, or via Fortymile from the lower river. These people very often make no attempt to hide their identity and in my opinion some law should be passed which would enable the police to turn them back at the boundary and refuse them admission to the territory. It has come to my knowledge that men and women arrested for offences in Seattle and San Francisco have promised to leave at once for the Yukon if given their liberty. One of the results of our having no exclusion law for this country to prevent the entry of such people is that in the spring they swarm in here from every direction. Many of them have not the means to pay their fare on steamer or railway and walk over the Pass and float down the Yukon in rafts or in small boats. I have brought this matter to the notice of the Commissioner of the Yukon Territory and he agrees with me that steps should be taken to prevent this influx and if I am not mistaken he has represented the matter to Ottawa. On arrival here the known criminals are met by members of the police, who inform them that their mode of living is known and advise them to move on. Sometimes our advice is taken but, on the other hand, many of them refuse to leave the territory or go out to the outlying creeks. We cannot prove a charge of vagrancy against them as we could not prove what they had been doing during the months previous to their arrival. It would be a great saving of money if the police at the boundary outposts could turn such people back.

As regards the Dawson penitentiary building I strongly recommend that a proper jail be built here and furnished with a proper staff. Owing to the low rate of pay in the Mounted Police and the high rate of wages paid in the territory a member of the force never remains in the service longer than he can help; the result is that we are constantly receiving new drafts from the North-west Territories to fill vacancies here. Very often our numbers are so reduced that the newcomers have to be put on escort duties and as guards over convicts before they have properly realized the serious nature of their work. Young and untried men consequently find themselves detailed for the safe-keeping of desperate criminals, and I am sure we would have many more attempts at escape were it not for the fact that all the prisoners realize that no steps would be left unturned, nor expense spared, to re-capture them, in which event they know another term of imprison-

ment would be awarded them.

If the government does not see fit to erect a common jail here, I have suggested that the present guard-room be torn down and a new one erected within the police enclosure, away from the public street. If this is done I would suggest that the members of the force, who are placed in charge of the prison, be specially detailed for that work, the same staff being constantly employed, and increased remuneration given them for this duty. This would do away with the necessity of putting recruits in charge of convicts. I do not think it is fair to the warden or to the provost or assistant provost to be constantly changing the escorts and guards. The former ought necessarily to know the character of the men before he entrusts to their care criminals who, everyone knows, will try to escape at the very first opportunity. Owing to the present system this is impossible, as every man takes his turn at guard and escort duty, often within a week of his arrival in Dawson.

The health of the convicts is looked after by Assistant Surgeon Paré at Whitehorse and by Assistant Surgeon Thompson at Dawson. Both of these medical officers visit the convicts daily, and I am glad to say that there has been little or no sickness during

the year in either penitentiary.

We have had few juvenile criminals to deal with, and in the cases which came before us the judge turned the offenders over to their parents, on condition that they sent them outside, rather than make them inmates of a jail with the class of people we have in our care in Dawson.

The sanitary arrangements of both penitentiaries are as good as is possible under the circumstances. Latrines are situated outside of the penitentiary buildings and some distance away. They are strongly built so that convicts cannot escape through the back or sides while the guard is waiting outside the door.

The conduct of the convicts has been good and the wardens have had to inflict but

few punishments.

Attached you will find reports from the wardens of each penitentiary, together

with a synopsis of the work for the past year.

During the period from October 1, 1902, to November 30, 1903, we have had twenty-seven convicts in confinement, two of whom were executed, thirteen sent outside to New Westminster, two released (time expired), two pardoned, one released on ticket of leave, leaving seven in the guard-room at the present date.

With respect to the working of the criminal law and penal system of Canada, no

injustice or hardship has resulted therefrom to my knowledge.

Sir,—In compliance with your instructions in letter of the September 23, ult., I beg to report as follows regarding the penitentiary as represented by the guard-room

of 'H' Division, Whitehorse.

The building in use for this purpose is, although warm and comfortable, in no way adapted for a prison, being too small to admit of sufficient cells being built to accomodate the number of prisoners we from time to time have, thereby necessitating some sleeping on floor of corridor. Furthermore the cells are built against the outer wall and the partitions of the cells are 2x4 scantling with space between, allowing prisoners to have intercourse with one another. These cells were only very temporarily built, as it was a waste of money to have constructed anything more permanent in a building so unsuited to the requirements.

The guard-room is under the immediate supervision of Corporal McClelland as

Provost, and assisted by the N.C.O., or constable in charge of the night guard.

The conduct of the penitentiary is governed by the rules and regulations for the government of convicts and the rules and regulations for the government of common jail prisoners as approved by order in council and contained in pamphlet supplied for our guidance this year.

Inspections are made daily of the penitentiary by the orderly officer and the assistant surgeon of the post, weekly by the officer commanding 'H' division and

periodically by yourself as inspector of penitentiaries.

The prisoners are asked daily by the orderly officer and weekly by the officer commanding division, and at their discharge by the officer commanding division, if they have any complaints, but I have not had a complaint made to me as yet.

I would strongly urge that some action be taken towards providing a guard-room

so that the work can be commenced early in the spring.

I have no further recommendations to make.

I attach a list showing the number of prisoners, the offences for which they were confined, and the period which they served.

Besides the above, 77 prisoners were received in the guard room and detained for a length of time ranging from twelve hours to three days, and discharged upon payment of fine or the case against them being dismissed.

The average duration of sentence was one month and ten days.

The one pardoned was Orlando McCraney who was sentenced to two years imprisonment with hard labour by Judge Dugas on July 26, 1901, and was pardoned December 16, 1902.

To the Assistant Commissioner, N.W.M.P., Yukon Territory, Dawson, Y.T.

SIR,—In compliance with your instructions of the 23rd inst., I beg to report as

follows in regard to the penitentiary comprised in guard-room at this post.

During the past year the immediate supervision of the penitentiary has been detailed to Sergeant Hildyard, as provost, and he has performed his duties in a most satisfactory manner, under the regulations made from time to time for its conduct, under the general provisions of the Penitentiary Act, and more recently under the rules and regulations for the government of convicts, approved by order in council as contained in a pamphlet supplied to us this year.

The provost is assisted by an assistant provost and the non commissioned officer of the night guard; during the day the convicts are in charge of police escorts while at their work, and at night in charge of the night guard, in the guard room; this arrangement has been found to work satisfactorily. One of the prisoners attends to the cooking of the food for the convicts. Few complaints have been made in the matter of food, or in fact under any other head. It is invariably the custom of myself, as wurden, to ask all convicts, on release, whether they have any complaints as to their treatment; none have yet been made.

The penitentiary has been inspected by yourself, as Inspector of Penitentiaries for the Yukon Territory, several times during the past year, and the convicts asked if they had any complaints. The officer commanding 'B' division inspected the penitentiary

once every week; the orderly officer inspects the penitentiary and guard-room daily and all convicts are asked if they have any complaints. The post surgeon makes a daily inspection of the penitentiary and guard-room and maintains strict obedience to sanitary matters. The health of the convicts during the past year has been exceptionally good.

There have been very few breaches of prison discipline, and with one exception,

none of a very serious nature.

On February 3, 1903, convict Sattler stole from the quarters of Inspector Taylor a package of tobacco and in attempting to smuggle it into the penitentiary was caught and placed under arrest. When the case came up before me this convict would give no information about the matter and tried to throw the blame on the constable who was in charge of him at the time. Subsequently he was sent before Magistrate Macaulay on a charge of theft and on February 4, received an additional sentence of one week imprisonment with hard labour.

The building used as a guard-room and penitentiary, although convenient, is an old

building which should be replaced in the not too distant future.

During the past summer repairs have been made to it, the floors which had sunk were raised and in other ways such as painting and calcomining, the interior has been greatly improved, and now has a bright and cheerful appearance. It has been at all times most cleanly, and its present state is in every respect as good as one could expect from a building not originally intended for a penitentiary.

Of the two men executed, Fournier and LaBelle, I quote the following from my

report to you of the event, written at the time the executions took place.

'On January 20, at a few minutes before 8 o'clock in the morning, Edward LaBelle and Victor Fournier were executed in accordance with the sentence of death passed upon them in October and November last, respectively, for the murder of one Leon Bouthilette in June last, and incidentally of Bouthilette's two companions, Beaudoin and Constantin. There was also another murder attributed to them, namely that of Archille Gilbault, which occurred shortly after the murder of the three men above mentioned and while in American territory. It would be difficult to conceive of any case where the death penalty has been carried out and in which seemingly, it was more deserved, than in the case of these two men. LaBelle died repentant and Fournier partially so. If one may judge from appearances both practically confessed to the crime proved against them before they were executed. Both men died at the same instant and death in both cases was instantaneous. There was no hitch of any kind in the proceedings. The temperature on that morning was 53 degrees below zero, and it was not much warmer inside of the temporary structure used as a scaffold, although we had put a stove in it. One of the spectators standing near the stove had his toes frozen.'

I do not know that any improvement can be made as to the management of the penitentiary, excepting in small matters which may arise from time to time and which can be dealt with as experience may suggest, but as stated above the time is not very far distant when it will become necessary to erect a new building containing modern im-

provements and with more accomodation than the present building affords.

I attach hereto a list showing the number of convicts confined during the year ended Sept. 30, 1903, their offences, number released on account of expiration of term, released on ticket-of-leave, pardoned, transferred to the New Westminster penitentiary; and also a list of convicts for whom application has already been made with a view of transferring them to the New Westminster penitentiary before the close of navigation this season.





REPORT

OF THE

DEPUTY MINISTER

DEPARTMENT OF MILITIA AND DEFENCE, OTTAWA, January 30, 1904.

The Honourable Sir F. W. Borden, K.C.M.G.,
Minister of Militia and Defence.

Sir,—I have the honour to submit the Annual Report of the Department of Militia and Defence for the year ending June 30, 1903.

It has been customary to prepare this report to the end of the financial year, and although it is not intended to make any change in that respect, yet I think it advisable, owing to the very great changes which have been made in the organization of the Department since the beginning of the present financial year—changes so important as to practically involve a reorganization—to make some reference thereto.

The development of the Department, which, for several years past, has been more rapid than during any like period since its organization, made it desirable that the custody and issue of Military Stores and the Engineer Services be organized as Military Branches of the Department, under military supervision and discipline. It was contemplated to have these changes and the organization of an Engineer and an Ordanace Corps as part of the Permanent Corps, consequent thereupon, date from July 1 last, but owing to the protracted length of the session, which terminated only on October 24, the changes were delayed for several months.

MILITARY BRANCH.

The present organization of the Department, so far as the branches under the control, or supervision, of the General Officer Commanding are concerned, is outlined in a

Minute of Council, dated October 29, 1903, which was promulgated as General Order 159, 1903, as follows:—

DISTRIBUTION OF DUTIES.

The General Officer Commanding.

1. The General Officer Commanding shall be charged with the military command and discipline of the militia, shall issue General Orders and hold periodical inspection of the militia.

He shall be the principal adviser of the Minister of Militia and Defence on all military questions and shall be charged with the control of the branches of the Adjutant General, the Director General of Military Intelligence and Military Secretary, and the

general supervision of the other military branches.

He shall be charged with the general distribution and localization of the militia, and with the selection and proposal to the Minister of Militia and Defence of fit and proper persons to be recommended for commissions in the militia, of fit and proper officers for promotions, for staff and other military appointments, and for military honours and rewards.

He shall be charged with the preparation and maintenance of plans for defence and

for the organization and mobilization of the militia.

In the absence of the General Officer Commanding, the Adjutant General shall act for him.

HEADQUARTERS STAFF.

The Adjutant General's Branch.

(a.) The Adjutant General shall be charged, under the control of the General Officer Commanding, with interior economy, military education and training of officers, warrant officers, non-commissioned officers and men of the militia.

With the matters relating to the general efficiency of the militia, and the effective

strength of its units.

With the allocation of the troops to their respective duties.

With patterns of clothing and necessaries.

With enlisting men for and discharging men from the militia.

With establishments, grants to rifle associations and bands, canteens, and the using of ranges, the preparation of General Orders, records of service, historical questions and archives; official militia list; revision of regulations and orders; dealing with returns and states, and issue of militia forms.

He shall also be charged with the organization and training of cadet corps.

With annually submitting proposals for the establishments for all the above services.

Intelligence Branch.

(b.) There shall be a Director General of Military Intelligence who shall, under the control of the General Officer Commanding, be charged with the collection of information on the military resources of Canada, the British Empire, and foreign countries.

He shall prepare maps of Canada of a suitable scale for the use of an army in the

field, and handbooks of military information of every portion of the country.

He shall command the Corps of Guides, and supervise and arrange the instruction

and duties of the members of that corps.

He shall arrange the provision of instructors for the militia at camps and elsewhere in reconnaissance and military surveying.

The Military Secretary's Branch.

(c.) There shall be a Military Sccretary who shall, under the control of the General Officer Commanding, besides other duties, be charged more particularly to deal with appointments, promotions and retirements of officers of the militia, and with military honours and rewards, the educational qualifications required from candidates for commissions in the militia and for promotion therein; Royal Military College examinations, including applications for admission; and the issue of military books and literature of an educational character.

In addition to the above duties he shall act as president and supervise the pro-

ceedings of the Medals Claim Board.

The Quartermaster General's Branch.

2. The Quartermaster General shall, under the supervision of the General Officer Commanding, be charged with supplying the militia with food, forage, fuel, light and quarters, with land and water transport, conveyance of stores, the movement of troops, the distribution of their barrack stores and equipment; with compensation for injuries to men and horses, and with administering the Army Service Corps and the Veterinary Service, and the establishments employed on the above services; with billeting and encamping of troops, appropriation of barracks, hospitals, buildings and lands in military charge; field, travelling and lodging allowances; remounts and castings of horses, and the registration of horses and transport for military requirements. He shall submit proposals for the annual estimates for the above services, and shall advise the Minister of Militia and Defence on all questions connected with the duties of his branch. He shall make such inspections as may be necessary to secure the efficiency of the services under his control.

Engineer Services Branch.

3. There shall be a Director General of Engineer Services who shall, under the supervision of the General Officer Commanding, be charged with the selection of sites for barracks, ranges, armouries, and maneuvring grounds, with the construction, maintenance and repairs of fortifications and defence works and with the maintenance and repairs of barracks, store buildings, ranges, and all buildings in military occupation; the inspection of ordnance factory buildings and engineer stores; with military railways and telegraphs, with the custody of militia lands and unoccupied buildings, with advising as to the design and issue of engineer and submarine stores; preparation of plans for all military requirements; custody of plans and occupation returns of barracks, &c. shall also be responsible for proper sanitary provision being made for all buildings and camps as well as the supply of water therefor; he shall advise on all questions relating to the technical instruction of the Corps of Engineers, and shall make such inspections as may be necessary to test the professional training of the officers and men of the corps, and to secure the efficiency of the services under his control; he shall submit proposals for the annual estimates for engineer services, including engineer stores; he shall advise the Minister of Militia and Defence on questions connected with the duties of the branch.

Ordnance Branch.

4. There shall be a Director General of Ordnance who shall, under the supervision of the General Officer Commanding, be charged with supplying the militia with warlike stores, except engineer stores; with the issue of equipment, clothing and necessaries; with supplying armament; with dealing with questions of armament, patterns of inventions and designs, and with the inspection of all stores, except engineer, medical and veterinary stores.

He shall administer the Ordnance Branch and the Ordnance Stores Corps, and shall make inspections of the government factories and such other inspections as may be necessary to secure the efficiency of the service under his control, as well as to ensure that militia units are properly supplied for taking the field with every requisite controlled by his branch.

He shall submit proposals for the annual estimates for the above services; and shall advise the Minister of Militia and Defence on questions connected with the duties of

his branch.

Medical Services Branch.

5. The Director General of Medical Services shall, under the supervision of the General Officer Commanding, be charged with the administration of the medical establishments of the militia and of the Militia Army Medical Corps, with dealing with sanitary questions relating to the militia, with the preparation of medical and sanitary statistical returns, and with the supply of medical stores to the militia. He shall advise the Minister of Militia and Defence as to the general distribution of the Militia Army Medical Corps, as to the appointment of officers to and their removal from responsible positions therein and on all other matters connected with his branch. He shall make such inspections as may be necessary to ensure the efficiency of the services under his control, and shall submit proposals for the annual estimates for medical services.

6. All correspondence for headquarters will be addressed:

The Adjutant General of Militia,
Militia Headquarters,
Ottawa.

All orders or regulations inconsistent with this Order in Council are hereby cancelled.

The principle of having the Quartermaster General and other heads of what are called Departments in the Imperial Service, under the supervision of the General Officer Commanding and advising the head of the Department direct, is borrowed from the War Office, and the organization of this Department is now similar to that of the War Office.

The adoption of this system afforded a solution of the difficulty which confronted you in transferring from the Civil to the Military Branch, Services involving a large expenditure of money, such as do the Engineer and Store Services.

THE CIVIL BRANCH.

The Civil Branch, since the transfer therefrom of the Engineer and Store Branches, comprises the Accountant's Branch, where all matters of pay concerning the Department are handled, the Contract Branch and the Chief Clerk's Branch.

The work of the Contract Branch was, prior to July 1 last, performed by the Secretary of the Department, and as the Chief Clerk conducted the correspondence, an anomaly existed. This has been done away with by changing the designation of the first referred to official from Secretary to Director of Contracts, and abolishing the designation Secretary. The duties with which the Director of Contracts is charged are defined by Minute of Council, dated December 12, 1903, and are as follows:—

'All work connected with the purchase of clothing necessaries, equipment, fuel, barrack and other stores, and all other supplies, services and works, including those demanded on service requisitions from the Dominion Arsenal, Royal Military College, Permanent Force, and Active Militia; the calling for and scheduling of all tenders, the preparation of all contracts, the checking of claims relating thereto.'

CENTRAL REGISTRY.

A change during the year which has been far reaching in improving the organization of the Department was the establishment, on July 1, of the Central Registry.

For some years the inconvenience of having five separate registries had been severely felt by yourself and others brought into contact with more than one branch of the Department, and you, yourself, were the first to recognize the advantages which would result from having the various offices merged into one.

After careful inquiry into the systems of the War Office, London, and the War Department, Washington, a system which was considered as likely to meet our requirements was framed and met with your approval. The British War Office and the Admiralty each has but one Registration Office. In the War and other Departments in Washington the registration of correspondence is by branches, but while this is the practice, there are many high officials in those Departments who think the concentration of the various registries would be an improvement over their present system. There does not appear, however, to be any tendency in that direction, attributable, in the main, to the immense size of the Departments. This reason does not apply to our Department, and it is believed that long before it has grown to such a size, the advantages of the central system will have been recognized by all.

There can be no doubt but that for economy, facility in referring papers from one branch to another, of which there is undoubtedly more in this Department than in any other in the public service, and the convenience of the head of the Department and of all those having to deal with more than one branch thereof, the advantages are all in favour of a central system.

All official correspondence for the Department, excepting that marked "Secret" and "Confidential", which is opened by the officer or official addressed, is now opened by the Chief Clerk, of whose branch the Central Registry is a division, who date-stamps and distributes it to the Registry Staff.

Another important change in connection with the registration of correspondence was the adoption of the Card System for indexing and recording. This system is extensively used in Libraries, Insurance Companies, and in the Public Departments in Washington. It certainly possesses great advantages over the old system, and it is confidently expected that time will demonstrate that it has all the advantages claimed for it.

The adoption of the Vertical system for filing, admitting of the use of Guide Cards, is another change which greatly facilitates the handling of correspondence in the Registry Office.

The Central Registry system has now been established some seven months. While I was, like yourself, satisfied that it would be a great improvement over the old method, I have now no hesitation in saying that it has been a greater factor in perfecting the organization of the Department than I expected, and that for simplicity, economy and as a means to thorough organization, it was well planned and is most effective in its operation.

DEPARTMENTAL LIBRARY.

A Departmental Library of books of reference and works on military subjects for the Staffs of the Department has been urgently needed for a long time, and during the last session of Parliament a small appropriation was made for the purpose of starting one.

Books are now being collected, and it is expected that at an early date we shall have a small library which will be a great benefit and convenience to the Department.

It is intended that the Librarian shall also act as Archivist of the Department. We have, belonging to the Department, many records of the war of 1812, the rebellion of 1837, and other valuable documents, which it has been the intention to classify. A Minute of Council of a recent date, however, requires that the records of the two campaigns named be handed over to the Dominion Archivist. As Dominion archives they will be, it is to be hoped, classified and made accessible, as it was the intention to have done with them here.

A Board, consisting of the Deputy Adjutant General and the Chief Clerk of the Department, have charge of the library, and they, with the Librarian and Archivist, comprise the Board charged with the classification and disposal of old records, etc.

NEW QUARTERS.

Owing to the very crowded state of the quarters occupied by the Department in the Western Block, the necessity for additional accommodation and the inconvenience of having several Branches of the Department in separate buildings, it was found to be absolutely necessary to secure new quarters. The Woods Block, which was being erected on Slater Street, afforded an opportunity of securing such quarters, and advantage was taken of it.

The new quarters, which have been laid out to suit the requirements of the Department, are commodious and well suited for its accommodation, and the work of the Department can be now carried on with greater facility and comfort to all.



Previous recommendation that a supply of rifles suitable for issue to lads composing Cadet Corps be procured is again brought forward. The rifle, heretofore issued, is too heavy for boys, and an additional reason is now submitted, *i.e.*, the fact that the supply

of even this arm, is now practically exhausted.

The number of Lee-Enfield rifles now in store charge is greatly reduced owing to recent issues to regiments and rifle associations. The increased use to which arms in charge of regiments and associations are subjected and the consequent wear on the barrels cannot fail to render very many of them unserviceable in the near future. To replace these a supply of rifles and component parts must be procured. The wear on barrels may be realized when it is understood that each of the rifles loaned to an association is fired on an average over 500 times annually with service ammunition.

Armourers attended the camps of instruction, recently held, to examine the rifles

in charge of the troops and effect necessary repairs.

The arsenal is gradually increasing the output of small arm ammunition, and the supply at the several stations is being gradually augmented, notwithstanding the greatly increased rate of free issues to Regiments and Civilian Rifle Associations, amounting to 200 rounds per member of the former and 100 to each member of the latter, annually.

Steps are being taken to replace the tents issued from Store to the Department of

the Interior.

A large supply of saddlery is required to meet issues to proposed increased strength in mounted establishment and possible requirements.

Reports from Superintendents of Stores show the condition regarding military

properties as unchanged.

The undersigned has much pleasure in bearing testimony to the zeal displayed by

the members of the inside and outside service in discharge of their duties.

There has been one change in the officers in charge of stations during the year, caused by the retirement of Lt.-Colonel Forrest and the appointment of Lt.-Colonel Boulanger as his successor. Lt.-Colonel Forrest had a long service, first as District Paymaster, and subsequently as Superintendent of Stores at the very important station of Quebec, in which capacity he discharged his duties faithfully.

APPENDIX C.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF ENGINEER.

The Deputy Minister of Militia and Defence, Ottawa.

Sir,—I have the honour to report that the following work was carried out under the supervision of the Engineer Branch during the financial year ending June 30, 1903.

GENERALLY.

RIFLE RANGES.

These most important adjuncts to military training have been increased throughout the different districts, as mentioned below. The construction during the last few years has been of a more permanent nature; in most cases concrete masonry and steel taking the place of wood.

QUEBEC WALLS.

The old town line walls, at Quebec, have practically been restored. A small annual expenditure, to keep these line walls in repair, by pointing, will now only be necessary.

A large expenditure, however, will still be required, for some years to come, to put the Citadel walls in a proper state of repair, though a considerable amount of this work has been completed, notably the walls facing the river and the different Bastions in the Citadel.

WATER SUPPLY FOR THE ROYAL MILITARY COLLEGE.

Some cases of typhoid fever, which occurred at the Royal Military College, were traced to a contaminated water supply. After going into the matter thoroughly, and making an exhaustive study of the same, the installation of a filter plant on the lines adopted in some of the larger American cities, such as Philadelphia and Albany, and also in a number of Canadian and foreign cities, was decided upon.

This plant is now under way, and, it is believed, will give entire satisfaction.

NEW QUARTERS FOR DEPT. OF MILITIA AND DEFENCE.

It having been decided that more extensive and suitable quarters were required for the Militia Department, a part of the new building, known as the Woods Building, on Slater Street, Ottawa, has been leased. The plans to convert this building into offices were made in this branch, and the work will be carried out under its immediate supervision.

A list of the general repairs carried on throughout the Dominion, in the different Military Districts, is given below.

MILITARY DISTRICT No. 1.

LONDON.

Wolseley Barracks.—These barracks were repaired generally, including Officers' Quarters. The plumbing throughout the barracks was examined and placed in a sanitary condition. Storm sashes were placed on the windows where necessary. A new concrete floor was laid in men's latrine.

Rifle Range.—Repairs were made.

CHATHAM.

The north wing of the old drill shed was repaired. The construction of a new drill shed is being considered.

DUNDAS.

The armoury extension here is about completed.

ST. THOMAS.

The grounds around this building were graded.

GODERICH.

Plans and specifications for the construction of a new rifle range have been prepared.

MILITARY DISTRICT No. 2.

TORONTO.

Stanley Barracks.—Extensive repairs were carried out at these barracks. A new coal and store shed was erected. General alterations were made at the R. C. D. sergeants' mess, canteen and library. The cavalry attached officers' quarters were enlarged and properly fitted up. The non-commissioned officers' quarters were painted and papered. Four hundred and fifty feet of new hose for fire protection was supplied. Minor repairs were made to the water pipes, which will shortly require renewal.

Store Building.—The old military buildings, used for old stores, require a large amount of repairing annually. It would be economy to build new modern buildings.

General repairs were made to the magazine. The ash pits were rebuilt, latrines renewed, night watchman's quarters and the sidewalks were generally repaired. Repairs were made to the block-house and soldiers' barracks. New gun platforms for saluting purposes were constructed, and a flag-pole was erected.

Drill Hall.—Miniature rifle gallery for G.G.B.G. and C.M.R. was altered and properly fitted up, extensive repairs to the roof of drill hall were carried out. New floors were laid in the basement, south tower, and lavatory. Electric light was substituted for gas, and repairs were made to floor in bowling alley. In view of the increased establishment of several of the city corps, the armouries were enlarged and fitted up.

Rifle Range, Long Branch, 1,000 yards.—Six new steel target frames were fitted up here. The firing point was extended to eighty feet in length. The firing points at 800 yards and 900 yards were also extended to the same length. A telephone system

for the 1,000 yards firing point to the targets, was installed. A new fence along the road was erected. All the buildings were painted, the chimneys raised, and the sidewalks around the buildings renewed, and the remainder repaired. This range is now in a satisfactory condition.

BRANTFORD.

Drill Hall.—Repairs generally were made to this building. Plans for the improvement of the building are now being prepared.

NIAGARA-ON-THE-LAKE.

Camp Grounds.—These grounds were repaired for the different camps. A new flag-pole was erected. The supply shed was altered and repaired. The rifle range is being reconstructed and fitted up with steel target frames and concrete markers' mantlet.

WHITBY

Armoury.—A miniature rifle gallery was fitted up and minor repairs were made to the drill shed.

SIMCOE.

The roof of this armoury was renewed and the chimney repaired.

SARAWAK.

A plan for the proposed construction of a rifle range was prepared.

MILITARY DISTRICTS Nos. 3 AND 4:

KINGSTON.

Tête-de-Pont Barracks.—These barracks were repaired generally. A new bath was fitted up in the hospital, eavetroughs in blocks "A" and "E" were repaired, new windows, &c., placed in riding school. The furnaces at Fort Henry were repaired. Extensive alterations were made to the men's w.c's., to put them in a sanitary condition. New floors were laid in married men's quarters. The passages in block "C" were painted and papered.

Barriefield Camp Grounds.—A supply shed was constructed for the new company of the Army Service Corps. The grounds were fitted up for camp with horse troughs. Permanent water supply pipes, with the necessary stands, taps, &c., were laid all along camp lines.

THE ROYAL MILITARY COLLEGE.

In order to improve the fire protection, a new duplex pump was installed. New hose and hose reels were supplied. New reading and billiard rooms were fitted up in the basement of the main building. The drain from the hospital was relaid. The parade ground was repaired. The old gymnasium was converted into an artillery drill shed for the instruction of the cadets. A survey and soundings were made for the laying of 350 feet of intake pipe, which is under contract. This is to be used in conjunction with the new filter system being installed there.

A new gymnasium has been erected by the Department of Public Works, and is completed with the exception of the apparatus. Plans have been prepared for the erection of a combined skating rink and drill shed.

Drill Hall.—The interior was painted. A rifle gallery for practice was fitted up. The acoustic properties of the hall were improved, and the building kept in general repair.

Rifle Range.—The construction of a new rifle range here is under consideration, and will be undertaken as soon as a satisfactory site can be secured.

PETERBOROUGH.

A survey was made here for a proposed new rifle range. The caretaker's quarters at the drill hall were repaired. The construction of a new drill hall is also being considered.

RICHMOND, ONT.

A new four-target rifle range was constructed here.

CARLETON PLACE.

The site for the rifle range here was changed. The targets were moved to the new site and erected there.

MILITARY DISTRICT No. 5.

MONTREAL.

Several repairs were made to Victoria Rifle Armoury. The fence around the Papineau Road cemetery was renewed. Repairs were made to the caretaker's quarters, Papineau Road cemetery.

Drill Hall.—The roof was generally repaired. The heating system was overhauled and placed in proper working order. New cupboards for the storage of the clothing and equipment were fitted up in the armoury of the 5th Royal Scots. -A new block floor was laid in the gun shed.

An armoury for the Engineer company was fitted up in the Point St. Charles Amateur Athletic Association Building.

Rifle Range, Pointe-aux-Trembles.—The construction of this rifle range was completed. Wells were sunk and the targets repaired.

THREE RIVERS.

Camp Grounds.—These grounds were generally fitted up for use of the troops during annual training.

MILITARY DISTRICT No. 6.

ST. JOHN'S, P.Q.

New storm windows were supplied for 'A' and 'B' blocks. The foundation walls of the hospital were partially rebuilt. The barracks were generally repaired. The roof of the officers' quarters was renewed with best galvanized iron, and chimneys of same properly repaired and painted.

The old drill shed was demolished, and a new brick building erected instead.

MILITARY DISTRICT No. 7.

QUEBEC.

Drill Hall.—The roof was generally repaired and ventilators were removed there-

from. A watercloset was installed in caretaker's quarters.

New waterclosets were fitted up in the cells building, Citadel. Chimneys of casements were painted. Walls of Citadel hospital were painted. General repairs were made at Mann's store. General repairs were made to outside walls of married men's quarters. The roof in 'D' married men's quarters was altered and repaired. The chimney in officers' quarters, Citadel, was repaired, The drainage at officers' quarters St. Louis St., was repaired and placed in a sanitary condition. Military buildings at the Citadel and the road leading to the same were generally repaired. The sidewalks in St. John Street and Arsenal Street were renewed. The fence around grounds was repaired. The quarters of the Superintendent of Stores was repaired. A new stable for a riding school was erected.

Fortification Walls, Citadel.—The work of repairing and rebuilding these walls was continued at the following places: The King's, Mann's, and Richmond Bastions.

LÉVIS.

The work of repairs to the forts was continued, but with the small appropriation available for these services, it is impossible to properly carry out all the repairs required.

DOMINION ARSENAL, QUEBEC.

These buildings were generally repaired. An artillery workshop and an iron foundry were constructed by the Department of Public Works. The Webster system of heating was installed in most of the buildings. The roof on the north side of the main factory was renewed, and new steam connection was made in the shell factory.

MILITARY DISTRICT No. 8.

FREDERICTON.

Barracks.—The barracks, including the officers' quarters, were generally kept in repair. A new stable for the officers' horses and new quarters for the sergeant-major are being erected by the Department of Public Works.

Rifle Range.—The construction of a new rifle range, at St. Mary's, is now under way and will shortly be completed.

ST. JOHN, N.B.

 $Store\ Buildings.$ —The store buildings were kept in repair. The flag station was repaired.

Drill Shed.—Minor repairs were made to the roof of the drill shed.

Rifle Range.—The markers' screen at the rifle range was repaired.

Artillery Range.—The range for artillery practice was fitted up at Fort Dufferin, and pedestals for 6 prs. and 12 prs. Q. F. guns put down.

MONCTON.

Rifle Range.—A survey and plan of the proposed rifle range were prepared, and the construction is now being considered.

MILITARY DISTRICT No. 9.

HALIFAX.

Store Building.—General repairs were carried out.

Drill Shed.—General repairs were carried out.

Rifle Range.—The rifle range at Bedford was completed, and a new competitors' building erected thereon.

PICTOU.

Armoury.—The armoury here was repaired.

BRIDGEWATER.

Drill Shed.—The drill shed here was repaired.

KENTVILLE.

Rifle Range.—A survey and plan of proposed rifle range were made here.

MILITARY DISTRICT No. 10.

WINNIPEG.

Fort Osborne Barracks.—These barracks were generally repaired. The question of the construction of new non-commissioned officers' quarters, hospital, district stores, magazine, &c., at this station is being considered.

MILITARY DISTRICT No. 11.

VICTORIA.

Drill Hall.—General repairs were made to the drill hall.

Armouries.—The construction, by the Department of Public Works, of company armouries for the Rocky Mountain Rangers, at the following places, is under way:—Rossland, Nelson, Kamloops, Kalso and Revelstoke.

Rifle Ranges.—A grant of money was made for fitting up a rifle range at Dawson.

MILITARY DISTRICT No. 12.

CHARLOTTETOWN.

Drill Shed.—Extensive repairs, and alterations, have been made to the drill shed, for the better accommodation of the local militia.

Store Building.—The store building was generally repaired.

OTTAWA BRIGADE.

Drill Hall.—General repairs were made to this building. In order to provide for the increased establishment of the Field Artillery, the organization of an Engineer corps and the Army Medical corps it was necessary to build an addition on the east side of the hall. Even with this addition the Cavalry, Artillery and Infantry, are very much crowded.


The G.G.F.G. sergeants' mess was damaged by fire, and was repaired.

Militia Store.—New cupboards and general repairs were made here, and a new shed erected in rear of the present building.

Rifle Range, Rockcliffe.—The stop butt was extended eastward for a distance of about one hundred feet. Wiring for electric light was installed in all buildings. A new tank for the water supply was erected and a hot air engine, for pumping water, installed. The river bank at the range has been protected by piles, driven opposite each firing point, in order to prevent landslides, which occur frequently at this place. The range was generally repaired under the supervision of this branch.

APPENDIX D.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT DOMINION ARSENAL.

Dominion Arsenal, Quebec, Feb. 12, 1904.

The Deputy Minister of Militia and Defence.

SIR,—I have the honour to report as follows upon the operations of this establishment for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1903:—

CARTRIDGE FACTORY.

The machinery ordered in England, last year, for increasing the output of this factory has been delivered, and is being installed as rapidly as circumstances will permit. Delays have, however, arisen in the completion of our new workshops, preventing the operation of all the new plant, and the output will, therefore, be less than was anticipated.

The system of paying for work by the piece continues to give satisfaction, and what was once an experiment has become a necessity, it being found that when people have some inducement they exert themselves more to do a fair day's work. It would be impossible to obtain the maximum output of the plant under any other system.

The process of annealing cartridge metal has been greatly improved by the use of rotary furnaces, and the burst cases formerly observed have disappeared almost entirely. The microscopic examination of metal undergoing this treatment is now performed as a regular factory test, and beneficial results are hoped for.

The best results are, however, only attainable by the use of gas fuel, and now that the plant is sufficiently large to justify the outlay, this feature will receive consideration. Producer gas will be used in the Rolling Mill, and for forging steel shells, in addition

to cartridge annealing.

No. 2 danger building has been lengthened to provide accommodation for additional machinery. This building was greatly overcrowded and work was carried on with difficulty. The increased space is ample to meet present requirements.

The motive power for the laboratory is generated by an old upright engine, which is insufficient to operate the extra load now carried. This engine could be used in the

foundry and a more powferful one should be purchased in its place.

The proof targets and firing point have been connected by telephone, thus doing away with a tedious system of signalling, which caused a great loss of time. The experiments commenced last year with a view to improving the method of firing velocity proofs of ammunition have been continued with highly satisfactory results. This work is now done in less than one-third the time formerly required, and with greater accuracy. A report will be submitted at the conclusion of the experiments.

The quality of the ammunition manufactured appears to be satisfactory, as no complaints of importance have been received during the year. The Gallery Practice Cartridge introduced last year appears to have become popular with Rifle Associations and riflemen generally. As cheapness is one of the essentials of this cartridge, new cases cannot be used in their manufacture, so that for a supply we must depend solely on getting back the empty cases of ball ammunition which has been fired off. The quantity we can manufacture is thus limited by the amount of fired cases returned. Unfortunately, the regulations providing for the return of fired cases are not generally

observed, and the public is thus largely deprived of the benefit of being able to obtain, at a nominal price, a cartridge which has proved satisfactory for the purpose required.

Cannon cartridges required during the year have been manufactured, a statement

of which is included in the list at the end of this report.

The Rolling Mill, and Foundry connected therewith, erected for the manufacture of cartridge metal, have commenced operations. This work will be carried out with great care until the quality of our product has been assured; it will, however, be necessary for a short time yet to proceed with the manufacture of ammunition entirely independent of the Rolling Mill.

The velocity of ·303 Small Arm Ammunition was increased during the year; this would have been done sooner, but that we were delayed by the non-receipt of new connecting rods for Maxim Guns, which are necessary with this ammunition. The change

has produced a marked effect in the accuracy of shooting.

SHELL FACTORY.

The installation of the hydraulic forging plant, commenced last year, has been completed, and we shall shortly be in a position to proceed with the regular manufacture of forged steel projectiles. Duplicate sets of tools have been made, and much work done on gauges, &c., required for the operation of the plant.

Protracted delays, due to causes beyond the control of the Department, have arisen in connection with the construction of the new Iron Foundry in St. John's Bastion. As soon as this building is available work will be resumed on the manufacture of iron shells

and other castings required in general manufacture.

The lighting of the foundry will be supplied from the generator in our own power house, and telephonic communication with the various departments is being provided.

ARTILLERY WORKSHOP.

The construction of this building was completed during the year, but for various reasons the installation of machinery has been greatly delayed. This has unfortunately interfered with the operation of the cartridge factory, as the whole of the machinery recently purchased for this Factory could not be employed. As soon as the shafting and other work required are completed efforts will be made to regain time lost. This department can render valuable services in connection with the repair of artillery materiel and ordnance. It is hoped that the policy of giving a portion of the orders for field artillery carriages and transport to the Arsenal may be put into effect, as we are in a position to do this work. The advisability of doing a portion of this work in the Arsenal is a matter which deserves attentive consideration, and will be alluded to further.

Experiments have been commenced with a view to deciding on a suitable pattern of sleigh for the use of Field Artillery, and it is hoped that during the present winter a definite pattern can be submitted for adoption

MAINTENANCE AND REPAIRS.

A large amount has been expended under this head in making various alterations to buildings. Among the most important may be mentioned the installation of the Webster Heating System, which now embraces the entire establishment.

The policy pursued during recent years of expending annually a certain amount to

keep our property in good working order is beginning to bear fruit.

For years nothing had been done, and the outlay required to restore falling walls and unsound foundations has necessarily been very great. The expenditure of money in this manner does not produce results which are apparent to the casual observer, but henceforth additional outlay will be more in evidence.

INSPECTION OF SMALL ARMS.

The duties of Inspector of Small Arms in connection with the Ross Rifle Works were assigned to me during the year. A department embodying the following features is therefore being organized for the performance of this service.

1. The steel and other raw materials will be analysed chemically, on delivery, to

ascertain that they are of suitable quality.

2. A testing machine has been purchased for carrying out tensile and other physical tests of this material.

3. Barrels will be tested by firing proof charges giving pressures in excess of the ordinary service pressure, and each barrel withstanding this test successfully will receive

a proof mark

4. All components of the rifle will be delivered separately before assembling, and will be gauged to ascertain that all are alike, and interchangeable. Great importance is attached to the feature of interchangeability of parts, which will permit of repairs being made to disabled arms on service by simply-removing the damaged component from the injured rifle and replacing it with a new component taken from among the spare parts; this can be done by any man of ordinary intelligence.

5. Every component will receive a view mark previous to assembling.

6. The complete rifle will be thoroughly examined for fitting of parts and quality of workmanship.

7. Finally every rifle will be fired to test the adjustment of the sights and accuracy

of shooting.

8. Extensive sets of gauges are being made to carry out the above, and weapons not complying with the foregoing tests will be liable to rejection.

Deliveries of finished arms are expected sometime during the year.

GENERAL.

The following gentlemen have been appointed to the staff, during the year:—Chemist, A. E. Macintyre, Esq., Ph.D. Medical Officer, Major J. D. Brousseau, A.M.S.

The increase of work, particularly in connection with the inspection of small arms, has necessitated the appointment of a chemist who will devote his whole time to this branch. Great benefit will be derived inasmuch as manufacturing operations can be conducted with greater certainty and method. Modern requirements call for the use of the best scientific methods and appliances; this is particularly true in the manufacture of ammunition and warlike stores. Our equipment, while small, is suitable for the work in hand, and favorable results are confidently hoped for.

All the new departments have been connected by private telephone, which is not

only a great convenience, but saves an immense amount of time.

The following is a list of machinery purchased during the year:—4 double vertical drawing machines, 2 vertical drawing machines, 2 indenting machines, 2 machines to cut case to length, 1 toggle jointed heading machine, 2 tapering machines, 1 stamping machine, 1 piercing machine, 2 head turning machines, 2 machines to reamer end of case, 1 point forming machine, 1 machine to press home lead core, 1 machine to close envelope, 3 patent necking and bulleting machines, 2 machines for stabbing and coning case, 1 lubricating machine, 1 discing machine with pump.

Money has been voted by Parliament to the Department of Public Works, for the

Money has been voted by Parliament to the Department of Public Works, for the erection of a new Store Building. We are particularly in need of additional storage, and have great difficulty in finding room for the numerous materials employed. The delay and expenses attending the handling of stores under present conditions is a dis-

advantage which, it is hoped may be removed during the ensuing year.

Our books for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1903, show that, given sufficiently large orders, ammunition can be manufactured here at a rate which compares most favorably with the cost of manufacture in England. What has been done in the case of ammunition can also be done with other descriptions of warlike stores. It is therefore

hoped that the Department will see its way clear to giving us a reasonable proportion of orders for Field Artillery and transport carriages, as we have all facilities for carrying on this work in a proper manner.

I regret to record the death of Mr. A. J. Duchesnay, accountant, who had been connected with this establishment since its foundation. By his death the Department

sustains the loss of a painstaking and capable officer.

PART II.

REPORT

OF THE

GENERAL OFFICER COMMANDING

The Honourable

The Minister of Militia and Defence, Ottawa.

Sie,—I have the honour to submit the following report on the Militia, with appendices thereto, for the year ending December 31, 1903.

ENROLMENT AND TRAINING.

The first and most pressing need of the Militia is a system of enrolment and training adapted to the convenience of the people in time of peace, capable of large expansion in time of war, and maintained at the least possible cost consistent with efficiency, and to carry out those ideas I have submitted a detailed scheme of organization and training which has been adopted.

ESTABLISHMENTS.

In order to carry out the scheme thus outlined, I have prepared Establishment Lists, of which the following is a resumé:—

NOTES AS TO THE NEW ESTABLISHMENTS.

The general lines on which the new establishments have been drawn up are as follows:—

To provide for peace-training establishments for the various units. These establishments include all the officers and non-commissioned officers of corps and certain percentages of the rank and file. The total of the peace establishments will consist of 46,043 men.

To provide for war establishments for all units. Our present units expanded to war strength by the new establishments will provide 100,000 men. This will be Canada's first line of defence.

In addition to this important first line, these establishments further provide sufficient officers and non-commissioned officers to form the basis of a second line. For example, each regiment of infantry will have a Field Officer, and each company a Captain, a Subaltern, a Sergeant, a Corporal, and two men as their nuclei for this purpose, the intention being that as soon as the first line has been mobilized for active service these nuclei will at once set about training duplicates of the corps which have gone to the front; so, in a very short time after hostilities have commenced, another line of 100,000 men can be put into the field.

All the officers and non-commissioned officers of the first line will be available for both peace-training and war service, and the men will be divided into two classes,

as follows :--

(a.) Those engaging for both peace and war service, who will be paid and be liable for training in peace.

(b.) Those engaging for war service only.

The officers and non-commissioned officers who form the nuclei of the second line

will be required to do training in time of peace.

These establishments, it is pleasing to know, have been given your approval. I strongly urge that provision should be made as soon as possible for the supply of the ordnance, arms, equipment, and ammunition necessary for the 100,000 men constituting the first line of defence, and that also the provision of rifles and ammunition necessary for the second line of defence should be seriously taken into consideration.

PROVISION OF LEADERS.

I have already brought to your notice a very important point connected with the efficiency of the Militia, namely, the provision of leaders. The urgency of this matter is as great as ever. To realize how great it is one has but to turn to the pages of the Militia List and see the vast number of officers who are appointed provisionally because they are not professionally qualified. The question of leaders involves not only the education of those we now have, but the supply of fresh ones to provide for the increased establishments.

EDUCATION.

As you are aware, this work is undertaken by the Permanent Corps scattered over the country in very small units, forming Schools of Instruction. The system which has been in vogue for some years past has been very unsatisfactory. For instance, it has permitted a provisional subaltern, young, inexperienced and untried, to enter and at once obtain a certificate which entitled him to the command of his regiment without any further promotion examination, and without any obligation to keep himself up to date in military knowledge, although many years might elapse between the date of his certificate and his coming to the command.

Such a system is evil. Examinations for promotion have their great value for two reasons. They keep the inefficient man from rising to a place for which he is unfitted, and they ensure that at certain intervals in his military career the officer shall study the ever-changing science of war. Without such continuous study no man is fitted to be placed in a position of command which may involve not only the lives of the men

entrusted to him but the honour of his country.

That the results of such a system are fatal to efficiency has been shown to me during my inspection. After much consideration and discussion with officers and non-commissioned officers all over Canada, I came to the conclusion that the fault existed in the system and could not be charged against the persons concerned. They all said the same thing: 'We wish to qualify, we wish to become efficient soldiers, but we are busy men. Our business demands our constant attention, and we cannot afford to leave it for the purpose of qualifying under the present system.' All that is true. The natural leaders of the people—those who should lead and direct the people in the day of trouble—are the busiest men, and it is undeniable that the busiest men make the best officers.

In order to meet these difficulties I have drawn up a plan with the object of completely changing the system of instruction.

This plan is embodied in—

(a.) A Regulation proposed to be passed by the Governor General in Council, giving authority for the laying down of the details.

(b.) A Militia Order founded upon that Regulation and containing the details.

These details may be shortly stated as follows:—

All examinations for promotion may be divided into five classes. Each class will be carried on throughout the year, divided into courses of twelve days (or more for special arms).

The First Class is for the appointment of Lieutenant.

The Second Class is for promotion of Lieutenant to Captain.

The Third Class is for promotion of Captain to Major, or for appointment of Adjutant.

The Fourth Class is for promotion to Lieutenant-Colonel Commanding. The Fifth Class is for promotion to Staff and Higher Commands.

A candidate for a commission will be first appointed provisionally. After a course of theoretical work studied at his own discretion at home and at his Head-Quarters, he will proceed to a School of Instruction or to the Central Camp. Here he will take a 12 days' course in Class I, at the end of which he may take the examination. If he fails to pass, or if he does not feel equal to the test, he may either stay on for another course of identical work or he may go home and come up again later on. He may repeat this course four times before qualifying. A similar programme has to be gone through for promotion to the rank of Captain in Class II. For the Third Class — promotion to Major or Adjutant—and for the Fourth Class—promotion to the command of a regiment—the system of courses is the same, but instead of their taking place at Schools of Instruction they must be held at the Central Camp of Instruction, and will embrace a thorough tactical training. The Fifth Class—for promotion to Staff and Higher Commands—is on the same lines as the Fourth, and also must be held at the Central Camp.

There is a similar course of training for non-commissioned officers, divided into three classes. The first two classes may be held at local Schools of Instruction, the last must be held at the Central Camp. This plan for the education of officers has been approved by you and will be carried into effect as soon as possible. I look to very good results from this change of system, but as a further means to the desired end I would strongly urge a reconsideration of the scale of allowances to officers and non-

commissioned officers attending Schools of Instruction.

GENERAL MILITIA TRAINING.

Having dealt with the education of officers and non-commissioned officers, I will now refer to the training of the whole force in all its ranks. Last year I drew up the following plan, and in doing so I had two considerations in view: one, that even a moderate scheme for the defence of this country must be based on the fact that a considerable force will be required; the other, that the cost of bringing the whole enlisted personnel at once to a high standard of efficiency is more than the people are willing to undertake at the present time, so my aim has been to give the largest possible preparation for war at the least possible immediate outlay. The main idea is, that a few in every unit shall be thoroughly versed in the art of war through instruction given at the Central Camp by the best men of every arm in Canada; that a larger number shall be fairly instructed by the better taught and more capable few above named, who would go straight from the Central Camp to District Camps, and that finally, on the alarm sounding, the whole 'skeleton' thus constructed shall be clothed with 'flesh and blood' by the addition of men who can shoot fairly well and have some slight knowledge of a soldier's work and duties-that knowledge being acquired partly in the ranks and partly through association with their Company Head-Quarters, its lectures, and its library. Such a force, on

taking the field, should be able in a short time to develop the necessary cohesion, discipline and handiness to enable it to perform its duties satisfactorily. It would provide the country with a larger nucleus of trained men than now exists, and it would have great-advantage over the present system in producing a large field army. It has been repeatedly demonstrated, and never more clearly than in the late war in South Africa, that quite raw troops can be turned into efficient and trustworthy soldiers in a very short time, provided they are gifted with the right soldierly qualities, and have good and experienced officers and non-commissioned officers and a small proportion of trained privates to stiffen the ranks and enable the others to pick up their work by constant example and imitation. If, in addition, the mass is composed of good rifle shots a very formitable body of men can soon be placed in the field.

But without good leaders and a nucleus of trained men, this result can only be obtained after long and painful probation and sad experience. In war, as in everything else, the blind can lead the blind only to destruction. If all are equally ignorant and the leaders are incapable, mutual distrust, unsteadiness, want of discipline, and panic

are inevitable, in the first serious action.

Of course the proposed system, like every other system, depends on the quality of those who undertake the training, on the personal element in fact. It is therefore of the first importance that the selection of officers and non-commissioned officers for the important duty of training shall be subject to the closest scrutiny, that appointments of a permanent nature shall be probationary, and that only those who have proved their fitness shall be confirmed in their appointments.

CENTRAL CAMP.

Those who would attend the Central Camp during the year would include the Permanent Corps, the Instructional Staff of the Militia, and a proportion of the officers and non-commissioned officers of every unit, the whole body of officers and non-commissioned officers if possible attending in rotation. Extra grants might be made to those who passed a satisfactory examination at the end of their course. In this Central Camp of Instruction the Field Officers would learn the higher aspects of the command of troops in the field, with well trained troops who would be constantly manoeuvring, and would learn their work generally in a way that is impossible under present conditions, hampered as they are by the necessity of continually turning back to the most rudimentary stages of instruction, and by never having time to get their regiments sufficiently trained to enable them to go on to more advanced work.

My desire is that at the Central Camp there shall be buildings for messes for both officers and non-commissioned officers, each building having its mess-room, library and sitting room. Also, there should be a large building to seat at least 1,000 men where, every night, would be held lectures on some military subjects or on the operations proposed to be carried out on the following day. The subject-matter of these lectures would be assisted by illustrations thrown on a screen by means of a lantern or some similar

method.

It is most desirable too that troops attending this camp shall be housed in cheap wooden buildings, containing cubicules with sleeping and washing accommodation for each officer and non-commissioned officer.

DISTRICT CAMPS.

The District Camps should still be held, as they have been, at various convenient local centres throughout the country, and should be attended by the Peace Establishment of every unit. At those places the value of the Central Camp would be demonstrated, for the officers and non-commissioned officers who had attended it would be well fitted to deal effectively with their local corps, and in that respect would be markedly superior to those who had not had the benefit of such preparation.

CITY CORPS TRAINING.

A proposal to give City Corps a certain amount of training in camp has been partly adopted, and this year facilities are to be afforded to some of them to do four days of their annual drill in this way.

MILITIA CAMPS, 1903.

In the course of the year I attended the Militia Training Camps as under:

London, Niagara-on-the-Lake, Kingston, Deseronto, Three Rivers, Sussex, Aldershot.

All ranks took a great deal of interest in their work, and seemed to have been greatly benefited by the system of instruction employed. The benefit derived from the instructional placards issued to the militia has been specially noticeable. The natural intelligence of the men was very marked, proving to me that the only thing required is for the leaders to be properly trained.

Some corps came into camp very weak in numbers, it being impossible to get the

men owing to the high rate of wages prevailing.

HORSE SHELTERS AT CAMP,

I am strongly of opinion that in standing camps rough shelters for the horses should be provided. The best shelters I have ever seen are those erected by the 8th Hussars at the Sussex Camp, New Brunswick. The great satisfaction given to horse owners, upon whose good will we depend for our Artillery and Cavalry efficiency, will more than repay the small cost of horse shelters, irrespective of the diminution that must ensue in claims for compensation for injuries sustained.

HIGHER COMMANDS.

I have proposed that a new system of administration be introduced which will correct the two great weaknesses of the present military system, by giving it decen-

tralization and more closely identifying the peace and war organizations.

In this system the present District Commands would be retained, subject to the modification of their boundaries, and the creation of fresh ones as population increased, particularly in the West; and, without in any way interfering with the general administration exercised by the Commanders of those districts, there should be higher Commands created—First Class Commands—under specially selected officers, whose duties in time of peace would be to supervise the drill and training of the Corps within their respective areas, and make the necessary inspections of both personnel and materiel with the purpose of securing the constant realiness of the troops for war.

I therefore recommend that there should be five such Commands, and that they be designated First Class Commands, and that the troops composing them be drawn from

the following areas:-

A. 'Maritime Provinces' including the present Districts 8, 9 and 12.
B. 'Quebec' " 5, 6 and 7.
C. 'Eastern Ontario' " 3 and 4.
D. 'Western Ontario' " 1 and 2.
E. 'The North-west' " 10 and 11.

It must be understoood, however, that the allotment and subsequent employment of the troops thus geographically divided will not necessarily be limited to the areas of these Commands respectively, but that they may be utilized as the exigencies of mobilization dictate.

Every Command should contain within itself everything that is required to enable the troops contained in it to take the field and operate for a period of at least three months, independent of external sources of supply,—arms, equipment, ammunition, transport, stores of every kind other than food; in a word, everything necessary for the subsistence and action of the troops composing the Command should be at the call of its Commander; and he would be responsible to the General Officer Commanding that the troops in his area were fully provided with everything necessary to this end. In this work he would be assisted by a Permanent Staff Officer, by the District Officers Commanding and by their Staffs.

DISTRICT COMMANDS.

Last year I drew your attention to the inadequate powers of the District Officers Commanding. In theory their responsibility is great, but in practice, owing mainly to the rigid control over expenditure which is exercised from Head-Quarters, they are little more than inspecting officers who form the medium of communication between the regiments and Head-Quarters. Such a system of centralization is opposed to recognized principles of sound administration, and it is very desirable, in the interest of the efficiency of the Militia, that greater powers and a certain liberty of initiative should be given to the District Officers Commanding.

ARRANGEMENT OF ARMS.

In order to give effect to the new scheme, which provides for an army of 100,000 men, it will be necessary to make some rearrangement to give them their due proportion in the general organization. This will entail a somewhat large increase in the Cavalry, Artillery and Engineers, in which arms we are at present weak—at first sight it would appear to involve a decrease in the present number of infantry units. This decrease, however, will have to be carried out with caution, if at all. I propose that it shall only be done by lopping off dead branches. With the exception of the dead branches, I do not think that it would be wise to strike off Infantry units until we see how many men will enroll in them for war service under the new scheme. As opportunity occurs from time to time, I will propose to you the substitution, man for man, of the other arms until the due proportions have been reached and a well-balanced army has been provided, at the same time endeavouring to increase the Militia where it is unduly weak and most required.

With Canada's immense extent of frontier and the great distances involved, it is of the utmost importance that the Cavalry should be increased, not only in some places in the East, but especially in the North-west. No country in the world is in greater need of large numbers of efficient Cavalry armed with the rifle, than is Canada. Cavalry and Artillery are popular arms with the people. A regiment was turned from Infantry into Cavalry in May last year, yet it came into camp in July over 400 strong, and I am informed that so keen was the desire of the farmers of the Eastern Townships to take a share in the defence of the country that pickets had to be placed on the stations to keep recruits back. I have recommended the formation of the Eastern Townships Cavalry into a Brigade. I have also submitted to you proposals for the conversion of the 79th Regiment into a Cavalry regiment. I also consider that the place of annual training for the cavalry of the Eastern Townships should be within that locality, provided a suitable

site can be found.

As the organizations of Cavalry increase in various other parts of the country, it will be desirable to provide local areas for manoeuvres.

ARTILLERY.

Field Artillery Training.

The instruction carried out was much the same as last year, except that the recent changes in Field Artillery Fire Discipline were introduced, and, on the whole, the training was very satisfactory considering the restricted nature of the training ground.

I trust that better facilities in this respect will be available for next year's training. What is wanted badly for the Artillery arm is a large area wherein tactical exercises can be carried out. This can only be done when there are good Artillery ranges in several directions.

Garrison Artillery.

The practice at Isle of Orleans was not very satisfactory, owing to the guns being essentially land service guns, whereas the range is a sea one. This could not be avoided for want of a good land range for heavy field guns. This, it is hoped, will be provided in the near future. The practice with the Quick Firing Guns at St. John, N.B. was more satisfactory, due partly to better weather conditions than last year, but it is hoped that facilities will shortly be provided for practice with more important guns than Light Quick Firers for the Garrison Artillery units allotted for coast defence purposes.

Heavy Field Batteries.

It is very necessary, too, that the Garrison Artillery Companies required for a field army should be organized and armed as heavy batteries, and I trust this may be done soon. Their training and gun practice would be carried out under similar conditions to those of the Field Artillery, and it is proposed that, in the event of a new training ground and artillery ranges being obtained, these units would be sent there in conjunction with the other arms.

Artillery Armouries.

Attention is called to the reference in last year's report with regard to the need of more accommodation for the different Artillery Units and their equipment. The equipment is of great value and requires good house accommodation. A new drill shed has been authorized for the Royal School of Artillery at Quebec. Similar accommodation for instructional purposes, as well as barracks, is most urgently needed at Kingston.

Musketry.

The great importance of good rifle shooting has been shown so conclusively in all recent wars that the work of the School of Musketry must have special interest. In the past year the total attendance at the two Courses held during the summer was 83 Officers, 54 non-commissioned officers and 7 Cadet Instructors. Of these, 58 Officers, 43 non-commissioned officers and the 7 Cadet Instructors obtained certificates.

It is necessary to point out that the time has arrived when a largely increased establishment for the School of Musketry must be provided in order to deal with its constantly growing work.

RIFLE ASSOCIATIONS.

Rifle Associations have increased from 200 to nearly 300 during the year. The membership of the Military Associations is nominally 11,830, but the members who take an active part number only about 5,000. The numbers in Civilian Associations are 11,105, and about 85 per cent of these take an active interest in shooting.

When the proposed new establishments are passed the members of Rifle Clubs will probably enroll for war service. The effect of the proposed new establishments passing into law will also necessarily bring about a reconstruction of the conditions which govern membership of Rifle Clubs.

RIFLE RANGES.

Good progress has been made in the construction of new rifle ranges, but it is desirable that some fixed principle should be adopted in this matter, as at present the establishing of a rifle range is rather the result of local agitation than of a broad and well-thought-out scheme. Such a scheme should, in the first place, provide for the establishing of a range at or near every Regimental Head-Quarters.

INTELLIGENCE DEPARTMENT.

I am very glad to say that this Department has now been formed, with the following staff :—

One Director General of Military Intelligence. Three Intelligence Staff Officers. Four Intelligence Staff Lieutenants. Three Clerks.

The work of the Department may be divided under three heads : Information. $\,$

Mapping.

Corps of Guides.

The information work includes the collection and arrangement of information of every kind useful for military purposes, and with the preparation of hand-books and

reports for the use of commanders in the field.

The Mapping Section has undertaken the work of making a military survey of Canada, and of producing maps of the area surveyed, which will be invaluable for military purposes, and which will also be of the greatest use for civil purposes. It has already prepared and issued a number of useful maps. A small grant has been made for this work, but if the necessary progress is to be made, this work must be carried on on a far larger scale.

In connection with this subject I may say that in the early part of the year I requested you to procure the services of a skilled officer from the Mapping Department of the War Office, to make a thorough report on the military surveying of Canada, so that any work that was undertaken might proceed on the best possible lines, and the money devoted to it spent to the greatest advantage to the country. The War Office kindly lent for this purpose their own head of the Mapping Department, Major E. H.

Hills, R.E. He has prepared a very able and important report on the subject.

The third branch of work done by the Intelligence Department needs a few words of explanation. I proposed to you the organization of a Corps of Guides for Canada, which was approved, and the formation of the Corps has been attended by the best results possible. Canada is now being covered with a network of intelligent and capable men, who will be of great service to the country in collecting information of a military character and in fitting themselves to act as guides in their own districts to forces in the field. I have much satisfaction in stating that there is much competition amongst the best men in the country for admission into the Corps of Guides. Nobody is admitted into this Corps unless he is a man whose services are likely to be of real use to the country.

SIGNALLING.

With the system now adopted for the Canadian Militia, a system which provides a mechanism for expanding a small peace establishment into a larger war strength, it is of special importance that in time of peace the scientific branches should be adequately organized and prepared for the requirements of war. The fighting part of the army can be rapidly filled up with comparatively untrained men, but it is impossible to improvise good signallers, so their training must be completed before mobilization. The

question of signalling instruction is of vital importance to an army. Should the Militia take the field, it is very desirable to have special Signalling Corps in existence who would have devoted the small amount of time they can give to military work entirely to that one subject. With that object in view I have recommended and you have approved the establishment of a

SIGNALLING CORPS,

which will be localized all over Canada in every Military District, and will, in each District, consist of a District Signalling Officer, non-commissioned officers and privates.

You have also approved of the formation of a School of Signalling.

This School will conduct its work largely at the Central Camp during the summer, and at other times of the year it will be divided into two portions, one portion under the Inspector of Signalling for the East, including the Province of Quebec and the Maritime Provinces, another portion under the Inspector of Signalling for the West, including Ontario and the North-west. These officers, with their assistants, will visit the various centres and conduct classes.

HEAD-QUARTERS STAFF.

The organization of the Head-Quarters Staff has been rearranged and the duties distributed.

ORDNANCE STORES BRANCH.

The Militia Stores Branch has become part of the Permanent Corps, under the designation of Ordnance Stores Corps. I am looking for good results from this change.

ENGINEER SERVICES BRANCH.

The Engineer Services Branch has been reconstituted on military lines. With a view to increasing the efficiency of this branch the present Director General was sent to England and took a course of instruction with the Royal Engineers, and Major Maunsell of this Department is now in England for a like purpose.

The establishment of a small permanent unit of Engineers has been approved by you, and its organization will be proceeded with as rapidly as suitable men can be found

for it.

In connection with the work of the Engineer Services Branch, Captain Naish, R.E., of the staff at Halifax, spent part of his leave, by the kind permission of Sir Charles Parsons, in assisting the Director General of Engineer Services in certain matters connected with fixed defences. The Militia are under an obligation to the Imperial authorities for granting the services of this officer. He is an exceptionally capable officer, and it would be a great advantage to the country if his services could again be secured for the purpose of dealing with certain points connected with defences.

The Head-Quarters Departments of Ordnance Stores and Engineer Services have only just been organized and their duties allotted. In future years I expect exhaustive reports from the heads of these departments and from the Quartermaster General's department, detailing what steps are required and what provision should be made to

place the matters under their control in a fit state for war.

ARMY SERVICE CORPS.

The nucleus of a small permanent unit of this Corps has been authorized by you, and an officer has been sent to England for a course in Army Service work.

Four new Militia Army Service Companies have been authorized and are in process of organization. The value and good work of this Corps were particularly apparent at the Militia Camps this year.

MEDICAL SERVICES.

The past year was marked by the resignation of Colonel Neilson, the first Director General of the Medical Services. I have great pleasure in calling your attention to the excellent work which this officer has done in creating the various organizations, and to the obligation which the Militia is under to him for his unremitting labour in the interest of the great service of which he was the head.

I have again much pleasure in testifying to the efficient service rendered by the

Militia Medical Corps at the various camps during the past year.

VETERINARY DEPARTMENT.

In view of the large increase to the Cavalry and Artillery, it is very desirable to establish an Army Veterinary Department, which would control the whole veterinary work of the Militia. In connection with the work of this Department there should be a School of Farriery. I believe that a School of Farriery would be of great advantage to the country generally, apart from its military aspect. It is necessary from a military point of view; from a civil point of view it is highly desirable to train the farriers in correct principles.

ROYAL MILITARY COLLEGE.

You will be pleased to learn from the Annual Report of the Commandant and from my personal observation when I inspected the College this year that this institution is keeping up its standard of efficiency.

I entirely agree with Colonel Reade's recommendation that accommodation should be provided for indoor exercise during the winter and in bad weather. Such a provi-

sion must have beneficial results.

A Riding Establishment has been granted to the College, which will be of great value in improving the standard of riding instruction and will, at the same time, be a relief to the men of the Royal Canadian Field Artillery.

GYMNASTIC TRAINING.

A very successful gymnastic training course for non-commissioned officers of the Militia was held at the Royal Military College this year. This is a very important branch of work, and it should, if possible, be extended and established on a permanent footing. In some of the City Corps throughout the country I have noticed a marked inferiority in physique as compared with the Rural Corps. Large numbers of men in certain places have con'racted chests, thus showing the urgent need of physical training. The immense advantage of this training is shown by the great increase of chest measurement of the cadets of the Royal Military College, whose development through gymnastic exercises is quite surprising. Owing to the use of electric cars and to long hours at business indoors, it is now more necessary than ever before that every facility should be given to young men to devote part of their spare time to physical training in Drill Halls. In fact, those halls should be made the popular gymnasia of the country.

CADET ORGANIZATIONS. **

I have placed before you proposals for the re-arrangement of the regulations with regard to the formation of Cadet organizations. These proposals have now been passed into law. I have also issued instructions with regard to Cadet training. The work of the Militia in camp only lasts 12 days a year, and of these 12 days one is spent in going into camp, one in leaving eamp, and one is a Sunday, so that only 9 working days remain. If the youth of the country could be trained in close order work, in a knowledge of discipline, in the use of the rifle and in simple movements of drill when at

school, the short time which they afterwards spend in Militia camps could be devoted altogether to that work which has to be done when face to face with the enemy.

You have approved my recommendation that the services of Cadet Instructors should be acknowledged by giving them subaltern rank in the Militia, subject to their qualifying professionally. I am very glad this important departure was made. It is a fitting acknowledgment of their patriotic service. This Militia rank will enable them to qualify for the Long Service Decoration. Arrangements have also been made to allow them to take the course of instruction at the School of Musketry and to obtain the certificate on passing.

The Cadet organizations will now be placed in the Militia List, as a further recog-

nition of their military value to the country.

LIBRARIES FOR THE MILITIA.

Last year a Military Library was created at Head-Quarters for the purpose of distributing necessary military literature. I am of opinion that provision should be made for extending the advantages of this library to every military organization in the country by the judicious distribution of a few well-selected books.

ARMOURIES.

It is, however, difficult to arrange for the instruction of the Militia by libraries or otherwise, unless armouries are constructed all over the country suitable for the various units and arms of the service, on lines laid down for universal application.

The first aim in providing buildings for Militia purposes should be the complete supply of accommodation for all corps—rural and city alike—on the following principles:

every squadron and company should have-

1. A room big enough to seat the whole war strength, for lecture purposes; to provide space for a large blackboard and half a dozen instructional placards a yard square; to hold the rifles in convenient racks, and to provide a separate locker for every man in which to keep his uniform and equipment—the number of lockers to be calculated on the war strength of the unit; and shelf space for 50 or 60 books.

2. A small room for the use of the non-commissioned officers.

3. A small room for the use of the officers, with another small room as an office.

At Regimental Head-Quarters there should be a room to be used as a regimental office, a room for the Officers' Mess, a room for the Commanding Officer, a room for the Field Officers of the Regimental Staff, a room for the Sergeants' Mess, besides store-room for the regimental stores, If a City Corps wishes to create a big drill hall with allied buildings, the Militia authorities might allow the cost price of the above accommodation towards the cost of the building, provided that it contains not less than the above detailed accommodation, and they might also subscribe a per capita amount towards the cost of the drill hall. The Company Armouries at present are nothing more than store cupboards. They offer no attraction to men. Lectures are impossible in them, there is no room for instructional placards to be hung, no place for books. They are cold and comfortless.

CAVALRY AND INFANTRY TRAINING.

One of the great difficulties in creating a Citizen Army is to educate leaders who have but little time to devote to military work. I hope that the system of instruction for promotion which you have approved may go far to overcome this difficulty. Another difficulty is to give increased efficiency to the rank and file in the very few days which they can spare for military training. Nothing will more conduce to securing enough efficiency for practical purposes than simplifying the text books on drill and thus bringing what is absolutely necessary for a soldier to know within the compass of his avail-

able time. With this object in view I have issued a 'Cavalry Training' which contains a new and very simple method of drill, which I have devised after a great deal of thought and consideration, for mounted men and men on foot. One of my objects in drawing up this book was to create a drill applicable alike to Infantry and Cavalry, and to make the formations and general system of working similar for the two great arms, so that the leaders and men of both may learn a common alphabet and be instructed in a common grammar. Eight men and a Leader are the groundwork of the formations. I look to these small commands as likely to be of great assistance in helping to create a thoroughly efficient Militia at war strength. The whole system of instruction of the recruit is also very much simplified, and is confined only to what is absolutely necessary for a soldier to learn, and in a simpler form, I believe, than has ever before been issued in a drill book. I hope very shortly to issue an 'Infantry Training' on similar lines to the 'Cavalry Training.'

Though in preparing these books I have very much simplified the system of training, I have been careful to avoid any differences which would prevent smooth co-oper-

ation between Canadian and British troops in the field.

UNIFORM.

A Service Dress has been adopted as the second dress of city corps. The rural corps will retain their present dress, and a Service Dress will be provided for them and kept in store to be issued when ordered on service. The rural corps will also have a canvas suit issued to them for work in the camps. I have recommended that, in future, all great-coats should be of the service colour, so that the least rossible amount would have to be issued to the troops when they take the field.

MILITIA OFFICERS AT THE STAFF COLLEGE.

I hear from you with great pleasure that arrangements have been made with the Imperial authorities to admit a certain number of Canadian officers, yearly, to the Staff College.

MILITIA OFFICERS AT THE BRITISH MANŒUVRES.

On the invitation of the Imperial Government, Colonel Otter, Colonel Evans and Colonel Drury attended the Manœuvres held in the south of England last September. Colonel Lessard was unfortunately unable to accept the invitation. These visits and the opportunity thus afforded to acquire military knowledge must necessarily be of great value to the Canadian Militia, and the expenditure for the purpose is fully justified.

WAR HONOURS OF CANADIAN REGIMENTS.

During the year six Colours especially designed for the purpose, have been assigned by Great Britain for presentation to the Canadian Corps which had taken part in the war in South Africa 'in recognition of their valuable services to the Empire.'

These will be allotted to—

The Royal Canadian Dragoons.
The Royal Canadian Mounted Rifles.
Strathcona's Horse.
The Royal Canadian Field Artillery.
The Royal Canadian Garrison Artillery.
The Royal Canadian Regiment.

CARTRIDGE FACTORY FOR ONTARIO.

Last year I called attention to the need for another arsenal and cartridge factory to be situated in Ontario. I wish again to emphasize this requirement, and to urge that it should be provided.

DEFENCE WORKS AND ARTILLERY.

I beg to refer you to certain memoranda which I have given you from time to time on this subject.


CONCLUSION.

APPENDIX 15.

Kingston, Ont., January 1, 1904.

To the General Officer Commanding Militia,

President of the Royal Military College of Canada.

Sir,—I have the honour to forward my report on the Royal Military College for the year ending December 31, 1903.

STRENGTH.

1. At the beginning of the year there were 89 Gentlemen Cadets.

During the year this number has been decreased by 32, as follows:—

Commissioned in Imperial Forces,

4) Conducted Level 1

Reserve of Officers 4 Graduated June, 1903.

Deceased 1 Withdrawn 4

and increased by 31 (admitted Sept., 1903), leaving a present strength of 88 Gentlemen Cadets.

HEALTH.

2. Cases of typhoid fever and diarrhea have occurred throughout the year, all traceable to the College water supply.

A filter system was installed in the summer, but was not reported to be in proper

working order until a few days ago.

It is hoped that this system will prove satisfactory, and that, by maintaining a constant supply of pure water, it will remove a cause of disease that occasions grave

anxiety from a medical point of view.

To ensure the best nursing, several Gentlemen Cadets, suffering from typhoid, were sent to the General Hospital at Kingston. I desire to express my satisfaction and gratitude for the way in which they were nursed there, and for the excellent medical attention they received from Surgeon Captain Kilborn, medical officer in charge of the College.

MEDICAL ENTRANCE EXAMINATION.

3. Three candidates who were passed as medically fit at the May Entrance Examination, were found, on joining the College, to be unfit for military service. Two of them had to undergo operation for varicocele, rejoining the College later in the term; and the third was altogether rejected. I consider that much greater care should be shown by the medical officers who examine candidates for entrance. It is only by this care that parents will be spared the expense and disappointment of sending their sons to the College to find that after all they are rejected as unfit.

CONDUCT AND DISCIPLINE.

4. The conduct and discipline of the Gentlemen Cadets have been good.

EXAMINATIONS.

5. The yearly examinations have given satisfactory results. Of the 27 Gentlemen Cadets who graduated, 10 gained "Honours."

DRILLS AND EXERCISES. '

6. A good standard has been maintained in drills and exercises. In rifle shooting 20 per cent qualified as marksmen, and the annual course was amended to include snap-

shooting, firing at moving objects, &c.

In June the Gentlemen Cadets went into camp at Deseronto, and carried out gunpractice as a Field Battery, and field-firing as a Battalion. In both these exercises they worked entirely under the command of their own Cadet N. C. Officers, who performed the duties of Battery, Battalion and Company Commanders. The result was most satisfactory in every way.

I desire to record my thanks to Col. C. W. Drury, C.B., Commanding the Camp, for his kind help and co-operation, which caused the whole exercise to be such a success. I would add incidentally that several cadets on graduating joined the Artillery of the Active Militia owing to their having seen and served alongside this branch of the ser-

vice in the Deseronto Camp.

MILITARY TOURNAMENT AT TORONTO.

7. A detachment of 60 Gentlemen Cadets, under Major C. Van Straubenzee, R.F.A., and Major H. Logan, Leicestershire Regt., together with Sergt.-Major Prince, took part in the Toronto Military Tournament in April, and gave an artillery and gymnastic display.

RIDING.

8. I have little to add to my report of last year on the Equitation at the R. M. College. This year there have been still greater difficulties in instruction, owing to the Riding School of the R.C.F.A. not being available. I cannot urge too strongly that a special Riding Establishment be authorized for the College; that stables and a riding school be erected in the grounds, and that the instruction be conducted by an officer.

N.C.O. GYMNASTIC COURSE.

9. A class of 14 N.C. Officers, drawn from the Active Militia and Permanent Force, was held during twelve weeks in the early spring under the direction of Major H. Logan,

Leicestershire Regt., and the Gymnastic Staff of the College.

The results obtained in so short a time were highly satisfactory, and it is hoped that, from this beginning, an interest in gymnastics and physical training may be spread amongst the Militia of Canada. I reported in detail on this subject to the Adjutant General of Militia on April 14, 1903.

OFFICERS' LONG COURSE.

10. A long course for officers was held from February till May. Eighteen officers completed the course. Of these, 5 obtained 1s Class and 12 obtained 2nd Class Certificates.

NEW BUILDINGS.

11. I consider it of urgent importance that the new Gymnasium should be com-

pleted and properly equipped.

I again draw attention to the lack of covered space for recreation in winter and bad weather, and would strongly urge the erection of a wooden covered rink, and two wooden squash racquet courts.

RETIRING MILITARY PROFESSORS.

12. Major C. VanStraubenzee. R.F.A., and Major H. Logan, Leicestershire Regt., having completed their period of five years' service at the College, rejoined their Corps in August. I take this opportunity of bringing to notice the excellent work done by these officers whilst at College, both in connection with the Gentlemen Cadets, and also with the many officers of the Active Militia and Permanent Force, who have come here for instruction.

COMMISSIONS.

13. During the year the following gentlemen cadets obtained commissions:—
M. V. Plummer, Royal Field Artillery; W. G. Tyrrell, Royal Engineers; G. L. Peterson, Army Service Corps; A. Flagg, Indian Army.
