SAVINGS BANKS.

At the close of the fiscal year, the balance at the credit of the depositors in the Post Office and Government Savings Banks amounted to \$55,567,603.42, a decrease of \$1,572,879.97 as compared with the balance held on March 31, 1913. The withdrawals during the year exceeded the deposits by \$3,200,218.22, while \$1,627,338.25 was added for interest accrued, thus making a net decrease of \$1,572,879.97.

INVESTMENTS.

Investments on account of the Sinking Funds of the various loans were made during the year to the amount of \$1,371,428.61. The 4 per cent Guaranteed Loan of 1878, of £1,700,000, which matured on the 1st October, 1913, carried a Sinking Fund of \$5,964,001.05 consisting wholly of 3 per cent 1888 stock. On the maturity of this loan the \$5,964,001.05 3 per cent stock was cancelled, thus reducing the amount at the credit of the Sinking Funds to that extent. The total of the Investments at the credit of the Sinking Funds, which stood at \$13,737,567.42 on March 31st, 1913, at the conclusion of the fiscal year 1914 was consequently reduced to \$9,144,994.98.

Advances were made under statute to the Montreal Harbour Commissioners and to the Quebec Harbour Commissioners amounting to \$5,562,000.00 as under:—

Under authority of Chapter 24, 3 and 4 George V. (1913), "The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Bond Purchase Act," £2,645,000, or \$12,872,333.27, Grand Trunk Pacific Railway 3 per cent mortgage bonds were purchased during the fiscal year 1913-14.

The total of 3 per cent mortgage bonds purchased under authority of above Act amounts to £6,800,000 or \$33,093,333.23 as follows:—

£2,287,700 or \$11,133,473.32 during fiscal year 1912-13.
2,645,000 or 12,872,333.27 " " " 1913-14.
1,567,300 or 9,087,526.64 since 1st April, 1914.

Under authority of the "Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company's Loan Act, 1913," \$8,500,000.00, of the total amount of \$15,000,000.00 authorized, was advanced to that Company, being secured by the pledging of an equal amount of 4 per cent bonds of said Company deposited with the Minister of Finance and Receiver General. Since the beginning of the fiscal year 1914-15, further advances on this amount have

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been made to the Company amounting to \$6,500,000 making the total of \$15,000,000 authorized by above mentioned Act. This Loan of \$15,000,000, together with the Loan of \$10,000,000, made in 1909-10 under authority of Cap. 19 of Acts of 1909, makes a total of \$25,000,000, advance by way of Loans to above Company.

DEBT.

The net debt of the Dominion at the close of the fiscal year was \$335,996,850.14, or an increase of \$21,695,224.46 over the net debt as it stood on March 31, 1913. The increase is accounted for as follows :—

On October 1st, 1913, the 4 per cent Guaranteed 1878 Public Works Loan for £1,700,000, or \$8,273,333.34, was redeemed and dealt with as follows :—

\$6,518,413.34 redeemed in cash.

1,754,920.00 converted into 4 per cent loan 1910-60 (September 1913, issue.)

The above loan was issued in 1878 for £1,700,000, under a guarantee by the Imperial Government, to run for thirty-five years and redeemable 1st October, 1913.

On November 1st, 1913, the Dominion of Canada $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent loan, issued originally in 1883 and subsequently extended, amounting to \$1,446,565.00, matured and was redeemed in cash.

Stock of the 3 per cent loan of 1888 to the amount of £1,225,479-14-0, or \$5,964,001.05, which was held in the Sinking Funds of the 4 per cent Guaranteed 1878 Public Works Loan, was, on the 1st October, 1913, the date of the maturity of that loan, cancelled : thus reducing the outstanding amount of the 1888 Loan to that extent.

In September, 1913, a loan of £3,000,000 4 per cent stock, due 1st October, 1960, with option to the Government to redeem in whole or in part on or after 1st October, 1910, on giving three months notice, was issued in London at £99 per cent to provide for the redemption of £1,700,000 4 bonds due 1st October, 1913, and for other purposes.

In December, 1913, a further loan of £4,000,000 4 per cent stock, as above, was issued at £97 per cent to retire maturing Treasury Bills, to in part reimburse the

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Government in respect of Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company Guaranteed Bonds purchased under statutory authority and for general purposes.

In February, 1914, a further loan of £5,000,000 4 per cent. stock, as above, was issued at £99 per cent to retire maturing Treasury Bills, to complete purchase of Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Guaranteed bonds, to complete advances to the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company guarantee to the Government by the Grand Trunk Railway Company of Canada and for general purposes.

In June, 1914, a further loan of £5,000,000 4 per cent stock, as above, was issued at £98 per cent, to complete the construction of the Eastern division of the National Transcontinental Railway and for the construction of Public Works and other purposes.

GUARANTEED SECURITIES.

The list of securities guaranteed by the Dominion is as follows:—

1. The Canadian Northern Railway Company, Cap. 7, Edward VII (1903).

The guarantee is for the principal of £1,923,287 sterling, and interest thereon at the rate of 3 per cent per annum for fifty years.

2. The Canadian Northern Railway Company, Cap. 11, 7-8 Edward VII (1908).

The guarantee is for the principal of £1,622,586-19-9 sterling debenture stock and interest thereon at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent per annum for fifty years from July 20, 1908, interest payable half yearly.

3. The Canadian Northern Ontario Railway Company, Chapter 6, 1-2 George V (1911).

The guarantee is for the principal of £7,493,835-12-4 sterling debenture stock and interest thereon at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. per annum for fifty years from May 19th, 1911, interest payable half yearly.

4. The Canadian Northern Alberta Railway Company, Chapter 6, 9-10 Edward VII (1910) as amended by Chapter 8, 2 George V (1912).

The guarantee is for the principal of £647,260 5s. 6d. sterling debenture stock and interest thereon at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent per annum for fifty years from May 4, 1910, interest payable half yearly.

5. The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company, Chapter 98, Act of 1905.

The guarantee is of 3 per cent bonds of the Railway Company to an amount equal to 75 per cent of the cost of construction of the Western Division of the National Transcontinental Railway, but not exceeding \$13,000 per mile in respect of the Prairie Section of the said Railway. The amount of bonds issued and guaranteed is £7,200,000, of which £3 200,000 were issued in 1905, £2,000,000 in 1909, and £2,000,000 in 1910.

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The balance, £6,800,000. of the issue of £14,000,000 authorized by the above acts to be guaranteed by the Dominion, has been purchased under authority of Chapter 24, 3-4 George V (1913). "The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Bond Purchase Act."

The guarantee is for the principal of £733,561 12s. 10d. sterling debenture stock and interest thereon at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent per annum for fifty years, from April 1, 1912, interest payable half yearly.

By "The Canadian Northern Railway Guarantee Act, 1914," authority is given the Dominion to guarantee the securities of the Canadian Northern Railway Company to an amount not exceeding \$15,000,000 together with interest thereon at the rate of 4 per cent per annum. £3,000,000 of these securities have been sold and a portion of the remainder have been pledged for the purposes set out in the Act.

By "The Grand Trunk Pacific Guarantee Act, 1914," authority is given the Dominion to guarantee the securities of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company to an amount not exceeding \$16,000,000 together with interest thereon at the rate of 4 per cent per annum: £482,400 of these securities have been sold and a portion of the remainder have been pledged for the purposes set out in the Act.

DOMINION NOTES.

The Circulation of Dominion Notes stood at \$117,795,638.53 on March 31, 1914, being an increase over the circulation at the close of last year of \$5,693,752.88.

SUPERANNUATION AND RETIREMENT ACTS.

The statement showing the number and total salaries of officials coming under the Superannuation Acts and the Retirement Act has been continued to March 31, 1914.
