This gave rise to the idea that the Dominion was taking a new step, but the fact is that no money is coming from Canada. Of the flour sent by Canada a year ago to relieve distress in England, very little was distributed, as poverty was in no way abnormal. Some 400,000 bags of this flour were transferred to the American committee for Belgian relief, which purchased them. The money paid for this flour being in the hands of the Local Government Board, Hon. Walter Long, as President of the Board, suggested to Sir George Perley that this might be utilized for the relief of the east coast towns where the season had been ruined owing to the lack of railway facilities and the disinclination of the public to visit the east coast because of the possibility of German naval or aerial raids. The Dominion Government acquiesced in this proposal, and the sum of \$750,000, part of the proceeds of the sale of the flour, has now been allotted for this purpose. Canada's generosity will therefore go to alleviate the distress of a large number of better-class people, who are direct sufferers from the war, instead of the destitute poor, for whom it was intended, but who, it develops, were not in need of it." 2. ## SAVINGS BANKS.

At the close of the fiscal year, the balance at the credit of the depositors in the Post Office and Government Savings Banks amounted to \$54,001,718.26, a decrease of \$1,565,885.16 as compared with the balance held on March 31, 1914. The withdrawals during the year exceeded the deposits by \$3,145,946.67, while \$1,580,061.51 was added for interest accrued, thus making a net decrease of \$1,565,885.16.

## INVESTMENTS.

Investments on account of the Sinking Funds of the various loans were made during the year to the amount of \$1,645,811.53. The total of the Investments at the credit of the Sinking Funds, which stood at \$9,144,944.98 on March 31, 1914, at the conclusion of the fiscal year 1915 amounted to \$10,790,806.51.

Advances were made under statute to the Montreal Harbour Commissioners and to the Quebec Harbour Commissioners amounting to \$3,920,000.00, as under:—

Under authority of various Orders in Council confirmed by 5 Geo. V, cap. 4 (Acts of 1915), advances in the form of an issue of Dominion notes were made to the Canadian Northern Railway Company and to the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company of ten million dollars (\$10,000,000.00) and six million dollars (\$6,000,000.00) respectively against a pledge by the companies of their guaranteed securities issued under the provisions of the Canadian Northern Railway Guarantee Act, 1914, and the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Guarantee Act, 1914.

Under authority of 5 Geo. V, cap. 3, "The Finance Act, 1914" subsec. (a) sec. 4, advances during the year were made, in the form of issues of Dominion notes, to various banks to the amount of \$14,439,767.55. Of this amount, \$9,047,267.55 was repaid, leaving an outstanding balance of \$5,392,500.00

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on March 31, 1915. Since March this balance has been reduced to \$320,075.00.

Under authority of chapter 24, 3 and 4 George V (1913), "The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Bond Purchase Act," £1,867,300, or \$9,087,526.64, Grand Trunk Pacific Railway 3 per cent mortgage bonds were purchased during the fiscal year 1914-15, making a total purchase of £6,800,000, \$33,093,333.23, as follows:—

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In March, 1915, a loan of £5,000,000, 4 $\frac{1}{2}$  per cent bonds, due May 1st, 1925, with option to the Government to redeem in whole or in part at par on or after May 1st, 1920, on giving three months notice, was issued in London at £99 $\frac{1}{2}$  per cent to provide for Capital expenditure upon undertakings under contract, including terminals and works at Halifax, St. John and other ports, construction on Welland Ship Canal, deepening the St. Lawrence Ship Channel and other Capital outlays.

Under the provisions of "The Appropriation Act, 1915" and of "The Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act", authority was given by Order in Council P.C. No. 1774 of 27th July, 1915, for the raising of a loan of \$45,000,000 in New York City by the issue and sale of notes of the Dominion of Canada bearing date 1st August, 1915, as follows:—

\$25,000,000 one year 5 per cent notes at par and interest, less  $\frac{3}{4}$  per cent commission.

\$20,000,000 two year 5 per cent notes at 99 $\frac{1}{2}$  and interest, less  $\frac{3}{4}$  per cent commission.

The notes to be of the denominations of \$1,000 or multiple thereof, at the option of the purchaser, and to be delivered in New York and payment thereof to be made in New York funds. The holders to have the right to convert the same into an equal principal amount of twenty year 5 per cent bonds maturing August 1, 1935, and not subject to prior redemption; interest payable semi-annually on the 1st February and 1st August, and both principal and interest to be payable at the agency of the Bank of Montreal, in the City of New York, in gold coin of the United States of America or, at the option of the holder, at the Bank of Montreal, Montreal.

Advances by way of temporary loans have been made from time to time by the Imperial Government amounting, on the 31st March, 1915, to £12,000,000 or \$58,400,000. These advances were made on the basis of £100 for each

£95 advanced, thus making a capital debt of £12, 631,579-19-0, or \$61,473,684.22. The interest rate is  $3\frac{1}{2}$  per cent per annum payable half yearly on October 1 and April 1.

On October 29, 1914, a temporary loan of \$5,000,000 was obtained from the Bank of Montreal repayable at option of the Government any time prior to March 31, 1915, at rate of  $5\frac{1}{2}$  per cent per annum. This loan was further extended at rate of 5 per cent per annum from and after May 3, 1915. On 27th and 31st July, 1915, further temporary loans of \$2,500,000 each, repayable at option of Government, were made to the Government by the Bank of Montreal Ottawa, at rate of 5 per cent per annum. These last two temporary loans were repaid on the 26th August, 1915.

The Treasury Bills amounting to £3,000,000 or \$14,599,999.99, which were outstanding on the 31st March, 1915, were at dates of their maturity redeemed as under:—

7. By "The Canadian Northern Railway Guarantee Act, 1914," authority is given the Dominion to guarantee the securities of the Canadian Northern Railway Company to an amount not exceeding \$45,000,000, together with interest thereon at the rate of 4 per cent per annum. £3,500,000 of these securities have been sold and a portion of the remainder has been pledged for the purposes set out in the Act.
8. By "The Grand Trunk Pacific Guarantee Act, 1914", authority is given the Dominion to guarantee the securities of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company to an amount not exceeding \$16,000,000 together with interest thereon at the rate of 4 per cent per annum. £655,600 of these securities have been sold and \$7,500,000 pledged against an advance by the Dominion Government of an issue of Dominion Notes to the amount of \$6,000,000.

The circulation of Dominion Notes stood at \$157,056,118.91 on March 31, 1915, being an increase over the circulation at the close of last year of \$39,260,480.38.

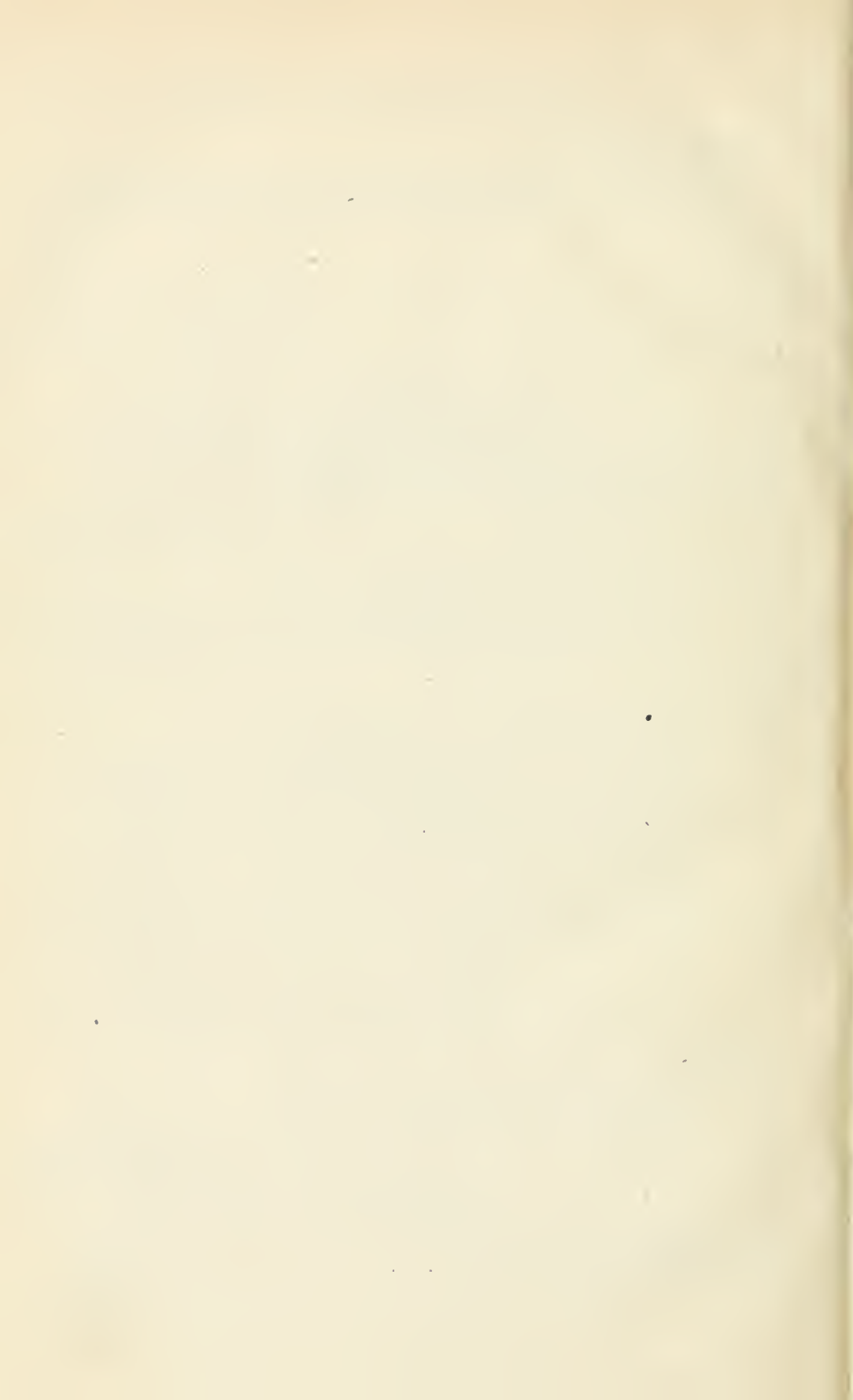
