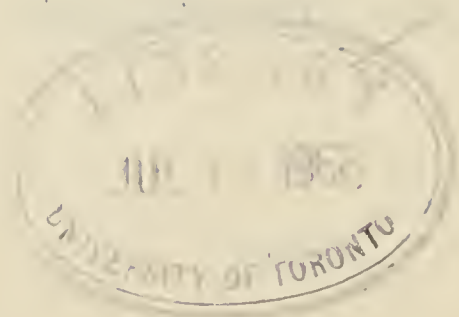

ORDINARY RECEIPTS AND PAYMENTS.

The receipts on account of Consolidated Fund for the year amounted to \$172,147,838.27, and the expenditure on the same account to \$130,350,726.90, showing a surplus of ordinary receipts over ordinary expenditure of \$41,797,111.37.

SAVINGS BANKS.

At the close of the fiscal year, the balance at the credit of the depositors in the Post Office and Government Savings Banks amounted to \$53,528,426.34, a decrease of \$473,291.92 as compared with the balance held on March 31, 1915. The withdrawals during the year exceeded the deposits by \$2,040,522.60, while \$1,567,230.68 was added for interest accrued, thus making a net decrease of \$473,291.92.

INVESTMENTS.

Investments on account of the Sinking Funds of the various loans were made during the year to the amount of \$1,773,021.11. The total of the Investments at the credit of the Sinking Funds, which stood at \$10,790,806.51 on March 31, 1915, at the conclusion of the fiscal year 1916 amounted to \$12,563,827.62.

Advances were made under statute to the Montreal Harbour Commissioners and to the Quebec Harbour Commissioners amounting to \$2,521,000 as under:—

Under authority of 5 Geo. V, cap. 3, "The Finance Act, 1914" subsec. (a) sec. 4, advances during the year were made, in the form of issues of Dominion notes, to various banks to the amount of \$3,585,000.00, to which should be added a debit balance of \$5,392,500.00 at the beginning of the year making total advances of \$8,977,500.00. Of this amount \$7,906,265.00 was repaid, leaving an outstanding balance of \$1,071,235.00 on March 31, 1916.

DEBT.

The net debt of the Dominion at the close of the fiscal year was \$615,156,171.02, or an increase of \$165,780,087.81 over the net debt as it stood on March 31, 1915.

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LOANS.

In March, 1915, a loan of £5,000,000, 4½ per cent bonds, due May 1, 1925, with option to the Government to redeem in whole or in part at par on or after May 1, 1920, on giving three months notice, was issued in London at £99½ per cent to provide for Capital expenditure upon undertakings under contract, including terminals and works at Halifax, St. John and other ports, construction on Welland Ship Canal, deepening the St. Lawrence Ship Channel and other Capital outlays.

Under the provisions of "The Appropriation Act, 1915" and of "The Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act," authority was given by Order in Council P.C. No. 1774 of 27th July, 1915, for the raising of a loan of \$45,000,000 in New York City by the issue and sale of notes of the Dominion of Canada bearing date 1st August, 1915, as follows:—

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\$25,000,000 one year 5 per cent notes at par and interest, less $\frac{3}{4}$ per cent commission.

\$20,000,000 two year 5 per cent notes at 99 $\frac{1}{2}$ and interest, less $\frac{3}{4}$ per cent commission.

The notes were of the denomination of \$1,000; were delivered in New York; and payment made in New York funds. The holders had the right prior to three months before maturity, respectively, to convert the same into an equal principal amount of twenty year 5 per cent bonds maturing August 1, 1935, and not subject to prior redemption.

During the fiscal year 1916-17 up to and including November 30, 1916, \$24,698,000 of the one year 5 per cent notes were redeemed and \$136,000, together with \$221,000 of the two year 5 per cent notes, making a total of \$357,000, were converted into twenty year 5 per cent bonds maturing August 1, 1935:— thus leaving on November 30th overdue notes outstanding of \$166,000.

Under the provisions of the "Public Service Loan Act 1916" authority was given by Order in Council P.C. No. 750 of 30th March, 1916, for the raising of a loan of \$75,000,000, 5 per cent gold bonds, interest payable April 1 and October 1, maturing in equal amounts of \$25,000,000 each in five, ten and fifteen years respectively, both principal and interest payable at the Agency of the Bank of Montreal, in New York City, in United States gold coin, such loan placed on the New York market at issue prices as follows:—

The 5 year bonds, maturing April 1, 1921, at 99.56 and interest, yielding about 5.10 per cent.

The 10 year bonds, maturing April 1, 1926, at 97.13 and interest, yielding about 5 $\frac{3}{8}$ per cent.

The 15 year bonds, maturing April 1, 1931, at 94.94 and interest, yielding about 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.

WAR LOANS DOMINION OF CANADA.

Under the provisions of 6-7 Geo. V, chap. 28, authority was given by Orders in Council P.C. No. 2421 of 20th November, 1915, and P.C. No. 3030 of 25th December, 1915, for the raising of a loan of \$100,000,000 5 per cent bonds maturing 1st December, 1925, to be issued in Canada at a price of 97 $\frac{1}{2}$ with the option to the holders thereof to convert into any future issue—other than issues made abroad—by the Government for the purpose of carrying on the war, at the issue price of 97 $\frac{1}{2}$ plus accrued interest, as the equivalent of cash for the purpose of any such issue.

On the 22nd November, 1915, the prospectus for this loan was issued for the amount of \$50,000,000 contemplated in the first Order in Council. On the closing of the subscription list on 30th November, the Department found that from 24,862 individual subscribers a sum aggregating \$78,729,500 had been offered. This amount taken with the amounts subscribed by the various banks, totaled over \$100,000,000. By authority of the Order in Council of 25th December, the amount of the issue was therefore increased to \$100,000,000.

Although not relevant to the operations of the financial year under review, reference may be made to the further war loan of \$100,000,000 issued in September 1916, very much on the same lines as those of the previous war loan. Authority for this loan was given by Order in Council of the 19th September, 1916, P.C. No. 2211. It carries 5 per cent interest for fifteen years and was issued at the price of 97 $\frac{1}{2}$, principal and interest payable in gold. The prospectus was issued on the 15th September and on the closing of the subscriptions it was found that from 34,526 subscribers the Department had offerings of \$201,444,800.

Advances by way of temporary loans have been made from time to time by the Imperial Government amounting, on the 31st March, 1916, to £28,000,000 which carried a capitalized debt of £28,354,598/11/11 or \$137,992,379.82.

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From the close of the fiscal year 1915-16 to 31st October, 1916, additional advances have been made amounting to £12,500,000 or \$60,833,333.30 making the total advances £40,500,000, to which must be added £354,598/11/11 as increased liability on the capitalization of £28,000,000 mentioned above; £22,324,295/11/0 of which was funded by conversion into \$107,612,029.53 Dominion Government dollar bonds as under:—

£2,400,000 capitalized, on basis of £100 debt to each £95 advance, to £2,526,-
315/15/9 or \$12,404,678.36, 3½ per cent bonds maturing 1st March, 1925-28.
£19,600,000 capitalized, on basis of £100 debt on each £99 advance, to £19,797,-
979/15/3 or \$95,207,351.17, 4½ per cent bonds maturing 1st December,
1925-45.

These bonds were handed to the agents of the Imperial Government in New York. Deducting them from the total liability on account of the £40,500,000 or \$197,792,-837.55 above mentioned leaves a net floating liability on 31st October, 1916, on this account of \$90,180,808.02.

From the 31st October to the 31st December, 1916, further advances of £4,500,000 have been made by the Imperial Government, which increases the net liability from \$90,180,808.02 to \$112,080,808.02. Against this may be placed advances of \$95,000,000 made by the Dominion to the Imperial Government, through the Imperial Munitions Board, up to the 31st December, 1916, which would leave at that date on this account a net indebtedness to the Imperial Government of \$17,080,808.02.

On the 1st of March, 1916, \$357,900 of the 1896 3½ per cent loan was redeemed leaving an outstanding amount of \$10,000 which has since been taken up.

The guarantee is for the principal of £1,923,287 sterling, and interest thereon at the rate of 3 per cent per annum for fifty years—

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2. The Canadian Northern Railway Company, Cap. 11, 7-8 Edward VII (1908).

The guarantee is for the principal of £1,622,586 19s. 9d. sterling debenture stock and interest thereon at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent per annum for fifty years from July 20, 1908, interest payable half yearly.

3. The Canadian Northern Ontario Railway Company, Chapter 6, 1-2 George V. (1911).

The guarantee is for the principal of £7,350,000 0s. 0d. sterling debenture stock and interest thereon at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent per annum for fifty years from May 19, 1911, interest payable half yearly.

4. The Canadian Northern Alberta Railway Company, Chapter 6, 9-10, Edward VII (1910) as amended by Chapter 8, 2 George V (1912).

The guarantee is for the principal of £647,260 5s. 6d. sterling debenture stock and interest thereon at the rate of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent per annum for fifty years from May 4, 1910, interest payable half yearly.

5. The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company, Chapter 98, Acts of 1905.

The guarantee is of 3 per cent bonds of the Railway Company to an amount equal to 75 per cent of the cost of construction of the Western Division of the National Transcontinental Railway but not exceeding \$13,000 per mile in respect of the Prairie Section of the said railway. The amount of bonds issued and guaranteed is £7,200,000, of which £3,200,000 were issued in 1905, £2,000,000 in 1909, and £2,000,000 in 1910.

The balance, £6,800,000, of the issue of £14,000,000 authorized by the above Acts to be guaranteed by the Dominion, has been purchased under authority of Chapter 24, 3-4 George V (1913) "The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Bond Purchase Act."

7. By "The Canadian Northern Railway Guarantee Act, 1914,"

Authority is given the Dominion to guarantee the securities of the Canadian Northern Railway Company to an amount not exceeding \$45,000,000, together with interest thereon at the rate of 4 per cent per annum. £3,500,000 of these securities have been sold and a portion of the remainder has been pledged for the purposes set out in the Act.

8. By "The Grand Trunk Pacific Guarantee Act, 1914,"

Authority is given the Dominion to guarantee the securities of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company to an amount not exceeding \$16,000,000 together with interest thereon at the rate of 4 per cent per annum. £655,600 of these securities have been sold and \$7,500,000 pledged against an advance by the Dominion Government of an issue of Dominion Notes to the amount of \$6,000,000.

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DOMINION NOTES.

The circulation of Dominion Notes stood at \$177,943,131.54 on March 31, 1916, being an increase over the circulation at the close of last year of \$20,887,012.63. During the same time the gold held by the Receiver General for redemption of bonds increased from \$94,644,423.44 to \$120,931,622.98.

SUPERANNUATION AND RETIREMENT ACTS.

The statement showing the number and total salaries of officials coming under the Superannuation Acts and the Retirement Act has been continued to March 31, 1916.
