## ORDINARY RECEIPTS AND PAYMENTS.

The receipts on account of Consolidated Fund for the year amounted to $\$ 232,701,294$; and the expenditure on the same account to $\$ 148,599,343.23$, showing a surplus of ordinary receipts over ordinary expenditure of $\$ 84,101,950.77$.

## SAVINGS BANKS.

At the close of the fiscal year, the balance at the credit of the depositors in the Post Office and Government Savings Banks amounted to $\$ 56,216,088.61$, an increase of $\$ 2,687,814.82$ as compared with the balance held on March 31, 1916. The deposits during the year exceeded the withdrawals by $\$ 1,085,840.88$, while $\$ 1,601,973.94$ was added for interest accrued, thus making a net increase of $\$ 2,687.814 .82$.

## INVESTMENTS.

Investments on account of the Sinking Funds of the various loans were made during the year to the amount of $\$ 1,471,697.50$. The total of the Investments at the credit of the Sinking Funds, which stood at $\$ 12,563,827.62$ on March 31, 1916, at the conclusion of the fiscal year 1917 amounted to $\$ 14,035$,525.12.

Advances were made under statute to the Montreal Harbour Commissioners and to the Quebec Harbour Commissioners amounting to $\$ 1,062,000$ as under:-

(a) sec. 4 , advances during the year were made in the form of issues of Dominion notes to various banks to the amount of $\$ 18,531,000$, to which should be added a debit balance of $\$ 1,071,235$ at the beginning of the year making

total advances of $\$ 19,602,235$. Of this amount $\$ 9,402,235.00$ was repaid, leaving an outstanding balance of $\$ 10,200,000$ on March 31, 1917.

Call loans have been made to the various banks, against security of Imperial Treasury Bills, amounting to $\$ 5,035,000$ of which $\$ 2,235,000$ has been repaid, leaving a debit balance at the close of the year of $\$ 2,800,000$.

LOANS.
Under the authority of Order in Council, P.C. 1774, of 27th July, 1915, the option was granted to the holders of the $\$ 45,000,000$ loan issued in New York, 1st August, 1915, to convert into twenty year $5 \%$ bonds maturing August 1, 1935. At the close of the fiscal year 1916-17 $\$ 873,000$ of the above loan was thus converted.

Under the provisions of the "Public Service Loan Act 1916 " authority was given by Order in Council, P.C. 750, of the 30th March, 1916, for the raising of a loan of $\$ 75,000,0005 \%$ gold bonds, interest payable April 1st and October 1 st, maturing in equal amounts of $\$ 25,000,000$ each in five, ten and fifteen years respectively, both principal and interest payable at the Agency of the Bank of Montreal in New York City, in United States gold coin, such loans were placed on New York market at issue prices as follows:-

The 5 year bonds, maturing April 1, 1921, at $99 \cdot 56$ and interest, yielding about $5 \cdot 1 / 10$ per cent.

The 10 year bonds, maturing April 1, 1926, at $97 \cdot 13$ and interest, yielding about $5 \frac{3}{8}$ per cent.

The 15 year bonds, maturing April 1, 1931, at $94 \cdot 94$ and interest, yielding about $51 / 2$ per cent.

## War Loans Dominion of Canada.

Advances by way of temporary loans have been made from time to time by the Imperial Government amounting, on the 31st March, 1917, to $£ 57,500,000$, which carried a capitalized debt of $£ 59,503,500-10-7$ or $\$ 289,583,702.52$. During the year 1916-17 £22,324,295-11-0 of the above amount was converted into Dominion Government dollar bonds as under:-
$£ 2,400,000$ capitalized, on basis of $£ 100$ debt on each $£ 95$ advance, to $£ 2,526,315-15-9$ or $\$ 12,404,678.36,3 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent bonds maturing 1st March, 1925-28.
$£ 19,600,000$ capitalized, on basis of $£ 100$ debt on each $£ 99$ advance, to $£ 19,797,979-15-3$ or $\$ 95,207,351.17,4 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent bonds maturing 1st December, 1925-45.
The above conversions into currency were made on basis of rates of exchange at the dates on which such advances were made. These bonds were handed to the Agents of the Imperial Government in New York. Deducting them from the total liability of $£ 59,503,500-10-7$ or $\$ 259,583,702.52$ above stated leaves a net floating liability on the 31st March, 1917, of £37,179,204-9-7 or \$180,938,797.42.

## SESSIONAL PAPER No. 2

Under the provisions of the "War Appropriation Act, 1916," authority was given by Order in Council of the 19th September, 1916, P.C. No. 2211, for the raising of a loan of $\$ 100,000,000,5$ per cent bonds maturing 1st September, 1931, to be issued in Canada at a price of $971 / 2$. On the 17 th July, 1917, P.C. No. 1986, the option was given to the holders of the above bonds to convert into any future issue, (other than issues made abroad) of bonds of maturity of twenty years or more, by the Government for the purpose of carrying on the war, at the issue price of $971 / 2$, plus accrued interest, as the equivalent of cash for the purpose of any such issue. On the 15 th September, 1916, prospectus of this loan was issued and on the closing of the subscriptions it was found that from 34,526 subseribers the Department had offerings of $\$ 201,444,800$.

Under the provisions of the "War Appropriation Act, 1916," authority was given by Order in Council of 10th March, 1917, P.C. 651, for the raising of a loan of $\$ 150,000,0005$ per cent bonds, maturing 1st March, 1937, to be issued in Canada at a price of 96 . Holders of these bonds were given the same option of converting as in the previous war loans. On the 12 th March, 1917, prospectus of this loan was issued and on the closing of the subscriptions it was found that from 41,263 subseribers the Department had offerings of $\$ 260,768,000$.

Under the provisions of "War Appropriation Act 1916 " Order in Council dated 7 th October, 1916, P.C. No. 2454, authority was granted to issue Dominion Stock to an aggregate amount not exceeding $\$ 50,000,000$ in sums of $\$ 500$ and multiples thereof; this Stock to bear interest at 5 per cent per annum and to mature 1st October, 1919, interest to be paid half-yearly on the first day of April and the first day of October. The holders of this Stock have the privilege of surrendering at par and accrued interest as the equivalent of cash in payment of any allotment made under any future war loan issue in Canada, other than issue of Treasury Bills or other like short date securities.

On the 31st March, 1917, the issue of such Debenture Stock amounted to $\$ 8,634,500$.

Under the provisions of section 4 of the War Appropriation Act 1916, Order in Council dated 17 th January, 1917, P.C. 104, authority was given to offer for sale War Savings Certificates of the denominations of $\$ 25, \$ 50$ and $\$ 100$ each, such certificates to be repayable three years from date of issue and to be sold at the following rates:-

These certificates to be redeemable as follows:-

Such certificates are exempt from taxes imposed by authority of Parliament of Canada. No person shall hold certifieates for more than $\$ 1,500$ face value.

On the 31st March, 1917, 79,509 certificates to the amount of $\$ 5,072,237$ were sold.

## Temporary Loans.

Temporary Loans were received from the chartered banks in Canada by the issue of Treasury Bills amounting to $\$ 130,200,000$, of which the sum of $\$ 30,200,000$ has been repaid, leaving an outstanding amount of $\$ 100,000,000$ as follows:-

The guarantee is for the principal of $£ 7,350,000$ sterling debenture stock and interest thereon at the rate of $31 / 2$ per cent per annum for fifty years from May 19, 1911, interest payable half yearly.
4. The Canadian Northern Alberta Railway Company, Chapter 6, 9-10, Edward VII (1910) as amended by Chapter 8, 2 George V (1912).

The guarantee is for the principal of $£ 647,2605 \mathrm{~s} .6 \mathrm{~d}$. sterling debenture stock and interest thereon at the rate of $31 / 2$ per cent per annum for fifty years from May 4, 1910, interest payable half yearly.
5. The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company, Chapter 98, Acts of 1905.

The guarantee is for 3 per cent bonds of the Railway Company to an amount equal to 75 per cent of the cost of construction of the Western Division of the National Transcontinental Railway but not exceeding $\$ 13,000$ per mile in respect of the Prairie Section of the said railway. The amount of bonds issued and guaranteed is $£ 7,200,000$, of which $£ 3,200,000$ were issued in 1905 , $£ 2,000,000$ in 1909 , and $£ 2,000,000$ in 1910.

The guarantee is for the principal of $£ 733,56112 \mathrm{~s}$. 10 d . sterling debenture stock and interest thereon at the rate of $31 / 2$ per cent per annum for fifty years, from April 1, 1912, interest payable half yearly.
7. By "The Canadian Northern Railway Guarantee Act, 1914."

Authority is given the Dominion to guarantee the securities of the Canadian Northern Railway Company to an amount not exceeding $\$ 45,000,000$, together with interest thereon at the rate of 4 per cent per annum. $£ 3,500,000$ of these securities have been sold and a portion of the remainder has been pledged for the purpose set out in the Act.
8. By "The Grand Trunk Pacific Guarantee Act, 1914."

Authority is given the Dominion to guarantee the securities of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company to an amount not exceeding $\$ 16,000,000$ together with interest thereon at the rate of 4 per cent per annum. $£ 655,600$ of these securities have been sold and $\$ 7,500,000$ pledged against an advance by the Dominion Government of an issue of Dominion Notes to the amount of $\$ 6,000,000$.

## DOMINION NOTES.

The circulation of Dominion Notes stood at $\$ 183,248,986.79$ on March 31, 1917, being an increase over the circulation at the close of last year of $\$ 5,305,855.25$. During the same time the gold held by the Receiver General for redemption of bonds decreased from $\$ 120,931,622.98$ to $\$ 118,561,338.50$.

## SUPERANNUATION AND RETIREMENT ACTS.
