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EXPLANATORY NOTES.

IN GENERAL STATEMENT No. 1 (Pt. ii) of IMPORTS AND GOODS ENTERED FOR CONSUMPTION, The term 'Entered for Consumption' is the technical term in use at the custom house, and does not imply that the goods have been actually consumed in Canada, but that they have passed into the possession of the importer and that duty has been paid on that portion liable for duty.

The value of goods imported is governed by Section 40 of the Customs Act, which provides that the value of imported goods subject to ad valorem duty 'shall be the fair market value thereof, when sold for home consumption, in the principal markets of the country whence and at the time when the same were exported directly to Canada.'

IN GENERAL STATEMENT No. 3 (Pt. ii) OF EXPORTS, The term 'The Produce of Canada' includes all imported articles which have been changed in form or enhanced in value by further manufacture in Canada, such as sugar refined in Canada from imported raw sugar, flour ground from imported wheat, and articles constructed or manufactured from imported materials.

'Goods not the produce of Canada' shows the exports of foreign goods which had been previously imported.

Under the Regulations commencing July 1st, 1900, all *Export* entries are delivered at the '*frontier port of exit*,' and the totals thereof are credited to the respective ports where the goods pass outwards from Canada. In view of the more complete returns obtained under this system the additions heretofore made to the export statistics (prior to July 1st, 1900) under the head of 'Short returns' are now omitted.

In this report, the tables of imports and exports at the several ports of entry indicate that merchandise of the value stated was *entered inwards* or *passed outwards* at the ports mentioned, but do not imply that the imports were all for consumption at such ports or that the exports originated there.

The trade by Countries, with the Dominion as a whole, is recorded in the General Statements of Imports and Exports.

The value of 'Goods the Produce of Canada' is their value at the time of exportation at the ports of Canada whence shipped.

The value of 'Goods not the Produce of Canada' is the actual cost of such goods.

The initials N.E.S. mean 'not elsewhere specified.'

" N.O.P. mean 'not otherwise provided for.'

The expression 'Ton' means two thousand pounds, and 'Cwt.' one hundred pounds.

" 'Standard hundred' when applied to deals, means 2,750 feet board measure.

" 'Ton,' applied to square timber, means 40 cubic feet.

In the shipping tables the tonnage is given in net tons.

SPECIAL NOTE.

Under an amendment to the Customs Tariff passed in 1903, provision was made for the collection of a surtax on the goods of any foreign country which treats imports from Canada less favourably than those from other countries.

It is to be particularly noted that the surtax does not apply to the goods of other countries imported from Germany, but only to articles which are the growth, produce or manufacture of Germany. Various classes of goods which are of *other than German origin* therefore appear in these Tables as imports from Germany, entered under the General Tariff and not subject to a surtax.

METHYLATED SPIRITS :—

The quantity of methylated spirits manufactured during the Fiscal Year was 144,679·68 proof gallons, and the sales 146,328·62 proof gallons. A statement of details appears on pages 58 and 59.

The price of this denatured alcohol is practically the actual cost of manufacture and is as follows :—

Grade No. 1. "Standard".—When consigned to points East of Toronto and West of Quebec, both inclusive, 65c. per Imperial gallon ; when consigned to points beyond Toronto and Quebec, 63c. per Imperial gallon.

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Grade No. 1. "Benzine".—When consigned as above 55c. and 53c. per Imperial gallon respectively.

Grade No. 2. "Standard".—75c. per Imperial gallon.

Grade No. 2. "Coloured".—60c. per Imperial gallon.
