STAND STILL LIKE A SENTRY

Sentries stand on guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier every day from April 9 to November 10, to honour Canadians who have served in the military. A sentry has to stand still for an hour at a time.

Can you do it? Challenge your family to stand still like a sentry for one minute — no smiling, no scratching and no fidgeting!

Make sure you stay out of the way of the sentries who are on duty. Stand off to the side of the tomb, and remember: a sentry stands in silence!

COUNT THE POPPIES

Do you wear a poppy on Remembrance Day? Poppies are a symbol. We wear them to show that we remember Canadians who have fought and died for our country. There are two poppies near the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. How many other poppies can you find around the National War Memorial?



Answer:

There are 3 more sculpted or carved poppies around the memorial. At certain times of the year, you might find poppies from people's coats or poppy wreaths here, too.







A PLACE TO REMEMBER




