WHAT IS HARM REDUCTION?

Harm reduction is a respectful nonjudgmental approach to reducing harms of drug and alcohol use that meets people "where they are at". For example:

THE 2016 RESULTS:

FOR FIRST NATIONS COMMUNITIES



9% DECREASE in Hepatitis C cases



10% INCREASE in HIV cases



27% INCREASE in harm reduction programs

50% NEW HIV CASES self-reported injection drug use as a primary risk factor

FOR FIRST NATIONS PEOPLE ACROSS THE PROVINCE



11% INCREASE in number of HIV tests



2491 PEOPLE enrolled in opioid replacement programs
