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VALUE OF FRUIT PRODUCTION, 1956

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The total farm value of commercial fruit production for 1956 was 38.6 million dollars, a decrease of 2 per cent from the 1955 figure. Receipts from the sale of apples in 1956 stood at 16.0 million dollars, 48 per cent above the 10.9 million of 1955. This increase, however, was more than offset by declines in the value of soft fruits. Growers received an estimated 10.4 million dollars from the sale of tender-tree fruits in 1956 compared with 13.6 in 1955, while small fruit sales brought a total of 12.2 million dollars in 1956 and 15.2 in 1955.

Prices were higher in 1956 than in the previous year for all crops except strawberries. This reflected the smaller crops produced; without exception, yields were lower in 1956 than in the year previous. The year 1956 was in many ways exceptional; production in Eritish Columbia was severely reduced by low temperature damage the previous winter and in Ontario, the growing season was unfavourable due to cool, wet weather. On the other hand, in 1955, production of many fruits reached record levels.

The value of fruit crops in 1956 was higher in each of the Atlantic Provinces and Quebec, while in both Ontario and British Columbia, the total estimated returns to farmers from sales of fruits in 1956 were below those of 1955 due to lower returns for soft fruits. The value of apple production was up in both provinces, however. In the two years 1954 and 1953, fruit growers received a total of 48.1 million and 47.2 million dollars respectively, considerably above returns in either 1955 or 1956.

^{1/} The original estimates secured by the Eureau were stated in measures of volume (except loganberries, grapes and blueberries). These were converted to tons at the following rates: 1 quart of strawberries or raspberries = 1.25 pounds (except in British Columbia where the rate of 1 quart = 1.50 pounds was used) and one bushel of all other fruits = 50 pounds (net weight).
