TOBACCO PRODUCTION AND VALUE 1951

May 31, 1952. - The estimated production of tobacco in Canada was 153,792,000 pounds in 1951, almost 28 per cent greater than in 1950. The flue-cured (cigarette tobacco) crop in Ontario exceeded 140 million pounds in 1951, up from the previous year by about 36 million pounds. This accounted for practically all of the increase in the 1951 Canadian tobacco crop. Although average yields of all types of tobacco were greater in 1951, the important factor in increasing production was the larger acreage planted in Ontario during that season. The average price to the grower for all types was slightly higher for the 1951 crop than for the 1950 crop.
