Report on the Live Stock Survey of June 1, 1952

- Cattle - Sheep - Horses -

Ottawa, October 2, 1952: The Dominion Bureau of Statistics released today estimates of the numbers of cattle, sheep and horses on farms in Canada 1/at June 1, 1952. These estimates are based on replies received from farmers in the annual June sample survey conducted by mail.

- Cattle -

Total number of cattle estimated at 9,172,700 increased 10 per cent from the Census of Agriculture figure for number on farms at June 1, 1951. The number of milk cows was 2 per cent above the June 1, 1951 total having risen in all provinces except Manitoba and Saskatchewan. Other cattle, including calves, increased about 14 per cent. The number of all cattle, by provinces, 1951 Census figures in brackets, were as follows: Prince Edward Island 104,900 (97,900); Nova Scotia 185,700 (166,200); New Brunswick 177,900 (161,900); Quebec 1,808,000 (1,640,800); Ontario 2,737,000 (2,465,900); Manitoba 685,000 (671,200); Saskatchewan 1,382,000 (1,274,900); Alberta 1,754,000 (1,563,000); British Columbia 338,200 (321,300).

- Sheep -

Total numbers of sheep and lambs were estimated at 1,582,000 as compared with the Census figure of 1,461,200 at June 1, 1951, an increase of 8 per cent. All provinces except Nova Scotia and New Brunswick contributed to the increase in sheep numbers. There were rises of 14, 17, and 13 per cent in Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia respectively.

- Horses -

The number of horses on farms declined in all provinces with the greatest drop being in Ontario. Estimated at 1,180,500 the total of farm horses in Canada at June 1, 1952 was 9 per cent below the 1,303,800 as reported in the 1951 Census of Agriculture.

^{1/} Not including Newfoundland for which the latest official data are those of the Census of Agriculture taken as of June 1, 1951. At that time there were 4,100 milk cows and heifers, 3,900 other cattle, 17,500 sheep and 2,900 horses in Newfoundland.
