REPORT ON LIVESTOCK SURVEYS HOGS, JUNE 1, 1964

The number of hogs on farms in Canada(1) at June 1, 1964 is 7 estimated at 5,620,000 up 8 percent from 5,210,000 last year. Hog numbers in Eastern Canada increased 2 percent from 3,200,000 at June 1, 1963 to 3,256,000 at June 1, 1964 despite decreases in New Brunswick and Quebec. The West showed an 18 percent rise over last year, quite uniformly distributed over the Prairie provinces but the increase in British Columbia amounted to only 5 percent.

The spring pig crop, (pigs saved from litters farrowed December 1 to May 31), at 4,456,000 was 8 percent higher than that of 1963. The West had an increase of 21 percent whereas the Eastern crop was only 1 percent higher because increases in Prince Edward Island and Ontario, were almost offset by decreases in other provinces.

Farmers' reports in the June survey indicate that sows to farrow in the fall period, (June 1 to December 1), could be 552,500 which would be 6 percent above the number farrowed for last year's fall crop. No significant change from last year is expected in the East due to a 7 percent decline in Quebec. While a 17 percent rise is expected in the West this may be modified to some extent because drought conditions have persisted over considerable parts of the hog producing areas in Saskatchewan and Alberta since these reports were filed at June 1.

Overall it would appear that hog numbers are still increasing except for Quebec where all indications point to a downturn.

- Note-

The hog-barley ratio is the number of bushels of No. 1 feed barley required to equal the value of 100 pounds Grade B (live) hogs, both prices at Winnipeg. The long-time average ratio (1913-1949, 1930 omitted due to extreme abnormality) was 18.3. The average ratio 1939-1949 was 20.4 and for 1951 to 1960 it was 20.0.
