REPORT ON THE POULTRY SURVEY OF DECEMBER 1, 1955

These estimates of the number of poultry on farms in Canada 1/ at December 1 are based on farmers' replies in the semi-annual mail survey and were prepared in co-operation with provincial officials.

Total poultry on farms at December 1, 1955 were estimated at 41,829,000 birds. This was a reduction of 2,143,000, or 5 per cent, from the total of 43,972,000 on hand at December 1, 1954. The December, 1955 estimate is composed of 38,850,000 hens and chickens, 2,254,000 turkeys, 316,000 geese and 409,000 ducks.

The estimate of 38,850,000 hens and chickens showed a decline of 4 per cent from the previous December estimate of 40,536,000. This decline in numbers is shown by all classes except chicks up to 6 weeks old. Hens and pullets 6 months old and over dropped to 25,040,000 (9 per cent from December 1, 1954), pullets 6 weeks to 6 months old, to 6,359,000 (11 per cent below last year), cocks and cockerels over 6 weeks, to 3,480,000 (a 9 per cent decrease), but chicks up to 6 weeks old increased to 3,971,000 (86 per cent over the previous December). This large increase in chick numbers on farms at December 1 was due partly to increased activity in broiler production and partly to the incidence of a heavier fall output of layer stock than in 1954. Placement of chicks for egg production was accelerated by favourable egg prices during the fall, and early hatch followed the fall pattern of 1953 rather than that of 1954.

There were small increases in numbers of hens and pullets 6 months old and over in Nova Scotia, Saskatchewan and Alberta, in pullets 6 weeks to 6 months old in Manitoba, and large increases in chick numbers in all provinces except Nova Scotia. Saskatchewan, with a decrease of less than one per cent, showed the smallest decrease in total number of hens and chickens from the previous December 1 estimate.

By provinces, the estimates for hens and pullets over 6 months old which comprise the laying flock, except for pullets under 6 months old that have already started to lay, (with December 1, 1954 figures in brackets) were: Prince Edward Island, 390,000 (425,000); Nova Scotia, 985,000 (970,000); New Brunswick, 690,000 (780,000); Quebec, 3,295,000 (3,700,000); Ontario, 9,500,000 (11,500,000); Manitoba, 2,460,000 (2,550,000); Saskatchewan, 2,590,000(2,380,000); Alberta, 3,330,000 (3,200,000); British Columbia, 1,800,000 (1,900,000).

Turkeys, estimated at 2,254,000 were 15 per cent less than at December 1, 1954, while geese at 316,000, and ducks at 409,000, decreased 6 and 10 per cent respectively.

L/ Current estimates for Newfoundland are not available. The Census of June 1, 1951 reports 76,429 head of poultry on farms. By classes, the number reported was: hens and chickens, 73,714; turkeys, 1,553; geese, 548; ducks, 614. Elsewhere than on farms there were 206,167 hens and chickens and 9,074 other poultry.
