HONEY PRODUCTION* FIRST ESTIMATE - 1953

Preliminary estimates indicate a honey crop in 1953 of 26,174,000 pounds which is less than in 1952 by about 5.0 million pounds and is the smallest crop since 1946 when the figure was 23.2 million pounds. The short crop this year was caused by declines from 1952 in colony numbers which were reduced by six per cent and in yields per colony which were down 11 per cent.

A comparison between conditions in the honey industry in 1953 and 1952 showed considerable variations between provinces. The number of colonies was up in Nova Scotia, Quebec and British Columbia this year and unchanged in Manitoba; elsewhere the figures were smaller. Yields were higher in 1953 than in 1952 in New Brunswick, Manitoba, Alberta and British Columbia; elsewhere they were lower, being down particularly in Quebec and Ontario. The reduced yields in the central provinces were occasioned largely by winter killing of legumes which cut down the bee pastures resulting in a dearth of nectar during the summer of 1953.

With substantially larger crops this year, Manitoba and Saskatchewan together account for 30 per cent of the total crop, in contrast to about 19 per cent in 1952. Ontario and Quebec produced about 50 per cent of the honey this year and 62 per cent last year. This situation may be expected to result in increased shipments of western honey to the markets of Eastern Canada this year.

^{*}Source: Estimates for the province of Quebec are prepared by the Bureau of Statistics, Department of Trade and Commerce, of that province. For all other provinces except Newfoundland, for which data are not available, the estimates are prepared by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics in co-operation with the provinces. Three mail questionnaire surveys are conducted, one in July to obtain the number of colonies and another in September to determine yields. A final yield and price survey is conducted in November. Provincial officials provide the mailing lists of beekeepers and aid in the interpretation of survey results.
