

HONEY PRODUCTION \* FIRST ESTIMATE - 1957

Preliminary estimates indicate a honey crop in 1957 of 31.4 million pounds, 29 per cent above the 1956 crop of 24.3 million and also slightly higher than the 1946-55 average of 30.9 million pounds. The average yield for all provinces stood at 97 pounds per colony, a sharp increase of 31 per cent over last year's 74 pounds per colony and also above the ten-year average of 70 pounds. Colony numbers, at 323,800, were 2 per cent less than last year's 330,000. It is estimated that there were 14,930 active beekeepers this year and 14,410 last year.

Colony numbers were up this year in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Manitoba and Saskatchewan but down in Prince Edward Island, Quebec and Ontario and unchanged from last year in both Alberta and British Columbia.

Yields in 1957, as compared with those of the previous year, varied in different provinces. Throughout the Maritimes and in Manitoba, production per colony was less this year than last but elsewhere yields were much higher. The largest increases from the previous year were recorded in Alberta and Ontario. Production per colony in all areas except the Maritime provinces exceeded the ten-year average (1946-1955).

Source: Estimates for the province of Quebec are prepared by the Bureau of Statistics, Department of Trade and Commerce, of that province. For all other provinces except Newfoundland, for which data are not available, the estimates are prepared by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics in co-operation with the provinces. Three mail questionnaire surveys are conducted, one in July to obtain the number of colonies and another in September to determine yields. This report is based on the results of the July and September surveys. A final yield and price survey is conducted in November. Provincial officials provide the mailing lists of beekeepers and aid in the interpretation of survey results.
