FIRST ESTIMATE OF HONEY PRODUCTION - 1962*

Preliminary estimates indicate a honey crop in 1962 of 30.5 million pounds 13 per cent below the 1961 crop of 35.0 million pounds. However, this year's production is slightly higher than the 1951-60 average of 29.1 million pounds. The reduction in output this year was brought about by a drop in average yield per colony to 89 pounds from 104 pounds in 1961. A small increase in the number of colonies was insufficient to offset the lower yield. The number of active beekeepers, estimated at 10,500 this year was down from the 11,660 of 1961 and substantially below 14,720, the average for the period 1951-60.

Honey production was lower in 1962 than in 1961 in all provinces except Ontario and Quebec. This is attributed to unfavourable weather conditions. Wet, cool weather throughout most of the season prevailed in the Maritime Provinces while on the Prairies, conditions were also less favourable than last year. British Columbia also experienced much unsettled weather throughout most of the season. In Ontario and Quebec the early summer was dry but generous rains were received later favouring plant growth. As a result of the increased production in Ontario and Quebec this year and decreases in other provinces a larger proportion of the total Canadian crop was harvested east of the Great Lakes this year than last. The five eastern provinces produced a total of 14.3 million pounds, 47 per cent of the Canadian total in 1962 compared with 12.7 million pounds, 36 per cent of the crop in 1961.

Average yields per colony were lower this year than last except in Ontario and Quebec where increases were recorded. Similarly yields also fell below the 1951-60 average in all provinces except Quebec, Ontario and Manitoba.

* Source: Estimates for the province of Quebec are prepared by the Bureau of Statistics, Department of Trade and Commerce, of that province. For all other provinces, except Newfoundland, for which data are not available, the estimates are prepared by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics in co-operation with the Provinces. Three mail questionnaire surveys are conducted, one in July to obtain the number of colonies and another in September to determine yields. This report is based on the results of the July and September surveys. A final yield and price survey is conducted later. Provincial officials provide the mailing lists of beekeepers and aid in

the interpretation of survey results.
