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HONEY PRODUCTION 1951, FINAL ESTIMATES =

Ottawa, February 6, 1952.- The final estimate places the 1951 honey crop at 40.9 million pounds, which is 12.6 million pounds greater than the production in 1950 and is the largest crop since 1948. As there was a small decrease in the number of colonies from 1950 the higher production figure is explained by a substantial increase in the yield per colony attributed to favourable weather conditions last summer in Ontario and Quebec. Production in Ontario and Quebec in 1951 was greater than in the previous year by 14.2 million pounds while there were decreases in the three Prairie Provinces.

The average price to the producer for honey in 1951 was estimated to be 15 cents per pound which was the same as in 1950. In comparison with 1950 prices, decreases occurred in Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, Ontario and Alberta, while in Saskatchewan and British Columbia prices were up. With the Canadian average price remaining at the 1950 level and with increased production, the total value of the 1951 crop, at \$6.6 million, exceeded that of 1950 by over two million dollars.
