HONEY PRODUCTION 1953, FINAL ESTIMATES

The final estimate places the 1953 honey crop at 26.4 million pounds. This is about 4.8 million pounds less than in 1952 and is the smallest crop since 1946. Although both the total number of colonies of bees in Canada and the average yield were lower in 1953 than in 1952 production was down only in certain provinces. Lower projuction and yields in Ontario, Quebec and Alberta were responsible for mos of the overall decline. Nova Scotia, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and British Columbia reported higher yields and larger crops with quite substantial increases occurring in Manitoba and Saskatchewan.

The total value of the 1953 honey crop was \$4.1 million, about \$600.000 less than in 1952. The lower value was due to the smaller crop rather than to prices which were higher or equal to those of 1952 in all provinces.
