ESTIMATED VALUE OF HONEY PRODUCTION, 1959*

The average price received by beekeepers for 1959 crop honey is estimated at 17 cents per pound, the same as in 1958 and as the average for the period 1948-57. However, the total value of honey produced, placed at 5.4 million dollars in 1959, was considerably above the 1958 figure of 4.6 million due to a larger outturn in the more recent year. In 1959 beekeepers produced a total of 31.5 million pounds of honey, 15 per cent above the previous season's 27.5 million pounds.

These prices represent average returns per pound of honey, not including the cost of containers, received by beekeepers, as reported to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. Beekeepers replying to the second honey survey (the second survey of the 1959 crop was conducted in January, 1960) are asked to indicate the average price received for their honey. However, in the case of those patronizing co-operatives, final payments are not known to the individual producers at the time this survey is made. Co-operative establishments handling honey in Canada have now provided data on the volume of 1959 crop honey handled and the average returns paid to their patrons for that crop. This information has been used to calculate weighted average prices for the provinces concerned. The 1959 price estimates include payments made by the Agricultural Stabilization Board via the honey co-operatives.

Source: Estimates for the province of Quebec are prepared by the Bureau of Statistics. Department of Trade and Commerce, of that province. For all other provinces except Newfoundland, for which data are not available, the estimates are prepared by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics in co-operation with the provinces. Three mail questionnaire surveys are conducted, one in July to obtain the number of colonies and another in September to determine yields. A final yield and price survey is conducted at about the end of the year. Provincial officials provide the mailing lists of beekeepers and aid in the interpretation of survey results.
