The revised estimate of the 1964 honey crop stands at 36.7 million pounds, a decline of 13 per cert from the 1963 outturn of 42.1 million pounds. Although the 1964 honey crop was below the near record level of 1963, production was considerably above that of 1962 and the 1952-1961 average. The yield per colony averaged 96 pounds in 1964, considerably below the 117 pounds of the season before. An increase in colony numbers from 360 thousand in 1963 to 382 thousand in 1964 failed to offset the effect of the lower average yield per colony. Yields were down in all provinces except Ontario where there was a one pound increase to an average of 85 pounds per colony in 1964.

The total value of honey produced in Canada in 1964 is estimated at 6.7 million dollars, a decline of 12 per cent from the value of the 1963 crop. The average estimated return per pound of honey to the beekeepers was the same each year. These figures represent estimated total returns to beekeepers for honey, not including the cost of the containers. Beekeepers replying to the survey on which this report is based, i.e. the second 1964 honey crop survey, which was completed in the early part of 1965, were asked to indicate the average price received for their honey. In the case of those patronizing co-operatives, final payments to the individual producers were not known at the time this survey was made. Therefore, co-operative establishments handling honey in Canada were asked to prepare estimates of the volume and value of honey which they expected to handle and the average returns which they anticipated paying their patrons by the end of the season. Final figures will be obtained at a later date. This information was used in calculating the weighted average price for the provinces concerned. To the extent that such returns are estimates, the 1964 values are preliminary and subject to revision.

Sources: Estimates for the province of Quebec are prepared by the Bureau of Statistics, Department of Trade and Commerce, of that province. For all other provinces except Newfoundland, for which data are not available, the estimates are prepared by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics in co-operation with the provinces. Three mail questionnaire surveys are conducted, one in July to obtain the number of colonies and another in September to determine yields per colony. A final yield and price survey is conducted about the end of the year. Provincial officials provide the mailing lists of beekeepers and aid in the interpretation of survey results.
