ESTIMATED VALUE OF HONEY PRODUCTION, 1968

The revised estimate for the 1968 honey crops stands at 33.4 million pounds, a decrease of 12.3 million pounds from the 1967 outturn of 45.7 million pounds. Although the 1968 honey crop was considerably below last year's crop, it was only slightly below the 1956-65 average of 34.1 million pounds. The decrease in the 1968 production, as compared to that of 1967, was mainly due to a 22 pound reduction in the average yield per colony; although the total number of colonies at 414,060 was down from the 1967 figure of 445,070.

The 1968 average yields per colony were lower than those of 1967 in Nova Scotia, Quebec, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia, while in Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick and Ontario the average production per colony was larger than that of the previous year.

The total value of honey in thousand of dollars, produced in the various provinces in 1968, with 1967 figures in brackets, is as follows: Prince Edward Island \$10 (\$8), Nova Scotia \$49 (\$54), New Brunswick \$55 (\$37), Quebec \$671 (\$858), Ontario \$1,968 (\$1,327), Manitoba - not yet available for 1968 (\$1,280), Saskatchewan \$712 (\$984), Alberta \$1,432 (\$2,607), and British Columbia \$469 (\$584).

Beekeepers replying to the survey on which this report is based, i.e. the second 1968 honey crop survey, were asked to indicate the average price received for their honey. In the case of those patronizing co-operatives, final payments to the individual producers were not known at the time this survey was carried out. Therefore, co-operative establishments handling honey in Canada were asked to prepare estimates of the volume and value of honey which they expected to handle and the average returns which they anticipated paying to their patrons by the end of the season. Final figures will be obtained at a later date. The information received from both the beekeepers and the co-operative is used in calculating the weighted average price for the provinces concerned. To the extent that such returns from the co-operatives are forecasts, the 1968 values are preliminary and subject to revision.

Source: Estimates for the province of Quebec are prepared by the Bureau of Statistics, Department of Trade and Commerce, of that province. For all other provinces except Newfoundland, for which data are not available, the estimates are prepared by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics in co-operation with the provinces. Three mail questionnaire surveys are conducted, one in July to obtain the number of colonies and another in September to determine yields per colony. A final yield and price survey is conducted about the end of the year. Provincial officials provide the mailing lists of beekeepers and aid in the interpretation of survey results.
