SHORN WOOL PRODUCTION

Froduction of shorn wool in Canada from 1954 shearings is estimated at 6,810,000 pounds, greasy basis. This is an increase of 2.2 per cent from the 6,659,000 pounds produced in 1953.

Average fleece weight at about 7.4 pounds per sheep shorn is practically unchanged from 1953 for Canada as a whole with very moderate differences for all provinces except Saskatchewan where the decrease was .5 pounds and British Columbia with an increase of .7 pounds per fleece.

There was an increase of 2.6 per cent over last year in the number of sheep shorn. Sheep numbers increased in the Maritime Provinces, Quebec, Alberta and British Columbia.
