Wool production in Canada* during 1959, estimated at 8,287,000 pounds, was B. 7 per cent greater than the 1958 total of ",624,000 pounds. Production of shorn wool rese about per cent and the quantity pulled from sheep skins increased about 16 per cent from last year ${ }^{\circ}$ s output.

Exports of Canadian wool during 1959 amounted to 5,002,000 pounds (greasy equivaleut): up exactiy $1,000,000$ pounds from exports in 1958. Imports of wool increased from $42,209,000$ pounds in 1958 to $51,492,000$ pounds in 1959. This substantial increase in imports, coupled with greater production, resulted in a 20 per cent increase in apparent domestic disappearance of wool in Canada. The increase in utilizstion however cannot be stated precisely because data on change in stocks are not available.

Total farm value of shorn wool production in 1959 , estimated at $\$ 2,966,000$ Was about 3 per cent lower than the farm value of the smaller wool clip in 1958 , diue to a drop of 4.5 cents in the average value per pound. Average farm values of 48.1 cents in 1958 and 43.6 cents per pound of shorn wool in 1959 included subsidy payments under the Agricultural Stabilization Act of 28 and 21 cents per pound respectively, on wool graded in registered warehouses.
