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## ADVANCE REPORT ON THE FISHELIES OF BRITISH COLUMEIA, 1937

The following report on the fisheries of British Columbia for the year 1937 is issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics in co-operation with the Departmeat of Fisheries.

## PRODUCTION

The product of the British Columbia fisheries in 1937 had a total value of $\$ 16,155,439$, compared with $\$ 17,231,534$ in 1936 . These values are for the fish as marketed, whetier sold for consumption frech, or prepared in the various ways, as canned, smoked, dried, etc. Among the different kinds of lish, the salmon is of paramount importance, and to the decrease in value of the product of this fishery is due the drop in the total value of output of the fisheries of the province. The catch of British Columbia salmon in 1937 totalled 1,691,736 cwt, and the marketed value was $\$ 11,907,905$, a decrease in the catch, from the preceding year, of $303,763 \mathrm{cwt}$. , and a decrease in marketed value of $\$ 1,479,433$. The main item in the output of the salmon fishery is the canned product, and this dropped from 1,881,026 cases ( 48 pounds to the case), valued at $\$ 11,128,636$ in 1936 to $1,508,577$ cases, valued at $\$ 9,261,388$ in 1937 . A large part of the canned salmon produced is exported: in 1937 the total exporta amounted to 591,793 cwt. (approximately $1,232,302$ cases), valued at $\$ 7,533,648$. There were altogether 68 countries to which canned salmon was exported, the largest quantities going to the United Kingdom and Australia, with France third, the United States, fourth, and New Zealand, filth. Compared with the preceding year the total export shows an increase in quantity of $119,955 \mathrm{cwt}$ (approximately 249,906 cases), and an increase in value of $\$ 1,166,325$.

Among the otner important fisheries of British Columbia are the halibut and herring fisheries, the former with a product in 1937 valued at $\$ 1,190,056$, and the latter with $\$ 1,181,466$. Both of these kinds show increases over 1936 in quantity and marketed value. A considerable part of the herring catch is used in the manufacture of meal and oil, and this applies as well to the pilchard catch. The number of whales taken by British Columbia fishermen in 1937 was 317 , with a marketed value of $\$ 220,251$, compared with a catch of 370 and marketed value of $\$ 172,201$ in the preceding year. The chief product of the whale fishery is oil, and although the quantity produced in 1937 was less than in 1936 the total value increased owing to the higher average price per gallon received for the oil

The total quantity of fish of all kinds (exclusive of fur seals and whales) taken by British Columbia Cishermen during the year was $4,954,195 \mathrm{cwt}$, with a value

at the point of landing of $\$ 7,837,930$, compared with a catch of $4,896,753$, and a landed value of $\$ 7,503,637$ in 1936 .

## CAPITAL EQUIPMENT AND EMAPLOYEES

## In Primary Operatione:

Capitalo- An amount of $\$ 9,207,478$ is recorded as the value of the vessels, boats and gear used in the primary operations of catching and landing the fish, compared with a total of $\$ 9,870,417$ in 1936 . The principal items, in order of value, are "gasoline and diesel boats", value $\$ 4,113,124$, and "sailing, gasoline and diesel vessels", value \$2,802,790.

Employees. The number of fishermen employed during the year was 11,184, compared with $11,393^{\prime}$ in 1936 .

## _In Fish Canning and Curing:

Capital: The amount of capital invested in the fish canning and curing industry of British Columbia in 1937 is placed at $\$ 11,771,130$, of which the investment of the salmon canneries accounts for $\$ 8,377,110$ or 70 per cent. Compared with the preceding year, the total capital shows a decrease of $\$ 760,383$. The number of establishmente in operation was 84, compared with 91 in 1936.

Employees:- There were 5,574 persons employed by the establishments during the year, this total comprising 3,250 male and 2,324 Comale employees. Comparative figures for 1936 are: male 3,859; females 2,737; total 6,596.
