

ADVANCE REPORT ON THE FISHERIES OF ONTARIO, THE PRAIRIE PROVINCES AND YUKON, 1945

This Bulletin is issued in co-operation with the Dominion Fisheries Department and the Fisheries Departments of the provinces concerned.

CNTARIO FISHERIES

Production - The production of the fisheries of Ontario in 1945 was valued at \$7,261,661, an increase of \$2,323,468, or 47 p.c., as compared with 1944.

Whitefish was first in order of value, amounting to \$1,514,395, an increase of 12 p.c. over 1944. Blue pickerel came second with a marketed value of \$1,474,056, an increase of 54 p.c. over the 1944 figure. Herring came third with a marketed value of \$1,325,019, an increase over 1944 of 200 p.c. Trout, pickerel (dore), perch, tullibee, pike, sturgeon and catfish all registered values of \$100,000 or over, as shown in Table 2.

The quantity of fish landed was 342,748 cwt., an increase of 10 p.c. over the 1944 landings of 310,392 cwt. Eight varieties of fish showed increases in the quantity caught, while five showed decreases from the preceding year. The quantity of herring caught was three times as great as in previous years, the 1945 catch being 91,241 cwt, compared with 30,459 cwt. in 1944.

Capital Equipment and Employment. - The capital invested amounted to \$4,239,688, an increase of \$618,883 or 17 p.c. over 1944. Vessels and boats were valued at \$1,815,280, or 43 p.c. of the whole; the remainder (\$2,424,408), or 57 p.c. being the value of nets, lines and land equipment.

The number of men engaged in the fisheries in 1945 was 3,982, an increase of 173 over 1944.

THE PRAIRIE PROVINCES

Production. - The total marketed value of the fisheries production of the three Prairie Provinces was recorded at \$7,000,533 in 1945. This was an increase of \$1,006,628 or 16.8 p.c. over 1944. By provinces, the marketed values were: Manitoba, \$4,263,670; Saskatchewan, \$1,286,361; Alberta, \$1,450,502. Manitoba and Alberta registered increases of \$681,875 (19,0 p.c.) and \$520,615 (56.0 p.c.) respectively, but Saskatchewan showed a decrease of \$195,682 or 13.2 p.c. as compared with 1944.

Whitefish, pickerel and saugers still led in value. Saugers are reported from Manitoba only, where they are the third commercial fish in point of value, pickerel and whitefish being in first and second places. Whitefish is the leading species in the other two provinces.

The total catch for the three provinces was 506,999 cwt., valued at \$5,041,713 at the point of landing. This was an increase of 1.6 p.c. in quantity and of 16.5 p.c. in value over 1944. By provinces, the landings and values to fishermen were: Manitoba, 310,960 cwt. (\$3,418,209); Saskatchewan, 110,215 cwt. (\$881,558); Alberta, 85,824 cwt. (\$741,946). Manitoba recorded an increase of 6.0 p.c. in quantities landed and of 2.1 p.c. in landed value; Saskatchewan showed decreases of 14.9 p.c. in quantity and of 14.6 p.c. in value, while Alberta registered a gain of 12.4 p.c. in quantity and of 59.6 p.c. in value. The increase in landed value of whitefish alone accounted for 44.6 p.c. of the total increase in landed values for Alberta.

Capital Equipment and Employment - The capital invested in the fisheries of the three provinces amounted to \$2,855,823, an increase of \$111,900 or 4.07 p.c. over 1944. Alberta showed an increase of 51.3 p.c., while the other two provinces showed losses of 2.9 p.c. in Manitoba and of 6.0 p.c. in Saskatchewan.

The total number of men engaged in the three provinces was 13,869. This showed 19 fewer for the Manitoba fisheries, 351 fewer for Saskatchewan, but 1,685 more for Alberta, or an overall gain of 1,315 men over 1944.

YUKON

The production of Yukon was valued at \$3,138 as compared with \$3,131 in 1944. The catch was 292 cwt. as compared with 281 cwt. in 1944. The number of boats and nets showed a decrease, but wheels registered a gain of 6. Employment was afforded to 28 men. a decrease of 10 from 1944.

NORTHWEST TERRITORIES

The opening of a commercial fishery in Great Slave Lake has created considerable interest and the following figures have been compiled for the whole Territory. Statistics for Great Slave Lake have been furnished by the Dominion Department of Fisheries and those for the other districts by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police. The catch of all species amounted to 32,913 cwt., with a landed value of \$111,678. Statistics of employment and of gear used are lacking. Production, by species, was as follows:




