

PRELIMINARY REPORT ON THE FISHERIES OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND, 1929.

The following preliminary report on the fisheries of Prince Edward Island, for the year 1929, is issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, in co-operation with the Department of Marine and Fisheries.

PRODUCTION

The product of the fisheries of Prince Edward Island in 1929 had a total value of \$1,366,428, compared with \$1,195,577 in 1928. These totals represent the value of the fish as marketed, whether sold for consumption fresh, or canned, cured, or otherwise prepared. The lobster fishery is of chief importance with a product in 1929 valued at \$881,210, or 64 per cent of the total value of fisheries output for the province. Canned lobster is the principal product of this fishery, the pack in 1929 amounting to 28,399 cases of 48 pounds each, valued at \$686,940. Prices for canned lobster averaged \$24 per case, compared with \$25 in 1928. The cod is second in importance among the chief commercial fishes, with a product in 1929 valued at \$119,000, followed by smelt, herring, oyster and mackerel. The total quantity of fish of all kinds caught during 1929 was 243,404, compared with 204,671 cwt. in 1928. The total value of the fish as caught and landed, i.e., the amount received by the fishermen for their catch, was \$933,563, compared with \$848,118 in the preceding year.

CAPITAL EQUIPMENT AND EMPLOYEES

PRIMARY OPERATIONS:


Capital.— The value of the vessels, boats and gear employed in the primary operations of catching and landing the fish, for the year 1929, was \$725,157, a decrease from the preceding year of about \$25,000. See table 4 for the number and value of vessels and boats and of the various kinds of nets, traps, etc.

Employees.- The number of persons engaged in these operations in compared with 2,396 in 1928.

FISH CANNING AND CURING ESTABLISHMENTS:


Capital.— The number of establishments in operation during the year was 100, and the capital investment had a total value of \$179,968. In the preceding year the establishments numbered 108, and the capital investment was valued at \$190,290. Nearly all of the establishments are classed as lobster canneries, the number of these in 1929 being 88, and in the preceding year, 103. The number of clam canneries increased from 3 in 1928 to 7 in 1929, and the number of fish curing establishments from 2 to 5.

Employees.- The number of persons employed in the establishments was 3,466, a decrease of 141 from the year 1928.


