## SAND AND GRAVEL, 1927.

Sand and gravel production in Canada during 1927 reached a new high mark at $22,952,519$ tons worth $\$ 6,055,601$ as against $17,112,798$ tons worth $\$ 4,941,434$ shipped in 1926.

Imports of sand and gravel into Canada in 1927 were recorded at 289,741 tons and $\$ 200,470$, while silica sand imported for the manufacture of glass and carborundum and for use in foundries amounted to 148,831 tons invoiced at $\$ 346,138$. Exports of sand and gravel totalled 637,627 tons worth $\$ 177,999$ in 1927.

Capital employed, including cost of pits, equipment, stock on hand, cash and collectable accounts, by the 483 operators in the sand and gravel industry amounted to $\$ 7,668,812$. employees numbered 7,133, comprising 119 salaried employees and 7,014 wageearners. Salaries and wages totalled \$2,043,962. Fuel and electricity cost \$188,327 including $\$ 17,471$ for electric power. Primary power employed consisted of 96 units rated at 4,305 hop.

The data referring to capital actually employed and fuel costs do not include statistics regarding the sand and gravel operations conducted by railway companies,
