



THE STONE INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1928.

The stone industry in Canada comprises two main divisions: (a) The Stone
Quarrying Industry, including quarries and dressing works operated in conjunction with
quarries; and (b) The Monumental and Ornamental Stone Industry, comprising the operations
of firms which have no quarries, but who operate dressing works where stone for building
and monumental purposes is cut, polished or otherwise finished.


In the Canadian stone industry as a whole in 1928 there were 476 firms having a total capital investment of \$\psi_22,333,066\$, according to finally revised statistics compiled by the mining, metallurgical and chemical branch of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics at Ottawa. Production during the year was valued at \$\psi_14,987,435\$, which included the value of the quarry output and the value added by manufacturing in the secondary stone industry. Employment was furnished 6,815 persons and their total earnings amounted to \$7,385,221.

In the following pages, the two industries are reviewed separately.


(1). PRIMARY PRODUCTION - The Stone Quarrying Industry includes data on stone quarries and on dressing works operated in conjunction with quarries.

Stone production from Canadian quarries during 1928 advanced 12.97 per cent in quantity and 10.87 per cent in value; the total shipments were 8,253,934 tons valued at \$10,272,301 as compared with 7,306,436 tons worth \$7,865,874 shipped in 1927. Ontario was the leading producer, accounting for 55.5 per cent of the total output; Quebec followed with 36.3 per cent and the other provinces in order of tonnages produced were: British Columbia, Manitoba, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Alberta.

Capital employed by the 254 firms operating in the stone quarrying industry in Canada in 1928 was reported at \$16,027,547. Salaried employees and wage-earners employed during the year totalled 5,129; their combined earnings amounted to \$4,806,514. Fuel and electricity used during 1928 cost \$579,086.

(2). SECONDARY PRODUCTION - The Monumental and Ornamental Stone Industry includes the cutting, polishing or other finishing of stone in plants not operated in conjunction with quarries.

Production from the 222 stone dressing works in the Dominion rose to a new high level of \$7,176,034 in 1928 as compared with a total of \$5,606,984 in 1927. These totals include cut and polished stone for ornamental, monumental and building purposes; the largest single item for 1928 was limestone for building which was valued at \$2,861,336. Distribution by provinces of the plants in operation during 1928 was as follows: Ontario, 118; Quebec, 45; Manitoba, 13; British Columbia, 11; New Brunswick, 10; Nova Scotia, 10; Saskatchewan, 8; Alberta, 5; and Prince Edward Island, 2. Stone used in these plants during 1928 cost \$2,460,900; capital employed amounted to \$6,305,519; employees numbered 1,686, and salaries and wages totalled \$2,578,707.



(3). IMPORTS AND EXPORTS OF STORE .- The total imports of stone into Canada during 1928 were valued at \$1,550,447, an increase of approximately 40 per cent over the total for 1927 of (1,110,100. Granite imports in 1928 were appraised at (248,444 made up of importations from the United Kingdom valued at (91,324; the United States, (56,350; Germany, \$37,495; Sweden, \$27,421; Finland, \$21,229; Czechoslovakia, \$13,804; and minor shipments from Switzerland, France and Italy. Paving blocks worth \$10,919 were brought into Canada from the United States. Imports of marble (rough, sawn and manufactures of) into Canada in 1928 were valued at \$433,923; producers in the United States supplied 69.8 per cent or \$302,903; those in Italy, 23.4 per cent or \$101,424; and the remainder, in order of import value, came from Belgium, France, the United Kingdom, Germany, Sweden, Finland, Cuba, Czechoslovakia, Austria, Switzerland and British India. Other building stone and flagstone to a value of \$412,882 were imported in 1928, principally from the United States. In 1928, Canada imported from the United States and Newfoundland refuse stone amounting to 597,134 tons worth \$373,453. Exports of Canadian stone were valued at \$250,215, as compared with \$141,306 for 1927; increased exports of crushed stone accounted for this advance.
