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PRODUCTION OF BUTTER AND CHEESE

The production of creamery butter in Canada during the month of February, 1937 amounted to 7,479,330 pounds as compared with 8,021,373 pounds in February, 1936 a decrease of approximately 542 thousand pounds or 6.8 per cent.

Cheese production in Canada in the month of February, 1937 reached a total of 768,667 pounds. In the five provinces, Quebec, Ontario, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia, for which comparative data are available for the same month last year, a decrease of about 61 thousand pounds or 8.0 per cent is recorded.

STOCKS OF DAIRY AND POULTRY PRODUCTS

Creamery butter reported in cold storage warehouses and creameries at March 1, 1937 amounted to 18,516,385 pounds. Making an estimate to cover the holdings of firms that failed to report, this figure is increased by 323,816 pounds giving a grand total of 18,840,201 pounds. Of this amount 12,561,443 pounds were held in cold storage warehouses and 6,278,758 pounds in creameries. Estimated stocks shown in the Canada totals are not included in the figures by provinces. Comparing the grand total as at March 1, 1937 with stocks reported at the same date of the previous year, an increase of approximately 2.4 million pounds or 14.7 per cent is shown, and compared with the grand total at the first of the previous month, there was a decrease of 9.8 million pounds or 34.4 per cent. The holdings of new firms added to the list since July 1, 1936 amounted to approximately 148 thousand pounds. Stocks of butter in the custody of railways, at terminals and in transit which are separately reported in this statement, amounted to 800,800 pounds as compared with 632,800 pounds a year ago. Both of these figures include 44,800 pounds consigned for export.

Dairy butter stocks reported at March 1, 1937 amounted to 109,323 pounds. Compared with the same date last year these stocks represent an increase of about 17 thousand pounds or 18.8 per cent, and in comparison with the corresponding figure for the previous month, a decrease of approximately 42 thousand pounds or 27.9 per cent is recorded.

Stocks of cheese reported in cold storages and dairy factories at March 1, 1937 amounted to 20,585,997 pounds. With the addition of 79,457 pounds to cover outstanding firms there is shown a grand total of 20,665,454 pounds. Compared with the same date last year these stocks represent an increase of approximately 1.3 million pounds or 6.8 per cent, and with the grand total of the previous month a decrease of approximately 1.7 million pounds or 7.6 per cent. Stocks contributed by new firms which were added to the list since January 1, 1937 amounted to approximately 2.6 million pounds.

The reported holdings of cold storage eggs on March 1, 1937 were 618,342 dozens. These holdings represent an increase of approximately 612 thousand dozens as compared with those reported at the same date last year, and a decrease of approximately 325 thousand dozens or 34.5 per cent in comparison with the stocks reported at the first of the previous month. Fresh eggs amounted to 732,695 dozens which includes 1,460 dozens of estimated stocks. Comparing these stocks with those reported at the same date of the previous year an increase of approximately 645 thousand dozens is recorded, and with the previous month a decrease of approximately 250 thousand dozens. Frozen eggs reported at March 1, 1937 amounted to 2,781,165 pounds. These holdings represent an increase of approximately 1.1 million pounds or 69.5 per cent over the stocks in store at March 1, 1936 and a decrease of approximately 332 thousand pounds or 10.7 per cent as compared with those reported at the first of the previous month. Unclassified stocks of eggs in transit amounted to 29,460 dozens compared with 29,460 dozens a year ago.

Concentrated whole milk products amounted to 7,452,854 pounds on March 1, 1937. In comparison with the quantities reported at the same date in 1936 there was an increase of approximately 1 million pounds or 16.7 per cent, and compared with the holdings at the first of the previous month a decrease of approximately 1 million pounds or 12.6 per cent. Stocks of concentrated milk by-products were reported as 1,152,641 pounds, representing decreases of approximately 836 thousand pounds from the same date last year and approximately 487 thousand pounds from the holdings reported at the first of the previous month.

Stocks of poultry, including estimated holdings of 22,344 pounds, amounted to 13,928,338 pounds, representing an increase of approximately 3.9 million pounds or 39.5 per cent over the same date last year and a decrease of approximately 1.8 million pounds or 11.3 per cent as compared with the stocks shown at the first of the previous month. Transit stocks were 198,000 pounds as compared with 66,000 pounds shown a year ago.
