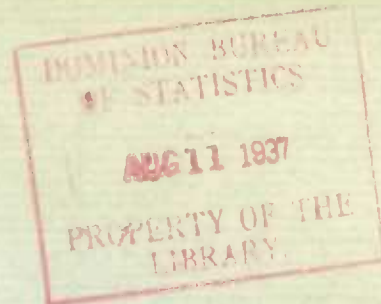

STOCKS OF DAIRY AND POULTRY PRODUCTS

CREAMERY BUTTER. The grand total of creamery butter on hand in Canada at the opening of business on August 1, 1937, amounted to 40,304,792 lb., consisting of 39,692,867 lb. actually reported and 611,925 lb. estimated for firms that failed to report. Of the grand total 26,869,602 lb. were held in cold storage warehouses and 13,435,190 lb. in dairy factories. Estimated stocks are shown separately for Canada and for the provinces. A comparison of the grand total with stocks reported as of the same date last year shows a decrease of about 1.2 million lb. or 3.0 per cent; while a similar comparison of last month's revised report shows an increase of nearly 13.9 million lb. or 52.9 per cent.

Stocks held by new firms, added to the list since February 1, 1937, amounted to approximately 57 thousand lb. Carloads of butter in transit by rail and at railway terminals, reported by the railway companies, amounted to 756,000 lb. as compared with 912,800 lb. a year ago and 588,000 lb. last month.

DAIRY BUTTER. The stocks of this commodity as reported at August 1, 1937 amounted to 403,160 lb. In comparison with the stocks at August 1, 1936, there is an increase this year of 76 thousand lb. being 23.3 per cent and compared with last month there is an increase of 116 thousand lb. or 40.7 per cent.

CHEESE. Warehouses and dairy factories reported 32,988,528 lb. of cheese. Adding 966,253 lb. as the estimate for outstanding firms, a grand total of 33,954,781 lb. is shown. These figures represent an increase of approximately 3.3 million lb. or 10.6 per cent over last year, and an increase of 4.6 million lb. or 15.8 per cent over last month.

New firms, added to the list since February 1, 1937, contributed approximately 2.2 million lb.

CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS. Whole Milk products amounted to 15,424,091 lb. At the same date last year the quantities reported were 14,083,837 lb. This month's figure is approximately 1.3 million lb. or 9.5 per cent more than on August 1, 1936 and about 2.3 million lb. or 17.1 per cent over July 2, 1937.

By-Products amounted to 1,647,780 lb. as compared with 2,381,648 lb. for the same month in 1936, being a decrease of 633,868 lb. or 30.8 per cent, while compared with last month there is a decrease of 496,124 lb. or 23.1 per cent.

EGGS. Cold Storage eggs are reported to a total of 10,393,189 dozens. Adding 158,280 dozens for the estimate to cover outstanding firms, there is a grand total of cold storage eggs of 10,551,469 dozens, representing an increase of 531,913 dozens or 5.3 per cent over last year and a decrease of 98,175 dozens or 0.9 per cent over last month.

Fresh eggs reported amounted to 586,553 dozens. This, together with the estimate of 5,599 dozens, amounts to a grand total of 592,150 dozens, being 210,014 dozens or 55.0 per cent greater than last year, and 119,899 dozens or 16.8 per cent less than last month.

Eggs in transit in carloads amounted to 117,840 dozens as compared with 220,950 dozens last year and 176,760 dozens last month.

Frozen eggs amounted to 5,946,965 lb. This amount is 852,562 lb. or 16.7 per cent more than last year and 249,687 lb. or 4.4 per cent more than July 2, 1937.

DRESSED POULTRY. Chickens in stock amounted to 1,091,677 lb; fowl to 1,289,216 lb. and turkeys to 2,282,544 lb. Total stocks of all poultry amounted 5,328,636 lb. being an increase of 1.1 million lb. or 26.5 per cent over the figures of August 1, 1936 and approximately $\frac{1}{2}$ million lb. or 10.3 per cent under July 2, 1937 figures. Included in the total stocks is an estimate of 59,945 lb. for outstanding firms.

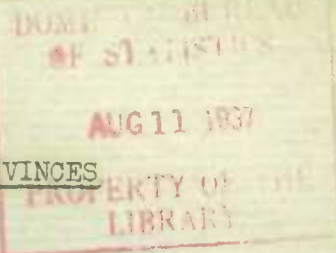
