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STOCKS OF DAIRY AND POULTRY PRODUCTS, NOVEMBER 1, 1939

CREAMERY BUTTER.

The Grand Total of creamery butter in Canada at the opening of business on November 1 was 56,203,733 lb. of which 55,923,733 lb. was in Storage and 280,000 lb. in Carloads in the hands of the railway companies. All of the storage butter was of Canadian make, 41,276,381 lb. being held in cold storage warehouses, and 14,647,352 lb. or 26.2 per cent in dairy factories. In these figures, however, there was included an estimate of 922,000 lb. for firms failing to report on time.

The Grand Total stocks were 6.5 million lb. or 10.5 per cent less than last year. The net "Out-of-Storage" movement for the month of October was 1.0 million lb. equivalent to 4.4 per cent of the preliminary figures of production for the same month, as compared with an "Out-of-Storage" movement of 2.2 million lb. for October, 1938.

DAIRY BUTTER.

The stocks of this commodity as reported at November 1, 1939 amounted to 228,044 lb. which was a decrease of 275,547 lb. from last year.

CHEESE.

Warehouses and dairy factories reported 41,461,796 lb. of cheese. Adding 642,000 lb. as the estimate for outstanding firms, a grand total of 42,103,796 lb. is shown.

These figures represent a decrease of 2.1 million lb. or 4.9 per cent under last year and a net "Out-of-Storage" movement of 10.1 million lb. as compared with a similar movement of 3.0 million lb. for October 1938. The "Out-of-Storage" movement for October 1939 was equivalent to 19.3 per cent of last month's revised holdings.

CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS.

Whole Milk products amounted to 9,062,375 lb. Stocks of Evaporated Whole Milk amounted to 7,516,900 lb. which is a decrease of 10 million lb. from last year. The net "Out-of-Storage" movement of Evaporated Whole Milk for October was 62 thousand lb.

By-Products totalled 4,915,673 lb. Included in this amount are 3,813,000 lb. of Skim Milk Powder, a decrease of 3.1 million lb. from last year.

EGGS.

Cold Storage eggs amounted to a total of 4,627,033 dozens.

Fresh eggs were reported to a total of 269,342 dozens.

Total Shell Eggs were 9.9 per cent less than last year at this time. The figures show a net "Out-of-Storage" movement of 2.8 million dozens, as compared with a net "Out-of-Storage" movement of 2.9 million dozens for October 1938.

Shell eggs in transit at November 1, 1939 amounted to 103,110 dozens.

Frozen eggs totalled 4,825,120 lb. being 21.7 per cent more than the 1938 figures. The net "Out-of-Storage" movement was 544 thousand lb. as compared with a like movement of 540 thousand lb. during October 1938.

DRESSED POULTRY.

Total stocks of all poultry as reported at November 1, 1939 were 4,562,651 lb. being 32.9 per cent more than at the same date last year. Chickens in stock amounted to 2,041,473 lb., fowl to 1,454,838 lb. and turkeys to 233,983 lb.

The net "Into-Storage" movement of all dressed poultry was 1.3 million lb. as compared with 321 thousand lb. in October 1938.

N.B. Shell Eggs. The report for October 1, 1939 stated the net "Out-of-Storage" movement was "1.1 million dozens". This should have read "408 thousand dozens".
