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STOCKS OF DAIRY AND POULTRY PRODUCTS, SEPTEMBER 1, 1939

CREAMERY BUTTER. The Grand Total of creamery butter in Canada at the opening of business on September 1 was 55,384,736 lb. of which 54,975,936 lb. was in Storage and 408,800 lb. in Carloads in the hands of the railway companies. All of the storage butter was of Canadian make, 39,637,901 lb. being held in cold storage warehouses, and 15,338,035 lb. or 27.9 per cent in dairy factories. In these figures, however, there was included an estimate of 1,639,000 lb. for firms failing to report on time.

The Grand Total stocks were 6.1 million lb. or 10 per cent less than last year. The net "Into-Storage" movement for the month of August was 9.3 million lb. equivalent to 27.5 per cent of the preliminary figures of production for the same month, as compared with an "Into-Storage" movement of 10.7 million lb. for August 1938, with imported stocks calculated.

DAIRY BUTTER. The stocks of this commodity as reported at September 1, 1939 amounted to 291,177 lb. which was a decrease of 138,650 lb. from last year.

CHEESE. Warehouses and dairy factories reported 50,765,421 lb. of cheese. Adding 1,742,000 lb. as the estimate for outstanding firms, a grand total of 52,507,421 lb. is shown.

These figures represent an increase of 8.9 million lb. or 20.3 per cent over last year and a net "Into-Storage" movement of 7.2 million lb. compared with a similar movement of 4.7 million lb. for August 1938. The net "Into-Storage" movement for August 1939 was equivalent to 35.6 per cent of the preliminary figures of production for the same month.

CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS. Whole Milk products amounted to 10,583,963 lb. Stocks of Evaporated Whole Milk amounted to 8,332,737 lb. which is a decrease of 14.5 million lb. from last year. The net "Into-Storage" movement of Evaporated Whole Milk for July was 2.8 million lb.

By-Products totalled 6,867,630 lb. Included in this amount are 5,264,958 lb. of Skim Milk Powder, a decrease of 803 thousand lb. from last year.

EGGS. Cold Storage eggs amounted to a total of 7,861,333 dozens.

Fresh eggs were reported to a total of 591,488 dozens.

Total Shell Eggs were 12 per cent less than last year at this time. The figures show a net "Out-of-Storage" movement of 220 thousand dozens, as compared with a net "Into-Storage" movement of 315 thousand doz. for August 1938.

Shell eggs in transit at September 1, 1939 amounted to 29,460 dozens.

Frozen eggs totalled 6,009,041 lb. being 24.4 per cent greater than the 1938 figures. The net "Out-of-Storage" movement was 402 thousand lb. as compared with a like movement of 160 thousand lb. during August 1938.

DRESSED POULTRY. Total stocks of all poultry as reported at September 1, 1939 were 2,894,628 lb. being 0.5 per cent less than at the same date last year. Chickens in stock amounted to 667,109 lb. fowl to 664,874 lb. and turkeys to 899,081 lb.

The net "Out-of-Storage" movement of all dressed poultry was 355 thousand lb. as compared with 320 thousand lb. in August 1938.

OF THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE LAND OFFICE, FOR THE YEAR 1900.
