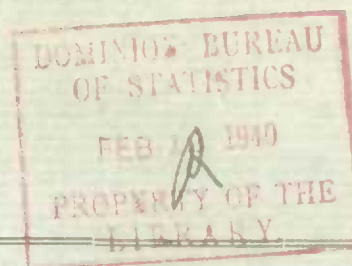

STOCKS OF DAIRY AND POULTRY PRODUCTS, FEBRUARY 1, 1940

CREAMERY BUTTER.

The Total of the Summary of Creamery Butter in Canada at the opening of business on February 1 was 33,381,447 lb. of which 32,748,759 lb. was Canadian make In Storage; 464,800 lb. in Carloads in the hands of the railway companies, and 167,888 lb. In Bond. Of the Canadian butter 23,669,425 lb. were held in cold storage warehouses and 9,079,334 lb., or 27.7 per cent, in dairy factories. In these figures, however, there was included an estimate of 640,000 lb. for firms failing to report on time.

The Grand Total storage stocks of Canadian make were 1.5 million lb, or 4.4 per cent less than last year. The net "Out-of-Storage" movement for the month of January was 8.2 million lb. (being 19.9 per cent of the revised total stocks of January 1, 1940) as compared with an "Out-of-Storage" movement of 9.5 million lb. for January, 1939.

DAIRY BUTTER.

The stocks of this commodity as reported at February 1, 1940 amounted to 147,316 lb. which was a decrease of 291,226 lb. from last year.

CHEESE.

Warehouses and dairy factories reported 20,135,622 lb. of cheese. Adding 330,000 lb. as the estimate for outstanding firms, a grand total of 20,465,622 lb. is shown.

These figures represent a decrease of 9.4 million lb. or 31.4 per cent under last year and a net "Out-of-Storage" movement of 5.3 million lb. as compared with a similar movement of 1.6 million lb. for January 1939. The "Out-of-Storage" movement for January 1940 was equivalent to 20.4 per cent of last month's revised holdings.

CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS:

Whole Milk products amounted to 10,198,393 lb. Stocks of Evaporated Whole Milk amounted to 9,101,497 lb., which is a decrease of 4.3 million lb. from last year. The net "Out-of-Storage" movement of Evaporated Whole Milk for January was 3.5 million lb.

By-Products totalled 3,434,273 lb. Included in this amount are 2,876,022 lb. of Skim Milk Powder, a decrease of 2.8 million lb. from last year.

EGGS.

Cold Storage eggs amounted to a total of 779,652 dozens.

Fresh eggs were reported to a total of 1,101,126 dozens.

Total Shell Eggs were 64.4 per cent more than last year at this time. The figures show a net "Into-Storage" movement of 431 thousand dozens, as compared with a net "Out-of-Storage" movement of 113 thousand dozens for January 1939.

Shell eggs in transit at February 1, 1940 amounted to 14,730 dozens.

Frozen eggs totalled 3,261,286 lb. being 22.9 per cent more than the 1939 figures. The net "Out-of-Storage" movement was 463 thousand lb. as compared with a like movement of 302 thousand lb. during January 1939.

DRESSED POULTRY.

Total stocks of all poultry as reported at February 1, 1940 were 13,939,783 lb. being 26.3 per cent more than at the same date last year. Chickens in stock amounted to 6,243,065 lb., fowl to 2,354,436 lb. and turkeys to 4,343,041 lb.

The net "Out-of-Storage" movement of all dressed poultry was 1.2 million lb. as compared with 1.5 million lb. in January 1939.
