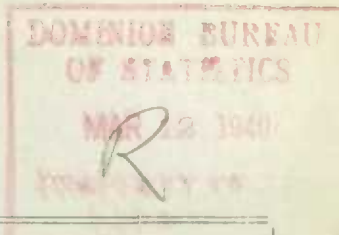

CREAMERY BUTTER.

The Total of the Summary of Creamery Butter in Canada at the opening of business on March 1 was 23,346,491 lb. of which 22,587,855 lb. was Canadian make In Storage; 616,000 lb. in Carloads in the hands of the railway companies, and 142,636 lb. In Bond. Of the Canadian butter in storage 15,857,042 lb. were held in cold storage warehouses and 6,730,813 lb., or 29.8 per cent, in dairy factories. In these figures, however, there was included an estimate of 372,000 lb. for firms failing to report on time.

The Grand Total storage stocks of Canadian make were 300 thousand lb. or 1.3 per cent less than last year. The net "Out-of-Storage" movement for the month of February was 10 million lb. (being 30.9 per cent of the revised total stocks of February 1, 1940) as compared with a similar movement of 11.4 million lb. for February 1939.

DAIRY BUTTER.

The stocks of this commodity as reported at March 1, 1940 amounted to 140,878 lb. which was a decrease of 117,157 lb. from last year.

CHEESE.

Warehouses and dairy factories reported 14,653,506 lb. of cheese. Adding 192,000 lb. as the estimate for outstanding firms, a grand total of 14,845,506 lb. is shown.

These figures represent a decrease of 12.5 million lb. or 45.6 per cent under last year, and a net "Out-of-Storage" movement of 5.8 million lb. as compared with a similar movement of 2.5 million lb. for February 1939. The "Out-of-Storage" movement for February 1940 was equivalent to 27.9 per cent of last month's revised holdings.

CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS:

Whole Milk products amounted to 8,234,597 lb. Stocks of Evaporated Whole Milk amounted to 7,333,639 lb., (including an estimate of 540 thousand lb. for firms failing to report) which is a decrease of 726 thousand lb. from last year. The net "Out-of-Storage" movement of Evaporated Whole Milk for February was 1.8 million lb.

By-Products totalled 2,978,714 lb. Included in this amount are 2,517,994 lb. of Skim Milk Powder, (which also includes an estimate of 625 thousand lb.) a decrease of 3 million lb. from last year.

EGGS.

Cold Storage eggs amounted to a total of 681,886 dozens.

Fresh eggs were reported to a total of 778,117 dozens.

Total Shell Eggs were 143.4 per cent more than last year at this time. The figures show a net "Out-of-Storage" movement of 429 thousand dozens, as compared with a similar movement of 544 thousand dozens for February 1939.

Shell eggs in transit at March 1, 1940 amounted to 88,380 dozens.

Frozen eggs totalled 3,115,809 lb. being 35.1 per cent more than the 1939 figures. The net "Out-of-Storage" movement was 154 thousand lb. as compared with a like movement of 347 thousand lb. during February 1939.

DRESSED POULTRY.

Total stocks of all poultry as reported at March 1, 1940 were 12,159,619 lb. being 36.6 per cent greater than at the same date last year. Chickens in stocks amounted to 5,293,660 lb., fowl to 2,065,807 lb. and turkeys to 4,017,394 lb.

The net "Out-of-Storage" movement of all dressed poultry was 1.9 million lb. as compared with 2.1 million lb. in February 1939.
