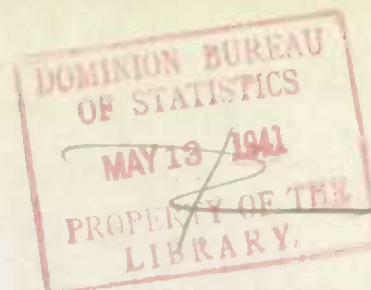

STOCKS OF DAIRY AND POULTRY PRODUCTS, MAY 1, 1941

CREAMERY BUTTER

The total of the Summary of Creamery Butter in Canada at the opening of business on May 1, 1941 was 10,171,704 lb. of which 9,662,895 lb. was Canadian make in storage, 308,000 lb. in Carloads in the hands of the railway companies, 13,097 lb. "Imported" and 187,712 lb. held "In Bond". Of the Canadian butter in storage 4,308,927 lb. were held in cold storage warehouses and 5,353,968 lb., or 55.4 per cent., in dairy factories. In these figures, however, there was included an estimate of 542,000 lb. for firms failing to report on time.

The Grand Total storage stocks of Canadian make were 696 thousand lb. less than last year, the decrease being 6.7 per cent. The net "Out-of-Storage" movement for the month of April was 896 thousand lb. (being 8.5 per cent of the revised total stocks for April 1, 1941) as compared with a similar movement of 3.3 million lb. for April 1940.

DAIRY BUTTER

The stocks of this commodity as reported at May 1, 1941 amounted to 58,888 lb., which was a decrease of 24,341 lb. from last year.

CHEESE

Warehouses and dairy factories reported 15,158,061 lb. of cheese. Adding 141,000 lb. as the estimate for outstanding firms, a grand total of 15,299,061 lb. is shown.

These figures represent an increase of 1.2 million lb., or 8.8 per cent over last year, and a net "Into-Storage" movement of 494 thousand lb., as compared with a like movement of 577 thousand lb. for April 1940. The net "Into-Storage" movement for April 1941 was equivalent to 13.3 per cent of the preliminary figures of April production.

CONCENTRATED MILK PRODUCTS

Stocks of Evaporated Whole Milk amounted to 4,129,335 lb. which is a decrease of 8.1 million lb. from last year. The apparent net "Into-Storage" movement of Evaporated Whole Milk for April was 7 thousand lb.

The chief by-product, Skim Milk Powder amounted to 1,449,169 lb., a decrease of 1.2 million lb. from last year, and a decrease of 26 thousand lb. from last month.

EGGS

Cold Storage Eggs came to a total of 3,856,823 dozens.

Fresh Eggs totalled 1,914,030 dozens.

Total Shell Eggs were 25.2 per cent more than last year at this time. The figures show a net "Into-Storage" movement of 3.4 million dozens, as compared with a similar movement of 3.0 million dozens for April 1940.

Shell eggs in transit at May 1, 1941 amounted to 574,470 dozens.

Frozen eggs totalled 4,497,937 lb., being 19.5 per cent. more than the 1940 figures. The net "Into-Storage" movement was 677 thousand lb. as compared with a like movement of 766 thousand lb. during April 1940.

DRESSED POULTRY

Total stocks of all poultry reported and estimated at May 1, 1941 were 6,471,960 lb., being 17.8 per cent. less than at the same date last year. Chickens in stock amounted to 2,563,900 lb; fowl to 399,155 lb; and turkeys to 3,088,069 lb.

The net "Out-of-Storage" movement of all dressed poultry was 1.8 million lb. as compared with 2.0 million lb. in April 1940.

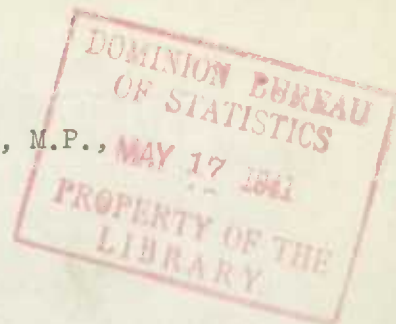
